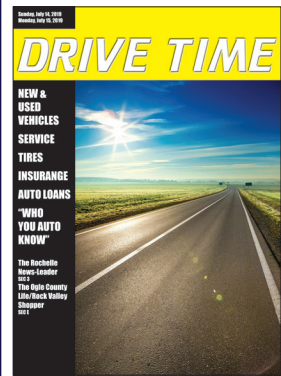

TV personality donates to Kitchen Table

ROCHELLE – When many people hear the name Mike Rowe, they might first think of the celebrity's hit television show Dirty Jobs, where he travels across the country and demonstrates the most disgusting jobs people do for a living.

But Rowe might now be better known to Rochelle area residents for his generous donation to Rochelle's very own The Kitchen Table, operated by Carolyn and Grant Brown and other volunteer board members.

Rowe produces a new internet series titled "Returning the Favor," in which he searches for stories of organizations and people who put others in the community before themselves.

Local non-profit organization The Kitchen Table was selected a few months ago to be featured on an upcoming episode in the fourth season of the series which will air on July 22 through Facebook Watch.

"The Kitchen Table recently received both the attention and a \$50,000 donation from celebrity Mike Rowe as a part of his new Internet streaming series," said Mark Schwendau, kitchen table board member, in a press release.

DONATES: Money will help build new dining hall

Lois Piller a board member of The Kitchen Table nominated the organization and the Browns to be featured on the show without anyone else's knowledge. In early March, a crew was sent from the show to interview diners and board members without anyone knowing why they were doing so. Following the interviews, the next step was to send Rowe and his crew to officially film the episode and lend a hand.

"On March 21, Rowe brought his film crew to shoot a new episode of his show, he interviewed the Browns and even pitched in by helping work at The Kitchen Table," Schwendau said.

While the help from Rowe and being featured on the show will likely bring awareness to the organization, it is the \$50,000 donation that will help the café serve the most people possible.

"Rowe's \$50,000 donation will be used towards an expansion project to build a new dining hall at the community café, located at 7034 Klondike Road," explained Schwendau.

The Browns, who reside in Ashton, envisioned a restaurant such as The Kitchen Table years before they eventually purchased the property in 2013 and opened for business in 2016. The café serves about 10 meals a month where diners are asked to pay what they can afford. Those who are unable to pay are offered the opportunity to volunteer their time in exchange for their meal.

The café remains operational thanks to individuals who dine and then pay it forward along with donations and grants received from individuals and corporations.

Monroe Center school project earns grant

MONROE CENTER – This year, Amy Metzger and Michele McDevitt, 5th grade teachers from Monroe Center Grade School, sought out and were awarded the Energizing Student Potential Needs Project grant.

This was an opportunity for the teachers to build both their Science and English Language Arts program simultaneously through a novel study.

This project took a great deal of planning and collaboration on the part of Metzger and McDevitt; however, the outcome of this project took on a life of its own and has allowed their 5th grade students to leave a legacy of their years and learning at Monroe Center for other students to enjoy.

"Students were engaged in ways that pulled even the adults into the classroom," said Deana Simpson, principal at Monroe Center. "Every time an adult walked by the students were pulling them in to share what they were doing, why they were doing it, and best of all sharing how they did it just as a teacher would traditionally do. This project flipped the entire classroom and we all became learners and teachers."

It was remarkable to see the students become the teachers as they lead their class, peers from other classes, and ultimately more than 140 adults and students at our April Family Literacy Night event that featured the students and their energy project.

"Thanks to the Energizing Student Potential Needs Project grant funding, students in our classes were immersed into The City of

Ember novel by connecting science through literacy," Metzger said. "The funding allowed the students to develop a deeper understanding of electrical circuitry and then apply it. Through a variety of STEAM activities students were challenged to strengthen their problem-solving skills which often pushed them out of their comfort zones. It was difficult for us to not jump in and help, but we knew they needed to learn that it was okay to struggle. We had students step up and take leadership roles who normally don't. Our rooms were busy with activity, in which the students were taking the lead, collaborating, and truly engaged. As a teacher, it was just plain fun to see them excited about learning."

From here students worked together with James Brown, the auditor for the grant program, to participate in a building wide energy audit. Students went throughout the building to capture opportunities for improvement in terms of energy usage. They looked into the energy consumption in the computer lab, which was rarely used this year, as the school is now fortunate to have one to one capability for students with Chromebooks. They used a kilowatt meter to determine that although off, the 30 computers/monitors were consuming (collectively) 219 watts. At 365 days per year (24/7) this is \$240 in utility costs for unused technology.

Students then determined there were 36, 32-watt bulbs in the room. There was a lot of discussion about

how lights being on when rooms are empty and how changing habits both in and outside school can conserve energy. This conversation led to students understanding the difference between conservation and efficiency. Students indicated that many days it is empty with lights off, but there are days where the lights are on. They agreed upon 3 hours per day as the average time the lights are on when the room is empty. At this amount of time, at 182 days per year of school, this is a cost of \$75 per year.

"It's so important when trying to impact change, students should always remember to make their claim, back it up with data and the evidence they have collected and give their reasoning for their recommendations," Brown said. "In this case, students and staff at Monroe Center did just that."

This incredible discovery led the conversation to sharing this evidence with our technology and buildings and grounds departments and has deployed our next passion project at MC and perhaps even surprise for the upcoming school year. Because of this energy audit, the students' efforts in learning and teaching, and the teachers' commitments to the time and planning investment, Monroe Center

is proud to announce we are taking the energy savings discovered during this audit along with the Max Dollars for Education check from Byron's County Market awarded this year, and are transforming our dated computer lab to a new updated innovation lab for students and teachers to discover new problems to solve.

"Every time I think about what capacity each student and staff member has here, I will envision what this project developed into," Simpson said. "As adults we often forget what true passion looks like and its moments like these that remind us simply passion and determination drives if we let it."

Energizing Student Potential is a program designed to infuse energy into the STEM classroom. In 1988, Weld decided to start his own band “Dave Weld and the Imperial Flames.” This band featured the most authentic seasoned blues veterans in Chicago. They toured countless times around the world, local and national festivals and the best venues in the Midwest and the national.

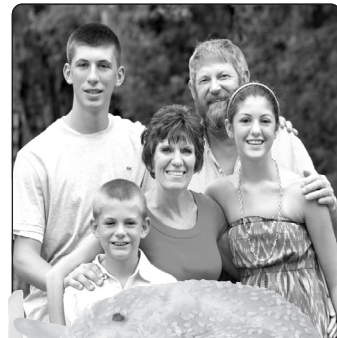

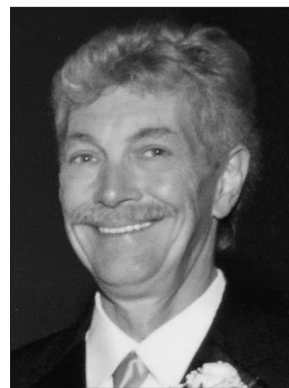
son; and sister, Carolyn Setterstrom.

* On Aug. 2, 1990, Iraqi forces invade Kuwait, Iraq's tiny, oil-rich neighbor, and gain control of 20 percent of the world's oil reserves. On Aug. 9, Operation Desert Shield began as U.S. forces raced to the Persian Gulf.

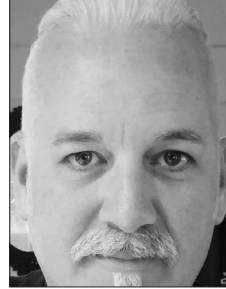

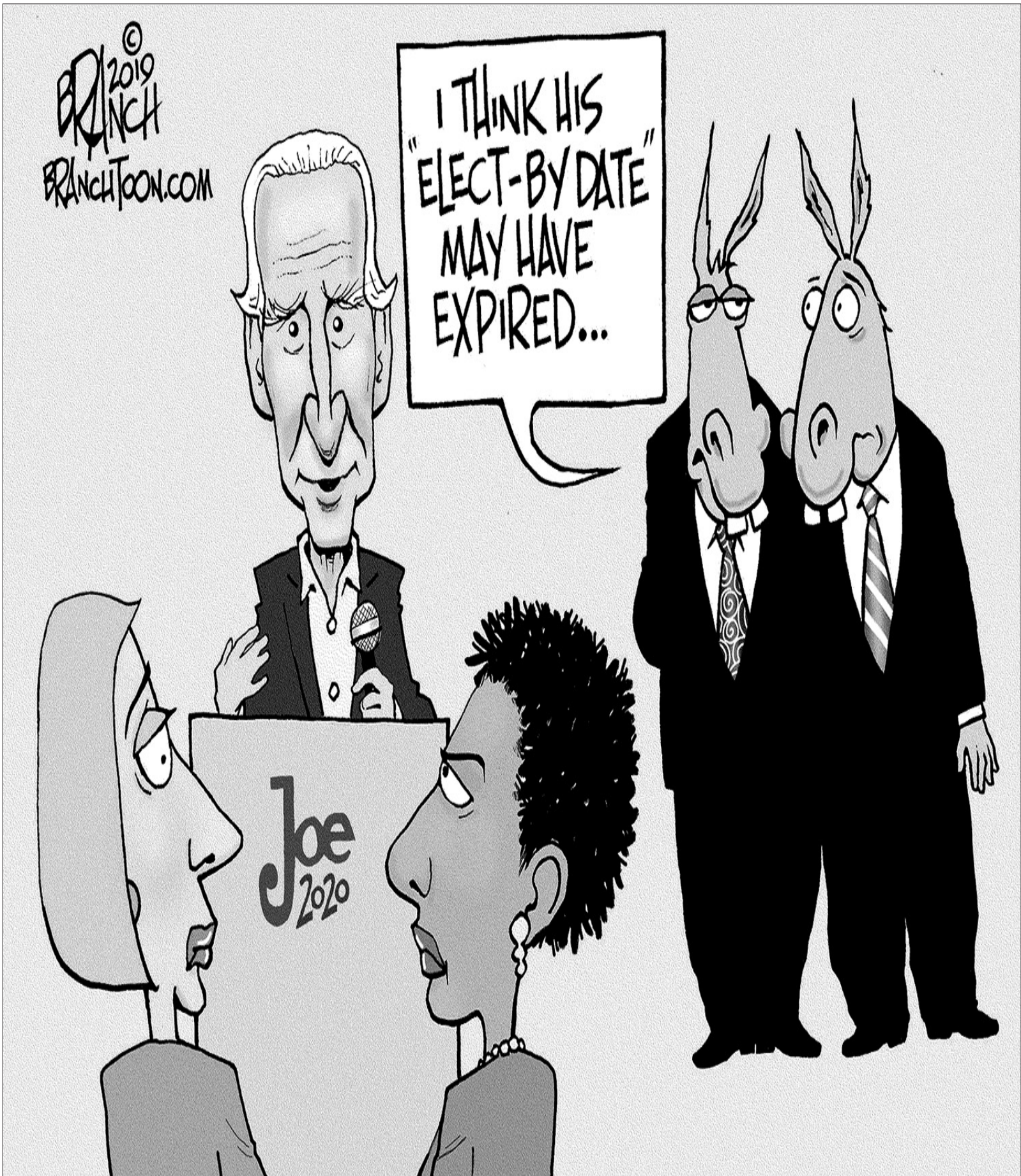
I recently had the privilege of attending a Concert on the Deck at the Byron Forest Preserve's Jarrett Prairie Center.

Three tips to drive more efficiently

UNLICENSED drivers learning to drive are often taught the benefits of defensive driving. Safety is often the focus of such lessons, but the benefits of driving safely and efficiently extend far beyond safety.

According to the U.S. Department of Energy, aggressive driving can lower gas mileage by roughly 15 to 30 percent at highway speeds. In addition, a 2017 study from researchers at the DOE's Oak Ridge National Laboratory found that aggressive driving can contribute to a reduce fuel efficiency by as much as 40 percent in stop-and-go traffic.

Speeding as well as

rapid acceleration and braking are hallmarks of aggressive driving, and each of these habits puts drivers, their passengers and other motorists at risk of accident and injury. By taking these steps to drive more efficiently, drivers can save money and potentially even lives.

1. Avoid rooftop cargo.

Rooftop cargo units can be beneficial for family vacations or other extended getaways. But using rooftop cargo boxes as traveling storage units for items you don't need on a daily basis or simply keeping empty units attached to vehicle roofs compromises fuel efficiency. Rooftop cargo bins increase the aerodynamic drag on

vehicles, forcing them to burn more fuel than they would need to burn while moving without anything attached to the roof. DOE estimates suggest that large, blunt rooftop cargo boxes can reduce fuel efficiency by as much as 25 percent when a vehicle is moving at speeds between 65 and 75 miles per hour.

2. Don't treat your trunk like a closet.

Trunks are not closets, so resist the temptation to use them to store golf clubs and other items that are better stored in a house or garage. Research has indicated that an extra 100 pounds in a vehicle can reduce gas mileage by about 1 percent. Because that figure is based on the per-

centage of extra weight relative to the vehicle's weight, drivers of small vehicles may find using their trunks as closets to be especially costly and inefficient.

3. Use cruise control when possible.

Cruise control makes it possible for vehicles to maintain constant speeds. That helps drivers ensure they are always obeying the speed limit, and it keeps cars from the constant acceleration and deceleration that wastes fuel.

Efficient driving is safe, cost-effective and eco-friendly. With some simple strategies, drivers can do their part to protect the planet and make roads safer, all while saving money.

Factors that impact auto insurance premiums

AUTO insurance rates vary from person to person, even though it may seem like the offerings are the same. But no two drivers are the same, and certain factors may be affecting drivers' auto insurance premiums without the motorists even realizing it.

Automotive insurance provider State Farm says most insurance companies consider several factors when calculating the cost of car insurance. Recognizing which situations can increase or lower costs can help drivers get the best rates and coverage needed. Although it can be tempting to reduce the price of insurance by choosing lower amounts of coverage, there are other ways to make insurance more affordable.

- **Move.** Insurers typically look at where a person lives when calculating rates. Those people who live in highly populated, urban areas likely will have higher premiums than others who live in more rural towns. That's because greater population density often translates into more people on the road — and a greater chance for insurance claims due to fender benders or theft. By moving, a person may be able to cut rates.

- **Gender and age are factors.** One can't step into a time machine, but it's helpful to know that growing a little older can lower insurance premiums. The financial advice source Money Crashers say that young men usually incur higher rates than young women because statistically men get into more accidents. However, as a person moves into his or her senior years, the roles reverse. Older women may see higher rates than men the same age.

- **Keep make and model in mind.** The type of vehicle driven can affect insurance premiums. Certain insurance carriers will increase premiums on vehicles that are more susceptible to damage. Flashy sports cars or those that do not score as highly on vehicle safety ratings calculated by industry experts may result in high premiums. Vehicles that are desirable to car thieves also may cost more to insure. Researching vehicles prior to purchase and checking the rates for those cars or trucks with insurance companies can help keep costs low.

- **Commuters may pay more.** Individuals who use a car for business or frequent commuting may pay more than people who drive less because statistically there is a greater risk for an accident, says State Farm. Reducing commute times can lower premiums.

- **Tie the knot.** Insure.com says married couples have been found to be less of a risk to insurance providers statistically than those who are single. A study by the National Institutes of Health found that single drivers were twice as likely to be in an auto accident as married drivers. Combining policies also can help married people save.

- **Follow the rules of the road.** Drivers who have moving violations, drink and drive or engage in otherwise risky behavior behind the wheel may see their rates soar.

Insurance companies weigh factors such as driving record, age, locality, and more when assessing premium costs. Drivers have some room to get lower rates by knowing the factors that determine their premiums.

Four reasons to skip topping off at the filling station

THE familiar click of the nozzle when filling up at the gas station is recognizable to anyone with a few miles of driving under their belt. Once that nozzle clicks, just about every driver faces the decision of whether or not to squeeze a few extra cents' worth of gas into their vehicles or remove the nozzle from their vehicles, place it back where it belongs and head off on their way.

1. Topping off costs you money.

According to the Environmental Protection Agency, drivers who top off at the pump are likely paying

for gas they're not getting. That's because gas station pumps have vapor recovery systems that feed gas vapors back into their tanks in an effort to decrease air pollution. So any gas that drivers try to pump into their tanks after the nozzle has clicked may only be drawn into the vapor line and fed back into the gas station's

tanks and not your vehicle's fuel tank.

2. Topping off may damage your car.

Topping off won't just hurt your pocketbook; it can potentially damage your vehicle as well. Fuel tanks need extra room inside them so gas can expand while the car is being operated. Without room to expand, gas

may evaporate into the vehicle's vapor collection system, which can damage the system and produce greater gas emissions, thereby harming the planet.

3. Topping off can affect the air you breathe.

If you had a choice, would you pay extra for more air pollution? Likely not. But the EPA notes that this is precisely what many people are doing when they top off their gas tanks. When vehicles' fuel tanks are overfilled, gas vapors can escape into the air and produce toxic air pollutants. That adversely affects air quality, which ultimately affects your health as well.

4. Topping off can cost the gas station

money.

Many drivers may wonder why gas stations, who would seemingly benefit financially from topping off, post signs that forbid topping off. But the EPA notes that gas stations are likely to lose money due to drivers squeezing an extra few cents' worth of gas into their vehicles. That's because topping off can damage the station's vapor recovery systems, causing them to operate improperly and requiring potentially costly maintenance.

Topping off at the filling station may seem like a savvy move. But drivers, their vehicles and the planet are best served by taking the pump handle out of the tanks at the familiar sound of the nozzle's click.

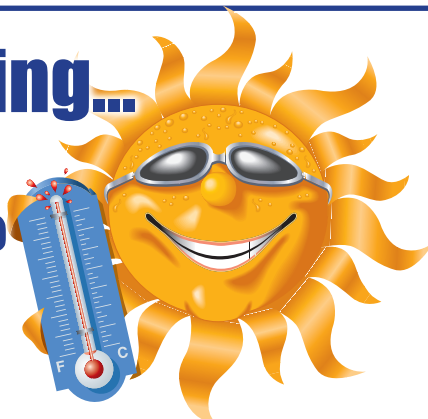

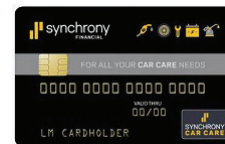

Why clean air filters are important

VEHICLE owners likely know to check fluid levels and get their cars' oil changed, but air filters may not be at the top of their maintenance checklists. Despite being a relatively inexpensive part, air filters often go overlooked.

Air filters have an important job in a vehicle, prolonging the life span of engines and helping cars run more smoothly and efficiently.



Purpose of vehicle air filters

Vehicle combustion engines operate with a mixture of fuel and air. Without oxygen, gasoline or diesel fuels cannot burn properly and power the engine. The air filter's job is to prevent dirt, dust and other debris from being

sucked into an engine. Otherwise, grime can build up and impede engine performance or cause erosion of parts under the hood.

It is much more cost-effective to routinely change air filters than replace expensive engine parts. Rather than ignoring air filters

until the last minute, drivers can take steps to keep filters clean and functioning at peak performance.

- Improve fuel efficiency. Clogged air filters reduce air flow to engines, resulting in an improper ratio of air to fuel. As a result, spark plugs can be negatively

affected and the engine may idle roughly or misfire. These scenarios can greatly affect fuel efficiency as well as cause engine deposits from rich fuel. To save money and trips to the fuel pump, replace filters regularly. According to GearHeads, for older cars, studies

have indicated that by replacing a dirty air filter, one can improve gas mileage by as much as 14 percent.

- Reduce stress on the engine. Because of the air-to-fuel mix in engines, even a mixture that is slightly off balance can affect what is going on under the

hood. That means the engine must work harder to get enough clean air into the chamber to complete the combustion cycle, says the Automotive Training Center.

- Enjoy more power. A filter that is saturated with dirt will restrict air flow. In such instances, drivers may notice a lack of power during acceleration. Replacing the filter can easily restore that pep.

- Reduce vehicle emissions. Environmental concerns are a priority for many people. By keeping the engine working properly, with the advantage of clean, unobstructed air entering the chamber, a vehicle may produce lower emissions.

Replacing air filters is an easy fix that many drivers can do themselves, or ask their mechanics to do during oil changes or other repair shop visits.

How to sell a vehicle with an accident history

SELLING a vehicle may seem easy, but unloading preowned vehicles may take some time. While sellers may already have their eyes on the prize — a new vehicle — the first step is selling their current vehicle at a fair price, especially for those sellers who need to finance the purchase of their next vehicle with the proceeds they earn when selling their current one.

Sellers must consider a host of factors, including potential market for the vehicle and its potential sale price, before putting their vehicles up for sale. The accident history of a vehicle is another important factor to consider. Buyers are understandably weary about purchasing vehicles that have been in an accident.

Easily accessible vehicle history reports can make it even more challenging to sell a used car, but

such reports don't make it impossible to unload preowned vehicles.

- Be open and honest. Hiding an accident is unethical and can haunt you down the road. It is better to be forthcoming about any accidents a vehicle might have been in. If you have documentation of the accident, such as photos and receipts for repairs, make it available to prospective buyers. If you have certification from an auto body shop or mechanic that the vehicle is in perfectly good condition and was repaired with quality, manufacturer-supplied parts, offer that information as well. The more information you provide and the more honest and forthcoming you are, the less it will seem like you're trying to hide major damage.

- Encourage a vehicle inspection. Inform the buyer that you have no qualms about him or her



taking the car to a mechanic and having it thoroughly inspected. This will show your confidence in the performance of the vehicle.

- Consider a dealer trade-in. Dealer trade-ins may not earn you as much money as you would get if you were to sell the

car privately, but trade-ins tend to be simpler. Dealerships have almost zero emotional attachment to vehicles and likely won't be as concerned as a private buyer about an accident on record. Some dealers farm out used cars to auctions or salvage

yards. It may be worth it to take the lower price and not have the headache of unloading the car on your own.

- Be flexible on pricing. The right price will help prospective buyers overlook minor blemishes or accidents. When coupled

with the truth, the right price can entice buyers to seal the deal.

Auto accidents happen. But while no one wants to get into a fender-bender, such accidents should not prevent auto owners from selling their vehicles in the future.



Keep summer road trips safe

WHEN the outdoors beckons, road trips can be the perfect way to see the countryside, escape the routine of daily life and enjoy short vacations. When taking to the open road, it is important to focus on safety. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration says that planning and prevention can spare road-trippers from the consequences of breakdowns, traffic accidents or other road emergencies.

- Stock emergency preparedness items. Prior to a trip, drivers should make sure their vehicles are equipped with necessary safety items. Liberty Mutual Insurance New Beginnings Report warns that nearly half of Americans do not check that proper emergency items are stored in their vehicles prior to getting on the road. Before embarking on a road trip, make sure vehicles have a first aid kit, flashlight, water bottles, phone chargers, tire-repair tools, flares, jumper cables, towels, and even an old backpack for storage.
- Schedule a service call. Regular maintenance can keep vehicles from breaking down. Drivers should take their cars in for tuneups before long road trips. Such tuneups should include an oil change, bat-

tery check, tire rotation, and any other necessary servicing.

- Plan your route. Map out the route before heading out. Be aware of potential road closures, obstacles or construction. Thanks to real-time GPS updates through mobile phones and other devices, some drivers like to rely on tech to get them through. But it's important to realize service may be spotty in rural areas. Mapping a trip out in advance can save drivers from getting lost during mobile service interruptions.
- Join a roadside repair service. Breakdowns happen even if trips are carefully planned. Automotive clubs can help drivers when breakdowns occur. Some car manufacturers also include roadside assistance in warranty packages, so inquire about your coverage.
- Refresh defensive driving skills. A safe-driving course can remind drivers of the rules of the road. In some cases, courses also may qualify drivers for discounts on their auto insurance policies. One such class is the AARP Driver Safety course.
- Avoid distractions. Keep children and other passengers occupied so they are not a distraction to the driver. Set out with favorite music, books, video games, or even a pad and paper for

doodling. Pack snacks to keep everyone feeling full in between roadside pit stops. Drivers also can load their cars up with tissues, water and music to limit distractions.

- Plan fun breaks along the way. Breaks give drivers a reason to rest and passengers an opportunity to get out and stretch their legs. The Roadside America smartphone app lists must-see stops along any route, and drivers can plan their own stops as well.
- Stay over if necessary. According to the NHTSA, driving while drowsy is a contributing factor in 100,000 accidents every year. Drive only when well-rested. Share driving duties or plan a night at a motel so everyone is well-rested.

Road trips are all about fun, but drivers must emphasize safety before and during such excursions.

Your vehicle has a recall ... now what?

VEHICLES are expensive. When motorists drive their vehicles away from a dealership, they hope to travel many miles before they need to come back for maintenance. But manufacturers sometimes issue recalls that can affect drivers of both new and old vehicles.

Recalls are safety precautions taken should a portion of a vehicle or the entire car or truck not operate in the manner it was intended. In many instances, auto manufacturers will directly contact customers who are affected by a recall via a letter, email or both. Individuals also can stay current on recalls by visiting the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration's website (www.NHTSA.gov).

According to AutoTrader, recalls are becoming more common because of the complexity of modern vehicles. NHTSA flagged nearly 22 million vehicles for safety issues in 2013, and that number is on the rise. Drivers can follow these important steps if they learn of a recall.

- Don't panic, but don't ignore recalls. The experts at Kelley Blue Book say recalls often occur due to a problem in the manufacturing process in similar models, and this issue may surface in other vehicles.



Recalls do not guarantee vehicles will malfunction or break down. However, consumers are urged to take recalls seriously, adopting a "better safe than sorry" approach when recalls are announced.

- Follow the instructions. A recall notice should come with instructions. Instructions often advise drivers to take their vehicles to the dealership where the cars were purchased. Notices may provide information regarding nearby dealerships for drivers who have moved since buying their cars or trucks.
- No payment should be necessary. The cost of repairing the recalled part should not fall on your shoulders. Such repairs are paid by the manufacturer. The financial resource Bankrate.com notes that, "if you had the repair made before the recall was issued (up to a full year),

the automaker is legally obligated to reimburse you, as long as you had the work done at one of its franchised dealers." Save all receipts for the work. If work was done by a private mechanic, drivers still may be eligible for reimbursement.

- Be patient. Dealerships are not responsible for making repairs until the date indicated on the recall notice, so motorists may need to wait before having their vehicles repaired.
- Request a loaner vehicle. In some instances, recalls may take a few days to fix. Although not every dealership may make loaner vehicles available, it's still worth requesting one so you are not inconvenienced.

Anyone having difficulty with a recall can contact the NHTSA online, by phone or by mail. Those who suspect a safety problem also can contact the agency and report their concerns.


