Byron man indicted on child porn charges

ROCKFORD – Three area men were indicted yesterday in separate cases by a federal grand jury in Rockford on child pornography charges.

Oscar Flores-Vazquez, 47, of Byron, was charged with one count of transporting child pornography via the internet in June 2018, and one count of possessing a computer in August 2018 containing an image of child pornography involving a prepubescent minor and a minor who had not attained 12 years of age.

David Wittwer, 48, of South Beloit, was charged with one count of transporting child pornography via the internet in February 2016, and one count of possessing a com-

puter and cell phone in April 2017 containing an image of child pornography involving a prepubescent minor and a minor who had not attained 12 years of age.

Donavan Heidenreich, 23, of Rockford, was charged with two counts of transporting child pornography via the internet in May and September of 2017, and one count of possessing a computer in November 2017 containing an image of child pornography involving a prepubescent minor and a minor who had not attained 12 years of age.

John R. Lausch, Jr., United States Attorney for the Northern District of Illinois, announced the Wittwer case with James M. Gibbons, Special Agent in Charge of the

Chicago Office of the U.S. Department of Homeland Security – Homeland Security Investigations, and the Heidenreich

and Flores-Vazquez cases with Jeffrey S. Sallet, Special Agent in Charge of the Federal Bureau of Investigation in Chicago. The government is represented by Assistant U.S. Attorney Michael D. Love.

The Wittwer investigation was conducted by the U.S. Department of Homeland Security – Homeland Security Investigations, with the assistance of the South Beloit Police Department and the Winnebago County Sheriff's Office. The Heidenreich and Flores-Vazquez cases were investigated by the FBI.

Each count of transporting child pornography carries a mandatory minimum sentence of 5 years and a maximum of 20 years in prison, and possessing child pornography carries a maximum of up to 10 years in prison. Each count carries a \$250,000 maximum fine. If convicted, the court must impose a reasonable sentence under federal sentencing statutes and the advisory United States Sentencing Guidelines.

The public is reminded that an indictment contains only charges and is not evidence of guilt. Each defendant is presumed innocent and is entitled to a fair trial at which the government has the burden of proving guilt beyond a reasonable doubt.

Ogle County Farm Bureau donates to Highland Ag. Department

FREEPORT – Over a three-year period, the Ogle County Farm Bureau made a donation of \$18,000 to the Highland Community College Agriculture Department, through the HCC Foundation.

The gift was announced on Aug. 28 in a check presentation ceremony on campus.

Beginning in 2015, the pledge was to support the creation of the test plot. The money will be used to remodel Building E with a science lab and research greenhouse.

“Highland has a great Ag. Program, and our farm bureau wants to support education in agriculture and this is a way to continue to thank supporters as they move into agricultural careers,” said Keith Poole, president of the Ogle County Farm Bureau.

“We are very grateful for the donation and long-term commitment from the Ogle County Farm Bureau,” said Monica Pierce, Highland Ag instructor. “A huge function of the Farm Bureau organization is to educate and advocate for agriculture. Highland’s agriculture shares that function, and we are thankful for our partnership with the Ogle County Farm Bureau to pursue this mission together.”

offers a place for kids to burn off some energy. Admission provides all-day use.

Hungry? You can stop by the Food Court, which includes a variety of choices from booths run by local not-for-profit organizations.

Want to take a trip back to the Renaissance? Stronghold Camp and Retreat Center, once the home of Chicago Daily News owner Walter Strong, will host its annual Olde English Faire both days.

Tours of the Stronghold Castle will also be available as well as food and entertainment.

Admission is charged for this event which is located about two miles north of Oregon, along Ill. Route 2.

Sunday morning starts with a 5K race and a one-mile fun run. And at 1 p.m. the Harvest Time Parade, featuring 100-plus units, makes its way through the downtown and past the courthouse square.

The Jesse White Tumblers and South Shore Drill Team are just two of the crowd favorites returning this year.

South Shore will also perform a post parade show at the conclusion of the parade on Jefferson Street, in front of the Oregon Library.

Drug Court receives state Supreme Court approval

OGLE COUNTY – The Ogle County New Horizons Specialty Court Team announces that the Illinois Supreme Court has approved the certification of its Drug Court Program.

In August 2009, Ogle County implemented New Horizons Drug Court to address substance-dependent offenders due to the lack of resources available within the State of Illinois to combat these crimes. Drug Court is a voluntary program which incorporates intensive individualized treatment plans and recovery programs, increased levels of community supervision, and facilitates participants to become productive, responsible citizens in our community.

Specialty Courts, like Drug Court, reduce the ripple-effect cost of these non-violent offenses, hold participants accountable for their behaviors, and prevent recidivism. By entering into the Drug Court program, many offenders avoid the revolving door of the Illinois

Department of Corrections, where if sentenced, many offenders come out better criminals without any rehabilitation.

In 2017, the Administrative Office of Illinois Courts (AOIC) mandated all Specialty Courts within the State of Illinois to become certified by the Illinois Supreme Court. All previously existing Specialty Courts were permitted to operate during the certification process. This process included reviews of policies and procedures, the participant handbook and other supporting documents. An Ogle County site visit was conducted that included observation of Drug Court staffing and court proceedings followed by individual interviews of the Drug Court Team. On September 05, 2018, the Illinois Supreme Court certified Ogle County New Horizons Drug Court.

Since its inception in 2009, Ogle County New Horizons Drug Court has had 32 successful graduates. Our graduates have an 84

percent success rate, which we define as offenders who do not commit a substance-related felony crime following their graduation. Successful programs, such as the Ogle County New Horizons Drug Court, can turn these offenders lives around so they are no longer viewed as “criminals” but as productive community members.

Church hosting flu shot event

BYRON – Once again, the United Church of Byron, in conjunction with Walgreen Drugs, will offer flu shots on Oct. 5, from 10 a.m.-1 p.m. in the church's fellowship hall.

According to the Immunization Action Coalition the best time to get your shot is in October as October is the optimal time for this vaccine. The Centers for Disease Control also recommends shots be given in October. The reasoning behind this is that effectiveness does wear off. Getting your shot too early may make you more vulnerable for flu later on.

There are several different types of flu vaccines. Ask the pharmacist and/or doctor which is the best choice for you. Most vaccines will protect you against four different strains of flu. These vaccines are incredibly safe. Flu vaccine will reduce your risk of getting the flu from 40 percent to 60 percent, and also reduce the severity of an illness should you get the flu despite your vaccination.

Those requesting pneumonia or shingle shots **must** call and pre order with Kathy Johnson, 815-234-5009 in order to insure that there will be a vaccine for you.

Most health insurance does cover the cost of the flu vaccine. Please bring your health insurance card and/or Medicare card so that Walgreens can submit your health insurance claim for the vaccine.

Remember, stay away from people who are sick and wash your hands frequently.

Storm does some damage

High winds from last Tuesday afternoon's storms toppled a large section of a tree into a home in Rochelle.

The house located on Lincoln Highway sustained damages to the roof as well as water damage to the kitchen and appliances. Homeowner Wanda Brimhall got the call from the tenant shortly after 4 p.m.

"They called to tell me part of the tree fell through the roof and the house was getting flooded. The water was coming in over the stove and microwave," Brimhall said. "The fire department came right away and

cut the power and told them it wasn't safe to stay there."

Red Cross assisted late Tuesday, providing shelter in a local hotel to the family.

Tree removal crews were on the scene early Wednesday with a crane to remove the limb. Brimhall said she plans to meet with the insurance adjuster sometime Wednesday afternoon to file a claim.

Downtown Rochelle lost power for a short time as well.

A section of Daysville Road between Lighthouse and Flagg Road in western Ogle County remains closed as of Wednesday from downed trees and leaning electric poles.

Lincoln photo to be unveiled in Oregon

OREGON – A high-quality reproduction of a famous Abraham Lincoln photograph will be presented to the Ogle County Courthouse on Wednesday, Oct. 3. The unveiling ceremony will take place at 9 a.m. in the Ogle County Judicial Center, 105 S. 5th St., Courtroom 204, in Oregon. The event is open to the public. The photograph was taken in Springfield by well-known photographer

Alexander Hesler on June 3, 1860, for Lincoln's 1860 presidential campaign. Historians consider Hesler's portrait one of the best taken of Lincoln during his pre-presidential years. The permanent installation is made possible by donations from the Illinois Judges Association (IJA), the Illinois State Bar Association (ISBA) and their respective foundations - the Illinois

Judges Foundation and the Illinois Bar Foundation. Printed on canvas, the image of the beardless Lincoln is encased in a richly stained wood frame and measures 30-inches wide by 40-inches tall. The four organizations are partnering with the Illinois State Historical Society (ISHS), which owns the glass-plate positives of Hesler's Lincoln portrait. The ISHS is leading a statewide campaign to

place a framed copy in a courthouse in each of Illinois' 102 counties in commemoration of the state's bicentennial this year. "We are excited to be part of this historic effort to honor Abraham Lincoln," said Robert Hanson, presiding judge of Ogle County. "Hesler's photograph captures Lincoln at a turning point in his life as he transitioned from trial lawyer to presidential candidate."

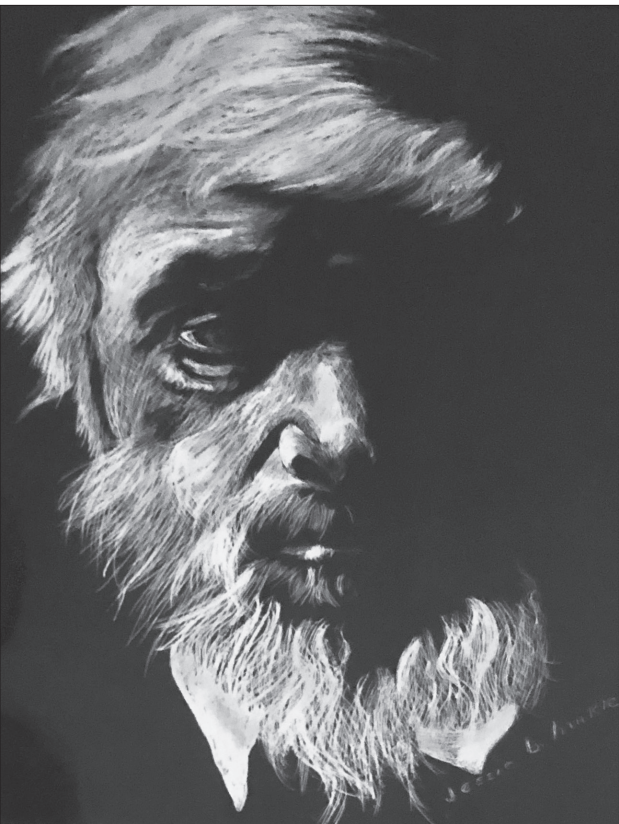

County staff and volunteers will be available to assist with your items and a brief survey will be conducted. Proof of Ogle County residency will be required. This collection is for household items only generated in Ogle County. No business or institutional electronics will be accepted.

Items accepted at these events include all televisions, DVD/VCR's, all computer hardware, desktop printers, FAX machines, copiers, computer monitors, laptops, tablets, cell phones, computer cables, video game hardware, satellite receivers, digital clocks/radios, stereo equipment, speakers, phone systems, calculators, holiday light strands, printer ink cartridges, CFL bulbs, rechargeable batteries, and microwave ovens (\$5 per microwave oven). There is a limit of 7 large items (TV's, monitors, computers, microwaves) per vehicle per month.

Large tubs, boxes, or crates full of assorted electronics will be treated as one large item.

Just because it has a plug doesn't mean it is accepted. Be familiar with accepted items and bring only those to the event. Items commonly brought to these events but get turned away include vacuum cleaners, toasters, ovens, lamps, heaters, fans, dehumidifiers, coffee makers, electric razors and toothbrushes, smoke detectors, flashlights, alkaline batteries, and sump pumps.

Please sort your items and bring only accepted items. Doing so makes the wait less for everyone. Also leave all packaging (boxes, plastic wrap, Styrofoam) from electronics at home. The cardboard is accepted in your regular recycling pick-up, and the other materials put out with your normal waste pick-up.

Kind of makes you wish you hadn't wasted all that time in college or trade school, am I right?

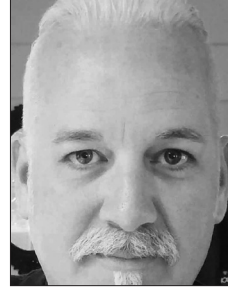

County should not turn away solar industry

Dear Editor,

Ogle's moratorium on solar reminded me of my time on the ZBA when wind farms were the issue. The county board chair and another board member led the opposition to wind farms and kept them out of Ogle. The effect has been a loss of revenue to Ogle. Per their assessor, Lee County collected over \$3.1 million in property taxes from wind in 2017. A project starting construction will produce an additional \$1.9 million in taxes. Also, land leases are reported at over \$5,000 per tower.

A law was signed in 2016 to promote Community Solar in Illinois as part of Illinois' goal to have 25 percent of its electricity produced by clean power by 2025. Community Solar includes projects up to 4 MW. The goal is to have 2,800 MW of new solar by 2022; some produced by facilities

larger than 4 MW. Illinois is 35th in solar, up from 42nd in 2017.

The Community Solar incentive program will end in January with a lottery. The moratorium on solar facilities will effectively ban Community Solar projects from Ogle County because there will not be enough time to submit projects for the lottery after the county board has completed their study. A solar developer estimates that at least 18-20 counties in IL are approving community solar applications. Solar has been coming to Illinois for 2 years and solar was added to the Ogle Zoning Ordinance a year ago. Why is Ogle not ready? Solar projects had completed the entire zoning process except for the final vote when the county board decided they may want to change the rules.

How did the moratorium come about? Three solar projects came before the Plan-

ning and Zoning Committee in August and the committee voted to approve them 4-3, 4-3 and 5-2. The committee chair voted against all 3. Without consulting his committee or the zoning administrator he went to the county board chair. They produced the moratorium resolution and put it at the top of the county board agenda. This violated the usual committee process. Most board members did not know about the resolution until just before the board meeting and had no time to study it.

Effect on landowners: A 2MW project requires about 16 acres and solar leases typically last about 30 years. If rented for farming at \$250/A. over 30 years, income would be \$120,000. If leased for solar at \$1,000/A, income would be \$480,000. So, the premium for solar over farming is an extra \$360,000 over 30 years or \$12,000/yr. A

4MW project would double that. Also, solar leases often contain adjustments for inflation whereas that may not happen for farm rent.

Effect on taxes: Illinois has set the assessed value of solar facilities at \$218,000/MW. Using local tax rates, that would produce \$12,720 in taxes/yr/2MW. That land would yield \$400 in taxes as farm land. So, the annual tax premium for using the land for solar is \$12,320/2MW

Two substations and 3-phase electrical lines along Hales Corner Road minimizes the cost of hooking into the grid. That attracted solar developers.

Ogle officials frequently talk about economic development but they turned down the wind industry and if they stay with the moratorium it appears they will turn the solar industry away also.

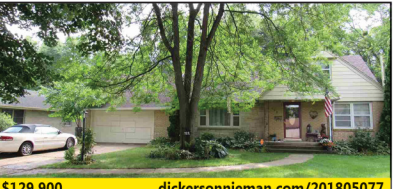

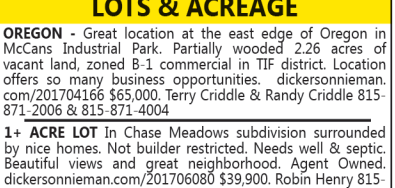

With lower temperatures incoming, it can be easy to forget about your vehicle's air conditioning system. Did you know that the AC system is still required for some functions that require heat?

This fall, schedule an appointment to ensure both systems are working properly to keep you safe and comfortable when the temperatures drop.

Why the AC System is Important

Do you allow your vehicle to warm up before your morning commute? If so, you surely engage the defroster to save yourself from the labor of window scraping.

Without properly protecting yourself, you stand a chance of developing frostbite and dropping your body temperatures to dangerous levels. Most vehicles rely on the air compressor to operate the defrost function. Without a properly working AC system, defrosting is not an option.

Here's why:

Even when the defrost is running at the highest heat setting, your AC system is behind the scenes making sure everything goes as planned. When you activate the defroster, the air compressor engages to remove moisture from the air. This makes it easier for the heat to clear frost from your front windshield.

Checking your Heating System

Before the temperatures drop, ensure all heating functions are operating properly. You should test this system by checking every setting your vehicle offers. This includes each fan speed and the air flow con-



trol. Some vehicles rely on different actuators for each mode. If one is bad, you may lose important heat flow from the floor, dash or

defrost.

Make sure to check your fluids as well. Being low on antifreeze can have serious effects on your vehicle's

health and your comfort.

If you feel like your system isn't running as efficiently as possible, be sure to schedule an appointment

at your local auto-repair shop. Workers there can determine the issue and fix your problem before you're stuck out in the cold.

Check your tires

A visual tire inspection is another way to ensure you are safe this season. According to the Department of Motor Vehicles, low air pressure and worn tires are especially dangerous on wet or slick roads, as both can reduce traction. Before the snow falls, make sure your tires meet national safety standards.

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration suggests replacing tires once the tread is worn down to 2/32 of an inch. You can easily check your tire's tread depth by purchasing an inexpensive gauge at an auto parts store.

While you're there, pick up a pressure gauge to make sure your tires are filled to the proper PSI. Most of the time you can find the manufacturer's recommendation on the side of the driver's door.

Keep your car washed – and waxed

Allowing these intrusions to remain on your vehicle is like asking for expensive body-

shop repairs. Regularly visiting your local car wash or detail center can make eliminating this type of debris easy. For a DIYer, there are chemicals on the market that can make removing bugs easy.

Importance of Wax

Whether you prefer the old-fashioned application process of waxing or use new products that require a quick spray and wipe, wax is a great protectant. It acts as an extra layer of security that keeps a car's clear coat intact.

Wax also leaves behind a shiny surface to make your vehicle more attractive.

Choosing the right oil is no simple task

Choosing the correct bottle of oil to “top off” your engine is not as easy as it used to be. Before, all you needed to know was which viscosity was required.

Today, oil contains different additives required to meet tough federal regulations to keep up with fuel economy and emission standards.

While engine oil may look the same as it has for decades, it has truly come a long way. The American Petroleum Institute and the International Lubricants Standardization and Approval Committee oversee setting these standards, keeping manufacturers on their toes.

It’s important to know which “spec” your engine requires and use the correct oil, every time.

Understanding Multi-Viscosity

The most distinct feature on a bottle of oil is the viscosity (0W-20, 5W-30, etc.) Check with your owner’s manual to find the correct formulation your engine requires. Using the incorrect viscosity can cause strain leading to early failure and poor fuel economy.

What do these alpha-numeric codes really mean? There is a common misconception that the W in an oil code stands for weight but each quart of oil you pick up will weigh

the same, right? What it really means is winter.

For example, a common type of oil is 5W-20. The prefix of 5W describes the thickness, or viscosity that an oil operates during cold-weather conditions. As the engine warms up to an average 215 degrees F, the oil begins a process of thickening up to a viscosity of 20.

Check Your Spec

Once you know the correct multi-viscosity formula, you’re halfway there. Make sure to take note of any specifications your manufacturer recommends for their engines.

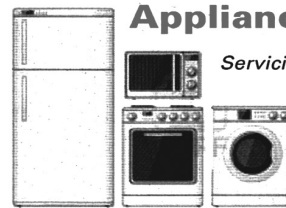

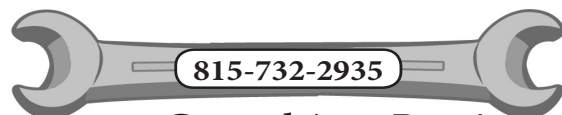

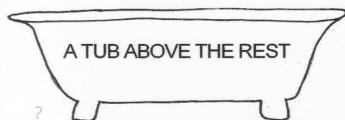

"The First Purge" (R) -- As has been established in the first three films in this series, the Purge is a horrific (or hedonistic) annual set-aside of 12 hours during which all actions are decriminalized. This fourth installment, an origin story, might be the most gruesome or uncomfortable of the lot. The New Founding Fathers of America have overtaken the country post-revolution, and Dr. May Updale (Marisa Tomei) announces her experiment: allow the population to exorcise their demons this one night, so that the crime rate will stay low the rest of the year. Stay in your homes, and you get paid. Participate, and you get creepy contact lenses to broadcast your actions. Drug dealer Dmitri (Y'lan Noel), who stays behind to protect his stash, and his ex-girlfriend, Nya (Lex Scott Davis), an anti-Purge protestor, must battle for their very lives when goons are sent in to stir the pot.

"Leave No Trace" (PG) -- Director Debra Granik delivers

a stunningly touching study of what it means to be a functioning member of society. Will (Ben Foster) and 13-year-old daughter Tom (Thomasin McKenzie) live in a society of two, in a woodlands park in Portland, Oregon, venturing into town only for supplies. Will is a veteran who suffers from PTSD. When they are discovered and shunted into the social-services system, they each begin to explore their individual needs, both from the world around them and each other.

"Sicaro: Day of the Soldado" (R) -- Mexican drug cartels are trafficking in terrorists, helping them gain entry to the United States, or so suspect American spies. They formulate a plan to refocus the cartels by encouraging a war between them. Agent Matt Graver (Josh Brolin) enlists the assistance of Alejandro Gillick (Benicio del Toro), an assassin who swoops in to take out one high-level target and blame it on the other side. But when a plan to kidnap the daughter (Isabela Moner) of a kingpin goes south, it puts Graver and Gillick on opposing



sides. This sequel to "Sicario" deals in many of the same locales but is more bullets-and-guns action than psychological drama.

"Three Identical Strangers" (PG-13) -- The true story of three boys, identical triplets separated at birth, who unbelievably reconnected at age 19 would be incredible enough.

Fascinatingly, there's much more to the story. Director Tim Wardle takes us on a journey with these men -- David Kellman, Eddy Galland and Bobby Shafran -- who were unknowingly the subjects of a lifelong study in personality development and the debate over nature versus nurture, each being adopted at birth into similar family structures at deliberately

different socio-economic strata. It's an informative, intriguing and very well-done documentary.

Take a step back in time at the Chana School

Reading, writing, and arithmetic are just three staples awaiting Autumn on Parade visitors at the historic Chana School, located on River Road in Oregon Park East.

This unique two-room school, built in 1883, is celebrating its 131st birthday this year!

It will be open for tours on Saturday, Oct. 6 from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Costumed docents will greet visitors inside the school.

The school originally stood in the town of Chana seven miles from Oregon and was set to be torn down in 1998.

But a group of local citizens formed the Chana School Foundation to move the building to a new location, restore it to its original appearance, and operate it as a living history museum.

“This fairy tale story began with a building that was going to be destroyed,

because it was in the way of progress. It had been used in a variety of ways, since the closing of the Chana School District in the late 1960s,” said Connie Stauffer, who along with Chana native Duke Thomas, spearheaded the school’s move and restoration.

“Little had been done to keep the old building standing. It had not been painted in 60 years. Was it an eyesore? Yes! But we had a vision of what the old Chana School could do for education and history of our area if it were saved and restored.”

After five years of fund raising, grant writing and thousands of hours of volunteer labor, the Chana School Museum opened in the Fall of 2003.

In December 2005, the school was placed on the National Register of Historic Places.

“This was an amazing recognition for the school

and to everyone who had volunteered their energy to help make the school a landmark—not only for Oregon, but for the state of Illinois and our nation,” said Stauffer.

“There are only two schools with two classrooms on the National Register from Illinois and the Chana School is the only two-room wooden school on the register from Illinois.”

This unique V-shaped building is not your typical rural schoolhouse.

Inside visitors will find cloak rooms with curved walls, decorative pressed tin walls and ceilings and fancy carved woodwork painted in Victorian colors.

One classroom has been restored to how it would have looked in the mid 1890s complete with period desks, pump organ, antique lithographs and a decorative wood stove.

The other classroom



contains exhibits about life in the late 1800s and information about rural education in northern Illinois.

The Chana School is open by appointment by calling 815-732-4714 or 815-732-2447.

The school offers simu-

lation field trips for school classes throughout the year. The museum can also be used for weddings, meetings, and workshops.

and stages with melodies while children gather in the Gremlin's Garden for stories and other children's activities.

Stronghold is the camping and retreat ministry of Blackhawk Presbytery, Presbyterian Church (USA). It is situated on 360 acres of woodlands on the bluffs overlooking the Rock River.

When not hosting the Faire, the Center offers facilities for over-

night retreats, summer camps, leadership development programs and outdoor education programming.

Walter Strong, owner and publisher of the Chicago Daily News, and his family built the Castle as a vacation home in 1928. It was purchased by a group of Presbyterian churches in 1962 and is the centerpiece of the retreat center.

Stronghold is located two miles north of the Ogle County Courthouse Square on IL Rte. 2 North.

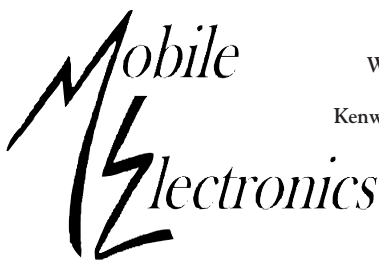
