Judge keeps bond at \$10 million

Meyer faces life in prison for fatal fire

OREGON—The Byron man accused of killing his ex-wife and 3-year-old son in 2016 will remain in jail on a \$10 million bond, Judge John Roe ruled at a hearing Oct. 16.

Duane Meyer was charged on Oct. 9 with four counts of first degree homicide, two counts of aggravated arson and one count of concealment of a homicidal death for allegedly setting the fire in Byron that killed Maggie Meyer and Amos Meyer. Duane Meyer, who was led into court in an orange jumpsuit with chains at his waist and ankles, has pled not guilty to the charges.

Meyer's attorney, Christopher Derango, of Rockford, who made the motion for the bond reduction,

argued that Meyer was not a flight risk. He said Meyer was a lifelong Ogle County resident who had family ties to the area.

He also said that during the three years since the fatal fire, Meyer has not left town or broken any laws.

"Not so much as a parking ticket," Derango said.

He said that if released, Meyer could continue to be a "productive member" of society during the trial.

But State's Attorney Eric Morrow told Roe that Meyer was a danger to the community and a flight risk. Morrow said that Meyer was charged with killing his ex-wife and son, two people close to him, and that when arrested, he was in possession of a loaded firearm in his vehicle.

"I would submit that nobody in this community is safe," if Meyer is released, Morrow said.

He also said that if convicted of the charges, Meyer faces a sentence of natural life in prison. Morrow said, "that alone" is enough to keep the bond in place.

Ultimately Roe agreed, citing the charges, loaded gun and the prospect of a life sentence – along with other evidence – as reasons to leave the bond at \$10 million.

"I am going to deny the bond reduction by the defense," Roe said.

Roe set the next pre-trial hearing for Nov. 18 at 10 a.m.

County gives burn reminder

With shorter days and cooler temperatures, autumn is now here in Ogle County.

The Ogle County Solid Waste Management Department (OCSWMD) routinely fields calls and responds to complaints dealing with the open burning of waste at this time of year.

In Illinois, the Environmental Protection Act has addressed this issue since the 1970's. By law in Illinois, only certain types of waste may be openly burned, and even then, only under certain conditions. No matter where you reside in Illinois, the only materials that can be openly burned are landscape waste generated from that property, certain agricultural materials (animal bedding, straw), and domicile waste, which includes cardboard and junk mail, which is generated on that property.

If you live within city limits of a town or village, there may be more restrictions on open burning as well. If you are burning some of the above materials, be sure that you are doing it responsibly. Always monitor the fire, only burn dry materials to avoid a smoky, smoldering fire, and only burn on days when smoke will not create nuisance conditions for your neighbors or create visibility hazards on roadways.

It is illegal to burn furniture, mattresses, tires, Styrofoam, plastic items such as chairs, coolers, or other containers, garbage, batteries and electronics, cabinets, carpet, vinyl siding, roofing shingles, fiberglass, or any type of construction or demolition debris, which includes lumber, OSB, paneling, and decking. Modern materials are mostly synthetic and petroleum based. Most wood debris is either treated, painted, or can contain adhesives. Burning these types of materials releases toxins and carcinogens to the atmosphere and the ash, which is toxic, contaminates the ground where the burn pile is located. It is in violation of the Illinois Environmental Protection Act and Ogle County ordinances to burn the above materials. In addition, structures, recreational vehicles, or mobile homes cannot be burned as a method of disposal under any conditions.

Boes appointed to fill County Board seat

ROCHELLE – At its Oct. 15 meeting, the Ogle County Board filled the vacancy left by the death of Kim Gouker.

Larry Boes, of Byron, was selected to replace Gouker, the former County Board chairman who was found dead at his Byron home during a wellness check on Sept. 10. Boes will fill out the remainder of Gouker's term, which ends on Nov. 30, 2020. He will represent District No. 6.

In other action, the Board approved payments totaling more than \$1 million for the construction of the new Judicial Center Annex being built in Oregon.

Most of the costs are for construction management services being provided by Gilbane. The new jail is expected to be completed in late 2020.

Also, the Board voted to approve an ordinance establishing a county cannabis retailers tax. It covers the tax rate for future businesses selling marijuana in the county, other than medical marijuana. For businesses in unincorporated area of Ogle County, the rate will be 3.75 percent.

For sales in a municipality in the county, the rate will be up to 3 percent.

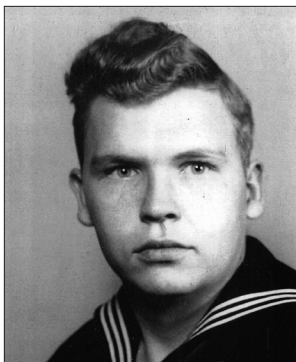

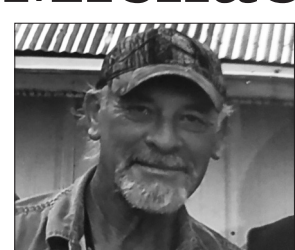

Deer are getting active – keep an eye out while driving

SPRINGFIELD – With the onset of autumn, the school year is in full swing, pumpkin lattes are steaming – and Illinois deer are feeling amorous.

The Illinois Department of Transportation and Illinois Department of Natural Resources are reminding motorists to be vigilant during deer mating season as the animals become more active, especially in the early morning and evening hours.

“As the risk of deer-vehicle crashes peak during fall, drivers can help ensure they reach their destinations safely by remembering a few important tips,” said Acting Illinois Transportation Secretary Omer Osman.

“Most importantly, don’t veer for deer. While your first instinct when facing a deer in the headlights may be to swerve, doing so could cause you to lose control of the vehicle and increase the severity of a crash.”

Motorists are urged to consider the following safe driving tips during deer mating season:

- * Be aware of your surroundings and pay attention to deer crossing signs.
- * Scan the sides of the road for eye shine – the reflection of headlights in the eyes.
- * Slow down if you see deer. They travel in groups, so more are likely nearby.
- * Prepare for the unexpected. Deer can

stop in the middle of the road or double back.

* If a collision is inevitable, try to glance the vehicle off the deer and avoid swerving into the opposite lanes of traffic.

In 2018, there were 15,636 motor vehicle crashes involving deer in Illinois. Of these, 14,998 resulted in damage to property or vehicles only, while 630 caused personal injuries. Eight of the crashes were fatal.

More than 40 percent of crashes involving deer in Illinois occurred in October, November and December, with November being the highest-risk month. Rural environments were the site of nearly 90 percent of all crashes involving deer, with more than

70% occurring at twilight or nighttime.

“Deer-vehicle collisions can happen in any part of the state – urban or rural,” said IDNR Director Colleen Callahan. “If you do hit a deer, remember to report the accident to local law enforcement or a conservation police officer. They can help control traffic, clear the roadway or in the event that the animal must be euthanized.”

If you hit a deer, pull off to the shoulder and turn on the hazard lights. Call 911 to report the accident so law enforcement can assist.

Do not get out of the vehicle to check on an injured deer or pull it from the road.

Accepted items include all residential televisions, computers, computer monitors, all computer accessories, hardware, and cables, UPS systems, printers, FAX machines, copiers, laptops, cell phones, tablets, video game equipment, phone systems, radios, stereo equipment, digital clocks, VCR/DVD players, remotes, and cable/ satellite receivers, holiday light strands, rechargeable batteries, CFL bulbs, and printer ink cartridges. Microwave ovens are also accepted for a \$5 charge.

Items that are not accepted include smoke detectors, fans, lamps, vacuum cleaners, personal hygiene items, power tools, yard tools, toys, heaters, air conditioners, dehumidifiers, sump

pumps, coffee makers, bread makers, toasters or ovens, or electric fryers. Electronics from businesses, schools, or other institutions are not accepted at these events. Please contact the OCSWMD for options regarding business or institutional electronic items.

The OCSWMD will also be accepting non-perishable food items at the electronics drop-off. Items accepted include all non-expired and sealed canned foods, soup, cereal, pasta, rice, pancake mix, syrup, peanut butter, jelly, and items such as bar soap, toothpaste, and toothbrushes. Cash donations are also accepted. All donated items are distributed to various Ogle County food pantries. The food pantries in Oregon and Byron have already received donations collected by the OCSWMD during the September drop-off events. Around 500 pounds of food items were collected during September from people dropping off their electronics.

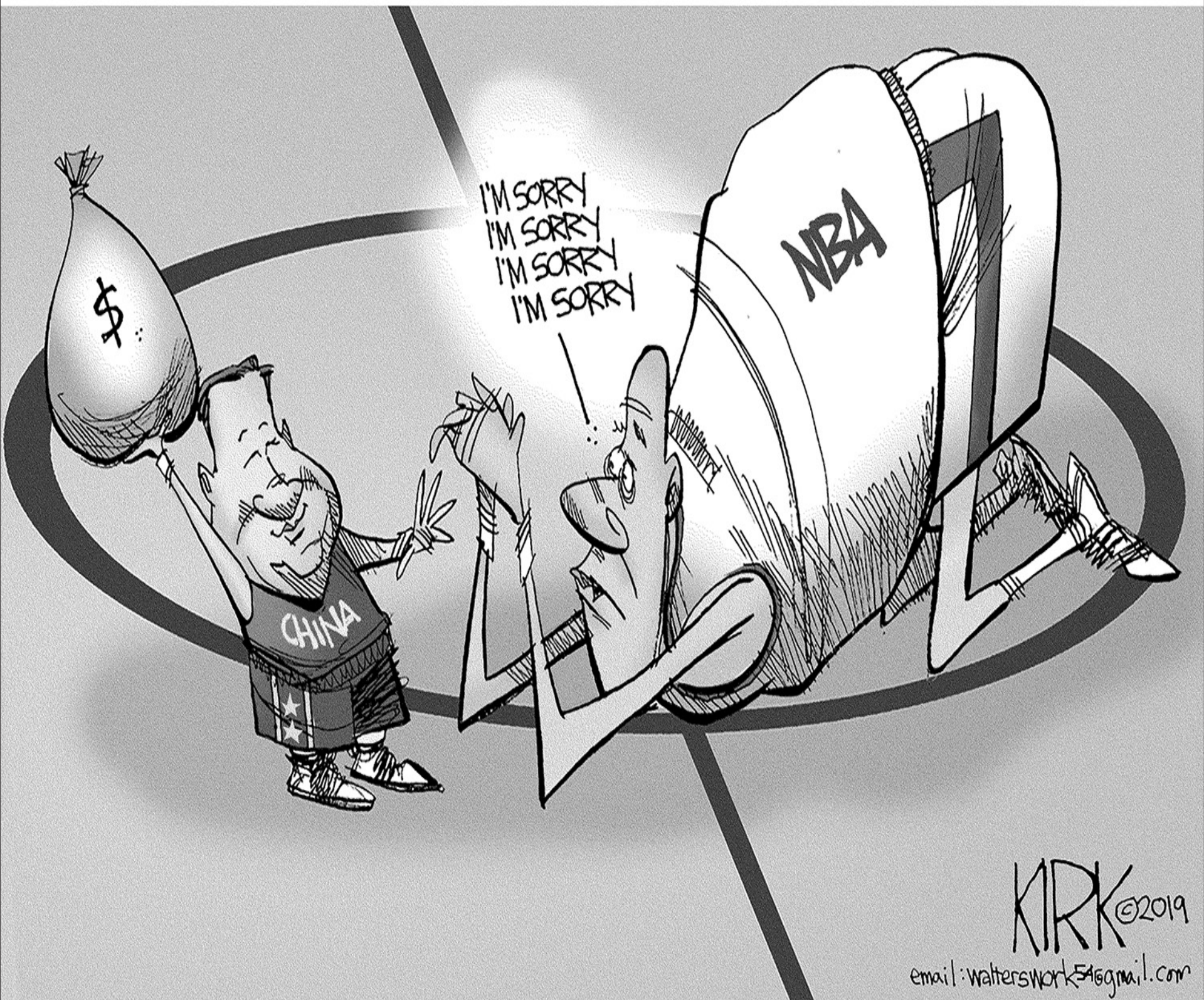

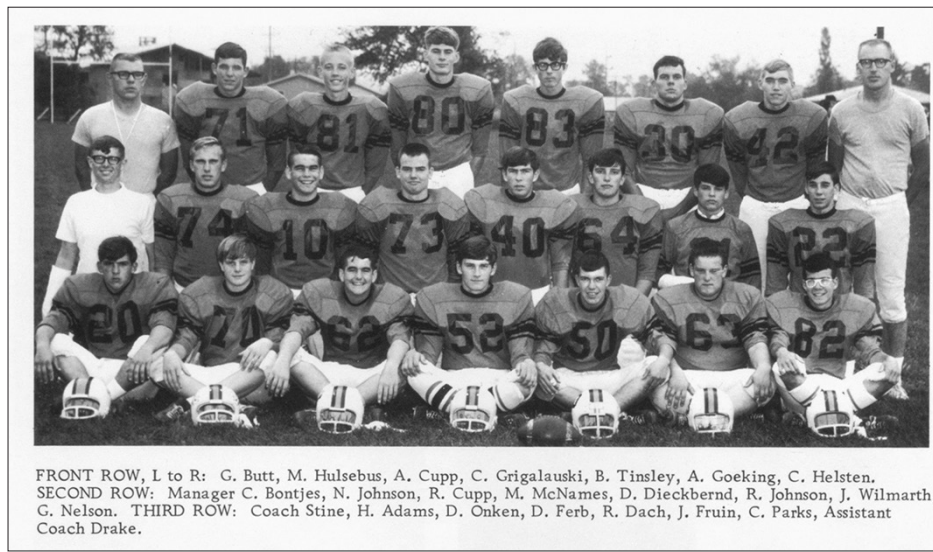



Colder weather means return of boxelder bugs

URBANA – As the weather gets colder and the days get shorter, we often start seeing uninvited insect guests in our homes, according to University of Illinois Extension educator Ken Johnson.

Boxelder bugs are commonly found trying to enter houses, especially if there's a boxelder tree nearby. These insects are about one-half inch long and black with orange or red markings. During the spring and summer, the adults will feed on leaves and seeds of boxelder trees (and occasionally maple and ash trees). When temperatures begin to cool in the fall, they will begin to seek out warmer areas.

"They are most often attracted to buildings with large southern or western exposures, because they are warmer than the surrounding area," Johnson said.

As they aggregate on a building, they will find cracks and other spaces to squeeze into, occasionally making their way indoors and ending up in walls and attics until warm weather returns.

Multicolored Asian lady beetles are also commonly found attempting to make their way into homes.

According to Johnson, these lady beetles were introduced into the United States to control aphids on pecan trees. Since their introduction, they have spread throughout the country. The beetles vary in color from yellow to reddish-orange and have anywhere from zero to 19 spots. They can often be distinguished from other lady beetles by the presence of an 'M' pattern near their head. In their native China, they will overwinter on tall cliffs.

"Since we lack these in most



parts of Illinois, they will instead use buildings to overwinter," Johnson said.

The brown marmorated stink bug (BSMB), on the rise in Illinois, is the final home invader. This stink bug is native to Asia and was first discovered in the U.S. in the late 1990s in Pennsylvania. Since then, Johnson says, it has quickly spread throughout the country.

Like the others, BSMBs will also congregate on buildings looking for somewhere to overwinter. But unlike boxelder bugs

and multicolored Asian lady beetle, these insects are more than a nuisance.

According to Johnson, "They will feed on a wide variety of tree fruits, vegetables, agricultural crops, and ornamentals and can cause a significant amount of damage."

They have the typical 'shield' shape of stink bugs. And, as their name implies, BSMBs are brown and marmorated (mottled). There are a few characteristics that can be used to differentiate them from our native stink bugs: the antenna

are striped with white bands, they have smooth "shoulders," and they have black and white triangular patterns on their abdomens. Several other insects are commonly confused with BSMBs. Johnson recommends contacting your local Extension office if you are unsure.

For all of these insects, the best management strategy for keeping them out of your home is exclusion.

Johnson says, "Make sure windows and doors fit tight and window screens are free from

holes. Seal any openings, cracks, and crevices around the foundation, pipes, wires, and chimneys. Finally, make sure siding, eaves, and soffits are in good condition."

Insecticides can be applied to the perimeter of buildings, but since these insects are rather mobile, it can be difficult to get good control of them. Once they enter your home, they can be vacuumed up and placed in soapy water and disposed of.

Using insecticides to control these insects indoors is generally not recommended.

Q: I recently saw some episodes of “The Day I Picked My Parents” on the A&E channel about the foster care system. Will it be returning? If so, when? -- B.H.

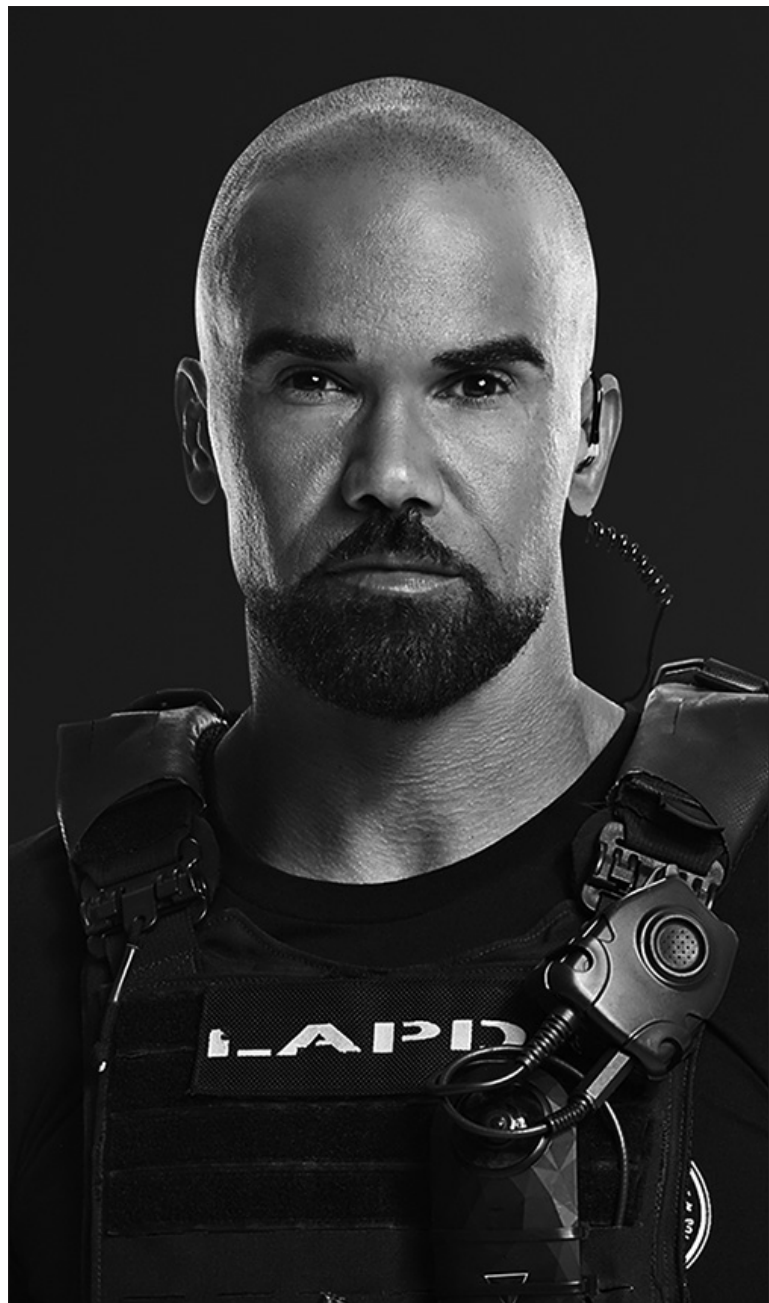

“Stuber” (R) -- How far would you go for a five-star rating? Stu (Kumail Nanjani) -- an Uber driver, hence the “Stuber” -- will go pretty dang far. He’s a timid, keep-the-boat steady type who’s desperate to keep his rating in the clear. Stu picks up a fare in the form of physically intimidating but unfortunately visually impaired cop Vic (Dave Bautista). He’s furiously running down a killer, but can’t do the driving himself. So naturally, he blackmails Stu into being his wingman using that coveted driver rating -- and if you ask me, the results were hilarious. Where Stu is apprehensive and uptight, Vic is brash and ballsy -- and the foil works. Director Michael Dowse’s idea of humor is a two-by-four to the face, so expect limits to be pushed.

“Crawl” (R) -- Haley (Kay Scodelario) is a small-town Florida girl sitting in the track of a monster hurricane. She goes to check in on her dad (Barry Pepper) under evacuation orders and finds him trapped in the crawlspace of his home. Injured and

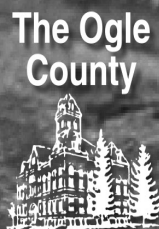

WHEREAS, the Byron Park District, Ogle County, Illinois (the "District"), is a Park District and body politic of the State of Illinois, duly created, organized and existing under the Park District Code of the State of Illinois, as amended (the "Park Code"), and having the

powers, objects and purposes provided by said Park Code; and WHEREAS, the Board of Park Commissioners of the District (the "Board") has determined that it is necessary to (i) finance the payment of land condemned or purchased for parks or boulevards, for the building, maintaining, improving and protecting of the same and for the payment of the expenses incident thereto (the "Project"), and (ii) pay certain costs of issuance of the Bonds (as such term is hereinafter defined), all for the benefit of the inhabitants of the District; and

This Ordinance, together with a notice in the statutory form, shall be published once within ten days after passage hereof by the Board in the Ogle County Life; the same being a newspaper of general circulation in the District, and if no petition, signed by 353 electors (said number being the greater of (i) seven and one-half percent (7½%) of the registered voters in the District or (ii) the lesser of 200 registered voters or 15% of registered voters), asking that the question of the issuance of the Bonds be submitted to the electors of the

District, is filed with the Secretary of the Board within thirty (30) days after the date of the publication of this Ordinance and said notice, then this Ordinance shall be in full force and effect and the Bonds shall be authorized to be issued. A petition form shall be provided by the Secretary at the principal office of the District, located at 420 North Colfax Street, Byron, Illinois, to any individual requesting one.

Section 4. Additional Ordinances. If no petition meeting the requirements of applicable law is filed during the petition period hereinabove referred to, then the Board may adopt additional ordinances or proceedings supplementing or amending this Ordinance providing for the issuance and sale of the Bonds and prescribing all the details of the Bonds, so long as the maximum amount of the Bonds as set forth in this Ordinance is not exceeded and there is no material change in the purposes described herein. 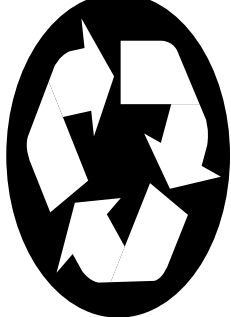
