## Oregon boys bowling sets records in Cavalier Classic win

## Surmo bowls 300 game, third in Oregon's history

OREGON - The Oregon Hawks boys bowling team competed at the LaSalle-Peru Cavalier Classic at IV Super Bowl in Peru
on Dec. 9 and came away with their second on Dec. 9 and came away with heir second
consecutive tournament championship, with junior Gavvin Surmo setting several Oregon school records.
In the second game of the day Surmo recorded a 300 game, the third such game in Oregon's 21 -year history. In addition, Gavvin started the day with a 256 game an 802 three-game total, the highest threegame total in history. At one point he rolled 29 of 30 possible strikes
Lastly following the three afternoon games, his six-game total of 1,404 also established a school record. His performance was not the only high point in the day, Senior Brady Davis shot a 1,256 series - including games of 246 and 256 , good enough for a medal and fifth place on the day. Davis was followed closely by Matthew Stahl with a 1,215 series - a seventh-place finish and RJ Keene with an 1,149 series 13thplace. Also bowling three games each were Ethan Smice ( 503 series) and Codey Dunbar ( 488 series). The team score of 6,015 is the highest team score since the 2016 season.
This was the second consecutive tournament where Oregon took the lead in the first game and never relinquished it.
Oregon's two girls bowled as individuals
in the event and Ahren Howy had a 743 series and Katy Miller a 689 series.

Another difference between downstate basketball versus elsewhere is that those gyms still have season ticket holders. Season ticket holders for basketball are a dying breed, as the popularity has waned.

Sure, some schools around here offer
it, but not like the old days when it wa a sought-after ticket, with some families keeping the same seats for generations. Wherever you are watching your boys and girls basketball tournaments over the holidays, encourage not just your team, but also the officials.
Don't be a crybaby like Patrick Mahomes, who threw his helmet to the ground and went into a tirade about a call in Kansas City's loss to Buffalo. With a minute left, KC scored a potentially winning touchdown, but it was called back for offsides.
Mahomes, who is generally considered a nice guy, went berserk on the sidelines afterwards. It was an ugly scene and set a

When a star like Mahomes does this, impressionable young people may believe they should model their behavior after him, as well. I wonder if Mahomes realizes the damage he does to officiating at all levels? Oddly, the call made by the official was correct and there was no reason to have a beef over it. Even it was a blown call, how about extending some grace for the much-maligned refs.

None of us can be 100 percent perfect.

In preparation for 2024, staff will begin to roll out the 2024-2027 strategic plan. Our team has developed and approved a new Strategic Plan, accompanied by an updated Mission, Vision and Values. Throughout this process, our passionate staff worked together to identify our current culture and the values we plan to pass along to our community. Keep an eye out for construction to begin in 2025.
I am pleased to report the District continues to be fiscally responsible and will exceed our year end fund balance goals.
