

## Two separate cases end in guilty murder verdicts

Jury finds Malta man guilty of murder stemming from death of pregnant Mt. Morris woman

**OREGON** — Ogle County State's Attorney Mike Rock announced in a March 25 press

release that on March 22, Matthew T. Plote, 36, of Malta, was found guilty by an Ogle County jury of four counts of first-degree murder, three counts of intentional homicide of an unborn child, one count of residential arson, one count of aggravated domestic battery and one count of concealment of a homicidal death.

The jury trial which began on March 18 was presided over by the Honorable Judge Benjamin Roe. On Nov. 25, 2020, 27-year-old

Melissa Lamesch of Mt. Morris, who was nine months pregnant with a son, was found on the kitchen floor in her sin-

gle-story home at 206 S. Hannah Avenue in Mt. Morris on Nov. 25, 2020 after the Ogle County 911 center received multiple calls at 4:29 p.m. for smoke coming from the residence. Firefighters found heavy smoke and heat as they entered the structure. Life-saving

measures were attempted on Lamesch, but she was pronounced deceased at the scene.

Oregon woman pleads guilty to first degree murder in 2021 death of 7-year-old son

**OREGON** — An Oregon woman pleaded guilty to first degree murder in the 2021 death of

her son in Ogle County court on March 27, Ogle County State's Attorney Mike Rock said in a March 27 press release.

Sarah Safranek, 37, of Oregon plead guilty in front of the Honorable Judge John C. Redington. On Feb. 17, 2021, the Oregon Police

Department responded to 403 S. 10th St. for a deceased minor. The minor would be identified as the defendant's son, seven-year-old Nathaniel Burton. An autopsy was conducted and it was determined that Burton died from suffocation. The Oregon Police Department and the Illinois State Police conducted

an investigation and the defendant was developed as a suspect. The case was reviewed by the Ogle County State's Attorney's Office and charges were authorized.

First degree murder is a Class M felony with a sentencing range of 20-60 years in the Illinois

Department of Corrections followed by three years of mandatory supervised release. The sentence is served at 100 percent.

Safranek's sentencing hearing is set for May 17 at 1 p.m.

Lamesch's son was due three days after the fire. She worked as an EMT since June 2016 and was working for Trace Ambulance in Tinley Park. Lamesch graduated from Oregon High School in 2011.

Ogle County State's Attorney Mike Rock and Assistant State's Attorneys Heather Kruse and Allison Huntley prosecuted the case at trial for the People. The case was investigated by the Ogle County Sheriff's Office, Mt. Morris Police Department, Illinois State Police, and the Office of the Illinois State Fire Marshal.

Plote will remain in custody pending a sentencing hearing. He is facing a mandatory life imprisonment sentence. The case is set for a status hearing on April 25 at 3 p.m.

"Sometimes when stores change to different ownership, they kind of lose that small-town thing," Herrera said. ## Groundbreaking held March 15 for new Creston-Dement Public Library

*Project has 12-18-month completion timeline: 'It's going to be a great thing'*

CRESTON — On Friday, March 15, a groundbreaking ceremony was held for the new Creston-Dement Public Library project at the corner of Main and Cederholm Streets. Board members, library employees and members of the community took part in the event.

A referendum passed in June 2022 that allowed the Creston-Dement Public Library District to issue \$2.2 million in bonds to build a new library building on the land that was donated years ago for just that purpose. The main reason for the desire for a new building is the library outgrowing its current space at 107 S. Main St.

"This has been a seven-year project to get up to this point," Library Board President Doug Kroupa said. "We did community surveys and had experts come in to show us the difference between wants and real needs to create the building the way we need it to be. We'll see a lot of community involvement. The growth in the library and the people who are interested in this will help the town and community. It's going to be a great thing." The library project re-

cently underwent a redesign due to an unexpected \$800,000 funding gap due to not receiving a state grant and higher-than-anticipated building costs.

The redesigned plans made the project about a third smaller. The redesign caused about a year-long

"We shrank the building width-wise, but all the major things are still in the building," Kroupa said. "We twisted the activity room so it now fits in. As the building could grow in the future, expansion could be easily incorporated into the design without a whole bunch of restructuring. We've been very conscious about how we're spending people's money. We spend it as if it was our own money. We were frugal in the way we deployed the money and in the design we still have a kids area and adult area. We did lose the study rooms in the redesign, but we have the activity

room that can be turned

into study rooms as the need grows. We can cover almost everything we need right off the bat."

Construction was scheduled to start during the week of March 17-23 and will take place weather permitting from there on out. Kroupa said the first steps will be leveling ground, soil boring, bringing in gravel and pouring a foundation. The board hopes for a fall 2025 opening.

Kroupa called community support for the project "amazing" and said the new library will allow his organization to better meet needs of the village's residents.

"We're here to make sure we meet the community's needs and gather information and share it quickly and easily to everyone," Kroupa said. "Even through COVID-19, the library continued to provide entertainment and education. We had online viewings and continued to offer services. Now that we'll have a facility that's large enough and fully handicapped accessible, we'll see growth of that type of education even more."

Growth in services and community offerings and demand from district residents has been seen in recent years which further showed the need for a new library, Kroupa said. He cited the library's Christmas in Creston event each year and said it has grown from 40-50 people at its start to almost 200

last year.

"Constantly, people are encouraging us to continue to grow," Kroupa said. "This means a lot to the community. The library isn't just about books and stuff like that. We bring people together in many different ways to share their knowledge and education. That community growth is spreading as we go. We bring everybody together to keep the community growing strong and it just keeps going and going."

For board members and library staff, "hundreds and hundreds of hours" of work have gone into the new library project up to this point, Kroupa said. The board has also navigated supply chain issues that have taken place in the construction industry since the COVID-19 pandemic.

"It's going through research, finding experts, talking to community members, and balancing the wants and the needs," Kroupa said. "Making sure we focus on what we need to do is really the important thing. It will be a great relief when it's finally done. When we were going through planning with the bonding people, we saw wood triple in price and steel and wiring more than quadrupled. Some things went up almost 10 times what they were to begin with. To manage that so we could get this in a timely fashion and watch the prices come back down so it's an affordable facility, that was the important thing."

## **Gale recognized by Wisconsin Broadcasters** Association at UW-Whitewater

WHITEWATER, Wis. — Brian Gale from Stillman Valley, who is studying journalism at the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater, was among the honorees at the Wisconsin Broadcasters Association (WBA) 2024 Student Forum. The event was held Feb. 24 at Lambeau Field in Green Bay.

Gale won Second place, News Writing (TV) as part of the organization's Student Excellence Awards program.

As an institution, UW-Whitewater took home 17 awards, including 11 for first place in a category, five for second place and one for third place.

The WBA is a state broadcasters membership group that was established in 1951. Its main purpose is to promote

the development of the arts of aural and visual broadcasting in all its forms, working closely with statewide educators and broadcast managers/directors to encourage and promote customs and practices that will strengthen and maintain the broadcast industry to best serve the public.

Student teachers assist cooperating teachers with lesson planning, instruction

and assessment. This spring, arecord46UW-Whitewater teacher candidates were hired by school districts as student teaching interns as part of the Department of Public Instruction's Wisconsin Improvement Program (WIP). Interns are licensed by the DPI to teach up to 50 percent of each day on their own and receive a stipend for the semester.

## The farming picture in Illinois

THESE days with all the new pronouns, changing definitions of things I've known for decades and misinformation peddled by "social influencers" it's hard for anyone to define anything anymore. The only social influencer I ever knew in my life were called mom and dad, and dependent on their mood at the time or their answer truly influenced

A resounding "NO" from pop when I asked to borrow the car usually signaled that my social life in the moment was going to be restricted.

your social life.

Believe it or not it's even becoming difficult to define what a "farm" is these days. I always thought it was any place that someone grew food and fiber. Now we have solar farms, wind farms, technology farms and the list goes on.

But let's look at farms in Illinois and see what the picture looks like. It might be familiar.

96% of Illinois' 70,900 farms are family owned.

Illinois has 27 million acres of farmland - 24 million cropland acres, 824,100 pastureland acres, and 1.4 million forestland acres.

In 2021, Illinois ranked: #1 in the nation in soybean and pumpkin production.

#2 in the nation in corn production.

#4 in the nation in pork production. #2 in the nation for farmers

markets. Renewable Fuels in

Illinois: Illinois ranks third

nationwide in ethanol production and fourth in the nation in biodiesel production. \$1 out of every \$10

generated in Illinois comes from agriculture. More than \$137 billion

in Illinois' economic activity stems from production-agriculture-related industries. Illinois food and agriculture

businesses account for more than \$359 billion in economic output in the state. Cook County derives \$17.8

million in economic activity from agriculture and related industries. One in 17 Illinois jobs are re-

lated to agriculture; agriculture and related industries account for more than 482,000 jobs in Illinois. Illinois agriculture con-

tributes \$25.1 billion in gross receipts from sales of crops & livestock.

Pretty impressive numbers. For those of us who live in rural Illinois that economic activity derived from farms is usually the number one economic engine that drives our counties.

\* On April 15, 1945, British troops liberated the German Bergen-Belsen concentration camp, where they discovered thousands of dead and rotting corpses, and many more thousands of sick and starving prisoners confined to severely overcrowded and dirty compounds. \* On April 18, 1997, major floods in Grand Forks, N.D., caused by the Red River's breaching a dike, necessitated the evacuation of 50,000 residents from their homes. In some areas, only the roofs of their houses were visible.

\* On April 19, 1897, the world's oldest annual marathon run took place for the first time. Today the Boston Marathon ranks among the world's most prestigious road racing events, with an average of 20,000 participants, and is one of five members of the World Marathon Majors, which also include the cities of London, Berlin, Chicago and New York.

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## Local counties consider protective resolutions

FTER postponing the evictions of migrants and illegal immigrants from Chicago shelters for months, Chicago leaders began an official eviction process on March 17. Chicago Mayor Brandon Johnson and members of his administration said thousands will be evicted from Chicago shelters over the next few months.

When announcing the enforcement of evictions, Mayor Johnson said, "The ultimate goal is to move people to resettlement or out-migration." In other words, the Mayor of the Sanctuary City of Chicago is saying migrants should move on and out of Chicago.

These evictions and out-migrations will place new pressures on municipalities that are ill-equipped to handle an influx of migrants and illegal immigrants into communities and schools.

City councils and village boards in a few suburban communities have already passed ordinances or resolutions prohibiting or restricting the arrival of buses carrying migrants and illegal immigrants. These community leaders are also limiting the amount of taxpayer funds spent on them by actively enforcing zoning laws and fire codes and taxing the use of hotels/motels, warehouses, and other facilities that are used for extended use by migrants and illegal immigrants.

Local units of government here in Northwest Illinois are also beginning to take proactive steps to address the migrant crisis. The Stephenson County Board is considering a resolution that declares the county a "Non-Sanctuary County" and urges the Illinois Legislature to repeal the Illinois TRUST Act, which prohibits local law enforcement from coordinating with federal immigration authorities on immigration matters. I am the chief sponsor of Senate Bill 3596, which repeals the TRUST Act.

This law is harmful because those entering our country via the southern border are primarily claiming to be asylum seekers. By designating themselves as asylum seekers, they can remain in the United States until a hearing takes place and asylum status is either granted or denied. This hearing process is now

taking several years.

Statistically, most of those claiming to be asylum seekers will have their asylum status denied at their hearing. At that point, they become illegal immigrants in this country should they decide to stay.

After living in the United States for several years, is it feasible to believe these illegal immigrants will leave our country of their own volition? With the TRUST Act tying the hands of local law enforcement, there is no legally enforceable mechanism to detain and deport illegal immigrants who are denied legal status in this country yet refuse to leave.

In neighboring Winnebago County, board members are considering a resolution that limits the use of county funds in any response

to the abandonment of asylum seekers in the county. Expressly, the Winnebago County resolution would forbid the use of taxpayer-funded reserves or emergency funds for long-term housing, medical, or other needs for these migrants, except for situations where they are abandoned in the county without means of transportation to the migrant landing zone in Chica-

I commend those sponsoring these resolutions for prioritizing the needs of their counties' families and for seeking to ensure that taxpayer resources are channeled first and foremost to their counties' citizens.

I will continue to address the migrant/illegal immigrant issue at the state level and will work with anyone who would like to address this issue. Still, local and county government is the final firewall we have at our disposal to protect our shared constituencies from the open border policies put in place by our current President.

The resolutions under consideration in the counties of Stephenson and Winnebago are model policies that could and should be used across the state, and I am proud that counties in the 45th District are leading on such a critical issue.
