Barb Harrison sold The Last Alarm to Rachel Miller on April Fool's Day after purchasing on the same day 20 years ago

AMBOY - When Barb Harrison bought The Last Alarm on April 1, 2004, it wasn't an April Fool's Day

When she sold the bar to Rachel Miller on April 1, 2024, it wasn't a laughing matter either.

"It was perfect to the day, 20 years. I bought and sold The Last Alarm in exactly 20 years. I decided to sell a year ago," said Harrison. "I started to look for the next buyer. I was asking people if they were interested. There was a lot of interest, which was a great thing because I

had a lot of people to choose from. I had a list. "As soon as Rachel said she was interested, she moved to the top of the list. She's been an employee of mine for the last 11 years."

At first, Miller was unsure if she wanted to buy the bar, but after further brainstorming and some in-house council, it became the right move for the 2005 Amboy High School graduate who has always lived in Amboy.

"Actually, my customers told me the bar was going up for sale before she did," said Miller, who began forming a bond with Harrison at The Main Flower Barn which Harrison owned for 11 years and was an employee for a bit before she bought The Last Alarm. "Shortly after Depot Days 2023, Barb made the comment, 'I don't know how many more Depot Days I have left in me.' It does take a lot out of someone to pull off a successful Depot Days in the bar. One of my customers said, 'Barb might be slowing down, she may retire.'

"I went home and made a comment to my husband. He gave me confidence by telling me not to be scared and to ask Barb, so one morning I came in and asked her about the sale of The Last Alarm.

"She said absolutely."

For Harrison, the sale was sweet.

The 20-year journey was fun. It brought pride and

hardships like businesses tend to do.

Now she's ready for retirement.

"It's more sweet than bitter. It's a lot of work and a lot of hours," Harrison said. "I'm a florist by trade. Several years after I bought the bar, I started doing flowers on the side, at the bar, and my DIYs (do it yourself) at the bar. I was always busy with weddings on weekends and throughout the summer.

"I had a lot of irons in the fire and when it came time to quit, there really wasn't any bitterness. I'm ready to slow down and concentrate more on my personal time and the volunteering I do for the community. I'm just retiring from receiving a paycheck."

Along with The Last Alarm, Harrison has given up her floral design, except for her DIYS which she still plans to do a couple of times a month. Miller is excited to host Harrison and the flower group anytime they want.

When Miller was hired 11 years, she was on the schedule one day a week. In 2020, she took after the bar four days a week and became the daytime mainstay where she learned the ins and outs of running the bar.

Now, The Last Alarm has become part of her lifestyle and is excited for the future as the owner.

"I originally did this job to get out of the house. I have four children at home," Miller said. "When someone mentioned Barb wanted to retire, I couldn't imagine working for someone else because I knew I would be

left to answer a lot of questions on how we do this or how do we do that. I kind of went into it as I either buy the bar or I'm not doing it at all.

"I had a goal to open that day, April 1. We were not going to be closed. We were a couple of hours off of when I wanted to open, but we were still able to open, and that made me extremely happy. Customers were asking if it was an April Fool's Day joke because we didn't tell anyone for a long thing. It was the best kept secret for about five months in

going to buy the bar. "We announced it at our Christmas party, which is a big shindig, and we had a packed house. They were all ecstatic to find out who was buying the bar."

Many have asked if there are going to be changes. Miller shakes her head no.

"It's business as usual," Miller said. "Queen of Hearts is still on Wednesday. Trivia is still on Tuesdays. Same workers. Same faces. Same specials."







September 29th, when the 107th Regiment went over the top my regiment, the 106th was behind the 107th; in other words we were moppers up.

Three hours after the son would be home now. attack the field was full American troops in a mob formation, most of our officers were picked before they went over and so the story goes. After we got in the German trenches after they retreated, I met the unfortunate Stanley severely wounded. He had a machine gun bullet wound one inch below his heart. He asked me to help him. I was the only one around that side with him. I took off his shirt and bandaged him up. I tried to give him a drink of water. My canteen bottle had four machine gun bullets through it and I could give him no drink.

I questioned as to where he came from and how long he was lying in the place I found him. He told me only two hours and he was getting very weak. Then he gave me his wallet and photo which I had no time to look at and he said to give or send to his people. I put Stanley on my back and I went 50 yards. I was running very fast for the first aid station, 2 miles behind the line,

but he stretched out on my back and I could get no other word from him.

He died from loss of blood. If he could have received quick medical treatment perhaps your

Mrs. Lena, I haven't of enormous sights, all answered your letter that I received. I just gave it the once over and I was so glad that I received your letter, so please when you receive this letter try to write to me about what you wrote in the last page of the letter I lost. These are the photos and the wallet that I received September 29, 1918 from your son, Stanley. I wasn't much acquainted with him but a few hours.

Having nothing else to say, I send you all my best regards and let's hope we make better acquaintance when I get around Illinois. I remain






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
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BBB Alert: Season opens for baseball and concert ticket scams Victims of ticket scams frequently find themselves left at the gate

ROCKFORD – The entertainment excitement for baseball home openers and a new season starting, as well as mega concerts provides scammers with months of lucrative opportunities to steal fans' money, identity, credit card info, and fun. The Better Business Bureau offers tips to make scammers strike out.

BBB anticipates extensive scam attempts because of 2024's major concert line-up across northern Illinois and southern Wisconsin: The Rolling Stones; Billy Joel and Steve Nicks; Pearl Jam; Kenny Chesney and Zac Brown Band; Pink and many more. Plus, Lollapalooza, Pitchfork, Riot Fest, Ravinia, Summerfest, and other events in the Stateline. Many online platforms are already flooded with tickets for sale.

Dennis Horton, director of the Rockford Regional Office of the BBB, says, "Fans need to be on the lookout for imposter websites, phony tickets, and counterfeit merchandise. There now are many ways for consumers to find tickets online; social media, online marketplaces, ticket sellers, resellers, and unfortunately, some are rip-offs. You don't want to show up at the gate after waiting months and paying hundreds, if not thousands, of dollars, only to find out your ticket is fake."

Horton notes, "Even in the era of pri-

marily electronic exchanges, the tickets and QR codes for entry may never be detected as fakes until you're left standing at the gate. Scammers not only take money from consumers; they're taking money from legitimate businesses."

Last year, BBB received hundreds of complaints on BBB Scam Tracker about ticket scams related to sporting events, concerts, theatre, and other forms of entertainment. Hundreds more complaints were received from customers buying shoddy, counterfeit merchandise sold as official apparel.

"Online purchases rank the #3 riskiest scam type in the latest BBB Scam Tracker Risk Report," adds Horton. "When entertainment is involved, people often are on a tight timeline, and emotions run high."

Here are BBB tips for baseball and concert fans to help avoid money loss and identity theft:

To reduce the risk of scams, always

- search ratings and reviews on BBB.org before you buy. Check out the seller/ broker to learn what other customers have – Buy tickets at the box office or from
- the venue's official site and be careful because imitation sites often appear first in internet searches.
 - -Only deal with secure websites. These

will begin with "HTTPS" and have a "lock" symbol on the address bar.

- Fake websites will offer tickets at low prices to trick people into entering their credit card info. Scammers can then use your credit card to purchase big-ticket items. And you never receive your ticket.
- -Use extra caution when buying tickets sold on Craigslist, Facebook Marketplace, or other free online listings. Scammers are skilled at providing realistic looking tickets and fake receipts.
- Counterfeit tickets with forged barcodes look very professional with a copy and pasted logo of the actual ticket company. You will be denied access when you arrive at the concert and the scammer is long gone.
- Another devious trick: Fraudsters will copy and paste an actual ticket and then "sell" it to many purchasers, all of whom get a surprise at the gate when they learn the ticket is not valid.
- Use payment methods that come with protection. Always use a credit card, so you have some recourse if the tickets are not as promised. Debit cards, wire transfers, or cash transactions are money lost if the tickets are fraudulent.
- Know the refund policy. Only purchase tickets from a ticket reseller that provides clear details about the transaction

terms. Know what happens when an event cancels or changes dates.

- Red flag: Scammers use high pressure to make fast sales knowing people are desperate to see the show.
- Be very alert to high transaction fees on the final page of your purchase. Many low-rated ticket sellers collect all your information before indicating sometimes exorbitant fees at the end of the transaction.

Sens. Rezin, Tracy call fur further fiancial support for Illinois parents

SPRINGFIELD – As Illinois families continue to face the challenge of how to pay the rapidly growing costs of nearly everything they need, Senate Deputy Minority Leader Sue Rezin (R-Morris) and Senate Republican Caucus Whip Jil Tracy (R-Quincy) have filed new legislation to provide additional financial support for struggling Illinois parents.

To accomplish this goal, Senators Rezin and Tracy have filed legislation to enact new state tax credits to help offset some of the costs that parents incur for both preschool and childcare. The two Senators held a press conference at the State Capitol March 21 to call for action on their legislation.

"Any parent or guardian of a young child will tell you that one of the greatest financial hardships that growing families face is the lack of access to affordable, high-quality preschool and childcare," said Sen. Rezin. "It is time for our state to ease some of that financial burden that has fallen upon parents and ensure that every child has a chance to access much-needed preschool education."

Sen. Rezin's Senate Bill 2717 would allow parents or guardians of one or more child between the ages of 3 and 5 who attend an eligible preschool program in the state to qualify for a tax credit equal to 100 percent, up to \$1,500 per child, for the expenses they incur in order to send their children to that preschool program.

Sen. Tracy is sponsoring Senate Bill 3104. which would give parents

a state tax credit for each qualifying child on their income taxes to help provide financial relief for those paying for childcare services. Under the proposal, qualifying families would receive a state tax credit equal to 25 percent of the current federal childcare tax credit for each child.

"Families throughout Illinois are finding it difficult to make ends meet as high inflation and other economic pressures impact their bottom line. Republican Senators have long been advocates for different plans to lessen the tax burden on Illinoisans," Sen. Tracy said. "Today, we are renewing our call to provide much-needed relief for Illinoisans who are struggling to keep up with the state's high cost of living."



Old School Crime

The Golden Age of Detective Fiction was an era of classic murder mystery novels of similar patterns and styles, starting in the 1920s and ending in the late 1930s. Agatha Christie and Dorothy L. Sayers, among others, were called the Queens of Crime. Golden Age crime fiction is still with us, as in "Reykjavik: A Crime Story" by Ragnar Jonasson and Katrin Jakobsdottir. Jonasson is one of Iceland's foremost crime fiction writers and Jakobsdottir is the Prime Minister of Iceland. They wrote their novel during the pandemic year, when Jakobsdottir had time on her hands. They dedicated the novel to Agatha Christie. As expected of a Golden Age mystery, "Reykjavik" starts slowly and does not pick up steam until the second half of the book. Last year when I was having internal issues with my colon and diverticulitis, the gastroenterologist (thank you Google) asked if I drank too much alcohol.

I answered 5-8 drinks on a Friday and/or Saturday. She said that is too much and I am an excessive drinker which could be borderline abuse. Column

There was a giggle as I thought of all the people I've watched consume more than me while I sober up to give rides home and to make sure I'm 100 percent clear the next day to officiate a basketball, volleyball, baseball, or softball game, or to talk to people for stories.

There was a cackle as I thought of younger Brandon who would have scuffed at eight drinks and said, 'Bro, step your game up.

Then I almost went into hysterics as I thought about how much water I've been told I needed to drink two months prior when I was hospitalized for a week and had an IV feeding me everything because I couldn't eat or drink.

More water requests were summoned my way between the hospital and this gastro visit.

When the gastroenterologist said what she said about my alcohol consumption, I instantly asked, 'So, if I drink 8-10 glasses a water a day like you want me to, that's not over consumption? That's not putting too much of something in my body?'

She went flush for a second.

She looked down.

Then looked me in the eye and gave me doctor speech of how water can do no wrong, angel like, and alcohol Maybe laughing at her, in her face, wasn't the right

call, but it was the one I made during the play on the court known as the doctor's office. To her credit, she was professional and said what

doctors will say about the benefits of water and told me I should drink water like I would alcohol and there shouldn't be any issues. To my credit, I asked an almost out of line but com-

pletely appropriate questions in a creative, realistic way... We can't drink too much water? It can't hurt our body? The meeting or debate ended with her telling me I'd

have to have a surgery to cut out a portion of my colon if something didn't change.

I already knew this, and my diet had changed and was continuing to change. No more red meat. No more eating out. Limited sweets. If there was a flare up, go to a liquid diet and stop trying to act like nothing was happening, which I was guilty of previously.

And more water. However, not 10 glasses a day.

I'm a journalist, I looked for information to back up my argument of how drinking so much water could have negative effects.

Don't get me wrong, there is more negatives behind alcohol than water, we should all know this, but at the same time I believe you can overindulge in everything, including agua. From the Mayo Clinic, www.mayoc-

linic.org, when you drink too much water, your kidneys can't get rid of the excess water. The sodium content of your blood becomes diluted, which is called hyponatremia and it can be life-threatening. The Institute of Medicine recommends

3.7 liters of water a day for males, which is 15-16 cups, and 2.7 liters for females, which is 11-

Quora.com says water excessiveness is when you chug two gallons (7.6 liters) because it can lead to overhydration or water intoxication. I agree one or two glasses or cups of water isn't enough,

but 8-10, and especially 15-16 or 11-12, is excessive and isn't doing anything but raising toilet flush tallies and the amount on the water bill. Not to defy doctors or to risk health, I joyfully drink

5-8 glasses, more often 16.9 Fl. Oz. bottles, daily and have reaped the benefits.

The next time I saw the gastroenterologist I told her what I'd done, she ran her tests, checked for cancer (there was nothing), and she told me she's OK with the compromise of finding a happy medium with water because I didn't have to have the surgery as my colon was in better shape and would continue to be if I kept doing what I had done since I left the hospital.

Water can be good for you. Alcohol can be good for you.

Water can be bad for you.

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

Signs it's time to repair or replace your deck

Illinois Commerce Commission reminds citizens how to reduce utility outages and accidents

April is Safe Digging Month in Illinois, and the Illinois Commerce Commission (ICC) is reminding citizens they can help reduce utility outages and accidents by calling 811. With temperatures starting to rise, this annual proclamation is a reminder to all professional excavators and homeowners to call 811 to safely locate and mark utility lines before starting a digging project.

"With the days getting longer and warmer, digging season is upon us. Whether you plan to install a new mailbox or start a home addition, be sure to call 811 to have nearby utility lines marked for free before you dig," said ICC Chairman Doug Scott. "Hitting a utility line can not only causes service outages, but potentially lead to injury or death."

Illinois law requires all homeowners and professional excavators to call JULIE, the Joint Utility Locating Information for Excavators, at the statewide number 811 before digging at least 48 hours or two working days prior to starting excavation. The project must begin within 14 calendar days from the call, and locate requests have a 28day life. JULIE has been protecting Illinoisans for 50 years.

Underground utility line can be unintentionally damaged by those who fail to request the lines be located and marked before digging. Homeowners and excavators

may also face penalties for not making the 811 call, and utilities may be cited or fined for failing to mark lines in a timely manner.

The ICC is responsible for enforcement of the Illinois Underground Utilities Facilities Damage Prevent Act, referred to as the Illinois One-Call or JULIE law. In 2023, ICC Staff issued 127 warnings and 709 citations for safe digging violations, resulting in \$4,104,255 in penalties assessed.
