Northbrook eighth graders simulate city, volunteer work

MENDOTA – Over the last year, Mendota volunteers have been involved in the Heart & Soul Grant Program to help the City of Mendota renovate, build, create, and update.

There were four phases with each including steps to help improve Mendota such as creating surveys for Mendota residents to give feedback of what they want to see in Mendota whether it was a change or improvement.

Mendota’s Heat & Soul Group co-directors Annie Short and Amy Brewer didn’t leave any stone unturned as they involved the youth as well as adults.

They partnered with Northbrook eighth grade social studies teacher, Sarah Gehant, to feature the process the adult volunteer group did as part of a class

for the eighth-grade students to work through the same exact process.

“The Northbrook eighth graders have done a wonderful job of being part of the Reimagine Mendota effort,” Short said. “Not only have they helped us, but they ran a similar process to the Heart & Soul Grant Program the City of Mendota did in school through their class with Sarah Henkel. They developed surveys, developed questions, interviewed Northbrook students, separated the research and figured out how to use it for benefit, and formed focus groups.

“I thought it was interesting to see what the sixth and seventh graders were telling the eighth graders on the surveys. A few of them said they liked Mendota because they feel safe.”

Mendota, school children to benefit from Safe Routes to School grants awarded to city

□ Funds to improve safety & encourage active transportation options around schools

MENDOTA – Children going to school and the Mendota community as a whole will benefit from the city being the recipient of two Safe Routes to School program grants announced at a press conference attended by Illinois Transportation Secretary Omer Osman and other state and local dignitaries on May 30 in front of Lincoln School in Mendota.

Administered by IDOT using federal funds, Safe Routes to School supports projects and activities that improve safety and encourage active transportation options in areas around elementary, middle and high schools. Improvements include new and upgraded sidewalks, efforts to reduce speeding and other traffic offenses, public education and outreach programs.

Governor JB Pritzker and the Illinois Department of Transportation announced \$9.8 million in grants for local projects that will help boost the health and safety of children by making walking and biking to school safer and more accessible. The Safe Routes to School program is funding 47 projects selected from 143 applications received from local governments and schools throughout the state.

Mendota is the recipient of two grants and both of the grants had the highest review score among the 143 applications received by the state. Grant writers for the city of Mendota on these projects were Annie Short and Amy Brewer, both of whom vol-

unteered their time and spent countless hours compiling the necessary information to submit to the state for its consideration.

One grant is in the amount of \$250,000 to be used for completion and connection of sidewalks in the area of Lincoln School. The other grant total is \$99,800, and is a safety audit to find the safest routes for all students to attend each of the four impacted schools – Blackstone School, Lincoln School, Northbrook School and Mendota High School. The safety audit will assist all students because the schools are structured by grade level, not neighborhoods. The safety audit being proposed will allow the community to plan, prioritize and implement

safer routes and paths to each of the schools.

“Safe Routes to School has always been very special to me,” said Osman. “I was told I have to get to Mendota to see what they’re doing with this program. I am so proud to announce we are providing not one, but two awards to Mendota. One is to address sidewalk infrastructure in this immediate area (Lincoln School) and the other will fund a comprehensive safety audit for walking, biking and rolling in the community at large.

“It showed in the application to us that Mendota truly cares about its people and most vulnerable residents, and why your application scored the highest of 143 we have received. Not to

mention that this was done on a voluntary basis and that is a great honor to be the highest one out of 143 we have received. I am thrilled to be here today to celebrate your success.”

Brad Cox, superintendent of Mendota Elementary District 289, said partnership within a community is reflected in Mendota being the recipient of these grants.

“They always say, it takes a village to raise a child,” said Cox. “That village component is really what you’re seeing here today.

“As you look around the area, we definitely have cracked sidewalks and sidewalks that are missing. The

Council appoints interim police chief; approves various codes

MENDOTA – The Mendota City Council appointed at interim police chief and handled several ordinances and requests at its June 3 regular meeting.

Mayor David Boelk announced the appointment of Tyler Kent as interim chief of the Mendota Police Department effective June 21. The city council will reaffirm the motion at its next meeting. He had been serving as deputy chief. Current police chief Greg Kellen announced his retirement last month after six years as chief.

ALDERMANIC REPORTS

Alderman John Hesenberger announced the outcome of a Plan Commission meeting held prior

to the council meeting. The Plan Commission discussed a variance request from Eddie Diaz for property at 1314 1/2 Meriden St. and also city codes. The Plan Commission recommended to proceed with both matters. In council discussion about the Diaz variance request, it was determined that the property owner had met all requirements to open his business with the exception of a building inspection. The request was not approved, but is moving forward in the process with a building inspection being the final item.

In regard to codes, the council adopted an ordinance approving various codes. The council also approved an ordinance amending certain chapters

of the Mendota Municipal Code book.

In other items from Hesenberger’s report, it was announced that a contractor training session of the new building permit process will be held on Monday, June 10 at noon and 5:30 p.m. at the city council chambers.

A representative from a company that installs digital billboards addressed the council in regard to erecting a billboard at 1214 Washington St. (Lube Cube building). He said one side is digital and the other vinyl. He said the billboard would have approximately 80 percent occupancy with the city free to use the other 20 percent. Since the bill-

Illinoisians can now get documents notarized without leaving home

SPRINGFIELD—Illinois residents will no longer have to notarize documents in person under a new Electronic-Notary system administered by Secretary of State Alexi Giannoulias' office.
Electronic Notarization, or "E-Notary," will radically change the way people and use notary services, Giannoulias predicted. Without leaving the home or office, an individual or business can have their documents notarized and signed electronically within minutes.
"In keeping with our ongoing effort to modernize the Secretary of State's office, E-Notary serves as a game-changer for Illinoisians by now providing a convenient way to notarize documents without leaving their home or office," Giannoulias said. "Enabling commissioned notaries to work virtually makes the process faster and more secure for individuals and businesses alike."
E-Notary allows both the customer and notary to sign with an electronic signature, and to electronically attach both the notarial certificate and notary seal to a document.
In 2021, the Illinois General Assembly passed legislation to allow the Secretary of State to implement electronic notarization.
Upon taking office last year, Giannoulias made it a priority to gain state approval of administrative rules, create a new application reflecting the E-Notary requirements, review and approve E-Notary technology platform providers, and train staff to process the new E-Notary applications.
Illinois now joins 47 other states that allow electronic notaries to operate.
Although Illinois had allowed remote notarization, it required all parties, (the notaries, signers, and witnesses) to be located in Illinois. Additionally, while someone could sign the document remotely by audio-video communication, the notary had to sign the notarized paper document and apply the notary seal in ink. With E-Notary, the document, signing, and seal are all electronically applied, dramatically reducing the time it takes to notarize a document. Additionally, while the notary must be present in Illinois, the other parties may be located outside the state.
To find a notary who offers electronic notarization, customers can visit [ilsos.gov/notarysearch](https://www.ilsos.gov/notarysearch). Customers will need a computer, phone or other device that supports audio-video communication and a valid form of identification to complete the notarization electronically.
When getting a document notarized, the notary public or electronic notary will:
* Require the customer to personally appear before them via an audio-video communication platform during the notarization.
* Check over the document to ensure it is complete and verify the name on the document matches the customer's ID.
* Confirm the identity of the customer by examining their ID.
* Once steps 1 through 3 are done, the customer will be permitted to sign the document electronically.
* The Notary Public will then complete the notarial certificate and affix their seal.
Fees for services vary by provider but are capped by state law at \$5 for any notarial act and \$25 for any electronic notarial act. All Notaries Public are required to provide receipts and keep records of the fees they charged for services provided.

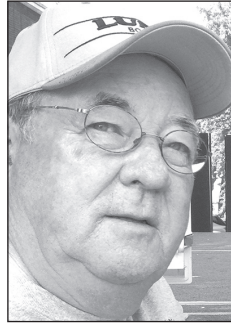

IVCC honors 35 adult education students for accomplishments

OGLESBY – Thirty-five students were recognized for their accomplishments during Illinois Valley Community College’s 43rd Annual Adult Education Recognition Event on May 22.

As she presided over her first Adult Education recognition, IVCC President Dr. Tracy Morris recognized participants’ dedication and courage, acknowledging the effort it takes to walk into an unfamiliar place to take the steps necessary toward change.

“Today is the celebration of all you have sacrificed and your hard work and courage. As you go out to make a difference in the world, all of us here at IVCC are so proud of the dedication, commitment and work that you have put in to reach your dreams. We thank you for choosing IVCC to be a part of your journey,” Morris said.

Graduates Ahlora Sbarbaro and Maren Barreras of Mark outlined their journeys to reach this moment of triumph.

After the deaths of her father and sister when she was a teen, Sbarbaro said she “let grief consume me. While I was trying to navigate through my grief, I allowed it to rip away everything I had ever worked for and dreamed of for myself. I ended up dropping out the last semester of my senior year in high school.”

Sbarbaro was determined to pass the General Educational Development (GED) test to show her young daughter that “anything she sets her mind and heart to she can achieve.” She also thanked her mother for her everlasting love and support and her GED instructor Kathy Drapa for believing in her.

Barreras was recognized for participating in the Bridge to Careers class and the Integrated Career and Academic Preparation System (ICAPS) program and for earning her high school diploma.

“If it was not for all the extraordinary instructors and staff, I would’ve never

been as motivated as I am today. When I started at IVCC, I never thought my dreams could soon become my reality. After completing my adult education, as well as my CNA certificate, my dreams have never felt so close,” Barreras said.

At the end of the program, Morris led a moment of silence remembering one of the group’s classmates, Anna Michelle Martin, 19, of Streator, who died last fall. Morris also commended Adult Education instructors and staff for supporting and encouraging classmates following the death.

Names of the 23 Illinois high school diploma graduates were read by Ryan Myers, assistant superintendent of La Salle, Marshall, Putnam County Regional Office of Education. more we can facilitate kids getting safely to school, not only is that great for their own personal health, it's great for getting exercise, getting accustomed to bicycling, it's better for traffic patterns, even down to pollution."

Being on the outskirts of Mendota, the high school is more difficult to get to aside from using a vehicle. Superintendent Denise Aughenbaugh is grateful for the Safe Routes to School grant and is excited to see how it can positively impact students getting to the high school.

"Currently, there is no safe access for our high school students to walk or bike out to the building due to the constant fast traffic on Route 251 and U.S. 52," noted Aughenbaugh. "This grant is going to provide equitable transportation options for all of our students, whether or not they can afford a reliable vehicle. They need to be able to attend extracurricular and sporting events and be able to walk and bike home safely."

Mayor David Boelk and the city council are well aware of the city's need to upgrade its sidewalks, but Boelk said there is so much more that's important that it gets misplaced every year. Now, the city can address the need with no strings attached.

"This grant is going to go to the place we can take care of the least," Boelk said. "It's a great deal for the residents of Mendota and takes some burden off the council. Number one out of 143 – that's very impressive."

Emily McConville, Mendota city clerk, said it was shocking to be at the top of the list out of 143, "but once I thought about it, it wasn't, because I saw how many hours they (Short and Brewer) put in. They really had the community in their best interest."

Short concluded, "This shows that if you volunteer, you can see what you can do for your city."

board would be located on a state highway, permission would first be needed from the Illinois Department of Transportation. The city gave its approval to continue with the process of seeking the permission of IDOT to install.

Alderman Jim Fitzpatrick presented two requests from the Mendota YMCA, both of which were approved. The YMCA was given permission to use the basketball courts at Strouss Park on Aug. 3 & 4 and the pickle ball courts at Lake Mendota Park on Aug. 10 for respective tournaments.

The council approved two items as presented by Alderman John Holland. The first was the establishment of a fee structure for building permits and the second was to set a minimum fee of \$50 for occupancy permits.

Alderman Mark Peasley asked the council to contemplate a way to honor Mendota native Ray Jauch, who will be inducted into the Canadian Football League Hall of Fame in September.

Alderwoman Vicki Johnson said a new city website should be up and running by the end of this week. She said the website will be more user friendly and will contain more information, including the newly adopted building codes. The website will have the same address as current – www.mendota.il.us.

The next regular meeting of the Mendota City Council will be Monday, June 17 at 5:30 p.m.

IVCC's Fike Scholarship to aid people with disabilities

OGLESBY – The Fike family has established a \$60,000 fund to provide scholarships to students participating in IVCC's Center for Accessibility and Neurodiversity.

The Donald Fike Family Scholarship honors Fike's advocacy for people with disabilities. Fike was the first executive director of Horizon House of Illinois Valley, and later launched a business in Galesburg that developed housing for people with disabilities and for senior citizens.

He remains a leading advocate for zoning laws for housing for people with disabilities, advocacy which led to the first federal test case regarding amendments to The Fair Housing Act.

During nine years at Horizon House, Fike established a work activity center, a sheltered workshop, various residential programs, and a summer program for kids. He also worked with LaSalle-Peru High School to establish the first program in the state in which people identified as Trainable Mentally Handicapped (a term used at the time) received regular high school diplomas.

"This scholarship will honor and continue Don's lifetime work to improve


the lives of people with disabilities. IVCC students who participate in The Center for Accessibility and Neurodiversity will receive support for years to come," said Tracy Beattie, Executive Director of the IVCC Foundation.

The scholarship will help strengthen The Center for Accessibility and Neurodiversity's mission of empowering diverse learners. "Awards that are dedicated to this group of students help them see that diversity is valued and difference is embraced," said Coordinator Tina Hardy. "Being awarded a scholarship is a vote of confidence that can help students see their possibilities, increase their motivation, and encourage them to move more readily toward their dreams."

Annually, between 150-200 students receive services - accommodations, coaching, strategy instruction, and resource referrals - that help them find support and encouragement for reaching their academic and personal goals. Students with physical, sensory, cognitive, and mental health diagnoses that create barriers to the educational process are served through the office.

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

Well, now my nieces and nephews, you guessed it, are doing the same thing.

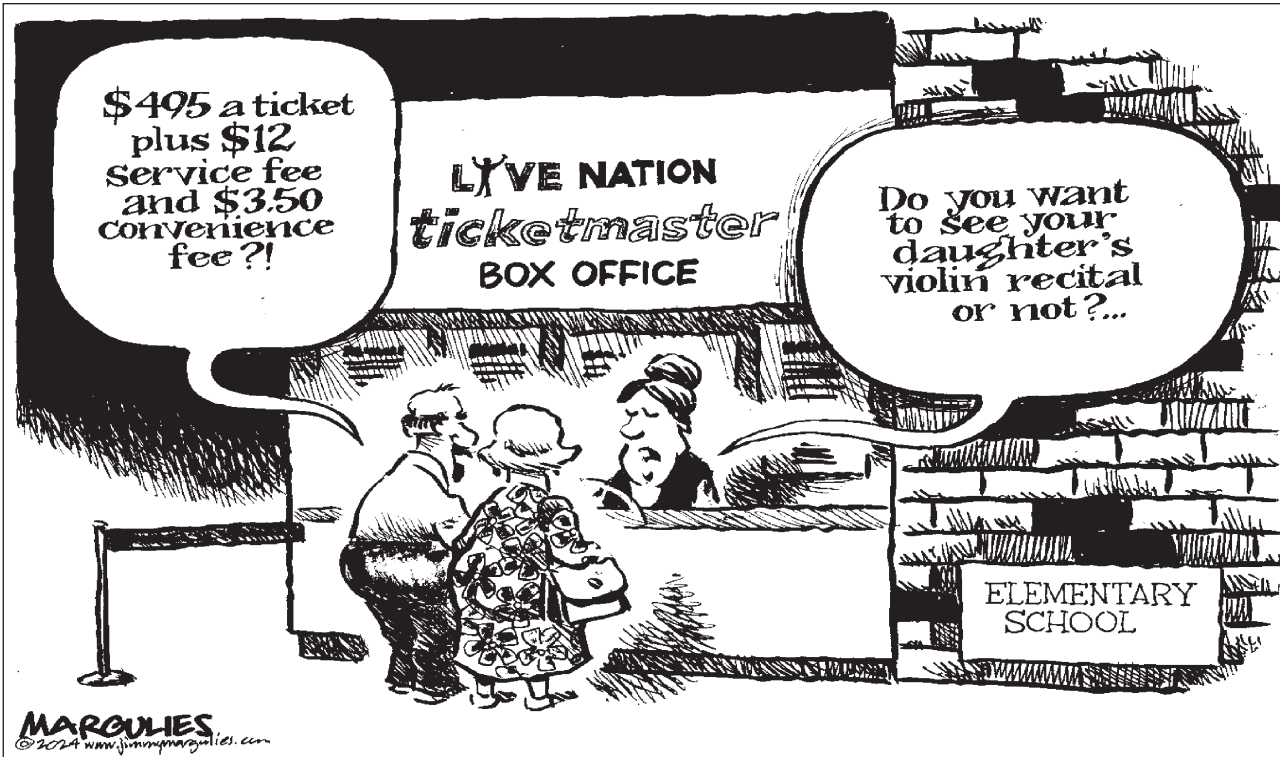

Kakusha Park on the north edge of Mendota had its grand opening on May 28, 1924 – 75 years ago.

The dance floor was encircled with benches to accommodate spectators. The admission fee of 10 cents included a ticket entitling the possessor to one dance. After that, dances were 10 cents each. More than 2,500 turned out for opening night. Portions of the side walls of the pavilion could be raised to allow for "good air circulation."

One of the owners, Ed Wixom, and his wife, had a refreshment stand near the pavilion. The other owners were John Rutishauser and Dr. Wilhelm Wagner, a dentist.

First musicians to play in the new facility were Darby's Orchestra. Two days later, on Memorial Day night, Mendotan Ed Bieser and his orchestra took the stage. Attendance that night was 2,000.

Memorial Day was thoroughly observed in 1924. There were only nine Civil War veterans to mark the day here, but they had been joined by veterans of the Spanish-American War and the World War.

Harry Schaller, commander of American Legion Post 540, was in charge of arrangements. The line of march for the parade was headed by the Mendota Fire Department and included the Mendota band, city officials, World War veterans, American Legion Auxiliary members, Lincoln School students, Blackstone students, Elks Drum Corps, Gold Star mothers, Spanish-American War veterans, Civil War veterans in autos and Woman's Relief Corps. After assembling at City Park, the parade circled the business district and returned to the park for the program. Principal speaker was the Rev. R.L. Peterson, pastor of the Advent church. He enlarged on a theme of the need to quickly school the ever-growing immigrant population in American values.

On June 2, 1924, 11 girls met at the home of Mrs. John Moore on North Main Street to organize a girls' clothing club. They chose the name of Willing Workers and elected officers – Helen

Waldorf, president; Ruth Beetz, vice president; Marian Deaner, secretary-treasurer. Miss Zelma Monroe, County Home advisor, took charge of the formalities. Mrs. Harry Setchell was leader, assisted by Miss Grace Kite.

A Home Bureau Exchange headed by Mrs. Edward Brown sold baked goods, cottage cheese "mixed with cream" and chicken at Yost's Sweet Shop every Saturday from 11 a.m. to 6 p.m.

Order chicken on Friday or early Saturday morning.

A building at 608 Sixth St., owned by Frank Westgate but leased to Mahlon and George Worsley for their Pennsylvania Oil Station, was sold at auction. The lease was for nine years at \$35 per month. The Worsleys decided to buy the property themselves.

The price was \$2,025.

When Frank McKean, accompanied by his wife and daughter, rounded the intersection of Sixth Street and Sixth Avenue during a heavy rainstorm one evening, he struck a hydrant, sending a stream of water 10 feet into the air. Edward Frey of the water department shut off the water in the Third and Fourth Wards. A new hydrant was installed the following morning.

Water was turned on shortly after the noon hour.

At their regular meeting in the Depot Hotel dining room, Kiwanis members discussed things they would like to see done in Mendota. R.W. Witte, a former alderman, said he wanted to see the sharp corners on paved streets made wider. But he didn't recommend presenting a resolution to the council. He said he knew what happened to resolutions presented to the city council.

They are referred to committee and then put to sleep.

His advice was to go after the mayor and aldermen personally, and keep after them.

Prohibition was still in effect in 1924 and on June 4, Federal men were in Mendota searching soft drink parlors for possible infractions of the 18th Amendment. At Charles Miller's establishment they found several cases of Red Jacket.

They were confiscated.

The Reporter's farm news included an item on Frank Foulk, 9-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Foulk, who had been a great help to his father.

He takes four horses and operates a pulverizer as well as any hired man.

The Reporter predicted that when Frank was a few years older, his father would not need to worry about getting hired help.

The Reporter carried a weekly syndicated column by Arthur Brisbane and on May 28, 1924, he mentioned that young ladies in the YWCA had advised working girls to dress "plainly and demurely" to impress possible husbands with their good qualities. The retiring president of the organization, Zelma Gwynne, did not agree. She advised a working girl to dress "conspicuously, even flashily," if she wanted to marry. Brisbane's comment –

Sensible Miss Gwynne.

Fahler's garage acquired a new wrecking truck. It featured a derrick, which could easily pull a car from a ditch. If rear wheels were broken, the rear part could be raised. In that case –

Someone should be sitting in front to keep the steering apparatus straight.

William Schmitz, highway commissioner, was praised for laying planks on bridges lengthwise instead of crosswise. This does away with a great deal of noise when cars hit cross boards. Schmitz also drove posts to mark culverts, painting them white.

This man's work is appreciated. No question about it.

The Henkel Company was replacing a bridge near Peterstown. The old bridge was blown up with a few sticks of dynamite.

This saves much hard labor.

What's wrong with people of color?

The progressive journalist Thomas Frank wrote a much-discussed book in 2004 titled, "What's the Matter with Kansas?" Right now, some other like-minded journalist might be thinking of writing a book called "What's the Matter with People of Color?"

For Democrats, the presidential polling among Latinos and African Americans ranges from concerning to extremely disturbing, as President Joe Biden sheds support to Donald Trump. The Republican was so bold as to hold a campaign rally that drew thousands in the South Bronx, a heavily Hispanic and Black area where Republicans may be rumored to exist but are rarely actually seen.

A New York Times poll in March had Trump beating Biden among Hispanic voters 46-40, while a Wall Street Journal poll last month found that 30% of African-American males say they are definitely or probably going to vote for Trump. Other surveys show less stark results, but something is going on, especially with Hispanic voters.

If nothing else, we are seeing the foolhardiness of Democrats believing that all minorities -- with a dizzying array of national backgrounds and socioeconomic and demographic characteristics -- could be lumped together as "people of color" and corralled into the Democratic coalition with woke political appeals. That might work on college campuses; it doesn't work in the rest of the country.

The problem for Biden is that Hispanics are too much like the rest of America. In Cygnal polling, 69% of Americans say the country is on the wrong track, and 72% of Hispanics think the same. Hispanics care about the economy as much as -- in fact, more than -- anyone else. Whereas 30% of the country says inflation and the economy is the top issue, 42% of Hispanics say it is.

All of this means that only 37% of Hispanics view Biden favorably, essentially the same percentage as among whites.

Changing Hispanic attitudes toward immigration is a big part of the picture. A CBS poll in Arizona found that 52% of all voters think recent immigrants have made life worse. What outrageous xenophobia, you say? Well, 40% of Hispanic

voters think they've made life worse, too (a slim plurality, 42%, say they've made it better).

While the Left thought that Hispanics would enjoy getting called "Latinx" and seamlessly fit into its victim-industrial-complex, Trump "the blue-collar billionaire" probably has more in common with the average Latino working-class male than any member of the (exclusively Democratic) Congressional Hispanic Caucus.

The division of the electorate among class lines, long evident among whites, now appears to be showing up among Hispanics. Ruy Teixeira of the American Enterprise Institute cites a YouGov poll that found Biden leading by 1 point among working-class Hispanics and 39 points among college-educated Hispanics. Working-class Hispanics tend to be more moderate or conservative than their college-educated counterparts and are more pessimistic about the economy and concerned about inflation. As Teixeira notes, about 78% of Hispanic voters are working class, and even higher percentages in Arizona and Nevada, states where Trump is leading.

There appears to be a trend among Hispanic voters. Hillary Clinton won them by nearly 40 points in 2016, while Biden carried them by 23 points in 2020 and could go lower this year. The move among Black voters is more provisional and less pronounced, but still real and obviously worrying to Democrats given their investment in advertising directed at these voters and Biden's recent fevered commencement address at Morehouse College.

It's best to think of the Latino and Black voters telling pollsters that they support Trump as very much potential voters -- Trump will have to continue to make his case, and the Republican National Committee find ways to reach them and turn them out. But, as the Republican political analyst Patrick Ruffini points out, if culturally conservative non-whites break away from the Democratic coalition it would be a boon for the GOP.

What's wrong with people of color? This year they could prove too politically independent-minded.

Local DAR chapter hears about Tomb of the Unknown Soldier

□ *Guests welcomed from Rochelle & Illini Chapters*

MENDOTA – The Fort du Rocher Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution met May 18 at the Graves-Hume Public Library.

The program was on the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. At the close of World War I in 1918 there were 2,000 American casualties who could not be linked with a name. In France, they exhumed 8 soldiers and 4 substitutes. One of the caskets was selected to represent all the unknowns. Some French soil was placed in the casket so he'd always be on French soil. The body was placed in the Arlington Cemetery tomb Nov. 11, 1921. The top section of the tomb was completed April 12, 1932. After World War II and the Korean War, an unknown from each was placed at the base of the tomb. With the advances in DNA testing to help with identification, the tomb for Vietnam unknown remains empty.

Regent Donna Jungnickel presided over the meeting. She welcomed guests from the Rochelle and the Illini Chapters of the DAR. The American Indian minute was on Pocahontas. In addition to the stories heard in school, she was made to convert to Christianity. In 1616 she went to England to be presented as a 'civilized savage'. She died at the age of 21.

Bev Richardson gave facts about Memorial Day, originally called Decoration Day because they decorated the graves of fallen Civil War soldiers. Some of the

earliest celebrations included the 1865 march of 10,000 freed slaves who marched to honor Union soldiers. The first formal observation was May 5, 1866.

The Patriot minute recognized Joseph Brown, a former slave. He was born into slavery in Rhode Island. He enlisted to serve as the replacement for his master's son who wanted to enter privateering. In return, he would receive his freedom after the war. After the war, most freed slaves were asked to leave the area but he continued living in Rhode Island with his wife who was also a freed slave. They owned and operated a tavern. Lucretia baked her "Joe Frogger" cookies which are still a staple in New England.

Under conservation, members learned that the Illinois state soil is Drummer silty clay loam. However, much of Illinois can thank Iowa for the rich soil that blew in on the west winds.

“Spacey Unmasked” (TV-14) -- A documentary detailing a mountain of allegations against disgraced actor Kevin Spacey has arrived, yet still, this might not be enough to keep Spacey out of Hollywood. The two-part docuseries, out now, includes interviews with 10 men who allege that Spacey sexually harassed them over the span of five decades. A completely different set of people from those whose cases have since been settled, these men worked alongside him in theaters in New York and London, met him in dodgy places like The Viper Room, and even knew him in high school. With so many individuals pinpointing the same atrocious behavior since the 1970s all the way to the 2010s, it’s astonishing that Spacey himself said this was “a dying network’s one-sided ‘documentary’ about me in their desperate attempt for ratings.” The only desperate one here seems to be you, Spacey. 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How do you feel about your life? Would you say you love it? John 10:10 (AMP) says, "The thief comes only in order to steal and kill and destroy. I came that they may have and enjoy life, and have it in abundance [to the full, till it overflows]."

The enemy—the devil—wants to steal our joy and destroy our lives. But Jesus came and died on the cross to give us abundant life, "to the full, till it overflows"! And it's a tragedy when born-again Christians don't enjoy their lives because they have a "barely getting by, hanging on till Jesus comes to get me" mentality.

If you're unhappy and want to love your life, I want to give you two keys to help you get there.

The first key is to make an attitude adjustment.

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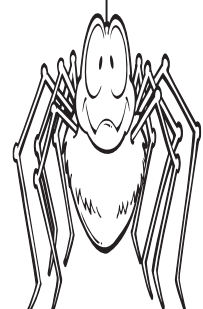
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
