Rep. Fritts responds to FY25 Budget

AMBOY – When you see Jessica Meusel in the halls of Amboy Central Elementary School, she's moving fast as she's going to her next duty as the principal.

Fanelli A Tribute to

Ralph

Amboy Patriots The story of Ralph Fanelli,

longtime Amboy citizen and businessman, exemplifies the patriotism of countless other citizens who supported the United States during World War I. Many served in uniform whileotherscontributedinany way they could as civilians and people who loved their country. Like so many others in Amboy, Private Fanelli was a hero who carried his war experience with dignity and

humility the rest of his life.

The Great War was

once often thought of as the war that would end all other wars. It was a time in America where most men were forced to leave their homes and fulfill the oath that promises one nation's needs are far greater than one's own. For the group, better known as the 18% of immigrants, it was a time in which they too honorably served a country, but one that was not their homeland, and often before they earned their American citizenship. So the story goes for Amboy's very own Fanelli's Confectionery owner, Private Ralph Fanelli.

Ralph was an Italian man born in 1895 in the hills of Pieve Di Compito, Italy where he grew up on a vineyard with his 8 siblings. He arrived on Ellis Island by boat in 1912 at 17 years old, and like

many Italian immigrants

at the time, he nestled in



the city of Chicago and began working there for a few years up until America entered the war. Ralph was drafted into the Army in 1917 under the 131st infantry, or better known as the "Little Illinois". The Little Illinois' position was among one of the war's most dangerous roles. Trench runners had the task of delivering messages along the front by foot. Trench running was often described as a thankless job because it was only a matter of when one was to get hurt, merely if. To survive this roll, trench runners had no choice but to be quick on their feet, and at 5 feet and 6 inches

tall in a skinny body, Ralph

was a great candidate in

the eyes of the US Army.

try, Ralph was assigned to the 2nd battalion H Company, and fought alongside the Australians. On May 13th, 1918, his unit harbored in Brest, France, and three days later were sent out in small groups by train to head to the front lines. Twenty days later, on the 21st of July 1918, Ralph and his battalion were inching closer toward the war, when a German plane filled with 7 men and their bombs fell from the sky and crash landed near them exploding into millions of pieces. The following day, Ralph's unit was passing through Amiens, France, a deserted bombed city, where they documented

that they were now in the

war zone. From here on

out, Ralph and his troop wore gas masks and dug ditches to protect themselves from the gruesome night bombings.

As the war continued to advance, and the 131st Infantry moved along the front, the harsh conditions of the trenches only increased. In early July of 1918 outside of Bayonville, France, Ralph and all companies A-H marched alongside the Australian troops while strategizing their charge on Hemel. At approximately 2:30 AM on July 4th the men executed the operation. Progressing at a rate of 100 yards every 3 minutes, they steadily pushed the frontline deeper into German territory.



Despite encountering strategically placed German barbed wire in the woods, the American forces pressed onward undeterred. Upon reaching Hemel, they found the British had already seized enemy positions. Ralph and the rest of H company rapidly secured the area, seized what they could, and continued marching on. The Battle of Hemel marked the first significant engagement involving

Infantry. The Australians noted their impression of the American forces, relaying that their only critique was their remarkable swiftness. Ralph's early war injuries and the exact timing they occurred remain unknown. However, given his role as a trench runner, it is imagined that he sustained such injuries during events like the Battle of Hemel. According to Ralph's children and

all members of the 131st

grandchildren, his left leg bore witness to his time in the war long after it had ended.

On October 3rd, 1918, an enemy aircraft and one allied plane went down in Drilliancourt near the 131st Infantry, amidst intense machine gun firing over control of the riverbank. Subsequently, many years later, an Amboy newspaper article shared that Ralph recalled his most vivid memory

from the war involving witnessing an American plane crashing nearby him during combat. Despite hoping to rescue the pilot, Ralph tragically discovered him to be deceased and riddled with bullet wounds.

On the evening of November 10th, at 6:15 PM, the commander of the 131st infantry company issued orders to Ralph and his unit. The message directed them to initiate

a heavy artillery fire on Butgneville at 5 AM the following day, approximately 1 mile northeast of their position. They were instructed to advance to the town after the bombardment, seize control, and hold it with the entire company strength, alongside four machine guns. Despite a notice of armistice delivered at 8:30 AM on November 11th, that announced a ceasefire at 11 AM, a German machine gunner fired at Ralph's unit at the very last moment.

The narrative persists that Ralph regained consciousness amid distant cries that shouted, "The war is over!", whilst under a pile of dozens of lifeless men. The weight of the bodies applied enough pressure to Ralph's punctured left leg, ultimately saving his life. As Ralph began to move toward the top of the trench, he realized he couldn't walk. Ralph laid there crying out for help until a wounded German soldier, whose right leg mirrored Ralph's left one, stumbled over to him. The two men took their rifles and supported

one another on opposing legs as they hobbled to the aid station together. When they arrived, the German soldiers were being treated on one side and the Allied soldiers on another. Ralph and the German exchanged different items before parting, leaving Ralph with his ring.

Ralph went on to receive his American citizenship in 1920, and he settled in Amboy three years later eventually taking over his brother's store. He later married Helen Fanelli and they raised their 6 children together in Amboy. Ralph was described as a taciturn man, who seemed to always be looking out into the distance at something others could not see. Ralph was honorably recognized numerous times for his remarkable sacrifice and brave service to our country. As much as Ralph loved Toscana, he wore his American citizenship with pride for the remainder of his life.

Summer Alert: Blood and platelet donors needed now

The American Red Cross critically needs blood and platelet donors now following a concerning decrease in donations as the country has experienced an increase in severe weather systems and historic travel. In fact, over the past month about 20,000 fewer blood donations were collected than needed to maintain the Red Cross national blood supply.

According to the Transportation Security Administration (TSA), five of the busiest travel days ever happened this month and more record-breaking travel is expected this summer—a busy time when many regular donors may be unable to give. Additionally, as the U.S. approaches what AAA calls the "100 deadliest days" of summer for auto accidents, it is critical hospitals have lifesaving blood products on hand for all trauma and accident victims who count on transfusions when there is no time to waste. In some of the most dire situations, medical teams may need to use hundreds of blood products to save a life.

Storm response efforts The holiday weekend brought the busiest severe weather day of the year so far, with 26 reported tornadoes across 10 states.

With the most active year for tornadoes

since 2017, hundreds of Red Cross disaster workers and our partners are working around the clock across multiple states to make sure people affected by this severe weather have a safe place to stay, food, relief supplies and emotional and spiritual support. Emergency shelters are open in some of the hardest hit areas like eastern Texas. Red Cross disaster workers are

helping assess the damage where it is safe to do so with preliminary reports indicating nearly 3,000 homes either destroyed or with major damage across the country.

I have become the person I always tried to ignore when I was younger, or frankly, try to prove wrong by giving examples of music during my time that is better than their older time.


Well, now my nieces and nephews, you guessed it, are doing the same thing.

Myrtle Eckburg, organist at Amboy United Methodist Church for many years, was honored at a speical musical program.

Areception followed in the church social rooms under the supervision of Mrs. Robert Lowe. Fay Faivre was honored by per-

Hassler proved he was the best

He just didn't know how perfect of a fit he was going

Hassler, a seventh-grade student-athlete at Amboy Junior High School, won the IESA Class 2A Discus State Title and finished second in shot put on May 3-4

"It just makes me happy that all of the hard work from fifth grade to now has finally paid off. I was mad I didn't make it to state last year. I was right there," Hassler said. "Going to state and winning was a big moment for me. I met tons of people. I'm going to keep working hard and hopefully I can make it again next year. I think can get better distance and get back there.

"The drive comes from knowing my entire family was in track, and they were pretty good at it. I wanted to be a part of that, and I want to be the best. It drove me to work toward it. I practiced as hard and as long

"I think the main reason I did track is because my sister Molly (Hassler) did it. She is good, but I told her I could do better. I used trying to throw better than her

The motivation paid off for the multi-sport athlete who also plays basketball and football.

His winning discus throw was 128-feet, 9-inches and his second place shot put heave was 37-8.

Amboy junior high track coach Reaine Wilson knew Hassler had the potential and was more than excited to see it come into fruition.

"When we went down there on Friday, we were told he was going to throw at a certain time. Then they got behind and we were told another time," said Wilson, who is leaving Amboy after one year to take over as the Hiawatha High School head varsity volleyball coach. "He didn't throw until 3:30 p.m. and we got there around 10 a.m. for the parade. He sat all day.

"For the fact his first discus throw was a good 143 feet, but he hit the out-of-bounds marker. His second throw was 121 feet, and he took the lead, but a couple other boys out threw him. His third throw, when he launched it, he released late, and it was a line drive that didn't go nearly as far as he can throw.

"He had one throw left and I told him, 'Quit playing with your food.' He looked at me funny. Then I told him, 'You know what you're doing here, get out there and do it.' He released the last one and it headed toward the foul line on the left side. All of a sudden, it curved and dropped in play. It was a good throw." Hassler had a similar progression during Saturday's

finals, but it proved to be enough to take home two state medals.

The coach knew Ian had it in him since his dad, Mark

He just had to do some fine tuning but only had four regular season meets before sectional because of weather cancelations.

Although there weren't many meets, 108 AJHS students started the season, 74 were still on the team at the end, 52 participated at sectional, 15 athletes placed 1-6 at sectional, and 42 set personal records.



Dunlap resigns as Amboy boys basketball coach

AMBOY - Brad Dunlap wasn't expecting what he heard on the other end of the phone call.

The Amboy boys basketball season had just ended and he was getting ready for the summer events for the Clippers. Until he received a phone call from a well-respected coach and program.

"I was very fortunate to be contacted after our season by Sterling High School and coach Ryan Vasquez, who I've known through the basketball coaching ranks," Dunlap said. "They gave me an opportunity to coach at Sterling, and it's hard to turn that down with the direction I want for my career. They have a high-level, big-time program, and it's always been a dream of mine to coach a team like theirs, a high-level Class 3A program."

Dunlap, who will be a Sterling varsity assistant coach and the sophomore head coach, became an Amboy High School physical education teacher and the head freshmen-sophomore boys hoops coach for the 2019-2020 school year.

He took over the varsity team the next year, 2020-21, and has led the Clippers for the last four years.

Leaving the Amboy program wasn't an easy decision, but this next step has been something he's thought about before.

"I just think the quality of the Sterling program, the long-standing tradition with sports in general, not just basketball, has a great message and great attitude. It drew me in,"Dunlap said. "Everything is about getting better and putting in the best effort. They also have great facilities.

"I have thought about moving up the ranks to try to coach at the small college level. Sterling is a step in the right direction as it will help me make connections for the higher level."

Not only is taking the Sterling gig a career decision, but it's also one for the family.

The Dunlaps moved five-minutes outside of the west side of Sterling in August of 2023. His wife, Ashley Dunlap, teaches in the Sterling school district and their kids go to Sterling schools.

"It was kind of a no-brainer for us," said Brad Dunlap, who commutes 40 minutes one way to AHS. "I'll get to see my kids more and go to their events. Hopefully I get the opportunity to coach our two boys. It was a really, really big family decision. Thought went into it because I'm still teaching in Amboy. I'll start coaching in Sterling this summer, but I'm still teaching in Amboy."

Although his coaching days in Amboy are over for the time being, Dunlap is thankful for the opportunity he had with the Clippers.

The coach hopes he left a lasting impression.

"My time in Amboy was really great. The kids were really good. I feel like they bought in. We took a program that wasn't the best and made it better," Dunlap said. "When I first started, there were 13 basketballs and half of them were flat and five practice jerseys for the entire team. Now, every junior high player has a jersey, and we have more numbers than we've ever had. There were 60-something junior high kids out. Since I took over, we've had both a fresh-sophomore team and a varsity team. We started a summer league a couple of years ago and there are now eight varsity teams and eight freshmen-sophomore teams involved. There's no

doubt we pushed things in the right direction. "I think with what we've done, I think in the next year or the next few years, the Clippers will be competing for regional titles. I have no doubt about it. It shows the work the assistant coaches and the junior high coaches have put in. The kids work ethic is amazing."

Beware of car wrap scam tactics; trucks, boats also at risk

ROCKFORD – Imagine the opportunity to earn a substantial income each week simply by driving your vehicle adorned with vibrant advertisements for popular beverages. While this prospect may seem enticing, the Better Business Bureau advises caution, as unsolicited offers for car wraps are most often fraudulent schemes.

"Don't let these con artists take you for a ride," says Dennis Horton, director of the Rockford Regional Office of the BBB. "The hoax could be a text or email offering quick cash. You could find a (fake) website promoting what seems to be a lucrative opportunity."

Car wrap scammers expanded their reach by targeting trucks and

Horton notes, "You fill out a form to apply for the job. Soon after, your new 'boss' texts you with instructions about how to get started."

The fraudsters use fake checks to convince potential "employees" of the company's legitimacy. It's very effective. They send you a check and you deposit it in your bank. The "company" instructs you to send a money order to a specific business that will paint the advertisement on your vehicle. Or they will tell you to pay via a money transfer app or buy and send gift cards to that business to pay for the service. The catch is that the "company" check is a fake and the "local vendor" is really the scammer or an associate.

At first, the check you deposited will appear as if the money is in your bank account. But you will be on the hook for the balance when the bank realizes the check is counterfeit. In the meantime, the phony car wrapping company will have taken your money and disappeared.

BBB Tips on how to avoid a car wrap scam: Never send any money or agree to anything without going to the company directly to verify

if they are actually offering money to do wraps.

 Know your rights and responsibilities when it comes to using checks. Banks will make the funds from a check available before the money is transferred into your account. If you spend the money and the check is a fake, the bank has the right to recover the funds from you.

• Finding out about a bad check can take weeks, so it's best to wait 30 days before spending the money from a check if you have any concerns about it. Learn more about

check scams. • Only use money transfer apps with friends: Protect yourself from scams by only using them for their intended purpose -- sending money to people you know.
