Former Mendota mayor Troupis charged with felony forgery in alleged fake elector scheme

MADISON, Wis. – Three operatives of former President Donald Trump were charged with felony forgery in Wisconsin on June 3. Among them was James R. Troupis, 70, of Cross Plains, Wis., formerly of Mendota.

Wisconsin Attorney General Josh Kaul filed the felony charges against Troupis and two other men involved in an alleged fake elector scheme, which is a result of their role in allegedly soliciting and delivering false sets of elector certificates to Congress in December 2020.

Reports indicate Kenneth Chesebro, another of the three men charged in the case, was allegedly deputized by Troupis, who was serving as a 2020 Trump campaign lawyer, to craft an elector strategy in November 2020 focused primarily on Wisconsin. The alleged scheme then became part of a national strategy to avert Trump's defeat in the 2020 election. The 26-page complaint comes primarily from text messages and documents obtained from Chesebro.

Troupis will make his initial court appearance at 10:30 a.m. Thursday, Sept. 19 in Dane County court in Madison, Wis.

Troupis, who is a 1971 graduate of Mendota High School, was an attorney in Mendota. He was elected mayor of Mendota in 1985, but resigned on July 1, 1987, before completing his four-year term, to move to Wisconsin to practice law.

MHS Athletic Complex to be named after former superintendent

□ Prusator was visionary behind all athletic fields at high school

MENDOTA – A ribbon cutting ceremony announcing the naming of the Jeff Prusator Athletic Complex at Mendota High School will take place at 5 p.m. Monday, June 17. The public ceremony will be held behind the main high school building.

At the Nov. 20, 2023, District 280 Board of Education meeting, the board approved the naming of the MHS Athletic Complex. The Jeff Prusator Athletic Complex is named in honor of long-time Mendota High School administrator, Jeff Prusator.

Prusator served Mendota High School from 1996 to 2023. He was hired as an Assistant Principal for five years, as a Principal for three years, and he served for 19 years as Superintendent. Prusator served three public school districts as a professional educator for 33 years. His loyalty, dedication, and service to the community of Mendota is greatly appreciated. His financial leadership and management skills influenced the district and numerous careers.

Mendota High School moved to its new location at 2300 W. Main St. in the winter of 2003. As Principal, Prusator helped to organize and move students and staff to the new location. He transitioned to the role of Superintendent at the new high school facility.

The first major enhancements to the complex were to bring out all athletic stadiums and fields to the new location. Soccer fields were immediately available in the back of the new grounds. Tennis courts were then built at the new facility, and there are eight regulation courts available for the MHS tennis teams. In 2011, a new multi-use turf sports field, bleachers, press box with sound system, and outbuildings for concessions, toilets, team rooms, and storage was completed. The eight-lane track allows for large competitions.

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

Lost Donner shares life lessons in Mendota author Shirley Prescott's new book

MENDOTA-It's not often you'll find a book on Amazon with illustrations of the Mendota Train Station or see the words, The Mendota Reporter.

This April, Mendota resident Shirley Prescott added one to the list with her offering titled, "The Journey of the Lost Reindeer on RT. 34".

"It's almost like a ministry. The lost reindeer, Donner, is from the North Pole. The cattle live in Illinois," Prescott said. "The reindeer is different than the cattle. People are different. Some are from a different country. We all look and act different, but we all have to get along. Donner lost his way like some teenagers lose their way with drugs and alcohol. Sometimes if you have a loving, caring person or somebody who could guide you in the right direction, they can guide you to where you need to be. That's what happens in this story.

"In the story, Santa had problems with his sleigh. OK, we all have problems or issues in life. What did Santa do? He didn't turn to drugs or alcohol or have a hissy fit. He used common sense, knew he had to get the job done, and did what he had to do to find Donner and get back on their way.

"This isn't just a kid's book. This is a book with life lessons. It may be a tiny book, but it has great impact.

Prescott, 71, who is originally from Peru but moved to Mendota when she married her husband Rich Prescott 48 years ago, still can't believe the book is finished.

Actually, the process seems overwhelming and unimaginable she wrote her first book at this stage in her life.

"It was during the beginning of COVID-19. I was sitting



in a chair in my front room, and I was thinking about how awful the world is, how we can't be with other people, and how we can't communicate with our family," Prescott said. "We were shut off from the rest of the world.

"I don't write much. I have written a little bit for Guidepost Magazine, and they've always submitted my work, but it didn't have anything to do with why I wrote the book.

"I got out my paper and pencil and I started writing this little story about our farm and about an experience I had with an injured deer outside of my house. I just started writing, writing, and writing. I couldn't stop. A couple hours later, I stopped, and I was finished with the book.

"It's just surreal."

Monier has felt ALS wrath, wants to help others with Walnut 5K Run/Walk

WALNUT - Instead of dwelling on tragedy, the Monier family uses it to fuel a fight. The fight against ALS (Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis), also known as Lou Gehrig's disease.

"My mom, Jan Monier, passed away from ALS in 2013. We have familiar ALS. There is a 50 percent chance someone in our family could have ALS," Hillary Monier said. "We have had 22 people in or extended family pass away because of the disease. We have family members fighting currently. It's very prevalent in our family. "There isn't a cure. Treatments are getting better but they're still behind. We're

trying to do our best to raise money for a cause that is near and dear to us.³

Hillary, along with her older sister Kristie Cady, older brother Brad Monier, and younger brother Jordan Monier, took over the Walnut 5K Run/Walk for ALS in 2021 to help raise funds and awareness for a deadly disease.

This year's 5K takes place at 8 a.m. Saturday, July 6 at 323 S. Main St. in Walnut.

"No one used to find out if you had the ALS gene because there wasn't anything that could be done before," Hillary Monier said. "There weren't any treatments, so it just wasn't worried about. But now, treatments are really advancing and

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there are a lot more studies taking place. Getting tested is becoming more common to seek out research trials to do what we can to treat the disease.

"I have had genetic testing and I do carry the gene. Brad has been tested and he does not carry the gene. Our other siblings haven't been tested. We are trying to be active in the community and do our part to help others."

'Yes, I have the ALS gene, but I could also die in a car accident tomorrow. We just live life to the fullest, stay close as a family, and support each other as much as we can."

Don Monier, the Monier father, helps his co-directing children run the event. Not only is the event

"This cause is near and dear to us. Unfortunately, I've seen first-hand what the disease does to individuals and their support group.' Brad Monier said. "Our motivation is to help make a difference in finding a cure so other people don't have to go through that.

"We're very fortunate Walnut and surrounding communities support, many on a yearly basis, the way they do."

Since the Walnut 5K Run/Walk was established in 2011, it has donated \$149,643.73 to ALS research.

The Amateur Radio Exams begin at 10 a.m. Saturday, June 22 and Field Day is from 1 p.m. Saturday, June 22 to 1 p.m. Sunday, June 23.

Field Day is a showcase for how amateur radio works reliably under any conditions from almost any location to create an independent communications network. "Ham radio functions completely independent of the Internet or cell phone infrastructure, can interface with laptops

or smartphones, and can be set up almost anywhere in minutes. That's the beauty of amateur radio during a communications outage," says Bob Inderbitzen, NQ1R, spokesperson for ARRL The national association for Amateur Radio®, (www.arrl.org), which represents amateur (or "ham") radio operators across the country. "In today's electronic do-it-yourself (DIY) environment, ham radio remains one of the best ways for people to learn about electronics, physics, meteorology, and numerous other scientific disciplines, and is a huge asset to any community during disasters or emergencies if the standard communication infrastructure goes down," Inderbitzen adds. Anyone may

become a licensed amateur radio operator. There are more than 750,000 licensed hams in the United States, as young as 9 and as old as 100. And with clubs such as The American Legion Post 33 Amateur Radio Club, it's easy for anybody to get involved right here in La-Salle County. VanKeulen siblings bring first joint business venture, Scooter's Coffee, to Mendota

MENDOTA – Since May 3, Scooter's Coffee has been serving Mendota residents coffee, smoothies, food, and more.

But the process, the ingenuity to bring a coffee shop and a new business to town has been brewing for years.

Mary VanKeulen brought Anytime Fitness to Mendota in 2018. With the initial reception and the continual support, she knew "The World's Greatest Little City" was a great location for her first co-owner endeavor with her brother, Butch VanKeulen.

"When I opened Anytime Fitness six years ago, I pretty much fell in love with the people in Mendota. I feel like there is a lot of dedication," said Mary VanKeulen, who lives in Princeton. "They're excited for new businesses. There are always volunteers around the community. And at the gym, I have amazing members.

"I like the town and I like how the residents support local businesses. The property around the gym has been for sale for all six years I've been in business. I nudged Butch and said, 'What do you think? Want to buy it?'

"I wanted to buy it so I could secure what is next to the gym. I wanted the property to be used for something that will help the town grow and something that is needed. We bought the property first, which was 14 months ago. At the same time, I was watching Scooter's in Princeton grow. It seemed like a nice franchise and Mendota didn't have a coffee shop."

Mary has owned a business since she was 21 including current operations, Sophisticuts Salon & Day Spa in Princeton, which she has had since she was 23, and Anytime Fitness.

Butch, who lives in Hennepin, co-owns Central Illinois Equipment Sales Inc. in Hennepin and Peoria with another business partner.

The two middle children of Marvin and Marcy's six children thought a joint venture was due.

"I got a phone call, 'Hey, I got an idea.' She explained and I trust her business sense. We looked into it and thought it was a pretty good plan," said Butch VanKeulen. "We secured the property, looked into numbers, went a little over budget, but it's OK. Mendota has supported it and I think the community will continue to support Scooter's Coffee. I like the town.

"We have a good mix. I take care of the mechanical stuff and she takes care of the employees, payroll, and that type of stuff. I'm the guy they call when a circuit breaker needs reset or equipment doesn't work."

Through the construction and operational process, the VanKeulen siblings have found plenty of positives. They're excited to not only bring a coffee shop to Mendota, but a place with

healthy food and multiple protein options. Local businesses were used to build Scooter's as Ken Otterbach Excavating and Hornung Electric were hired as contractors.

Theo Landgraf, a 2022 Mendota High School graduate, was hired as the general manager. The VanKeulens said Landgraf is innovative, creates a fun environment, did all of the hiring, learns extremely fast, is sharp. They added, 'We want him to be the face of Scooter's, notus."

The one negative was windows.

While cars drove past the unfinished Scooter's building during the winter, there wasn't much progress on the building for three months. Residents of Mendota asked questions why it wasn't finished.

"We had some growing pains in construction, but I think that came more with commercial being backed up," Mary VanKeulen said. "It took longer to build than we wanted to, but it really wasn't on our contractors, the franchise, or us. Getting supplies, or not being able to get supplies, was out of our hands."

Butch seconded his sister.

"We lost three months on the windows. There was nothing we could do. We were frustrated because no one wanted Scooter's to open more than us," Butch VanKeulen said. "But, once the windows showed up, it all came together quick."

Business came quick also.

On opening day, Scooter's Coffee served 565 cars and averaged 1 minute, 40 seconds per car, even though the line was wrapped around the building and pouring onto Rt. 251.

The Scooter's franchise contractor told the VanKeulen they set four opening day franchise records.



A Sublette history program, "German Neighbors Then, Illinois Neighbors Now," is scheduled for

Monday, June 24 at 7 p.m. at the Ellice Dinges Center, sponsored by Sublette 365. The public is invited to attend the program given by Ron Weitzel.

Weitzel tells the story of 75 former residents of Oberhilbersheim, Germany, who settled in the tri-county area near Sublette, Mendota, Compton and LaMoille. school German teacher. He grew up in Sublette Township and graduated from Mendota High School. He is a board member for the old St. Paul's Evangelical Church cemetery on the Old Chicago Road. He has also helped Three Sisters Park in Chillicothe establish a hands-on historical program for grade school students on farm life in 1918.

Weitzel and Don Dinges will also discuss the members of these families who later moved to western Iowa to homestead. As families grew and there was no more land available in this area, some of the young farmers moved to Iowa as they were advertising for farmers to homestead in that area.

Weitzel and Dinges have previously given a presentation in Sublette regarding the one-room school in Henkel and the little settlement of Henkel.

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

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Preparing for the Bicentennial celebration – 1975

(The following is from Jessica Nashold's Backtracks & Sidetracks column reprinted from June 14, 2000.) By Jessica Nashold

Although the Bicentennial Celebration did not start until 1976, the year 1975 was devoted to preparations. A Centennial Commission was appointed for Mendota-Alice Wubben, chairman; Art Sauer, vice chairman; Phyllis Martin, secretary; Dwight Heckert, treasurer. The theme chairmen were Norma Campbell, heritage; Tom Merwin, festival; Karen Sisler and Don Klein, horizons; Judy Pickert, communications; and Erika Geyer, member at large.

Post Office Box 1976 was secured for Bicentennial correspondence. One of the first acts of the commission was to sponsor a design competition for a city flag. The theme had to be "meaningful" for Mendota. The winning design, selected on June 9, 1975, was submitted by Mrs. Wayne (Dorothy) Ennenbach. The flag was stitched by Erika Geyer and raised at a special ceremony in Veterans Park conducted by the Mendota Veterans Council on July 6, 1975

Since Mendota had been granted the status of "Bicentennial Community" by the American Revolution Bicentennial Association, the flag was an ARBA flag. Mendota's Bicentennial-related events were given national publicity.

Statistics on grade school expenses were widely disseminated but failed to produce a tax increase proposed in a special education fund referendum on June 24, 1975. High on the list of proposed "cuts" was closing the Compton grade school. Several public meetings were called at which Compton residents mounted vigorous objections. At one meeting, a Compton mother reminded that when seventh and eighth graders were removed from the Compton school, Superintendent J.W. Price had given assurance the school would "never be closed." Another Compton resident was sure West Brooklyn parents would rather send their children to nearby Compton grade school rather than one farther away. Why not close Blackstone instead?



Compton village president Bud Jacobs predicted that if the school board would "put it in writing" that Compton school wouldn't close, "we could help them pass the referendum."

Grade School Superintendent James Basala expressed the heartfelt wish that people firing off "letters to the editor" would verify their facts before writing.

It was explained before the referendum that the education fund was separated by law from other school-related funds: liability, operation, building and maintenance, transportation, bonds and interest, working cash and Illinois Municipal Retirement Fund.

Board member Harry Phalen compiled a report showing allocation of the education fund: salaries - \$925,787; administration - \$115,946; supplies -\$80,694; lunch program - \$104,000; athletics - \$4,400; other - \$67,075.

The referendum would have increased the tax rate of 92 cents per \$100 assessed valuation for the education fund. But it failed.

The James D. Hume Citizenship Award for 1975 went to Kathy Brewbaker.

Tackle football, scoreboards for MHS gym and athletic field, bleachers, Cobb Faber trophy case and salaries for one year for grade school coaches.

Coast to Coast was coming to Mendota, following the Ben Franklin store, in a building on the east side of Illinois Avenue. It was owned by Walt and Joan Dietmann, who were coming with their family to make Mendota their home.

Dean Lubbs resigned from his duties as assistant principal at MHS since it took too much time away from his teaching responsibilities. He was replaced as assistant principal by Robert Atherton.

The number of tavern licenses issued in Mendota was increased from 12 to 15. The Loft Restaurant and VFW Club got theirs at once, while a license for the European Café was pending. A new ordinance was being compiled in which provision would be made for beer gardens operated by non-profit groups, probably for a fee of \$35 per night. ***

Troy Grove advertised the village hall and the old firehouse, including land, for sale. Bids were to be accepted by Village Clerk Maxine Hamel until July 2, 1975. ***

It was in the year 1975 that Vikings coach Bud Grant reluctantly informed four of his outstanding players that because of their age, their contracts would not be renewed. One of the four was Mendota's Bill Brown. Grant said Brown "epitomized" the Vikings as much as anyone did.

A new press box for the MHS athletic field was erected in June 1975. Work was by Phalen Steel, also contributors of \$500 toward the \$3,500 cost. MABS, too, contributed \$500 and was conducting a fundraising drive to raise the balance of \$3,500. The press box was 14 feet by 12 feet with windows overlooking the field. It was designed to accommodate area newspaper reporters, radio announcers and speakers on the public address system.

In making its plea for donations, MABS enumerated other projects it had helped fund: a weight machine, Junior

The secretary of transportation who couldn't

Rarely has a cabinet secretary done so little with such vast resources.

On the CBS show "Face the Nation," Secretary of Transportation Pete Buttigieg had to defend the Biden administration's woeful record of building new electric-vehicle charging stations that are key to unlocking its hoped-for EV nirvana.

Host Margaret Brennan asked how it could be that, with \$7.5 billion allocated for this purpose two years ago, the administration has managed to build eight. Not eight thousand, or even eighty. Eight.

Buttigieg said that President Joe Biden plans on building 500,000 chargers by the end of the decade, and -- implying this is some sort of an accomplishment -- "the very first handful of chargers are now already being physically built."

It's true that eight is better than zero, and the administration is now only 499,992 chargers away from its goal rather than 500,000 away.

At this rate, though, the Emperor Hadrian wouldn't have finished his wall prior to the fall of the Western Roman Empire, and we'd still be constructing the Hoover Dam to this day.

The administration that made "Build Back Better" the catchphrase of its economic agenda turns out not to be any good at building.

Surely, the pace of the construction of charging stations will pick up, but the slowness out of the gate is a symptom of the folly of attempting to force a radical change in vehicular transportation via government fait.

Buttigieg insists that "the EV revolution will happen with or without us," yet it's off to a sputtering start. It's less a revolution than a shift in consumer preferences at the margins, especially at the high end of the market among people who can afford to make their second or third car an electric vehicle.

There are signs that the uptake of EVs is slowing down. The New York Times reported that Ford and other automakers have tapped the brakes on EVs, a shift "prompted largely by the companies' difficulties in making and selling enough electric cars and doing so profitably."

Is that all?

Even Tesla has been taking a hit. Part of the resistance to EVs is so-called range anxiety, the fear that if you can't charge up in your garage or if you are on a long trip, you might not find a charging station. Hence, the imperative to build a more robust network of charging stations that has, so far, been going so poorly.

One problem with trying to build back better, or build at all, in the contemporary United States is that needless complexity and regulatory obstacles make it so difficult. Even when the future of the planet is supposedly at stake, nothing is simple or easy. According to a Politico report on the slow rollout of the charging stations, "States and the charger industry blame the delays mostly on the labyrinth of new contracting and performance requirements they have to navigate to receive federal funds."

The CEO of a charging manufacturer told the publication that "design, engineering, installation and utility upgrades could extend the wait by years even after the contracts to build stations are awarded."

On top of this, the existing charging infrastructure is glitchy and prone to failure.

The contrast with gas stations, which are ubiquitous and highly convenient, couldn't be starker. The government didn't have to subsidize the oil companies to construct gas stations at the beginning of the 20th century, or tell them to offer free maps, branch out into oil changes and other services, or begin to stay open 24 hours.

There is, no doubt, a niche market for electric cars that will grow over time. Rather than letting this happen organically and in keeping with consumer preferences and sensible business choices by car manufacturers, the mandarins of the Biden administration are trying to force a transformation that drivers aren't ready for and the infrastructure doesn't yet exist to support.

Secretary Buttigieg so far has had to explain away failure, and he might have to get used to it.

Flowers in full bloom at Northbrook School

MENDOTA - Students and teachers have been hard at work this year assembling, painting and maintaining four raised beds at Northbrook School with the goal of helping students learn the skill of growing their own food.

At the heart of the project were the ideas that each bed should be accessible to every student and classroom in the building and focused on supporting student skills both in the garden and in nature. The location was chosen with great care as it was important that each classroom had the opportunity to overlook the beds, giving students the chance to check on the progress of their plants as they grew year after year.

Students, with teacher supervision, cut each board to size and assembled each bed carefully this fall, giving special attention to both process and placement. With a donation of dirt from the City of Mendota and compost from teachers, the beds were ready for planting. Early sprouts included lily and iris with cold crops of lettuce and peas patiently waiting in windowsills for slightly warmer weather.

As winter led into spring, all manner of crop from potato to corn, to sunflower and anemone began to sprout. Lettuce was harvested and the first tastes from the garden made their way into classrooms.

With a generous donation of bottle caps from Coca-Cola and the time and hard work of both Art and Science clubs, the raised beds are scheduled to sport beautiful murals this fall to help them stand out and add a pop of color when the crops are out of season this winter.

Plans are in the works to send the first batch of harvested food home in Feed His Children bags this fall, with the hope that each student receives at least one fresh fruit or vegetable with each bag. As the beds are open to all teachers and classrooms at Northbrook, it will be truly remarkable to see just what they can produce year after year.

IVCC offering Career Exploration Summer Camps to teenagers

OGLESBY – Illinois Valley Community College's series of summer Career Exploration Camps introduces teens to agriculture, automotive technology, nursing, cybersecurity and other careers.

The programs expose teens ages 13-17 to careers in various fields. IVCC faculty guide students through projects and activities using professional techniques and tools in IVCC's state-of-the-art labs. Essential career skills are incorporated into the lessons.

The career camps are:

technology is reshaping modern agriculture practices, before digging into plant cultivation fundamentals. Students will create herb gardens while understanding nutrient requirements and the science and benefits of pruning and trimming.

GRIP, the IVCC STEM Academy, is jam-packed with science, technology, engineering and math activities. The camp meets June 17-18 and 20 from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Campus is closed for a holiday on June 19, so there is no class.

They'll begin with electronics,

design, where they'll model and print 3-D designs. On Day 2, they'll explore automotive maintenance and gas engine theory and participate in a racing pit crew tire change competition. In the CNC machinery operation segment, they'll learn CNC milling machine theory and programming, tooling, and machine setup. The final day, students design and build air-powered rockets after being introduced to fluid power and hydraulic and pneumatic systems. The class wraps with a field trip to

a local manufacturer.

computers, gaming systems and more, explore computer servers and drone operation, learn how to build systems, and participate in game competitions.

SCRUBS, IVCC Healthcare Pathways, meets July 15-17 from 9 a.m. to noon. Campers will be introduced to dental health, nursing, and emergency medical services using state-of-the-art simulators in IVCC's labs.

On the first day, students will explore different dental careers and practice using clinical tools. On the second day, they'll move to the nursing simulation lab where they'll practice using a stethoscope, get familiar with vital signs, medications and patient needs, and master the art of documenting patient histories. From there, campers move into Day 3 and the lifesaving techniques used by Emergency Medical Service providers, where they'll practice CPR, splinting and bandaging, and assessing vital signs. They'll put their new skills into action in a mock emergency using IVCC's ambulance simulator.





THE MOST COMMON CANCERS

More than 200 different types of cancer have been identified. However, the vast majority of cancer cases across the globe are attributed to a handful of types. Cancer is a leading cause of death around the world and a major contributor to health disabilities. Recognition of the most common cancers may raise awareness of which cancers pose the biggest threat and how to reduce risk for these diseases. Cancer is a word no one wants to hear. However, cancer affects millions of people across the globe, and no one is immune to it.

The impact of cancer can be staggering to behold. The following cancer facts, courtesy of the American Cancer Society, National Cancer Institute, World Health Organization, and the Mayo Clinic, highlight the far-reaching nature of this potentially deadly disease.

1. Cancer is the leading cause of death worldwide. In 2020, it

accounted for more than 10 million fatalities.

2. Cancer can start in almost any part of the human body, which is comprised of trillions of cells.

3. Tumors are formed when abnormal or damaged cells grow and multiply when they shouldn't. Many cancers cause solid tumors, but blood cancers do not.

4. Cancer cells can grow in the absence of bodily signals telling them to grow. They also ignore signals to stop dividing or to die off. Cancer cells can tell blood vessels to grow toward tumors helping to supply tumors with oxygen and nutrients.

5. Signs and symptoms of cancer will vary depending on which part of the body is affected. However, lumps (tumors), fatigue, weight changes, skin changes, and changes to bowel or bladder habits are symptoms often associated with cancer.

6. The word "cancer" comes from the Greek word for "crab." It likely stems from the finger-like spreading protrusions of cancer being likened to the shape of a crab.

7. Tobacco usage is one of the leading causes of lung cancer and many other forms of the disease. Tobacco can be linked to the death of at least 50 million people in the last 10 years.

8. Gene mutations that result in cancer can be present from birth or occur after birth from lifestyle behaviors or exposure to carcinogens.

9. Certain lifestyle choices increase the risk for developing cancer. These include smoking, drinking alcohol, excessive exposure to the sun, being obese, and having unsafe sex.

10. In 2020, the most common cancers worldwide included breast, lung, colorectal, prostate, and non-melanoma skin cancers.

11. Lung cancer accounted for the most cancer deaths in 2020.

12. Cancer that has spread from the place where it first began to another place in the body is called metastatic cancer. The cancer is always called by the initial cancer, not where it has spread. So breast cancer that spreads to a lung is known as metastatic breast cancer.
13. Carcinomas are the most common types of cancer. They form in the epithelial cells that cover the inside and outside surfaces of the body.
14. Excluding non-melanoma skin cancer, at least 42 percent of newly diagnosed cancers in the United States are potentially avoidable, particularly those caused by smoking, obesity and alcohol consumption.

Knowing you are loved gives you courage and boldness to step out and try new things, so you don't have to be stuck


