Hops & Harmony helps Sublette turn 170

SUBLETTE – Established in 1854, Sublette needs a proper 170th birthday or anniversary.

Sublette 365 and the Village of Sublette have just the answer with a two-day celebration September 7-8.

On Saturday, Sept. 7 Sublette will host a petting zoo, bounce houses, softball tournament, food trucks, craft vendor fair, a parade at 1 p.m., and an uptown

Later in the evening, 6-8 p.m., Sublette 365's Hops & Harmony brings country music's Diamond Rio and Voth, plus beer tasting.

"We were fortunate to have Shane Profitt and Drew Parker last year. Parker is now on tour with Luke Combs, one of the biggest names in the nation, and he recently performed at the Grand Ole Opry in Nashville," said Nick Dinges, who is with Sublette 365 and the owner of Dinges Fire. "To think he was in Sublette less than a year ago is pretty cool.

"This year, we have a trio from Nashville called Voth. We're excited to have them. They might not be as known, but Voth offers great country music from the heartland of country music. Our headliner is Diamond Rio. They've had chart-topping songs for the last three decades. It's a pleasure and an honor to have them



coming to Sublette and playing music for us.

"We're glad we've been able to turn Hops N Harmony into an annual event. Profitt, Parker, Voth, and Diamond Rio are coming to us instead of us having to go to Chicago, Milwaukee, or a bigger city to catch a concert. You can walk from your home in Sublette, drive the 10-15 miles from Amboy or Mendota, or a little further but not have to deal with Chicago and spending hours to travel or worry about hotel accommodations.

On Sunday, Sept. 8, Sublette will have the tractor

Marathoning for ALS

Monier family has felt the tragedy of the disease, wants to help others

WALNUT – Instead of dwelling on tragedy, the Monier family uses it to fuel a fight. The fight against ALS (Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis), also known as Lou Gehrig's disease.

"My mom, Jan Monier, passed away from ALS in 2013. We have familiar ALS. There is a 50 percent chance someone in our family could have ALS," Hillary Monier said. "We have had 22 people in or extended family pass away because of the disease. We have family members fighting currently. It's very prevalent in our family. "There isn't a cure. Treatments are getting better but they're still behind. We're trying to do our best to raise money for a cause that is

near and dear to us." Hillary, along with her older sister Kristie Cady, older brother Brad Monier, and younger brother Jordan Monier, took over the Walnut 5K Run/Walk for ALS in 2021 to help raise funds and awareness for a deadly disease.

This year's 5K takes place at 8 a.m. Saturday, July 6 at 323 S. Main St. in Walnut.

"No one used to find out if you had the ALS gene because there wasn't anything that could be done before," Hillary Monier said. "There weren't any treatments, so it just wasn't worried about. But now, treatments are really advancing and there are a lot more studies taking place. Getting tested is becoming more common to seek out. research trials to do what we can to treat the disease.

"I have had genetic testing and I do carry the gene. Brad has been tested and he does not carry the gene. Our other siblings haven't been tested. We are trying to be active in the community and do our part to help others."

Sublette history program scheduled

SUBLETTE – A Sublette history program, "German Neighbors Then, Illinois Neighbors Now," is scheduled for Monday, June 24 at 7 p.m. at the Ellice Dinges Center, sponsored by Sublette 365. The public is invited to attend the program given by Ron Weitzel.

Weitzel tells the story

of 75 former residents of Oberhilbersheim, Germany, who settled in the tri-county area near Sublette, Mendota, Compton and LaMoille. The 75 immigrants were from 14 families, descendants of whom still reside in that area. At the presentation, Weitzel, who is a descendant of some of these families, will give a slide program about these immigrants. With family documents and maps, the program explains the political situation of resulting difficulties with measurements and calendars, and the challenges of living in a new country and environment.

Weitzel is a retired high school German teacher. He grew up in Sublette Township and graduated from Mendota High School. He is a board member for the old St. Paul's Evangelical Church cemetery on the Old Chicago Road. He has also helped Three Sisters Park in Chillicothe establish a hands-on historical program for grade school students on farm life in 1918.

Weitzel and Don Dinges will also discuss the members of these families who later moved to western Iowa to homestead. As families grew and there was no more land available in this area, some of the young farmers moved to Iowa as they were advertising for farmers to homestead in that area.

Weitzel and Dinges have previously given a presentation in Sublette regarding the one-room school in Henkel and the little settlement of Henkel.

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

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

Soon after, Pvt. Watts traveled with the 400th Casual Company on the Long Island Railroad to Camp Mills and then on to the battle front in France in September.

According to the research support website History Hub, casual companies served multiple purposes during the war:

"During World War I, casual companies were often holding units to which soldiers were assigned when they were between operational units, to include soldiers that were being demobilized. They generally didn't have duties or missions per say, though the soldiers assigned to such a unit might be used for various tasks as needed until they

moved on to other units. Because of this, there are typically very few records in National Archives custody pertaining to casual companies." Although we have few details on

the exact nature on Private Watts' duties, we know that the American Expeditionary Force was engaged in the Meuse-Argonne Offensive at the time of his arrival in France. During this time, armies on both sides of the war suffered stunningly high casualty rates due to the combined effect of intensive combat and the influenza pandemic sweeping across Europe. On October 8, 1918, within a month of the Armistice, Pvt. Harry Watts was taken ill with the flu and died. His remains were returned to his

family in Jefferson County for burial at the Harmony Cemetery. Though his time in Lee County was brief, he is remembered for his ultimate sacrifice to the nation and the cause of freedom.

Source of Drinking Water

The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally-occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations, and wildlife.

Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally-occurring or result from urban storm water runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farming. Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban storm water runoff, and residential uses.

Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban storm water runoff, and septic systems.

Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally-occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. Illinois Rural Water Association on April 15, 1998 was reviewed. Based on this information, five potential sources of contamination were identified within proximity of this water supply's wells. The Illinois EPA does not consider the supply's source water susceptible to contamination. This determination is based on a number of criteria including: monitoring conducted at the wells; monitoring conducted at the entry point to the distribution system; and the available hydrogeologic data on the wells. In anticipation of the U.S. EPA's proposed Ground Water Rule, the Illinois EPA has determined that the water supply is not vulnerable to viral contamination. This determination is based upon the completed evaluation of the following criteria during the Vulnerability Waiver Process: the supply's wells are properly constructed with sound integrity and proper site conditions; a hydrogeologic barrier exists that should prevent pathogen movement; all potential routes and sanitary defects have been mitigated such that the source water is adequately protected; monitoring data did not indicate a history of disease outbreak; and a sanitary survey of the water supply did not indicate a viral contamination threat. Because the wells are constructed in a confined aquifer, which should minimize the movement of pathogens into the wells, well hydraulics were not considered to be a significant factor in the vulnerability determination. Hence, well hydraulics were not evaluated for this groundwater supply.
