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The 2024 Amboy Depot Days Parade Grand Marshal is... George Kaleel

AMBOY – George Kaleel has been part of Depot Days a time or two before. This time, he's part of it in a different manner as he is the 2024 Amboy Depot Days Parade Grand Marshal.

"I'm sure there are a lot of people who could be the grand marshal besides myself. I'm just honored that I was asked to be the grand marshal," Kaleel said. "Amboy has been real good to our family." We made a good living here with our store.

"I was kind of surprised when they asked me, but I'm looking forward to it. I've been involved with Depot Days or have gone to it since it started. It's a big event for Amboy."

Kaleel, 91, moved to Amboy in 1956 after being born in Spring Valley, moving to Earlville in 1939, graduating from Earlville High School in 1952, and enlisting in the U.S. Army during Korean War (1952-55) to start a store for his father, Nemer Kaleel, who wanted to expand from the store he had in Earlville.

With the opening of Kaleel's Clothing in Amboy, it began a 63-year run (1956-2019) for George in clothing and a lifelong connection to the community.

"I opened the store in Amboy in 1956. It started with my dad, Nemer Kaleel. He came from the old country of Lebanon," said Kaleel. "At the age of 17, he came over on a cattle boat. He settled in Spring Valley. He was a country peddler at first. They called him "Mike the Peddler" because he peddled with a horse and buggy for many years. He couldn't speak English or write English when he



first came to the states.

"In 1939, he opened a clothing store in Earlville. That's how our family got started in the clothing business. My dad was looking for another store and he sent me to Amboy to open a store. I did that in 1956 and a few years later my brother Mitchell, who was my partner in business, opened a store in Mendota."

When George arrived in Amboy, he was single and didn't have any children.

It changed through the years as he met and married Mona and they had two children in Mark and Karen.

The children are keeping the Kaleel's Clothing brand thriving. Mark owns Kaleel's Clothing & Printing and Karen helps run the store, while Mark's wife Renee owns an embroidery shop in the same building.

A Tribute to the fallen of World War I

Editor's note: The Amboy News will be publishing a series of articles on Lee County veterans who served during World War I. These heroes are part of Amboy's history and it is our honor to publish these articles so you can learn about their service to our country. This article was researched by Jack Mead and Tom Dempsey, and written by Dempsey.

Cpl. Ward Arthur Singdlinger

Troop F, 4th Cavalry, U.S. Army

Born in 1886, Ward Sindlinger spent his early childhood in Mt. Carroll before moving to Dixon with his parents Arthur and Mabel Sindlinger.

At the age of 28, Ward enlisted in the army in September, 1914 (nearly three years before America entered the World War)

and was sent to Jefferson



Barracks, Missouri for his training. In November of that year, he left San Francisco for Schoefield Barracks in Hawaii where he was stationed with the 4th Cavalry for the next several years.

In those years, much of the U.S. Army still depended on the use of horses for transportation

of troops and equipment. It is likely that Corporal Sindlinger was experienced with the care and management of horses prior to enlisting. Army records indicate

that Ward left Schoefield Barracks aboard an army transport ship for the United States, assigned the task of attending to the private horses of Lieutenant Colonel William T. Littebrant, arriving at Fort Ogelthorpe, Georgia in



July, 1917.

On August 20th, Cpl. Sindlinger died of a gunshot wound at that locagunshot remains a mystery at this writing.

Could the community building become a storm shelter for Amboy?

AMBOY - Amboy City Council meetings usually ask and answer a lot of questions.

One of the first queries came because of the storms the area has suffered in June and July. Could the Amboy Community Building become a shelter?

To do so, Amboy Mayor Frank Stenzel and the council know they need some power.

"We have applied for a grant to purchase a generator to make sure there was power in the building if anything happened," Stenzel said. "If anything were to happen because of a storm, the generator would make sure there are lights, heat, and air conditioning.

"We thought about this idea years before the storms we have had in June and July. You never know what is going to happen with thunderstorms in the summer or the weather conditions in the winter. Some people may be out of power for two or three days and may need to relocate for a couple of days."

The need for a grant comes because a generator big enough to power the building would cost approximately \$65,000.

Even if the grant Amboy could receive would be a match grant, Stenzel said the city would jump at the opportunity.

As the Depot Commission gets ready for Depot Days, it is trying to get the building prepared.


While they do so, more and more need for repair is being recognized. The combined cost to fix everything needing some tender loving care would be too much, but to break it down into mini projects would work just fine.

First up is the roof.

Dave Shaw, the depot chair, also reported Joe Flessner completed the replacement of the windows in the freight house.

Another project Amboy recently completed is the tar and chip patching of roads both downtown and in residential

"The city crew filled in a lot of spots to try to keep the roads in



good shape," Stenzel said. "The process is similar to one Mendota uses. It keeps water out and keeps the road from deteriorating. We rented the equipment, and the city crew did a great job going up and down all of the Amboy streets and taking care of what they could."

A long conversation began during the audience concern section of the meeting.

"We have some landowners who wanted to know about the ending of their 20-year abatement," Stenzel said. "It was

when we secured the dump and annexed all of them. They all signed and now it's coming up. They're saying it's pretty expensive and they want us to see if we can relieve the city taxes on the property. "We're going to revisit it. The

agreements were signed and now the contract is expiring. There was a lot of discussion. We told them we'd look into it and see if there is anything we can do. We also told them it would take time and lawyers."

There was also a vote on

whether or not to purchase a property in efforts to cut down the number of abandoned decaying properties in Amboy.


This could be the first of many if residents and owners don't take care of the property first.

"We voted to relieve some

money to try to purchase a property located on North Blackstone Avenue. We would like to buy it for a reasonable price and then we would take control of it and have it demolished," Stenzel said. "There is a grant out there in Lee County. We have to own the property to receive the money.

"The council did approve the spending of money to purchase the property for demolish costs. It's abandoned. The daughter lives in Pennsylvania. She comes out here, but there are taxes and other expenses associated with the property. She doesn't want anything to do with it. It's a mess and needs to be taken care of."

Stenzel said the council is hiring a firm to check out a few more properties for the same process. He added it will cost money, but it will clean up the city.





IDNR reminds Illinoisans of potential black bear visits

SPRINGFIELD – The Illinois Department of Natural Resources (IDNR) reminds residents that although sightings of black bears in the state are rare, the potential exists that animals from neighboring states may be observed in Illinois over the next few months.

With established populations in the adjacent states of Missouri and Wisconsin, occasional summer movements by bears into Illinois are anticipated, including recent confirmed sightings in Saline, Pope, Williamson, and Jackson counties. It's uncertain at this time if it's the same bear or multiple bears.

"IDNR biologists are monitoring the bear's movement and appreciate receiving ongoing reports from the public of its whereabouts," said IDNR wildlife chief Mike Wefer. "We're also grateful to everyone who has followed our advice to leave the bear alone and enjoy the rare privilege of observing it from a safe distance."

Go online to report a bear sighting to IDNR.

During early summer months, yearling bears disperse from their birth ranges in search of food and a permanent home range. Adult males travel far and wide looking for mates, and nursing females

venture further from home range core areas to meet the energetic demands of raising cubs.

Bears are omnivores that will consume a wide range of plants or animals that provide calories. The bulk of their spring and early summer diet is plant-based with whatever available protein they can locate – small mammals, fish, insects, birds, reptiles, amphibians, or dead animals.

Seeing a bear may be a once-in-a-lifetime experience, and their presence should not necessarily be perceived as a threat to human safety. Nevertheless, it's important to remember that bears are wild animals and should be treated as such.

IDNR encourages people to avoid direct encounters with bears and to check their property for food sources that could attract a bear if one is reported in the area. Bears can follow their powerful noses to food sources and can pick up nearly anything with an odor from more than a mile away. Through learned behavior, bears often investigate anything that may yield a food reward, such as bird feeders, barbeque grills, garbage cans, and dog food. Once a bear finds a food source, they will likely return, so prevention is key.

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

Legendary Chicago Bears officially in Canton

I was torn between two, what I felt were must see events, on Thursday, Aug. 1.

Locally, the Illinois Valley Pistol Shrimp were hosting a Prospect League playoff baseball game to see if the Peru team could become the Northwest Division champions.

Nationwide, the first NFL preseason game, known as

the Hall of Fame Game, was being played between the Chicago Bears, my favorite team, and the Houston Texans in Canton, Ohio, which includes introductions to this year's HOF inductees.

Since I believe this is the best Pistol Shrimp team that has been compiled since arriving in Peruin 2021 (after forming in Lisle in 2019 and moving during COVID-19) and I recently had owner/manager John Jakiemiec and general manager June Keely on an episode of my podcast, Edge of Your Seat Podcast, I thought I should go to the baseball game and record the HOF game on my YouTube TV account. I'm so glad we have the technology we have

in 2024 where we can almost, figuratively and literally, be in two or more places at the same time when it comes to sports or TV viewing. It was a great decision.

I got the opportunity to see the Shrimp defeat the Clinton Towa) Lumberkings to win their third division crown since 2019, which advanced them to the Western Conference

On Saturday, Aug. 3, while I was in Cleveland attending WWE Summer Slam, the Pistol Shrimp defeated the Thrillville Thrillbillies for Illinois Valley's first conference championship after falling short in both 2019 and 2022 and its first appearance in the Prospect League Champsionship, kicking off today (Monday, Aug. 5) on Bob Warn Field at Sycamore Stadium in Terre Haute, Indiana.

I was glad I had the opportunity to be present for a fraction of the Illinois Valley Pistol Shrimp's success and I hope it continues so I can see the crowning of the 2024 Prospect League Champion, which will take place at the Shrimp's Schweickert Stadium.

It'll be super awesome if the crowing at the Shrimp's stadium is of the Shrimp. Let's go.

Afterward, I was able to watch the Hall of Fame Game, the Bears (my favorite team, yes, purposely repeated) and to see the Class of 2024 walk across the Canton field or on the screen.

I was three months old when the Bears defeated the New England Patriots 46-10 at Super Bowl XX on January 26, 1986. In other words, I didn't get to watch the game because I had naps I couldn't miss.

Steve "Mongo" McMichael was on the Super Bowl team in part of his career lasting from 1980-1994 with the Patriots (1980). Bears (1981-1993) and the Green Bay Packers (1994). I probably began watching sports serious in 1992 or 1993

because of Michael Jordan and it translated to all sports, not just basketball. However, I was too late for McMichael's career.

Mongo came to the Mendota QB Club Golf Outing. I was more than upset that I wasn't able to cover the event for a story because of a family gathering. I missed the opportunity to meet a Bears legend for a bunch of people I didn't know then and haven't seen since. When I heard he was being enshrined as one of the

gridiron immortals, I knew I had to tune in. I also viewed when his HOF bust was unveiled to McMichael. Although laying in a hospital bed with what seems a hundred cords and tubes hooked up to monitors and lifesaving equipment due to his battle with ALS, I shared the same smile the rest of the football world had on their faces.

Fast forward from watching WCW on a 1980s bubble TV in the 90s to working at Steak'n Shake in Carbondale during my junior year at Southern Illinois University.

I couldn't get out of my shift. I contacted all the other white apron wearing financially struggling college students who were trained to make shakes, cook burgers, and/or

wash dishes. They all turned me down...because they wanted to watch the game. My uniform was put on and my car started, maybe by

themselves because I had no interest in getting paid on a day, I wanted to do nothing more than spend money on all the best football food and beverage and hang out with

Thankfully, the manager was cool on February 4, 2007, he usually wasn't, and he brought in a TV to replace the broken one hanging on the wall in the break room so we could watch the game. With a fry in my chocolate shake, I stood in the middle

hhhhhhhhhhi" at the top of my lungs when Devin Hester began the second of the two Bears' Super Bowl appearances with a 92-yard opening kickoff return touchdown. As we all know, the Bears lost to the Colts 29-17, but

we all remember, and love Hester for what he did during his years with the Bears (2006-13). Call him a niche player or a specialist as a returner if

you choose, but no one did it better and no one installed more fear in special team's units than him...before, during, or after his career. I don't have any special moments which remind me of

Julius Peppers except he was an animal and a player I was glad left the Carolina Panthers to join the Bears. The Bears don't win a Super Bowl every year or more

than one in almost 40 years, but the fans are loyal because of talent like Mongo, Hester, and Peppers.







What is the Freelance Worker Protection Act?

SPRINGFIELD - The Freelance Worker Protection Act, which provides protections for independent contractors who create products or services in Illinois or who work for a hiring entity located in Illinois, took effect on July 1st.

Under the law, freelance workers are entitled to the following when the value of their work is equal to or greater than \$500 in a 120-day period:

A written contract outlining the products and services to be provided, the dates by which services are to be performed, and the rate and method of compensation (sample available online)

Full payment for the services by the due date in the contract, or if the due date is not specified, within 30 days of completing the services outlined in the contract

Protection from retaliation and/or other negative action for exercising rights under the FWPA

"The Freelance Worker Protection Act establishes a framework of understandable and transparent expectations for independent workers in Illinois, to better protect their work, and compensation," said Illinois Department of Labor Director Jane Flanagan.

The law only applies to freelance contracts taking effect after July 1, 2024. It does not apply to individuals performing construction services, nor does it apply to employees of an employer. Employees owed back wages from their employer may file a wage claim with the Department of Labor here.

"Freelance workers, like all workers, deserve to have basic protections like timely pay and the right to a written contract," said State Rep. Will Guzzardi (D-Chicago). "Many freelancers say they live check to check; these protections ensure there are clear expectations for the workers and hiring entities."

These collection events are co-sponsored by units of local government and provide residents the free opportunity to safely dispose of unused or leftover hazardous products commonly found in homes.

"Illinois EPA is pleased to once again offer one-day Household Hazardous Waste collection events, providing residents with the opportunity to properly dispose of unused and unwanted household chemicals and other hazardous products from their homes," said Interim Director Jennings. "I would also like to extend a special thanks to our local partners for helping to make these events possible.'

One-day collections are open to all Illinois residents and operate from 8:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. on the day of the event. Pre-registration is required for all Fall 2024 collection events. Residents participating are encouraged to bring chemical cleaners, oil-based paints, thinners, antifreeze, motor oil, gasoline, kerosene, weed killers, insecticides, and pesticides, and similar hazardous household products. Fluorescent and other high-intensity discharge lamps may also be brought to the collections. ITEMS NOT ACCEP-TEDinclude latex paint, explosives, propane tanks, fire extinguishers, smoke detectors, agricultural chemicals, and business wastes. For safe transport of HHW, residents are asked to:

 Pack HHW items in a disposable box to avoid spilling during transport.

- Keep like chemicals together and separate unlike chemicals.
- Secure lids and make sure containers are not leaking.
- Place box(es) of HHW in the empty trunk or storage compartment of your vehicle, away from passengers during transport.
- Remain in vehicle at collection site. On-site personnel will remove the HHW from your vehicle.

"Establishing, pubthe month of June, the lishing, and enforcing By requiring that Illinois Department of prevailing wage rates are core functions of the Department," said Illinois Department of Labor Director Jane Flanagan. "Keeping rates up-to-date safeguards local contractors' ability to bid and win publicly funded construction

ects and provides local workers with quality job opportunities."

From now until August 14th, people who disagree with the published rates may object in writing to the Department. Any objection filed will then be granted a hearing before an Administrative Law Judge.

The Committee will continue its work to promote equality and fairness in all aspects of the administration of justice and facilitate a high level of trust and public confidence in the courts, judicial officers, and the entire judicial system. The Committee works to advance the Su-

SPRINGFIELD-Chief preme Court of Illinois' commitment to a judicial system free of bias in which every user and employee of the court feels fairly treated, safe, and respected.

A new charge for the renamed Committee is to "strengthen and advance the ideals of fairness, equity, and diversity in the entire Illinois legal system; identify and work to dismantle inequalities, disparities, and biases in the Illinois legal system; foster and develop a high level of public confidence; and extend respect and dignity to all."

First formed in 2015,

the Committee is chaired by 1st District Appellate Court Justice Michael B. Hyman with Justice P. Scott Neville Jr. serving as the Supreme Court Liaison to the Committee. The appointed members are a diverse mix of judges and attorneys from all around the state. In 2022 the Committee added six subcommittees to help further promote equality and trust in the court system.
