Illinois Housing Development Authority meets with Mendota

☐ What is next in efforts to bring more housing to Mendota?

MENDOTA - From April to July, citizens of Mendota answered a survey - Mendota Community Needs Assessment, which was produced in partnership between the City of Mendota and the Illinois Housing Development Authority (IDHA).

The survey asked residents questions about the current housing opportunities and conditions as well as what they would like the housing situation to be in the city moving forward.

On July 29, Kristopher Walton, a community revitalization planner within IDHA came to the Mendota Civic Center to discuss the results of the 61-question survey, which was answered by 354 Mendota residents, 5.1 percent of the population.

The results were displayed on a handout featuring bar graphs of whether Mendota residents strongly agreed, disagreed, were neutral, disagreed, or strongly disagreed with a topic.

When it came to housing, 50.1 percent of the 354 survey takers disagreed that housing in Mendota was in good condition, 33.1 percent agreed that

housing is available for the elderly, and 50.6 percent disagreed housing in Mendota offers options that suit a variety of lifestyles and needs.

Also, 72.8 percent agreed Mendota has a need for more overall housing opportunities, 74.1 percent agree Mendota is in need of more homeownership opportunities, and 61.9 percent agree Mendota is in need of more rental housing opportunities.

The questions of cost of housing was answered with 50.3 percent of the surveyed disagreeing with the statement "Housing in my community is affordable to households making a variety of incomes," while 28.9 percent agreed housing costs are generally affordable in Mendota and 53.5 percent agree their personal housing costs are affordable.

Walton opened each graph and result information for discussion with the approximately 15 people who were in attendance at the Civic Center. Through the conversation it was determined more

housing in general and more housing for senior citizens is needed in Mendota. Landlords and neighbors taking

Council sets bid openings

MENDOTA - The Mendota City Council is another step closer to beginning its summer street maintenance program after action taken at the Aug. 5 regular council meeting.

During his report, Alderman Jim Fitzpatrick announced that the bid opening for the 2024 motor fuel tax street maintenance program will take place at 10 a.m. Monday, Aug. 19 at the Mendota city building on Washington Street.

At the same time on Aug. 19, bids will be opened for the Raymond Drive concrete replacement project.

In other action from Fitzpatrick's report, the council approved a resolution to appropriate \$160,000 in Rebuild Illinois funds for the Fifth Street and Eighth Avenue bridge repair. Also, the council entered into an engineering services agreement with Chamlin & Associates for the Fifth Street and Eighth Avenue bridge repair.

Finally from Alderman Fitzpatrick, the council approved the hiring of Ivan Pantoja as a full-time employee in the Water Department effective Aug. 12.

In action from Alderman Jay Miller's report, the council approved a liquor license for the Tri-County Fair to hold a beer/wine garden.



scholarship (\$1,000 per year for 10 years) in the works for a Mendota High School student who is going to college for art, and potentially if there isn't an art student interested, a consideration for a student planning to be an educator since Barb was an art teacher at both Holy Cross and Northbrook.


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

Beware of scammers posing as the IRS

WASHINGTON, D.C. -Identity thieves may try to contact taxpayers through fraudulent calls, emails, texts and social media messages pretending to be the IRS. Here's how taxpayers know when it's the IRS that contacts them.

Email, text and social media

The IRS will mail a letter or notice before calling or emailing. The IRS does not:

· Send unexpected or

- unsolicited text messages to taxpayers. · Initiate contact with
- taxpayers by email, text message or through social media.
- Send messages that ask for personal or financial information, especially when it comes to a tax refund.

Common IRS-related online scams include:

- Phishing emailssent to taxpayers.
- Fake IRS social media accounts that contact taxpayers about a fake bill, grant or refund.
- Text messages sent to taxpayers for fake "tax credits" or "stimulus payments."

Scammers' messages often direct taxpayers to click fraudulent links they claim are IRS websites or other online tools.

Phone calls

After mailing a notice or letter to a taxpayer, IRS agents may call to confirm an appointment or discuss items for a scheduled audit. Taxpayers should know that:

- The IRS doesn't leave pre-recorded, urgent or threatening messages. Scammers will tell victims that if they do not call back, a warrant will be issued for their arrest. These calls are scams.
- Private collection agencies that the IRS works with may call taxpayers to collect certain outstanding inactive tax liabilities, but only after sending written notice to the taxpayer and their representative.
- The IRS and its authorized private collection

agencies will never ask a taxpayer to pay using any form of pre-paid card, store or online gift card. Taxpayers can review the IRS payments page at IRS.gov/ payments for all legitimate ways to make a payment.

Letters and notices

A letter or notice is usually the first contact a taxpayer gets from the IRS contacts. If a taxpayer gets a suspicious letter or notice, they can check to see if it's really the IRS

- · Log in to their secure IRS Online Account to find a copy of the notice or letter.
- Contact IRS customer service to verify it, if they weren't able to do so in their Online Account.
- · Review IRS letters and notices at Understanding Your IRS Notice or Letter.
- Confirm that collection notices from a private collection agency have the same Taxpayer Authentication Number as the Notice CP40 the taxpayer received from the IRS.
- Visit Private Debt Collection Frequently Asked Questions to learn more about verifying a private collection agency. Warning signs of a scam

If taxpayers get an un-

expected letter, email or text that claims to be from the IRS or another trusted source – like a bank, a credit company or a tax software provider – here are some tell-tale signs that it's a

- · Spelling errors or incorrect grammar.
- · A link or attachment that with a slightly misspelled URL or an unusual one such as irs.com. All IRS links go to irs.gov.
- · A threatening or urgent request to pay now, to follow a link or to open an attachment.

Taxpayers who receive a request from IRS in the mail or by phone can always contact IRS customer service to authenticate it.



Remembering Polly Butler Hickok – 2004

It so happens that this issue of The Mendota Reporter is appearing on the 200th anniversary of the birth of Polly Butler Hickok, on Aug. 4, 1804. It seems appropriate, on this date, to share the findings of Joseph G. Rosa, of Middlesex, England, as he checked the background of Polly's celebrated son, Wild Bill Hickok. Rosa is the author of several biographies of Wild Bill. Polly was born in North Hero, Vt.

In 1827, she married William Alonzo Hickok, and after several moves, they settled in Homer, Ill., already parents of sons Oliver, Lorenzo and Horace. In Homer, on May 27, 1837, Polly gave birth to another son, James Butler Hickok. Later, there were two daughters, Celinda, born in 1839, and Lydia, born in 1842. (Homer was renamed Troy Grove when it was found there was already a Homer in Illinois.)

William Alonzo Hickok, Polly's husband and father of her children, died in 1852. In 1851, Oliver, the eldest son, had left for California. In 1856, James and Lorenzo went west to Kansas. When they received a letter announcing that Polly was ill, Lorenzo returned home. James, however, remained in Kansas. In 1859, Horace visited his brother and wrote his mother that James was going to Pike's Peak. He had been employed as a teamster by Jones & Cartwright, on their route to Denver City. He was to receive \$30 a month.

Polly promptly replied: "I am sorry to hear that James has gone to Pike's Peak. I do not know what he means by doing so. Has he got anything, or made anything, or is he in debt for his board? If you hear from him, tell us all about it. I was pleased when I heard you had gone to Kansas, instead of the Peak, for I thought it would be better for you and James to be together. But it seems you did not stay together long.

Among a few existing letters from James to Horace, it seems there was a lot of brotherly banter. Horace announced he would like to go hunting with James, only to be told he never got up early enough. In 1861 Polly and the family were

shocked to hear from their cousin, Guy Butler, who lived in Olatha, Kan., that James had died, having contracted "newmonia," and that his employers had owed him money. Horace promptly wrote the company, who advised that James was alive and well when he left their employ, in late April, and had been paid what was due him. For reasons unknown, James

stopped off at a Pony Express relay station, at Rocky Creek, Nebraska Territory. There, on July 12, 1861, a fight over ownership of the station resulted in three men being killed. Controversy still rages over the role James played in the affair. From Rocky Creek, James went to

Leavenworth where he began service to the Union army during the Civil War. That service included stints as teamster, wagon master, government scout and spy. For a brief period, he was a Provost Marshal's detective. Back in Troy Grove, Polly and other

family members hears little from James during the conflict, except for a visit home in 1862. Following the war, Polly spent a lot

of time in the East, visiting relatives.

When Harper's New Monthly Magazine, in February, 1867, published the now legendary article, "Wild Billl," written by Col. Georhe Ward Nichols, Polly and other family members were "bemused.'

One visit home by Wild Bill, in Rosa's words – "Early in 1869, Polly was agog with excitement. James intended to come home for his birthday on May 27. But early in March, he telegraphed from Mendota requesting that she meet him at the depot. She and Celinda did so and James presented Polly with a large framed photograph of himself. During his short stay in Mendota and Troy Grove, James was treated for a lance wound suffered in an Indian uprising, which turned septic. He was summoned to Chicago for a meeting with General Phillip Sheridan, possibly to brief him on what would be wanted of him, should the Plains Indians go on the warpath again. Polly possible last saw James when

he visited prior to his marriage to Agnes Lake Thatcher, on March 5, 1876, in Wyoming Territory. Wild Bill was shot on Aug. 2, 1876, as he sat playing poker in Saloon No. 10, in Deadwood, Dakota Territory. Family members tried to keep the news from reaching Polly until she could be prepared for the shock. But as Rosa relates, the effort was fruitless. Polly was found with a copy of a newspaper announcing his death, in her hands, as she rocked back and forth in her chair, tears streaming down her face, and blood from a lung hemorrhage staining the front of her dress. She dies two years later, in 1878,

still mourning James.

SIDETRACK-A letter written by Polly to a cousin gives a glimpse into her later years. "I don't expect to live very much longer, and still I am healthier than I have been in years. Life is beautiful and I take more interest in what is going on in the world, especially in our beloved land. Hope the time will come when we get cleaned of the corruption, and people will find there is something that gives more satisfaction than the almighty dollar. The dear Saviour has been my stay and prop through all my troubles. O year, I want to tell you, I am a bent over old woman, and I get around lively. I don't take any kind of drug, no tea, no coffee, no meat, except a little chicken meat."

A black taffeta dress belonging to Polly, high style for the mid-19th century, was modeled on several occasions by her granddaughter, Miss Ethel Hickok. It can now be seen at the Hume Carnegie Museum, in the area devoted to Wild Bill Hickok memorabilia.

Sorry, everyone – Oswald still acted alone

All we need to know about the Deep State, we supposedly learned when John F. Kennedy was assassinated in 1963.

In the aftermath of the attempted assassination of Donald Trump, Sean Davis of the conservative website The Federalist wrote on X, "They did it to Kennedy, and his brother, and they just tried to do it to Trump."

In a recent conversation with Donald Trump Jr., Tucker Carlson casually referred to the system having been broken "for at least 61 years since they killed a president in an election year.'

"Exactly," Trump Jr. responded.

In another interview with Carlson, Ron Paul said that there "was a coup" on Nov. 22, 1963.

The JFK conspiracy theories originally emanated from the Left. As the Right has come to hate and distrust the Deep State, though, the theories have seeped over.

That such conspiracy theories have so long endured, and, in fact, found new converts on another part of the political spectrum, is a stunning victory of paranoia over reason and fiction over fact. For all its consequences, the JFK assassination is an uncomplicated murder case.

There were only three shots that day, and they were all fired from the Texas School Book Depository, where Lee Harvey Oswald worked. Almost all the witnesses thought the shots came from the direction of the depository. Multiple witnesses saw a man with a rifle in the sixth-floor window. A couple of Oswald's fellow employees were on the floor beneath him and saw cement loosened by the shots fall from the ceiling.

All of this is why the police had an accurate description of Oswald within minutes and why an officer immediately rushed to the depository and found Oswald right after the assassination; he let him go when Oswald's supervisor said he was employed there. Oswald was a good shot during his stint in the Marine Corps,

and the longest shot, the third, which killed Kennedy, was

only from 88 yards away – considerably closer than Thomas

Crooks was to Trump in Butler, Pennsylvania. Moreover, Kennedy's two entrance wounds were from behind - where Oswald was shooting from.

No one who knew anything about Oswald could be surprised. He was a misfit with a history of violence, including trying to assassinate a right-wing general. Would the CIA have recruited Oswald to do its dirty work? It's a fantastical notion. Not only was Oswald an utterly unreliable character, he was a pro-Castro Marxist.

Besides, why, if the CIA was omnicompetent enough to pull off such an operation, did it not deploy a super-sniper who could get in and out of Dallas quickly? At the very least, it should have secured a getaway plan for Oswald. Instead, it allowed him to careen through the streets of Dallas, a clearly desperate man, and after he was captured, permitted him to be interrogated by the police for days, when he could have unraveled the entire plot.

Ah, you say, but they didn't need to rely on Oswald's discretion because they had a hit on him planned via his shooter, the strip club owner Jack Ruby? This was clearly an impulse killing by another violent misfit, who believed he'd be hailed as a hero for taking out JFK's assassin. With a different happenstance or two, Ruby never would have been in just the right time and place to kill Oswald.

Regardless, no organization that valued loyalty or discipline ever would have trusted Ruby, any more than Oswald, with anything – not the CIA, and not even the Mafia.

It made sense that the anti-American Left gravitated to a conspiratorial view of the JFK assassination. But now some on the Right are so disaffected from contemporary America that they, too, think that our history is a tale of the nightmarish scheming of shadowy forces.

We thought we were citizens of a decent, open society, when the truth, or so they believe, is that we live in the plot of an Oliver Stone movie.

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

OGLESBY – Last fall, Illinois Valley Community College Director of Admissions Tom Quigley treated a Dutch guest to American cuisine and Halloween displays. This spring, it was Quigley's turn to sample Dutch culture.

Quigley rejoined Ryan Smulders in 's-Hertogenbosch, The Netherlands, where Smulders teaches at Koning Willem I College. The pair are part of a professional study abroad program through the Illinois Consortium for International Studies and Programs.

Though not fond of the rainy climate, Quigley enjoyed the food. "I enjoyed trying traditional Dutch foods such as stroopwafels, kibbeling, cheese, and bitterballen. The focus on fresh, local ingredients in many meals was also impressive." He also noted the college provided plenty of tea and coffee, preferred beverages in the country.

The Dutch place a strong emphasis on work-life bal-

MPD offers burglary prevention tips

MENDOTA - The Mendota Police Department encourages its citizens to prevent crime before it happens. Taking a few prevention steps could keep your home from being a target. The golden rule in home security is to ensure that your property does not present an opportunity. Please consider these burglary prevention tips.

• A would-be burglar will look for signs of an alarm or cameras. Let them know they cannot enter your home unnoticed.

• Over one-third of home burglaries are termed by police as "no force" entries. Doors or windows that are left unlocked allow easy access to the home.

 Sliding glass doors are another easy way in. They are usually at the rear and can often be lifted out of their frames.

 An unsecured garage door presents an opportunity for a burglar to enter your property if your garage is attached to the home or to find tools to assist him.

 An unlocked shed or outbuilding likewise presents an easy target. The burglar can use your own tools to enter your home or take valuables such as bikes and lawnmowers.



• A dark property is always attractive. About 90 percent of all intruders choose not to enter a residence that is well lit so keep the main entryways and exterior sections of your home lit, either constantly or using motion sensor lighting.

• Overgrown bushes or trees close to your home allow a burglar to hide and can provide a leverage to higher windows.

• A quick escape is important for a burglar, so high fences or hedges are a real deterrent.

• Burglars prefer to target empty residences. Stop the newspapers when you go on vacation and have a neighbor pick up your mail.

• Install a deadbolt lock. Deadbolts are usually locked with a key from the outside and a thumb turn on the inside. The cylinder should be pick resistant.

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Lock your doors every time you leave. The more popular times for residential burglaries are weekday daylight hours. In over one-third of all burglaries, there is no forcible entry - someone forgot to lock

the door. · Install solid doors. Outside doors should be metal or solid hardwood and at least 1-3/4 inches thick. Frames must be made of equally strong material and each door must fit its frame

· Keep garage doors closed and locked.

securely.

· Secure sliding doors and windows. Cut a broom handle to the length of the bottom track so that the window or door will not slide open when forced. Also, drill one hole through both castings and sliding window and insert a nail or pin.

· Secure sash windows. To prevent wooden sash windows from being pried open, drill a downward sloping hole into the top of the bottom window through and into the bottom of the top window and insert a pin or nail. To prevent aluminum windows from being broken into, purchase a track lock that blocks the window track.



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
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
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

Steve "Mongo" McMichael was on the Super Bowl team in part of his career lasting from 1980-1994 with the Patriots (1980), Bears (1981-1993) and the Green Bay Packers (1994).

I probably began watching sports serious in 1992 or 1993 because of Michael Jordan and it translated to all sports, not just basketball. However, I was too late for McMichael's career.

Another however, I was not too late to see him in the media or to watch him wrestle as part of the 4-Horsemen with Ric Flair, Arn Anderson, Chris Benoit, Dean Malenko, and Curt Henning (guys came and went quickly during this time) on WCW TV in the mid-to-late 1990s.

I hated him.

I didn't want to see him or any of them win.

When I heard he was being enshrined as one of the gridiron immortals, I knew I had to tune in. I also viewed when his HOF bust was unveiled to McMichael. Although laying in a hospital bed with what seems a hundred cords and tubes hooked up to monitors and lifesaving equipment due to his battle with ALS, I shared the same smile the rest of the football world had on their faces.

Fast forward from watching WCW on a 1980s bubble TV in the 90s to working at Steak'n Shake in Carbondale during my junior year at Southern Illinois University.

I couldn't get out of my shift. I contacted all the other white apron wearing financially struggling college students who were trained to make shakes, cook burgers, and/or wash dishes. They all turned me down...because they wanted to

My uniform was put on and my car started, maybe by themselves because I had no interest in getting paid on a day, I wanted to do nothing more than spend money on all the best football food and beverage and hang out with my

Thankfully, the manager was cool on Feb. 4, 2007, he usually wasn't, and he brought in a TV to replace the broken one hanging on the wall in the break room so we could watch the game.

With a fry in my chocolate shake, I stood in the middle of the break room and screamed "Yeahhhhhhhhhhhhhhhhhhhhhhhhhhhhh" at the top of my lungs when Devin Hester began the second of the two Bears' Super Bowl appearances with a 92-yard opening kickoff return touchdown.

As we all know, the Bears lost to the Colts, 29-17, but we all know, remember, and love Hester for what he did during his years with the Bears (2006-13).

Call him a niche player or a specialist as a returner if you choose, but no one did it better and no one installed more fear in special team's units than him...before, during, or after his career.

I don't have any special moments which remind me of Julius Peppers except he was an animal and a player I was glad left the Carolina Panthers to join the Bears.

The Bears don't win a Super Bowl every year or more than one in almost 40 years, but the fans are loyal because of talent like Mongo, Hester, and Peppers.

Don't booze and boat: The risks of drinking while boating

SPRINGFIELD-Gordon Lightfoot's song The Wreck of the Edmund Fitzgerald depicts the Midwest's waterways simultaneously as a robust economic and recreational force and a terrifying force of nature. As beautiful as the rivers and lakes of Illinois are, any body of water can become dangerous and deadly when mixing boating and alcohol. Alcohol drastically increases the risks and dangers of boating in Illinois waterways. The Illinois Liquor Control Commission (ILCC) urges boat operators and passengers to be responsible, practice moderation, and understand the threats of drinking and boating.

"Like drinking and driving, Boating Under the Influence (BUI) of alcohol can impair operator and passenger safety. Alcohol can damage operator judgment, reflexes, depth perception, and coordination abilities. No matter how confident a boat operator is while under the influence,

the danger of boating," said Illinois Liquor Control Commission Executive Director Lisa Gardner.

The Illinois Department of Natural Resources (IDNR) reported 70 boating accidents and 72 people arrested for BUI in Illinois in 2023. Tragically, IDNR registered two fatalities in BUI incidents in 2023. Due to the deaths and injuries caused by BUIs, boaters must educate themselves on safety on the water. Should an individual wish to appreciate Illinois' rivers and lakes while enjoying alcohol, the ILCC recommends designating a sober operator before a boating trip or taking advantage of the many commercial boats and watercraft with professional operators in waterways across the State.

Recreational sports that make for a great workout

Billions of people across the globe share a passion for sports. Whether it's youngsters playing on sandlots, adolescents competing in scholastic sports or even professional athletes locking horns at the highest level, there's no denying that sports appeals to people of all ages.

The thrill of competition undoubtedly compels many athletes to engage in sports, but playing a sport also makes for great exercise. That's even the case for various recreational sports, which many athletes look to after their more formal playing days have ended. In fact, the following recreational sports are not only fun, but also make for a great workout.

Pickleball

Perhaps no recreational sport has enjoyed a surge popularity as significant as pickleball in recent years. The 2023 Topline Participation Report from the Sports & Fitness Industry Association indicates participation in pickleball grew by 159 percent between 2019 and 2022. Pickleball is something of

a hybrid sport that combines elements of tennis and ping-pong to form a fun activity that's also great exercise. An ongoing examination of pickleball by Apple has found that participation in the sports helps players reach moderate to vigorous heart rate zones, which cardiologists note can improve cardiac fitness. In addition, a 2023 study published in the journal Frontiers in Psychology found that pickleball players enjoyed significant improvements in happiness, life satisfaction and personal well-being after taking up the sport.

Basketball

Basketball is among the more accessible recreational sports, as it's not uncommon for players to find a pickup game at their local park on a nice spring or summer afternoon or evening. Basketball combines various components of a great workout, including cardiovascular exercise, coordination and balance and weight-bearing activity. A 2018 study published in the Journal of

Sport and Health Science found that both half-court and full-court basketball helped to increase lean body mass, bone mineral density and oxygen uptake, each of which helps to make recreational basketball a great way for players to improve their overall health.

Golf

The serene setting of a typical golf course can make it easy to see the sport as fun but not necessarily a great workout. But that's a misconception, as a round of 18 can make for great exercise. A 2016 study published in the British Journal of Sports Medicine noted that golf can be a useful ally in the prevention and treatment of chronic diseases such as heart attack, stroke, certain cancers, and diabetes, among other conditions. Walking the course, as opposed to renting a cart during a round, makes for excellent cardiovascular exercise as well.

Athletes may embrace recreational sports for fun, but these physical activities also can make for a great workout.

Q: Do you know if they are going to make a second season of the new "Justified"

A: It's been more than a year since "Justified: City Primeval' premiered



on FX. The reboot of the widely acclaimed original series "Justified" marked the return of Timothy Olyphant as Deputy U.S. Marshal Raylan Givens, but it wasn't set in the hills of Kentucky anymore. Instead, his character was seen in Miami. contemplating retirement before he was summoned to Detroit for a new case.

Walton Goggins, who played Raylan's longtime foe Boyd Crowder, told TV Insider that "everyone wants to do another lap of 'Justified.'" But he said, "It's just a matter of timing and whether or not FX wants to pick it up." The show also streams on Hulu, so if FX is foolish enough not to greenlight another season, perhaps Hulu or another streaming service will.

Honestly, the biggest obstacle right now seems to be scheduling. Goggins is currently juggling several

shows: HBO's "The Righteous Gemstones," Amazon Prime Video's "Fallout," and the upcoming new season of

"The White Lotus" (also on HBO). Meanwhile, Olyphant will star opposite Tom Hardy in the film "Havoc." He also has another FX project on the horizon, a prequel series based on the "Alien" movies, titled "Alien: Earth." Perhaps after some much needed rest for the stars, "Justified" will find its way into production again.

Q: With movies being so expensive these days, I missed "The Fall Guy" in theaters. Will it be available to stream anywhere soon? -- *M.M*.

A: Yes, romantic comedies are in big demand from the public, but due to inflation, moviegoing seems to be on the decline, except for big-budget action flicks like "Twisters" or anything in the Marvel or DC Universes. "The Fall Guy" cost \$140 million to make, but only grossed \$28 million its opening weekend, a shocking disappointment with stars like Ryan Gosling and Emily Blunt as leads. The rom-com adventure film had all the recipes for a hit, but it just didn't produce.

The film was available to

rent or purchase as early as May 21, and it came out on DVD a month later. Beginning Friday, Aug. 30, you can watch the movie on the Peacock streaming service, which costs \$7.99 a month with ads or \$13.99 a month ad-free.

Q: Who is the actor who plays Luke on "Criminal Minds: Evolution"? He looks so familiar, but I don't think I've seen him in anything else before. -- C.I.

A: Actor Adam Rodriguez was cast as Agent Luke Alvez on "Criminal Minds" during its 12th season on CBS. Now in its 17th season and titled "Criminal Minds: Evolution" on Paramount+, the actor might look familiar to you if you watched another CBS crime series "CSI: Miami." Rodriguez played Detective Eric Delko during the show's entirety from 2002-2012.

Other series you might have seen him in are "Jane the Virgin," "Penny Dreadful: City of Angels," and "Ordinary Joe." He also appeared in the film "Magic Mike's Last Dance.'

The dangers of doubt

God loves boldness and He wants us to be confident of His love for us. He wants us to know without a doubt that we are made right with Him through the sacrifice Jesus made for us on the cross—especially on those days when we feel unworthy of His love.

To live boldly means that we're willing to step out in faith to try new things and pursue our God-given dreams and passions without letting the fear of doubt overshadow our faith.

Doubt is a fear that can bring a lot of confusion: Did I make the right decision? I don't know. Maybe I did. Well, maybe I didn't. We can go back and forth like that in our heads forever. But I've found that when I'm confused, it's better to stop, turn off my brain, and just look at what's in my heart—not for what I think I should do, but what I believe I should do.

Sometimes it becomes very clear what God wants us to do; other times it's less obvious. But before you jump ahead, give God a chance to speak to your


James 1:5-6 (AMP) says, "If any of you lacks wisdom [to guide him through a decision or circumstance], he is to ask of [our benevolent] God, who gives to everyone generously and without rebuke or blame, and it will be given to him. But he must ask [for wisdom] in faith, without doubting [God's willingness to help], for the one who doubts is like a billowing surge of the sea that is blown about and tossed by the wind."

I hope that you noticed it says, "If any of you" need wisdom. God isn't looking for perfect people; they don't exist. So, no matter where you are, God wants to help you! Isn't that good news?

God will never leave you or forsake you, and He will always remain faithful to His Word. All you have to do is ask and receive, dismissing the doubts that set themselves up against His Word. If you can do that, there's no telling what God will make happen in your life!

Romans 4 gives a wonderful account of the story of Abraham, one of the great heroes of faith. Verses 18-19 say, "In hope against hope Abraham believed that he would become a father of many nations, as he had been promised [by God]: 'So [numberless] shall your descendants be.' Without becoming weak in faith he considered his own body, now as good as dead [for producing children] since he was about a hundred years old, and [he considered] the deadness of Sarah's womb" (AMP).

Abraham considered the facts. But he still be-



lieved God was greater. Verse 20 says, "But he did not doubt or waver in unbelief concerning the promise of God, but he grew strong and empowered by faith, giving glory to God" (AMP).

Instead of relying only on what we see around us, you and I can choose to believe God's Word. And we can open our mouths to speak words of thanks, like this:

"God, I remember the good things You've done for me and how You've been faithful to those who've trusted in You through the ages. I'm giving You praise today because I know You'll always be faithful."

Like Abraham, we all have times of waiting that God uses to test and stretch our faith. But He promises to work all things out for the good of those who love Him and are called according to His purpose (Romans 8:28).

Honestly, if we can keep a good attitude throughout the process, our wait time might be shorter than it would be if we decided we'd rather murmur and complain.

God wants to use the challenges we experience to draw us closer to Him so that when our prayer is finally answered, and our day of breakthrough comes, we'll be stronger in our faith and able to withstand any opposition that comes against us.

Hebrews 10:36 (AMP) says, "For you have need of patient endurance [to bear up under difficult circumstances without compromising], so that when you have carried out the will of God, you may receive and enjoy to the full what is promised."

It takes boldness to believe God's promises are for you and not just for everyone else. It takes boldness to cling to His promises when the world around you says, It will never happen! And it takes boldness to step out in faith and try something new. But be encouraged. God isn't concerned about you making mistakes. He knows you're not perfect and He wants to give you His wisdom and strength to do everything He's put in your heart.

So, stop doubting and step out in faith...and thing amazing in you and through you. He wants to see boldness in you!



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

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
