New Mt. Morris Firehouse to break ground in spring 2025 Funding issue causes delay, construction documents being finalized

MT. MORRIS — The new Mt. Morris Firehouse is now scheduled to begin construction in spring 2025, a Mt. Morris Fire

Protection District press

release on Aug. 1 said.

Originally the project timeline had the district breaking ground for the new facility in the spring of 2024. The project is being sourced with federal, state and local funds. A "significant" source of funding is a \$1 million dollar Congres-

sionally Directed

Spending Grant that the district was awarded in 2022. The district was told it would see its first grant payment in summer of 2023, and that did not occur. Through engagement with the district and its federal legislators, the district was able to secure its first payment in June 2024.

"Now that the federal obligation is in place, the

district is moving forward full steam," the press release said. "The district has recently contracted architectural and engineer services for the final stages of the planning. Final construction documents will be done in late fall 2024. The project will then be placed out for bid. The district is confident with the hurdles now removed that construction will begin in the spring of 2025."

On Aug. 15 of last year, the district completed the purchase of land for the new firehouse site. The land is comprised of four parcels located in the 10 block of South McKendrie Avenue. The site included to the north, the two previous hardware store buildings and the house on the corner of Main & McKendrie. To the south, it included the house on the corner of Front Street & McKendrie Avenue and the house immediately to the west. Those structures were demolished for the project.

The site was chosen due

to proximity to the district's service area and access to utilities such as water, sanitary sewer, storm sewer and fiber optic lines.

After the new facility is in operation, the district's century-old firehouse will be put up for sale. The project has seen community support and donations in recent years.

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RCH Convenient Care adds new nurse practitioner Outpatient Services Manager: 'Our need for convenient care has grown exponentially'

ROCHELLE — Rochelle Community Hospital recently added a new full-time nurse practitioner, Chenin Congrave Rude, to its Convenient Care department, which treats patients of all ages for minor illnesses and injuries with no appointment necessary.

Congrave Rude has been an NP for several years and will offer care along with other part-time NPs and RCH Convenient Care staff. The department is open Monday-Friday 11-7 p.m. and Saturdays 9-5 p.m. and closed Sundays and holidays.

"When she came to us we were very excited to have her," RCH Manager of Outpatient Services Tracey Busby said. "She fit right in with our organization and works really well with the team. She's been really well-received by patients. We had a need here in convenient care that she filled. We're always welcoming nurse practitioners but we wanted to try having one full-time NP so

the community would have a familiar face when they came in. Chenin is here four days a week and that adds comfort to the community and people can come in and see the same person."

RCH has run into some issues in the past with hours Convenient Care was able to be open due to staffing, but is now in "a good place", Busby said, and conversations have been had about expanding hours during busier times like flu season.

The need for RCH's Convenient Care department has grown "exponentially" recently, Busby said, due to the community coming out of the pandemic, primary care physicians having less availability, and people not having primary care physicians.

RCH's Emergency Department has seen increased need as well, and Convenient Care has helped to ease that burden on the ED with being able to see patients that don't need the higher level of

family healthcare because they have a lot of patients that need to be seen by their primary care physicians and if they can't and it's just an illness-type thing, as well as taking the burden off the ED with easier

patients that just want to be seen."

RCH Convenient Care sees a "pretty large" contingency of people that don't have a primary care doctor due to factors like insurance limitations,

along with the City of Rochelle being a hub for truck drivers and contract construction workers that are too far away from their

More about science, democracy and Donald Trump

OTH sides in this presidential election proclaim that it's a battle for the survival of democracy. In that case, we need to be clear about what American democracy is. It's not just that the people vote. There are also safeguards against the abuse of power by the government, or by the people themselves.

But, beneath all that, our democracy is built on an understanding of what truth is, and how we go about knowing

The founders of our nation were products of the Scientific Revolution that had taken place a couple of centuries earlier. The governmental system they created is grounded on science's insistence on reasoning based on facts instead of beliefs and assumptions. Truth disappears, and democracy dies, when facts are denied or ignored. I said in last month's

column that Donald Trump operates under a more ancient mindset, a prescientific one that's deeply embedded in human psychology. It judges ideas by how well they line up with existing beliefs and feelings instead of facts. Politicians who operate from this worldview can use tactics that are unavailable to other leaders.

The most important is a heavy emphasis on emotional appeals - positive sentiments like tradition and patriotism, but also fears and prejudices — at the expense of reason. These are the leaders who single out groups - elites, immigrants, and others — for the people to fear, resent, and blame for their troubles. They rely on ridicule, personal attacks, and fabrications to make up for the lack of factual support for their

accusations.

Keeping fear

and resentment at a fevered pitch enables them to present themselves as saviors, and to inspire intense devotion among their followers. Lovalty to them overrides all other obligations, sometimes even those to democracy itself. They may encourage, either subtly or openly, intimidation and even violence against those who disagree.

You may find that Donald Trump fits this description to one degree or another. Keep in mind, in that case, that he's far from the only one who does. Politicians like this exist everywhere, and have inhabited democracies ever since the beginning. Huey Long was one of the most successful.

His fiery speeches against wealthy and powerful elites, abusive language toward his enemies, and just-folks manner fueled his rise to power as governor of Louisiana from 1929 to 1933. The passionate loyalty he inspired

allowed him to create, in the words of the Encyclopedia Brittanica, an "unprecedented executive dictatorship that he perpetrated to ensure control of his home state.. "Surrounding

himself with gangster-like bodyguards, he dictated outright to members of the legislature, using intimidation if necessary.

office to serve in the U.S. Senate (1932), he fired the legally-

When he was

about to leave

elected lieutenant governor and replaced him with two designated successors who would obey him from Washington. In order to fend off local challenges to his control in 1934, he effected radical changes in the Louisiana government, abolishing local government and taking personal control of all educational, police, and fire job appointments throughout the state. He achieved absolute control of the state militia, judiciary, and election and tax-assessing apparatus, while denying citizens any legal or electoral redress."

Huey Long's career was cut short when he was assassinated in 1935 while campaigning to become president of the United States. There's no way to know how far he might have gone otherwise. His dictatorial control over his home state illustrates what can happen

to a nation influenced by a prescientific worldview that denies the importance of facts.

Politicians like Huey Long and Donald Trump are on the march across the world. Victor Orban in Hungary, Narendra Modi in India, and other would-be dictators are harnessing primal emotions in the pursuit of power. They're capitalizing on democracy's greatest weakness, its vulnerability to emotional appeals that overwhelm facts and reason.

Democrats insist that a victory for Donald Trump in this election will mean the end of democracy in America. It's true that our democratic institutions have been weakening for some time now, but their roots run deep. We can hope for a different future, regardless of who wins.

His reelection would. nevertheless, be a victory for a worldview that's incompatible with the science-inspired and fact-based democracy that the founders envisioned. In that sense, the Democrats are right. This election is indeed — and more than anything else about the survival of democracy.

T'S hard to believe that summer is racing to a close as we turn the calendar on July. Kids only have a about three weeks until school starts and the carefree summer days end.

Growing up it never really bothered me that summer was ending and school would soon start. It meant I got to see classmates I hadn't seen in two months and it meant that I moved on and up to hopefully better

The farm kid in me was happy. It meant that the growing season was coming to a close, harvest season would be just around the corner, followed by those delightful fall days and evenings.

And this end of August meant that the State Fair was less than two weeks away. I suppose I got more excited about the fair than some kids, but living only a mile away from the fairgrounds make it a convenient nuisance.

The US Army Golden Knights put on an evening sky diving show and to close the fair each evening there were fireworks. Both could be enjoyed from the patio at the back of our house. Who doesn't like free fireworks?

So let's roll into August; there's still some fun to be had.

Lately I've been getting calls from farmers around the area concerning drones. Not sure if they are being flown for fun or some other activity. But in the interest of trying to be informative here's the rule on private use of drones.

A drone flown by a private individual must be operated in accordance with Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) regulations.

Below is a summary of the regulations and suggestions on what to do if a private individual is operating a drone and collecting video over or near your property.

Drones can be flown by private operators at or below 400 feet above the ground in Class G airspace. Farmland qualifies as Class G airspace. An operator of a drone must fly the drone

within his/her visual line of sight (VLOS) or

within the VLOS of a visual observer who is

next to the operator. Drones cannot be flown directly over any person who is not affiliated with the operator of the drone.

Drones cannot be operated in a careless or reckless manner.

If an operator intentionally violates drone safety requirements or operates the drone in a careless or reckless manner, they could be liable for criminal and/or civil penalties.

What to do if a drone is flying over your

Do not shoot down the drone. Shooting down a drone is a federal crime.

The drone may be filming you. Remain calm and do not become combative as you are likely on video.

You should film the drone and its operator, especially if the drone is flying close to livestock, over anyone on your property, or close to buildings or your home.

You should advise the operator that they do not have permission to fly over and film your

If the operator is located on your property, advise them that they are trespassing and ask them to leave. You should always know the boundaries of your property. If the operator is located on the side of the road and outside of the road right-ofway (ROW), then that is your property.

You should contact local law enforcement if the operator does not leave your property.

Also contact your local County Farm Bureau and let them know about the situation. The drone operator may be liable for trespassing, nuisance, invasion of privacy, stalking, and other violations. Your County Farm Bureau can refer you to an attorney.

"It's not primary care, but it is care for people that just need to be seen or tested for illnesses or need X-rays for injuries. We're a minor illness and injury unit."

The News-Leader met with Congrave Rude and members of the Convenient Care staff on July 30 including Medical Assistant Laura Delarosa, Receptionist Paulette Jurina and LPN Jim Miller and talked about what it's like to service the community.

Jurina said she's been thankful for RCH's new Convenient Care patient signup system where patients choose a timeframe to come in. That has helped to keep patients in order and feeling like their needs are being met. The new system has been received well by patients, Jurina said.

"And our patients en-

joy having this service here in town," Jurina said. "They like that they don't have to drive to Dixon, Sycamore or Rockford. We hear that a lot."

Congrave Rude said the Convenient Care department is in "a good place" to meet the community's needs. It offers all-at-once testing for COVID-19, flu and RSV which sets it apart from a standalone urgent care, she said. Patients only need to have their nose swabbed once and they can find out results right

Busby praised the Convenient Care staff for its work outside of seeing patients including cleaning rooms, stocking, transporting patients, ordering medication, making phone calls and referrals, and charting.

Miller described the Convenient Care service that works to fill in the

Illinois State Police continues efforts to reduce gun violence

SPRINGFIELD – To help ensure those who are prohibited by law from having a firearm, and who pose a threat, do not have guns in their possession, the Illinois State Police (ISP) conducted numerous firearm enforcement details in counties across the state from June 24 through July 19. The enforcement details focused on individuals who have become the subject of a Firearms Restraining Order or Clear and Present Danger, or received a criminal convic-

tion, among other reasons. "Firearms Restraining Orders and Clear and Present Danger reporting are two highly effective tools for getting firearms out of the hands of someone who poses a significant threat to themselves or others," said Brendan F. Kelly. "As the use of these tools increases, so does the need for law enforcement to be able to safely conduct these arduous, intensive enforcement details."

From July 2023 through June 2024, ISP received approximately 11,300 Clear and Present Danger reports, of which more than 10,800 were affirmed. While not all of those 10,800 individuals are out

of compliance with state law, law enforcement is able to take action on those who are to bring them into compliance, thereby making communities safer.

During the recent ISP focused enforcement details, ISP officers completed 192 details and brought 673 people into compliance with state law. As a result of these efforts, 318 individuals transferred firearms out of their possession. ISP has been conducting firearm enforcement details since May 2019. From that time through July 2024, ISP has conducted 2,303 details

and placed 5,549 individuals into compliance with the law.

In addition to its own efforts, ISP provides grants to local law enforcement agencies to help protect the public by transferring firearms out of the possession of a person legally prohibited from having a firearm and who is a danger to themselves or others.

In Fiscal Year 2024, ISP awarded almost \$1 million in firearm enforcement grants to 16 law enforcement agencies across the state. During that time, local law enforcement

agencies completed 7,048 compliance checks and brought 2,101 people into compliance with state law by transferring all firearms out of their possession and documenting that transfer with a Firearm Disposition Record. ISP awarded another \$1.5 million in grants to 21 law enforcement agencies in Fiscal Year 2025.

Law enforcement agencies that are members of the Violent Crime Intelligence Task Force are eligible to receive grants from the State Police Enforcement Fund. Funding helps agencies conduct

firearms enforcement details and ensure firearms are turned over to a person who is legally allowed to possess firearms, or to law enforcement.

Funding for the enforcement grants comes from the State Police Enforcement Fund and were made possible through Public Act 102-0237.

Along with enforcement details, between 2020 and the end of June 2024, ISP stopped more than 139,000 unlawful attempts to obtain a firearm through firearm eligibility checks.



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
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

Ogle County 2024 4-H Fair announces General Project winners

Ogle County 4-H Fair was held July 31-Aug. 4 at the Ogle County Fairgrounds in Oregon, where 446 4-H project exhibits were judged on and showcased by Ogle County's 2844-H members in 13 clubs.

4-H fairs are held nationally to allow youth to exhibit a product that has resulted from an in-depth yearlong study in an area of interest to them. As part of the exhibition, non-animal exhibitors meet oneon-one with project judges to receive feedback about their displays and gather ideas for future project expansion.

At the Ogle County 4-H Fair, competition exists at two levels. 4-H'ers first compete against themselves for exhibit ratings. Every exhibit—animal or non-animal — is assigned a rating of blue, red, or white. Blue ratings are awarded to youth with entries that meet class guidelines and represent high-quality work. White ratings are assigned when entries do not meet class guidelines or exhibits are low quality. Red ribbons are assigned for exhibits falling somewhere in between.

Once ratings have been assigned, all of the blue rating award winners compete against one another for the chance to become class champions or overall division winners. Some blue-awarded non-animal exhibits are also selected each year to represent Ogle County 4-H at the Illinois State Fair.
