Saint Patrick Catholic Church enjoys new roof, upcoming "Save the Steeple" projects set for Fall, after Christmas

AMBOY – If you've driven past Saint Patrick Catholic Church at 32 North Jones Avenue in Amboy, you've seen the new roof.

After two years of fundraising, "Save the Steeple", St. Pats has a new top all members of the parish are proud and happy with.

They are letting the new roof sink in for a little while as fundraising is currently on pause. It will start back up in the fall or after Christmas because repairing the church is not finished.

"We're excited that the roof is done. It looks great," said Carol Prunty, the parish bookkeeper. "But we're not done by any means in terms of church repairs. The first part of the roof project was \$319,000 and the second part was \$119,000. We were able to raise it with the help of so many generous donations from the community and others.

"Now we need to tuck point the actual steeple which will probably be another \$100,000. Then the windows need some work, but we haven't priced it yet."

The tuck-pointing project is the

next step as the steeple is crumbling in certain areas.

"What we have left to do is tuck pointing for the church's bricks. Some of the bricks are original when the church was built approximately 170 years ago," said Beverly Halsey, the St. Pat's pastoral associate. "They need to be reinforced. You can see little pieces of the bricks break and fall down all the time.

"We're taking a little breather from fundraising to give people a little bit of a break since we've been doing it for a little over two years now. Everything gets redundant and we don't want to do the same things over and over." What Halsey, Prunty, all everyone

else involved is excited about with the completed roof project is the access to the complete parking lot. The roof project blocked off the

main portion of the parking lot for three weeks as the two-part project was being completed.

"We're glad to have our parking lots back, especially for the people who are older and have to use the side doors and park close," Halsey said. "That was a huge inconvenience, but they all kept coming to church.'

Village of Sublette addresses busy August agenda

SUBLETTE – Per usual, the Village of Sublette Board had a lengthy agenda and many topics to talk about at its monthly meeting on Monday, Aug. 12 at the Ellice Dinges Center.

The Mendota Sweet Corn Festival Parade on Sunday, Aug. 11 gave the Sublette Village float the Friendship Award. Ethan Orzech will be taking the float to Amboy's Depot Days this weekend.

Village Economic Development Coordinator Don Dinges let the board know the Sublette Farmer's Market has done well in the last two weeks with more vendors bringing more vegetables. Instead of 3-6 p.m., the vendors have asked to stay open 3-7 p.m. to increase sales

and exposure. Dinges also spoke about possible grants. One grant idea is to pave the bike path and another grant proposal is for a new business program, which would help build a building for a new, ensuing business. Both are in the blueprint process to see what information would be needed and if they are feasible.

Fliers for the Sublette Country Car Show (10 a.m.- 3 p.m. Saturday, Sept. 14) have been distributed and there is a lot of interest and enthusiasm. Also, Hops & Harmony, Pullin' in the Park and the celebration of Sublette's 170th Anniversary September 7-8 are catching steam. In his president's report,

Sublette Village Board President John Stenzel said the well at the Sublette Elevator was pulled out and would have to be sealed. Sublette's attorney

Dana Considine was in attendance and spoke on ordinance violations. The Bonnell residence has been issued a warrant for failure to appear in court and ordinances have not been paid, the Vasquez residence has

been ordered to pay \$350 a month for ordinances, and the Truckenbrod residence made a payment toward violations and the village has agreed to not file a lien against the property.

Two properties in Sublette borders will receive letters from Considine's office with a summons of fines of \$500 a day for junk cars loitering front and back yards. The letters will include a 10-day notice before the ordinance violations will mandate. The definition of junk cars is those that are not licensed and not operable. Stenzel said he has sent

both properties letters about cleaning up the junk cars and they have either been ignored or haven't responded. Both of the LED speed

limit signs the village were able to purchase thanks to federal grant money have been installed. The village

agreed to buy speed limit

signs, \$35 each, to put

closer to the LED signs

to help drivers realize the speed zone. There are signs currently, but they're a distance from the LEDs and can't be moved because they are owned by Lee County.

Stenzel said there has been good feedback on the LED signs from the community. There was a special

committee meeting held on Wednesday, Aug. 7 and included discussion of making changes to the maintenance contract which is up for renewal. The current three-year

contract with Rick's Lawn & Property Maintenance has cost Sublette \$45,000 a year with a \$100 lease for equipment. At the committee meet-

ing, the changes the village wants to make include adding removal of garbage cans at Centennial Park twice a week, mowing the walking path, recording how many times they mow

and shovel, washing trucks


and tractors, requiring a



copy of driver's license for all village equipment operators, and no storing of equipment inside or outside of village property. Sublette is accepting

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



Babies aren't waterproof; Illinois DCFS reminds parents, caregivers to supervise children in water

CHICAGO – WHAT: According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), drowning is the leading cause of death for children ages 1 to 4 and the second leading cause of unintentional injury death for children ages 5 to 14. In 2023, 20 Illinois children lost their lives to accidental drowning: eight in pools, four in bathtubs, four in lakes, two in ponds, one in a washing machine and one at a water park. Thirteen of the children were age 5 and younger; including six of the children who drowned in pools. For every child who dies from drowning, another seven receive emergency department care for non-fatal submersion injuries.

WHY: During the summer when pools are open and lakes, ponds and other bodies of water are more accessible, there is an increase in water related deaths especially with children. The Illinois Department of Children and Family Services (DCFS) reminds parents and caregivers to constantly supervise children whenever they are near water, no matter their age or how well they can swim.

"It is easy to be lulled into a false sense of security when using devices such as floaties or baby bathtubs," said Illinois DCFS Director Heidi E. Mueller. "Children should never be left unattended. Whether at home or at events, family gatherings or vacations, it's very important to remember that children are naturally drawn to water – it's fun and entertains many senses.

Keep your children safe by always keeping them in sight near water. Get waterwise...SUPERVISE!"

Follow these safety tips to help protect children and prevent water-related tragedy:

Bathrooms

- Never leave a young child alone in a bathtub or rely on a bathtub seat for safety.
- Secure the toilet lid. Curious toddlers could tip headfirst into a toilet, risking drowning.

Buckets

- Five-gallon buckets commonly used for household home-improvement projects pose a threat to babies and toddlers who may topple into them and be unable
- Empty and store all buckets out of children's reach when not in use.

Portable or inflatable pools

- Don't be lulled into a false sense of security because of the shallowness of baby pools.
- Empty the pool immediately after use and store it upside-down.

Swimming pools and hot tubs

- Keep ladders, patio furniture and toys away from above-ground pools. • Install a four-sided fence with a self-closing,
- self-latching gate around all pools and spas. · Keep the pool and deck clear of floats, balls and
- toys after you leave the pool. Young children can wear personal flotation devic-
- es, but do not be lured into thinking these are able to prevent drownings. Keep hot tubs securely covered when not in use.
- Children should not be left in a hot tub alone. · Appoint an adult who can swim to always watch
- children when they are in the pool. Learn CPR and keep rescue equipment, a phone and emergency numbers by the pool. The American Red

Cross offers online CPR training classes anyone can

take at their own pace from the convenience of home. Ponds, fountains and retention ponds

 Be aware of access to water hazards in your yard and neighborhood. If a child goes missing, check these areas first.

Don't booze and boat: The risks of drinking and steering while boating

SPRINGFIELD – Gordon Lightfoot's song The Wreck of the Edmund Fitzgerald depicts the Midwests waterwayssimultaneouslyas a robust economic and recreational force and a terrifying force of nature. As beautiful as the rivers and lakes of Illinois are, any body of water can become dangerous and deadly when mixing boating and alcohol. Alcohol drastically increases the risks and dangers of boating in Illinois waterways. The Illinois Liquor Control Commission (ILCC) urges boat operators and passengers to be responsible, practice moderation, and understand the threats of drinking and boating.

"Like drinking and driving, Boating Under the Influence(BUI)ofalcoholcanimpair operator and passenger safety. Alcohol can damage operator judgment, reflexes, depth perception, and coordination abilities. No matter how confident a boat operator is while under the influence, the consequences of alcohol

on an individual's mental and physical well-being increase the danger of boating," said Illinois Liquor Control Commission Executive Director Lisa Gardner. The Illinois Department

of Natural Resources (IDNR) reported 70 boating accidents and 72 people arrested for BUI in Illinois in 2023. Tragically, IDNR registered two fatalities in BUI incidents in 2023. Due to the deaths and injuries caused by BUIs, boaters must educate themselves on safety. 

Chicago sports fans still scratching their heads

It has been a rough couple of years for Chicago

Since the Chicago Sky won the WNBA Championship in 2021, it has been doom and gloom for

Chicago franchises.

The Sky are currently eighth in the league and fourth in the Western Conference with a dismal 11-16 mark.

The White Sox are the worst team in baseball with a 30-95 record (as of 2:38 p.m. Aug. 19, they do play at 8:45 p.m. against the San Francisco Giants, which should be No. 96). The Chicago Cubs started the season off hot but are 61-64 (as of the same time and date, with no game tonight) and trail both the Milwaukee Brewers and the St. Louis Cardinals in the National League, with the Cincinnati Reds a half-game behind the Cubs with a 60-64 record. Cubs are going nowhere unless they win out. Ha Ha.

Between injuries (seems like everyone), bad deals for older players toward the end of their career (we could start with Dwyane Wade and move forward), and bad draft picks (Patrick Williams, and more), the Chicago Bulls can't make it past the playoff play-in tournament. This next season may be a total collapse as DeMar DeRozan and Alex Caruso are playing for different teams, while Zach LaVine and Lonzo Ball (I'm not holding my breath) are supposed to return from injury.

defensive players come and go, while the

offense was led by quarterbacks such as Mitch Trubisky (a second overall pick in 2017) and Justin Fields (an 11th overall pick in 2021)

would be outplayed by Keanu Reeves character Shane Falco in The Replacements.

Actually, can the Bears sign him?

The Chicago Fire won the MLS Championship in 1998, which was their first year in the league as an expansion franchise. And haven't won again.

In other words, there are a lot of reasons for Chicago sports fans, like myself to scratch our heads or rip our hair out (you get the joke).

But we hold on. We have faith.

Because it always seems like one or a few of the franchises are right on the cusp of turning things around.

The Bulls are trading older players and adding

younger, closer to their prime players via trade and free agent signings such as Josh Giddey and Jalen Smith, while drafting a 6-foot-9 Lithuanian in Matas Buzelis. Foreign exports are how the league is going as of late and was a good move for the Bulls.

The Bears used their No. 1 draft pick they received in a great trade with the Carolina Panthers before last season where they also acquired D.J. Moore (an awesome, talented wide receiver) and selected Caleb Williams.

Williams, a QB from USC, has wowed every Bears

fan in the preseason and has everyone excited that the

offensive unit may actually score some points and give the Bears a chance to win more than seven games for the first time since 2020 when they lost in a Wild Card game against the New Orleans Saints. The Blackhawks have had No. 1 and No. 2 draft picks in each of the last two seasons adding a scoring

center in Connor Bedard and a big, bully defender in

Artyom Levshunov. There were also two more first round picks in 2024. So, although the head scratching never seems to stop, there is always a reason to only use one or two fingers

instead of the entire hand. Or both hands. The life of a Chicago sports fan is never easy.

IHSA Board announces changes to 2024 state golf dates; provides clarity on All-Star Game by-law

BLOOMINGTON – The Illinois High School Association (IHSA) Board of Directors met virtually on Aug. 9, where the Board took action on three items.

• The Board approved a recommendation to update the Definition of an "All-Star Team" in the IHSA Handbook and also provided a new Illustration for the IHSA's All-Star Participation by-law (3.120). IHSA member schools voted (547 schools in favor, 136 schools opposed and 43 schools with no opinion) last December for changes to 3.120 that went into effect on July 1, 2024.

Definition: All-Star Team – A team of students who are selected to participate in a non-school contest or tournament based on athletic ability, performance or reputation when representing the member high school the student attends or previously attended. Students represent their school by using the school's name, being selected or nominated by the school, or by wearing any part of the school's athletic uniform.

Illustration: By-law 3.120 applies during the school year (from Monday of Week 8 through Saturday of Week 49 of the IHSA standardized calendar).

• The Board approved a recommendation to change the dates of the 2024 IHSA Boys Golf State Finals and 2024 IHSA Girls Golf State Finals to Friday and Saturday, Oct. 18-19, one week later than the original dates.

'Changing the 2024 IHSA Boys & Girls Golf State

Final dates to Oct. 18-19 will allow us to provide the most inclusive State Series tournament possible, as the original state tourney dates (October 12-13) coincided with Yom Kippur," said IHSA Executive Director Craig Anderson. "We recognize that these changes were not easy to facilitate from a staffing and planning perspective for our state final courses and communities, so we greatly appreciate their partnership in helping provide the best experience possible for high school golfers in the state."

• The Board approved the terms & conditions for girls' flag football. The inaugural IHSA State Series in Girls' Flag Football will take place this fall.

Dental assistants are health care professionals who work closely with dentists and dental hygienists to provide quality preventive and corrective dental care and administrative support in dental offices. In-person practice will be conducted from 6-9 pm on four Tuesdays in a local dental office.

Pharmacy Technician: Aug. 26-Dec. 6 (Online) Pharmacy technicians assist pharmacists with dispensing prescription medication while performing various other duties in a pharmacy setting. Online instruction is delivered in an asynchronous format. Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) funding is available to those who qualify.

Phlebotomy Technician: Aug. 26-Nov. 8 (In-Person)

Phlebotomists are health care professionals trained to collect, transport, handle and process blood and other specimens for laboratory analysis using venipuncture and micro-collection techniques. Instruction and in-person practice is from 5:30-7:30 pm on Mondays, Tuesdays and

Thursdays at Kishwaukee College. A clinical experience will be offered in a local hospital from Oct. 21-Nov. 8.

Real Estate Broker Pre-License: Sept. 24-Nov. 14 (Online)

Real estate brokers perform many duties in real estate transactions, including marketing homes, establishing escrow accounts, and working to ensure transactions are fair and legal. Online instruction is from 6-9 pm on Tuesdays and Thursdays.

Sterile Processing Technician: Aug. 26-Nov.

29 (Online) Sterile processing technicians support patient services in a health care facility. Technicians help decontaminate, clean, process, assemble, sterilize, store and distribute medical devices and supplies needed in patient care, especially during surgery. Online instruction is delivered in an asynchronous format.
