### Area DMV facilities increase operating hours

SPRINGFIELD - Illinois Secretary of State Alexi Giannoulias announced a change in DMV facility operating hours across the state to align with higher customer demand in the morning.

As of Sept. 23, Illinois DMV locations will be open to customers Monday through Friday from 7:30 a.m.-5 p.m., a half an hour earlier than the previous hours of 8 a.m.-5:30 p.m. This includes sites in Mendota, Dixon, LaSalle, Ottawa and Princeton.

Facilities that offer services on

Saturday will also change hours from 8 a.m.-12:30 p.m. to 7:30 a.m.-Noon on Saturdays.

"Since Day One, our priority has been to provide the best possible DMV experience and service to our customers," Giannoulias said. "We listened to feedback and analyzed the data to determine when our customers need us most. As a result, we're adjusting our hours to align our operations with their busy schedules so they can conveniently access services without disrupting their routine."

A data-driven analysis revealed customer demand is generally higher in the morning than in the early evening. By opening facilities earlier, the office aims to enhance service accessibility while reducing wait times.

The new facility hours are implemented at most, but not all, Illinois DMV facilities. To check facility hours, make an appointment or apply for online services, customers are encouraged to visit www. ilsos.gov.



#### ☐ Mendota native Patrick Doughty has close to 1,000 air sport experiences

MENDOTA - When we graduate from high school, we never truly know what's going to happen next or later

Patrick Doughty put on Mendota High School cap and gown in 2009 and then left for University of Wisconsin-Platteville knowing he wanted to get a degree in construction management and create buildings, structures, staples of cities and communities.

Somewhere in the mix, he decided he wanted to be part of air sports and parachute

"To those of us in air sports, it's not really a thrill that we're seeking. I don't really get a huge adrenaline boost. I'm not scared or shaking on exit," Doughty said. "When I climb out on a helicopter, I'm not nervous. It's more so putting skill to the test. I like to do unordinary stuff. The ordinary stuff doesn't do it for me. It just so happened I got into sky sports

and parachute sports. It's a niche hobby people think is super dangerous. From there I had goals to progress, and

"My jump numbers and ny experience, I consider to be extremely novice. I've been sky diving for nine or 10 years with periods of time where I wasn't jumping at all. Having close to 600 sky dives and 200 base jumps, those are childish numbers compared to the people I surround myself with, who are in the thousands. The guy who taught me how to base jump had over 8,000 base jumps when he taught me 2 ½ years ago."

Although almost 1,000 jumps doesn't seem like much to Doughty, he has enough experience to be able to break down all of the air sports disciplines and the differences between them.

Doughty, who has lived in or spent considerable time in New Zealand, South Africa, Australia, India, and South America, first started with sky diving, otherwise known

as belly diving or relative works, which is where all jumpers begin.

He has progressed to base jumping and wearing winged suits.

"Now, it's all wingsuit for me. It's really a progression to get to that point. You have

#### Graves-Hume registrars are excited to register you to vote

MENDOTA - It's almost election time in the United

But to vote for the president of the country or any of the other voteable positions in our federal, state, or local government, you have to be registered.

For LaSalle County residents, there is now another place to get registered, the Graves-Hume Public Library in Mendota as staff members Holly Christman and Jen Bresley are now certified registrars.

"It's pretty cool to be a registrar. We actually received a phone call asking if we registered people to vote," said Christman, who has been with the library for 12 years. "I approached Emily (Kofoid, the library's director) and she said we used to have two people who were registrars, but they're no longer at the library. I told her I'd be interested in doing it.

"Emily called to figure out what we had to do. I normally workdays and Jen works nights, so that way we have one on each shift to help register people. We had to go through a booklet and be educated on what registrars do."

The Graves-Hume registrar service is for LaSalle County residents and can only be done at the library. Those wishing to register to vote at the library do not have to be library members.

Although Bresley and Christman recently became certified, they will have to recertify after Nov. 30 as all Illinois registrars are on the same two-year certified timeline.

pecially for someone who is younger and is trying to get younger people to register to vote and to vote," Bresley said. "I am happy and honored to do that for our community.

To be eligible to register to vote, a LaSalle County resident, similar to all United States citizens, has to be at least 18 years old to vote or will become 18 on or before the date of the next election. Also, if the citizen has been a resident or will have been a resident of his or her precinct for 30 days before the date of the next election.

The person must bring two forms of identification with verification of name and address.

There are no registrations 27 days preceding any election, including the upcoming election on Nov. 5.

Kofoid is proud of Bresley and Christman for stepping up and giving LaSalle County residents a place to go to register to vote.

"This is another service that we can do for the community," Kofoid said. "It goes in line with us being a community center."

#### All 102 counties in Illinois now have 9-1-1 service

TOULON - Illinois State Police (ISP) Director Brendan F. Kelly, joined by Illinois Statewide 911 Administrator Cindy Barbera-Brelle, Stark County Sheriff Steve Sloan, and Peoria-Stark Joint Emergency Telephone System Board Chairman David Tuttle, recently announced every county in Illinois now has 911 service.

"This is a significant milestone for ISP's Division of Statewide 911 and the whole state," said ISP Director Brendan F. Kelly. "The agreement between these two counties means residents will see quicker response times as telecommunicators can get the appropriate first responders enroute sooner.'

Stark County entered into an agreement with Peoria County to create a Joint Emergency Telephone System Board so that Stark County residents and those traveling through the area can quickly and efficiently receive emergency services. This marks the successful completion of a monumental mission assigned to the Illinois State Police by the General Assembly in 2015.

Before this partnership, Stark County residents had to call a specific, 10-digit number for emergency services, such as the sheriff's office or fire department. People traveling through Stark County who didn't know which number to call had to be routed through other 911 systems, which meant more steps before police, fire, and EMS could be dispatched.

"With the intergovernmental agreement between Stark and Peoria counties. each county in Illinois now has a comprehensive and coordinated 911 system," said ISP Illinois Statewide 911 Administrator Cindy Barbera-Brelle. "Illinois is continuing to migrate 911 systems to the State's Next Generation 911 network, which will provide increased services and better responses in an emergency."

In 2015, Public Act 99-0006 established consolidation requirements for public safety answering points (dispatch centers) and mandated the delivery of enhanced 911 to unserved counties. Since 2016, the Illinois Statewide 911 Administrator, with the advice and recommendation of the Statewide 911 Advisory Board, has awarded approximately \$47.5 million in grants to 911 systems across the state from the 911 Consolidation Award Grant Program to ensure enhanced 911 service throughout Illinois.

"Stark County has finally reached the 21st Century with our 911," said Stark County Sheriff Steven Sloan. "We will have faster response time to get to a call and we will know where they are calling from. Peoria County has been fantastic to work with, as they have so much knowledge on 911. I believe Stark County residents will be thrilled with the 911.'

"The partnership between Peoria and Stark County has been great," said Peoria-Stark Joint Emergency Telephone System Board Chairperson David Tuttle. "Peoria County is thrilled to bring the same level of 911 service to the citizens of Stark County."

Public Act 99-0006 also requires the establishment of a statewide Next Generation 911 network to enhance the delivery of 911 service to residents living in and traveling through the state of Illinois. Next Generation 911 is a system comprised of managed IPbased networks, gateways, functional elements, and databases that provide new methods of communication. It is designed to provide multimedia data capabilities, such as text and video, to first responders so they have more information and a "virtual on-scene" look of the incident to determine what resources are needed before they arrive. The system is also capable of providing more accurate locations to cellular users' incidents in situations where they may not know where they are or are unable to communicate effectively.

There are 179 public safety answering points (911 centers) in Illinois, 158 of which have already switched over to Next Generation 911, and 21 are moving in that direction.

"By incorporating ABUS alongside mammography for women with dense breast tissue, we expect to improve detection rates for small cancers that might not be visible on a mammogram alone. We believe ABUS will become a key component of our practice in the fight against

Studies published in JAMA (Journal of the American Medical Association) highlight that

dense breast tissue is a common risk factor for breast cancer and makes detection more challenging with mammography alone. Since both dense tissue and cancer appear white on a mammogram, distinguishing between them can be difficult. ABUS helps by making suspicious masses appear black against the white dense tissue.

In early 2019, a national density inform law was enacted, requiring the FDA to update mammography reports to inform women if they have dense breast tissue. Providers may offer supplemental imaging to help detect cancers hidden in dense tissue.

Mammography remains the gold standard for breast cancer detection," Magallanes noted. "However, it is not as effective for all women, especially those with dense breast tissue. Research shows that ABUS technology, used in conjunction with mammography, can identify nearly 40% more cancers that mammography alone might miss."

#### Tri-County Opportunities Council announces start of Energy Assistant Program

ROCK FALLS – Tri-County Opportunities Council, as the administrator of the Energy Assistance Program in Bureau, Carroll, LaSalle, Lee, Marshall, Ogle, Putnam, Stark, and Whiteside, is pleased to announce that funds are available to assist income-eligible households with their natural gas, propane and/or electric bills and furnace assistance for inoperable heating systems.

The program will begin taking applications on Oct. 1, 2024, for older adults (60 years +), individuals with disabilities, families with children under the age of six, and households that are disconnected from their utilities, have a disconnection notice, or have less than 25% in their propane tank. All other income-eligible households can start applying November 1, 2024.

Applications will be taken on a first-come, first-served basis through August 15, 2025, or until funding is exhausted. If needed, households that receive a one-time benefit may return during the program year for a Reconnection Assistance or Furnace Assistance benefit(s).

Households must be at or below 200% of the federal poverty level to receive a benefit from LIHEAP. The 30day income guidelines for LIHEAP are based on Federal Poverty Guidelines, State Median Income and the number of persons living in the household. The income guidelines are as follows: 1-\$2,510, 2-\$3,407, 3-\$4,303, 4-\$5,200. Go

to [Agency website] or liheapillinois.com to know income limits for households with 5 members and more.

The Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) provides one-time benefits to income-eligible homeowners and renters to help with energy bills and for reconnection of energy services. Propane customers who are part of the priority group are encouraged to apply when the program opens in October. Propane prices typically increase during the winter months, so by applying early propane customers will see their LIHEAP benefit go further.

GRANVILLE-The Putnam County Public Library will host a film screening of the PBS documentary. "Flyways", at 6 p.m. Thursday, Oct. 3 at the Granville branch.

"Adopting digital wallets increases the accessibility and ease of purchase customers already enjoy at stores and restaurants they

Reports show that more than half of all Americans use contactless payment for everyday purchases from groceries to gas. The widespread adoption is attributed to people wanting a contactless payment method during the pandemic and the increased security offered by the

Near-field communication (NFC) is safer than using a traditional credit card with a magnetic strip or chip due to the use of end-to-end encryption to ensure maximum fraud protection.

"Illinois residents can rest assured that their payment and personal information is safe when they visit the DMV," Giannoulias said. "The security surrounding the payment and the speed at which it is processed leaves no room for fraudsters to steal information."

Customers may now use their digital wallets to pay at all 150 Illinois DMV locations across Illinois as well as the Secretary of State's Business Services and Index departments.








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

Continued from Page A1 to start belly flying," Doughty said. "As you progress and get more time in the sky, you get more comfortable with your body flight. Generally, people jump into free flying, which is when people utilize

the iFLY wind tunnels in the

Chicago area.

"I've done some free flying, tracksuit flying, and movement flying. For the last 350 jumps, it's been all progression in wingsuit. You start in a small suit. It's a weird feeling at first and there is potential instability and dangers that go with that. You start in a suit that has all small wings where the wings only go from your wrist to your hip, and your leg wing only goes halfway down

"There are a lot of different ways to progress in the disciplines. My way of progressing suited me but may not be the same path for the next person. I would consider my progression conservative.'

Doughty lives in Denver, Colo., and works for his company remotely.

Although busy, he tries to find time for air sports to get enough reps in one suit to move to the next as they are intermediate, advanced, and expert.


He is currently in an advanced suit, which means the tail wing goes past his feet and acts like a rudder and control surfaces are larger than intermediate suits.

"The suits become like weapons. They're tools in your tool belt. You work up to getting comfortable in the advanced suit," Doughty said. "You choose suits based on what you're trying to achieve. In base jumping there are different types of suits. They look like wingsuits to everyone else, but they are technologically designed to give specific characteristics during flight or at the beginning of flight.

"Some suits start really fast meaning the start arc from when they jump off of a mountain to when they're fully inflated and in flight, happens in a shorter vertical distance than other suits."

Some may decide to stay on the ground after a few Others may get bored.

For Doughty, there is





always something to look forward to, something else to work for in his desired sport.

"It's just the advancement of skill. There are always people better. It's the sort of longing to be better but there is a never-ending tunnel of desire to be better," Doughty said. "Had I not picked up wingsuiting, I would have gotten bored with sky diving eventually. There is only so much you can do over and over again, and you're paying for it every time.

"For base jumping, it's just you. There is no one to tell you, you can or can't do something. You should have friends you surround yourself with in the sport who will speak up if something doesn't seem right. But, otherwise, it's just you, your equipment, and your skill. It's a put up or shut up with

"The feeling of accomplishment after overcoming an initial fear, stomping an exit, or having a flight really dialed in is hard to describe. It's what keeps me coming back, always chasing the progression."



Mendota native Patrick Doughty has a bachelor's degree in construction management and makes a living by supplying product to construction companies building projects. However, when he's not helping build a structure, he's wingsuit base jumping out of helicopters, airplanes, and off of mountains such as this one in Walenstadt, Switzerland.



(The following is from Jessica Nashold's Backtracks & Sidetracks column reprinted from Sept. 29, 2004.) By Jessica Nashold

A boxing match, which had been scheduled to take place at the Opera House on Sept. 15, 1904, was blocked by "the church people." Rev. T.E. Allen, pastor of the Presbyterian Church, consulted an attorney to verify an Illinois law regarding boxing exhibitions. With support from the Methodist and Evangelical congregations, the Presbyterians passed a resolution calling upon the mayor to stop the contest. Text of the Illinois law was published on the front page of The Sun-Bulletin on Sept. 16, 1904. It was taken from page 1308 of the Criminal Code of Illinois. Anyone promoting or witnessing a boxing exhibition would be subject to a fine not to exceed \$500, and jail time not to exceed six months. In addition, anyone who contemplated sponsoring a boxing

## The real scandal in Springfield, Ohio

In what ranks as one of the most memorable debate moments in recent history, Donald Trump said that Haitian immigrants are eating people's pets in Springfield, Ohio.

No one has yet turned up evidence that this is true, although there is an audio recording of a man reporting that he witnessed four Haitian immigrants absconding with geese

Since everyone is always happy to see geese go someplace else, this call hasn't made much of an impression on the debate over Trump's comments, which, true to form, were the most incendiary thing he could say about Springfield. Even if Tabby and Fido aren't on the menu in the small

Ohio town, the fact remains that a place with a population of 60,000 has seen an influx of 15,000 to 20,000 Haitian immigrants since 2020, making the new arrivals a wildly disproportionate share of the population in short order. Prior to this point, Springfield had nothing to do with Haiti, and looking at the map, a town located between Columbus

and Dayton would be one of the least likely places to have

anything to do with Haiti. It is very far from Little Haiti in

Miami, and it had no pre-existing Haitian population or an infrastructure to provide services to Haitian Creole speakers. No matter. Under the Biden administration's open-handed immigration policies, every place in the country has become subject to sudden, disruptive demographic change. We've seen it in big cities, where Democratic mayors have complained of the associated burdens, and now we are seeing it in a small city. To match in relative terms what's happened

to arrive in New York City in the past several years. Numbers matter. No one would care if there were 150 new Haitian migrants in Springfield since 2020, or 1,500. But 15,000 is a different proposition. Quantity, as they say, has a quality all of its own.

in Springfield, more than 2 million migrants would have had

To be clear, Haitian immigrants (many permitted here legally under Biden policy) didn't begin showing up in Springfield hoping to filch unsuspecting domestic short hairs.

Rather, they were looking for work in a city that was seeing something of an economic revival. That's all well and good, but people are more than cogs to be plugged into warehouses or manufacturing operations.

They come with families and with needs for housing, health care and education. They have pre-existing cultural predilections different from ours (Haiti and the United States are very different places), and if they don't speak the language, that makes everything even more difficult. Nor are resources unlimited. Health care facilities, schools and the housing stock have all been strained in Springfield.

The New York Times reports that consultations began to take three times as long at the local community health center. The head of the clinic told the paper: "We lost productivity. We had huge burnout of staff." It hired six Haitian Creole speakers, and annual spending on translation services increased from \$43,000 in 2020 to \$436,000.

The school district, according to the Times, has had to hire two dozen new English-as-a-second-language instructors and several interpreters.

The city manager, Bryan Heck, wrote a letter to U.S. senators saying that the influx is "putting a significant strain on our resources and ability to provide ample housing for all of our residents." The Haitians also tend to be poor drivers. Ohio Governor Mike DeWine has pledged help from the state highway patrol.

News reports often dismiss the concerns of residents as ill-informed or xenophobic. Their complaints about the costs and disorder associated with the wave of immigration are legitimate, though, and the sense that the town has undergone a large-scale change that no one was consulted about is very real. Who signed up to become a laboratory for Biden's experiment in permitting Haitians to come to and stay in the

The cats and dogs may be safe and sound, but all is not right in Springfield.

 Start small. If you're inexperienced, it is best to begin small when setting up the book club. Privately reach out to a few different people you know enjoy books and see if they would be interested. Ask them to invite a few other people to help the club grow.

• Stay organized. Digital tools can help book club organizers stay on top of things and inform the club. Many clubs utilize social media platforms



like Facebook Groups. Bookclubs is an application designed especially for book clubs. Make an account to organize your book club, receive book recommendations and view discussion guides.

• Identify your intentions. The motivation behind a book club is to read, but you might want to narrow that even further. Perhaps you want to make new friends? Or maybe you want to explore a certain literary genre exclusively? Create a book club business plan of sorts where you fully express your intentions for the club.

· Choose the vibe and meeting style. Some book clubs are rigid with a set schedule and firm deadlines. Others are more relaxed with meetings being shuffled around to accommodate everyone's lives. Create a game plan of where you will meet. how often you meet and how books

and discussion points will be selected.

· Select your first book: Look to Goodreads, Amazon reviews, and other book-related resources to find a popular book. Various celebrities also have their own book club recommendations, so that may be a safe place to start. · Opt for a slow weeknight for

meetings. People tend to be busy on the weekend with other social engagements, so book clubs may be best hosted on a Monday or Tuesday evening. When establishing the book club, poll potential attendees to see what the majority want. Try to be consistent with the meeting day and time to keep the book club rolling along.

 Prepare discussion questions. It's easy for a book club meeting to veer away from the book or for there to be a lull in conversation unless it is guided along. A discussion question list will help keep people chatting about what's important: the book.

 Be open about costs. Some book clubs are free and others require a fee to join to help pay for meeting spaces or refreshments. Be up front about how costs will be absorbed.

Book clubs are entertaining ways to bring literary lovers together to expand their enjoyment of reading.



HOLLYWOOD -- After being eclipsed by Margot Robbie in "Barbie" and Emily Blunt in "The Fall Guy" (which had disappointing grosses of \$180.5 million against a \$125-million cost), Ryan Gosling flies solo in the sci-fi film "Project Hail Mary." In the film, he wakes up in space as the sole survivor of a crew who is searching for a way to save Earth. It's due on March 2026.

#### Child proficiency testing above average in Paw Paw CUSD

PAW PAW – The Paw Paw CUSD 271 Board of Education met on Sept. 17.

Superintendent Jennifer DuBois presented a power-point program explaining the results of the testing just completed of where the children stand in proficiency in math and reading. Tests from the end of last school year were compared to tests taken in the first weeks of this school year. It is usual to lose some standing after the "summer-slide." Some notable news was that the kindergarten class came in at 0.2 (the second month of kindergarten). The standings are listed by grade and month. Thus, it could be expected for kindergartners to come in at 0.0. It was a pleasant surprise that some of them actually came in above what would be expected for their first month in school. The fifth and eighth grade students came in above the national average for the Illinois Science Assessment.

The Board noted that perhaps the Paw Paw Library Summer Reading Program had helped keep skills up.

There will be intervention periods available to help students who need extra attention in catching up to their grade level and to help those at grade level excel beyond in areas of their interests.

The math department is participating in a year-long professional development series with a coach from the Illustrative Math curricular resource that the school uses in all grades K-8. This series will help teachers fine tune their implemen-

tation of the curricular resource.

The old mower, that is not in working condition, will be assessed for use in the FAA group, or, disposed of.

Bus routes were discussed. There is a bus-stop at Brookside and Peru Street, which anyone who can walk there is welcome to board. The Board is looking into getting a crossing guard at the corner of Chapman Street and Chicago Road. Superintendent Du Bois said she will send a survey out to all families who live south of Chicago Road and ask if they would use an extra bus stop at other locations south of Chicago Road.

Dr. Erik Borne, principal of Indian Creek High School, was in attendance to give an update on happenings and answer any questions. He reported that the school year has gotten off to a good start. The focus is on positive culture. The five indicators that positively affect school success are effective leaders, collaborative teachers, involved families, supportive environments and ambitious instruction. Dr. Borne stated that he has lunch meetings in his office with 6-8 freshmen each week, discussing any questions or concerns they may have. The students from Paw Paw have mentioned they enjoy having more friends this year.

He explained that Indian Creek has a program that allows students to give a "Shout-Out" during the announcements at the end of the day for anyone they think did something helpful that day. Students are enjoying that, as well as the end-of-the-week raffle, in which students' names are submitted by teachers for a student who has done something meaningful. A drawing is held, and the winner is given a prize - perhaps a gift card to a local business, or, to get a designated parking space for a week.

#### New home construction is adding to the enrollment in Indian Creek School District

SHABBONA – The Indian Creek School Board met on Sept. 16.

Middle School Principal Travis Naber reported that Paw Paw sixth through eighth graders are invited to the Indian Creek Middle School dance on Nov. 1.

Many new homes are being built in Waterman, which is adding to the district's enrollment. Over 100 homes have been built or sold within the last couple years in the Green Ridge Subdivision. The village of Waterman is also updating the impact fees for the Deerfield subdivision. Eighty-nine lots are currently under contract with a developer.

A 1% sales tax for DeKalb County will be on the November ballot. Indian Creek has taken a neutral stance. According to PMA Asset Management, 42% of purchases are made by individuals outside DeKalb County. If it does pass at the November election, Superintendent Chad Willis will likely recommend that to abate the district's bonds, which will lower the tax rate/taxes unless the enrollment increases enough that would cause the district to add on to its existing buildings.

The Paw Paw High School contract is up for renewal at the end of this year. It must be re-negotiated every two years, as set by the State of Illinois. Willis is recommending that a committee be formed to meet with Paw Paw to negotiate a new contract within the next couple months.

Dr. Erik Borne, high school principal, reported that the average high school class size is 21 students.

Homecoming activities were held the week of Sept. 16, with a bonfire and volleyball games on Thursday, parade and soccer games on Friday evening, and dance on Saturday evening.

High school students have been enthusiastic about the Best Student Friday raffles and prizes. Names of students are put into the raffle by teachers, based on doing good deeds, making a great improvement, consistently putting forth best effort, doing something extraordinary. Prizes so far have included gift certificates to Screamer's, the principal's parking spot for a week, etc. There will be other gift cards to local businesses in the future.


#### Bridge work set on Meridian Road

The work is expected to be completed by Dec. 15, 2024, weather permitting. Motorists are advised to use alternative routes around the construction site.







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

of the Year, two-time American League MVP (2021, 2023), four-time All-MLB First Team, two-time All-MLB Second Team, four-time All-Star, two-time Silver Slugger Award recipient, three-time Edgar Martinez Award winner, earned the Hank Aaron Award, led the American League in home runs in 2023 and in triples in 2021.

Oh, he was also the Associated Press Male Athlete of the Year twice (2021, 2023).

Quite an impressive resume for a 30-year-old, who has only been in the MLB for six years.

Well, the above listed credentials were overshadowed by a whale of a feat on Sept. 19.

Not just a feat, he created his own club. Ohtani is the inaugural member of the 50-50 club

as he became the first baseball player to hit 50 home runs and steal 50 bases in the same season, in history. Which means, he did something no one has ever done since the National League was created in 1876, the American League in 1901, or Major League Baseball in 1903 Read those years again. And then remember, we're

On Sept. 19, the man went nuts against the Miami Marlins to begin the club as he was 6-of-6 at the plate with three home runs, two doubles, 10 RBI, and stole two bases, which is going down as one of the best performances of all time.

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

## The secret to your best life

One of the greatest lessons I've learned is that you can't be both selfish and happy. I know this is true through my own personal experience, but more importantly, the Bible has some things to say about the attitude we should have about "self."

For example, love is not selfish. In the Amplified Bible, 1 Corinthians 13:5 says love "is not self-seeking." In 1 Corinthians 15:31, the apostle Paul said, "...I die daily [I face death and die to self]" (AMP), which basically means

he was not self-seeking but instead focused on doing what God called him to do with his life.

There are also scriptures that teach us the importance of having self-control. Galatians 5:23 lists self-control as a fruit of the Spirit, and 2 Timothy 1:7 says that in Christ, we have a spirit "of power and of love and...personal discipline [abilities that result in a calm, well-balanced mind and self-control]."

The truth is, loving others is not always easy, and it always costs us something: time, money, convenience, etc. But through our relationship with Christ, we can find the strength and ability to love others, even when it seems to cost more than we think we can give.

Imagine how different the world would be if everyone would just do one nice thing to help someone else every day. It can be so simple to put a smile on someone's face. Give a compliment, give


something away, take the time to listen, open a door for someone, let someone go before you in line at the store...the list could go on and on.
