MHS tackles serious subject matter in fall play

"Radium Girls" set for stage Oct. 4 & 5

MENDOTA - When Mendota High School Drama Director James Younger was thinking about choosing the fall play, an old idea came

"Radium Girls" had been on the back burner for a few years. He thought it was a good play, but it just wasn't the right time.

Now it is, as MHS welcomes you to "Radium Girls" at 7 p.m. Friday, Oct. 4 and Saturday, Oct. 5 at the MHS Auditorium.

"I've been thinking about this show for a couple of years. I have the right cast at the right time," Younger said. "It allows for lots of participation. I have a lot of hungry students who are willing to bite into something a little more serious with a difficult subject matter. They were willing to put in the work to understand the depth of their characters.

"We have 15 actors on stage, and we have almost that many helping with technical duties and in the back. We have around 30 students involved in the production. The play has local connections. This one is set in New Jersey, but they had the same story in Ottawa. It gives the students a chance to be really dramatic. We've done some comedies in the past, which they've enjoyed. This lets them flex a different muscle. I thought they were ready for it."

"Radium Girls" is a play. There isn't music involved. There isn't any choreography, dance, or song.

It is all dialogue where

Younger has seen all of his young actors and actresses grow as performers.

Gracie Botts, a MHS junior, has been in the drama program since her freshman year. She has enjoyed all of the productions she has been in over the last few years, but this hits a little different.

She enjoys telling the story of the girls from the 1920s and wearing the period wear dresses of the time period.



District 280 Board OKs FY25 budget

☐ MHS supports city grant application

MENDOTA - The Mendota High School District 280 Board of Education approved the Fiscal Year 25 budget at its Sept. 23 meeting.

BUDGET HEARING

Abudget hearing was held prior to the regular session. Superintendent Denise Aughenbaugh said the FY25 budget had changes from what was placed on display last month. The Corporate Personal Property Tax revenue funds were estimated at \$759,447, which is a decrease from \$1.127 million received in FY24. The CPPRT revenue funds are shifting back to the amount prior to a state correction in revenue sent to school districts.

Over the last four years, several capital projects have occurred that impacted expenditures. In FY24, the district remodeled the weight room with ESSER (Emergency and Secondary School Emergency Relief) grant funds and made bus garage roof, gutter and minor flat roof repairs.

Projects planned or completed from FY22 through FY25 are approximately \$5.3 million. The Finance Committee met and also recommends a future \$400,000 Working Cash transfer to Capital Projects to pay for the rough estimate of capital projects and health life safety work, which is approximately \$1.6 million in FY25.

The total estimated revenue for FY25 is \$11,029,445 with expenses at \$12,159,651 for a deficit of \$1,130,206.

REGULAR MEETING During regular session, the board approved the

FY25 budget as proposed. Budgets are posted at www. The board heard a request from City of Mendota

representatives Annie Short and Ali Braboy for a permanent easement to support the walk/run/bike path grant application. Upon review by the district attorney, the board will approve the request. A representative from Land's Energy Electric Re-

newal addressed the board regarding pending electrical increases. The board approved a 24-month renewal Also, the board approved the purchase of a snow re-

moval/maintenance truck and approved the first reading of PRESS Plus 116 policy updates. Principal Joe Masini reported on the professional

development scheduled, Homecoming Week activities and Curriculum Committee updates, and provided commendations and a fall athletics overview.

The next regular meeting of the Mendota High School District 280 Board of Education will be at 6 p.m. Monday, Oct. 21.



Fire Prevention Week 2024 Theme is: "Smoke alarms: Make them work for you!TM"

National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) has announced this year's theme for Fire Prevention Week Oct. 6-12: "Smoke alarms: Make them work for you!TM' The goal of this year's campaign strives to educate everyone about the importance of having working smoke alarms in the home.

"It's simple, working smoke alarms save lives! Due to synthetic materials used in modern construction, homes burn hotter and faster, while also emitting toxic smoke limiting the time you have to escape to less than 2-3 minutes. The early warning from smoke alarms could save your life," said Illinois State Fire Marshal James A. Rivera. "I encourage all departments across the state to make plans to host outreach events that help to promote fire safety in their



communities during this week. You should always test your smoke/CO alarms monthly and replace any broken or expired alarms in

your home.' During 2023 in Illinois, the "Be Alarmed!" Smoke Alarm Installation Programs participating fire departments found 68% of pre-existing smoke alarms in homes that received new 10-year sealed battery smoke alarms were non-functional or expired. Currently, there are 280 active Illinois fire de-

partments from 61 different counties participating in this program. To learn more about the "Be Alarmed!" program visit www.ifsa.org/alarms.

According to the NFPA, smoke alarms reduce the risk of dying in a home fire by more than half (54 percent). Meanwhile, roughly three out of five fire deaths happen in homes with either no smoke alarms or no working smoke alarms.



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

In 1925, President Calvin Coolidge proclaimed Fire Prevention Week a national observance, making it the longest-running public health observance in the United States. During Fire Prevention Week, children, adults, and teachers learn how to stay safe in case of a fire. Firefighters and other public safety educators provide lifesaving public education in an effort to drastically decrease casualties caused

Fire Prevention Week is observed each year during the week of Oct. 9 in commemoration of the Great Chicago Fire, which began on Oct. 8, 1871, and caused devastating damage. This horrific conflagration killed more than 250 people, left 100,000 homeless, destroyed more than 17,400 structures, and burned more than 2,000 acres of land.

State flag redesign contest open in Illinois until Oct. 18

SPRINGFIELD-Illinois Secretary of State Alexi Giannoulias announced that the Illinois Flag Commission has begun accepting public submissions for a new state flag design.

The commission will accept design ideas for consideration from the public online or via mail – until Oct. 18. The commission also plans to work with schools and local libraries to inform Illinoisans about the process and encourage residents to take part.

The commission was created in 2023 after Senate Bill 1818, sponsored by State Senator Doris Turner (48th District—Springfield) and State Representative Kam Buckner (26th District—Chicago) was signed into law.

"I'm excited to see the creativity of Illinois residents and how they display their passion for our great state," said Giannoulias whose office is responsible for chairing the commission. "The symbols that represent and unify our state are important and this presents an excellent opportunity to engage Illinoisans and showcase their pride.'

"History is living, breathing and ever-evolving," said Turner. "We need to ensure government is evolving with the times so people are engaged and a part of what

is going on across the state. To start the conversation, I led the initiative to create the Illinois Flag Commission, which is tasked with deciding whether the current state flag should be replaced with a redesigned state flag. We need a flag that truly represents Illinois – a state with a strong workforce, an agriculture champion and so

"Our flag embodies the rich tapestry of Illinoisfrom the mighty Mississippi to the shores of Lake Michigan. It reflects our history, our people, and the spirit of our state," said Buckner. "A new design presents a unique opportunity to honor our heritage while showcasing the evolving story of

The commission will select 10 designs based on how they reflect the identity

of Illinois and will host an online public survey for residents to vote on their favorites or to keep the current flag. Voting will begin Jan. 1 and last around two months.

Some general guidance for submissions includes: · Design elements can

- include natural features of the state, history and culture of the state.
- No limit on flag shape or ratio but designs may be edited by the commission.
- · No limit on colors but recommended less than three colors for clarity of design.
- · Participants can visit www.ilsos.gov and upload online or submit their design via mail addressed to Illinois Flag Commission, Howlett Building, Room 476, 501 S. Second St., Springfield, IL 62756
 - · Participants are re-

quired to provide their first and last name, address, email address and phone number. They are also required to explain their relationship to Illinois and provide a description of their flag entry (each category limited to 500 characters). • To upload an image, the

file will need to be 5 MB or less and in PNG, GIF, or JPG format.

• There should be no watermarks or frames around the image.

- By submitting a design to the Commission, the designer is authorizing the Commission and the State of Illinois to take ownership of the design
- Persons under 18 may submit designs if submitted in coordination with a parent/guardian, teacher or adult mentor.
- Designs cannot be copied from other designs or use existing logos or copyrighted materials; however, the design can include elements or reproductions of the State Seal or any prior Illinois State flag.
- Designs cannot be AI generated.
- Submissions are limited to three per person.
- Submissions from outside the United States, i.e. military bases, need to be made by regular mail.

After public feedback, the commission will report its findings to the Illinois General Assembly, whose members will vote on whether to adopt a new flag or retain the current flag The bill allows for the


commission to evaluate if a new state flag would better represent the state's diversity of urban, suburban and rural communities and inspire renewed state pride among Illinoisans. The commission is

chaired by David Joens, Director of the Illinois State Archives, on behalf of the Secretary of State. Its members also include:

• Three members appointed by the governor

- Four members each appointed by the President of the Senate, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the Senate Minority Leader and the House Minority Leader.
- A representative from the State Superintendent of Education and one from the Board of the Illinois State Museum will also be commission members.

Illinois has joined other states in seeking a new state flag design. Minnesota unveiled its new flag in December 2023, using a similar method to the one adopted by Illinois. Both Michigan and Maine are also considering an official change in their state flags.



than small and dried quantities of branches, leaves, weeds or grass at any time. The burning of any material such as rubber, tires, leather, tar paper, old batteries or any material that emits an offensive odor when burned is unlawful within the city limits of Mendota.

Limited amounts of yard waste material may be burned provided the material is dry and does not create an offensive odor, nuisance or fire hazard due to excessive high winds. Combustible yard waste material may be kindled from 10 a.m. through 4 p.m. on Thursdays, Fridays and Saturdays only. All fires must be constantly tended by a competent person, until such fire is properly extinguished. The continued smoldering of slow-burning combustible yard waste after 4 p.m. is a nuisance and anyone kindling such a fire that will emit obnoxious odors after 4 p.m. will be considered performing an unlawful act. Burning on Sunday by commercial establishments shall be considered an unlawful act.





Donnelley comes to Mendota – 1992

(The following is from Jessica Nashold's Backtracks & Sidetracks column reprinted from Oct. 1, 1997.)

On Sept. 30, 1992, The Mendota Reporter carried the news that R.R. Donnelley & Sons had signed an agreement to purchase Combined Communications Services. The option to purchase had first been announced in July 1991.

James Ratcliffe, vice president of marketing for Donnelley, said the sale would be closed "in a month or so." Edward E. Lane, president of Donnelley's Magazine Group, saw the acquisition as "an opportunity to diversify. Combined Communication Services, like its predecessor, Wayside Press, had specialized in trade publications. Conco Press, which had preceded Wayside, was publisher of a variety of organization magazines.

The sale will include printing presses in Mendota, pre-press facilities in Oregon, Ill., and a closed plant in Columbia, Mo.

The Mendota plant, located on West Washington Street, had been built by the Western Advent Publishing Co. It was known as the Hope Press, because its principal production was Our Hope, an Adventist magazine. During extensive remodeling by Wayside, the original plant had been completely encased by a larger structure, then dismantled and brought out piece by piece through the front door. This was followed by further

Combined Communication Services had employed 450 full- and part-time people, 350 of them in Mendota. Robert Sanderson, CCS president, was slated to become vice president of sales and marketing for Donnelley.

Co-secretaries named were Emily Wulf and Marie Rollins. Serving alone in 1993 would be Susan Ginocchio, vice president; Dorothy Copper, treasurer; and Joann Reeder, corresponding secretary.

Thank you, Caitlin Clark

I called a long-time friend the other day, a fellow sports fan, to catch up, and we spent the first 20 minutes talking about women's professional basketball.

Neither of us had ever exhibited the slightest interest in the WNBA, but both of us, simultaneously, unbeknownst to the other, had become Caitlin Clark fans.

There are transformational players who change the competitive balance in a league or change how the game is played, but it's rare to come across players who lift an entire league on their shoulders.

There was much knowing chatter when Clark entered the WNBA that she was in for a rude awakening after her historic college career, that she wouldn't look so special against the best women players in the world. And, yes, there was a period of adjustment, but as the WNBA regular season ends and the playoffs begin, we can say the Clark doubters have been proved categorically wrong. Infamously, Geno Auriemma, the storied coach of the

University of Connecticut women's team, said back in June, "The delusional fanbase that follows her disrespected the WNBA players by saying she's going to go in that league and tear it apart." Delusional? Clark has had the best rookie season in WNBA

history and turned everything she's touched to ratings or attendance gold. For all the jealousy and even hostility she's elicited from

other WNBA players, Clark is doing them all a favor. The WNBA could have had an unlimited advertising and marketing budget and not produced anything like the results of simply putting "C squared" on the court.

With Clark, the everyday is extraordinary. For the final game of the season against the Fever, the unremarkable Washington Mystics moved the event to the NBA arena and drew 20,711, the most for a game in WNBA history. The Mystics usually play in an arena with a capacity of 4,200.

The Indiana Fever averaged 17,000 attendees per home game and 15,000 on the road; both are more than any other

team by a healthy margin. When the team shows up in an opposing arena, often a lion's share of the fans are rooting for Clark, not the home team.

The Ion network, which broadcasts WNBA games, saw its ratings increase 133% from a year ago, to 670,000 per game. It benefited from broadcasting seven games with more than a million viewers, all involving the Indian Fever. Notably, viewership among men ages 25-54 increased 181%.

Clark finished the season tied for seventh most points per game and led the league in assists per game. She set rookie records for total points in a season, assists per game and three-pointers made. She's the only rookie ever with a triple-double -- and she did it twice.

She scored the second most three-pointers ever in a season, falling just short of the all-time record.

WNBA legend Sheryl Swoopes, who has never sounded overly enamored with Clark, recently said that the Fever star wasn't yet "dominating" the league. Perhaps, but Clark's numbers match or eclipse those that Swoopes amassed in her MVP seasons. Swoopes, for instance, averaged 18.5 points, 3.3 assists and 4.9 rebounds per game in 2002. Clark averaged 19.5 points, 8.4 assists and 5.7 rebounds per game this year -- and, again, she's a rookie.

Clark is a fierce competitor on the court and a modest voice off it, constantly expressing -- and showing -- deep gratitude for her rock-star-like following. She's a role model in every way for her young fans, and her older ones can marvel at her skills while appreciating her class.

The Fever are making their first playoff appearance since 2016, after starting the season with a woeful 1-8. They might be bounced quickly, but, after an incredible post-Olympicbreak surge, who knows? Regardless, for sports fans along for the thrilling ride and

WNBA players and executives benefiting from the boost to their business, the universal sentiment should be, "Thank you, Caitlin Clark."

then rinse thoroughly. This should not be done more than once every 10 years. An interlocking gravel should be used when resetting stones.

Corrigan took a class online. In her class, she learned about the different kinds of stones and their meanings. Stones are much like museums, preserving a part of our history. First, the stone must be solid to avoid damage. She sprays the stone with clear water, lets it set, followed by a D2 Biological Solution, which kills the algae. Next, she uses a natural soft bristle brush to lightly scrub stone. One can use shims or cuticle sticks to clean indentations,

IVCC Field Day showcases research done at local plots and by U of I researchers

OGLESBY - Illinois Valley Community College in partnership with the University of Illinois Extension hosted its annual Fall Field Day on Sept. 6. IVCC Ag + Extension's Fall Field Day gives both students and the community a chance to learn about the latest research updates and topics in agriculture. The Field Day attracted over 40 participants to the Agricultural Education Center to hear presentations from University of Illinois researchers and local industry professionals.

Animals-Pet Waste Ordinance

• The purpose of this section is to establish requirements for the proper disposal of pet solid waste in the City of Mendota so as to protect public health, safety and welfare, and to prescribe penalties for failure to comply.

• Requirement for disposal. All pet owners and keepers are required to immediately and properly dispose of their pet's solid waste deposited on any property, public or private, not owned or possessed by that person.

• Exemptions. Any owner or keeper who requires the use of a disability assistance animal shall be exempt from the provisions of this section while such animal is being used for that purpose.

• Violations and penalties. Any person(s) who is found to have violated the provisions of this section shall be subject to a fine of no less than \$25 and no more than \$75.

With cold weather near, make sure CO alarms are working

SPRINGFIELD-The Office of the State Fire Marshal warns residents across the state to pay special attention to the distinct signals sent by carbon monoxide alarms when their life has expired. Frequently, people may believe that a beep coming out of their CO means it's time for a battery change, when in fact it means that the device needs to be replaced.

"It is extremely important to pay attention to the different beeps that come out of a dead CO alarm. We want to ensure that our residents understand the difference in order to take immediate action and prevent a tragedy," said a spokesperson from the Illinois State Fire Marshal's office. "Carbon monoxide is known as the silent killer. The replacement of dead carbon monoxide detectors is also a life saver."

Since January 2007, it has been an Illinois law to have a properly functioning CO alarm in all dwelling units. The law requires that detectors must have battery power as the primary or secondary power supply.

They cannot be solely electric powered. Many carbon monoxide detectors now in service were made prior to the incorporation of the new requirements and may not have an end-of-life signal.

Carbon monoxide is the number one cause of poisoning deaths in the nation, claiming approximately 300 lives a year, according to the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA). Because CO is an odorless, colorless, tasteless gas, it can kill people before they realize its presence. It can be produced by gas or oil appliances such as furnaces, clothes dryers, water heaters, ovens, space heaters or, in some cases, by fireplaces and wood-burning stoves.

OSFM advises consumers that if their CO alarms were manufactured before August 2009, prior to the incorporation of the new requirements, they may not have the end-of-life feature. In addition, residents who have a carbon monoxide detector installed for more than three years should look for the manufacturing date, which may be found on the

outside back of the alarm or visit the company's website for further information. If none can be found, the device should be replaced without any hesitation.

Carbon monoxide alarms should be tested every month by pushing the test button. If the alarm goes off, follow the basic steps:

- If your CO detector activates, evacuate everyone from your home immediately leaving the door open for ventilation on your way out and then call 911.
- experts have investigated the problem and declared it safe to return.

- Never operate generators indoors.
- Neverburn charcoal inside a home, garage, vehicle or tent.
- Never use gasoline-powered tools and engines in-
- Never use gas-powered appliances such as an oven or clothes dryer for heating
- · Never leave a car running in an attached garage, even if the garage door is

City Ordinance

Grass clippings, etc. in streets

No person shall throw, place or leave, or cause or permit to be thrown, placed or left, any ashes, dirt, filth or rubbish, grass clippings, or foreign matter in or upon any street, alley or sidewalk of the City of Mendota.

Penalty: Any person violating this section shall be subject to the penalty of not less than \$50 nor more than \$500. Imposition of any penalty for a violation of this section shall not be construed as a waiver of the right of the City to collect the cost of removal of such nuisance where it is necessary for the City to remove such nuisance.

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



fourth-and-3 from its own 33 and then having to punt the ball back to the Tigers on a fourth-and-6 from its own 42. The net result of the punt into the wind was just 10 yards from the original line of scrimmage, so Sherrard went back on offense at its own 48 with 3:04 left to play.

While Mendota still had the football, medical personnel wheeled a stretcher to the Sherrard sideline and subsequently left in an ambulance with an unknown injury to a Tiger player. That player turned out to be starting quarterback Carter Brown, who up until that point had two rushing touchdowns, one passing TD and was responsible for 217 of his team's yards.

In came running back Garrett Woodward to go under center to try to lead his team to the game-winning drive, and that he did. Woodward completed a 20-yard pass to Emery Partlow that placed the ball at the Trojan 16, and from there Woodward darted outside the Trojan defense and dove into the end zone for a score with 55 seconds left. Woodward passed to Lane Luxmore for the two-pointer and a 28-21 Sherrard lead.

Freeman ran the ensuing kick back 28 yards to the Trojan 46, then facing a fourth down, Freeman ran 13 yards to the Tiger 38 with 26 seconds left. Mendota could only advance as far as the 27-yard line when it ran out of time.

The final statistics were nearly even, with the Trojans gaining 297 yards to 305 for Sherrard. Tillman rushed for 54 yards and passed for 137, while Freeman had three receptions for 62 yards. Brown ended up leading the Tigers with 130 yards rushing and 87 yards passing.

The game didn't start out so well for Brown. 

Trust God and do good

One of the most life-changing things I've learned since I've been teaching the Word of God is that God is always right! No matter what I think, how I feel, or what my circumstances look like, His wisdom and His way of doing things are always the answers to my problems.

Psalm 37:3 contains some of the greatest instruction there is for having a great life. It says, "Trust (lean on, rely on, and be confident) in the Lord and do good; so shall you dwell in the land and feed surely on His faithfulness, and truly you shall be fed" (AMPC).

All of us go through difficult times and experience pain and disappointment. In John 16:33, the Lord even tells us that "in this world you will have trouble" (John 16:33 NIV). However, I believe Psalm 37:3 provides us with God's prescription for every problem we face: Trust God and do good.

Trusting God also brings freedom. Many times, things happen that we simply don't understand. But that's okay—we don't have to figure everything out. We can trust God that He knows and will take care of everything.

Maybe someone has really hurt you, and what's happening doesn't seem fair at all. The Bible says that God will be your Vindicator (Psalm 135:14). As you place your trust



in Him, you open the door for Him to work in your situation and deal with the people who have mistreated you.

Your faith and trust also allow God to take the wrong things that have happened and ultimately work out them out for your benefit (Romans 8:28).

The Bible teaches us that it's not the things that happen to us that determine the quality of our lives—it's how we choose to respond to them that really makes all of the difference. And trusting God is the key to making right choices that bring us the life He has planned for us.

We can choose to trust God. The truth is, God is the only One we can completely trust to take care of us and do what's best for us at all times, in every situation.

You not only sow seeds for your own breakthrough, but helping others releases tremendous joy. Nehemiah 8:10 says, "...the joy of the Lord is your strength" (NIV).

I know it's not always easy to trust God and do good. But it's the best option because it's the only thing that will really work. I know it works because I was a mess, and learning how to trust God and obey His Word has literally changed my life.







HUNTING & FISHING

Illinois fall trout season opens Oct. 19 in locations statewide

SPRINGFIELD - The 2024 Illinois fall trout season will open Saturday, Oct. 19 at 60 ponds, lakes, and streams throughout the state.

The early catch-and-release season is scheduled to open Oct. 5 this year. No trout may be taken from any of the stocked sites until the regular fall season opens at 5 a.m. Oct. 19. The daily catch limit is five trout.

All anglers, including those who participate in the early catch-andrelease season, must have an Illinois fishing license and inland trout stamp, which are available at IDNR license and permit locations, including many bait shops, sporting goods stores, and other retail outlets. Check the IDNR website for locations. Fishing licenses and trout stamps can be purchased online with

For information about all site regulations, anglers should contact individual sites that will be stocked with catchable-size trout. Not all sites open at 5 a.m. on opening day. Anglers are reminded to check the opening time of their favorite sites prior to the

The fall trout season offers opportunities for families to get outdoors and enjoy fishing. Online resources are available for taking kids fishing.

IDNR reinstated its catchable trout program in 1994, funded in part by those who use the program through the sale of inland trout stamps. The Illinois Department of Natural Resources stocks more than 80,000 rainbow trout each year in bodies of

water where trout fishing is permitted during the fall season. An additional 80,000 trout are stocked for the spring season, which begins each April. For more information on trout seasons and other Illinois fishing opportunities, visit https://www.ifishillinois.org.

Deer hunting dates set in Illinois

SPRINGFIELD – The Illinois Department of Natural Resources has set dates for the deer archery season, and also the youth, firearm and muzzleloader-only deer hunting and late winter deer seasons in the state. The deer archery season

opened on Oct. 1 and will continue through Jan. 19, 2025. Archery season will be closed during the firearm

The youth firearm season is Oct. 12, 13, 14.

The first firearm deer season is Nov. 22, 23, 24. The second firearm deer season is Dec. 5, 6, 7, 8.

The muzzleloader-only deer season is Dec. 13, 14, 15. Hunters may also use a muzzleloader permit with a muzzleloading rifle during the second firearm season, Dec. 5, 6, 7, 8.

The 2024 Deer Firearm and Muzzleloader lottery drawings are now closed. County-specific permits remaining after the lottery drawings will be available for sale over the counter at license vendors beginning Tuesday, Oct. 15, on a firstcome, first-served basis. Permits will be sold until quotas are exhausted, or until the close of the firearm/

deer per legally authorized either-sex, antlered-only or antlerless-only permit. All either-sex permits and antlered-only permits are subject to the following restriction: No hunter, regardless of the quantity or type of permits in his/her possession, may harvest more than two antlered deer during a year, including the Youth, Archery, Muzzleloader and Firearm seasons. 



either-sex permit after having harvested two antlered deer during a year may only use the permit to harvest an antlerless deer. Subject to this restriction, an either-sex permit holder is allowed to take a deer with or without antlers and an antlered-only permit holder is allowed to take only a deer having at least one antler of a length of three or more inches. An antlerless only permit holder is allowed to take only a deer without antlers or a deer having antlers less than three inches long.





about experiences of a fishing trip A fishing trip is much more than just going to catch

fish. The excitement of getting the boat ready, packing a lunch, going over the checklist, picking out lures for the tackle box, buying worms, etc., is all part of the fun. The fishing experience teaches a child about patience, makes them aware of the sights and sounds of the outdoors, and provides a great sense of accomplishment from baiting a hook to catching that first fish. We all need to take the time to bring our children outside and teach them about taking ownership in caring for the natural environment. Help our Illinois youth get excited about fishing—if you can pass on your knowledge, you will be continuing a great tradition of exploring Illinois lakes and rivers.

Here are some ways to teach young people of all ages to fish and have a successful fishing experience:

Fishing License

Anyone under the age of 16 in Illinois does not need

Note: The adult accompanying a child fishing does not need a fishing license if he/she does not participate in fishing at all. Usually the adult casts, sets the hook, and/or helps the child reel in, in which case, that adult would need a valid Illinois fishing license.

Safety

Many fishing related accidents can be avoided with some forethought. Act on the side of caution, watch over children diligently, and teach by example. Young children should always fish with an adult. When in a boat or canoe, ALWAYS wear a life jacket.

Conservation

Always teach and practice the Anglers' Code of Ethics. Our lakes and rivers belong to everyone and we all must do our part to preserve them for future generations.

Where To Go? Morning trips are best as the fish usually bite better

and it is not too hot. A good place to teach a beginner is from a dock. This provides enough room to show kids how to put their worm on a hook, teach them proper casting, and observe other anglers. Sunfish often hang out around docks, making this a great way to view swimming fish and observe how fish are attracted to a lure.

Child-Sized Equipment

Small hands can handle a kid-sized rod and reel much easier. For young children, toddler to preschool aged, a beginner fishing rod and reel combination can be found in the sporting good area of most department stores at a low price. Do not, however, choose the prepackaged rod sets with comic heroes on them for school-aged children. Instead, choose an ultra-light rod and reel.

The Best Bait

Getting kids excited about fishing usually means actually catching a fish. Fortunately, most kids are happy with any size and kind of catch.


The best luck will usually be with earthworms. Many a fishing adventure begins with digging for your own worms in the garden or collecting them after a good rain, however, a container of worms are easily purchased from the local tackle shop or marina.

If the sunfish are really biting, you can use corn, pieces of a hot dog or even marshmallows.

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



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

to show "Chapter 1" and "Chapter 2" at the Venice Film Festival to raise awareness. The result is that "Chapter 2" will soon be available on Max, the streaming platform owned by Warner Bros. "Chapter 3" began filming in May and should wrap next year.

"Dune: Part Two" grossed \$711.8 million, and its producer/writer/director, Denis Villeneuve, has agreed to make another "Dune" film but emphasized: "...for me, it was really a diptych. It was really a pair of movies that will be the adaption of the first book. ...
