Back for a third time...

No. 4 Amboy beats No. 1 Pawnee 52-8 in semifinal to return to the I8FA State Championship

PAWNEE – Heading into Saturday's Illinois 8-Man Football Association semifinal, the Amboy-Ohio-Football team knew what they had to do.

It started with Pawnee senior running back Carson Wort, who rushed for 495 yards and seven touchdowns the week before and shutting down the play-action pass game of junior quarterback Caden

The Clippers held their defense assignments and ran the offense to a tee as A-L-E won the semifinal 52-8 to advance to the I8FA State Championship Friday at 7 p.m. at Monmouth College.

"It was really awesome to have them not know what we were doing offensively or defensively," said senior running back and linebacker Ed Fry. "We came out firing whether it was a run or a pass. I agree with Quinn from last week, the running backs are a family. We have communication between all of us where we don't even have to talk to communicate. I love my brothers. I've been through everything with them. Defensively, we shut them down. No. 9 couldn't get a run to save his life. We did an awesome.

"We need to win state again. That's the only thing that's going through my head. We're here to win."

Although the running game has been the Clippers bread and butter all year, the first touchdown was scored on a 30-yard pass from senior quarterback Eddie Jones to junior tight end and lineman Rylan McNinch.

McNinch wowed the crowd as he hailed in the pass one handed.

"I knew I had to bring it in because if I brought it in and had room to run, the momentum would go to our side with the first score of the game in a really big game," McNinch said. "We had the momentum on our side right away.

"Our front five kind of dominated up front. When they tried to stop our run offense, we have Eddie. He has a good arm, and we have good receivers. We can pass all day."

The momentum continued to stay on Amboy's side as it took a 22-0 lead with 10:46 in the second quarter behind an 11-yard TD run by senior Brayden Klein and a 78-yard connection between Jones and senior Caleb Yanos.

Wort scored the only Indian points on a 1-yard touch with 7:23 remaining in the first half.

The Clippers didn't back down as the next possession was 15 plays and ended on a 10-yard run by senior Josh McKendry to give the squad a 30-8 lead at halftime.

'My main focus was block No. 9, block No. 9, block No. 9," said senior lineman Caleb Shugars. "We had a really good week of practice. We looked good on all sides. We went out there and got the job done.

"We bounced back from the holding calls. We knew we had to clean it up. We did what we had to do. Our job is not done yet. We still got one more



game against a tough opponent. We have to focus."

After strong defensive stands by both teams, Klein scored on a 1-yard run with 5:59 on the third-quarter clock to give the Clippers a 36-8 lead.

Coach Scott Payne said this is when he knew his team was going to the state championship for the third straight year.

"It's the kids. It's about the players. They're the ones who go on the field and the game," Payne said. "There is an old saying, 'It's not about the X's and O's it's about the Jimmys and Joes. We have some great Jimmys and Joes on our team. I'm so happy and proud

"They were up to the challenge. We challenged them all week long. We told them they have to stop Carson Wort. He's one of the best backs in the state, if not the best. They all stepped up to the challenge. That says a lot about this group of young men."

Protect yourself from seasonal illness

CHICAGO – The Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH) is reminding the public that along with fall, October brings the start of the traditional respiratory virus season. The department is urging Illinoisans to use the proven tools that can safeguard them from illnesses that typically surge during the fall and winter, including COVID-19, flu and RSV. This includes getting vaccinated to protect yourself and your family for those viral diseases if you are eligible.

The Department has upgraded its Seasonal Respiratory Illness Dashboard and has posted two new FAQ documents on its website providing the latest guidance on vaccinations and how to get tested and treated for these seasonal illnesses. In addition, the CDC has created a new Respiratory Illness Data Channel that provides nationwide county specific information that would valuable for anyone planning to travel out of state. "As our public health workers ramp up preparations for the respiratory virus season we know is coming, all of us can play a role in protecting ourselves and reducing the spread of COVID-19 and the flu by getting vaccinated," said Governor JB Pritzker. "So make plans now to get both of those shots and protect yourself from serious illness."

"As we head into fall, the Department of Public Health is closely monitoring this season's respiratory illnesses and so can you with our updated respiratory illness dashboard," said IDPH Director Dr. Sameer Vohra. "Similar to past seasons, we should expect a rise in RSV, COVID-19 and flu cases as the weather cools. Now is a great time to get yourself protected from severe illness with updated vaccines, especially if you are over 65, immunocompromised, or have chronic medical conditions.'

Public health leaders also stress that one of the best ways to reduce transmission of viruses is

to stay home when you are sick to reduce transmission to others. Anyone with respiratory symptoms such as coughing, a runny nose, or fever – should try to self-isolate from others, unless they need to seek medical care. If you cannot self-isolate, wear a well-fitted mask around others.

IDPH officials remind the public that there are effective anti-viral treatments available for COVID-19 and the flu, but they must be started quickly. This is why it is important to get tested if you are feeling symptoms.

For COVID-19, treatment must be prescribed by a healthcare provider and started within 5–7 days after symptoms appear. Treatment is strongly recommended for those who are over 65 or at higher risk for severe illness. Some Illinoisans should be eligible to access free oral antivirals through the Paxcess and Merck Helps programs.

Antiviral treatments for flu are most effective when given within 48 hours of starting to feel ill and are only available by prescription. Older adults, young children, and those who are pregnant or have conditions like diabetes, asthma and heart disease are at risk for complications and should contact a healthcare provider be assessed for the need for treatment as soon as possible.

You can find locations that perform COVID-19 tests in person at no cost near you by using the testing locator for the federal ICATT (Increasing Community Access to Testing) program. In addition, the federal government resumed offering free Covid tests to every household through the covidtests. gov website.

The IDPH respiratory illness dashboard shows that hospital admissions for COVID-19 are currently trending down and are at 1.4% of admissions, according to data as of September 28. Illinois' overall respiratory illness level is listed by the CDC as minimal.

The FDA and CDC have approved new vaccines for this fall for COVID-19 and flu as well as updated who can receive the RSV vaccines. The new Covid vaccines and the new flu shots are recommended for everyone over the age of 6 months. The RSV vaccine is recommended for everyone 75 years and older. But if if you got an RSV shot last winter, you do not need another at this time, according to the CDC. Those in the late stages of pregnancy are advised to get the RSV vaccine designed to protect newborns. Newborns whose mothers have not received the RSV vaccine, should receive nirsevimab between October and March.

Last month, IDPH posted an episode of its podcast "This is Public Health"featuring the state's chief medical officer and the state epidemiologist discussing the outlook for the coming respiratory virus season, the efficacy of vaccines, and prevention measures.

The new vaccines are widely available at pharmacies and through hospitals, and community health clinics. The major pharmacy chains allow you to make an appointment to get a shot online. For help finding a provider of vaccines near you, go

to www.vaccines.gov. For those who don't have healthcare coverage through a private plan, Medicare, or Medicaid, IDPH operates the Vaccines for Children Program, which provides vaccines at no cost for children 18 and under. Adults without insurance have several options. They can check with their local health department or contact a free and charitable clinic or a Community Health Center.

Non-profit security grant program, supplemental notice of funding opportunity available

SPRINGFIELD – The Illinois Emergency Management Agency and Office of Homeland Security (IEMA-OHS) was notified by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), of two grant opportunities for non-profit organizations across Illinois. Available funding for these two grant opportunities for the Fiscal Year (FY) 2024 Nonprofit Security Grant Program National Security Supplemental (NSGP-NSS) is \$210 million nationally.

The FY 2024 Urban Area Nonprofit Security Grant Program National Security Supplemental (NSGP-NSS-UASI) will provide a total of \$105 million nationally to eligible 501(c) (3) organizations who are deemed at high-risk of a potential terrorist attack and are located in one of the FY 2024 UASI-eligible urban areas. The designated urban area for Illinois is Cook

The FY 2024 Statewide Nonprofit Security Grant Program National Security Supplemental (NSGP-NSS-S) will provide a total of \$105

million nationally to eligible 501(c)(3) organizations who are deemed at high-risk of a potential terrorist attack located outside of Cook County.

IEMA-OHS, as the State Administrative Agency, will issue these competitive grants, up to \$200,000, to applicants that are approved by the Grants Program Directorate/FEMA. Eligible non-profit organizations with one site may apply for up to \$200,000 for that site. Eligible non-profit organizations with multiple sites may apply for up to \$200,000 per site, for up to three sites, for a maximum of \$600,000 per sub-applicant, per funding stream. The period of performance is 36 months.

Both NSGP-Urban Area and NSGP-National Security Program funds must be used for security enhancements activities, which can be accomplished through the purchase or installation of security equipment on real property (including buildings and improvements) owned or leased by the non-profit organization, as well as through contracted security

personnel. Security enhancements must be for the location(s) that the nonprofit occupies at the time of the application, and the projects must be fully completed during the three-year performance period.

Complete applications from eligible nonprofit organizations must be submitted no later than 5:00 p.m. CDT on Wednesday, December

Firearm hunting season is upon us

SPRINGFIELD -

The Illinois Department of Natural Resources has set dates for the deer archery season, and also the youth, firearm and muzzleloader-only deer hunting and late winter deer seasons in the state.

The deer archery season opened on Oct. 1 and will continue through Jan. 19, 2025. Archery season will be closed during the firearm seasons.

The first firearm deer season is Nov. 22, 23, 24. The second firearm deer season is Dec. 5, 6, 7, 8.

The muzzleloader-only deer season is Dec. 13, 14, 15. Hunters may also use a muzzleloader permit with a muzzleloading rifle during the second firearm season, Dec. 5, 6, 7, 8.

The later winter deer hunting season dates are Dec. 26-29 and Jan. 17-19, 2025. Hunting hours are one-half hour before sunrise to one-half hour after sunset.

The bag limit is one deer per legally authorized either-sex, antlered-only or antlerless-only permit. All either-sex permits and antlered-only permits are subject to the following restriction: No hunter, regardless of the quantity or type of permits in his/her possession, may harvest more than two antlered deer during a year, including the Youth, Archery, Muzzleloader and Firearm seasons. For purposes of this bag limit,

deer seasons are considered to be in the same year if their opening dates fall within the same 12-month period that begins July 1. A hunter in possession of an either-sex permit after having harvested two antlered deer during a year may only use the permit to harvest an antlerless deer. Subject to this restriction, an either-sex permit holder is allowed to take a deer with or without antlers and an antlered-only permit holder is allowed to take only a deer having at least one antler of a length of three or more inches. An antlerless only permit holder is allowed to take only a deer without antlers or a deer having antlers less than three inches long.



Success levels change in time as every team goes through periods of greatness and rebuilding.


Hopefully it never happens to the Clippers, but time






desk docent who assists the more than 350,000 visitors who stop by the visitors' center annually.


