## Graves-Hume Public Library offers large selection of books, much more

In the last five years, the Graves-Hume Public Library in Mendota has shifted in a different direction than before.

Graves-Hume Director, Emily Kofoid, and Graves-Hume Youth Service Manager, Carolynn Ohlendorf, have put an emphasis on strengthening the library's connection to the community, added more programs for patrons of all ages, revamped the youth department to encourage more free and playtime, partnered with local organizations, and have made it a priority to show the public the library is a community center.

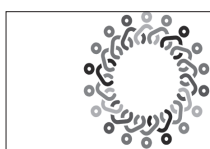
"We don't just offer books; we offer so much more. Our programs bring people together that can make connections, a welcoming space for all," Kofoid said. "I love to see moms, dads, grandparents bringing their kids to programs. Not only is this a great learning environment for the kids, these parents can also connect."

"I remember being a new mom and not knowing anyone. I needed a place to let my kids play but also, I — as a person — needed adult connections. And libraries did this for me! A free, safe place for my kids to learn and for me to have an outlet other than staying home."

Graves-Hume Public Library strives to serve the community as an informational, recreational, and cultural agency, providing educational resources, recreational needs through print and non-print materials, and distinctive programming.

The library offers an environment that enhances individual and community life by providing the resources and services needed by our diverse community.

Partnerships have been

formed with the library and the Mendota Area Senior Center, Mendota YMCA, University Extension Office, Friends of the Library, Nightengales, Mendota Lions Club, Meridian Grain, City of Mendota, Mendota Rotary Club, and Starved Rock Wood Products.

These partnerships, and more, help fund special programming, especially summer reading.

For more advanced reading, Kofoid started an adult monthly book club in 2018.

The book club has been a success as many members come to the discussions on Kofoid's book selection held at 1 p.m. and 6 p.m. on the third Tuesday of every month. The club reads a wide range of books as it dives into challenging pieces that make readers think outside of the box. The discussions allow the members to meet new people and to learn new perspectives on each new, diverse topic.

Youth Services offers monthly programs for all ages from birth to tweens. The LEGO club has been a huge hit. For kids in first through eighth grade, Graves-Hume supplies LEGOs to let the kids let their creativity run wild.

All of the library's programs are free, but pre-registration is requested.

Except for Summer Reading, the programs do not require a library card and are open to anyone. To get a library card, you must live within the Library District. If you live outside of the

district, it is a yearly cost per family.

Summer Reading is Graves-Hume Library's biggest event. The summer book spectacular runs for four weeks in July.

This year's theme is 'Level Up At Your Library,' which has the library's biggest lineup of programs to date!

Each week, there will be programs for different age groups that also include crafts, stories, songs, and more. And of course, reading challenges for all ages.

Fridays in July are Family Fun Nights where everyone is welcomed. Weather permitting, they will be outside in the back-lawn area.

Kofoid and Ohlendorf are excited to create programs around the summer reading theme. Through the programs

in July, the theme: Level Up At Your Library will be explored. The library will be exploring a range of free activities for children, teens, and adults to encourage and support a love of reading and to remind all that libraries are not just a space for knowledge, they are a space for fun!

Participants can win prizes for reaching their reading goals.

Play is one of the ways we learn to relate to others, to think in new ways, and to foster friendships, new and old. This summer the library is excited to discover new ways to play at the library and to showcase games in different ways.

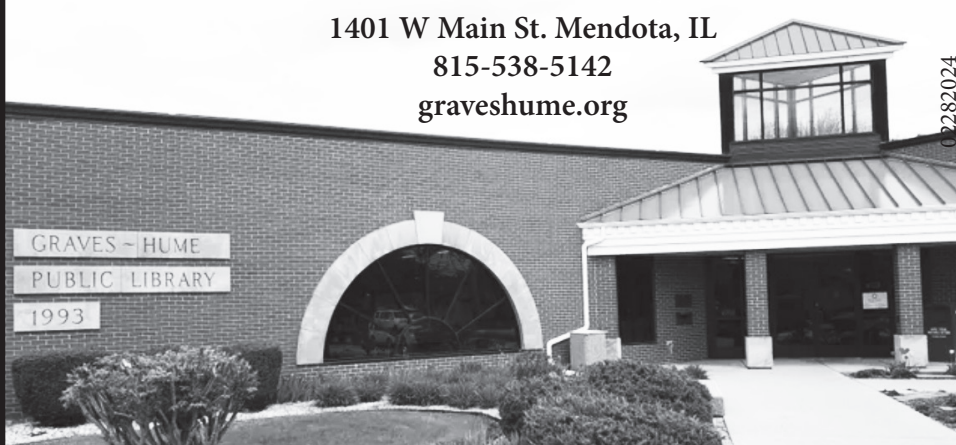

Improving employee morale can start with various techniques to help staff feel more appreciated.

Employee appreciation ideas staff will love

Embracing strategies to manage work-related stress

Work-related stress is a significant issue for millions of professionals. Recent research from the management system experts at Moodle found that 66 percent of American employees are experiencing a form of burnout in 2025. Stress also is an issue for professionals working north of the United States border, as data from Gallup indicates 49 percent of Canadian workers report feeling daily work-related stress.

Stress is sometimes considered a good thing, and medical professionals even note that acute stress can help to sharpen focus and compel some to fulfill their full professional potential. However, the Mayo Clinic reports chronic stress has been linked to a host of serious health

problems, including anxiety, depression, digestive issues, and heart disease.

The American Institute of Stress notes that work-related stress is a major stressor for professionals. Embracing strategies to manage work-related stress can help professionals reduce their risk for the serious health conditions that can be brought on by chronic stress.

• Monitor your stressors. The American Psychological Association advises professionals to maintain a journal for a week or two in which they document situations that are triggering stress. When documenting stressors, also jot down your responses, feelings and details about the environment, including the people around you, when stress kicked in. Keeping a

journal can help identify the sources of stress and determine if there are any patterns that trigger it.

• Embrace healthy responses to stress. The APA notes that exercise, yoga or any other form of physical activity are helpful and healthy responses to stress. Too often individuals lean into unhealthy responses, such as drinking alcohol and/or eating unhealthy foods after a stressful workday. But the Cleveland Clinic notes that relying on alcohol as a coping mechanism for stress only exacerbates the feelings of depression and anxiety that stress can trigger.

• Establish boundaries between your professional and personal life. The APA notes that the digital era has led many professionals to

feel pressured to be available around-the-clock. But work-life boundaries can be vital to combatting career-related stress. Turning off notifications from your work email account at the end of the workday can help to establish a work-life boundary. In addition, resist any temptation to check emails before going to bed, as doing so might trigger stress that makes it hard to fall asleep.

• Use your personal/vacation time. The 2024 Sorbet PTO (Paid Time Off) Report found that 62 percent of professionals did not use all of their PTO in 2023, which marked a 5 percent increase in unused PTO from the year prior. The APA notes that time off is linked to reduced stress as well as lower rates of heart disease, depression



and anxiety. In addition, professionals may or may not be surprised to learn that time off has been linked to improved productivity.

Work is a significant

source of stress for millions of professionals. Embracing healthy ways to combat work-related stress can benefit your personal and professional life.

Mendota has such a rich history it can share memories, famous people, inventions, equipment, and town milestones in three different locations as the Hume-Carnegie Museum is at 901 Washington St., the Union Depot Railroad Museum is at 783 Main St., and the Breaking the Prairie Museum is at 684 8th St. Hume-Carnegie and the Union Depot are open 1-4 p.m. on Saturdays and Sundays while Breaking the Prairie opens by appointment or visitors can look through the large glass windows. The Historical Society recently purchased 907 and 909 Washington Street, the former Walter Bros. Plumbing building, to use as a headquarters and office space. The Union Depot Railroad Museum features a head model of the Zephyr train, above, which famously traveled through Mendota. Exhibits at Hume-Carnegie include Wild Bill Hickok, Bill Brown, Helen E. Hokinson, and Black Bros. Breaking the Prairie showcases a collection of antique tools and early farm equipment used during the settlement of the area. The museums and the society are headed by President Bryon Walters and Executive Director Alex Revzan. ## Lions Club conducts community events, donates for many projects

The Mendota Lions Club is in existence to serve the local community.

The Lions Club kept up its commitment to serving the community with numerous projects and donations in 2024. The club's top donation last year was a \$10,000 contribution to the Mendota YMCA for sponsorship of its After-School program.

A donation of \$5,700 was made by the club to purchase two new batting cages for the Little League field that were damaged by a storm. The club helped the city of Mendota purchase two new sets of goals for the Lake Mendota soccer fields with a donation of \$3,400. Also, the Lions made a \$2,000 donation for Madrick's Scholarship.

Other recent donations from the Lions Club include basketball hoops wrapped with protective padding at Northbrook School and Apple Orchard Park; BB Gun Club targets and build-out at Mendota Elks Lodge (opening Fall 2025); repair of glasses for a Mendota High School student; \$1,000 to Mendota Booster Club; \$500 to local FFA club; honors banquet for MHS honor roll students; books for Mendota Chamber Christmas event; sponsorship of boy and girl to the Boys and Girls State;



sponsor a queen candidate in Sweet Corn Festival pageant.

The Mendota Lions Club has donated funds for many other projects and organizations in recent years, including city park bench, Lake Mendota Park picnic table materials, Horizon House Christmas gifts for Mendota residents, Mendota bowlers, Mendota Booster Club, Mendota Operation Elf, eyeglasses, Mendota High School scholarship and Mendota Area Christian Food Pantry.

Each year, the Lions Club sponsors free events for local youth. Among the annual activities are a fishing rodeo at Lake Mendota; Christmas break kids' bowling and pizza party at the Mendota Elks; grade school end-of-year picnic; eighth grade end-of-year pizza party; hot dogs, hot chocolate and books at the Mendota Cham-

ber of Commerce Christmas event; and medals awarded for academic achievement at the Mendota High School Honors Banquet.

The Lions Club has several fundraisers during the year. The Paul Bunyan breakfast is held in March. When the warmer months arrive, Lions Club members make all of the preparations to cook up and serve their world-famous corn dogs, which has been a club specialty for decades. The delectable delights can be found in late June during the Mendota Chamber of Commerce Fireworks Show, in August at the Sweet Corn Festival and over Labor Day weekend at the Tri-County Fair. The club also holds an Octoberfest event in late October.

The Mendota Lions Club meets the second and fourth Tuesday of the month at 7 p.m. at the Mendota VFW.
