Farm Toy & Antique Tractor Show is ...almost upon us

SUBLETTE – Whether rain, sleet, snow, or sun, the 43rdAnnualSubletteAntique Tractor & Toy Show will take over the streets of the Village of Sublette from 9 a.m.-3 p.m. both Saturday and Sunday, March 15-16.

Anthony Morgan, the first-year president of the show's board of directors, anticipates a similar event to those of the past.

However, his fingers are crossed for the best possible weather.

"Last year was chilly, but there were thousands of people in and out of the buildings," said Morgan, who may be a new president but has been on the board since 2020. "Talking to the vendors, they said they did pretty well even though there wasn't a lot of people on the streets. They were in the buildings patronizing the vendors.

"Being the show is in March, you never know what the weather is going to bring. It could rain. It could be sunny. There has been snow before and we had to clean up the roads before the show. It could be windy. It could be a nice day.

"You never know what you're going to get."

As usual, there will be local vendors and there will be vendors from the surrounding area and surrounding states.

Toys will be presented in five different buildings (Sublette Community Building, Ellice Dinges Center, Main Street Repair, Jacoby Building, and the Sublette Elevator) antique tractors will be outdoors as well as a semi-tractor display, and there will be a train display set up by Ethan Orzech at Orzech Auto Truck & Tow LLC, located at 301 N. Richmond St. in Sublette.

"There are people who

have new stuff and a lot of the other vendors have the old, vintage models," Morgan said. "We have some who make grain bin setups and can make you whatever you want while you're at the show. There are a lot of different displays.

"There are craft vendors, too, where people will have operator manuals and books, and those kinds of things."

This year, there are two featured tractor companies in the Oliver Farm Equipment Company (1929-1960) and Minneapolis-Moline(1929-1963).

Both companies were created separately by the same process, mergers of other companies as Oliver was constructed of four companies and Minneapolis-Moline was founded with three companies coming together.

Oliver and Minneapolis-Moline were both purchased by the White Motor Corporation in the 1960s.

Sublette moves forward with Sidewalk Replacement Plan

SUBLETTE-The February Village of Sublette Committee Meeting was short and sweet Monday, Feb. 10 as three trustees and the president formed the minimum of four people to authorize a reported council.

Many items were discussed including a recent committee meeting which took place to move the Sidewalk Replacement Plan forward "There was a committee meeting with an engineer from Willett, Hofmann & Associates. He let us know where he was with the sidewalk plan," Village of Sublette Board President John Stenzel said. "We're using the Rebuild Illinois funds, Motor Fuel Tax, and a \$25,000 grant on West Main Street. The meeting went well and he was authorized to submit the plan to the Illinois Department of Transportation for approval. "It needs to be bid out and approved by July so we don't lose the federal funding we have received. We're taking the next step to getting it done." With a 4-0 vote, it was approved to use the

Motor Fuel Tax funds for the sidewalk project.

The Richmond, Virginia, Reeve Street Project is on hold because the ground is frozen thanks to Mother Nature's winter cold front delaying domesticated digging. The weather is also putting a pause on the investigation of the Water Service Line Inventory, which Sublette received the first installement, \$15,000, to begin.

Lee County hasn't validated a firm date, but the county is going to resurface West Main Street between March and July. See Sidewalk page A9


"But it'll be good because there are a lot of talented people here and a lot of good ones coming up after us. This is a great play to end on."





"They don't make either tractor anymore. I've worked on both of them before. We have different companies on a rotation, and it was their turn,' said Morgan, who grew up around International Harvester tractors but isn't partial to any specific brand. "We put Oliver and Minneapolis-Moline together because both companies were formed around the same time, and then were bought by the same company.

"We have so many different manufactures and companies people collect, so every year we try to represent a different one. We move down the line and then recirculate them. People collect the tractors that their grandparents and parents farmed with, so it's sentimental."

The Sublette Antique Tractor & Toy Show will provide a free shuttle service to each of the buildings and there will be a Pedal Pull for kids.

Nikki Beyer, RN, given DAISY Award



Illinois lawmakers share their thoughts on last week's sentencing of former Illinois House Speaker Michael Madigan

State Representative Brad Fritts (R-Dixon)

DIXON–Former Illinois House Speaker Michael Madigan was found guilty on 11 counts of conspiracy, bribery, and wire fraud.

In response, State Representative Brad Fritts (R-Dixon) released the following statement:

"Today, justice was finally served for the people of Illinois who suffered for decades under the unethical rule of Former House Speaker Michael Madigan. This verdict is a stark reminder of what happens when corrupt, unethical behavior runs rampantin our state government.

"Unfortunately, the people of Illinois have become used to the pay-to-play corrupt system that has plagued our state government for years. My message to the people of Illinois is this: we are done playing games and submitting to the corrupt practices of the past. We do not have to accept years of corruption and mismanagement as the norm. We can, and will, demand better of those elected to serve the people of our state."

Rep. Fritts has previously sponsored multiple ethics reform bills, including a bill to impose term limits on legislative leadership roles.

Rep. Fritts concluded, "This guilty verdict has made me more determined than ever to deliver ethics reform to the people of our state. There are dozens of common-sense bills that have been filed by House Republicans, yet the majority party refuses to call any for a vote. In the wake of the guilty verdict of the patriarch of the Illinois Democratic party, it is finally time to pass ethics reform."

I'm refereeing summer ball where the National Anthem is played before a long day of competition, whether it's baseball, softball, volleyball, or basketball.

About four or five years ago, I became an all-around journalist and now add news events to my schedule along sports. This includes multiple Veterans Day and Memorial Day presentations every year; plus city council, Lions Club, and VFW events.

I'm not listing all of this to be narcissistic or 'Hey, look at me, 'but just to share where my brain went when I was asked what song I've heard the most. All of this hit me at once, which made it easy for me to say, 'The National Anthem.'

Looking back, Idon'tremember ever pushing play to "The Star-Spangled Banner" on my phone, iPad, iPod, CD player, cassette player, or dropping the needle on a record player.

But without a shadow of a doubt, if I was tallying, the national anthem would have the most.


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
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
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LOCAL/STATE NEWS Pritzker calls \$55.2 billion budget 'Responsible and balanced'

Warns state of the state audience, President Trump policies could reroute Illinois' budget

SPRINGFIELD — An improved revenue forecast is helping ease pressure on state finances as Gov. JB Pritzker calls for tightened spending to balance the budget without tax increases on everyday Illinoisans.

During his annual state of the state and budget address on Wednesday, Pritzker called for a roughly 3% spending increase to \$55.2 billion in fiscal year 2026 that will be supported by a similar increase in state revenue to \$55.5 billion.

The plan factors in a better-than-expected economic outlook for the com-

ing fiscal year after the governor's office originally projected a multi-billion-dollar shortfall in November. Pritzker also proposed a significant spending reduction compared to the November estimate while still increasing spending over current-year levels.

But administration officials also warned that the state is in large part at the whim of President Donald Trump's onslaught of federal policy changes.

The governor's plan assumes a \$173 million increase in federal funding, though Pritzker named several enacted or feared Trump policies that could alter estimates, including tariffs, food safety deregulation and potential health care cuts.

The governor called his proposal "responsible and balanced," pointing out that it doesn't raise taxes on Illinoisans, though he did propose a tax hike on certain casino profits.

"If there's one thing I've learned as governor, there are no magic bean fixes," Pritzker said. "And each year there's some difficulty that requires us to work hard to overcome it.'

Part of the spending plan includes significant changes to immigrant health care programs, including eliminating a program for low-income noncitizens living in the U.S. without legal permission between ages 42 and 64.

Ultimately, lawmakers and the governor will have to come to an agreement on a spending plan by the end of May. But the governor's opening salvo could meet opposition from Democratic lawmakers in the General Assembly - especially members of the Illinois Legislative Latino Caucus - due to what it doesn't fund.

"All of us have been hearing that it was going to be a tough budget year. I think that we expected there to be some things in the budget that we weren't going to be happy with," Sen. Karina Villa, D-West Chicago, said. "But I think completely removing a program is not anything that we were expecting."

What do Illinois senators, representatives think of the proposed state budget?

State Senator Li Arellano (R-Dixon)

SPRINGFIELD – State Senator Li Arellano, Jr (R-Dixon) has released the below statement following the State of the State and State Budget Address:

"Today's budget proposal highlights ongoing fiscal mismanagement and the troubling financial path our state is on. Since taking office, Governor Pritzker has made history by passing the largest budgets in Illinois' history.

"At a time when families across our state are tightening their belts to make ends meet, this administration is doubling down on even more spending. More spending means more taxes, and what the

Governor failed to mention in his speech-but included in his proposal-is a tax hike on Illinois job creators. These are just more ways to take money out of Illinoisans' pockets.

"I was encouraged to hear the Governor listening to Republicans in his proposal to rolling back free healthcare for non-citizens. I will be closely monitoring this proposal in making sure this is more than an empty promise, ensuring our state's taxpayers aren't left footing the bill for these services."

"In the months ahead, we must focus on real solutions-property tax relief, safer streets, better schools, and meaningful economic growth."

State Representative Brad Fritts (R-Dixon)

SPRINGFIELD – Following today's State of the State Address, State Representative Brad Fritts (R-Dixon) released the following statement.

"Governor Pritzker's State of the State Address was nothing more than political theater filled with partisan rhetoric, empty promises, and a bizarre hyper-focus on national politics. We have plenty of issues to focus on here in Illinois first, such as our \$425 million deficit and rampant crime.

"Despite his smoke and mirror attempts at portraying our budget as balanced, it is anything but. While the rest of Illinois cuts back and tightens their belts to deal with inflation, the rising cost of living, and the growing tax burden, Governor Pritzker and Illinois Democrats refuse to reign in their spending habits. It's long overdue for the majority party to start making budget cuts the same way hardworking Illinoisans have been forced to do for years.

"Yet, what I find most reprehensible about the Governor's remarks today was when he likened Republicans to Nazis. Amboy advances to regional semifinal with 64-50 victory over Hiawatha

AMBOY – With the Amboy boys basketball team being a host for regionals for the 2023-24 season, the squad wants to do one thing, represent the Clippers the best way it can.

The first step of the mission was taken on Monday, Feb. 24 when No. 9-seeded Amboy defeated No. 11 Hiawatha, 64-50, in an IHSA Class 1A Amboy Regional Quarterfinal.

"Since we found out the regional was going to be here, we've been really excited about it," said first-year Amboy coach Tyson Powers. "We wanted to make sure we got to the semifinal and really represent ourselves on our home floor at our regional.

"I told the guys after the game this is our first playoff win since the 2017-18 season. It's been 2,500-some days. I'm really proud of these guys. But we're not satisfied. We're here to win the whole thing. We're going to give it our best effort."

Senior Eddie Jones and junior Ezra Parker tied for a game high scoring 22 points each as the duo combined for 44 of the Clippers 64 points.

They were helped as senior Quinn Leffelman knocked down the only two Amboy 3-pointers in the quarterfinal and finished with eight points, junior Rylan McNinch tallied six, sophomore Colt McCoy finished with four, and freshman Bryson Deery made two free throws.

"We know we're going to have a size advantage most nights," Powers said. "We've struggled to shoot the ball from the perimeter, but we've shot 50 percent from the floor for most of the year. We know when we pound the ball inside, good things are going to happen to us.

"Eddie is athletic enough in the middle of a zone. We have a highlow going with Eddie and Ezra right now and it worked tonight. Hopefully, they continue to play well. We need them to play well to win the next game."

The Clippers jumped out to a 21-14 lead over the Hawks after the first quarter, held a 39-25 advantage at halftime, and were ahead 49- 37 after the first three frames.

Yes, scoring helps win games, but the Amboy coach knows his team also has to rely on a strong defense to continue to advance in the regional.

"I thought our pressure was the difference. We've done a really good job in the last four games of playing an extended 1-3-1 and getting guys into traps and getting deflections," Powers said. "Hopefully, we can capitalize on it a little more. We have to continue to keep our defensive pressure up and do it on a higher level on Wednesday."

Amboy (13-18) will play No. 2 Annawan (21-6) at 6 p.m. Wednesday, Feb. 26 in an IHSA Class 1A Amboy Regional Semifinal. The winner will play the winner of No. 7 St. Bede (14-18) and No. 3 Forreston (20-12). The Clippers entered the postseason winning two of their last three contests, which were all in the Northwest Upstate Illini Conference South Division.

The Clippers defeated Polo, 51-50, on Tuesday, Feb. 18 and Milledgeville, 44-37, on Thursday, Feb. 20, while falling to Fulton, 53-44, on Friday, Feb. 21.

Jones, who finished with a team-high 21 points, used the charity strip to the best of his ability against Polo as he sank a free throw with .6 seconds remaining on the clock to give Amboy the one-point Northwest Upstate Illini Conference South Division win.

McNinch scored 12, Parker had seven, Leffelman added five, and Deery pitched in four.

Gus Mumford had a game high 22 points for the Marcos as he knocked down five 3-pointers.

Against Milledgeville, Parker led the way with 14 points, Jones and Deery added 10 apiece, McNinch had eight, and McCoy finished with two. In the loss to Fulton, Jones scored a game high 16 points, Parker had 11, McCoy seven, Deery six, and Leffelman four.

However, Pertell came back, and Amboy had only lost three games since November coming into the postseason.




