Mendota city officials sworn in, fiscal year '26 budgets approved

MENDOTA - Newly-elected officials took the oath of office and fiscal year budgets were passed at the May 5 meeting of the Mendota City Council.

City attorney Mike Guilfoyle conducted the swearing-in ceremony for the city officials voted into office at the April 1 election. They included Mayor David Boelk, City Clerk Emily McConville, Aldermen Kyle Kim, Leo Hochstatter and Jim Fitzpatrick, and Alderwomen Vicki Johnson.

ALERMANIC REPORTS

Alderman Fitzpatrick reported on engineering agreements for Eighth Street and Ninth Avenue bridge projects. The agreements will be formally acted upon at the next regular council meeting.

As a formality, the council acknowledged the Safe Routes to School award concurrence of D. Construction from Coal City in the amount of \$247,454. Work will consist of the removal and replacement of various sidewalks within the city.

In other action from Fitzpatrick's report,

the council approved a resolution for street closures for the annual Sweet Corn Festival in August and agreed to a request from the Mendota YMCA to use Lake Mendota Park for a Showcase Truck Show on Saturday, July 26 from 10 a.m.-4 p.m. in conjunction with its adult soccer league that concludes on July 26.

Alderman John Holland presented the FY26 budgets. The General Fund budget revenue is projected at \$10,387,670 and expenses are estimated at \$10,368,120 for a surplus of \$19,550.

Alderman Jay Miller shared a request from the Mendota Area Chamber of Commerce for a liquor license to hold a beer garden, which was accepted by the council.

Alderwoman Johnson introduced members of the Live Well Mendota group, which gave a presentation to the council. The group is an offshoot of the Drug Prevention Committee that was established after Mendota received a \$1.9 million grant in late 2023

□ Prescription Drug Take Back among happenings on May 13

MENDOTA – In 2023, Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration rebranded National Prevention Week to further provide evidence-based and accessible resources to facilitate collective action.

The City of Mendota hopped aboard the idea and became part of SAMHSA's grant program and will use the funds to educate and assist residents with events, activities, and guest speakers on Tuesday, May 13.

"The City of Mendota received a Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration's Partnerships for Success Grant in 2023," said Mendota Project Director Annie Short. "Each year, as our Live Well Mendota group grows, it gives us opportunities to grow National Prevention Week.

"This year, we were excited to receive a phone call from State Representative Bradley Fritts to once again do the Prescription Drug Take Back event. Although we have Take Back boxes at CVS and the Mendota Police Department and the hospital, OSF Saint Paul, does take prescriptions back also, it's nice to do this during the prevention event."

The Prescription Drug Take Back is from 4-6 p.m. on May 13 and features a drive-thru drop off at the Mendota Civic Center parking lot featuring Fritts.

There are no questions, no judgments, just the opportunity to get drugs out of homes because research has proven the first place or first time for the misuse of drugs



happens at the home. Hidden in Plain Sight is

an adult only event taking place from 4-6 p.m. inside the Mendota Civic Center.

"This is a great opportunity for parents to test their detective skills. There are a lot of products out there now that are easily able to hide drugs," Short said. "Not to alarm parents, but it's an opportunity to educate them and give them a sense of what to look for. We don't want kids using or misusing drugs, and being a parent can be very difficult when it comes to this.

"This event will give them a mock bedroom to see if they can find all the areas where drugs could be hidden."

After Hidden in Plain Sight, two guest speakers will present.

At 6 p.m., Special Agent Greg Czaczkowski will share current drug use trends among youth and how drugs are being sold to prevent usage among the youth.

At 7 p.m., BeSure Consulting will discuss how parents can monitor, manage, and keep children safe online and on mobile devices.

"We're excited to have

both of our speakers to discuss drug prevention. They'll share what to look for and the understanding of how drugs are getting into the hands of our kids," Short said. "Also, with our social media speaker, we recognize it has to be difficult for a parent these days to know how to protect their children while also letting them be independent, especially when it comes to the internet. "The speaker will help

are the speaker will help parents find a way to monitor social media without them feeling like they're hovering over their kids."

Short and the City of Mendota are excited to host the National Prevention Week programing to assist Mendota residents. And because guest speakers and Rep. Fritts care as well.

"It shows we're all concerned and getting involved in preventing our youth from using drugs," Short said. "Having these opportunities and the grant to pay for speakers to come in is nice because having the national experts, who can give other insight beyond what happens in Mendota is helpful to the cause."

Food Truck Mania set to

MENDOTA-Reimagine Mendota brought a new concept to eating out in Mendota when it began Food Truck Mania two years ago.

The event has been so successful it has become the biggest fundraiser for the pavilion project.

It also outgrew its location.

"We didn't have the space to continue having Food Truck Mania on Main Street," said Reimagine Mendota Secretary Vicki Johnson. "When we put our survey out, people said it was hard to have the food trucks lined up so long because they had to walk all the way down and back to decide what they wanted.



"We talked about still having the food trucks on Main Street and closing a street to make the walk shorter, but due to the traffic, we decided it wasn't the best idea."

This year, Food Truck Mania is moving to Illinois Avenue between Jefferson Street and Monroe Street.

This location gives Food Truck Mania – 4-8 p.m. the second and fourth Mondays every month starting May 12 and ending Oct. 27 – a

MENDOTA – After a few months of covering the windows and carrying wood and saws in and out of its doors, the Coffee Barn has its windows uncovered and coffee and donuts are now leaving with customers.

The Coffee Barn, located at 701 Illinois Avenue in Mendota, had its soft open May 1 and plans to have a grand opening in the coming weeks.

Majority owners Sean Arteaga and Humberto Garcia, as well as general manager and co-owner Janaya Garcia, are excited to officially bring the Coffee Barn to Mendota.

"The idea was thought of by me and Humberto when we went and looked at the building," said Arteaga. "We liked the space and thought it would be cool for a coffee shop. Janaya and her husband, Lucas (Humberto's brother), are big coffee people, too. They wanted to be involved, and Janaya knowing coffee and what she is doing, it worked out well for everyone in a partnership."

"It's two buddies who have been friends forever, 20 years, and came together on a business concept. We brought it to life and brought Janaya in the mix to create the Coffee Barn. It took longer than expected. Humberto and I purchased the building, and it needed more work than we anticipated. We basically remodeled the entire building with new electrical, plumbing, and renovated the barn."

The Coffee Barn is open 6 a.m.-2:30 p.m. seven days a week, but could change after business trends set in.

The barn currently offers coffee, lattes, pastries, donuts, and cinnamon rolls with additional breakfast and lunch option in the mix such as breakfast sandwiches, bagels, and paninis.

Seating is available upstairs and downstairs with Wi-Fi available. A library is coming soon with the options to buy books or read an in-house selection while at the Coffee Barn.

Arteaga and the Garcias plan to host pop-up events with other local business owners and rent the building for parties and gatherings.

"With the City of Mendota and Reimagine Mendota putting in the effort to revitalize Mendota, we saw it as a great opportunity to buy the building and bring something cool to Mendota," Arteaga said. "It's downtown, next door to First State Bank and the Mendota Reporter, plus we're right across the street from the city building.

"It made sense to bring a new, cool coffee spot to that exact location. People can come and hang out, relax, and socialize."

Although the ownership group wanted to open the Coffee Barn as soon as it took a look at the building, they had to be patient.

Previously Jerry's Flower Barn owned by Jerry Prokuski,

who passed away April 28, 2024, they wanted to give the building the same tender, loving, care, Jerry would.

"It was Jerry's Flower Barn forever and everyone in town knew the building as Jerry's Flower Barn," Arteaga said. "We wanted to keep the name to give respect to him, so that's why we named it the Coffee Barn. We wanted to keep the building in the same barn fashion rather than changing it 100 percent.


"We have some pieces from the flower barn that we kept. There is some open shelving from an old bench we broke down. We just wanted to keep some of his stuff around to pay respect."

This program is ideal for ages 10-plus, teens, adults, and seniors.



Pressure can foods safely this summer with free test from U of I Extension

OTTAWA – To ensure safety in the home canning process, pressure canner dial gauges should be tested once per year. This canning season, University of Illinois Extension is offering free testing of dial gauge pressure canners at your local Extension office. Over time, the accuracy of a dial gauge can become inaccurate. If the pressure is lower than recommended, the internal temperature of the food will not be high enough to kill harmful bacteria.

Register or stop at your local University of Illinois Extension office on a pressure canner testing day. Lids and gauges can also be dropped off prior to the testing day, and we will call you to pick them up at your convenience when offices are open.

This presentation will be at 7 p.m. at the Bureau County Genealogical Society, 629 S. Main St., in Princeton. The public is invited to attend this free presentation.



IVCC Board approves bid for 2025 renovations

OGLESBY-The Illinois Valley Community College Board of Trustees launched a multimillion-dollar renovation project to improve lab and testing areas on campus.

On April 16, the Board accepted a bid from Vissering Construction Co., Streator, in the amount of \$3.8 million for 2025 campus renovations

Work is expected to begin this summer on creating new space on the College's lower level, where a microbiology lab will be relocated, making it independent of other lab areas and improving safety for students.

The Assessment Center will also be relocated and renovated to include advanced features and technologies.

Additionally, as part of the renovation project, a corridor near the cafeteria will be redesigned and new seating options will be created in the cafeteria space.

In other action, the Board welcomed 2025-2026 student trustee Danica Scoma of Utica and recognized outgoing student trustee Emma Garretson for her service.

Outgoing trustees were recognized for their service on the board. Dr. Amy Boyles served eight years and Jane Goetz served 12 years.

In her monthly report, President Dr. Tracy Morris noted

· Students have been active in supporting their classmates by volunteering at the Eagles Peak Food Pantry. Nora Villareal's English Composition students have donated items, unloaded deliveries, organized shelves, and greeted students. Project Success students volunteer monthly, unloading a delivery truck, unboxing goods, and stocking shelves. In the first quarter of this year, more than 1,400 people in 182 households received food pantry supplies. That number included 182 children.


In other action, the Board: · Approved a proposal from the IT Department to purchase equipment for a technology refresh at a cost not to exceed \$206,000.

· Learned of the resignations of welding instructor Christian Carboni, Career and Technical Programs instructor Michael Furlan and Financial Aid Advisor Louis Lukacsy, and the retirements of maintenance employee Mark Quincer, administrative assistant Marlene Merkel, speech and theater instructor David Kuester, and psychology instructor Richard Mangold.

IVCC alum documents local theater legend's personal and professional impact on Illinois Valley

OGLESBY - Reid Tomasson had crossed paths with Jim Jewell often, but it was not until he read the writing on the wall that he imagined how he and the area theater

legend could share a stage. Last year, Tomasson be-

and memories for his latest film project showcasing Jewell's life and art and his lasting impact on the Illinois Valley. The feature-length documentary carries an intriguing title: "Thank You Jim Jewell for the Use of Your Piano.'

Jewell died in 1994, long before Tomasson was born, so they never met. Yet their paths intersected notably at Illinois Valley Community College, where Jewell taught speech from 1968-1994. Tomasson, who graduated in 2021, said his parents relocated to the area when his dad, Cory, succeeded Jewell on the faculty.

"It is crazy to think about, that we might not have moved here, and I would not have been at IVCC and Stage 212. I owe so much in my life to Jim, and I wanted to repay that," Tomasson said.

Hooked on the story-telling power since seeing the thriller "Jaws" as a boy, Tomasson commandeered the family camcorder to create horror, action or comedy films in his neighborhood. An IVCC film appreciation class introduced him to fine points of lighting and sound, while a chance venture recording the College's virtual stage productions in 2020 shaped his editing skills.

In 2023, Tomasson gathered up his Columbia College film and TV production degree and went to work as production manager at La Salle's Stage 212, where Jewell had performed, directed, served on the management board and eventually endowed the institution, which named the

auditorium after him. As a boy growing up

performing with Stage 212, Tomasson knew the name but discovered when he read a plaque on the Wall of Honor that there was more to Jewell than an auditorium. He had written a play and a book.

Tomasson, who enjoys reading play scripts, borrowed a copy from Stage 212's business manager, Natalie Smigel. Jewell's image - as a performer and as a local hero - sharpened.

"So many things hit a chord for me and made me feel like there had to be more to his story. I realized a lot of people who knew Jim recalled he was one of their favorite people, but you didn't hear about his life," Tomasson said.

In 2024, as part of his quest to fill in the gaps, Tomasson re-staged the one-man monologue that Jewell had debuted on La Salle's stage decades earlier. "Milo Lookingale" stimulated awareness of the documentary project and uncapped sources of Jewell stories.

"What stood out in the stories is that people felt he was the best person in their lives - a charming beacon of happiness bringing other people up. They counted him among their favorite teachers. Jim had been a face without a personality to me, someone I had only seen on a plaque. I am getting to know him. He lives through the stories!"

People keep presenting new memories of Jewell, tidbits they consider insignificant but which Tomasson hears as epic parts of the story. "They have more to say than they think," Tomasson marveled.

A documentary appealed to Tomasson, who had been looking for another film project after what he describes as a "low-budget guerilla comedy" in 2022. "I wanted to tell a real story, to change things up."

He partnered with local filmmakers and fellow IVCC graduates Tyler Amm, who

provides creative and technical support, Zach Shaw, a cinematographer who presents a visionary eye behind the camera, and Griffin Tabor, a writer with a tenacity for research.

Tabor poured over newspaper articles and genealogy sites, tapping a rich archive that unveiled relatives and revealed that Jewell had written a well-respected history of Broadway's Tony Awards. Theater program dedications over the years yielded links to classmates and college instructors.

Knowing that Jewell grew up in Indiana and was adopted, Tomasson had despaired of finding family until they discovered cousins who had grown up with Jewell. That meeting "turned up a flood of family photos and videos and gave our documentary more of a personal touch."

Jewell was a prolific writer and newsletter editor, traveled widely to do etchings of memorial gravestones, and - in pre-internet days - filed away articles about friends, students and colleagues because "he wanted to keep in touch and know about you. He was a champion of other people.'

Jewell's one-man play – written at the height of the AIDS crisis and chronicling a man's fears and frustrations as he watches his friends die - foreshadowed his own death.

Tomasson is progressing on the documentary, though no release date is set. He said the title is an inside joke among local theater people and refers to Jewell's personal piano which appeared in various productions. The piano became as famous as its owner and was credited often in theater programs and even a wedding program, and a legend was born.

"The title is perfect! It sums up who Jim is and celebrates the people who are part of this production," said Tomasson, who himself borrowed the piano from the Stage 212 lobby for his 2022 film. The appearance passed uncredited into history since Tomasson did not know the legend then, but Tomasson wants to ensure Jewell's legacy does not vanish too.

"Jim had so many sides to life: teaching, writing, Stage 212, other organizations, the Indiana side. This is a chance to see all sides of him."

Spring planting accelerates across U.S.

BLOOMINGTON - It is early in the season, but soybean planting is ahead of the five-year average pace and the forecast for May generally looks favorable for fieldwork.

USDA reported 10% of Illinois soybeans were planted as of April 21 compared to 10% at the same time last season and 7% on average.

Complanting reached 7% complete as of the same date compared to 10% last year and 11% on average.

Jason McVicker, Pioneer field agronomist who covers the Interstate 80 corridor in northern Illinois, said planting has been all over the board in his area.

"We have guys that are probably about half done and really poured the coals to it and you've got others that said they wouldn't do anything until after Easter," he told the RFD Radio Network's Jim Taylor.

McVicker said those who planted put a good dent in soybean acres.

"A lot of my reps' sheds were stocked full (of seed) and now they're not quite down to bare bones, but they have made a lot of progress with deliveries and getting some of those beans in the ground," he said, adding that many farmers were holding out for warmer temperatures to plant corn as of last week.

"But if we do get dried out, I think we're going to see a pretty heavy switch to guys getting corn in the



ground and maximizing that opportunity," McVicker said.

Wind has been the biggest challenge in northern Illinois this season, according to McVicker, as it prevented timely herbicide applications.

"It is getting frustrating for some of these guys because we need to make sure we've got that chemistry out there to keep us weed-free and give that crop a chance to get ahead of any of those challenges that could present themselves," he said.

Weather outlooks for May point toward warmer and wetter-than-average conditions across Illinois.

Trent Ford, state climatologist with the Illinois State Water Survey, told RFD chances for a late spring cool down are slim and above average temperatures should

continue an upward trajectory for soil temperatures.

"Wetter-than-normal conditions do mean that spring fieldwork windows aren't going to be wide open, but they'll be open in between things," Ford said.

Far southern Illinois, where growers have received more than enough rain this spring, is where this forecast is of concern, Ford said.

"Any additional rainfall that they're likely to receive in May is probably going to continue to delay or maybe obstruct good fieldwork," Ford said.

Soil in the rest of the state has the capacity to take in more water, according to the climatologist.

'So that means any rain that falls will hopefully drain pretty quickly and, combined with above average tempera-

2024 La Salle County final multiplier announced

SPRINGFIELD – La Salle County has been issued a final property assessment equalization factor of 1.0000, according to David Harris, director of the Illinois Department of Revenue (IDOR).

The property assessment equalization factor, often called the "multiplier," is the method used to achieve uniform property assessments among counties, as required by law. This equalization is particularly important because some of the state's 6,600 local taxing districts overlap into two or more counties (e.g., school districts, junior college districts, fire protection districts). If there was no equalization among counties, substantial inequities among taxpayers with comparable properties would result.

Under a law passed in 1975, property in Illinois should be assessed at one-third (1/3)of its market value. Farm property is assessed differently with farm homesites and dwellings subject to regular assessing and equalization procedures. Farmland is assessed at one-third of its agriculture economic value and not subject to the state equalization factor. Assessments in La Salle County are at 32.93% of market value, based on sales of properties in 2021, 2022, and 2023.

The equalization factor is determined annually for each county by comparing the price of individual properties sold over the past three years to the assessed value placed on those properties by the county supervisor of assessments/county assessor.

If the three-year average level of assessment is one-third of the market value, the equalization factor will be one (1). If the average level of assessment is greater than one-third of market value, the equalization factor will be less than one (1). And if the average level of assessment is less than onethird of market value, the equalization factor will be greater than one (1).

No person shall throw, place or leave, or cause or permit to be thrown, placed or left, any ashes, dirt, filth or rubbish, grass clippings, or foreign matter in or upon any street, alley or sidewalk of the City of Mendota.

Penalty: Any person violating this section shall be subject to the penalty of not less than \$50 nor more than \$500. 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Illinois patients need prescription drug relief from 340B legislation

In communities across Illinois, patient health care – particularly for those who can least afford disruptions and uncertainty – faces enormous challenges.

Debates from Washington, D.C., to Springfield, to our local communities over how to provide care to low-income families and children covered by Medicaid and other critical insurance programs put in jeopardy the support system millions count on to stay healthy.

While these struggles have recently taken on new importance, community health centers from north of Chicago to deep southern Illinois have fought firsthand for several years to save the 340B prescription drug discount program. Our fight continues this spring, and the stakes could not be higher.

Since the early 1990s, the federal 340B program has created a win-win for our centers and the roughly 300,000 uninsured Illinoisans who they serve. The program creates steeply discounted rates for drug purchases from pharmaceutical manufacturers. Health centers pass the savings on in two important ways: Uninsured patients get medications they need at affordable prices, and the centers put the payments they receive from insurers back into services and supports that are underfunded – or not funded at all.

This discount program makes it possible for our centers to do things like provide free colonoscopies and mammograms, bring mobile clinics closer to the communities where patients need care, and to pick up patients for medical appointments with free transportation.

But in recent years, pharmaceutical companies have found a dangerous loophole that they use to restrict 340B participation to one contract pharmacy, forcing patients to travel long distances to receive their needed medication. And when patients cannot receive the care they need, the centers serving them do not have the resources they need to make free transportation, mammogram and cancer screenings, and mobile clinics possible.

IPHCA is asking state legislators to pass the Illinois Patient Access to 340B Pharmacy Protection Act legislation this spring. It's modeled after laws passed in 13 other states and growing, which have withstood challenges in federal courts.

Our aim is simple but powerful, and effective. In those other states that passed contract pharmacy protection laws, drug companies can no longer prohibit, restrict or interfere with local pharmacies that want to participate in 340B programs to support local patients and their community health centers. We can, and must, preserve a powerful lifeline that could not be more needed right now. The proposed Illinois Patient Access to 340B Pharmacy Protection Act is Senate Bill 2385, sponsored by Sen. Dave Koehler, and House Bill 3350, sponsored by Rep. Anna Moeller. The proposal has no cost for taxpayers, a key point as financial considerations dominate health care policy discussions. In the coming weeks, state lawmakers will debate how we shape prescription drug access and affordability and provide care to our most vulnerable communities – at a time when the future is unclear. We urge our leaders to stand with community health centers and their patients by shoring up the future of 340B protections in Illinois. We are counting on the help when so many aren't sure what storm they will face next.

Small Pox-Chicken Pox dispute - 1919

(The following is from Jessica Nashold's Backtracks & Sidetracks column reprinted from May 4, 1994.) **By Jessica Nashold**

On May 1, 1919, The Mendota Reporter carried a proclamation by Mayor R.N. Crawford. There had been several cases of small pox in the city of Mendota and the State Board of Health ordered all persons living within the city to be vaccinated.

Whenever small pox becomes epidemic in a community it is the fault of the residents in not availing themselves of this preventative.

Not everyone was satisfied that the diagnosis of small pox was correct in all cases where houses had been placed under quarantine.

Dr. E.P. Cook felt strongly enough about the issue to advertise a lecture at Mendota Township High School on Sunday night, May 5, at 8 p.m. There would be no charge for the lecture, which was entitled "Small Pox, Chicken Pox and Vaccination."

Between the hours of seven and eight there would be taxi service from Hotel Faber to the high school at 5 cents per ride. Return transportation after the lecture would be offered at the same rate.

Dr. Cook reminded the audience that his father had always been an advocate of a place for community gatherings, which the high school now provided.

This meeting will mark an epoch in the history of Mendota - it is



New York on April 25, 1919, and in May there was a big parade in Chicago. Four Mendota boys were in the Rainbow: Don and Tracey Tower, Nick Coss and Harold John.

Don Tower had the honor of being selected to carry the pennant for Battery F when the boys marched down Michigan Avenue. Many Mendotans went to Chicago to view the parade.

Don has filled out wonderfully since joining the army and being tall, also, our Mendota folk will be able to pick him out very easily.

A school in Belgium sent pictures of some of their classes to the Mendota schools. The pictures carried likenesses of the King and Queen of Belgium and of President Woodrow Wilson as well as American and Belgian flags. They found several places where records had not been kept of the hours in which the female help worked each day.

The number of hours women could work was limited by law.

Rev. Father Jakobs announced that he would be obliged to relinquish his work at Holy Cross because of trouble with his eyes.

Srul Koopersmith was trying to locate his wife and children, stranded in Europe during the war. He sent a cablegram to the town where he had learned they might be. The cablegram cost more than \$12.

E.J. Degenhardt, manager of Mendota's Princess Theatre, attended a convention of the Motion Picture Association of Illinois held at the Hotel Morrison in Chicago.

John Winter, assisted by Mr. Buckley, planted six Norway maple trees in memory of Mendota's war dead: John Madden, Earl S. Garage, William Frey, Harry Weygandt, Earl Cummings and Edward March. Four trees were north of the walk leading east from the library and one of these has since been replaced. Two were east of the north and south walk through the park.

He then showed pictures of two cases in Mendota, which were clearly chicken pox, although they had been diagnosed as small pox by a state health inspector. Dr. Cook sent for additional inspectors and the quarantine of three Waldorf children was changed from small pox to chicken pox.

Trump shifts his own vibe

The vibe around President Trump's second term has shifted, and it's all his doing.

The president entered office with a bit of a wind at his back. His polling was better than the first time around, protestors weren't in the streets, and federal investigators weren't after him. The GOP was more united than in 2016, and business leaders wanted to work with him, while the culture was generally heading in an anti-woke direction.

Now, though, his polling is in a marked decline. His job approval rating is sliding. Depending on what poll you believe, it's down to 44% (Fox News), 40% (Pew Research) or 42% (Reuters). According to RealClearPolitics, his average approval rating was about 50% when he took office and is 46% now.

It's not hard to discern the root of the discontent. In the Fox News poll, just 38% approve of Trump on the economy. On tariffs and inflation, the numbers are almost 2-1 against him; 33 approve and 59% disapprove on inflation, while it's 33-58 on tariffs.

Pew Research found that 45% were confident in his ability to handle the economy, down from 59% after his election, and lower than in his first term in 2019 and 2020.

Via his snap imposition of sweeping tariffs, Trump in short order took a traditional strength that could see him through any controversy, or counterbalance any vulnerability, and at least vitiated it and perhaps made it a weakness.

It's hard to think of another example of a president changing the momentum of his administration from positive to negative so quickly and decisively. Trump did it literally in a matter of days.

Usually, presidencies are rocked by events -- a hostage crisis, a war gone wrong, uncontrolled inflation. Here, nothing was done to Trump; he did it to himself. He was the event.

This wasn't him getting denied, either by more cautious advisers or a recalcitrant Congress. He hasn't been sabotaged by the Deep State. No, he got exactly what he wanted, with a couple of strokes of his pen.

The problem is that Trump didn't run in 2024 on economic dislocation, business uncertainty, higher prices or pain for manufacturers. People didn't want any of these things and, understandably, don't like them.

It's true that he promised tariffs, although all the potential downsides were ignored or minimized. No one could be certain whether he was truly talking of tariffs on the scale of those he imposed on Liberation Day -- shocking and unsustainable -- or those of his first term, which were much smaller and less disruptive.

Listening to him during the campaign and his Inaugural Address, you'd have thought he promised a Golden Age starting on Day One. Instead, his message has shifted to the notion that the sunny uplands are off somewhere in the future, after we work through all the gut-wrenching turmoil. In other words, the Golden Age is coming, but, in the meantime, stock up on toilet paper.

Trump's other numbers aren't looking so great, either. The Fox News poll has him at 40% approve and 54% disapprove on foreign policy. Here, too, he's been the master of his own fate. Canada, Mexico and Denmark didn't pick fights with him; he created them out of nothing. The overpromising on a Ukraine peace deal -- and retaking the Panama Canal -- can't be helping, either.

Defenders of Trump's unorthodox way of doing business will often say that he's a "disrupter," meaning it as a compliment. But what he's been disrupting lately is his own presidency. His splashy tariff announcements, rapid reversals and sense of mystery where he's headed next all have real-world consequences on businesses, consumers and allied nations, and none of it is redounding to his political benefit.

The good news is that having created this situation of his own volition, he can undo most of it if he reverses field on the tariffs. In the meantime, the vibe has definitely changed.

Local school district libraries are recipients of state grants

SPRINGFIELD - Secretary of State and State Librarian Alexi Giannoulias has awarded more than \$1.3 million to 2,484 Illinois public school libraries throughout Illinois.

Since its establishment in 2018, the Fund has awarded 483 County Fair Facility Upgrade Grants for a total impact of more than \$1.6

million that has improved the experiences of fair organizers, participants and attendees. The grant will open for 2026 applications in March 2026.

Among the 21 organizations in Illinois earning a County Fair Facility Upgrade Grant include:

• LaSalle County Junior Fair Board Association: Electrical upgrades for the fairgrounds, barns and show barn.

• Lee County Fair Association: Replacing doors and openers in the commercial exhibit building.

• Marshall-Putnam Fair Association: New rollup doors on the poultry and rabbit building.

• Ogle County Fair Association: Replacing the walkway and drive chip seal.

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

NBA Playoffs offer breath of fresh air

Sometimes life, especially sports, rotates on a similar axis from year to year where we can compare different fads or eras.

In terms of the NBA playoffs, from the beginning of the playoffs and the first Walter A. Brown Trophy winner the Philadelphia Warriors in 1947, we get tired of seeing the same players and teams in the last series of the season.

From 1949-54, the Minneapolis Lakers won five out of six championships. The Syracuse Nationals won in 1955 after losing in 54 and the Warriors won again in 1956, Before I



even started giving examples, you knew the Boston Celtics were going to be mentioned as they won their first in

1957 and then

won every year to 1969, except for 1958, which was won by the St. Lous Hawks but lost to the Celtics in three other finals, and 1967 which was won by Philadelphia, now the 76ers.

Along the way, the Lakers were in the finals seven times before Jerry West and Wilt Chamberlain finally won in 1972 after Willis Reed and the New York Knicks won in 1970 and Lew Alcindor, better known as Kareem Abdul-Jabbar, won in 1971.

The Knicks won again in 1973, Boston in 1976, and the Lakers in 1980.

There were some swerves in the middle, which happens occasionally as Rick Barry and the Golden State Warriors won in 1975, Bill Walton and the Portland Trail Blazers won in 1977, and the Seattle SuperSonics (no longer a team) won in 1979.

Then the "Showtime" Lakers thanks to Magic Johnson and Kareem, the Larry Bird Boston Celtics, and the Moses Malone and Dr. J (Julius Erving) 76ers won every championship from 1980 until 1989 when the "Bad Boy" Pistons won in 1989 and 1990.

All of us sports fans know what the Chicago Bulls did in the 1990s with two three-peats surrounding Hakeem Olajuwon dreaming his Houston Rockets to two rings.

Then the San Antonio Spurs and the Lakers (a threepeat) won the next five before an actual team in the 2004 Pistons were victorious. Then the Spurs exchanged with the Heat and the Celtics before the Lakers won two more.

The Dallas Mavericks snuck past the Dwyane Wade, LeBron James, Chris Bosh Miami Heat, but they were in four consecutive finals winning two.

The Spurs win again and then the "Splash Brothers" Steph Curry and Klay Thompson, along with my least favorite NBA player of all time, Draymond Green, were in the next five finals, winning three with losses to James and the Cleveland Cavaliers and Kawhi Leonard and the Toronto Raptors (talk about a surprise).

The Lakers win in the bubble, Giannis Antetokounmpo gives the Bucks their first ring since 1971 in 2021, Steph wins again in 2022, Nikola Jokic takes the Denver Nuggets to unchartered territory in 1013, and the Boston Celtics win yet another banner last year thanks to Javson Tatum and Javlen Brown.

I wasn't originally going to go down the entire NBA Championship list, found on Wikipedia, NBA.com, or a number of other sites, but it helps prove my point and why the NBA playoffs are so interesting, There seems to be a been there done that, the same teams or the same players are in the NBA finals year after year...with, again, a few expectations. This year, the playing legends, who are first-ballot, no-doubt-about-it hall of famers, all of them are already eliminated, in the first round, except one...Curry. The Lakers are eliminated taking out James. The Suns never made it to the playoffs, Kevin Durrant (who won two NBA Finals MVPs with the Warriors in 2017 and 2018) gone. The Bucks bowed out, Antetokounmpo is gone. Kawhi Leonard and James Harden (who plays great until the playoffs) are gone thanks to the Nuggets.

Princeton, Rockridge top MHS softball





Doggie decoding: Understanding canine body language

Without the gift of gab, dogs are left to rely on a bark, a tail wag, or, sometimes, even a snarl to communicate with their two-legged companions. However, as we attempt to connect with our canine friends, understanding the unspoken becomes immensely important in recognizing their wants and needs.

"Understanding our dogs' basic body language allows us to gain insight into their thoughts and feelings about the world around them and what they are experiencing," said Harmony Diers, a veterinary technician and project manager for the Dog Aging Project at the Texas A&M College of Veterinary Medicine & Biomedical Sciences. To help owners "decode" their dog, Diers describes the meaning behind some common body language signals that dogs use to communicate.

is showing you that it is very happy and joyful, Diers said.

Other body language-based observations of a content and calm dog include:

- Eye squinting
- Soft, yet direct gaze
- Leaning on you
- Laying down
- Rolling over

• Open/panting mouth "It is important to recognize a calm and content

ognize a calm and content dog's body language to determine whether he or she is comfortable with the current environment and circumSimilar to shaking off water from the pool, dogs also give a shake to reduce tension or stress from their bodies.

Other signs of a nervous or alerted dog include:

• Upright and forward ears — shows an attempt to be ready for "fight or flight"

• Pinned back ears near the head — shows the dog is attempting to make itself look smaller

• Alerted eyes — often in a fixed stare

• "Giving you the whale eye" — averting direct eye contact or showing the whites of the eyes indicates a scared dog



Reading The Relaxation

Happy dog, happy life is a wonderful sentiment to live by. But how do owners know when their dogs are happy?

"Happy and relaxed dogs offer us a great deal of body language intel," Diers said. "The ears of these dogs can range from forward and relaxed to pointed back and relaxed. Dogs that are happy and submissive may even fold their ears back. But the takeaway is 'relaxed.""

A key sign is found in circular wags — if your dog is wagging its tail in a circle, it stances," Diers said. "When we learn to recognize our dog's communication, we can set them up for success within their boundaries and also identify situations where they may need more support or training."

Personal Space Advised

On the other hand, discontented body language refers to behaviors that raise concern — reflecting defensive or submissive signs. This can be influenced by a multitude of variables, such as overstimulation, new environments, or unfamiliar individuals.

Once again, a key source of information lies in a dog's tail; for example, a frightened dog may tuck his tail, while an alert or nervous dog will carry its tail high and possibly wag it vigorously.

"A dog experiencing an uncomfortable situation may also turn his body away from the threat to present his back," Diers said. • Tense lips — often pulled back/lifted over the teeth

• Licking lips — often accompanied with yawning

Being able to recognize the signs of a discontented dog is vital for your furry friend to feel a sense of security at home as well as encountering unfamiliar dogs outside of the home.

Diers notes that while these are common signs, some breeds' natural characteristics may appear alarmed upon first glance.

For example, German shepherds' natural ear shape means they're often upright, and husky and malamute breeds have curled-up tails, even when relaxed.

"When these dogs are in alert mode or feel threatened, the tail may go higher and stiffer and wag quickly," Diers said "Look at our pugs. They always have big open eyes, but if a wide-eyed pug is giving the whale eye, he may be experiencing a threat or feeling nervous."

Trouble In Paradise In understanding your dog's body language, you can also be better prepared to recognize potential health concerns.

"An ill dog may sleep more, be grumpier, and not want the normal interaction he usually gets excited about," Diers said.

Other "red flag" indicators that can indicate pain or tension include:

- Limping
- Head-hanging
- Tense posture



- Whimpering
- Lip-smacking (precur-

sor to nausea).

Diers notes that lip-smacking can also indicate a self-soothing method for stress or anticipation of a snack.

"Ultimately, if your normally active and happy dog starts to isolate and show lethargy and/or decreased appetite, this is a sign that something has changed with their overall health, and seeking the care of a veterinarian is a suggested course to take," Diers said.


Reading, understanding, and responding to your

dog's body language is a key part of the companion-to-owner relationship. By understanding their cues and appropriately advocating for your dog, owners can continue to ensure their dogs remain happy, comfortable, and safe while also guaranteeing the safety and well-being of those around them.

Q: Why did "Alert: Missing Persons Unit" kill off Nikki? She was one of the leads on the show. Who will replace her? -- J.M.

LaSalle County Health Department begins its vector surveillance program

OTTAWA – There will be a slight change in the way the LaSalle County Health Department conducts its vector surveillance program for the 2025 season (May 1 through Oct. 15, 2025).

The Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH) has notified all local health departments that the collection of dead birds for West Nile virus testing will not be conducted due to the ongoing H5N1 avian influenza outbreak. Therefore, the LaSalle County Health Department will not be collecting dead birds as part of the vector surveillance program during this time frame. Reports of five or more dead birds found in LaSalle County during this time frame should be made to the Illinois Department of Natural Resources (IDNR) District Wildlife Biologist for LaSalle County by calling (779) 702-8274 or call the U.S. Department of Agriculture, Wildlife Services, at 1-866-487-3297 to determine if domesticated bird samples should be collected for testing.

How do I dispose of dead birds on my property?

Given the concern regarding influenza in wild birds (especially waterfowl, aquatic birds, and birds of prey), the following are tips to reduce the risk of avian influenza spreading to people who may need to pick up dead birds on their property. While it is unlikely that handling dead birds would lead to human infection, it is best to be cautious. The Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends specific Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) when around dead birds. In the case of not having that PPE, the following guidance can be used:

• Don't use bare hands to pick up a dead bird or animal.

• Use disposable waterproof gloves and/ or an inverted plastic bag to pick up the dead bird(s). Double the plastic bag with the bird(s) inside and dispose in the trash where it cannot be accessed by children or animals.

• After handling a bird, avoid touching your face with gloved or unwashed hands.

• After the bird(s) are disposed of, take gloves off first and put into a plastic bag for disposal.

• Wash hands with soap and water. If soap and water are not available, use hand sanitizer.

If you should develop flu-like symptoms within ten days of disposing of a group of dead birds, contact the LaSalle County Health Department. For additional information on disposal of dead birds, please visit: IDPH Safe Dead Bird Disposal (Less than 5 birds), Safe Dead Bird Disposal (5 or more birds)

Mosquito Collection and Testing

As in prior years, Health Department staff are getting ready to begin testing mosquitoes for West Nile virus. The mosquito collection and testing equipment were purchased with grant money. Testing will begin once the weather stays consistently warm and will continue through the fall months. Multiple mosquito collection sites are utilized and they are typically moved throughout the county during the surveillance season. Collected mosquitoes are placed in a freezer to inactivate and then they are sorted out for testing. The female Culex pipiens (common house mosquito) are the only mosquitoes tested, as they bite for blood meals. The Health Department will report any positive mosquito batches to the public.

Larvicide Distribution

The Health Department also utilizes grant money to purchase a large quantity of mosquito larvicide, which is used to treat potential mosquito breeding sites. The larvicide will be distributed to licensed mosquito control applicators from local municipalities and villages throughout the county.

Additionally, the Health Department, through a grant, offers larvicide to property owners looking to reduce mosquito breeding sites. Property owners are encouraged to pick up a package of NATULAR® DT. NATULAR® DT, is a mosquito larvicide that controls larvae of mosquitoes for up to 60 days. Manufactured by Clarke, Natular® DT is an easy-to-use, bi-layer tablet that prevents mosquito breeding in standing water sites around yards. The larvicide can be picked up at the Health Department (717 Etna Road, Ottawa. 8 a.m.-4:30 p.m.). Each package contains 12 tablets. At this time, supplies are limited to one per household.

Overcome doubt and live with bold faith

In Acts 27 (AMPC), there's a great story about the apostle Paul. He was traveling by ship with some people when "a violent wind [of the character of a typhoon]... came bursting down from the island" (v. 14). For days, they were caught in the storm, and at one point it was so fierce, they were "dangerously tossed about by the violence of the storm" (v. 18) and had to throw the ship's freight overboard. They ended up without food, hungry, stranded seemingly without hope.

In that moment, Paul stood in the midst of the survivors and said to them, "I beg you to be in good spirits and take heart, for there will be no loss of life among you..." (v. 22). He then shared that an angel of God told him this, and said in verse 25, "So keep up your courage, men, for I have faith (complete confidence) in God that it will be exactly as it was told me."

How could Paul, in the middle of a horrible storm, ask the people to "be in good spirits" and have a good attitude? Because he believed in his heart-without a doubt—"that it will be exactly as it was told me." I love that! It's a

great picture of the power of faith in God when all hope seems lost. And we can have the very same faith that Paul had if we will overcome doubt.

We all face storms in life. Some are more difficult than others, but we all go through trials and tribulation. That's why we have the gift of faith. Ephesians 6:16 (NIV) calls it "...the shield of faith, with which you can extinguish all the flaming arrows of the evil one." Doubt is a type of "flaming arrow" that the enemy uses to attack our faith.

We usually experience doubt after we've made a decision. In James 1:6, the Bible says having doubt is like being tossed about by the wind, which feels like you're trying to go in two different directions at the same time. And it's miserable to be torn between two places, not able to decide what you really believe. It's in those moments we have to choose whether we are going to believe God or the enemy...God or our feelings...God or what people tell us...God or our circumstances....

When doubt comes against us, we have to lift up the shield of faith. We do this when we open our mouth and say what God's Word says, rather than grumbling and complaining about the problem. Our faith is released as we say, pray, and do the Word. So, in those times, open



your mouth and say, "I believe that everything God has told me will come to pass!"

Maybe you're doubting whether you can hear God's voice or not. This happens because we usually doubt ourselves more than we doubt God. Now I'm not talking about actually hearing a voice; I'm talking about that knowing we have inside our hearts about what is right or wrong.

The Bible says in James 1:5 that when we need wisdom, we can go to God, ask Him for it, and He will give it to us "liberally and ungrudgingly, without reproaching or faultfinding..." (AMPC). What this means is that even with our imperfections, God will be faithful to us and give us what we need if we will ask Him for help. He loves us, blesses us, and uses us in spite of us, because He is faithful! And we never have to doubt that.

I've learned through my own relationship with God that He's not

expecting me to be perfect; He wants me to do my best to be in His will and take steps of faith as He leads me—whether that's through His Word or something He speaks to my heart. Remember, He wants us to put our confidence in Him. God really does want to speak to you personally and lead you in His great plan for your life. So don't be afraid to step out and do what's in your heart. If you make a mistake, you'll learn from it and go on. That's how we "step out and find out." And we all have to do it.

I want to encourage you to begin saying things every day that will help you grow in your faith and confidence in God. Declare things like, "God loves me. He wants to speak to my heart. I can hear from God. He is faithful to me and will lead me in His will for my life. And I believe it will be exactly as God has told me!" By God's grace, we can be bold in faith and overcome every attack of doubt during the storms of life. ***




