

There's something for everyone at Illinois State Fair

SPRINGFIELD–Something old and something new, the Illinois State Fair will offer a little something for everyone to enjoy this year.

Fans of the fair and its food gathered at the state fairgrounds in April to celebrate the countdown of 100 days until the Illinois State Fair begins Aug. 7. Thousands of people traveled to Springfield on April 29 to savor their favorite fair foods, purchase discounted admission books and more.

Joe Khayyat, Illinois State Fair year-round events coordinator, told FarmWeek renovations at the Illinois State Fair Coliseum, which began with a roof overhaul in 2019, are nearly complete. Phase two renovations focused on updating electrical, heating and cooling, plumbing and sound systems, as well as improving accessibility.

The building is functional and was recently used for a horse show. Khayyat said the project is now in its "punch list phase," which involves final touches and corrections before the project is officially completed.


In addition to infrastructure improvements, Khayyat mentioned that the state fair team, especially Rebecca Clark, Illinois State Fair manager, has worked hard to make the fair more accessible. This includes offering a sensory room for individuals with sensory issues and providing more food options for those with dietary restrictions.

"I just think that we've made a real concerted effort over the last couple of years to make the fair more friendly to more potential fairgoers," Khayyat said.

One of the newest additions to the fair's food vendor list, and a friend to those with dietary needs, is Hae's Bakery and Coffee Shop. The vendor made its debut at the fair last year, and Alex Devaney, Hae's new general manager, is eager to return this summer.

"I've been a fairgoer since I was a baby,"Devaney said, noting that she used to work in a corn dog stand at the state fair while she was in high school. "I just feel like everything kind of flows pretty naturally out here, so that's why I'm so excited to be back."

Whether visitors come to show livestock, see the butter cow, attend a concert at the grandstand, enjoy fair food or try something new, Khayyat said there is always something for everyone. The new additions to the fair are exciting, but the traditional favorites are

8 games to try at the next backyard bash

Games can enhance any outdoor function. Whether at the beach or in one's backyard, activities can keep guests entertained in between the food and other refreshments. And the good news is that most games designed for these types of functions are appropriate for players across a wide range of ages.

The following are eight games that can add to the excitement of any outdoor gathering.

1. Ladder toss: Also known as ladder golf, this game requires players to toss string-attached balls onto a ladder-shaped target. Points are awarded depending on which rung the ball lands on.

2. Kubb: Pronounced "KOOB," this Swedish lawn game believed to have originated during the era of the Vikings and is best described as a blend of bowling and horseshoes. Two teams compete to knock over their opponents' wooden blocks by throwing batons.

3. Cornhole: Many people have played cornhole, which involves tossing bean bags at the cornhole board, The objective is to get the bag into the hole or on the board to score points. The game can be played as singles or doubles. The first team to reach 21 points wins. 4. Spikeball[™]: Also called Roundnet, this twoon-two sport is played by hitting a ball off a net with the goal of preventing the opposing team from returning the ball within three touches.

5. Ring toss: This is another game that tests hand-eye coordination. Players take turns tossing the rings onto the target pegs. Each peg is worth a different number of points. The first player to reach the agreed-upon amount of points wins.

6. Connect four in a row: Giant versions of familiar tabletop games also are available for yard use. With this game, players need to get four chips in a row, either up and down or diagonal.

7. Kan Jam®: Similar to cornhole or horseshoes, Kan Jam® features two teams of two that alternate between throwing a frisbee and trying to deflect it. The goal is to get the frisbee into the can.

8. Rollers: Goals are placed 25 feet apart and then players roll wooden discs to try to get closest to the goal. Each side of the disc has a different number to determine the point value.


• Bug spray: Bugs won't get the hint that campers don't want them around the campsite, so don't forget to pack some bug spray to repel these unwanted guests.
