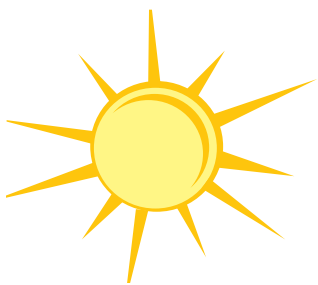

South Dakota sets new daily coronavirus record

SIOUX FALLS (AP) – South Dakota on Wednesday broke its record for COVID-19 hospitalizations and new cases, and the state has already had more deaths from the disease less than halfway through October than it had in any other month.

Despite the grim prognosis – South Dakota had the nation’s highest rate of positive tests over the last 14 days, according to the COVID Tracking Project – Republican Gov. Kristi Noem has resisted pressure to step up the state’s response to the disease, explaining Tuesday that the surge in case numbers was “expected” because the state was conducting more tests.

Secretary of Health Kim Malsam-Rysdon said she thinks the state is doing a good job conducting enough tests to detect outbreaks.

However, South Dakota’s 14-day average positivity rate of nearly 24% is more than four times the national average of 5.1%, according to the COVID Tracking Project.

State Epidemiologist Josh Clayton said that the increase in testing led to more positive cases being identified. But he also acknowledged that infections are spreading in communities across the state.

“If you take all of that put together, we are seeing a fair bit of COVID-19 transmis-

Settlement agreement complete

BROOKINGS – With work now underway on project, City Attorney Steve Britzman gave the Brookings City Council an update on the settlement agreement for the Brookings County jail expansion during the council meeting Tuesday.

The council voted 5-2 in August

to withdraw its appeal to the state Supreme Court regarding the detention center remodel and expansion, after a circuit judge in March ruled the project could move forward.

The city has completed all of the steps of its settlement agreement with the county, Britzman said.

“The primary objective of the settlement agreement was to establish some understandings with the county with

respect to withdrawal of the appeal to the (state) Supreme Court. The appeal has been withdrawn,” Britzman said.

Another point of consideration in the agreement is the issuance of the building permit, which was issued in mid-September, and the construction project is moving forward, Britzman said.

They got some help from Optimist member Roger Jenner, and now the library is open for business at 1133 12th St. S. in Brookings.

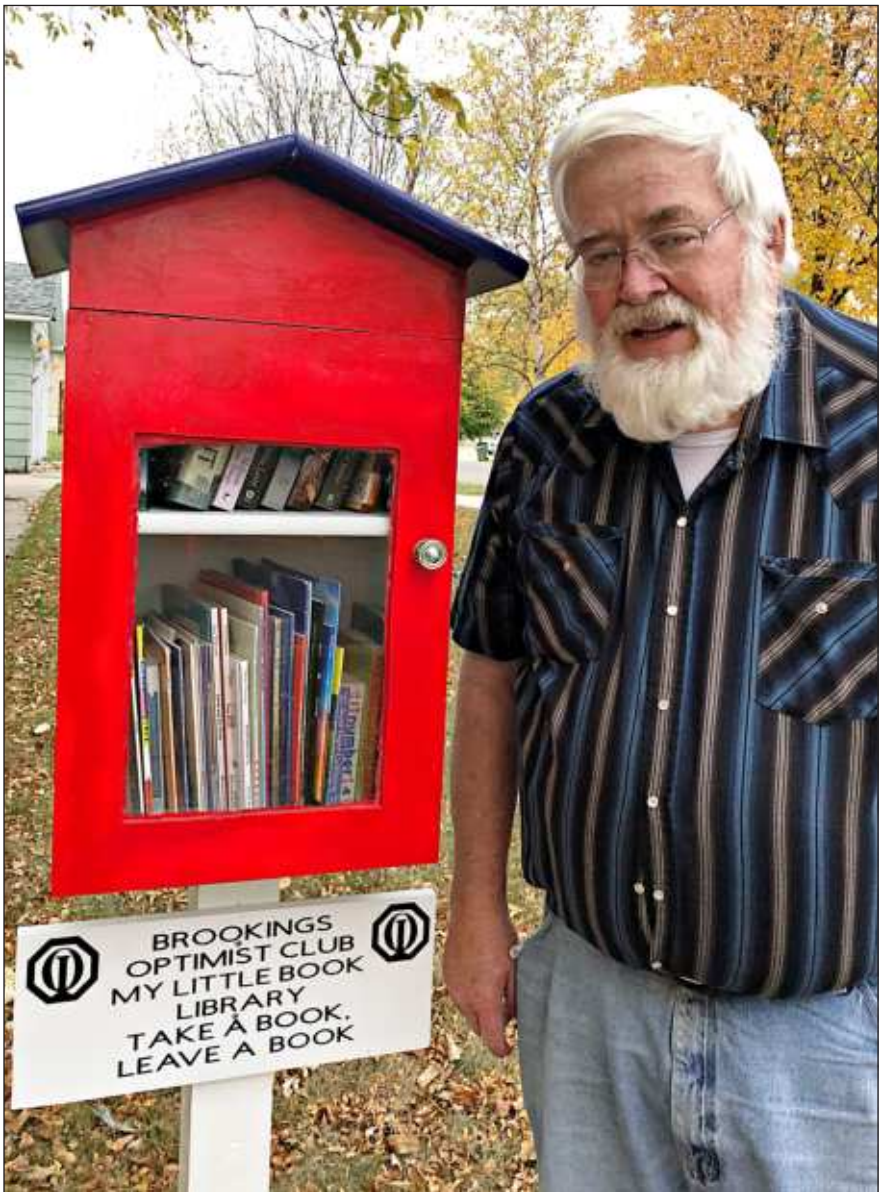

SDSU now allowing open COVID-19 testing for students

BROOKINGS – South Dakota State University is now allowing open COVID-19 testing for its students. The testing, which is free for students, runs from 11:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Mondays through Thursdays.

The open testing started Oct. 14. Previously, students needed a referral by the SDSU Student Health Clinic and Counseling Services.

Students can get tested at the drive-thru/walk-thru testing site located near Frost Arena. Enter the parking lot at the southeast corner of Frost Arena.

Students should consider getting tested even if they currently have no symptoms of COVID-19 and no known contact with an individual who has tested positive for COVID-19. Results will be available within approximately 24-36 hours.

2 arrests in domestic assault cases

BROOKINGS – Two people have been arrested in recent alleged domestic assaults cases, and Brookings Police want to call attention to the fact that October is Domestic Abuse Awareness Month.

“We had two more domestic arrests here and I know that we had a couple last week, too,” Lt. Marci Gebers said.

One was reported about 7:06 p.m. Saturday and occurred in the 500 block of 12th Street South, Gebers said.

Curtis Borstad, 26, of Sioux Falls, was arrested and charged with aggravated assault domestic and transported to the Brookings County Detention Center, she said.

“Officers spoke with the female victim who stated that she had been attempting to leave (in a vehicle) and Curtis stopped her from leaving,” Gebers said.

“He punched her in the back and then grabbed her by her sweatshirt and strangled her multiple times with her sweatshirt,” Gebers said.

“Then he bit her on her arm. She did have visible injuries

‘Fair Warning’: This is a good read

Wow. Just WOW.
I’ve been a fan of Michael Connelly’s for a long time, but I think he just ramped it up a few notches with his latest book, the very aptly

FairWarning, a watchdog website that covers consumer fraud to alert the public to dangers. But Jack is, at heart, a murder reporter, and when he hears about a woman whose cause of death is unusual, to say the least, he jumps into the case wholeheartedly.

What he finds is this woman is just one who’s been killed in the same way over a period of time; all the deaths cleverly disguised so not even the authorities are aware there could very well be a serial killer out there.

Jack’s dealt with killers before, but even he’s shocked when he discovers the women’s deaths weren’t random – the killer hunted them by their DNA.

Jack teams up with a fellow reporter at FairWarning and contacts Rachel Walling for her profiling skills, even though they haven’t

seen each other in years.
They need every advantage they can get to track a killer whose name and face – and next target – they don’t know. A killer who is still on the hunt and could be onto them.

If you want to read a story with up-to-the-minute implications and a plotline permeated with urgency and a race-against-time vibe that makes you turn pages, pick up “Fair Warning.”

Connelly is best known for his Harry Bosch stories and Lincoln Lawyer stories, and to be honest, I’ve always liked the Bosch novels best, but Connelly has used current events to make Jack a front runner as a lead character.

This novel grabbed me on two fronts: DNA and journalism. The first one should scare the crap out of people; the second I hope will educate them.

Connelly took a topic that’s all over the news, DNA, and brought out a side that most people would never think about: what happens when someone has your DNA – your very specific, personally identifying DNA that is supposed to be anonymous – and uses it for a purpose you had no idea was possible, let alone gave your consent for.

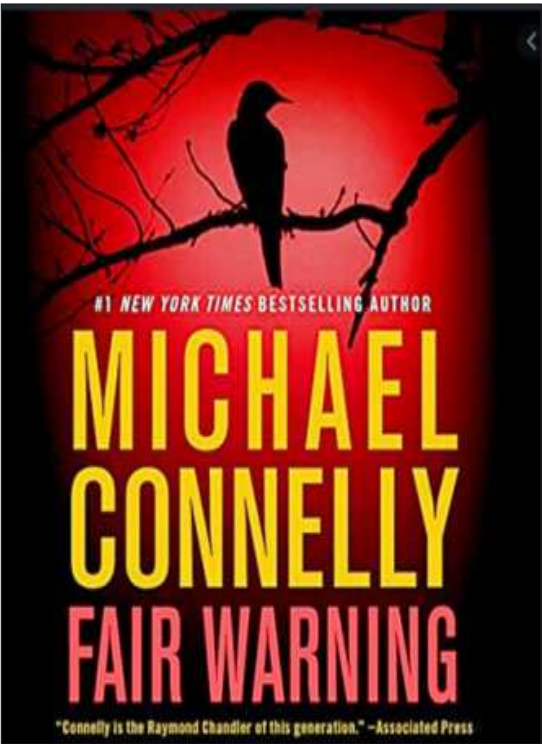
What’s even more terrifying is folks are voluntarily turning in their DNA and signing over their rights; it’s not being stolen for these purposes. The implications are horrifying. This is something everyone should read before submitting their DNA for testing.

Telling this story from the point of view of a reporter gave Connelly the opportunity to explain the profession. Connelly is a former crime reporter and I’ve always admired the way he’s used that knowledge to give nuanced details to reporters and news in his novels. A lot of novelists, you can tell they don’t have the first clue of how a reporter does their job; Connelly lived it. His passion for the profession and how reporters serve the public comes through very clearly in the voice of Jack McEvoy.

There’s a reason a free press is guaranteed in the Constitution, and Connelly – through Jack – makes the case for why reporters have to have a free rein to do their jobs with no outside influence or interference from anyone. Others might have an agenda, but a reporter’s duty is to keep the public informed so they can protect themselves.

Although Connelly has been a best-selling novelist for years, he’s still active in the journalism world, so his viewpoints on the profession are up-to-the-minute. FairWarning is not just a plot point in the book, it’s a real news site for watchdog reporting on consumer issues and Connelly serves on the board of directors, according to the Author’s Note. If you want to start at the beginning of Jack’s journey, read “The Poet” (1996) and “The Scarecrow” (2009). Jack’s popped up in a couple other Connelly books, too. You might as well



start at the beginning of Connelly’s books with “The Black Echo” (1992), which is the first Harry Bosch book.

Connelly’s latest book “The Law of Innocence” is due out Nov. 10 and it’s the latest in the Mickey Haller series which starts with “The Lincoln Lawyer” (2005). For more information, visit michaelconnelly.com or your local library.

Man dies in Rapid City brush fire

RAPID CITY (AP) – A man has died of smoke inhalation in a brush fire in Rapid City, authorities said.

The victim was discovered when police and firefighters responded to the fire Saturday night, police said Tuesday. The man has not been identified.

The fire broke out in a wooded area just southwest of a commercial building and near the north bank of Rapid Creek. Police say the area is occupied by many homeless people.

Several people were in the area when the fire spread. A witness told police the man didn’t make it out of the fire.

Forensic testing is needed to identify the man due to his serious injuries, officials said.

Virtual tourism yielding results

PIERRE – A virtual road trip to South Dakota helped draw journalists and travel writers to promote tourism in the state when the pandemic shut physical travel down.

Katlyn Richter, global media

and public relations director with the state Department of Tourism, recently told members of the Tourism Advisory Board that a virtual road trip marketed to the press was a huge success. The virtual road trip was conducted in June, and preliminary results show a collective about 295,000 combined impressions across the world, with results continuing to climb.

“This was a response to COVID-19,” Richter said after the meeting. “Early in the pandemic, travel was at a standstill for writers. Our international journalists were not able to travel. Many domestic writers were not traveling.

Brookings County Museum reorganizes

BROOKINGS – Partly due to the pandemic, the governing board of the Brookings County Historical Society/Museum voted at its annual meeting earlier this month to try an experimental co-leadership concept.

Society members also elected two new board members, Lynette Nelson of Volga and Janet Gritzner of Brookings. Re-elected to the board were incumbents Larry Ust, Floyd Havrevold and Bob Buchheim, all of Volga, and Patty Kratochvil of Brookings.

Other officers re-elected were Darla Strande of Brookings, treasurer, and Buchheim, secretary.

Two long-time museum leaders, former president Harold Christianson and vice-president Jerry Leslie, both of Volga, are retiring from the board. They were given emeritus status.

For the first time since the society was organized in Brookings in 1939, its leadership will operate through the next 12 months under a co-presidency model.

This will reduce the growing work load for which the society’s president is responsible, including the numerous public contacts necessary. With six buildings in the museum complex and assets in excess of \$800,000, a co-presidency can better direct the maintenance and improvements necessary for the museum campus during this unusual period.

Elected co-presidents were incumbent Phil Wagner of Brookings and board member Shirley Deethhardt of Aurora. Among other leadership duties, Deethhardt will work with volunteers in the task of filling out and staging the newly refurbished 1894 James Hauxhurst house with period furnishings and accoutrements of the age.

James Hauxhurst was clerk for the Brookings County Commissioners during the selection of Brookings as the county seat that was then moved from now-defunct Medary to Brookings.

Some years later Hauxhurst built his

home on Third Street, across the street south from what became the location of the Brookings Library.

The Hauxhurst home was also located where more than a century later the new County-City governmental services building was constructed on Third Street. Rather than raze the historic old home, a group of interested Brookings citizens about ten years ago provided funds to move it to the museum site in Volga’s City Park.

Since then the museum has raised about \$75,000 to refurbish it because it had been converted into apartments. Under the leadership of museum board members Floyd Havrevold and Larry Ust of Volga, the home’s first floor has now been converted back to near its original footprint.

It is hoped the home can be ready for visitors for the 2021 summer season should the COVID19 pandemic abate by then.

As Maine goes, so goes Electoral College reform – maybe

■ Maine has rejected the “winner take all” method for determining Electoral College votes.

FAYETTE, Maine – The other night, the moon rose over the lake, creating a stream of light that illuminated the passage of two loons. The tiny library at the bend of the road is open only on Wednesdays and Thursdays. The nearby orchard is selling a McIntosh blend of apple cider, as cool and crisp as the mornings here. There’s hardly a soul along Echo Lake Road.

Here in these pine groves and birches – in this most peculiar political battleground, with combat across the second-most-rural congressional district in the country, 14 times the size of former Vice President Joe Biden’s home state of Delaware – some of the most unusual civic combat in the country is being waged.

It’s all over a single electoral vote in the November election.

But it is more than that. It is also a testing ground for any overhaul of the Electoral College that might be contemplated after the 2020 election.

At least that is how this situation – the awarding of single electoral votes to the winner of each of Maine’s two congressional districts, along with two to the winner of the state’s popular votes – started out: as a reform movement that this state, with its independent streak

(and its history of governors and, now, a senator, who declared themselves Independents) undertook as a first step 48 years ago.

But with the possibility of a close presidential election and with new pressures on the Electoral College, the rest of the country suddenly is paying attention to a broad swath of remote America resting on the Canadian border – 27,236 square miles of mostly forest and scattered settlements, with vast stretches of land owned by the government and paper companies, with roads that will be officially closed in a few weeks because of heavy snowfalls, and with wild rivers that once carried the trees felled by angular men from the logger camps that remain a vivid remnant of Maine folklore.

Four years ago, Trump lost Maine to former Secretary of State Hillary Clinton, who took three of the state’s electoral votes. But Trump won the second congressional district and harvested its single electoral vote. His team is working hard this fall to repeat the trick, but polls show Biden, who will win statewide, could sweep this district as well.

Not that it will be easy. Drive along these remote parts, and you’ll see rural byways clogged with signs and flags for Trump. The other day I took a long walk along a dirt road and saw a Trump sign two houses after the electrical lines ended; the chances of a traveler seeing that message is about as great as the chances a lobster has for a long, fulfilling life after the water in the pot



has boiled for three minutes.

“I took a drive through rural Maine, and I never saw so many lawn signs in all my life,” said Harold Pachios, a lawyer active in the state’s politics since the days of its legendary Democratic governor, senator and secretary of state, Edmund S. Muskie. “I never saw anything like this even for Muskie. It’s a movement, a cult.”

And yet the congressional district that gave Trump a 10-point victory in 2016 defeated a Republican incumbent House member, Rep. Bruce Poliquin, two years later by the slender margin of 3,509 votes. Now the new incumbent, Democratic Rep. Jared Golden, a Marine veteran of Iraq and Afghanistan, is poised to win a second term in the district covering four-fifths of the entire state.

“There’s a lot of split tickets here,” Golden, 38, said in an interview. “We take our own path in thought and personal lifestyle here. Voters here aren’t committed to individuals or parties but

look at every election separately.”

Even so, the latest New York Times/Siena College poll shows Biden has a slender lead in the district, which once had a workforce heavily tilted toward labor unions in the long-ago days when nonfarm employment was concentrated in the textile, shoe and paper industries, which were in steep decline beginning in the late 1960s. “This is a case where the congressman may be pulling Biden’s number up a bit,” said Amy Fried, a University of Maine political scientist.

It was shortly after the eclipse of those industries – all of them beneficiaries of Maine’s raging rivers – that the first modern qualms about the Electoral College emerged, prompted in part by the distress of Muskie, the 1968 Democratic vice-presidential nominee, over the decision by Lloyd Bailey, a Richard Nixon elector, to vote instead for former Gov. George C. Wallace of Alabama.

But the determination to take on the Electoral College’s power was a bipartisan movement.

“This was a rarity: purity in politics,” said Severin Beliveau, who was state Democratic chair at the time. “There was mass popular support. It wasn’t a partisan issue, and it didn’t seem to help any particular politician.”

But there also was the hope that the movement would affirm a political maxim that had been popular since 1820: As Maine goes, so goes the nation.

“The idea was that if we did this, others would follow,” said John Martin

of Eagle Lake (population 805, half of whom speak French), who was House speaker at the time and now is the longest serving lawmaker in Maine history. “We wanted to do something the public wanted rather than what the parties wanted.”

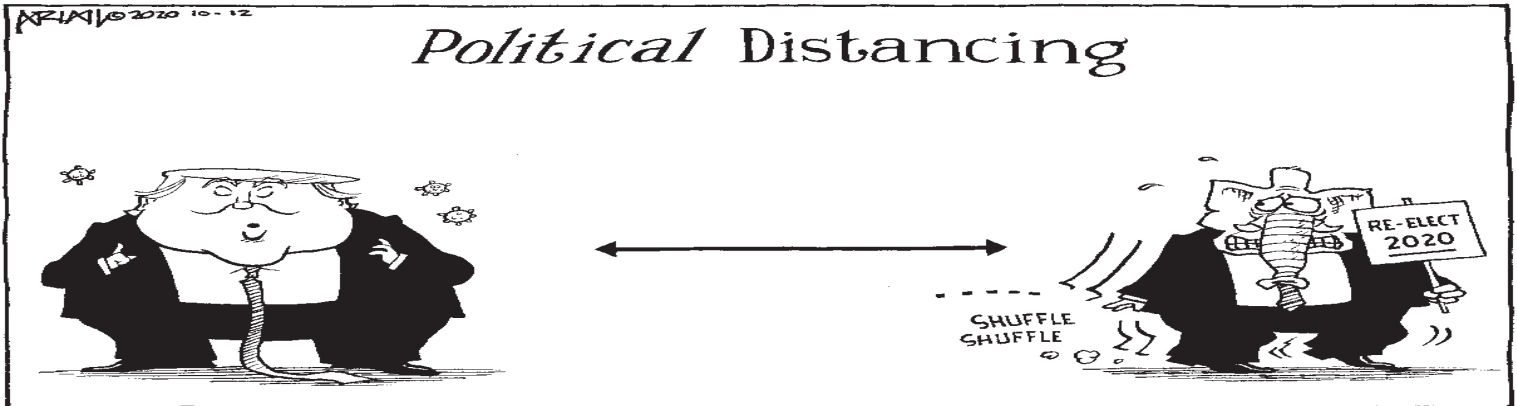
The legislation went into effect after Democratic Gov. Kenneth Curtis, who preferred total elimination of the Electoral College, allowed it to become law without his signature. He permitted its enactment because the Maine statute “may well aid our national decision.”

Though many states used the district system until 1836 – they abandoned it because they believed they held greater power in a winner-take-all arrangement – only Nebraska has followed Maine in modern times, doing so in 1991.

Nebraska’s action was not part of the reform impulse that once was personified by its legendary senator, George W. Norris, a onetime advocate for overhauling the Electoral College, who died in 1944. The state instead was motivated by what James P. Melcher, the University of Maine (Farmington) scholar who is the leading authority on congressional-district electoral votes, characterized as “a desire for more attention from presidential candidates.”

As Maine goes, so goes Nebraska. And maybe, someday, 48 other states.

Chicken, Alaska, got its name because none of the miners there knew how to spell ptarmigan.

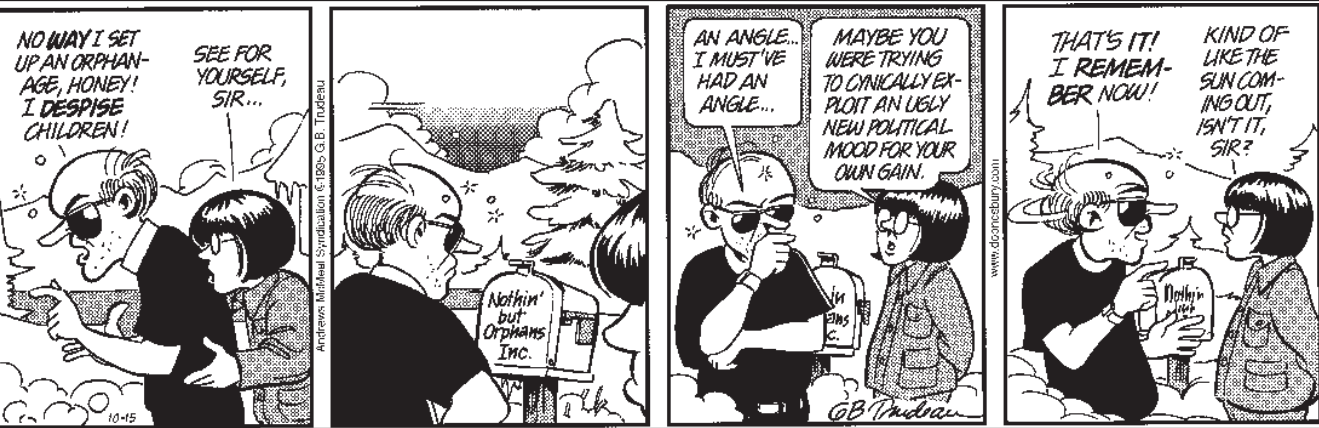

Fire crews deploy to Northern California

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Fire crews from across the state were being deployed to Northern California, where hot, windy conditions Wednesday renewed fire threats in the region where massive blazes already have destroyed hundreds of homes and killed or injured dozens of people this year.

Most of the huge fires that erupted over the past eight weeks are now fully or significantly contained and skies once stained orange by heavy smoke are blue again. Containment means that firefighters have lines holding in a fire, though it doesn’t mean a fire has stopped burning.

But the gains made by thousands of firefighters assigned to the blazes that have scorched more than 4.1 million acres this year could be hampered if new fires ignite, said Daniel Berlant, assistant deputy director with the California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection, known as Cal Fire.

“If a new fire breaks out, that fire will be able to grow very quickly under these conditions,” Berlant said.

The National Weather Service issued a red-flag warning for extreme fire danger from 5 a.m. through Friday morning. With bone-dry humidity and wind gusts possibly hitting 55 mph, Pacific Gas & Electric, the largest utility in the nation, warned that it may cut power starting Wednesday evening to as many as 54,000 customers in 24 counties.

Preemptive electricity cuts are a strategy aimed at preventing fires from being started by power lines that have been damaged or knocked down amid high winds. PG&E equipment sparked several massive blazes that destroyed tens of thousands of homes and killed more than 100 people since 2017.

“We really view it as a last resort option,” said Mark Quinlan, the company’s incident commander.

The utility also has deployed generators and other measures to keep electricity flowing in some areas that might lose power during the outages, Quinlan said.

Mom on trial for deaths says she blacked out

COLUMBIA, S.C. (AP) – A South Carolina mother on trial for placing two of her newborns in trash bags and throwing them away about a year apart told investigators she blacked out from the pain of delivering the second child alone, waking up 15 minutes later and finding the boy’s face blue.

Alyssa Dayvault did not show up for her trial this week on two counts of homicide by child abuse, but the case is moving forward at the Horry County

courthouse with her lawyers putting on a defense.

Prosecutors on Wednesday played a recording of Dayvault’s interview with police who were called after Dayvault showed up at the hospital with an infection caused when she did not deliver the placenta along with the baby boy in December 2018.

Dayvault told investigators in the recording she hid the pregnancy from both her long-time boyfriend and her mother. She said she delivered the baby alone in her North Myrtle Beach home. And after passing out from the pain and discovering the unconscious baby, she put him in a trash bag and threw him away, the recording showed.

Cells at zoo lead to cloning of endangered horse

SAN DIEGO (AP) – Little Kurt looks like any other baby horse as he frolics playfully in his pen. He isn’t afraid to kick or head-butt an intruder who gets in his way and, when he’s hungry, dashes over to his mother for milk.

But 2-month-old Kurt differs from every other baby horse of his kind in one distinct way: He’s a clone.

The rare, endangered Przewalski’s horse was created from cells taken from a stallion that had sat frozen at the San Diego Zoo for 40 years before they were fused with an egg from a domestic horse.

With the egg’s nucleus removed, ensuring Kurt would be basically all Przewalski’s horse, they were implanted in the mare who would become his mom on Aug. 6.

The result, officials say, was the world’s first cloned Przewalski’s horse.

The zoo sees his birth as a milestone in efforts to restore the population of the horse also known as the Asiatic Wild Horse or Mongolian Wild Horse. The small, stocky animals (they stand only about 4 to 5 feet tall at the withers) are believed extinct in the wild and number only about 2,000 in zoos and wildlife habitats. Their limited gene pool puts them at a reproductive disadvantage.

“This colt is expected to be one of the most genetically important individuals of his species,” Bob Wiese, chief life sciences officer at San Diego Zoo Global, which operates the zoo, said in a statement. “We are hopeful that he will bring back genetic variation important for the future of the Przewalski’s horse population.”

Although only 2 months old, Kurt’s birth was made possible in 1980 when cells were taken from a 5-year-old stallion and put in deep freeze at San Diego’s Frozen Zoo facility. His father died in 1998.

Kurt was named for Kurt Benirschke, who played a key role in founding the Frozen Zoo with its extensive research program and cell cultures.

“A central tenet of the Frozen Zoo, when it was established by Dr. Benirschke, was that it would be used for purposes not possible at the time,” said Oliver Ryder, director of genetics at San Diego Zoo Global.

The zoo worked in collaboration with the California conservation group Revive & Restore and the Texas-based company ViaGen Equine in creating Kurt.

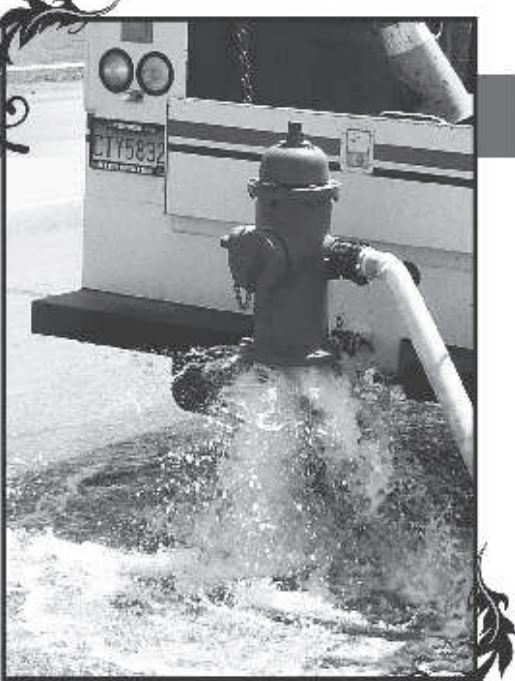

Render unto Caesar what is Caesar's

A good friend of mine recently sent me a link to an article titled "Are Life, Liberty, and the Pursuit of Happiness Christian?"


Rod Martin, the author, ultimately states, "In short, these self-evident unalienable rights, endowed unto all men equally by the Triune Creator God, guaranteed that no man might take a life created in His image, that all men be free of the sinful oppression of modern-day Cains and Nimrods, and that each might pursue the calling God gave him to its fullest reasonable extent" (<https://rodmartin.org/life-liberty-pursuit-happiness-christian/>). I can endorse that.

Martin makes many good points, but I think he might have overlooked some important considerations. I do not see him wrestling sufficiently with the question of how we choose to use, life, liberty, or the pursuit of happiness. If I choose to squander my life in profligate ways, to use my talents solely for my own benefit, is that acting in a Christ-like manner? If I choose to use my liberty in ways which harm others or in ways which deny others the necessities required to sustain a reasonable life, is that acting in a Christ-like manner? If I choose to pursue my own happiness over and above consideration for the happiness of others, or at the expense of oth-

ers' happiness, is that acting in a Christ-like manner?

Case in point: Many argue non-payment of taxes is only good business sense – that doing so enables their own pursuit of happiness. Many take a pro-life stance while refusing to concern themselves with whether the naked are clothed and the hungry are fed. The pursuit of happiness involves far more than being fat, dumb, and happy!

Martin cites Aristotle's use of eudaimonia, which is generally translated as happiness. This translation is unfortunate in that it captures only a small part of what eudaimonia entails (living properly and well in accordance with the rule by which the practically wise man would do so). One may suffer adverse circumstances, e.g., Nelson Mandela's extended imprisonment. I would not

say that he was happy, but I could mount a very reasonable argument that he was living well (making his life count for the greater good), for his life and imprisonment ultimately served to bring greater justice to millions.

The Scripture lesson for next Sunday quotes Jesus as saying, "Render unto Caesar what is Caesar's but render unto God what is God's." Many go to extremes to avoid paying taxes, or begrudging give what is rightfully Caesar's unto Caesar – that is pure, unadulterated greed and selfishness.

I wish Martin had wrestled with these questions: Would we pursue life, liberty, and happiness as Jesus pursued them in service and love to others or would we pursue them merely for our own benefit? Would we pursue life, liberty, and happiness for the good of our social order which would encompass all members of our society or would we pursue them merely for our own benefit? When we pursue them in ways which emulate Jesus' life, I would say we are pursuing them in a Christian manner, but I would not say that in and of themselves they are Christian.

I find many pieces such as Martin's to be attempts to dress elements of greed and selfishness in fine clothing. All too often they fail to consider the way Jesus lived and loved.

Black churches mobilizing voters

NEW YORK (AP) – For the Rev. Jimmy Gates Sr., the 2008 presidential election year was one to remember – and not just because it yielded a historic result as the nation elected its first Black president.

The pastor of Zion Hill Baptist Church in Cleveland recalls how, on the last Sunday of early voting before the general election, he and his congregation traveled in a caravan of packed buses, vans and cars to the city's Board of Elections office and joined a line of voters that seemed to stretch a mile.

"What a sight to see," Gates said. "Seniors, middle-aged people, young people."

In recent election cycles, Black church congregations across the country have launched get-out-the-vote campaigns commonly referred to as "souls to the polls." To counteract racist voter suppression tactics that date back to the Jim Crow era, early voting in the Black community is stressed from pulpits nearly as much as it is by the candidates seeking their support.

But voter mobilization in Black church communities will look much different in 2020. Churches have organized socially distant caravans with greatly reduced transportation capacity for early voting and Election Day ballot-casting. Church volunteers are phone-banking and canvassing the homes of their members to ensure mail-in and absentee ballots are requested and hand-delivered to election board offices or drop boxes before the deadlines.

Bipartisan Christian group forms super PAC to oppose President Trump

WASHINGTON (AP) – A group of prominent Christians from both sides of the aisle, including a past faith adviser to former President Barack Obama, is forming a political action committee designed to chip away at Christian support for President Donald Trump in the final weeks of the 2020 campaign.

Dubbed Not Our Faith, the new super PAC plans to roll out six-figure TV and digital ads focused on Christian voters – particularly the evangelical and Catholic voters who helped power Trump to victory in 2016. Its first digital ad, set to run in Michigan and Pennsylvania, takes sharp aim at Trump's claim to a foothold with Christians.

The ad, shared with The Associated Press in advance of its release, says Trump "has used Christianity for his own purposes," invoking imagery of the Republican president's photo op outside a historic Washington church amid this summer's racial justice demonstrations. Urging Christians to break from Trump, the ad states that they "don't need Trump to save them. The truth is that Trump needs Christians to save his flailing campaign."

That sharp critique of Trump's standing with Christian voters comes as the president looks to evangelicals in particular to help him muscle to reelection over Democratic nominee Joe Biden.

While Biden's campaign is mounting a well-organized faith outreach effort, that work largely focuses on an affirmative case for the former vice president rather than the overtly anti-Trump case

that the new PAC is making.

Among the PAC's advisory council members are Michael Wear, a former faith adviser in Obama's administration and reelection campaign, and Autumn Vandehei, a former aide to onetime Republican Rep. Tom DeLay of Texas. Wear said in an interview that Trump has "in a predatory way attached himself to Christians," asserting that the faith would be "better off" without the president.

"Trump eked out 2016 with unprecedented support from white evangelicals and, important to note, a really strong showing among Catholics. We're going after all of it," Wear said. "We think Christian support is on the table in this election."

Trump and his reelection campaign continue to lean heavily on pitches to Christian voters, with the president asserting the baseless claim that Biden and Democrats are hostile to religion.

Republicans are also appealing to voters of faith by claiming that Democrats have unfairly criticized Supreme Court nominee Amy Coney Barrett for her Catholicism, although no Democratic senator has yet raised the issue during Barrett's confirmation hearings.

Trump's faith adviser and personal pastor, Paula White, is set to appear Tuesday in the battleground state of Ohio at an event for the campaign's evangelical outreach project.

Whether Biden backers' bid to peel away evangelical support from Trump is making headway remains to be seen. A survey from the nonpartisan Pew Research Center taken after Trump's contentious church photo op found that 72% of white evangelicals approved of his handling of the job, a level that has remained largely consistent over his presidency.

But the new PAC sees room for a wide-ranging connection with Christian voters beyond Trump's white evangelical base. Wear said the project hopes "to reach and appeal to a diverse coalition of Christians ... just as we anticipate a diverse coalition of Christians will oppose Donald Trump's re-election."

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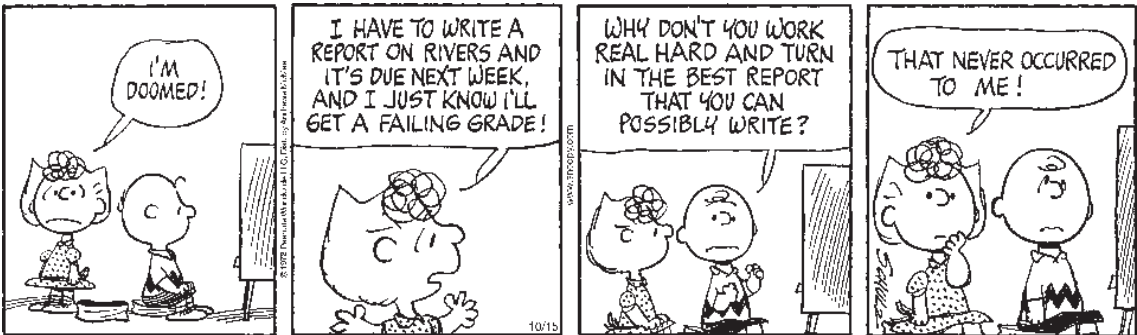

Bridge

By PHILIP ALDER

Mark Twain wrote, “Fiction is obliged to stick to possibilities. Truth isn’t.”

In truth, today’s deal contained several possibilities. South was in three no-trump. West led the heart four: six, queen, eight. East returned the heart two: jack, king, seven. West played a third heart. Declarer led a diamond to her queen, then played a diamond to the king. East won with the ace and led her last heart, after which South claimed the balance for plus 600.

What do you think of the bidding, declarer play and defense?

North should have raised straight to three no-trump. Don’t use Stayman with 4-3-3-3 distribution.

West guessed well to lead a heart. I would have chosen the ineffective spade 10.

East knew that her partner had only four hearts. (South wouldn’t have opened one no-trump with a singleton.) So, there was a strong case for East’s shifting to the club 10 at trick two, which would have worked beautifully here. Also, West knew that the hearts were 4-4. So, after winning the second trick, she should have switched to the club king. This defense would have defeated the contract also.

Declarer knew that to get home she had to drive out the diamond ace. But she was worried that she might lose one diamond and four hearts. So, declarer held up the heart ace until the third round. But when East returned the heart two at trick two, it announced that she had started with four hearts. If hearts were 4-4, holding up couldn’t help. Declarer should have taken the second trick and played on diamonds.

Reversing the trend of rising blood pressure

Barry White was known for his bass-baritone that delivered such low-n-slow ballads as “Can’t Get Enough of Your Love, Babe.” Unfortunately, his easygoing style didn’t prevent him from dying from complications of high blood pressure. It’s a risk more and more Americans face every year, despite the push for regular screening and

the availability of effective antihypertension medications.

According to a study presented at the American Heart Association’s Hypertension 2020 Scientific Sessions with the pessimistic title “Hypertension Control in the U.S. 2009-2018: Rapidly Reversing Years of Progress,” between 1999-2000, around 32% of Americans were able to maintain a healthy blood pressure of 140/90mmHg or less (the guidelines that year). By 2013-2014, the number had risen

to more than half (54.5%). Bravo! But by 2015-2016, there was a 6% drop to 48%. And, as of 2017-2018, fewer than 44% of U.S. adults had a heart-healthy blood pressure.

In 2017, the measure of a healthy blood pressure was lowered from 140/90mmHg to 130/80mmHg, because research shows earlier interventions prevent heart attack and strokes. But we suggest you go lower and aim for 115/75.

So, sign on to reverse the national trend by adopting three tried-and-true interventions: 1) get 300 minutes of exercise weekly; 2) maintain a healthy weight through a plant-based diet that eliminates highly-processed foods and red meats; and 3) know your numbers and talk to your doc about medication if lifestyle intervention doesn’t help enough.

2020 STATEWIDE BALLOT MEASURES CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT A
Title: An amendment to the South Dakota Constitution to legalize, regulate, and tax marijuana; and to require the Legislature to pass laws regarding hemp as well as laws ensuring access to marijuana for medical use.
Attorney General Explanation: This constitutional amendment legalizes the possession, use, transport, and distribution of marijuana and marijuana paraphernalia by people age 21 and older. Individuals may possess or distribute one ounce or less of marijuana. Marijuana plants and marijuana produced from those plants may also be possessed under certain conditions. The amendment authorizes the State Department of Revenue ("Department") to issue marijuana - related licenses for commercial cultivators and manufacturers, testing facilities, wholesalers, and retailers. Local governments may regulate or ban the establishment of licensees within their jurisdictions. The Department must enact rules to implement and enforce this amendment. The amendment requires the Legislature to pass laws regarding medical use of marijuana. The amendment does not legalize hemp; it requires the Legislature to pass laws regulating the cultivation, processing, and sale of hemp. The amendment imposes a 15% tax on marijuana sales. The tax revenue will be used for the Department's costs incurred in implementing this amendment, with remaining revenue equally divided between the support of public schools and the State general fund. Judicial clarification of the amendment may be necessary. The amend-

ment legalizes some substances that are considered felony controlled substances under current State law. Marijuana remains illegal under Federal law.

Fiscal Note: Legalizing cannabis would provide revenues from licensing fees, sales tax, and a 15% excise tax. After regulatory costs, the State would distribute 50% of net revenues annually to public schools and 50% to the general fund. Incarceration costs would decrease due to a decriminalization of several current laws. Estimated Net Revenues: FY2021: \$355,705 FY2022: \$355,705 FY2023: \$19,589,466 FY2024: \$29,372,397

Full Text of Constitutional Amendment A

§ 1. Terms used in this article mean: (1) "Department," the Department of Revenue or its successor agency; (2) "Hemp," the plant of the genus cannabis, and any part of that plant, including the seeds thereof and all derivatives, extracts, cannabinoids, isomers, acids, salts, and salts of isomers, whether growing or not with a delta-9 tetrahydrocannabinol concentration of not more than three-tenths of one percent on a dry weight basis; (3) "Local government," means a county, municipality, town, or township; (4) "Marijuana," the plant of the genus cannabis, and any part of that plant, including the seeds, the resin extracted from any part of the plant, and every com-

pound, manufacture, salt, derivative, mixture, or preparation of the plant, its seeds, or its resin, including hash and marijuana concentrate. The term includes an altered state of marijuana absorbed into the human body. The term does not include hemp, or fiber produced from the stalks, oil or cake made from the seeds of the plant, sterilized seed of the plant which is incapable of germination, or the weight of any other ingredient combined with marijuana to prepare topical or oral administrations, food, drink, or other products; (5) "Marijuana accessory," any equipment, product, material, which is specifically designed for use in planting, propagating, cultivating, growing, harvesting, manufacturing, compounding, converting, producing, processing, preparing, testing, analyzing, packaging, repackaging, storing, containing, ingesting, inhaling, or otherwise introducing marijuana into the human body. §2. Notwithstanding the provisions of this article, this article does not limit or affect laws that prohibit or otherwise regulate: (1) Delivery or distribution of marijuana or marijuana accessories, with or without consideration, to a person younger than twenty-one years of age; (2) Purchase, possession, use, or transport of marijuana or marijuana accessories by a person younger than twenty-one years of age; (3) Consumption of marijuana by a person younger than twenty-one years of age; (4) Operating or being in physical control of any motor vehicle, train,

aircraft, motorboat, or other motorized form of transport while under the influence of marijuana; (5) Consumption of marijuana while operating or being in physical control of a motor vehicle, train, aircraft, motorboat, or other motorized form of transport, while it is being operated; (6) Smoking marijuana within a motor vehicle, aircraft, motorboat, or other motorized form of transport, while it is being operated; (7) Possession or consumption of marijuana or possession of marijuana accessories on the grounds of a public or private preschool, elementary school, or high school, in a school bus, or on the grounds of any correctional facility; (8) Smoking marijuana in a location where smoking tobacco is prohibited; (9) Consumption of marijuana in a public place, other than in an area licensed by the department for consumption; (10) Consumption of marijuana as part of a criminal penalty or a diversion program; (11) Conduct that endangers others; (12) Undertaking any task under the influence of marijuana, if doing so would constitute negligence or professional malpractice; or (13) Performing solvent-based extractions on marijuana using solvents other than water, glycerin, propylene glycol, vegetable oil, or food grade ethanol, unless licensed for this activity by the department. §3. Notwithstanding the provisions of this article, this article does not: (1) Require that an employer permit or accommodate conduct allowed

by this article; (2) Affect an employer's ability to restrict the use of marijuana by employees; (3) Limit the right of a person who occupies, owns, or controls private property from prohibiting or otherwise regulating conduct permitted by this article on or in that property; or (4) Limit the ability of the state or a local government to prohibit or restrict any conduct otherwise permitted under this article within a building owned, leased, or occupied by the state or the local government. §4. Subject to the limitations in this article, the following acts are not unlawful and shall not be an offense under state law or the laws of any local government within the state or be subject to a civil fine, penalty, or sanction, or be a basis for detention, search, or arrest, or to deny any right or privilege, or to seize or forfeit assets under state law or the laws of any local government, if the person is at least twenty-one years of age: (1) Possessing, using, ingesting, inhaling, processing, transporting, delivering without consideration, or distributing without consideration one ounce or less of marijuana, except that not more than eight grams of marijuana may be in a concentrated form; (2) Possessing, planting, cultivating, harvesting, drying, processing, or manufacturing not more than three marijuana plants and possessing the marijuana produced by the plants, provided: (a) The plants and any marijuana produced by the plants in excess of one ounce are kept at one private residence, are in a locked space, and are not visible by normal, unaided vision from a public place; (b) Not more than six plants are kept in or on the grounds of a private residence at one time; and (3) The private residence is located within the ju-


isdiction of a local government where there is no licensed retail store where marijuana is available for purchase pursuant to this article. (3) Assisting another person who is at least twenty-one years of age, or allowing property to be used, in any of the acts permitted by this section; and (4) Possessing, using, delivering, distributing, manufacturing, transferring, or selling to persons twenty-one years of age or older marijuana accessories. §5. (1) A person who, pursuant to §4 of this article, cultivates marijuana plants that are visible by normal, unaided vision from a public place is subject to a civil penalty not exceeding two hundred and fifty dollars. (2) A person who, pursuant to §4 of this article, cultivates marijuana plants that are not kept in a locked space is subject to a civil penalty not exceeding two hundred and fifty dollars. (3) A person who, pursuant to §4 of this article, cultivates marijuana plants within the jurisdiction of a local government where marijuana is available for purchase at a licensed retail store is subject to a civil penalty not exceeding two hundred and fifty dollars, unless the cultivation of marijuana plants is allowed through local ordinance or regulation pursuant to §10. (4) A person who smokes marijuana in a public place, other than in an area licensed for such activity by the department, is subject to a civil penalty not exceeding one hundred dollars. (5) A person who is under twenty-one years of age and possesses, uses, ingests, inhales, transports, delivers without consideration or distributes without consideration one ounce or less of marijuana or possesses, delivers without consideration, or distributes without consideration marijuana accessories is subject

to a civil penalty not to exceed one hundred dollars. The person shall be provided the option of attending up to four hours of drug education or counseling in lieu of the fine. § 6. The department shall have the exclusive power, except as otherwise provided in § 10, to license and regulate the cultivation, manufacture, testing, transport, delivery, and sale of marijuana in the state and to administer and enforce this article. The department shall accept applications for and issue, in addition to any other types of licenses the department deems necessary: (1) Licenses permitting commercial cultivators and manufacturers of marijuana to cultivate, process, manufacture, transport, and sell marijuana to marijuana wholesalers; (2) Licenses permitting independent marijuana testing facilities to analyze and certify the safety and potency of marijuana; (3) Licenses permitting marijuana wholesalers to package, process, and prepare marijuana for transport and sale to retail sales outlets; and (4) Licenses permitting retail sales outlets to sell and deliver marijuana to consumers. § 7. Not later than April 1, 2022, the department shall promulgate rules and issue regulations necessary for the implementation and enforcement of this article. The rules shall be reasonable and shall include: (1) Procedures for the issuance, renewal, suspension, and revocation of licenses; (2) Application, licensing, and renewal fees, not to exceed the amount necessary to cover the costs to the department of implementing and enforcing this article; (3) Time periods, not to exceed ninety days, by which the department must issue or deny an application; (4) Qualifications for licensees; (5) Security requirements, including lighting

and alarm requirements, to prevent diversion; (6) Testing, packaging, and labeling requirements, including maximum tetrahydrocannabinol levels, to ensure consumer safety and accurate information; (7) Restrictions on the manufacture and sale of edible products to ensure consumer and child safety; (8) Health and safety requirements to ensure safe preparation and to prohibit unsafe pesticides; (9) Inspection, tracking, and record-keeping requirements to ensure regulatory compliance and to prevent diversion; (10) Restrictions on advertising and marketing; (11) Requirements to ensure that all applicable statutory environmental, agricultural, and food and product safety requirements are followed; (12) Requirements to prevent the sale and diversion of marijuana to persons under twenty-one years of age; and (13) Civil penalties for the failure to comply with rules adopted pursuant to this article. § 8. In determining the appropriate number of licenses to issue, as required under this article, the department shall: (1) Issue enough licenses to substantially reduce the illicit production and sale of marijuana throughout the state; and (2) Limit the number of licenses issued, if necessary, to prevent an undue concentration of licenses in any one municipality. § 9. Actions and conduct by a licensee, a licensee's employee, and a licensee's agent, as permitted pursuant to a license issued by the department, or by those who allow property to be used by a licensee, a licensee's employee, or a licensee's agent, as permitted pursuant to a license issued by the department, are not unlawful and shall not be an offense under state law, or the laws of any local government within the state, or be subject

to a civil fine, penalty, or sanction, or be a basis for detention, search, or arrest, or to deny any right or privilege, or to seize or forfeit assets under state law, or the laws of any local government within the state. No contract is unenforceable on the basis that marijuana is prohibited by federal law. A holder of a professional or occupational license is not subject to professional discipline for providing advice or services related to marijuana licensees or applications on the basis that marijuana is prohibited by federal law. §10. A local government may enact ordinances or regulations governing the time, place, manner, and number of licensees operating within its jurisdiction. A local government may ban the establishment of licensees or any category of licensee within its jurisdiction. A local government may allow for cultivation at private residences within its jurisdiction that would otherwise not be allowed under §4(2)(c) so long as the cultivation complies with §4(2)(a) and §4(2)(b) and the other requirements of this article. A local government may not prohibit the transportation of marijuana through its jurisdiction on public roads by any person licensed to do so by the department or as otherwise allowed by this article. §11. An excise tax of fifteen percent is imposed upon the gross receipts of all sales of marijuana sold by a person licensed by the department pursuant to this article to a consumer. The Legislature may adjust this rate after November 3, 2024. The department shall by rule establish a procedure for the collection of this tax and shall collect the tax. The revenue collected under this section shall be appropriated to the department to cover costs incurred by the department in carrying out its duties under this article. Fifty percent of the remaining revenue shall be appropriated by

the Legislature for the support of South Dakota public schools and the remainder shall be deposited into the state general fund. § 12. Any rule adopted by the department pursuant to this article must comply with chapter 1-26 of the South Dakota Codified Laws. Any person aggrieved by a decision of the department is entitled to appeal the decision in accordance with chapter 1-26 of the South Dakota Codified Laws. If by April 1, 2022, the department fails to promulgate rules required by this article, or if the department adopts rules that are inconsistent with this article, any resident of the state may commence a mandamus action in circuit court to compel performance by the department in accordance with this article. §13. The department shall publish an annual report that includes the number and type of licenses issued, demographic information on licensees, a description of any enforcement or disciplinary action taken against licensees, a statement of revenues and expenses of the department related to the implementation, administration, and enforcement of this article, and a statement of taxes collected in accordance with this article, and an accounting for how those revenues were disbursed. § 14. Not later than April 1, 2022, the Legislature shall pass laws to: (1) Ensure access to marijuana beyond what is set forth in this article by persons who have been diagnosed by a health care provider, acting within the provider's scope of practice, as having a serious and debilitating medical condition and who are likely to receive therapeutic or palliative benefit from marijuana; and (2) Regulate the cultivation, processing, and sale of hemp. §15. This article shall be broadly construed to accomplish its purposes and intents. Nothing in

If any provision in this article or the application thereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid or unconstitutional, such invalidity or unconstitutionality shall not affect other provisions or applications of the article that can be given effect without the invalid or unconstitutional provision or application, and to this end the provisions of this article are severable.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT B

Title: An amendment to the South Dakota Constitution authorizing the Legislature to allow sports wagering in Deadwood.

Attorney General Explanation: The constitution currently authorizes the Legislature to allow certain types of gaming in the City of Deadwood: roulette, keno, craps, limited card games, and slot machines. This constitution amendment authorizes the Legislature to also include wagering on sporting events as a type of gaming allowed in Deadwood.

Under federal law, any gaming authorized by the Legislature to be offered in Deadwood would also be allowed at on-reservation tribal casinos upon amendments to current tribal gaming compacts. Vote “Yes” to adopt the amendment. Vote “No” to leave the Constitution as it is.

Full Text of Constitutional Amendment B:

A JOINT RESOLUTION, Proposing and submitting to the voters an amendment to the Constitution of the State of South Dakota, providing for wagering on sporting events and to revise provisions regarding certain municipal proceeds of gaming revenues. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE STATE OF SOUTH DAKOTA, THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING THEREIN:

Section 1. That at the next general election held in the state, the following amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of South Dakota, as set forth in section 2 of this Joint Resolution, which is hereby agreed to, shall be submitted to the electors of the state for approval.

Section 2. That Article III, § 25 of the Constitution of the State of South Dakota, be AMENDED:

§ 25. GAMES of chance prohibited--Exceptions. The Legislature shall

may not authorize any game of chance, lottery, or gift enterprise, under any pretense, or for any purpose whatever provided, however, it shall be lawful for the Legislature to authorize by law, bona fide veterans, charitable, educational, religious or fraternal organizations, civic and service clubs, volunteer fire departments, or such other public spirited organizations as it may recognize, to conduct games of chance when the entire net proceeds of such games of chance are to be devoted to educational, charitable, patriotic, religious, or other public spirited uses. However, it shall be lawful for the Legislature to authorize by law a state lottery or video games of chance, or both, which are regulated by the State of South Dakota, either separately by the state or jointly with one or more states, and which are owned and operated by the State of South Dakota, either separately by the state or jointly with one or more states or persons, provided any such video games of chance shall may not directly dispense coins or tokens. However, the Legislature shall may not expand the statutory authority existing as of June 1, 1994, regarding any private ownership of state lottery games or video games of chance, or both. The Legislature shall establish the portion of proceeds due the state from such lottery or video games of chance, or both, and the purposes for which those proceeds are to be used. SDCL 42-7A, and its amendments,

regulations, and related laws, and all acts and contracts relying for authority upon such laws and regulations, beginning July 1, 1987, to the effective date of this amendment, are ratified and approved. Further, it shall be lawful for the Legislature to authorize by law, roulette, keno, craps, wagering on sporting events, limited card games and slot machines within the city limits of Deadwood. The entire net Municipal proceeds of such roulette, keno, craps, wagering on sporting events, limited card games and slot machines shall be devoted to the Historic Restoration and Preservation of Deadwood.

INITIATED MEASURE 26

Title: An initiated measure to legalize marijuana for medical use.

Attorney General Explanation: This measure legalizes medical use of marijuana by qualifying patients, including minors. “Medical use” includes the use, delivery, manufacture – and for State residents, cultivation – of marijuana and marijuana-based products to treat or alleviate debilitating medical conditions certified by the patients’ practitioners. South Dakota patients must obtain a registration card from the State Department of Health. Non-residents may use out-of-state registration cards. Patients may designate caregivers to assist their use of marijuana; the caregivers must register with the Department.

Cardholders may possess 3 ounces of marijuana and additional amounts of marijuana products. Additionally, if a resident cardholder is allowed to grow marijuana plants the cardholder may possess a minimum of 3 plants, as well as marijuana and products made from those plants. The measure legalizes marijuana testing, manufacturing, and cultivation facilities, as well as marijuana dispensaries. These establishments must register with the Department. The measure legalizes some substances that are considered felony controlled substances under current State law. Marijuana remains illegal under Federal law. The measure limits State and local law enforcement’s ability to assist Federal law enforcement authorities.

The 95-section measure contains numerous other provisions not described here. It will likely require judicial or legislative clarification.

Fiscal Note: Legalizing cannabis for medical use would have an initial cost to the state of \$677,309. Once the medical cannabis program is operational, it is expected that ongoing program revenues would cover program costs for a net to zero. This measure will likely have minimal impact on prison and jail costs.

Vote “Yes” to adopt the initiative measure.

Vote “No” to leave South Dakota law as it is.

Full Text of Initiated Measure 26:

An act to provide for regulation, access and compassionate use of cannabis in South Dakota.

Section 1 Terms used in this act mean:

(1) “Allowable amount of cannabis” means:

(a) Three ounces of cannabis or less;

(b) The quantity of cannabis products as established by rules promulgated by the department under section 72 of this Act;

(c) If the cardholder has a registry identification card allowing cultivation, three cannabis plants minimum or as prescribed by physician; and

(d) If the cardholder has a registry identification card allowing cultivation, the amount of cannabis and cannabis products that were produced from the cardholder’s allowable plants, if the cannabis and cannabis products are possessed at the same property where the plants were cultivated.

(2) “Bona fide practitioner-patient relationship”:

(a) A practitioner and patient have a treatment

or consulting relationship, during the course of which the practitioner has completed an assessment of the patient’s medical history and current medical condition, including an appropriate in-person physical examination;

(b) The practitioner has consulted with the patient with respect to the patient’s debilitating medical condition; and

(c) The practitioner is available to or offers to provide follow-up care and treatment to the patient, including, patient examinations;

(3) “Cannabis products,” any concentrated cannabis, cannabis extracts, and products that are infused with cannabis or an extract thereof, and are intended for use or consumption by humans. The term includes edible cannabis products, beverages, topical products, ointments, oils, and tinctures;

(4) “Cannabis product manufacturing facility” an entity registered with the department pursuant to this Act that acquires, possesses, manufactures, delivers, transfers, transports, supplies, or sells cannabis products to a medical cannabis dispensary;

(5) “Cannabis testing facility” or “testing facility” an independent entity registered with the department pursuant to this Act to analyze the safety and potency of cannabis;

(6) “Cardholder,” a qualifying patient or a designated caregiver who has been issued and possesses a valid registry identification card;

(7) “Cultivation facility,” ap entity registered with the department pursuant to this act that acquires, possesses, cultivates, delivers, transfers, transports, supplies, or sells cannabis and related supplies to a medical cannabis establishment;;

(8) “Debitilating medical condition,”

(a) A chronic or debilitating disease or medical condition or its treatment that produces one or more of the following: cachexia or wasting syndrome; severe, debilitating pain; severe nausea; seizures; or severe and persistent muscle spasms, including, those characteristic of multiple sclerosis; or

(b) Any other medical condition or its treatment added by the department, as provided for in section 26 of this act;

(9) “Department,” means the Department of Health.

(10) “Designated caregiver,” a person who:

(a) Is at least twenty one years of age;

(b) Has agreed to assist with a qualifying patient’s medical use of cannabis;

(c) Has not been convicted of a disqualifying felony offense; and

(d) Assists no more than five qualifying patients with the medical use of cannabis, unless the designated caregiver’s qualifying patients each reside in or are admitted to a health care facility or residential care facility where the designated caregiver is employed;

(11) “Disqualifying felony offense,”

(a) a violent crime that was classified as a felony in the jurisdiction where the person was convicted;

(12) “Edible cannabis products” any product that:

(1) contains or is infused with cannabis or an extract thereof;

(b) Is intended for human consumption by oral ingestion; and

(c) Is presented in the form of foodstuffs, beverages, extracts, oils, tinctures, or other similar products;

(13) “Enclosed, locked facility,” any closet, room, greenhouse, building, or other enclosed area that is equipped with locks or other security devices that permit access only by a cardholder or a person allowed to cultivate the plants. Two or more cardholders who reside in the same dwelling may share one enclosed, locked facility for cultivation;

(14) “Medical cannabis” or “cannabis,” marijuana as defined in SD 22-42-1;

(15) “Medical cannabis dispensary” or “dispensary,” an entity registered with the department pursuant to this Act that acquires, possesses, stores, delivers, transfers, transports, sells, supplies, or dispenses cannabis, cannabis products, paraphernalia, or related supplies and educational materials to cardholders;

(16) “Medical cannabis establishment,” a cultivation facility, a cannabis testing facility, a cannabis product manufacturing facility, or a dispensary;

(17) “Medical cannabis establishment agent,” an owner, officer, board member, employee, or volunteer at a medical cannabis establishment;

(18) “Medical use,” includes the acquisition, administration, cultivation, manufacture, delivery, harvest, possession, preparation, transfer, transportation, or use of cannabis or paraphernalia relating to the administration of cannabis to treat or alleviate a registered qualifying patient’s debilitating medical condition or symptom associated with the patient’s debilitating medical condition . The term does not include:

(a) The cultivation of cannabis by a nonresident cardholder;

(b) The cultivation of cannabis by a cardholder who is not designated as being allowed to cultivate on the card holder’s registry identification card; or

(c) The extraction of resin from cannabis by solvent extraction unless the extraction is done by a cannabis product manufacturing facility;

(19) “Nonresident cardholder” a person who:

(a) Has been diagnosed with a debilitating medical condition, or is the parent, guardian, conservator, or other person with authority to consent to the medical treatment of a person who has been diagnosed with a debilitating medical condition;

(2) Is not a resident of this state or who has been a resident of this state for fewer than forty-five days;

(c) Was issued a currently valid registry identification card or its equivalent by another state, district, territory, commonwealth, insular possession of the United States, or country recognized by the United States that allows the person to use cannabis for medical purposes in the jurisdiction of issuance; and

(4) Has submitted any documentation required by the department, and has received confirmation of registration;

(20) “Practitioner,” a physician who is licensed with authority to prescribe drugs to humans. In relation to a nonresident cardholder, the term means a person who is licensed with authority to prescribe drugs to humans in the state of the patient’s residence;

(21) “Qualifying patient,” a person who has been diagnosed by a practitioner as having a debilitating medical condition;

(22) “Registry identification card,” a document issued by the department that identifies a person as a registered qualifying patient or registered designated caregiver, or documentation that is deemed a registry that, in the practitioner’s professional opinion, a patient is likely to receive therapeutic or palliative benefit from the medical use of cannabis to treat or alleviate the patient’s debilitating medical condition or symptom associated with the debilitating medical condition

. This document shall affirm that it is made in the course of a bona fide practitioner-patient relationship and shall specify the qualifying patient’s debilitating medical condition.

Section 2. A cardholder is not subject to arrest, prosecution, or penalty of any kind, or denial of any right or privilege, including any civil penalty or disciplinary action by

a court or occupational or professional licensing board or bureau for:

(l) The medical use of cannabis in accordance with this Act, if the cardholder does not possess more than the allowable amount of cannabis, and if any cannabis plant is either cultivated in an enclosed, locked facility or is being transported;

(2) Reimbursement by a registered qualifying patient to the patient’s registered designated caregiver for direct costs incurred by the registered designated caregiver for assisting with the registered qualifying patient’s medical use of cannabis;

(3) Transferring the cannabis to a testing facility;

(4) Compensating a dispensary or a testing facility for goods or services provided;

(5) Selling, transferring, or delivering cannabis seeds produced by the cardholder to a cultivation facility or dispensary; or

(6) Offering or providing cannabis to a cardholder for a registered qualifying patient’s medical use, to a nonresident cardholder, or to a dispensary if nothing of value is transferred in return and the person giving the cannabis does not knowingly cause the recipient to possess more than the allowable amount of cannabis.

Section 3. That the code be amended by adding a NEW SECTION to read:

No nonresident cardholder is subject to arrest, prosecution, or penalty in any manner, or denied any right or privilege, civil penalty or disciplinary action by a business or occupational or professional licensing board or entity, for acting in accordance with this Act to:

(1) Possess, transport, or store cannabis or cannabis products;

(2) Deliver, transfer, or transport cannabis to a testing facility and compensate a testing facility for services provided;

(3) Accept cannabis offered by a cardholder or nonresident cardholder if nothing of value is exchanged in return;

(4) Purchase or otherwise acquire cannabis from a cultivation facility or dispensary, and cannabis products from cannabis product manufacturing facility or dispensary; and

(5) Deliver, sell, supply, transfer, or transport cannabis, cannabis paraphernalia, or related supplies or educational materials to a cardholder, nonresident cardholder, or dispensary.

Section 9. That the code be amended by adding a NEW SECTION to read:

No cultivation facility or a cultivation facility agent is subject to prosecution, search, or inspection, except by the department pursuant to section 69 of this Act, seizure, or penalty in any manner; or may be denied any right or privilege, including civil penalty or disciplinary action by a court or business licensing board or entity, for acting in accordance with this Act to:

(1) Possess, transport, or store cannabis or cannabis products;

(2) Deliver, transfer, or transport cannabis to a testing facility and compensate a testing facility for services provided;

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(1) Possess, transport, or store cannabis or cannabis products;

(2) Deliver, transfer, or transport cannabis to a testing facility and compensate a testing facility for services provided;

(3) Accept cannabis offered by a cardholder or nonresident cardholder if nothing of value is exchanged in return;

(4) Purchase or otherwise acquire cannabis from a cultivation facility or dispensary, and cannabis products from cannabis product manufacturing facility or dispensary; and

(5) Deliver, sell, supply, transfer, or transport cannabis, cannabis paraphernalia, or related supplies or educational materials to a cardholder, nonresident cardholder, or dispensary.

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(1) Possess, transport, or store cannabis or cannabis products;

(4) Purchase or otherwise acquire cannabis from a cultivation facility or dispensary, and cannabis products from cannabis product manufacturing facility or dispensary; and

(5) Deliver, sell, supply, transfer, or transport cannabis, cannabis paraphernalia, or related supplies or educational materials to a cardholder, nonresident cardholder, or dispensary.

Section 7. That the code be amended by adding a NEW SECTION to read: No person is subject to arrest, prosecution, or penalty of any kind, or may be denied any right or privilege, including any civil penalty or disciplinary action by a court or occupational or professional licensing board or bureau, for:

(1) Providing or selling cannabis paraphernalia to a cardholder, nonresident cardholder, or to a medical cannabis establishment;

(2) Being in the presence or vicinity of the medical use of cannabis that is exempt from criminal or civil penalty by this Act;

(3) Allowing the person’s property to be used for an activity that is exempt from criminal or civil penalty by this Act; or

(4) Assisting a registered qualifying patient with the act of using or administering cannabis.

Section 8. That the code be amended by adding a NEW SECTION to read:

No dispensary or a dispensary agent is subject to prosecution, search, or inspection, except by the department pursuant to section 69 of this Act, seizure, or penalty in any manner; or may be denied any right or privilege, including civil penalty or disciplinary action by a court or business licensing board or entity, for acting in accordance with this Act to:

(1) Possess, transport, or store cannabis or cannabis products;

(2) Deliver, transfer, or transport cannabis to a testing facility and compensate a testing facility for services provided;

(3) Accept cannabis offered by a cardholder or nonresident cardholder if nothing of value is exchanged in return;

(4) Purchase or otherwise acquire cannabis from a cultivation facility or dispensary, and cannabis products from cannabis product manufacturing facility or dispensary; and

(6) If more than one designated caregiver is designated at any given time, documentation demonstrating that a greater number of designated caregivers are needed due to the patient's age or medical condition;

(7) The name of no more than two dispensaries that the qualifying patient designates, if any; and

(8) If the qualifying patient designates a designated caregiver, a designation as to whether the qualifying patient or designated caregiver will be allowed under state law to possess and cultivate cannabis plants for the qualifying patient's medical use.

Section 30. That the code be amended by adding a NEW SECTION to read:

If the qualifying patient is unable to submit the information required by section 29 of this Act due to the person's age or medical condition, the person responsible for making medical decisions for the qualifying patient may do so on behalf of the qualifying patient.

Section 31. That the code be amended by adding a NEW SECTION to read:

Except as provided in section 32 of this Act, the department shall:

(1) Verify the information contained in an application or renewal submitted pursuant to this Act and approve or deny an application or renewal within fifteen days of receiving a completed application or renewal application;

(2) Issue registry identification cards to a qualifying patient and to a qualifying patient's designated caregivers, if any, within five days of approving the application or renewal. A designated caregiver shall have a registry identification card for each of the qualifying patients; and

(3) Enter the registry identification number of any dispensary the patient designates into the verification system.

Section 32. That the code be amended by adding a NEW SECTION to read:

The department may conduct a background check of a designated caregiver in order to carry out the provisions of section 31 of this Act.

Section 33. That the code be amended by adding a NEW SECTION to read:

The department may not issue a registry identification card to a qualifying patient who is younger than eighteen years of age unless:

(1) The qualifying patient's practitioner has explained the potential risks and benefits of the medical use of cannabis to the custodial parent or legal guardian with responsibility for health care decisions for the qualifying patient; and

(2) The custodial parent or legal guardian with responsibility for health care decisions for the qualifying patient consents in writing to:

(a) Allow the qualifying patient's medical use of cannabis;

(b) Serve as the qualifying patient's designated caregiver; and

(c) Control the acquisition of the cannabis, the dosage, and the frequency of the medical use of cannabis by the qualifying patient.

Section 34. That the code be amended by adding a NEW SECTION to read:

The department may deny an application or renewal of a qualifying patient's registry identification card only if the applicant:

(1) Does not provide the required information, fee, or materials;

(2) Previously had a registry identification card revoked; or

(3) Provided false information.

Section 35. The department may deny an application or renewal for a designated caregiver chosen by a qualifying patient whose registry identification card was granted only if:

(l) The designated caregiver does not meet the requirements of a designated caregiver as defined in Section 1 Of this Act

(2) The applicant does not provide the information required;

(3) The designated caregiver previously had a registry identification card revoked; or

(4) The applicant or the designated caregiver provide false information.

Section 36. That the code be amended by adding a NEW SECTION to read:

The department shall give written notice to the qualifying patient of the reason for denying a registry identification card to the qualifying patient or to the qualifying patient's designated caregiver.

Section 37. That the code be amended by adding a NEW SECTION to read:

Denial of an application or renewal under Section 34 or 35 of this Act is considered a final department action, subject to judicial review.

Section 38. That the code be amended by adding a NEW SECTION to read:

Until a qualifying patient who has submitted an application and the required fee to the department receives a registry identification card or a denial, a copy of the patient's application, written certification, and proof that the application was submitted to the department is deemed a registry identification card.

Section 39. That the code be amended by adding a NEW SECTION to read:

Until a designated caregiver whose qualifying patient has submitted an application and the required fee receives a registry identification card or a denial, a copy of the a qualifying patient's application, written certification, and proof that the application was submitted to the department is deemed a registry identification card.

Section 40. That the code be amended by adding a NEW SECTION to read:

Until twenty-five days after the department makes applications available, a valid, written certification issued within the previous year shall be deemed a registry identification card for a qualifying patient.

Section 41. That the code be amended by adding a NEW SECTION to read:

Until twenty-five days after the department makes applications available, the following is considered a designated caregiver registry identification card:

(1) A copy of a qualifying patient's valid written certification issued within the previous year; and

(2) A signed affidavit attesting that the person has significant responsibility for managing the well-being of the patient and that the person has been chosen to assist the qualifying patient.

Section 42. That the code be amended by adding a NEW SECTION to read:

A registry identification cards shall contain all of the following:

(1) The name of the cardholder;

(2) A designation of whether the cardholder is a qualifying patient or a designated caregiver;

(3) The date of issuance and expiration date of the registry identification card;

(4) A random ten-digit alphanumeric identification number, containing at least four numbers and at least four letters, that is unique to the cardholder;

(5) If the cardholder is a designated caregiver, the random identification number of the qualifying patient the designated caregiver will assist;

(6) A clear indication of whether the cardholder has been designated to cultivate cannabis plants for the qualifying patient's medical use;

(7) A photograph of the cardholder; and

(8) The phone number or website address where the card can be verified.

Section 43. That the code be amended by adding a NEW SECTION to read:

A registry identification card expires one year after the date of issue. Unless the practitioner states in the written certification that the qualifying patient would benefit from cannabis until a specified earlier date, then the registry identification card expires on that date.

Section 44. That the code be amended by adding a NEW SECTION to read:

The department shall maintain a confidential list of any person to whom the department has issued a registry identification card and the addresses, phone number, and registry identification number of each person. The list may not be combined or linked in any manner with any other list or database, nor may it be used for any purpose not provided for in this Act.

Section 45. That the code be amended by adding a NEW SECTION to read:

Within one hundred twenty days of the effective date of this Act, the department shall establish a secure phone or web-based verification system. The verification system shall allow law enforcement personnel and medical cannabis establishments to enter a registry identification number and determine whether the number corresponds with a current, valid registry identification card. The system may disclose only:

(1) Whether the identification card is valid;

(2) The name of the cardholder;

(3) Whether the cardholder is a qualifying patient or a designated caregiver;

(4) Whether the cardholder is permitted to cultivate cannabis plants;

(5) The registry identification number of any affiliated registered qualifying patient; and

(6) The registry identification of the qualifying patient's dispensary or dispensaries, if any.

Section 46. That the code be amended by adding a NEW SECTION to read:

The following notifications are required:

(1) A registered qualifying patient shall notify the department of any change in the applicants name or address, or if the patient ceases to have a debilitating medical condition, within ten days of the change;

(2) A registered designated caregiver shall notify the department of any change in the caregiver's name or address, or if the caregiver becomes aware the qualifying patient passed away, within ten days of the change;

(3) Before a registered qualifying patient changes a designated caregiver, the patient shall notify the department;

(4) If a registered qualifying patient changes a preference as to who may cultivate cannabis for the patient, the patient shall notify the department;

(5) If a cardholder loses a registry identification card, the cardholder shall notify the department within ten days of becoming aware the card has been lost; and

(6) Before a registered qualifying patient changes a designated dispensary, the patient shall notify the department;

Section 47. That the code be amended by adding a NEW SECTION to read:

Any notification that a registered qualifying patient is required to make under this Act may be made by the patient's designated caregiver if the qualifying patient is unable to make the notification due to age or medical condition.

Section 48. That the code be amended by adding a NEW SECTION to read:

If a cardholder notifies the department of any item listed in section 46 of this Act, but remains eligible under this Act, the department shall issue the cardholder a new registry identification card with a new random ten-digit alphanumeric identification number within ten days of receiving the updated information and a twenty dollar fee. If the person notifying the department is a registered qualifying patient, the department shall also issue the patient's registered designated caregiver, if any, a new registry identification card within ten days of receiving the updated information.

Section 49. That the code be amended by adding a NEW SECTION to read:

If the registered qualifying patient's certifying practitioner notifies the department in writing that the registered qualifying patient has ceased to suffer from a debilitating medical condition or that the practitioner no longer believes the patient would receive therapeutic or palliative benefit from the medical use of cannabis, the card is void. However, the registered qualifying patient shall have fifteen days to dispose of or give away any cannabis in the registered qualifying patient's possession.

Section 50. That the code be amended by adding a NEW SECTION to read:

A medical cannabis establishment shall notify the department within one business day of any theft or significant loss of cannabis.

Section 51. That the code be amended by adding a NEW SECTION to read:

Except as provided in section 18 of this Act and this section, a person may assert the medical purpose for using cannabis as a defense to any prosecution involving cannabis, and such defense is presumed valid where the evidence shows that:

(1) A practitioner has stated that, in the practitioner's professional opinion, after having completed a full assessment of the person's medical history and current medical condition made in the course of a bona fide practitioner-patient relationship, the patient has a debilitating medical condition and the potential benefits of using cannabis for medical purposes would likely outweigh the health risks for the person;

(2) The person was in possession of no more than three ounces of cannabis, the amount of cannabis products allowed by department rules, six cannabis plants minimum or as prescribed by a physician, and the cannabis produced by those plants;

(3) The person was engaged in the acquisition, possession, use, manufacture, cultivation, or transportation of cannabis, paraphernalia, or both, relating to the administration of cannabis to treat or alleviate the person's debilitating medical condition or symptoms associated with the person's debilitating medical condition; and

(4) Any cultivation of cannabis and storage of more than three ounces of cannabis occurred in a secure location that only the person asserting the defense could access.

Section 52. That the code be amended by adding a NEW SECTION to read:

An affirmative defense and motion to dismiss shall fail if the prosecution proves that:

(1) The person had a registry identification card revoked for misconduct; or

(2) The purpose for the possession or cultivation of cannabis was not solely for palliative or therapeutic use by the person with a debilitating medical condition who raised the defense.

Section 53. That the code be amended by adding a NEW SECTION to read:

A person is not required to possess a registry identification card to raise the affirmative defense set forth in section 51 of this Act

Section 54. That the code be amended by adding a NEW SECTION to read:

If a person demonstrates the person's medical purpose for using cannabis pursuant to this Act, except as provided in section 18 of this Act, the person is not subject to the following for the person's use of cannabis for medical purposes:

(1) Disciplinary action by an occupational or professional licensing board or bureau; or

(2) Forfeiture of any interest in or right to any property other than cannabis.

Section 55. That the code be amended by adding a NEW SECTION to read:

Not later than ninety days after receiving an application for a medical cannabis establishment, the department shall register the prospective medical cannabis establishment and issue a registration certificate and a random ten-digit alphanumeric identification number if all of the following conditions are satisfied:

(i) The prospective medical cannabis establishment has submitted all of the following:

(a) The application fee.

(b) An application, including:

(i) The legal name of the prospective medical cannabis establishment;

(ii) The physical address of the prospective medical cannabis establishment that is not within one thousand feet of a public or private school existing before the date of the medical cannabis establishment application;

(iii) The name and date of birth of each principal officer and board member of the proposed medical cannabis establishment; and

(iv) Any additional information requested by the department.

(c) Operating procedures consistent with rules for oversight of the proposed medical cannabis establishment, including procedures to ensure accurate record keeping and adequate security measures.

(d) If the city or county where the proposed medical cannabis establishment would be located has enacted zoning restrictions, a sworn statement certifying that the proposed medical cannabis establishment does not violate the restrictions.

(e) If the city or county where the proposed medical cannabis establishment requires a local registration, license, or permit, a copy of the registration, license, or permit.

(2) None of the principal officers or board members has served as a principal officer or board member for a medical cannabis establishment that has had its registration certificate revoked.

(3) None of the principal officers or board members is under twenty-one years of age; and

(4) At least one principal officer is a resident of this state.

Section 56. That the code be amended by adding a NEW SECTION to read:

If a local government has enacted a numerical limit on the number of medical cannabis establishments in the locality and a greater number of applicants seek registration, the department shall solicit and consider input from the local government as to its preference for registration.

Section 57. That the code be amended by adding a NEW SECTION to read:

The department shall issue a renewal registration certificate within ten days of receipt of the prescribed renewal application and renewal fee from a medical cannabis establishment if the establishment's registration certificate is not under suspension and has not been revoked.

Section 58. That the code be amended by adding a NEW SECTION to read:

A local government may enact an ordinance not in conflict with this Act, governing the time, place, manner, and number of medical cannabis establishments in the locality. A local government may establish civil penalties for violation of an ordinance governing the time, place, and manner of a medical cannabis establishment that may operate in the locality.

Section 59. That the code be amended by adding a NEW SECTION to read:

No local government may prohibit a dispensary, either expressly or through the enactment of an ordinance that makes the operation of the dispensary impracticable in the jurisdiction.

Section 60. That the code be amended by adding a NEW SECTION to read:

A local government may require a medical cannabis establishment to obtain a local license, permit, or registration to operate, and may charge a reasonable fee for the local license, permit, or registration.

Section 61. That the code be amended by adding a NEW SECTION to read:

Each medical cannabis establishment shall conduct a background check into the criminal history of each person seeking to become a principal officer, board member, agent, volunteer, or employee before the person begins working at the medical cannabis establishment.

Section 62. That the code be amended by adding a NEW SECTION to read:

A medical cannabis establishment may not employ any person who:

(1) Was convicted of a disqualifying felony offense; or

(2) Is under twenty-one years of age.

Section 63. That the code be amended by adding a NEW SECTION to read:

Each medical cannabis establishment shall have operating documents that includes procedures for the oversight of the medical cannabis establishment and procedures to ensure accurate record keeping.

Section 64. That the code be amended by adding a NEW SECTION to read:

A medical cannabis establishment shall implement appropriate security measures designed to deter and prevent the theft of cannabis and unauthorized entrance into any area containing cannabis.

Section 65. That the code be amended by adding a NEW SECTION to read:

All cultivation, harvesting, manufacturing and packaging of cannabis shall take place in a secure facility at a physical address provided to the department during the registration process. The secure facility may only be accessed by agents of the medical cannabis establishment, emergency personnel, and adults who are twenty-one years of age and older and who are accompanied by a medical cannabis establishment agent.

Section 66. That the code be amended by adding a NEW SECTION to read:

No medical cannabis establishment other than a cannabis product manufacturer may produce cannabis concentrates, cannabis extractions, or other cannabis products.

Section 67. That the code be amended by adding a NEW SECTION to read:

A medical cannabis establishment may not share office space with or refer a patient to a practitioner.

Section 68. That the code be amended by adding a NEW SECTION to read:

A medical cannabis establishment may not permit any person to consume cannabis on the property of a medical cannabis establishment.

Section 69. That the code be amended by adding a NEW SECTION to read:

A medical cannabis establishment is subject to inspection by the department during business hours.

Section 70. That the code be amended by adding a NEW SECTION to read:

Before cannabis may be dispensed to a cardholder or nonresident cardholder, a dispensary agent shall:

(1) Shall make a diligent effort to verify that the registry identification card or registration presented to the dispensary is valid;

(2) Shall make a diligent effort to verify that the person presenting the documentation is the person identified on the document presented to the dispensary agent;

(3) May not dispense an amount of cannabis to a person that would cause the person to possess more than the allowable amount of cannabis; and

(4) Shall make a diligent effort to verify that the dispensary is the current dispensary that was designated by the cardholder or nonresident cardholder.

Section 71. That the code be amended by adding a NEW SECTION to read:

A dispensary may not dispense more than three ounces of cannabis to a nonresident cardholder or a registered qualifying patient, directly or via a designated caregiver, in any fourteen day period. A dispensary shall ensure compliance with the limitation under this section by maintaining internal, confidential records that include records specifying how much cannabis is dispensed to a nonresident cardholder or registered qualifying patient and whether it is dispensed directly to a registered qualifying patient or to the designated caregiver.

Section 72. That the code be amended by adding a NEW SECTION to read:

Not later than one hundred twenty days after the effective date of this Act, the department shall promulgate rules pursuant to chapter 1-26:

(1) Governing the manner in which the department shall consider petitions from the public to add a debilitating medical condition or treatment to the list of debilitating medical conditions as defined by this Act, including public notice of and an opportunity to comment in public hearings on the petitions;

(2) Establishing the form and content of registration and renewal applications submitted under this Act;

(3) Establishing a system to numerically score competing medical cannabis establishment applicants, in cases where more applicants apply than are allowed by the local government, that includes analysis of:

(a) The preference of the local government;

(b) In the case of dispensaries, the suitability of the proposed location and its accessibility for patients;

(c) The character, veracity, background, qualifications, and relevant experience of principal officers and board members; and

(d) The business plan proposed by the applicant, that in the case of a cultivation facility or dispensary shall include the ability to maintain an adequate supply of cannabis, plans to ensure safety and security of patrons and the community, procedures to be used to prevent diversion, and any plan for making cannabis available to low-income registered qualifying patients;

(4) Governing the manner in which the department shall consider applications for and renewals of registry identification cards, that may include creating a standardized written certification form;

(5) Governing medical cannabis establishments to ensure the health and safety of qualifying patients and prevent diversion and theft without imposing an undue burden or compromising the confidentiality of a cardholder, including:

(a) Oversight requirements;

(b) Record keeping requirements;

(c) Security requirements, including lighting, physical security, and alarm requirements;

(d) Health and safety regulations, including restrictions on the use of pesticides that are injurious to human health;

(e) Standards for the manufacture of cannabis products and both the indoor and outdoor cultivation of cannabis by a cultivation facility;

(f) Requirements for the transportation and storage of cannabis by a medical cannabis establishment;

(g) Employment and training requirements, including requiring that each medical cannabis establishment create an identification badge for each agent;

(h) Standards for the safe manufacture of cannabis products, including extracts and concentrates;

(i) Restrictions on the advertising, signage, and display of medical cannabis, provided that the restrictions may not prevent appropriate signs on the property of a dispensary, listings in business directories including phone books, listings in marijuana-related or medical publications, or the sponsorship of health or not-for-profit charity or advocacy events;

(j) Requirements and procedures for the safe and accurate packaging and labeling of medical cannabis; and

(k) Certification standards for testing facilities, including requirements for equipment and qualifications for personnel;

(6) Establishing procedures for suspending or terminating the registration certificates or registry identification cards of cardholders and medical cannabis establishments that commit multiple or serious violations of this Act.

(7) Establishing labeling requirements for cannabis and cannabis products, including requiring cannabis product labels to include the following:

(a) The length of time it typically takes for a product to take effect;

(b) Disclosing ingredients and possible allergens;

(c) A nutritional fact panel; and

(d) Requiring that edible cannabis products be clearly identifiable, when practicable, with a standard symbol indicating that it contains cannabis;

(8) Procedures for the registration of nonresident cardholders and the cardholder's designation of no more than two dispensaries, which shall require the submission of:

(a) A practitioner's statement confirming that the patient has a debilitating medical condition; and

(b) Documentation demonstrating that the nonresident cardholder is allowed to possess cannabis or cannabis preparations in the jurisdiction where the nonresident cardholder resides;

(9) Establishing the amount of cannabis products, including the amount of concentrated cannabis, each cardholder and nonresident cardholder may possess; and

(10) Establishing reasonable application and renewal fees for registry identification cards and registration certificates, according to the following:

(a) Application fees for medical cannabis establishments may not exceed five thousand dollars, with this upper limit adjusted annually for inflation;

(b) The total fees collected shall generate revenues sufficient to offset all expenses of implementing and administering this Act;

(c) A sliding scale of patient application and renewal fees based upon a qualifying patient's household income;

(d) The fees charged to qualifying patients, nonresident cardholders, and caregivers shall be no greater than the costs of processing the application and issuing a registry identification card or registration; and

(e) The department may accept donations from private sources to reduce application and renewal fees.

A violation of a required or prohibited action under any rule authorized by this section is a Class 2 Misdemeanor

Section 73. That the code be amended by adding a NEW SECTION to read:

A cardholder or medical cannabis establishment who fails to provide a notice required by this Act is subject to a civil penalty of no more than one hundred fifty dollars.

Any civil penalty collected shall be deposited in the state general fund.

Section 74. That the code be amended by adding a NEW SECTION to read:

In addition to any other penalty under law, a medical cannabis establishment or an agent of a medical cannabis establishment who intentionally sells or otherwise transfers cannabis in exchange for anything of value to a person other than a cardholder, a nonresident cardholder, or to a medical cannabis establishment or its agent is guilty of a Class 6 felony. A person convicted under this section may not continue to be affiliated with the medical cannabis establishment and is disqualified from any future affiliation with any medical cannabis establishment under this Act.

Section 75. That the code be amended by adding a NEW SECTION to read:

In addition to any other penalty under law, a cardholder or nonresident cardholder who intentionally sells or otherwise transfers cannabis in exchange for anything of value to a person other than a cardholder, a nonresident cardholder, or to a medical cannabis establishment or its agent is guilty of a Class 6 felony.

Section 76. That the code be amended by adding a NEW SECTION to read:

A person who intentionally makes a false statement to a law enforcement official about any fact or circumstance relating to the medical use of cannabis to avoid arrest or prosecution is guilty of a Class 2 misdemeanor. The penalty is in addition to any other penalty that may apply for making a false statement or for the possession, cultivation, or sale of cannabis not protected by this Act. If a person convicted of violating this section

EAGAN, Minn. (AP) — When Dalvin Cook hurt his groin and left for the locker room Sunday night in Seattle, the Minnesota Vikings didn’t alter their game plan.

Despite the absence of the NFL’s leading rusher, Minne-sota maintained its run-heavy approach with second-year back Alexander Mattison. In the Vikings’ eyes, the strategy didn’t need to change. After all, Mattison — nicknamed “Deuce” — is nearly a clone of Cook.

“He sees the field how I see the field, and it’s crazy when we come off the field how we see things so similar,” Cook said Wednesday. “He’s just a bigger version. When he comes in, he’s trying to break the home run, too. But he knows what’s ahead of him. I do think Deuce is a similar version of me.”

Cook hobbled off after catching a short pass on the first offensive play of the second half in the 27-26 loss to the Seahawks. Cook came back for one more play, before determining he couldn’t go full speed and was done for the rest of the game.

Mattison had 12 carries for 80 yards in the fourth quarter alone. He finished with 112 yards rushing, the first 100-yard game of his career, on 20

attempts.

“We’re both that two-head-ed monster,” Mattison said.

Cook, who leads the NFL with 489 rushing yards and is tied with New Orleans’ Alvin Kamara with a league-best seven touchdowns, didn’t practice on Wednesday. His status is in question for Min-nesota’s game on Sunday against Atlanta.

“I feel better,” Cook said. “Still taking this thing day by day. As far as my Atlanta sta-tus, we’re going to take this thing day by day. Just see how it feels after treatment and ev-erything.”

Cook has dealt with inju-ries throughout his career, missing 21 games over his first three seasons. The Vi-kings have thus made it a pri-ority to have a steady backup.

When Latavius Murray left in free agency following the 2018 season, Minnesota select-ed Mattison in the third round of the 2019 draft out of Boise State. The similarities to Cook weren’t the reason Mattison was chosen. Call it a fortunate consequence.

“Alexander is a good back, a really conscientious kid,” Vikings coach Mike Zimmer said. “He works real hard and tries to learn from Dalvin as much as he can.”

Mattison grew up in San

Bernardino, an often danger-ous and poverty-stricken city in Southern California. His family was left homeless at times while struggling finan-cially and his father, Darrell, was diagnosed with a rare form of leukemia.

Despite the challenges, Mattison excelled athletical-ly and academically. He had a 4.7 grade-point average and became fluent in Span-ish through a dual immersion program before earning a scholarship to Boise State.

Mattison earned his nick-name while wearing No. 2 as a youth football star in San Bernardino. He wore No. 22 at Boise State. Although safe-ty Harrison Smith owned that number in Minnesota, forcing a change to No. 25, the nick-name stuck with the Vikings.

Deuce would be No. 1 on Sunday if Cook isn’t cleared. The Vikings have a bye the following week.

“Alex is a great back,” Vi-kings quarterback Kirk Cous-ins said. “I don’t feel there’s a lot of limitation there in terms of an area of the offense. He can obviously run the ball, he can pass protect, he can catch the football, he can run all the routes. He knows the game plans inside and out, so you are able to run your offense.”

Jasade Siverson was the top finisher for Estelline/Hen-dricks and she came in eighth (21:55.97). Saide Johnson came in 12th (22:09.73) and Kaylee Johnson came in 15th (22:38.27). Claire Dagel rounded things out for the Redhawks and she fin-ished in 22nd (24:07.65).

Carley Landmark came in 25th (24:31.63) and Brynlee Hansen came in 28th (25:20.57) for Deubrook. Joeve Krier was the final finisher for the Dol-phins and she came in 37th (27:14.79).

Dodgers blow out Braves, cut series lead to 2-1

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — The Baby Braves were the Bat-tered Braves in their first loss of these playoffs.

Now the young pitchers who had been so poised and effective in the postseason will have to try to get Atlanta back on track.

Rookie starter Kyle Wright and the Braves gave up a post-season-record 11 runs in the first inning of a 15-3 loss to the Los Angeles Dodgers in Game 3 of the NL Championship Series on Wednesday night.

The 15 runs allowed in the first three innings were more

than the Braves permitted in their first seven postseason games combined. And those 13 previous runs included seven scored by Los Angeles in the fi-nal three innings of Atlanta’s 8-7 win in Game 2.

The Braves will have to re-mind themselves they still lead the series 2-1, with Game 4 on Thursday night in the first NLCS with no days off since 1978, and the first ever at a neutral site, the home of the Texas Rangers.

Wright gave up seven runs while getting just two outs after Atlanta starters allowed only

five runs over 38 2/3 innings in their first seven playoff games.

The 25-year-old right-hander had one of the five scoreless starts for the Braves, who fell one win short of Kansas City’s record eight straight victories to start the 2014 postseason.

Left-hander Grant Dayton re-placed Wright and yielded eight runs in two innings, making them the second pair of team-mates in postseason history to allow at least seven runs in the same game. Bartolo Colon (seven runs) and Steve Reed (eight) did it with Cleveland in a 23-7

loss to Boston in Game 4 of the 1999 ALDS.

Before this meltdown, Wright and 22-year-old Ian Anderson had given the Braves a pair of impressive rookie pitchers to go with young offensive stars Ron-ald Acuña Jr. and Ozzie Albies.

Wright pitched six scoreless innings in his postseason debut, a 7-0 win over Miami to clinch the NLDS, while Anderson hasn’t allowed a run in 15 2/3 innings covering the first three playoff starts of his career.

Add lefty Max Fried to the

mix, and Atlanta was just the second team to throw shutouts in four of its first five games in a postseason. The other was the 1905 New York Giants.

Now it’s up to another 22-year-old making his postsea-son debut, Bryse Wilson, to try to get the Dodgers’ dangerous offense back under control. The right-hander most likely will face the LA’s career leader in postseason victories, Clayton Kershaw, pitching down the road from his Dallas home.

Kershaw was scratched from Game 2 because of back spasms,

but manager Dave Roberts said the lefty was on track for Game 4 if his condition continued to improve as it had over the past few days.

“We had the mindset of we’ve just got to stay on the gas ped-al,” Wilson said before Game 3. “They can come alive anytime. They’re a great team, great line-up.”

The Dodgers showed it in Game 3 by becoming the first team to score 15 runs and hit five homers in the first three innings of a playoff game, according to the Elias Sports Bureau.
