Brookings Co. voters select 3 incumbents, 1 former lawmaker

BROOKINGS – Three incumbents and one former lawmaker claimed victory Tuesday in local Republican primary elections.

Commissioners Ryan Krogman and Mike Bartley won the Republican primary for Brookings County Commission, while incumbent Rep. Tim Reed and former state senator and representative Larry Tidemann came out on top in the Republican primary for District 7 House.

In the Brookings County Commission race, Krogman was the top vote-getter with 1,877 (47%), followed by Mike Bartley at 1,316 (33%). Newcomer Shawn Hostler came in third with 789 votes (20%).

Krogman and Bartley move on to the November general election, facing independent candidate Tim Bauer of Elkton in a three-way race for two, four-year seats on the commission.

In the District 7 House race, Reed was in first with 1,205 votes (41%), followed by Tidemann at 977 (33%). Incumbent Rep. Doug Post came in third with 764 votes (26%).

Reed and Tidemann move on to the November general election to face Democratic candidates Bill Adamson and Louise Snodgrass, competing for two, two-year District 7 seats in the state House of Representatives.

Brookings County voters followed statewide trends in the primary race for the Democratic nominee for president and in selecting Republican candidates for U.S. senator and U.S. representative.

Ballots cast in favor of Joe Biden for the presidential nomination were well ahead of Bernie Sanders. In Brookings County, 1,395 (75%) voted for Biden, and 456 (25%) chose Sanders.

Brookings County Republicans chose U.S. Sen. Mike Rounds with 1,957 votes (78%), and 536 votes (22%) were cast in favor of Scyller Borglum. They also

Mr. Quinn turns 30

North Dakotan finds his name, niche in Brookings

BROOKINGS – Tim Webster, known to his radio audience here in Brookings as “Mr. Quinn,” is a native of Riverdale, North Dakota, a town built by the federal government. He grew up on the site of the nearby Garrison Dam National Fish Hatchery and graduated from Riverdale High School in 1983.

Now after three decades here, more than half his life, he remains a dedicated bring-your-dreams Brookings resident.

His post-high school education began with a short stint at Brainerd (Minnesota) College, a two-year community and technical college in the Minnesota State Colleges and Universities System. Next came 2 1/2 years at the University of North Dakota. He then attended the

Meyer School of Broadcasting in Minot, North Dakota, a broadcast school, where he later taught.

“I don’t think it still exists,” Webster said. (Online search yields no evidence that the school is still in operation.)

His next stop and the beginning of his life’s vocation came in 1986 at KIZZ-FM 93.7 in Minot; in 1989 he spent a year at KYYZ-FM in Williston, North Dakota. Finally came his last stop: Brookings Radio. He began with a spot on Rock 94 on May 28, 1990.

“I came here completely on a whim.” He described his job in Williston as “not the best situation; let’s put it that way.” His next step was to send out resumes and audition tapes.

“The first person that offers me a job – I don’t care where it is or what it pays – that’s where I’m going.”

Brookings Radio responded and he took the offer; however, he admitted that he had no plan to stay here permanently.

“I figured I’d be here a couple years, springboard to something else. But that’s not how it worked out.”

Shortly after his arrival, ground-up

construction began on the 100,000 watt B93.7 (KBRK-FM). The station signed on the air for the first time on Feb. 17, 1991. From its start he had his own show.

“Essentially, I did the morning show on B93.7, for almost exactly 20 years,” he said. “When I first came here though, it was KGKG Rock 94, just a little 1,000 watt peashooter. Then we pumped it up to 100,000 (watts), moved it out to Arlington and changed the frequency to 93.7.”

Since about 2005, Webster has broadcast on 107.1 The Hawk Classic Rock.

Becoming ‘Mr. Quinn’

In a circuitous fashion, Webster can trace his radio name to Bob Dylan, noted American songwriter, singer, musician and winner of the Nobel Prize for Literature. About 1967, Dylan penned and recorded “The Mighty Quinn,” a song that also mentioned “Quinn the Eskimo.” Over the years several other artists also recorded the song.

As to the monicker “Mr. Quinn,” Webster has claimed it “pretty much from

County’s jobless rate at highest level in 30 years

BROOKINGS – According to the South Dakota Department of Labor, the April unemployment rate for Brookings County was 8.6%. The state unemployment rate was 11% while the federal rate was 14.7%.

The county had 19,284 people in the labor force with 17,618 employed.

Prior to April, the highest level

Tractor destroyed in blaze

ARLINGTON – A tractor caught fire Monday, but the owner wasn’t injured, according to the Brookings County Sheriff’s Office.

“The tractor was a complete loss and was valued at \$35,000,” Assistant Sheriff Scott Sebring said.

The fire was reported at 7:20 p.m. Monday and occurred at 207th Street and 456th Avenue northeast of Arlington, he said.

“The owner ... advised that he smelled what he thought to be burning electrical wires and exited the tractor to see where the smell was coming from. When he was getting back into the tractor, he found the center console on fire,” Sebring said.

Also responding were the Arlington Fire Department and the Lake Preston Fire Department.

Rounds wins GOP nod in virus-altered South Dakota primary

SIOUX FALLS (AP) – South Dakota election officials worked to process a historic number of absentee ballots Tuesday as two congressional incumbents fended off Republican primary challenges in bids for second terms.

The secretary of state's office reported that nearly 87,000 absentee ballots had been returned by Tuesday afternoon, which is almost four times the number received in the 2018 primary. The state had encouraged people to vote absentee to avoid crowded polling places during the coronavirus pandemic.

Election officials have had to scramble to process the deluge of absentee ballots, the Argus Leader reported. The main-in ballots take extra steps to process like matching signatures on the absentee application and the ballot.

Joe Biden easily won South Dakota's Democratic presidential primary as he looks to rack up enough votes nationwide to formally secure the nomination. President Donald Trump won the state on the Republican side, running unopposed.

Meanwhile, GOP Sen. Mike Rounds and Rep. Dusty Johnson coasted to victory in their Republican primaries and both are considered strong favorites to win second terms. The election was also deciding a host of legislative, city and school posts, including some contests that were postponed due to virus concerns.

Jess Jones, a Sioux Falls voter, said the current turmoil in the

country motivated her to vote Tuesday.

"With recent events, any time you have a voice, you should use it to vote for the people that best represent you," she said.

Republican Senate primary

Rounds, of Fort Pierre, defeated state Rep. Scyller Borglum to win the Republican primary in his effort for a second term. He'll face Democrat Dan Ahlers from Dell Rapids in the November general election.

Rounds is a former governor who has focused on agriculture and military policy. While Borglum criticized him for encouraging Chinese foreign investment in the past, Rounds has appeared more assertive on Chinese policy during the coronavirus crisis, stating he believes the coronavirus can be linked to a lab in Wuhan that studies infectious diseases.

Rounds also received an endorsement from President Donald Trump on Tuesday morning.

Republican House primary

Johnson has a clear path to winning a second term in South Dakota's lone seat in the U.S. House after defeating former state legislator Liz Marty May for the Republican nomination. He will not face a Democrat in the November general election but will run against Libertarian Randy "Uriah" Luallin.

Johnson, who is from Mitchell, appears to have a huge fundraising advantage over Luallin. He has focused on agriculture policy and argued for restraint in gov-

ernment spending in response to the coronavirus crisis.

Legislative races

All 105 seats in the Legislature are up for grabs in November, but one powerful Republican leader won't be returning to the Capitol after losing to a political newcomer.

Erin Tobin, a nurse from Winner, defeated the current House Majority Leader Lee Qualm to win the GOP Senate nomination for District 21 in the southern part of the state. She will face Democrat Dan Kerner Andersson in the November general election.

Tobin challenged Qualm after he introduced a bill this year that would have gotten rid of schools' requirements for vaccinations. The bill was condemned by health care groups across the state because it would have decreased vaccination participation.

Tobin received the backing of doctors in the region and raised more campaign cash than Qualm. The race turned aggressive in recent days, with Tobin saying she had been the subject of "personal attacks." She asserted her conservative stance on a range of social issues and was able to end Qualm's eight-year tenure in the Capitol.

Tobin may still face a challenge in the general election as she competes in a district where Democrats have been competitive.

Voters decided on 26 other Republican primaries Tuesday as the GOP seeks to strengthen its grip on the Statehouse.

of unemployment in the last 30 years was in June of 1990, which showed a labor force of 13,898 and the number of workers at 13,095 for an unemployment rate of 5.8%.

"Our unemployment rate over the last five years had averaged just under 3%," said Al Heuton, executive director of Brookings Economic Development Corporation. "It is apparent that COVID-19 has impacted our local business community and their ability to keep their workers employed."

Despite the effects of the coronavirus on the economy, many Brookings businesses are still hiring. In fact, there are currently 931 job openings, according to Heuton. BEDC updates open job opportunities on a daily basis on

its website, jobsinbrookings.com. A temporary employment page has also been added to bridge the gap between displaced workers and short-term employment opportunities.

"We will continue to promote the value and benefit of employment in order to sustain and grow our economy," said Sarah Hauge, BEDC's director of workforce employment. "In addition to posting jobs on our website free of charge, businesses are encouraged to reach out to BEDC for support and resources."

Hauge expects the unemployment rate to possibly climb higher in May because a few businesses did announce layoffs. National models predict South Dakota could reach 15.8% unemployment by July. These projections are based on the number of jobs within industries most vulnera-

ble to COVID-19.

"Brookings is fortunate to have a diversified economy which enables the area to better resist recessions and negative impacts produced by events such as COVID-19," Heuton said. "Further diversifying the economy through entrepreneurship and selective industry recruitment is an on-going BEDC strategy."

When comparing the unemployment rate of the 10 largest counties in South Dakota, Brookings County's rate of 8.6% was the lowest while Lawrence County was the highest at 21.7%.

the beginning. Before that it was the 'Mighty Quinn,' which came from the Manfred Mann and the Earth Band song."

"We were at broadcast school, a horrible blizzard, the evening lab instructor couldn't make it in," Webster explained. "But most of us were already there. So we ran down to the liquor store and got a case of beer and started playing records."

"One of the them was Manfred Mann. And I remember one of the guys said, 'You should be the Mighty Quinn.'" The name stuck with Webster until he got to Brookings.

"Dave Harris, our news director at the time, said, 'You should be Mr. Quinn.' We were talking about Mr. Rogers' Neighborhood." Webster explained. "The solution was to make it Mr. Quinn's Neighborhood, so we did. It was Mr. Quinn's Neighborhood for a very long time (about 24 years)."

"It was a strange transition to make, going from what was an adult contemporary station to a classic rock station; it was a whole different cat, a character change,

I guess."

Still 'someplace special'

Webster now shares the Hawk with J.D. Berreth and Dusty Stalder – a three-man rock-and-roll morning show, from 6 to 11 a.m., Monday through Friday. The trio plays "classic rock, probably from the late '60s through the mid '90s."

Webster conceded that it could sometimes be a struggle to come up with enough banter to carry through a five-hour on-air show. "It really depends on the day and what's happening." But he comes to work prepared.

"My day starts at 4 a.m.," he said. "I get up, stumble around with some coffee, and get online and review some things. I take a lot of notes throughout the day."

"I always make sure I have a Post-It pad with me, because some of your best ideas come while you're waiting in line at the grocery store or standing in the shower and something strikes you."

Webster sees a wide range of demographics in his audience: "25 to 65, maybe more blue collarish-type workers, probably more male than female. It's deceiving, it

really is, especially when you run contests and whatnot. You get a surprising number of women that call.

"You kind of get a basic idea of what you hope the audience is; but when you find out what it actually turns out to be, it can sometimes be surprising."

At the time Webster came here, Brookings prided itself on being "someplace special."

"It kind of is," he said. "It kind of is. A lot has changed in the last 30 years. But the soul of the city has remained completely intact. I think that's one of the things that keeps people here."

Webster said he tries to keep his finger on "the pulse of the city" and hopes that he brings that to his radio show.

Webster has a grown daughter, Johnna, and a year-old grandson, Booker James. Webster and his wife Emily have a teenage son, Liam, and a dog named Dan.

A lifelong motorcycle enthusiast, Webster is a supporter of Sioux River ABATE; additionally, he supports veterans issues via Rolling Thunder, South Dakota Chapter 2.

South Dakota reports 33 new COVID-19 cases, no deaths

SIOUX FALLS (AP) – South Dakota reported 33 new cases of COVID-19 on Tuesday and no new deaths, according to the Department of Health.

The new cases bring the state's total case count to 5,067, but 80% of those have recovered. 1,015 people still have active cases of COVID-19, and 62 people have died from the virus.

Over the past two weeks, the rolling average number of daily new cases has remained mostly constant around 64 per day. There has been a further downward trend in the last two days.

Brookings County cases have risen by one to 17 positive tests, and 16 of those people have recovered. There have been 832 negative tests

in Brookings County as of Tuesday, the state reported.

For most people, the coronavirus causes mild or moderate symptoms, such as fever and cough that clear up in two to three weeks. For some, especially older adults and people with existing health problems, it can cause more severe illness, including pneumonia.

selected Rep. Dusty Johnson with 2,066 votes (83%) over Liz Marty May, who had 412 votes (17%).

Final statewide tallies in those three races were not

available by press time Tuesday night, but Biden, Rounds and Johnson were the presumptive primary winners with a majority of precincts reporting.

In Brookings County's Precinct 5, Republican Pat Powers claimed 220 votes (64%)

over Republican Leon Pesall's 125 votes (36%) in a race for precinct committeeman.

Voter turnout in Brookings County Tuesday came to 24.3%, with 4,490 ballots cast out of 18,479 registered voters.

SDSU, Capital Services expand fellowship program

BROOKINGS – Capitalizing on a postgraduate fellowship, South Dakota State University graduate Ryan Burton has established himself within one of South Dakota's leading financial firms.

Burton, of Sioux Falls, serves as portfolio analytics and risk director at Capital Services in Sioux Falls, a position he has held since 2018, seven years after joining Capital in 2011. The doors at Capital were easy for the Yankton High School graduate to walk through because he was a Capital Services Fellow, which was a financial and developmental boost while obtaining his master's degree in statistics.

The number of students to have gone through the two-year program, which covers tuition and pays a stipend, has grown to 12 since beginning in 2007.

There will be more. A new three-year funding agreement between Capital Services and the SDSU Department of Mathematics and Statistics was finalized April 28. Department Head Kurt Cogswell said the agreement will provide funding to two current faculty members and three graduate students, an increase of one student and one faculty member from what had previously been financed.

Burton served as a fellow in 2012-13 before completing his master's in 2013. He earned his bachelor's degree in mathematics in 2011.

'Jumpstarted my career'

"The fellowship opportunity with SDSU and Capital Services jumpstarted my career enabling me to do what I love while making significant business impacts. Applying predictive analytics techniques learned at SDSU with Capital Services' data has been a great experience," he said.

"After graduating, I've enjoyed continuing to be a part of the SDSU and Capital Services partnership helping with new internships and fellowships."

That's exactly what Cogswell hoped would happen when Capital began the program in 2007. "The money is extremely important and the professional development opportunity is terrific as well," said Cogswell, who is equally excited that the expanded program will address

another facet of the department's curriculum.

The previous agreement provided funding for assistant professor Tom Brandenburger and fellows in academic analytics and financial analytics. The new agreement also funds a fellow in machine learning and artificial intelligence with assistant professor Cedric Neumann, an internationally recognized expert in this area, as the named scholar.

'Extremely intelligent and ambitious'

Alfred Furth, the second person to get a doctorate through SDSU's statistics program and senior vice president at Capital Services, said, "We've been delighted to partner with SDSU for more than a decade in helping to develop some of the brightest minds in the Midwest. With the new agreement, we are able to increase the number of opportunities that can be provided."

"We love to see the success our Capital Services Fellows have had in their careers. The students we have funded are extremely intelligent and ambitious. The majority of their success is a result of their own hard work and dedication, but I like to think we had a small part in unlocking their talent for this discipline."

More than a little, according to Burton.

"I'm grateful that Capital Services' CEO Chuck Hendrickson and SDSU's Mathematics and Statistics Department Head Cogswell helped start the fellowship program that has helped many students early in their career. The combined mentorship from SDSU and from Capital Services during my fellowship was invaluable."

"Connecting the theoretical knowledge from SDSU with real-world applications at Capital Services provided a unique experience," Burton said.

Help from academia, industry

Burton specifically cited help from Brandenburger, his advisor, who "spent many hours helping with both the theoretical and applied aspects of my research. Dr. Gemechis Djira, also on my thesis committee, helped with a simulation analysis to measure the potential impact of trended data."

"At Capital Services, I was mentored by my boss, Dr. Alfred Furth, James Gentile and Valerie Bares, all graduates from SDSU. Chet Wiermanski, former glob-

al chief scientist at TransUnion, was another committee member who brought additional industry expertise. Having help from industry and academia side-by-side was a great balance that led to interesting research."

Now Burton also serves as a mentor for new Capital Services fellows.

Cogswell notes that students are not obligated to work at Capital Services after completing their fellowship and often-times their research work is not of direct benefit to the firm.

"It's really a gracious and beneficial thing Capital has been doing for the last 13 years," he said.

New agreement begins June 22

Brandenburger, who has supervised the academic analytics and financial analytics fellows for 11 of the 13 years, said, "This program provides a valuable connection between the classroom and real world application. Students who have participated in this fellowship program have shown substantially increased career advancement. This has been true whether or not the student stays in financial services."

"In addition to the substantial depth of experience offered by the program, the fellowship recipients also gain breadth that has allowed several to utilize these skills in industries as diverse as consulting, health care and marketing for major regional and national companies."

Neumann expects the same thing to happen in the machine learning and artificial intelligence fellowship.

"I think that it is a tremendous opportunity for our students and for local and regional businesses to work together on challenging problems that will have a positive impact on the economy of the region," Neumann said.

The agreement, which kicks in June 22 to cover fiscal years 2021-23, is the type of partnership the university hopes to further develop with industry, Cogswell said.

"Businesses wanting these analytical capacities have a certain vision of what they want. We want to find what industry wants and prove that our students are capable of delivering that. Research undertaken by Capital Services Fellows is a great way to do that," Cogswell said.

SDSU to offer online parenting classes in June

Each class is intended for parents who have children ranging from newborns up to 3 years old and is designed to help parents understand their children's behaviors.

While there are four sessions,

participants are not required to attend all four. However, participants are required to register by contacting the Family Resource Network at 688-5730 or sdsu.frn@sdstate.edu. Certificates will be given to attendees upon completion of the series.

The "Understanding Me Up to Age 3" parenting series complements the Common Sense Parenting training currently provided by the Department of Social Services, which focuses on children ages 3 to 16. These complementary programs offer a comprehensive system of parent education from birth through the teenage years.

The class topics are:

• June 4 – Why I Do What I Do: This class explains your

child's behaviors as they think, learn and feel with strategies to encourage your child's development;

• June 11 – Keep Me Safe: This class gives tips to keep your home a safe place for your child to grow and learn;

• June 18 – How I Learn: This class provides tips and tools to encourage your child's natural desire to learn; and

• June 25 – Help Me Manage My Feelings: This class provides insight on guiding and encouraging your child through the stressful moments of growing up.

SDSU prof. receives award to study cross-laminated timber for bridges

BROOKINGS – Cross-laminated timber has grown substantially in popularity for use in exterior walls, floors, partition walls and roofs. However, it has not been used in highway bridges in the United States.

A South Dakota State University faculty member will be the first person in the U.S. to study the use of cross-laminated timber on a low-volume vehicle bridge.

Junwon Seo, an associate professor in the Department of Civil and Environmental Engineering in the Jerome J. Lohr College of Engineering at SDSU and chair of the American Society of Civil Engineers Timber Bridges Committee, has received a \$375,700 award from the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Forest Service through its Wood Innovations Grant Program. The figure includes \$125,700 of in-kind contributions.

According to the Forest Service, the grant program received 103 proposals from different government and industrial agencies and academic institutions. It selected the 35 projects for funding. Since 2015, this award has been the first Wood Innovations Grant awarded in South Dakota.

Seo said the success of receiving the award was based on his previous laboratory investigation funded by USDA NIFA through the North Central Regional Sun Grant Center at SDSU and the U.S. Department of Transportation through the Mountain-Plains Consortium. In the project, Seo demonstrated cross-laminated timber can be used as structural bridge materials to resist dead loads and live loads.

Seo's plan is to design, fabricate and build a field demonstration bridge through the collaboration with various government agencies, cross-laminated timber producers and bridge engineers. Also, Seo will assess

the wheel load distribution and load rating of the bridge through collaboration with a Minnesota county and monitor its moisture contents and deterioration through visual inspection for at least six months.

"CLT has great potential to promote wood products markets in bridges on low-volume roads such as rural or forest roads. These efforts will be a

significant benefit that demonstrate the feasibility of the demonstration CLT bridge and that provides forefront information needed to create new standards for exterior applications of CLT," Seo said.

Episode 3: "Tiny Teeth, Fearsome Beasts" (Wednesday, July 1, 9 p.m. on SDPB1)

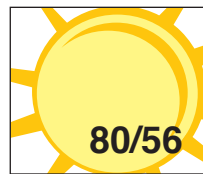
As she drives closer to the present day, Emily discovers surprising truths written in the fossil record. Meantime, scientists studying our planet's past are revealing clues about its future.

Trump's reelection hopes have taken a beating

■ The president wanted to ride a strong economy to a second term, but those hopes are gone.

WASHINGTON – A Quinnipiac University presidential election poll last month showed President Trump trailing Joe Biden by 11 points. It highlighted a sharp turnaround for the once robust Trump economy, triggered by the coronavirus pandemic that led to a plunge in the stock market and a sharply higher unemployment rate. The economy has been tanking ever since, and the coronavirus death count surpassed the 100,000 mark.

"In addition to a 50 percent to 39 percent national lead, Biden outscored Trump on honesty, leadership skills and caring about average Americans,"



The Washington Post reported this week. "Polling also has indicated that people who dislike both Trump and Biden now lean strongly toward Biden, in a shift from 2016, when Trump won voters who disliked both candidates in the race."

In an interview with political

analyst Charlie Cook on MSNBC, Lawrence O'Donnell said the election was coming down to the "lesser of two evils voter, which is the final decider – they're the people who are making up their minds two or three days ahead of time, day of. At the moment they are leaning heavily to Joe Biden even though they don't like him; they don't like Donald Trump more."

"That's right," Cook said. "Now, to me when I look at some of these undecided voters this year or go back six months, you had a group of people that had – they thought the economy was doing really well and they gave President Trump complete credit for it, but they had real doubts, reservations about his character, about him as a person, about his leadership style, all of that ..."

"So maybe he doesn't have a headwind because of the economy, but he's going to lose the tailwind that I think

was the one thing that was kind of keeping him going last year."

The Quinnipiac University poll showed Trump trailing Biden by "one of the biggest gaps to date," the Post concluded. Meantime, "Voters were split over which candidate would do a better job handling the economy, an issue that had been a source of strength for Trump before the pandemic."

Trump's numbers seem to have shifted, according to a poll by Fox News conducted from May 17 to May 20. They showed Trump had fallen behind Biden by 8 points. And Rasmussen Reports, whose polls had been favorable to Trump, showed Biden ahead of him by 5 points – 48 percent to 43 percent.

Elsewhere, Biden was leading Trump in key swing states.

Recent polling in Michigan, Wisconsin, Pennsylvania and Florida, states that Barack Obama won in 2008

and 2012 – and that Trump carried in 2016 – Biden was leading by several points.

In Michigan, for example, a key battleground that Trump "carried by a margin of 0.2 percent of the vote, Biden currently leads by an average of 5.5 points," according to an aggregate of polls compiled by Real Clear Politics.

Beyond that, even Arizona, which hasn't had a majority of its citizens vote for a Democratic presidential candidate since Harry S. Truman, now appears to be in play, analysts say.

It's still a long way to the November election, but Trump is clearly in trouble, and it shouldn't come as a surprise to anyone.

The nation is still struggling to overcome a pandemic that he told us would be over soon and quickly disappear. But 100,000 deaths later, it remains as deadly as ever.

"Lakisha Willis White, 45, Orlando, Florida, was helping to raise some of her dozen grandchildren...."

"Eugene Lamar Limbrick, 41, Colorado Springs, Colorado, loved automobiles, especially trucks...."

As if 100,000 pandemic dead weren't bad enough, yet another African-American is dead at the hands of police: George Floyd, in Minneapolis. His alleged crime? Using a fake \$20 bill. That's something I might do myself, without realizing, but if I did, I wouldn't end up dead. My skin's the

George Floyd cried out for his mama and begged for help as a police officer knelt on his neck for 8 minutes and 46 seconds. For the last three of those minutes, he didn't speak or move. For the last two minutes, he had no pulse.

The New York Times could fill its front page with the names of African-Americans who have died wrongfully through the years at the hands of police. A huge scrolling graphic on its website might help us glimpse the unique persons behind those names and how easily they were dispatched from this life:

"George Floyd, 46, Minneapolis, called 'Big Floyd' by his friends, a 'gentle giant' who would 'give you the shirt off his back.' Killed by police outside a grocery store."

"Breonna Taylor, 26, Louisville, Kentucky, a first responder, killed by police while sleeping in her bed...."

"Eric Garner, 43, New York City, killed by police after breaking up a fight...."

"Tamir Rice, 12, Cleveland, killed by police while playing in a park...."

"Atatiana Jefferson, 25, Fort Worth, Texas, killed by police while babysitting her nephew...."

"Philando Castile, 32, St. Paul, Minnesota, killed by police while driving home from dinner with his girlfriend...."

"Botham Jean, 26, Dallas, Texas, killed by police while eating ice cream in his living room...."

Even during a pandemic, we dare not keep silent when yet another unarmed person of color has been "lynched."

I applaud the peaceful marchers and demonstrators. If I could, I'd be out in the streets with them. As for the rioters, looters and arsonists, let's be clear: community members and public officials agree that the vast majority are using the outrage over George Floyd's death as a cover for their own agendas.

Authorities should investigate and prosecute

them, where appropriate.

Like all dutiful citizens, I've been monitoring the health of our country. The vital signs aren't good.

Minnesota files civil rights charge vs police in Floyd death

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) – The state of Minnesota filed a human rights complaint Tuesday against the Minneapolis Police Department in the death of George Floyd who died after an officer pressed his knee into Floyd's neck for minutes, even after he stopped moving.

Gov. Tim Walz and the Minnesota Department of Human Rights announced the filing at a news conference Tuesday afternoon.

Widely seen bystander video showing Floyd's death has sparked sometimes violent protests around the world.

The officer, Derek Chauvin, has been fired and charged with third-degree murder and second-degree manslaughter. Three other officers involved were fired but have not been charged.

"We know that deeply seated issues exist," the governor said. "I know it because we saw the casual nature of the erasing of George Floyd's life and humanity. We also saw the reaction of the community. They expected nothing to happen, because nothing happened so many times before."

Walz said the investigation into the police department's policies, procedures and practices over the past 10 years will determine if the force has engaged in systemic discrimination toward people of color, and work out how to stop it. State Human Rights Commissioner Rebecca Lucero will lead the investigation.

Lucero's department will seek an agreement from Minneapolis city leaders and the police department to immediately implement interim measures, followed by long-term

measures to address systemic discrimination.

The FBI is also investigating whether police willfully deprived Floyd of his civil rights.

Spokesmen for the police department and the mayor's office didn't immediately respond to messages seeking comment. The Minneapolis City Council planned to issue a statement on the investigation later Tuesday.

The department enforces the state's human rights act, particularly as it applies to discrimination in employment, housing, education, public accommodations and public services. Mediation is one of its first-choice tools, but the cases it files can lead to fuller investigations and sometimes end up in litigation.

The Minneapolis Police Department has faced decades of allegations brutality and other discrimination against African Americans and other minorities, even within the department itself. Critics say its culture resists change, despite the elevation of Medaria Arradondo as its first black police chief in 2017.

Arradondo himself was among five black officers who sued the police department in 2007 over alleged discrimination in promotions, pay, and discipline. They said in their lawsuit that the department had a history of tolerating racism and discrimination. The city eventually settled the lawsuit for \$740,000.

Earlier Tuesday, an attorney for Floyd's family again decried the official autopsy that found his death was caused by cardiac arrest as police restrained him

Confederate monuments coming down around South amid protests

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP) – Sarah Collins Rudolph thought she'd never see what happened in her hometown: Prompted by protests, the city removed a 115-year-old Confederate monument near where her sister and three other black girls died in a racist church bombing in 1963.

A wave of Confederate memorial removals that began after a white supremacist killed nine black people at a Bible study in a church in South Carolina in 2015 is again rolling, with more relics of the Old South being removed from public view after the killing of George Floyd by police in Minnesota.

In Birmingham, where Rudolph lives, the graffiti-covered, pocked base of a massive Confederate monument was all that remained Tuesday after crews dismantled the towering obelisk and trucked it away in pieces overnight. Other symbols came down elsewhere, leaving an empty pedestal in Virginia and a bare flagpole in Florida.

Rudolph, whose sister Addie Mae Collins died in the bombing of 16th Street Baptist Church, had to see the sight for herself. She lowered a protective face mask to take in the absence of an edifice she long considered a

symbol of oppression.

"I'm glad it's been removed because it has been so long, and we know that it's a hate monument," said Rudolph, 69. "It didn't represent the blacks. It just represented the hard times back there a long time ago."

Confederate symbols across the South have been targeted for vandalism during demonstrations sparked by Floyd's death in police custody in Minneapolis. Now, even some of their longtime defenders have decided to remove them.

In Alexandria, Virginia, it was the United Daughters of the Confederacy that took action early Tuesday, removing the statue of a soldier gazing south from Old Town since 1889. And outside Tampa, Florida, a Sons of Confederate Veterans chapter lowered a huge Confederate battle flag that has long been flown in view of two interstate highways.

Birmingham took down the obelisk a day after protesters tried to remove the monument themselves, during one of the many nationwide protests. Crews were preparing to finish the job by pulling up the base.

The monument had been the subject of a protracted court battle between the city and state, which passed a law to protect Confederate icons after

and compressed his neck. The medical examiner also listed fentanyl intoxication and recent methamphetamine use, but not as the cause of death.

A separate autopsy commissioned for Floyd's family concluded that that he died of asphyxiation due to neck and back compression.

"The cause of death was that

he was starving for air. It was lack of oxygen. And so everything else is a red herring to try to throw us off," family attorney Ben Crump said Tuesday. He said the Hennepin County medical examiner went to great lengths to try to convince the public that what was shown on bystander video didn't cause Floyd to die.

rebel monuments were challenged and removed following the killings at Emanuel African Methodist Episcopal Church in Charleston, South Carolina.

Alabama authorities said Birmingham would face a \$25,000 assessment for violating the state law, but Mayor Randall Woodfin said the fine was more affordable than the cost of continued unrest in the city. Online fundraising drives raised more than enough money to pay the fine.

Work to remove the monument began Monday, which was Alabama's holiday honoring Confederate President Jefferson Davis, who was sworn in Montgomery. There, on the same day, someone knocked over a statue of Confederate Gen. Robert E. Lee outside a mostly black high school named for him.

Four people were arrested on criminal mischief charges, and the toppled statue was removed.

In Alexandria, a city spokesman said the United Daughters of the Confederacy informed the city on Monday that it would remove the statue, and the city's only role was to provide

traffic support. By morning, the pedestal was all that was left. City officials were not told where the statue was taken.

Titled "Appomattox," it depicts a solitary Confederate soldier, his head bowed slightly. In 1890, a state law was passed barring local officials from ever removing it.

That law was repealed earlier this year.

Alexandria Mayor Justin Wilson tweeted photos of the removal on Tuesday, saying "Alexandria, like all great cities, is constantly changing and evolving."

In Birmingham, Rudolph saw the removal of the rebel monument as unfinished business from decades ago. The more than 50-foot-tall memorial to Confederate soldiers and sailors was located just a few blocks from the church where Rudolph was badly injured and her sister died when a bomb went off on a Sunday morning.

"The things that we were fighting for in the '60s aren't solved yet," said Rudolph, who testified against Ku Klux Klansmen convicted in the bombing. "We shouldn't be treated the way they treat us."

Florida woman discovers alligators fighting by her home

FORT MYERS, Fla. (AP) – A woman in route to get her morning coffee was jolted awake with pounding on her front door she later discovered to be two alligators fighting in front of her home in Florida.

The video of the surprising encounter in Fort Myers was posted on Facebook last week by Susan Geshel. When she first saw the reptiles before 7 a.m., Geshel told The Fort Myers News-Press that one of the alligators had his snout pinned on her door while the other was stationed at a distance with its snout wide open.

The video then shows Geshel calling her husband in surprise as one of the alligators clamped its jaws on the other's body and pushed it to the wall as it moved away from the house.

"They made a mess on the front door," Geshel, who has never seen alligators on her property in Fort Myers, said. After about 20 minutes by her house, one of the alligators walked across the street to a neighbor's home while the other disappeared from the area and could have gone to a nearby pond, she added.

Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission Spokeswoman Melody Kilborn said the fighting alligators were reacting to being in a confined space.

The reptiles, who Kilborn said are most visible when the weather is warm, also tend to mate during May and June, according to the wildlife agency.

Golfers have run of course because of closed border

FORT FAIRFIELD, Maine (AP) – The closing of the Canadian border because of the pandemic is giving Maine golfers the run of a golf club that straddles the border.

The Aroostook Valley Country Club's parking lot and pro shop are in Maine but the 18-hole course and clubhouse are in the province of New Brunswick.

Maine golfers can park and hit the links. But the border crossing that gives access to Canadian golfers is closed. In an odd twist of fate, the Canadian staff is allowed on the grounds.

"I feel extremely bad for our Canadian members," Larry Gardner, a board member, told the Bangor Daily News. "They're our friends."

Police chief: More than 2,700 arrests in Los Angeles so far

LOS ANGELES (AP) – More than 2,700 people have been arrested since protests and violence began in Los Angeles in response to the death of George Floyd.

Chief Michel Moore told the city Police Commission on Tuesday that about 2,500 of those arrests were for failure to disperse or curfew violations.

The remainder were for crimes including burglary, looting, assaults on police officers and other violence, the chief told the panel, which functions as the Police Department's civilian oversight board.

A huge new demonstration filled streets in the Hollywood area, with police and National Guard troops on scene.

Earlier, police officers took a knee with clergy-led demonstrators near the downtown police headquarters where speakers urged everyone to heed the call of Floyd's family for people to protest peacefully.

Other major cities including San Francisco and San Diego also were calm.

Los Angeles County, however, announced its 10 million residents would again be under curfew starting at 6 p.m. Other jurisdictions around the state also renewed curfews.

The full impact of curfews on the ability to police downtown Los Angeles and other areas of the city was evident by Sunday night, Moore said on Monday.

Violence and thefts on Monday were not on the scale of the weekend, when blocks of stores were devastated, police cars torched and officers injured.

Virginia county pulls officers from DC after Trump photo-op

ARLINGTON, Va. (AP) – A county in northern Virginia pulled its officers out of the District of Columbia Monday night after they played a supporting role in clearing protesters from a park outside the White House so the president could walk to a church for a photo opportunity.

The Arlington County Board issued a statement Monday night saying its officers were used "for a purpose not worthy of our mutual aid obligations."

Arlington officers joined a team of federal law enforcers using chemical agents and flash bangs to forcibly remove a large group of peaceful protesters from Lafayette Park.

That cleared a path for President Donald Trump, who had just issued a statement from the Rose Garden vowing to crack down on protesters, to walk from the White House over to St. John's Church, which had been damaged in earlier protests. Trump then posed with a Bible for a few minutes.

County Board Chair Libby Garvey said on Twitter she's "appalled" that the mutual aid agreement was abused "for a photo op."

Minnehaha County jail inmate died of meth overdose

SIOUX FALLS (AP) – A woman held at the Minnehaha County jail died last month from a meth overdose, according to information from the county coroner released on Tuesday.

Warden Mike Mattson said that Jordin Eichmann removed a substance concealed in her body and ingested it shortly after 2:15 a.m. on May 13. Eichmann, 31, was found unresponsive in her cell later that morning.

She had been booked into the jail on a misdemeanor charge related to child support. Eichmann was a mother of three who was waiting on a spot reserved for her at a treatment facility.

Rapid City police warn armed civilians not to help officers

RAPID CITY (AP) – Rapid City police say civilians organizing armed patrols in an attempt to help law enforcement deal with potentially violent protests over the death of George Floyd in Minneapolis will actually hinder officers.

Representatives from the Rapid City Police Department and the Pennington County Sheriff's Office met with several dozen members of the Defend RCPD/Rapid City Facebook group who had gathered outside the Rushmore Mall Monday. Some carried handguns on their belts.

Police Lt. Andy Becker said armed civilians patrolling businesses could actually encourage protesters who had no plans to show up. He said officers don't want anyone trying to do their jobs, the Rapid City Journal reported.

"We need to be able to do our job, to contain the problem and issue, and having folks threatening to take matters into their own hands actually only makes it harder for us to do the job," he said.

The Police Department said on its social media pages Monday afternoon that it had "found no evidence to substantiate" social media rumors "about out-of-state looters/rioters coming to Rapid City."

The Facebook group was organized by Kenneth Dirk, 38, of Rapid City. Dirk said he supports peaceful protests, but not the violence that has erupted in some communities.

"That sparks a concern because I don't want to see that happen here," he said.

Floyd, who was black, died May 25 after a white Minneapolis police officer pressed his knee against Floyd's neck as Floyd struggled to breathe and eventually became motionless. Derek Chauvin has been charged with third-degree murder and second-degree manslaughter. He and three other officers at the scene have been fired.

U.S. food prices see historic jump; likely to stay high

DES MOINES, Iowa (AP) – As if trips to the grocery store weren't nerve-wracking enough, U.S. shoppers lately have seen the costs of meat, eggs and even potatoes soar as the coronavirus has disrupted processing plants and distribution networks.

Overall, the cost of food bought to eat at home skyrocketed by the most in 46 years, and analysts caution that meat prices in particular could remain high as slaughterhouses struggle to maintain production levels while implementing procedures intended to keep workers healthy.

While price spikes for staples such as eggs and flour have eased as consumer demand has leveled off, prices remain volatile for carrots, potatoes and other produce because of transportation issues and the health of workers who pick crops and work in processing plants.

In short, supermarket customers and restaurant owners shouldn't expect prices to drop anytime soon.

"Our biggest concern is long-term food costs. I believe they will continue to go up," said Julie Kalamboikidis, co-owner of Adriano's Brick Oven, a restaurant in Glenwood, Iowa.

Tamra Kennedy, who owns nine Mexican-inspired fast food franchises in Iowa and

Minnesota, joined Kalamboikidis on a call set up by Iowa U.S. Rep. Cindy Axne and said sometimes even getting essential ingredients is difficult.

"You can pick an ingredient and I can tell you there are shortages," she said.

Big fluctuations in food prices began in March, when the coronavirus pandemic began to sink in for U.S. consumers.

The Labor Department

reports that the 2.6% jump in April food prices was the largest monthly increase in 46 years. Prices for meats, poultry, fish and eggs increased the most, rising 4.3%. Although the 2.9% jump in cereals and bakery products wasn't as steep, it was still the largest increase the agency has recorded.

Dairy and related products, and fruits and vegetables increased by 1.5 percent in April.

Egg prices also reached an all-time record of more than \$3 a dozen in late March, but they have since fallen to less than \$1 a dozen.

The situation has been worse for meat prices, largely because of illnesses among slaughterhouse workers. The outbreaks struck pork processing plants the hardest, but beef and chicken processors also saw some impact as thousands of

workers tested positive for the virus and the United Food and Commercial Workers union said at least 44 workers had died of COVID-19 as of Friday.

April retail prices for boneless pork chops and ham were nearly 6% higher than in March and retail prices for hamburger and sirloin steak were about 4% higher, the U.S. Department of Agriculture reported. The price of whole fresh chickens rose by more than 12%.

After numerous closures, most pork plants have reopened but often not at full capacity, forcing pig farmers to euthanize animals that couldn't be processed.

"There are biological constraints to this and that's why I would anticipate prices to stay high at least for some period of time," said Trey Malone, an agriculture economist and professor at Michigan State University. "If you're going to euthanize thousands of animals and it takes six months to raise a new one, obviously there's going to be some type of delay or buffer in the supply chain."

By mid-May, beef and pork slaughterhouses were operating at about 60% capacity, though that figure has since climbed to nearly 90%, said Jayson Lusk, an economist at Purdue University. Although Lusk was optimistic that the worst of the meat sup-

ply crunch is over, he said it's always possible that a second wave of illness could cause the situation to worsen.

Some grocery price jumps were because of people stocking up when the coronavirus first arrived. But even as some prices have dropped, the cost of produce such as potatoes, onions and carrots has remained above last year's prices.

Much of the increase appears to be because more people are cooking at home.

For garlic, most of which is imported from China, a 278% price increase from a year ago is largely due to a sluggish supply chain in China.

Jeff Dunn, CEO of Bolthouse Farms, a major provider of carrots and distributor of salad dressings and fruit and vegetable-based beverages, said he doesn't anticipate new supply problems. But he noted that some of his company's workers in distribution and field work have become sick, and that there is an additional cost to implement and maintain procedures intended to keep workers safe.

Someone has to pick up those costs, he said.

"There is real cost being built across every supply chain. Not just with us but with the retailer in terms of incremental cost associated with COVID," Dunn said.

In "Nausea," Jean-Paul Sartre wrote, "Three o'clock is always too late or too early for anything you want to do." Presumably it is too late to have a post-lunchtime nap and too early for a cocktail.

However, some things go in threes. My last two columns featured bridge deals used by Charles Schulz in his "Peanuts" cartoon. Surprise, surprise — the day after yesterday's column, Snoopy returns to the aerodrome, ready to fight the Red Baron again. But his mechanics are playing today's deal.

Snoopy asks, "Can anyone tell me if my plane is ready?"

Woodstock replies something. "Yes, I can see this is an important deal," comments Snoopy.

After a few more words from Woodstock, Snoopy says, "Yes, I realize you're not playing 'Old Maid.'" South's jump to three hearts showed 9-11 points. In four hearts, declarer won the spade lead on the board and cashed the heart ace, happy to see the queen fall. He drew trumps, ending in hand, then had to gain three club tricks. Based on the bidding, East rated to be short in that suit. So South cashed his club king, played a club to the jack and claimed the ace to make his contract. Declarer won three spades, four hearts and three clubs.

It was probably lucky for North-South that East was the dealer. If North had been the dealer, he would have opened one no-trump, East would have overcalled two spades, and South might well have raised to three no-trump. Then East's secret weapon would have shot the contract from the sky.

their beverages. According to a study in AJPH, a publication of the American Public Health Association, an analysis of top-selling "juice drinks," marketed to kids found that 97% showed images of fruits on the label, but only 47% contained any of the fruits that were depicted, and 37% contained NONE of the fruits pictured on their labels.

It is such a problem that rather than changing the law, the Food and Drug Administration issued a recommendation in 2016 that says you have to look at the ingredients list on a juice bottle to determine if a drink contains real fruit — the pictures (and words) on the label don't have to make it clear. That's also true for many flavorings: For example, the FDA says current regulations allow use of terms like "maple" or "maple-flavored" on the food label without having maple syrup in the product, as long as it contains something that creates a maple taste.

We say skip juices and opt to give your child fresh fruit instead. Real fruit delivers fiber and an array of nutrients along with no added sugar or artificial sweeteners. Then give thirsty kids water in BPA-, BPS-free bottles.

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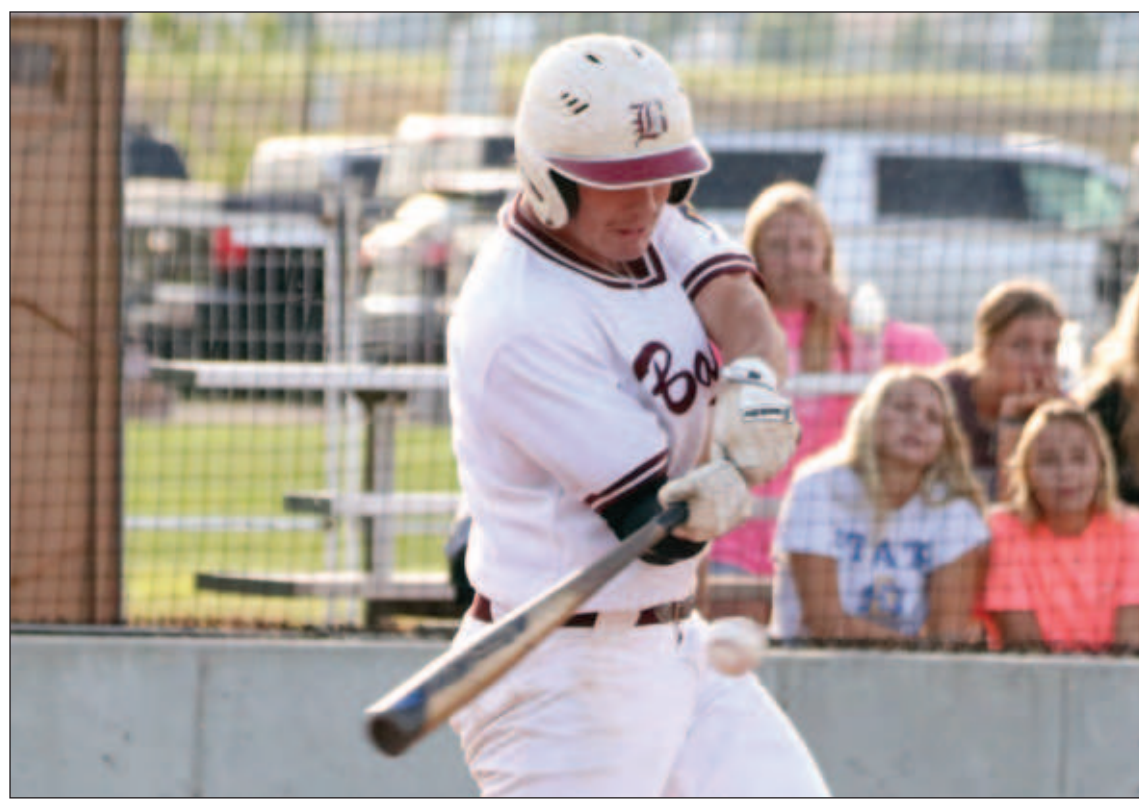

Game on: Bandits open season next week

Let there be baseball. American Legion National headquarters canceled the 2020 season; however, South Dakota will play.

Call it 19U independent baseball.

"As of right now, (all Class A teams are) playing, to my knowledge," said Brookings coach Rob Hirschoff.

The uniforms will be the same - with the Legion patch prevalent - but there is no sponsor.

It's a unique time. It's going to be a unique season.

But there will be baseball.

"The biggest thing is extended dugouts, which will be kind of different at each stadium - but give everyone room to keep that 6-foot zone as much as you can," Hirschoff said when asked about precautions being taken for COVID-19. "Each team will supply their own baseballs. We were kind of already transitioning towards

this, but it works out great this year for each player to just have their own helmet - so there won't be sharing of helmets. Any shared equipment - which now would just be catchers gear, and we'll have two sets, or if you share a bat - will be sanitized. Batting gloves are heavily encouraged.

"As far transportation to games, we won't be using the van. And then we're not doing any overnights as of right now - that would postpone only if we had to go out west or something."

What makes things even more unique for the Bandits is the fact they don't have a home field. Bob Sheldon is being renovated.

"The original plan was to use Erv Huether as our temporary home field, but since (SDSU's) campus is closed down until Aug. 15, we kind of decided we're going to play games on the road," Hirschoff noted. "Mickelson is too small. We didn't know about the availability of Aurora. With minimal revenue - no concessions, not that

many fans - it wasn't going to be really worth it to (play home games on) a field that isn't ours.

"So we're going to do all roadies. The turnaround of it is next year, when Sheldon is ready to go, we're going to have a large majority of home games.

"I've been using this phrase a lot, but trying to look at it as half full - we're actually getting out there and playing ... all roadies will be a little bit of a struggle but hopefully people are thankful we're playing."

Brookings currently has 33 regular-season games scheduled.

The postseason format changed and is now similar to that of the SDHSA's SoDak16 in volleyball and girls' and boys' basketball. Except in baseball, the round of 16 is a best-of-three series instead of one game.

There is a wrinkle this year due to social distancing, and the same format will be used in the round of eight to cut the field to four teams. The final four teams will play a double elimination tourney at the highest remaining seed.

In future seasons, state will be a double elimination tourney with eight teams.

Post 74 went 17-22 last year after qualifying for state in 2018.

"As far as expectations, I usually try to go in with a clean slate or not a lot of expectations versus wait until you get started with practice and not have preconceived thoughts around players," Hirschoff noted.

"Give them a fresh start each year. And it's weird - normally at this time of the year we have the spring season to go off of, which is sort of maybe where your base of where to start from. Expectations, I would say, are kind of pushed off to the side a little bit.

"And then, looking back, we didn't know if we were going to play. But after a couple weeks of practice, I'm really excited. We have a good mix of guys from last year and then guys that I haven't really coached before. I've been happy with what we're seeing.

"I talked with Gunner Peterson and Jared Tschetter - we think top to bottom from Bomb-ers on up we've been pretty happy with the talent in our program. Good numbers at each grade. As far as our spot, I'm happy with what we're seeing. I think we're going to get into a scrimmage maybe on Sunday, so that will give us a little bit of a jumping off point. Just go-

ing in with no real expectations at the start but I've been really happy with what I've seen after two weeks."

Rhett Zelinsky, a William Penn University baseball commit, Parker Rykhus and Cole Mahlum are the most experienced returners.

Zelinsky hit .325 with 11 doubles and 35 RBIs in 39 games a season ago.

Rykhus ended up .248 with 25 RBIs in 34 contests.

Mahlum, a catcher, hit .309 with five doubles, a triple and 10 RBI in 34 games.

Jackson Krogman batted .383 in 24 games.

Caden Wright appeared in 19 games and Daniel Messerli seven in 2019.

Rounding out the 2020 roster are Wes Koenig, Jamison Honkomp, Mason Bebensee, Jake Ammann, Max Kjelden, Joey McMacken, Kyle Bauer and Henry Hammrich.
