

Bobcats look to make their way back to SoDak 16

BROOKINGS – The Brookings Bobcats have a young core and a plethora of athletic guards, but Mike McCarty will take over on the sidelines as the Bobcats look to make their way to the SoDak 16 this season.

McCarty takes over for David Rohrbach, who led the Bobcats to a 3-17 record last season. After spending six years with the Spearfish boys basketball team and three years coaching girls basketball at Thunder Basin High School in Gillette, Wyoming, McCarty will oversee a team that lost key seniors Sam Conrad, Nathan Lease, Ryan Bauman and Jackson Hoffman but returns guard Austin Clark and center Öwen Burns.

"They played a lot and gained a lot of experience last year," McCarty said of Clark and Burns. "They have good leadership for us and have that varsity experience."

McCarty complimented Clark's ability to shoot, score from the outside and get to the basket as well as his ability to defend on the perimeter. While Burns provides an inside presence due to his post moves and ability to finish with either hand, he also contributes defensively and on the glass.

Burns and Clark will be joined by several seniors that will provide the foundation of this year's team. McCarty praised Nathan Smith for his ability to handle the ball and Sam Johnson for his athleticism at the guard position. Fellow

his philosophies this summer.

Cole Kyberg and Cale Jones will also be relied upon this season as well as Keech Bior, a transfer from Fargo who McCarty believes can provide some help on both ends of the floor.

Together, McCarty is trying to install a brand of team basketball and has worked hard to implement

"We've spent a lot of time this summer talking about ball movement, player movement, reading defenders and taking what the defense gives us," McCarty said. "We definitely want to play a fast, up-tempo type of style and shoot some outside shots but we still want to attack the basket as well."

McCarty also noted the number of guards which will help complement his up-tempo style but also a desire to post up players if there are some advantages.

Together, the Bobcats are set on competing for a berth in the state tournament but will have to do so battling in a tough ESD conference. While McCarty said

there will be an acclimation period after his time in Wyoming, he's confident heading into the season.

"I'm optimistic of where we are," McCarty said. "I think with the guys that we have coming back and some of the seniors that we have, we definitely have an opportunity to be competitive with most of the teams in the ESD."





Bobcats' young core has big goals for 2023-24

BROOKINGS – After a year where their young players got plenty of experience, the Brookings Bobcats will look to take another step forward this winter as they aim toward a return to the SoDak 16.

The Bobcats finished 5-16 a year ago and lost to ESD champion Pierre in the SoDak 16. While Brookings lost senior starters Gracey Sheridan and Sophia Hammerich, they return several players from a young nucleus that head coach Mitch McLagan believes has plenty of upside moving forward.

"Our young kids, they're stil young but in terms of court time, they're not that young anymore," McLagan said. "We're going to ask a lot of those athletes to be leaders for us and be in some roles they may not be comfortable with yet. But as the season goes on, we really need them to step up and kind of be the floor generals, helping our young girls that don't have experience on the floor."

The Bobcats will be led in part by junior Logan Smidt, who committed to Southwest Minnesota State last offseason. An All-ESD pick, Smidt will look to build off a strong sophomore season, but McLagan notes she will also need help from the players around her to make that happen.

"She's going to be a big piece, but she's also going to be a player that every team is going to focus on," McLagan said. "That's where we're going to need some other players to step up."

Sophomores Amari Ward and Macy Even will be two of the younger players who will be expected to fill those roles along with junior Tess Burns, who was a key reserve last season.

With senior Kymber Buys also expected to contribute on both sides of the court, McLagan is also expecting a larger role for fellow senior Brynlee Mack and sophomores Sloane McLagan and Lily Thompson.

"We legit have four people that can score and I think we can have more people that can help us," McLagan said. "But we have players that have scored a lot of points in varsity basketball that are returning, so while we are young, we have some scorers and some of them just need to realize they need to be more offensive-minded and be aggressive on the offensive end."

Together, the Bobcats will compete in an ESD conference that is loaded with competition. While the Lady Governors will be the favorite, other teams such as Brandon Valley and Harrisburg could make a bid to win the conference with another group of teams such as Aberdeen Central and Mitchell battling behind them.

"You have some really good teams towards the top and then I think you have a bunch of teams that are right there," McLagan

said. "You start looking and see how much you match up with them and that's where we want to be. We're not there yet...but I think a lot of us are really close to what you have in that upper tier."

If the Bobcats can make that step forward, McLagan believes they can accomplish even more this upcoming season. But he also cautioned it will take some patience to allow his young roster to grow into that role and will need a fast start in the regular season to reach that goal.

"You want to see that growth faster than what is probably going to happen, but I don't think it's a secret," McLagan said. "I think we have a roster that needs to be able to compete for a state tournament and when we look at that, we truly believe we have a group that can make a state tournament. That's a goal that's a really long way away, but I think that starts during the regular season and it's important that you win games early and put yourself in a good position to go beat somebody in the spring."





Rangers seek four-peat as state champs, national title

BROOKINGS – After winning their third straight title last season, the Brookings Rangers have high expectations. But while a four-peat would be nice, Brookings has their sights even higher to win a national championship this winter.

The Rangers went 19-2-1 last season and won three straight games including a victory over previously undefeated Sioux Falls to win the state title. While that was a great accomplishment, the Rangers fell twice to the Springfield (Mass.) Jr. Thunderbirds including a 5-1 loss in the championship game that left them short of a national title.

"After our showing at the national tournament last year, we don't want to look too far ahead," Rangers head coach Garrett Gerstner said. "We're pushing for that fourth state title but we played very well at the national tournament. So I think naturally that would be our next step to win that national championship."

Gerstner will be tasked to lead the Rangers after Justin Kirchhevel stepped down and became the Rangers' hockey director. Entering his eighth year with the program with previous experience as a JV coach and a Bantam level coach, Gerstner was excited to work with some of the players he coached throughout their youth years. "It's kind of the first group that I started with," Gerstner said. "I've known all of these kids for a long time and been able to watch and help them develop as hockey players."

Part of that group will be Addison Ronning, who started for the Rangers during last year's run to the state title. Ronning will also have the benefit of playing behind a loaded defensive group that includes defensemen Luke Honkomp and captain David Brink.

The top pairing on the blue line is a perfect contrast for the Rangers as Honkomp ranked fourth in the state with 53 points and Brink is a prototypical defensive defenseman.

"[David] just doesn't play similar to Luke," Gerstner said. "You know exactly what you're going to get and they can play a lot of minutes in every situation."

A challenge for the Rangers will be replacing some of their offensive production from a year ago. Graduating senior Zach Struck was second in the state with 66 points (34 goals, 32 assists last season) and outgoing junior Breck Hirrschoff led the state with 72 points (30 goals, 72 assists) before joining the Sioux Falls POWER this season.

While replacing that production will be key, Gerstner also believes that practicing against some of the top players in the state has helped his younger players form a group of players to step in this season.

"A lot of those guys who were practicing against them are now the guys we're looking to elevate their game so they can fill those roles," Gerstner said. "They might not be playing on that top line because we have a lot of seniors this year, but you're just looking to replace them by committee and have everyone chip in." The Rangers would love to score their fourth straight state championships and would be the first school to accomplish that feat since Sioux Falls did it in the 1990s. But the Rangers would also like to capture a national title, which is their biggest objective heading into the season. would have to be celebrated," Gerstner said. "We work so hard and I just think it'd be huge for the town of Brookings to see that you can stay here, you can go and play of these teams out of state and see where we stack up. We're trying to push these kids in the right direction and make them the best hockey players that they can be."

Rangers look to reload after winning state title

BROOKINGS - One year after winning the South Dakota Amateur Hockey Association state championship, the Brookings Rangers will look to reload as they welcome a slew of new faces to this year's team.

The Rangers went 13-3-0-0 in conference play a year ago and made a run as the No. 3 seed to win the state title. Repeating that feat won't be easy as they lost seven seniors from last year's squad including captain Savannah Barber and alternate captains Kiran Vugteveen, Taylor Hokenson and Ella Park.

"That group [of underclassmen] needs to play a big role," Anderson, who is in his third year as the head coach of the girls team and fifth total year with the program said about this year's team. "Part of our retool and recharge is that I think they have enough experience to lead this team and get it going in the right direction."

Despite their youth and several players who are playing at the varsi-

ty level for the first time, the core of this year's team has had success as a runner-up during the 14U tournament. But Anderson stressed the importance of getting used to the speed of the game as one challenge his team could face as well as building the culture that that helped them take home a state title one year ago.

"We have a really good group of girls that get along off the ice and in the locker room," Anderson said. "They seem to have gelled up extremely well at this point and that's one of the things we preach a lot. We want to develop a strong culture because we feel that once the girls had that great team bond, that will naturally lead to success."

Anderson also believes bond will also have to be forged among a group of players that haven't played alongside each other extensively but could be created with time.

"This is the first time some of these girls will skate with each other so they'll have to get familiar on and off the ice," Anderson explained. "It's about developing that trust through-

out the season."

That process will take place within an SDAHA landscape that has several teams worthy of a state title. Aberdeen, Sioux Falls, Mitchell and Oahe, who defeated the Rangers in the 14U state tournament last year, could all be considered favorites but a team like Brookings or Rushmore

could be a wild card.

With so much unpredictability, Anderson and the Rangers are focused on what they can control and looking to reload after losing so much from a year ago.

"I'm expecting the girls to show up everyday, work hard, learn new things and progress," Anderson said.

"We are trying to establish a strong culture and I think we have enough girls from last year who have experienced that success and know what it takes to win a state title. Hopefully, it's just something that's contagious and spreads with the rest of the younger girls and keeps that run going."

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Bobcat boys wrestling looks to take next step, girls hope to continue to compete as one team

BROOKINGS – The Brookings Bobcats have a strong leadership group with four returning to this year's team. But a talented group of sophomores will look to take the next step as the Bobcats wrestling team looks to compete at a high level during the 2023-24 season.

The Bobcats will be led by their veteran group of Joey Fitzpatrick, Tate Helmbolt, Nolan Miles and Logan Straub. While Miles placed second at 126 pounds, Helmbolt placed fourth at 106 pounds and Fitzpatrick qualified for the state tournament, the group will be relied upon heavily to replace graduating place-winners Israel Caldron (fifth at 170 pounds), Tyson Brandt (fourth at 182 points), Caleb Loehr (eight at 195 pounds) and James Olson (eighth at 220 pounds).

"Their leadership will help based on the fact that they are seniors and have been in the lineup for four years," Brookings boys wrestling coach Matt Hanson said. "They've got state tournament experience so their leadership for practices and meets will be just as valuable for the younger kids."

Hanson also complimented his current group of seniors for how they've grown over the past year but not just physically. Hanson believes his four seniors have

taken a step mentally heading into their final year with the Bobcats.

"They've kind of taken over their team," Hanson said. "They know this is their last go at it, so they've kind of taken the reins and they're leading practices. They're doing what they're supposed to do."

In addition to the seniors, the Bobcats have a group of underclassmen who could take a step forward this season. The biggest addition is junior Gabriel Stern who qualified for state as an eighth grader at 126 pounds and as a freshman at 138 pounds before missing last season with a hip injury.

Brookings also has a talented group of sophomores who will look to fill out some of the holes in the lineup.

"We knew we had a big sophomore class that we needed to make sure was ready to go this year," Hanson said. "Some of them are starting to separate themselves and figure out what they need to do to be successful and that's a good sign for this early in the season."

The Bobcats will compete in a loaded ESD conference that contains several top contenders. With Watertown, Harrisburg and Aberdeen Central expected to lead the conference, Hanson sees plenty of challenges ahead.

"We've looked at it every year and usually four or five of the top teams in the state come from our conference," Hanson said. "We're definitely battle-tested by February and that's kind of how we look at our season. We just need to keep getting better so we can make a good postseason run."

Even with a tough conference slate, the state tournament remains the main goal for the Bobcats. While there will be plenty of youth, Hanson believes the talent is there to push several wrestlers to the state tournament and could lead to another step forward for the Bobcat wrestling program.

"If I had one goal for this squad, it would be to be in the best position we can be," Hanson said. "I know that's a broad statement but last year we made a goal that we all wanted to be in the match to qualify for the state tournament. They all did that and a couple got in with some upsets but that's the steps we're trying to take. This year, they hopefully get over that hurdle and are at their best in February."

Girls

While the Brookings wrestling program competes as one team, the girls program has its own goals this winter.

The Bobcats girls program has continued to grow over the years and will continue this season as Eric Toft will lead the team as it looks to return to the state tournament and be one of the top teams in the state. "I think it signals to the girls in the community that the Bobcats take [girls wrestling] seriously and that we want to give them all the resources they need," Eric Toft said. "We have a couple of girls events where the boys don't go but almost all of our events are together so we talk to the girls and boys as though we are one Bobcat team and that has worked well for us."

Eric Toft takes over the girls program after boys head coach Matt Hanson oversaw both teams the past two seasons. Toft has been with the Brookings wrestling program for 18 years as a middle school coach and assistant varsity coach and takes over a strong foundation that is led by senior Maizy Mathis, who placed second at 170 pounds during last year's state tournament and has taken on a leadership role with the team.

"All the girls look to Maizy," Eric Toft said. "She is a role model and a vocal leader. She is not afraid to speak and take on that role. She would never brag about it, but it just fits her. ...She's just an awesome person. She's always positive. She works extremely hard and she's very humble. She's about as good a kid we could ask for her to be."

The Bobcats will also have some veteran experience with junior Johanna Steinlicht, who placed fourth at 132 pounds, sophomore Bailey Tekrony, who qualified for state at 106 pounds, and senior Cierra Strand, who qualified for state before suffering an injury.

But there's also a wave of new talent joining the team including freshman MaKenna Hudy, eighth grader Ramsie Hinricher and seventh graders Claire Milliron and Lily Toft.

"We don't have a lot of girls, but the girls we have are pretty darn good," Eric Toft said. "The girls that we moved up have a lot of potential. A lot of them are raw, but they're athletic and aggressive."

The Bobcats will continue to work in a landscape where girls wrestling has changed over the past three seasons. Canton, Pierre and Spearfish are considered to be some of the deepest teams in the state but also can fill an entire lineup as the state added two additional weight classes this season.

While those teams have depth, Toft believes in his team's talent to wrestle against any team in the state. That's led to a goal to finish in the top five at the state tournament but to also have fun, enjoy the season and continue to work as one team.

"These girls are very tight and they get along very well," Eric Toft said. "They have the older generation and those older girls are bringing in the younger girls and mentoring them. If we can keep that cycle going, we're going to continue to be strong."



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Brookings bowling looks for redemption, improvement in 2023-24

The boys team finished 6-7 in the ESD conference last year but bowled at their best during the state tournament. After knocking off top-seeded Yankton at state, the Bobcats return virtually their entire roster from a year ago and are hoping to continue that momentum into this year.

"We were extremely pleased to come away with fifth place," Brookings boys coach Rick Hieb said. "For these young kids, knocking off Yankton was just as good as winning the championship because that was a really good team."

The Bobcats return several of their top bowlers from a year ago including Gage Craft, Adrian Howard and Dylan Scubelek. With Riley Owens and James Tefft also contributing, Brookings also has plenty of youth including Holden Austreim, who has stepped up as the team's anchor.

"We work as a team, so we really push the team aspect and this year, I'm seeing it more than I ever have," Rick Hieb said. "We have 18 bowlers and we're still young, so we can definitely take another step forward."

While the boys team is looking to capitalize on its momentum, the

girls team is looking to get back to the top of the conference after going 13-0 last season on its way to winning the regular season title last year but finishing third at last year's state tournament.

"We kind of had a little hiccup at state," Brookings girls bowling coach Kasee Hieb said. "The previous year, we were able to win it all, so that's why I think the girls are really out for redemption this year and show that last year was a fluke."

Like the boys team, the girls team will continue to lean on a young nucleus. Alexis and Brooklyn Hieb are two key bowlers but Catelyn Venarsky, Peyton McBride, Teagen Bremmon, Maddey Austreim and Hayley McBride give the Bobcats a level of depth rarely seen at any level in the state.

"There are a few teams that will maybe have a good bowler, but we literally have seven or eight," Kasee Hieb said. "Only six can play at the varsity level at a team, so our depth is unmatched."

Hieb also believes that her team has connected well after last year's disappointment and the years of perfecting their craft will help both teams as they enter this season.

"These kids get to bowl together for a lot of years," Kasee Hieb said. "They get to know each other and I think that helps a lot, but I have a goal for them to have the top average in the girls league and I know they can do it. We had a rough couple of weeks last year, so that's my goal to have a really good year and have them do their best."

Bobcats gymnastics looks for improvement in upcoming season

BROOKINGS – The Brookings gymnastics team is looking to improve as a stable of seniors as well as some talented underclassmen provide a solid foundation for the 2023-24 season.

The Bobcats will be led by Rachelle Engelbrecht, who has been with the program since she started as an assistant coach during the 1994-95 season. After being promoted to head coach in 1999, this season will mark her 24th as head coach and 29th with the program overall.

Erickson also had a strong season ahead of her sophomore year, placing sixth in vault, seventh in all-around, eighth on the balance beam and 10th on the uneven bars at state. With fellow sophomores Nevaeh Strohfus and Ava Petterson returning this season, the goal is to improve on last year while refining their routines.


"They're working really hard," Engelbrecht said. "They're really getting their routines put together and they're really closeknit, good teammates and that kind of stuff. Hopefully, we can get everything put together."

"A lot of it is being able to do the skill without a spot or a crutch," Engelbrecht said. 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Brookings Swimming Club continues to focus on growth

BROOKINGS – The Brookings Swimming Club is hoping for another successful season as they look to continue the growth they've established in recent years.

BSC director Doug Humphery estimates that the club had 30 swimmers when the club was established over six years ago but with 75 swimmers enrolled for the upcoming season, he sees a group that is continuing to expand.

"This past year has probably seen the biggest growth of our club," Humphrey said. "It has been kind of a membership explosion for us and while the national trend is losing swimmers nationwide, we're kind of the anomaly and we're adding more and more to our group."

Humphrey also credits the coaching staff which includes Cassie Hendricks, Wendy Ahrendsen, Damon Venner, Allison Johnson and Sam Johnson for building the culture and the families to help keep BSC growing throughout the years.

"It's a testament of the families we have and the coaching staff," Humphrey said. "We're not only creating better swimmers, but the kids are having a lot of fun doing it."

The foundation has created a strong base of swimmers not only at the high school level but in the youth levels as well. While Ava Humphery and Ava Brenner return as key seniors, Ernest Ting and Trevin Lounsbury are also some of the top names to watch this year.

The most impressive depth might be at the lower levels however as youth swimmers McKinley Schwab, Kalla Forester, Kyra Bowne, Kendall Schmidt, Sofia Gonzalez and Quinn Humphrey highlight a strong nucleus on the girls side. "It's a great group of girls that have kind of all grown up together in the club," Humphrey said. "They've experienced success together and now that they're in middle school and entering that high school age, it's a really fun time for them to be peaking together."

Even with the success of their swimmers, Humphrey and the BSC is focused more on the experience than the results, which has helped lead to their rapid growth.

"It's about making them faster, having more experiences and giving them more opportunities to swim outside of the state," Humphrey said. "We're just trying to grow the club that we have. We're connected with some American programs that we do



some swim lesson programs, so that's kind of a feeder into our system. The natural progression is if you want to continue swimming, you come into the club to do that."

While the BSC would like to build state champions and swimmers for the next level, they also want to enhance the Courtesy Photo

culture and continue to see it grow this season and beyond.

"Our focus is not necessarily on creating these Olympiclevel athletes," Humphrey said. "If that happens along the way, great, but the focus is more of where you are today versus where you are before."



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


