# No elections for open seats on boards

Ward to vote on street improvements

Most local races this spring are already decided, in part, because there are no candidates or no new candidates running for office.

Open School Board seats in both the Flandreau and Colman-Egan School District's will either be filled by incumbents or by appointment or one petition that was turned in. Cynthia Sheppard will fill one of the seats.

It is the same situation with city council seats in Flandreau, Colman, and Egan.

Annette Mitchell turned in a petition for the only seat up for grabs in Ward, a 3-year-term. There will be an election in Ward though and what will be on the April 9th spring ballot is a measure

on road improvements.

Trent and the county if there are any races to be determined, will be listed on the June ballot, as Trent asked this spring to be combined with county elections.

The lack of local candidates is nothing new nor unique to Moody County. Getting anyone to run for local office is an issue that has plagued communities nationwide, especially in rural America, for years.

One bright spot, 18 to 25-year-olds are increasingly running for political office, according to a 2022 study from Tufts University. More than 20% of youth, the report states, are considering running for office. Many are dismayed by the current state of our democracy.

# **New Postmaster for Flandreau Office**

He may be a new name and face behind the Postmaster desk at the United States Postal Service office in Flandreau, but Emmanuel Bamba is no stranger to the community, or to local mail service.

Emman, as many who know him call him, or Bamba, has lived in Flandreau since 2008. He and his family of three at that time, moved here from the Town of Solano, Nueva Vizcaya Province, Philippines, to be closer to family and the opportunities that a life in the United States might offer.

Upon moving here, he went straight to work at Riverview Manor as a Laundry Aide and Bed Maker.

In 2010, he became a Kitchen Helper at Flandreau High School.

In 2012, he became a part-time substitute Mail Carrier in Flandreau, working every Saturday. He kept busy though, pick-

ing up hours each week in Dell Rapids, Madison, Pipestone, Slayton, and Brookings.

With three openings in 2014 at the Brookings office, Bamba transferred and it wasn't long before he became a full-time USPS employee. Emman also that year became a Naturalized Citizen of the U.S. (March of 2014).

He carried mail across the city until 2019, when he was assigned his first supervisory role in Customer Service overseeing 25 employees, including the offices of Aurora and White.

He loved it.

The drive however kept him from his family more than he liked. It also kept him from a volunteer role he loved — serving the broader Flandreau and Moody County communities through volunteering with the Flandreau Fire Department.

"I've been driving to Brookings for 10 years now," he said.

"I want to come back to this town and serve our own

people instead of doing my job in a different town."

Bamba just this month was officially brought on as the new local Postmaster. He couldn't be happier to be back home.

"As a Filipino American, it's a big accomplishment for me, serving Flandreau... I'll do my best to help and serve the public and if I can go beyond, I will. I will serve our community with honesty and integrity. I will treat every piece of mail as my own," said Bamba.

Emman and his wife, Hersy have been married for 20 years and since moving here with their son Drew, the couple has added two more children to the family. Drew Bamba, now 19-years-old, graduated from Flandreau Public Schools and attends South Dakota State University.

Their two younger children, 13-year-old Kalel Bamba, and 8-year-old Sophia Bamba, attend Flandreau Public Schools.

# Controversial "Landowner Bill of Rights" signed into law

Local state legislators will return this week to civilian life after wrapping up another year of business in Pierre. The South Dakota State Legislature ended its 2024 session this past Thursday.

Legislators passed a \$7.3 billion budget for fiscal year 2025. That budget includes 4% increases for K-12 education, health care providers and state employees.

Among other closely-watched legislation passed — foreign entities such as China are now banned from owning farmland in the state and another trio of bills that have become known as the "Landowner Bill of Rights" were signed into law. That trio of laws is one many locals not only watched closely but fought as they pave the way for controversial personal property land grabs through the use of eminent domain and carbon capture pipeline networks to move forward across the

The Burden of Sin: A Shepherd's Call

A few years ago, Shrek the Sheep became a global sensation. For six years, he evaded shearing by hiding in New Zealand's hillside caves. When finally brought in, Shrek's wool weighed over 60 pounds-more than a third of his normal body weight. It's a miracle he survived. Imagine the burden he carried—hair, sticks, rocks, and dirt-all clinging to him. And when wet, that fleece would have been even heavier, endangering his life without a shepherd's care.

Today, our Shepherd speaks to us about our burdens. Christ entered this messy world to forgive sins. The Bible describes sin in two distinct ways. First, we encounter it as debt. Sin is the debt we owe God and one another-the price for our wrongdoings. When we pray the Lord's Prayer, we ask the Father to forgive our debts, our trespasses, our sins. This language of debt echoes throughout the Old and New Testaments.

Viewing sin as debt allows us to trace wounds back to their cause. We can assign blame and responsibility. "He or she is the root cause of this," we might say. But this perspective also makes it difficult to seek forgiveness. After all, we consider ourselves good people. Why would good people need forgiveness?

Yet there's another lens through which to view sin. Imagine it as a burden-like Shrek's wool. It clings to us, weighing us down. We carry the weight of our mistakes, regrets, and brokenness. Just as Shrek's fleece hindered him, our sins hinder our spiritual journey. We stumble, struggle, and risk accidents without a Shepherd to guide us.

Our Shepherd, Jesus, invites us to cast our burdens upon Him. He alone bears our sins and takes them from us. We lack the power to do this ourselves. We can't dump our sins on the cross; only Christ can. So, let us come to Him, acknowledging our need for forgiveness. Good people, too, need grace. Our Shepherd waits, ready to lift our burdens and restore us.

Remember Shrek's fleece-how it clung to him until the shearer intervened. Likewise, Christ intervenes for us, offering freedom from sin's weight. Let us heed His call, surrendering our burdens, and find rest in His grace.

May we embrace forgiveness, knowing that our Shepherd loves us beyond measure. Amen.

# **Are Americans finacially** educated on retirement savings?

Here's what we have

• In a financial well-being poll conducted during the COVID-19 pandemic, 85% respondents confirmed that some aspect of their personal finances was causing them stress. For 31% of respondents, that concern was "having enough saved for retirement."

• In that same poll, 70% said they made financial adjustments due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Of that group, 27% increased contributions to their emergency savings, retirement savings, or other savings or investments. In comparison, 21% tapped into emergency savingsborrowed against retirement savings.

• In a poll about financial education mandates, 80% of adults said they wish they were required to complete a semester- or year-long course focused on personal finance education during high school. Also, 88% think their state should require a semester- or yearlong course for high school graduation.

• In that same poll, 84% of those approaching retirement age "spending and budgeting" should be taught in schools.

The 99th session of the South Dakota Legislature is in the books, except for a final one-day meeting on March 25 to consider any vetoes that may be made by the Governor. As with most legislative sessions, this one had its own personality. Each session has its wins and losses. No one bats 100%

Government in South Dakota has changed in recent years. Traditionally citizen legislators gathered to debate issues and agree or disagree on bills. In recent years Pierre has seemed more like Washington D.C. as reasonable debate and discussion has often been replaced by "this is necessary for business". Many legislators appreciate working on good policy but don't "Washington D.C. enjoy politics".

The traditional South Dakota philosophy of small, efficient government and low taxes with a focus on citizen needs has been largely replaced by one of more government intrusions in private enterprise and people's lives on behalf of big business. I am reminded of the Ronald Reagan quote that the most terrifying words in the English language are "I'm from the government and I'm here to help".

Private property is the foundation that freedom is built upon. Our Founding Fathers understood this concept, but in recent history government has encroached more and more into areas that should be protected. Our South Da-

kota Constitution reads: "Inherent rights. All men are born equally free and independent, and have certain inherent rights, among which are those of enjoying and defending life and liberty, of acquiring and protecting property and the pursuit of happiness. To secure these rights governments are instituted among men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed."

We had twelve bills surrounding the issue of property rights this year. Nine of those bills died, and three passed. These three are the bills that leadership in both chambers call the "compromise bills", the "landowner rights" bills. In my opinion, we had some very good bills die that would have provided common sense protections for landowners. Committee rooms were often filled with concerned citizens who came to watch and testify. The opponents to property protections rarely had a farmer or landowner testify. Testifying against many of the bills that would have had real safeguards were GEVO, Summit Carbon Solutions, South Dakota Farm Bureau, South Dakota Ethanol Producers Association, South Dakota Chamber of Commerce and Industry, Glacial Lakes Energy, Greater Sioux Falls Chamber, SD Retailers, and some utility companies. I am not against any of these groups and happen to be a member of more than one of them. However, I am very concerned with the fact that organizations who have depended on property owners and farmers, and who in the past have stood up for what is right, are now working to limit individual property rights. I will leave it up to concerned citizens to look at the campaign finance reports of legislators who voted consistently with some of those who testified.

SB 201 was crafted in a way that takes away local control. HB 1185 and HB 1186 had a few things for landowners, but they were ultimately stripped of any real value.

I encourage you to go on YouTube and search for "South Dakota Legislature." Click on February 28 and listen to the House floor testimony from the day that SB 201 was heard. The patriots were in the House and spoke up for what was right. Some almost cried as one legislator gave a speech about the flag and the soldiers who serve. Why do they serve? To defend our freedoms and our rights. We may have lost the vote, but we won some hearts

and minds. Representing Moody and rural Minnehaha counties (25th Legislative District) in the South Dakota Legislature has been a high honor. It is humbling and challenging at the same time. My goal has always been to do my best to represent the diverse interests of our area for the betterment of our great state. New challenges and opportunities will present themselves while working to make South Dakota a home that reflects our self-reliant values and God given freedoms.

The 8th week of the 2024 legislative session ended on February 29th. At this point, many of the policy related bills have either passed or died and we are now mostly working on spending priorities and putting together a budget.

While the session may be winding down, there are still many exciting conversations and things going on. This past week, we celebrated the 2023 Dell Rapids Quarriers with Senate Commemoration 812. The commemoration reads as follows:

On November 11, 2023, the Dell Rapids Quarriers won a second consecutive 11A state football championship; and the Quarriers were the number one seed going into the playoff tournament and finished the 2023 season with a record of 12-0; and the Quarriers advanced to the state championship after defeating the Madison Bulldogs 52-0 in the first round and the Sioux Falls Christian Chargers 22-14 in the second round; and the Quarriers dominated the state championship game, outscoring West Central by thirty-four points in the first half, en route to a final score of 42-6; NOW, THERE-FORE, BE IT COMMEMO-RATED, by the Ninety-Ninth Legislature of the State of South Dakota, that the Dell Rapids Quarriers are the 2023 State 11A football champions. Congratulations boys on a heck of a season!

# **State Senator calls** ban on House floor an "overreaction"

Local State Senator Tom Pischke is calling the ban he was given from the House of Representatives floor and lobby the last week of the 2024 Legislative Session an 'overreaction."

Sen. Tom Pischke, R-Dell Rapids, our State Senator for Moody County, received a letter during the final week of the session from Speaker of the House Hugh Bartels, R-Watertown, informing him of the action.


It followed Pischke placing a bottle of syrup on another lawmaker's desk — a violation of decorum, Bartels wrote. Pischke has said that he placed the bottle of syrup on Rapid City Republican Rep. Kristin Conzet's desk days after Conzet motioned to defeat a commemoration celebrating the late Nancy Green, whose likeness was used to create the Aunt Jemima advertising character, formerly used on syrup and other products.

The commemoration was introduced by Rapid City Republican Rep. Phil Jensen and co-sponsored by Pischke and Sen. Jim Mehlhaff, R-Pierre.

It stated, in part, "that Nancy Green was a remarkable woman whose story has been sadly erased by politics."

The Aunt Jemima brand was discontinued in 2021, a change made in response to criticism that the caricature of a Black woman perpetuated outdated and offensive portrayals of African Americans.

Pischke has since sent a letter of apology to Rep. Conzet. Pischke is being challenged for his seat this next term by former State Senator Jordan Youngberg.

# The bill also outlines

that "all pipelines carrying carbon dioxide must be installed so that the cover between the top of the pipe and the ground level, road bed, river bottom, or underwater natural bottom, as determined by recognized and

generally accepted practices, must be a minimum of forty-eight inches in thickness and must be buried so that it is below the level of cultivation."

Pipeline companies are also to be held liable for repairs of drain tile installed prior to any installation of the pipeline facility for the life of the pipeline facility, cover full replacement costs including material, labor, and equipment, and the reclamation and restoration of topsoil as part of any drain tile repair.

HB1185 requires a \$500 fee be paid to landowners when a pipeline company of any type wants to perform a survey on that property, but it allows a landowner to challenge the right to survey or examine by commencing an action in circuit court in the county where the survey or examination is proposed within thirty days of service of the written notice.

HB1186 caps easements for carbon pipelines at 99 years, withdraws the easement if business operations don't begin within five years after construction or there is a five-year gap in the use of the pipeline.

"I'm very disappointed in so many of our representatives and Governor who did not stand for the rights of the landowners opposing the CO2 pipeline! Those representatives pretty much laid out the red carpet for Summit to come in. The whole issue is about this private company getting \$450 million annually in federal tax credits, money that could be better spent elsewhere! Summit had the ability to hire lobbyists, to wine and dine, even hire a bus to bring done people from Watertown and Aberdeen and put on a show, while the landowners fighting to protect our property gave up time from farming, time from their jobs, and paid out of their pockets to protect our property rights! A huge thank you to the representatives who spoke from their hearts through all of this and listened to the landowners concerns. Thank you Tom Pischke, Ron Hanson, and Randy Gross, all from the Moody County District," said local landowner Cindy Menning, in regard to the carbon capture pipelines and opposition to the use of eminent

domain to build them.

# **Brookings** man identified as I-29 crash victim

The man killed when his vehicle left the Interstate at the Big Sioux River bridge in northern Moody County has been identified as a Brookings man.

Lee Andrew Clark, II, died on Friday, March 1, when he ran off I29 just short of the bridge as he was traveling north. The 56-year-old, for reasons still being investigated, left the roadway, crashed his Ford Expedition in the median, and came to rest in the Big Sioux River.

Law enforcement and passers-by that had stopped to help pulled Clark from his vehicle but he died at the scene. He was not wearing a seatbelt.

The South Dakota Highway Patrol continues to investigate the crash and what might have been the preliminary cause.

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




WHEREAS, Moody County, South Dakota, encompasses a geographic area of 521 square miles, and the Moody County Highway Department is responsible for maintaining 122 miles of gravel roadway, maintaining 166 miles of paved roadway, and maintains 52 bridges, with 10 of those bridges crossing the Big Sioux Riv-

WHEREAS, in the last 10 years the County of Moody replaced two Big Sioux River bridges at a total cost exceeding \$4.5 million dollars; and WHEREAS, the County of

Moody continues to experience high rates of inflation in the cost of purchasing road construction materials, repairing and purchasing road maintenance equipment, and engineering expenses; and

WHEREAS, the County of Moody, in order to cover costs of its entire operation, has been forced to reduce the funds pro-vided to the Moody County Highway Department, which in turn has reduced the ability of the Highway Department to meet its obligations; and WHEREAS, the network of

roads and bridges maintained by the Moody County Highway Department are vitally important for the farms, agricultural operations, and 6,300 residents of the county, with road usage increasing each year;

WHEREAS, South Dakota Codified Law §10-12-13 authorizes county commissioners to levy an annual tax as a reserve fund to be accumulated and used for the purpose of maintaining, repairing, constructing, and reconstructing roads and bridges, with said monies deposited into a special fund to be known as the county highway and bridge reserve fund; and

WHEREAS, The Moody County Commission desires to establish an annual road and bridge property tax levy of Five Hundred and No/100 Thousand Dollars (\$500,000.00) distributed proportionally across all properties county-wide, pay-

able in the calendar year 2025. NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, by a vote of two-thirds (2/3rd) of its members, the Moody County Board of Commissioners does hereby:

1. Establish a county-wide property tax levy of Five Hundred and no/100 Thousand Dollars (\$500,000.00) distributed proportionally across all property in Moody County, South Dakota, for the maintenance, repair, constructing, and reconstructing of roads and bridges as overseen by the Moody County Highway Department, with said sum payable in the calendar year 2025;

Establish a special fund into which the proceeds of the levy shall be deposited, with such fund being known as the Moody County Highway and

Bridge Reserve Fund.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the dollar amount of the Moody County Road and Bridge Levy may be increased each subsequent year hereafter by the Moody County Commission in order to meet increasing construction and inflation costs, but the increase may not exceed the statutory limit established in South Dakota Codified Law §10-12-13.

BE IT FURTHER RE-SOLVED this Resolution may be referred to a public vote upon the filing of a referendum petition, signed by at least five percent (5%) of the registered voters in Moody County, with the Moody County Auditor within twenty (20) days of the first publication of the Resolution. 

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# Bring home Consolation title

# Fliers win final two games of State Tournament to take fifth place

The Flandreau Flier girls took an opening round loss and then came back to win the Consolation Championship at the State Class A Girls Basketball Tournament last weekend in Brookings.

The Fliers lost to Tea Area, rebounded and won over Hanson and Mahpíya

Two Fliers, Lily Klein and Lizzie Pavlis, were named to the All-Tournament team.

## Flandreau upset by Tea Area in Class A quarterfi-

BROOKINGS - The third seeded Flandreau Fliers were upset in the quarterfinals of the State Class A State Girls Basketball Tournament, falling to the sixth-seeded Tea Area Titans 52-47 at the Dacotah Bank Center on Thursday night.

The loss stung as the Fliers entered with a 23-0 record but the team's effort to rally from a double-digit deficit in the first half and bring the game within a possession in the fourth quarter was something that helped them hold their heads high.

"My kids are tough," Flandreau head coach Megan Severtson said. "I knew that going in, we were excited about the matchup. Tea is a really nice team and we knew it was going to be a battle. They just had girls that knocked down shots and unfortunately, tonight wasn't our best shooting night."

The Titans set the tone early with a 9-5 lead at the end of the first quarter and built a 26-17 lead with 1:48 left in the second quarter. Lily Klein knocked down a pair of 3-pointers and Katie Vasecka made a layup with seven seconds to go to give Tea a 28-23 lead at half-

While Flandreau was within striking distance, the Titans made things difficult with a zone defense that clogged up the paint and the Fliers couldn't convert their opportunities on the outside, shooting 3-for-21 on 3-pointers in the game.

"I think the style of zone they were playing put them into some passing lanes and



our girls just weren't quite prepared for that," Severtson said. "We did a better job in the second half taking care of the basketball, but we just dug ourselves too big of a hole.

The Titans built their lead to as many as 11 points and led 44-36 at the end of the third quarter but the Fliers went on a 6-2 run to make it a 46-42 lead on Sadie Iott's layup with 4:10 left in the fourth quarter.

The Fliers had a chance to cut it to a one-possession game after Klein came up with a steal but a missed 3-pointer and layup by Claire Sheppard allowed Tea Area to extend their lead on Mara Grant's layup with 2:31 to play.

After both teams exchanged a pair of scoreless possessions, Klein knocked down a 3-pointer with 1:36 to play to make it a 48-45 game. The Fliers got a stop on the other end when Vasecka missed a layup and committed her fifth foul of the game with 1:01 to play but the Fliers missed a hook shot at the rim on the next possession and Reese Hammerquist came up with a steal with 42 seconds to go.

With a couple of free throws down the stretch, the Titans advanced to a state semifinal matchup with Sioux Falls Christian on Friday night but Severtson still admired the effort of her team to fight their way back into the game.

"That's just my girls," Severtson said. "Their attitude. Their effort. They have a never-give-up mindset. I was really proud of how they responded."

Klein finished with a team-high 19 points, four rebounds and three steals for the Fliers while Claire Sheppard finished with 14 points, five rebounds, four assists, a pair of blocks and a steal. Pavlis had eight points and 13 rebounds while lott had six points and four boards.

Ellie Clayberg led Tea Area with 17 points while Vasecka had 14 points, eight points, five assists and three steals. Haidyn West had nine points and Mara Grant had six points and five rebounds.

Flandreau shot 39 percent for the game and made 2-of-10 (20%) free throws. The Fliers out-rebounded the Titans 33-26 and committed 14 turnovers.

Tea Area shot 48 percent



## in the game including 5-of-9 (55.6%) on 3-pointers. The Titans made 9-of-14 (64.3%) free throws and committed 14 turnovers.

The loss dropped the Fliers to 23-1 on the season and sent them to the consolation bracket where they faced Hanson on Friday afternoon. While Thursday's loss was disappointing, Severtson says her team is focused on finishing the season strong in the final two games.

## Flandreau shuts down Hanson in Class A consolation semifinal

Shortly after the Flandreau Fliers lost to Tea Area in the quarterfinals of the State Class A Girls Basketball Tournament on Thursday night, head coach Megan Severtson stated that one of the goals over their next two games was to not let the loss define them or their season.

In wins over Hanson on Friday and Mahpíya Lúta on Saturday, the Fliers showed just what kind of team they are and how a program that was built in large part by their five seniors rallied from a tough loss to win the consolation championship.

"I have a really gritty group of girls," Severtson said after Saturday's win. "They had to work for this. We've had to work to get our program to this position and my senior class has been a big part of getting us to a program that's well-respected across the state."

The weekend began with the Fliers shaking off Thursday's loss and turning in a dominant performance against Hanson in the consolation semifinals. Flandreau's defense had been a calling card all season and was prominent on Friday afternoon, holding Hanson to just eight percent shooting in the first quarter and 20 percent in the first half.

After racing to leads of 12-4 at the end of the first quarter and 30-12 at halftime, Flandreau put an exclamation point on the win, extending their lead to 51-24 after three quarters and sealing the win with a 14-9 fourth quarter advantage. Flandreau forced 14 turnovers and out-rebounded Hanson 40-29 on the way to a 65-33 victory.

"Our defense going into this tournament is what we really relied on all year long," Severtson said. "But in the first game against Tea, we probably came out with a little too many jitters. We settled in on the second day of the tournament with a little less pressure and we had something to prove. My girls responded well to it."

(Severtson, in her high school days, played basketball for long-time Hanson Head Coach Jim Bridge.)

Lily Klein led the way with 23 points, 13 rebounds and six assists for the Fliers in Friday's win while Claire Sheppard knocked down six 3-pointers on the way to 18 points, five rebounds and three assists. Lizzie Pavlis had 10 points and eight rebounds while Morgan Sheppard and Sadie Iott had six points each.

Eliza Oltmanns led Hanson with nine points and three rebounds while Alyssa Moschell had eight points and five rebounds.

Flandreau shot 53 percent in the game including 10-of-18 (60%) on 3-pointers. The Fliers also made 3-of-5 (60%) free throws, outrebounded Hanson 40-29 and committed 17 turn-

Hanson shot 22 percent in the game including 3-for-22 (14%) on 3-pointers. The Beaverettes made 8-of-9 (89%) free throws and committed 14 turn-

## Win battle over Mahpíya Lúta

In a battle of the two undefeated teams heading into the tournament, the Fliers got off to a fast start with an 11-2 run to open the game. But Mahpíya Lúta had their response, using a full-court press to turn up the tempo and cutting Flandreau's lead to 13-12 at the end of the first quarter.

The Fliers pulled away by doing some of the things that they did best. Their defense held Mahpíya Lúta to five points in the second quarter and Flandreau closed the first half on an 11-1 run to take a 27-17 lead into the half. Flandreau's lead swelled to as many as 19 points before taking a 46-29 lead into the fourth quarter and the Fliers closed out the game to win the consolation title with a 56-41 victory.

"They made us play way

too fast in the first quarter but I thought once we settled in, we were able to get some open looks," Severtson said. "We were able to rely on our defense to create a couple of things on offense for us, so it was fun to come out of here with a win."

It was a fitting finale for Flandreau's five seniors including Klein, who had 17 points, 15 rebounds and five assists and Pavlis, who also had a double-double with 21 points, 10 rebounds and five steals.

Sheppard had 13 points, six rebounds and a pair of blocks and Grace Krull and Hayden Neises checked in near the end of the game to get their final moment as part of a group that helped put Flier girls basketball on the map both in the South Dakota basketball scene and in their community.

"They bought into the program," Severtson said of her senior class. "They've always been excited to be a Flandreau Flier. Because of them, there are a lot of little girls in our community that are really excited to play Flandreau basketball."

Severtson said the way her team responded this weekend will define her team more than how they finished the season and at 25-1, the Fliers had a lot to be proud of.

"I love these girls," Severtson said. "They're a part of my family. My kids love these girls. My husband has to hear a lot about girls' basketball for months. But what I think we've built here is a community that supports these kids and supports their students. That's really fun to see because when these girls leave this program, I've always wanted them to be proud that they're from Flandreau."

At the welcome home rally on Sunday, Severtson echoed those thoughts in talking to her team.

"We had a saying this season of 'Finish the Dream' and while you may feel that you didn't do that (not winning the state championship), you've done this by leaving your legacy on Flier girls basketball for many young girls."

The purpose of the meeting is to meet the coaches, go over the activity handbook, handout practice and game schedules and sign forms that are required to participate.


After the general assembly, each sport will hold their preseason meeting to discuss details for the upcoming sea-
