

Bobcat track looks to hit its stride this season

BROOKINGS – The Brookings Bobcats will look to improve throughout the year as the track and field team prepares for the 2024 spring season.

The Bobcats are led by Jason Sebern who is in his 26th season with the program after taking over as head coach in 1999. Sebern will have plenty of help on his staff including assistants Joe Fredrickson, Vonda Bjorklund, Addison DeHaven, Jim Hazelton, Scott Miller and Lisa Bahe as they look to get the best out of a roster that includes over 120 kids.

"It's a great group of kids," Sebern said of this year's team. "Like every year, we're trying to improve every week throughout the season and we're trying to improve from year to year so the kids have their personal bests that they're trying to improve upon and our relay teams are trying to do the same throughout

the season."

The Bobcats will lose a couple of key athletes including state place winner Sam Conrad and Maddix Archer, who finished second in the girls' 200-meter dash at the State Meet last year and was a key member of the relay teams. Gracie Adamson is also a key loss after placing in the discus at the State Meet last spring.

But while the Bobcats lost some talent, they have a lot of strengths this year. One of the most notable areas is in the boys' distance events which include Jon Kahler, who finished eighth in the 800 meter at the Ruth Marske Invitational in Brookings on Mar. 30, Trevin Loundsbury, Alex Diersen, Shane Harming and Ernest Ting, who placed eighth in the 800-meter run at last year's State Meet.

The Bobcats also will return Logan Smidt, who placed sixth at last year's State Meet and Cole Hockett and Nathan Smith, who

were part of last year's 4x400 meter relay team along with outgoing seniors Cody Vertin and Wyatt Hockett that set a school record last season.

"We have a good mix of experienced kids and newcomers," Sebern said. "Track and field is a participation sport, so we usually get a big turnout and this year is no different than in past years."

Sebern also complimented the character of this year's team after completing their service project by collecting non-perishable food for the Brookings County Food Pantry.

"I was just really impressed by the kindness and sincerity of this group of kids," Sebern said. "It makes me feel pretty good about our future as a communitv."


Brookings established a solid starting point with their first meet of the year and are looking to improve as the season goes along. With plenty of talent in Class A, the Bobcats are focused

Bobcats look to continue rich baseball tradition

BROOKINGS – The Brookings Bobcats will have a new face in the dugout this spring but head coach Carter Roach hopes to keep the Bobcats tradition alive as they open the 2024 season.

Roach has been coaching baseball since he was an assistant for Yankton during the 2020 season. Roach spent the 2021 season as an assistant for the Brookings Bandits Post 12 Legion team and was the head coach for the 2022 and 2023 seasons.

Roach replaces Ryan Bauer as the head coach for the spring season but is looking to continue the Bobcats' history of success on the diamond.

"I'm very excited and very fortunate to get handed such a tradition with a lot of wins," Roach said. "I'm excited about putting the two teams together and it's a cool ordeal because our team is pretty similar from the spring to the summer. So it's just kind of nice of having the reins of both teams and keep it in one direction which we have done a good job of in the past but now we just have a similar face for both programs."

Roach inherits a talented group that went 13-9 last spring but lost some key faces including first baseman Justin Coffell, pitcher Nathan Lease and shortstop Zach Struck. The Bobcats will also be without senior Breck Hirrschoff, who pitched and played for the spring season due to his commitment to play hock-

ey for the Sioux Falls POWER but they have a group of seniors ready to fill those voids.

Owen Schnieder and David Brink will be middle-of-the-order bats for the Bobcats while Nolan Miles, Austin Clark and Tate Helmbolt also are poised to be key contributors this spring.

"I'm excited for the next group of seniors," Roach said. "We have some guys who practiced last year and got some playing time but this year, their roles will increase. I'm excited for those guys who will have opportunities who didn't get to play as much last year."

While the Bobcats should have plenty of offense at the plate, Roach was also excited about the team's defense even with some questions on the mound after the departures of Lease and Hirrschoff.

"Defense is always something that we hang our hat on," Roach said. "The teams that I've been a part of, we've always found a way to defend well and I would say it's going to be a strong suit for us again as we navigate our way through."

One of the challenges will be a new playoff format which has expanded the State Tournament from four to eight teams. With a best-of-three playoff series to get to the tournament, the Bobcats are looking forward to building off their legion performance last summer which saw them advance to the state championship game

last August.

"With the experiences from last spring and summer, I see us stacking up somewhere in that top eight," Roach said. "I think that's every coach's idea for their team every year, so being somewhere in that top eight and getting the state tournament is our main goal and we'll see what we can do when we get there."

The Bobcats are scheduled to open the season with a doubleheader in Huron on Apr. 4.

Bobcat golf returns to fundamentals on the course

BROOKINGS – The Brookings Bobcats are looking forward to returning to the links this spring but a batch of new faces will emphasize perfecting the fundamentals as they begin the 2023-24 season.

"It will be a little bit of a rebuilding year and we have a lot of young girls," Brookings head coach Holly Sebern said of this year's team. "Our strength though is that they get along really well and the things we need to go back to are the fundamentals."

The Bobcats lost Kyra McClemans and Jaden Devine from last year's team but have some senior leadership in Delilah Fuls. Fuls finished ninth as an individual at last year's State Tournament and is looking to have a strong senior season ahead of her commitment to play golf at the University of Sioux Falls.

"Her strength is her confidence," Sebern said of Fuls. "She's strong. She hits it straight and she hits it far. Her putting is really good and she's really got everything to her game. She's our No. 1 player and if she can just kind of keep the troops rallied that will help a lot."

Fuls will be joined by Kamryn Streich and Miyah Foerster, who both qualified for the State Tournament last season but there are new faces throughout the roster including senior Taylor O'Neil and Aubrey Knutzen.

Together, Sebern believes there

will be some learning process at the beginning of the year but hopes her team can improve as the season progresses.

"It's a hard sport and a lot of the girls don't play all through the summer," Sebern said. "So we'll have to start out strong with the fundamentals and make sure that when we get to practice outside, we practice with purpose and refine our game." Sebern also said that the youth is a positive aspect to the season and many of the girls on the team have played throughout the summer to give them a head start.

"You can see the progress when you work with girls that have played all summer," Sebern said. "They get excited every time they shoot a better score and they just kind of build on that. That's what's fun about a rebuilding season." The Eastern South Dakota Conference also has plenty of competition this year. The Bobcats qualified for the State Tournament as a team last year but was joined by several conference rivals including Mitchell, who won the state championship last spring and Aberdeen Central, who finished as the Class AA runner-up.

"I just want to maintain what we did last year," Sebern said. "We ended up having a good end of the season last year and my goal is to just get better throughout the year. As long as we are at practice and we're doing what we need to do and get better each meet...I just want to be competitive and I want the girls to improve."

BROOKINGS – The Brookings Bobcats return several players this spring and with a few new faces mixed in, head coach Brian Dobbs hopes his team will reach its potential as they open the 2023-24 season.

"Our goal is just for each player to reach their potential," Dobbs said. "We want them to play as many matches as possible, just enjoy tennis and try to finish as high as we can."

Dobbs is entering his 21st season leading the Brookings tennis program and will be assisted by Brenna Lange(CHECK!). The Bobcats had a 1-15 but had plenty of young players gain experience throughout the season.

Braylon Peters, Carson Kreie, J.C. St. Pierre and Xavier St. Pierre return from last year's team and will be joined by some new faces this spring. Among them is foreign exchange student Stefan Nikolic, who should compete for a spot toward the top of the lineup.

"We've got a lot of juniors that have experience, so we're not really young," Dobbs said. "We've got some upperclassmen and we've got some returning varsity players. So we're going to be pretty decent and have some experience in the lower flights."

The battle in the early weeks will revolve around the sixth spot where several sophomores including Zachary Mueller,

"We're still playing matches to see who will be where this year," Dobbs said. "We've got a handful of kids that are all very close to each other and any of

them could be in that sixth spot on the varsity team."

While the Bobcats will have plenty of experience, they'll also have plenty of competition within the conference. Yankton, Brandon Valley, Aberdeen, Watertown, Harrisburg, Sioux Falls Lincoln, Sioux Falls Washington, Sioux Falls Jefferson and Sioux Falls Roosevelt all field deep teams, but Dobbs feels that there will be enough of an improvement to climb to the middle of the pack.

"It might be a struggle for us to get into the top half, but I'm hoping we'll be more in the middle rather than at the bottom like we were last year," Dobbs said.

The Bobcats are scheduled to open the season with a triangular against O'Gorman and Brandon Valley at McKennan Park in Sioux Falls on Apr. 5.

Bobcat softball looks to capture a state title in 2024

BROOKINGS – One year ago, the Brookings Bobcats were runner-up at the State Softball Tournament. In its first year as a sanctioned sport, the Bobcats were one of the best teams in South Dakota posting a 16-4 record and winning the Eastern South Dakota Conference title before falling to Sioux Falls Lincoln in the championship game.

While the Bobcats are proud of what they achieved, their bar is even higher in 2024 as they look to take home a state title.

"We're hungry to win this year," Brookings head coach Emma Hardin said of her team's goals in its second year. "It wasn't good enough just to make it to the state championship and be ESD champs. We want to be ESD champs and state champs, so I think that's our goal and what we are hungry for."

Hardin returns for her second season with the Bobcats along with assistant coach Alex DeGroot.

A former Bobcats standout and SDSU pitcher, Hardin has plenty of experience coaching U10, U12 and U14 levels before taking over the Brookings program one year ago.

Hardin's second year will include managing some turnover as the Bobcats lost All-State pitcher Gracie Adamson and All-ESD selection and All-State honorable mention catcher Morgan Linstad from last season.

"They are both a tough loss for us," Hardin said. "Gracie was outstanding on the mound and great with the bat and Morgan had a huge bat for us as well, so we kind of lost our battery heading into the season."

With Ava Sandine, Tess Penske, Madison Penske and Maya Erickson also graduating, there are plenty of holes to fill in the lineup. Still, Hardin believes there are plenty of players on the roster who can step into new roles.

The first name Hardin mentioned was junior Tess Burns, who will be the Bobcats' primary starter to begin the season. Hardin praised Burns's performance in the circle as well as

at the plate and has big expectations this year.

"I'm hoping she can step up to that role that Gracie played as our ace last year," Hardin said. "She's been working a lot to get movement and that change of speed, so it's been really fun for her."

Hardin also was excited about

the potential of infielder Morgan Norgaard who was an All-ESD and All-State selection after hitting .407/.493/.695 as a sophomore last season. Norgaard played shortstop a year ago but her versatility could come into play with some time at catcher this season.

"She has a great bat and a great arm," Hardin said. "It's exciting for her to get to do a little bit of both this year and be versatile for us."

The Bobcats will also have Tessa Twedt, who is committed to playing softball at Black Hills State and will slot in at first base.

"She's a great leader and understands the game really well," Hardin said. "Her hitting has come a long way this offseason, so it's going to be fun for her to showcase it a little more this year."

Second baseman Kylie Moe will play at second base as well as pitcher for Brookings this season and sophomore Kymber Buys will join seniors Sydney Bebensee and Megan Wadsworth in the outfield.

With junior Keisha Cushing and freshman Leila Jacobs also expected to get playing time, Hardin sees a deep team that should have a little more speed coming into this season. "Last year we didn't have a lot of speed, so I'm hoping to play a little short game and continue to be power hitters," Hardin said. "I think that we're going to get around the bases with some home runs as well but I also think we have some good gloves. I'm excited to see them showcase what they can do."

The all-around game of the Bobcats should prove well against the competition in Class AA. While Brookings will have to earn their way back to the state tournament, Hardin believes her team can not only get to where they were a year ago but take another step forward and win the championship this spring.

"If you ask any coach, they want to be at the top," Hardin said. "That's where I'm hoping to be again. I tell the girls all the time that how we do anything is how we do everything and we're really focusing on the little things this year to get us back to the state championship game and help us win it this year."







use our five coaches creatively, but we are happy to have the numbers.






