Public invited to Six-Mile creek flood follow up

BROOKINGS — After gathering public input about Six-Mile Creek flood mitigation efforts in March, the city of Brookings will host a follow-up meeting on Monday, May 20.

The city's engineering staff and consultants will share updated mitigation options and discuss the next steps for the Six-Mile Creek feasibility study, said City Engineer Charlie Richter.

The public meeting is scheduled for 5 to 6:30 p.m. on the third floor of the **Brookings City and County** Government Center at 520 Third St. A presentation will kick off the meeting.

BHS principal leaving after 1 year

Departure approved but not mentioned at school board meeting.

BROOKINGS — Brookings High School Principal Heather Miller-Cink will leave the position after just one year on the job.

Though her departure was not mentioned at Monday's meeting of the Brookings School Board, her leaving was later listed in the personnel report posted online and approved 5-0 during the consent agenda portion of the meeting.

It was coded as a resignation.

Miller-Cink was one of new Superintendent Summer Schultz's first two hires, announced to the board last June 11, before Schultz had officially even taken over the superintendent job.

Miller-Cink took over for Paul von Fischer, who left Brookings to take the superintendent job in

At the time, Schultz said "She leads with excellence. She is going to be a great addition."

Miller-Cink came to Brookings from Park Center High School in Brooklyn Park, Minnesota.

In a September profile in The Register, Miller-Cink explained See **BHS**, page 2

Anti-abortion group calling petition signers

Hundreds of phone calls this week that the South Dakota secretary of state has labeled a "scam" are originating from an anti-abortion group seeking to disqualify an abortion-rights ballot measure.

A petition was submitted last week to the Secretary of State's Office with enough signatures to place the measure on the Nov. 5 ballot, but the signatures must undergo a validation process.

Earlier this year, the Legislature and Gov. Kristi Noem passed legislation allowing people to withdraw their signatures from petitions.

Rachel Soulek, elections director with the Secretary of State's Office, said the callers are capitalizing on the new law.

"This is the first time we are seeing this and it's a result of the law change to allow individuals to remove their name from a ballot measure up until the point it is validated in our office," Soulek told South Dakota Searchlight through email.

The office sent a news release Monday warning the public to be aware of scammers impersonating employees of the Secretary of State's Office, "pushing the voters to challenge the abortion rights ballot measure petitions."

No one hurt after large van catches fire

BROOKINGS — A blaze involving a 15-passenger van in Brookings on Tuesday night resulted in significant damage to the vehicle, but no injuries.

Brookings Fire Chief Pete Bolzer told the Brookings Register that the incident occurred in the 1700 block of Elmwood Drive and was reported at approximately 9:11 p.m. Three fire engines and 16 firefighters responded, he added, and were on the scene for 30 minutes. The blaze, which originated in the engine compartment, was contained to the van.

The cause wasn't known as of Wednesday morning, Bolzer said when asked about what people can do to avoid such fires. As such, "it is difficult to recommend anything other than proper seasonal maintenance of your vehicle."

Editor's note: As part of Historical Preservation Month, this is the 1906 report on the dedication of Catholic Church in Brookings from the Brookings County Press. The information was compiled by Tom Thaden.

NEW CHURCH IS DEDICATED Catholics Consecrate Their New House of Worship

Brookings County Press -November 1, 1906

The new St. Thomas Catholic church in this city was formally dedicated Tuesday, appropriate services being held in the morning and evening. The dedicatory exercises proper were conducted by Rt. Rev. Thomas O'Gorman, bishop of Sioux Falls, assisted by eighteen visiting priests. The weather during the day was fine, it being one of the nicest days we have had in several weeks, and a large crowd was in attendance at each service.

The property upon which the church now stands was purchased in 1904, and church has been held in the house since that time. In June of this year the house was moved to the west side of the property, and on July 7th ground was broken for the new church. The contract was let to Wold & Johnson of this city.

The new church stands at the northwest corner of Medary Avenue See **LOOKING** BACK, page 2

"Citizens in South Dakota, by law, have the right to petition and people like these scammers are eroding public trust in the election process," Secretary of State Monae Johnson said in the news release.

Johnson's office asked state Attorney General Marty Jackley to look into the calls. Jackley said Tuesday that the Division of Criminal Investigation reviewed complaints about the calls, and also reviewed scripts used by callers, and found no indication of criminal wrong-

Calls are for impending court challenge

The calls are associated with a new South Dakota Petition Integrity political action committee, registered Monday by Dell Rapids Republican state Rep. Jon Hansen. The group is affiliated with the Life Defense Fund ballot question committee, which Hansen co-chairs.

Callers are targeting over 700 South Dakotans who signed the petition and were randomly selected as a sample to validate the petition signatures by the Secretary of State's Office.

The office uses samples to estimate whether enough of the signatures on a petition are from registered voters, rather than examining every signature. The abortion petition, a proposed state constitutional amendment, needed 35,017 signatures and was submitted with about

Hansen said his volunteers are not impersonating state employees. He said they're clearly stating that they are volunteers with the committee and disclosing how they received the person's name.

The callers are independently verifying the signatures, Hansen said, and asking signers whether petition circulators followed applicable laws and whether signers were misled into signing the petition. Hansen has alleged some signers were duped into believing they were signing a petition to repeal the state sales tax on groceries when they were actually signing the abortion-rights petition.

The information collected through the phone calls will be used as evidence when opponents of the ballot measure challenge the validity of the signatures in court.

"We don't intimidate a single person. Our mission is not to intimidate — our mission is to educate," Hansen told South Dakota Searchlight.

Hansen obtained the sample list through a public records request. Rick Weiland, who is leading the abortion-rights ballot initiative, also obtained the sample list from the office. The sample list is prepared within five days of the signatures being submitted.

Information or harassment?

Hansen was a prime sponsor of the petition signature withdrawal bill that passed the Legislature earlier this year with an emergency clause, ensuring that the law went into effect immediately. He said callers are informing signers they can remove their signatures if they were misled or have changed their mind.

"I would encourage anybody who signed that abortion petition to take their name off of it," Hansen said. "Ever since this law was passed and went into effect, I've been encouraging people to take their name off the petition, but it's not coercive. It's not intimidation."

Hansen said the phone calls are not harassment under state law.

"If anybody's harassing anybody, it's wrong and they shouldn't do it. That's certainly not what we're doing — we're just giving people the facts," Hansen said. "We have laws already on the books against harassment, so if anybody is getting harassed those laws should be enforced."

Weiland, with Dakotans for Health, the ballot question committee backing the abortion-rights measure, said the calls are acts of "desperation" in an effort to "suppress direct democracy."

"It smells of voter intimidation and harassment," Weiland added.

Some people who received phone calls from the committee told South Dakota Searchlight that the volunteers did not clearly indicate they were not affiliated with the state government. Some called several times, and some did not state their name or organization when leaving voice-

Adrienne Bosma signed the petition and volunteered with Dakotans for Health as a petition circulator. She said a caller from South Dakota Petition Integrity created the impression of being officially associated with the Secretary of State's

The volunteer asked questions, including whether Bosma knew the petition "allows for abortion up to birth." Bosma said she challenged the volunteer's language before the volunteer hung up

"I was so mad, I was physically shaking," Bosma said. "If you're calling people and harassing them when they're exercising their First Amendment right, that's over the line. That's not OK."

The ballot measure would legalize abortions in the first trimester of pregnancy but allow the state to impose limited regulations in the second trimester and a ban in the third trimester, with exceptions for the life and health of the mother.

Law creates double standard, official says

Pamela McClure received a voicemail that stated the caller's name and organization. The voicemail also said the group "received" her name from the South Dakota secretary of state.

"She said she was a volunteer of the group registered with the secretary of state and got my name from the secretary of state," McClure said. "To me, that means she's working with the Secretary of State's Office."

Amy Scott-Stoltz, president of the South Dakota League of Women Voters, was also contacted. Scott-Stoltz asked the volunteer several questions about the committee, its intent and mission, which she said went unanswered.

Scott-Stoltz said she was worried about this after the Legislature passed its signature withdrawal bill. She said the law's lack of guidelines for signature withdrawal solicitors feels like a "double standard."

"This just made it legal for them to call and have no restrictions on what they can or cannot say to me, where there are restrictions for petition circulators," Scott-Stoltz said. "I wasn't told who this committee was and couldn't find any information on them at the time. Basically, the transparency wasn't there."

Scott-Stoltz said the law should be reversed or amended to hold signature withdrawal solicitors to the same standards as petition circulators.

Sioux Falls Democratic state Rep. Erin Healy spoke against the signature withdrawal bill during the legislative session. She told South Dakota Searchlight via text message she believes the law "derails the democratic process."

"I would like to know if volunteers were required to take a training course prior to contacting South Dakota citizens, because if the Legislature is going to put guardrails in place for gathering signatures or removing signatures, the same should be done for volunteers representing committees that are calling and harassing citizens," Healy said.

Petition signers should expect to receive another unsolicited phone call soon, this time from Weiland's organization.

"It's important because we know what the arguments are, what they've been saying all along about our amendment,"

"We'll be trying to address that in our communication to not believe what you're being told and if you have any questions or concerns, give us a call. That'll be the gist of what we'll try to do."

and Williams Street (now Fourth Street), six blocks from Main Street. The exterior presents a very handsome appearance, the foundation being of concrete blocks and the walls veneered with dark red pressed brick. The main entrance to the building is on the north, but there are also entrances on the east and west sides. The northeast corner is ornamented by a square tower, 12x12x41, in which a bell will be placed later. The dimensions of the church are 62x36, and it is expected that the cost will be something over \$7,000 when it is completed. A broad flight of

concrete steps leads to the main entrance on the north.

This entrance leads to a hall, 12x12, from which doors lead to the main auditorium of the church to the choir loft. The woodwork of the interior of the church is of white birch, finished in oil, and the floors are of white pine. The pews, which have not yet been placed in position, are of solid oak, and have a seating capacity of 350. At the rear of the church is the choir loft and gallery, which can accommodate 50 more. The interior walls are not as yet completed, and they will be kalsomined and tinted. The altar is located at the south

end of the church, and on either side are the sacristies, 9x12.

The building is especially well lighted. In the main auditorium there are ten windows of stained glass, which were donated by members of the congregation, and which are inscribed with the names of the donors. The gallery is well lighted, with a large circular window, and three smaller ones. The electric lighting is also well arranged. In the center of the church is a seven globe cluster of lights and three light clusters are arranged along the sides. In the arch over the altar are twelve small lights, which throw

their rays directly upon the altar, giving a beautiful effect at night. In the basement will be located the furnace for heating the building and part of the basement will be furnished for use as a lecture room.

There yet remains considerable work to do around the church. The furnace and pews have not yet arrived, but are expected in a few days. The interior walls will be finished off in colors, and when everything is completed the Catholic congregation will have a very neat, little church, and one that will meet all their needs for

years to come. Numerous donations have been made in the furnishings of the edifice among which are: The large statue of Jesus, by

Man arrested in teen overdose case

PIERRE — South Dakota Attorney General Marty Jackley and authorities in Clay and Yankton counties have announced that an 18-year-old Yankton man has been indicted in the fentanyl overdose death of a 15-year-old female from rural Clay County.

Evan Nelson was indicted Monday by a Yankton County Grand Jury on three felony counts: One count of Distribution of a Controlled Substance to a Minor Resulting in Death, which is a Class C Felony and carries a maximum sentence of life in prison and a \$50,000 fine; one count of Distribution of a Controlled Substance to a Minor, which is a Class Two Felony and carries a maximum sentence of 25 years in prison and \$50,000 fine; and one count of Unauthorized Possession of a Controlled Substance, which is a Class 5 Felony and carries a maximum sentence of five years in prison and a \$10,000 fine. Nelson was arrested Tuesday and is

being held on a \$500,000 cash only bond. The 15-year-old female was found deceased in her bedroom on Dec. 23, 2023.

"This arrest comes after months of extensive investigations by state and local law enforcement and prosecutors," said Jackley. "This tragic case and the loss of a 15-year-old victim demonstrates the seriousness and dangers of fentanyl."

Project to begin on U.S. Highway 212

WATERTOWN — Pipe repair work on U.S. Highway 212 is scheduled to begin during the week of May, 20. This reconstruction project will mill and overlay approximately 21 miles on Highway 212 from Clark to west of Watertown.

The project also includes two miles of

Highway 212 shoulders and service roads

Weather dependent, cold milling and asphalt operations are scheduled to begin Monday, June 10. Traffic will be controlled by flaggers and a pilot car. Motorists should be prepared for delays through the work zone.

Border States Paving, Inc. of Fargo, ND is the primary contractor for this \$11 million project. The overall completion project completion date is Friday, Sept.

Businesses get state loans from GOED

PIERRE — The Governor's Office of Economic Development Board of Economic Development approved three loans at this month's meeting. Financing for these projects will reflect a capital investment of approximately \$6.5 million. An additional 14 full-time jobs will be created.

Borns Group Inc. of Aberdeen, a professional mailing and marketing business, was approved for a SD Works loan in the amount of \$530,000 for working capital.

Barge hits bridge connecting Galveston and Pelican Island

GALVESTON, Texas (AP) — A barge slammed into a bridge pillar in Galveston, Texas, on Wednesday, spilling oil into surrounding waters and closing the only road to a smaller and separate island that is home to a university, officials said. There were no immediate reports of injuries, although officials said one person on the barge was knocked into the water and quickly rescued.

The bridge that leads to Pelican Island, north of Galveston, was struck by the barge around 9:50 a.m. when a tugboat backing out of Texas International Terminals, a fuel storage operator next to the bridge, lost control of two barges it was pushing, said David Flores, a bridge superintendent with the Galveston County Navigation District.

"The current was very bad, and the tide was high. He lost it," Flores said.

One of the barges hit the bridge and two telephone poles, he said.

The accident came weeks after a cargo ship crashed into a support column of the Francis Key Bridge in Baltimore on March 26, killing six construction work-

The accident Wednesday knocked one man off the vessel and into the water, but he was quickly recovered and was not injured, said Galveston County Sheriff's Office Maj. Ray Nolen.

The tugboat was pushing bunker barges, which are fuel barges for ships, Flores said. The accident resulted in oil spilling from the barge into the channel off Galveston Bay and crews were working to clean it up, he said. The barge, which is owned by Martin Petroleum, has a 30,000-gallon capacity, but it's not clear how much leaked into the bay, said Galveston County spokesperson Spencer Lewis. He said about 6.5 miles (10.5 kilometers) of the waterway were shut down because of the spill.

Galveston County Judge Mark Henry said the temporary closure of the waterway should not have a significant impact on water commerce in the area.

Across the Nation

Senators urge \$32 billion in AI spending

WASHINGTON (AP) — A bipartisan group of four senators led by Majority Leader Chuck Schumer is recommending that Congress spend at least \$32 billion over the next three years to develop artificial intelligence and place safeguards around it, writing in a report released Wednesday that the U.S. needs to "harness the opportunities and address the risks" of the quickly developing technology.

The group of two Democrats and two Republicans said in an interview Tuesday that while they sometimes disagreed on the best paths forward, they felt it was imperative to find consensus with the technology taking off and other countries like China investing heavily in its development. They settled on a raft of broad policy recommendations that were included in their 33-page report.

While any legislation related to AI will be difficult to pass, especially in an election year and in a divided Congress, the senators said that regulation and incentives for innovation are urgently needed.

Chase through two states ends in death

(AP) —A police pursuit through two states that involved two separate shootouts with law enforcement officers and several crashes ended with the death of the woman being sought, authorities said.

Wilmington police said they began their pursuit of Yazmyn Stewart, 23, shortly before noon Tuesday at a Delaware residence, seeking to arrest her on a warrant stemming from a December 2023 shooting. She fled the home in a vehicle and rammed multiple police vehicles before driving along I-95 northbound into Pennsylvania, as Wilmington officers and Delaware state police troopers followed her.

Shortly after entering Pennsylvania, Stewart crashed her vehicle and started firing at the officers, and two troopers returned fire, authorities said. It's not known if Stewart was struck by any shots at that time, authorities said.

Stewart then carjacked another vehicle and drove to Chester, where she crashed into a structure.

She then entered a home where she was confronted by a mother with her baby before she took another car and tried to flee again, authorities said.

However, several officers — including three from Wilmington, five Delaware state troopers and individual officers from Trainer and Chester in Pennsylvania started shooting at the vehicle, and Stewart soon succumbed to her injuries at the scene.

One Wilmington officer was treated at a hospital for an undisclosed minor injury. No other injuries were reported in the chase or related incidents.



Woman who defied Methodists' ban on gays seeks reinstatement

Twenty years ago, Beth Stroud was defrocked from her beloved job as a United Methodist pastor in Philadelphia. In a church trial, she was found guilty of violating "Christian teaching" because she had acknowledged living in a committed relationship with another woman.

Earlier this month, delegates at a United Methodist Church conference struck down the UMC's longstanding anti-LGBTQ policies and created a path for clergy ousted because of them to seek reinstatement.

Stroud — even while recalling how her 2004 ouster disrupted her life is taking that path, though some other past targets of UMC discipline are choosing otherwise. Stroud is optimistic that United Methodist clergy from eastern Pennsylvania will restore her pastoral credentials at a meeting next week.

Ahead of a church service last Sunday, Stroud pondered what reinstatement would mean, and shed a tear. "It's about how compelling that call is that after 20 years, I still want to come back," she

At 54, she doesn't plan a return to full-time ministry - at least not immediately. Now completing a three-year stint teaching writing at Princeton University, she is excited to be starting a new job this summer as assistant professor of Christian ĥistory at the Methodist Theological School in Ohio one of 13 seminaries run by the UMC.

Yet even with the new teaching job, Stroud wanted to regain the options available to an ordained minister as she looks for a congregation to join near the Delaware, Ohio, campus.

"Í think a church will be able to use me in some way where my credentials are important — like being asked to celebrate

Communion on a day when the regular pastor is out of town," she said. "Those would be really meaningful opportuni-

When Stroud finally made her decision, she knew it was the right one.

"It felt really good to write that email, to request reinstatement," she said. "I want to continue to be a part of the church and its work in the world."

But the decision did not come easily as she followed the UMC's deliberations on the anti-LGBTQ policies.

"The first thing I felt was just anger — thinking about the life I could have had," she said. "I loved being a pastor. I was good at it. With 20 more years of experience, I could have been very good — helped a lot of people and been very fulfilled."

Instead of pastoring, she spent several years in graduate schools, while earning modest income in temporary, non-tenured academic jobs. There were challenges, including a bout with cancer and divorce from her wife, although they proceeded to co-parent their daughter, who was born in 2005.

Had she not been defrocked, Stroud said, "My whole life would have been different."

The process that led to

Stroud's ouster began in April 2003, when she told her congregation, the First United Methodist Church of Germantown, about her same-sex relationship. The church — where Stroud had been a pastor for four years — set up a legal fund to assist with her defense and hired her as a lay minister after she was defrocked.

When she later moved to New Jersey, she sought a new church to join, and settled on Turning Point United Methodist Church, a predominantly Black congregation in Trenton.

On Sunday, as Stroud sat in the pews, she got a shout-out from Turning Point's pastor, Rupert Hall.

"You guys may not realize this, but for the last 15 or so years, we have been blessed to have — as a loving, supportive, active member of Turning Point - a rock star," Hall said.

"The United Methodist Church stripped Beth of her credentials to be a pastor, and her name is known throughout the world as a martyr for those of God's children who call themselves and who are identified in the LGBTQ community."

There were cheers when Hall said Stroud now had a chance for reinstatement.

The UMC says it has no overall figures of how many clergy were defrocked for defying anti-LGBTQ bans or how many reinstatements might occur.

It's an option that won't be exercised by Jimmy Creech, who like Stroud was ousted from the UMC decades ago. Jurors at a church court removed his clergy credentials in 1999 after he presided over a same-sex union ceremony in North Carolina.

Creech is grateful that the General Conference, near the close of its recent proceedings in Charlotte, North Carolina, passed legislation allowing reinstatement of pastors defrocked in cases like his.

"This is an act of reconciliation and restorative justice, a move to heal the broken community of the Church," said Creech, who earlier doubted such a move would ever happen.

However, Creech, 79, said he won't seek reinstatement.

"Simply knowing the Church now provides for it is satisfaction enough for me," he said via email. "Because I am not nor cannot be in pastoral ministry at this time in my life, I do not think reinstating my ordination is appro-

Creech was ordained in 1970 and served various parishes in his native North Carolina.







In this deal, South is in three no-trump. What should he do after West leads the spade seven?


With 24 high-card points all in aces and kings, and also having one 10, South made a slightly cautious twono-trump rebid. However, it had the big advantage of leaving North room to use

Stayman or a transfer bid to investigate a possible majorsuit fit. If South had rebid have had to pass unless he had either a six-card or longer major, or sufficient points to be willing to reach four no-trump. Here, of course, it was a moot point, North not caring about the majors.

Bridge

South seems to start with nine top tricks: three spades (given the lead), four diamonds and two clubs. However, to get four diamond tricks, declarer must first cash his ace and king, then cross to the dummy. And what is the dummy entry?

The only candidate is the spade jack. So South must resist the temptation to win the first trick with his 10; he must take the trick with his ace or king. Then, after unblocking his diamond



honors, declarer leads a low spade toward dummy's jack.

West wins with his queen and shifts to a club, but South collects those nine

Bobcat javelin throwers enjoy record-breaking season

BROOKINGS - If you walked into the Brookings Athletic Complex last Saturday, you saw plenty of fans watching the Eastern South Dakota Conference Track & Field Championship Meet. There were all sorts of events happening from shot put to long jump but if you walked across the street, you may have seen the Brookings Bobcats' best-kept secret.

Led by Logan Smidt and Alex Wainman, the Bobcats have enjoyed a record-breaking year in the javelin toss and the Brookings duo has its eyes set on new heights in the final weeks of the season.

The javelin appears to be a simple competition. A thrower lines up behind the foul line arc and makes strides like a pilot on a runway. Once they arrive at the foul arc, they must throw the javelin as far as they can with one arm and have the javelin make a mark into the ground

for measurement.

But while it seems like a simple movement, there are several aspects that go into a successful javelin toss.

"It's not your typical event," Brookings javelin coach and track & field assistant Lisa Bahe said. "You want some speed. You want someone with some height and some long levers. It's kind of like the discus but you need that speed on the runway because you have more of an approach. You have kind of a running into crossover approach and so speed and power are two of the big things that you look

Bahe competed in javelin at South Dakota State and became an assistant coach at the middle school level. While Bobcat alum Gracie Adamson threw for the Bobcats and several other athletes worked with Bahe to try the event, the javelin toss didn't become a sanctioned event until three years ago.

Bahe began to work at the

varsity level once the javelin toss was adopted and Smidt was one of the first athletes recruited to try the event.

"There was a lot of challenges my first year just because it was so new," Smidt recalled. "I'd never really tried anything like it."

The learning curve was steep for Smidt, who threw out her rib during her freshman year. When she recovered from her injury, she bounced back to finish 25th in the section and just below the cutoff line for a spot in the State Meet.

Smidt continued to improve and broke the school record previously held by Landree Wilson (115-02 in 2022) with a toss of 127-05 at a home meet in Brookings during her sophomore year. Smidt went on to finish sixth at the State Meet a few weeks later with a toss of 118-06 and built momentum for her this year where she had a season-high toss of 121-07 at the Brookings Quad on Apr. 15 and set a meet record on

the way to winning the ESD Championship with a toss of 111-06 last weekend.

While Smidt also plays volleyball and basketball, she also felt like her success in the javelin toss was rewarding due to her lack of experience.

"It's really cool just because I haven't been doing it that long," Smidt said. "With my other sports, I've been doing them for a while and when you get those rewards, it still feels good. But with javelin, I haven't been doing it for a long time and it just makes it even better."

While Smidt has three years under her belt, Wainman is finding success in his first season. A sophomore, Wainman was recruited for the javelin toss thanks to his long frame and speed developed during football season. While Wainman had the build to succeed, it was the technique that provided an initial obstacle.

"I was trying to get too

high or too low," Wainman explained. "My arm was all the way back but otherwise, Coach Bahe told me I was just naturally good at it."

Wainman eventually refined his technique and started strongly to begin the season. After finishing 10th with a toss of 127-08 during the Huron Invitational on Apr. 5, Wainman finished fourth at the Brookings quad on Apr. 15 with a toss of 146-05 and set a school record with a toss of 153-08 at the Sioux Falls Jefferson quad on Apr. 23.

Wainman's toss took down Robert Wilson's record of 146-06 which was set back in 1927 but the result didn't take Wainman by surprise after he came close a few weeks before.

"I was kind of expecting to break it going into that next meet...but it felt pretty good," Wainman said. "I had a lot of my family members and teachers congratulating me which was pretty cool. It was definitely very reward-

Wainman said one of the challenges he's facing now is consistency but he still managed to finish with a throw of 126-07 at the Howard Wood Relays on May 4 and finished eighth in the ESD Meet with a toss of 141-02.

Just a sophomore, Wainman has high goals for the end of the season to get over 160 feet while setting his sights on the state record of 193 feet by the time his high school career is over. Meanwhile, Smidt hopes to qualify and place for this year's State Meet.

Both throwers have their eyes set on big things in the final weeks of the season and are continuing to reach toward becoming two of the best javelin throwers in school history.

"I think they're just very good athletes and they're really aware of what their body is doing," Bahe said. "They've picked up the technique very quickly."

Bobcats look to stick to the plan in playoff series vs. Roosevelt

The best-of-three series is set to begin with a game at 6 p.m. on Friday night with the second game scheduled for 1 p.m. on Saturday. If a third game is necessary, the two teams will play 30 minutes after the conclusion of Game 2 with a spot in the State Tournament on the line.

The format is a change from the single-elimination format that has been used in previous years to determine the final four teams for the State Tournament, but Brookings head coach Carter Roach and his team are embracing the change and the challenge that comes with it.

"It's going to be a tough matchup for us," Roach said. "It's going to be a couple of good baseball games. They have some great pitchers we have to be ready for and offensively, they're going to be able to hit the ball, so we're going to have to execute."

The matchup between the Roughriders and Bobcats is an interesting one. The two teams were scheduled to play a doubleheader in Brookings on Apr. 16 before it was

canceled due to weather and they've had an interesting path to the playoffs since the rainout.

The Bobcats have been a streaky team, coming into the series as the No. 7 seed with a record of 13-12. While they won their first four games of the season, they lost six of their next seven before winning six of the next nine games. Although they've been up and down, one of the constants has been their offense, which has picked up over the final weeks by averaging 7.1 runs and scoring in double digits in five of the past 10 games heading into this weekend's series.

"I think our biggest thing has been finding out our identity offensively," Roach said. "We're going to cause havoc on the base paths and I would say our approach at the plate has come a long ways from where we started in April."

The Bobcats have also received some stellar pitching from several arms including starters Nolan Miles and Owen Schneider.

"Nolan's done a fantastic job for us on the mound and I can't really think of a start where he didn't put us in a position to win," Roach said. "Owen has given us some big-time starts when we've needed it coming off a loss and those two guys together have been huge on the mound."

But a high school baseball

tournament is just as much about the depth on the mound as much as the players on it. While Miles and Schneider have sat at the top of the rotation, Roach believes he has several guys to turn to including Austin Clark and David

"What's been fun about this team is that we have a lot of guys that can grow," Roach said. "Being able to set up your bullpen and things like that...I'm proud of our guys for taking the ball and competing at a high level for

With the offense clicking and the pitching staff finding its stride, the Bobcats put together one of its most complete doubleheaders of the year, defeating Mitchell by scores of 14-4 and 13-1 last Saturday.

"I thought Mitchell was a fantastic kind of jumping board for us into the playoffs," Roach said. "I thought a lot of guys gained a lot of confidence at the plate and we looked really sound defensively."

The Bobcats will need that momentum against Roosevelt, who has recovered from a shaky start. While the Rough Riders come into the tournament as the 10th seed with a record of 6-13, they've won three of their past four games including a sweep over the Kernels on May 7.

Led by former SDSU baseball player and 2011 graduate Erik DeJong, the Rough Riders carry plenty of talent including second baseman and pitcher Jacob Mongar, who had three hits in a 7-5 win over Mitchell and Noah Verdoorn, who allowed one earned run on two hits and three walks with seven strikeouts in the nightcap.

"We haven't played them and they haven't played us so it's going to be two teams that don't really know too much about each other," Roach said. "But going in we know that they're very well-coached. Coach DeJong does a really good job of getting his guys ready to go and they're going to be talented."

The winner of this weekend's series will advance to face the winner of the series between No. 2 Sioux Falls Lincoln and No. 15 Huron at the State Tournament, which will take place on May 24 and 25 at Sioux Falls Stadium.

While the Bobcats would like to make a trip to the State Tournament, they also know they'll have to beat a talented Rough Rider team to get there.

"This week's practice has been good and we're running over every situation you could possibly run into during the playoffs," Roach said. "We have a big senior class and it means a lot to them to make it to the State Tournament and have success in the postseason, so I'm feeling good about this weekend."






