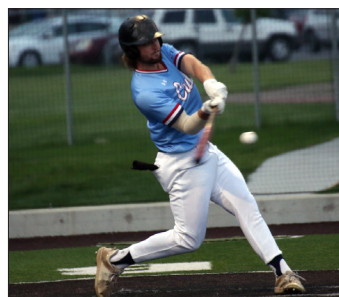

High court unanimously OKs abortion pill

South Dakota AG Jackley supported group who lost vote 9-0.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court on Thursday unanimously preserved access to a medication that was used in nearly two-thirds of all abortions in the U.S. last year, in the court's first abortion decision since conservative justices overturned Roe v. Wade two years ago.

The nine justices ruled that abor-

tion opponents lacked the legal right to sue over the federal Food and Drug Administration's approval of the medication, mifepristone, and the FDA's subsequent actions to ease access to it. The case had threatened to restrict access to mifepristone across the country, including in states where abortion remains legal.

Abortion is banned at all stages of pregnancy in 14 states, and after about six weeks of pregnancy in three others, often before women realize they're pregnant.

Justice Brett Kavanaugh, who was part of the majority to overturn

Roe, wrote for the court on Thursday that "federal courts are the wrong forum for addressing the plaintiffs' concerns about FDA's actions."

The opinion underscored the stakes of the 2024 election and the possibility that an FDA commissioner appointed by Republican Donald Trump, if he wins the White House, could consider tightening access to mifepristone, including prohibiting sending it through the mail.

Kavanaugh's opinion managed to unite a court deeply divided over abortion and many other divisive social issues by employing a mini-

malist approach that focused solely on the technical legal issue of standing and reached no judgment about the FDA's actions. Kavanaugh's seven "pro-life" references to abortion opponents may have been the only language in his opinion that revealed anything of his views on abortion.

While praising the decision, President Joe Biden signaled Democrats will continue to campaign heavily on abortion ahead of the November elections. "It does not change the fact that the right for

Back Alley Meats off to popular start in Volga

VOLGA — Have you got a hankering for some great meat, but don't know where to find it? Well, you can rest easy: All it takes is a short trip down an alley in Volga — really! — where you'll find Back Alley Meats.

The business, owned by Brookings resident Dan Kriese and managed by his daughter Kyla Kriese, opened May 24 at 111 Astrachan Ave. It's been hopping ever since as people come and go, checking out the newest addition to Volga's business community.

"We're a new, small meat shop. We've been busy, and we appreci-

ate everybody's patience with us as we've been very busy with limited staff," Dan Kriese told the Brookings Register in a recent interview.

Anything new always gets more attention, but the sheer diversity of Back Alley Meats' selections is certainly a huge factor that attracts customers.

The business' offerings include fresh meats such as chicken, beef and pork. There are some frozen options for those meats as well, but fresh is a big focus for Dan Kriese. On top of that, there's a variety of bratwursts on hand, along with summer sausages and snack sticks. Deli meats and cheeses can be found, too, as can

engage entire families. This will be the first time we've held the event mid-week and in the evening."

Juneteenth, celebrated annually on or around June 19, marks the date in 1865 when federal troops ordered slaves in Texas officially freed — more than two years after the Emancipation Proclamation. It has been called the longest-running African-American holiday and America's Second Independence Day.

President Joe Biden signed a bill making Juneteenth a federal holiday in 2021, formalizing the longstanding celebrations across the nation.

New to the Brookings celebration this year is a featured musical act.

"We're thrilled to showcase a collaboration of top musicians from Brookings and Sioux Falls this year," Nagy said. "The Brass Kickin' Riverband is a nine-piece group that will play an hour-long set of upbeat, energetic, New Orleans-style jazz funk and will likely have everyone up on their feet."

Nagy said the Juneteenth celebration has always been well received by the Brookings community and attendance has grown through the years. All community members — of all races — are welcomed to the event. There is no cost to attend and registration is not required.

Food will be on offer and vendors including local Black-owned businesses will be there.

"These annual commemorations provide a valuable opportunity to acknowledge our collective history, to reflect on how the past has shaped our present, to celebrate progress, and to revel in the rich tapestry of our diversity," Nagy said. "Doing so makes Brookings a more welcoming and inclusive place and us a more vibrant community."

MEAT: Steaks cut fresh daily in Volga

salads, fruits, produce, buns, seasonings and sauces.

"(We're) kind of your one-stop shop for meat," Dan Kriese said.

Customers will also have a role when it comes to product selection.

"We're going to be, at some point, probably up around that neighborhood of 40 different flavors of brats," Dan Kriese said. "We'll have brats on a rotating basis, so people can try different flavors they may not think of, or want to try at a different point in time — and if those brats become popular, we'll keep those as a main brat as well."

Understandably, fresh steak has been one of the shop's biggest sellers.

"They are fresh-cut daily — that's not something I think we can get, really, around the area in a retail setting," he said. "Also, if anybody requests it, a steak cut a certain thickness — we're more than happy to provide that as well."

Even better, Back Alley Meats offers a rare kind of steak — well, rare for around here.

"Probably one of our most popular products in the fresh meat case has been the teres major steak," Dan Kriese said. "That's a steak that comes from the front end of cattle — it's a muscle that's not used very often, so it's almost as tender as beef tenderloin."

He continued, "Nobody around here offers it; to my knowledge, we're the first in

the area to offer that. It's a very, very good piece of meat — very tender, very flavorful. People that have tried it have been back for more several times since we've opened."

And, hey, if you can't devour your steak the same day? The shop offers a solution for that, too.

"We try to provide the customer service nobody else is providing. If you buy a steak and you're not going to cook it today or tomorrow, we'll offer to vacuum seal it for free," Dan Kriese said. "That's been a good thing with people."

Let's not forget about the snack sticks. They, too, are popular — to the point that Dan Kriese relayed the story of one very zealous customer.

"I had one customer tell me that, from Volga to Brookings is 6 miles, the snack sticks are six to a package and when he got home he didn't have any left."

A perfect spot

What brought Back Alley Meats to Volga? Why not Brookings, or Bruce, or another nearby town? Part of it had to do with the price of the building it now inhabits — it was available at a "great price," Dan Kriese said.

"Retail space availability in Brookings is expensive, and to try to keep prices competitive — I didn't want to have to raise our prices just to be able to sell products and cover the overheads," he explained.

Beyond that, though, there's something else that's

both tangible and intangible.

"I feel like businesses in smaller towns are more personable — you have that small-town feeling, you have that small-town atmosphere, the small-town pride," Dan Kriese said. "Like our slogan says, 'Small-town quality, big-city selection.' Our quality is going to come first, and I think having a business in the Volga community, all of the residents that have had interaction with us have been nothing but supportive of it."

"They're glad we're here, and that just makes me know that our decision to open shop here was the right one," he finished.

Meat expertise

Dan Kriese said he grew up hunting pretty much his entire life, and that his family always processed their own wild game.

"My grandpa always seemed like he was always smoking something ... I kind of thought to myself, 'You know, I need to learn how to do this.' I started smoking some meat on my own and continued doing wild game processing, then did it for some friends," Kriese recounted.

He said his friends, impressed by his skills, encouraged him to start a business. He added to his already-formidable base of knowledge through classes at South Dakota State University and the University of Wisconsin-Madison. To

top it all off, Kriese is also a member of the South Dakota Association of Meat Processors and National Association of Meat Processors.

"We're always striving to look how we can do things better and provide better service for everybody," he said.

His new venture in Volga opens up options people haven't had for years.

"The grocery store here in Volga closed probably about eight years ago, and besides a couple other retailers in the area, there hasn't been anywhere else to purchase fresh meats, produce and stuff in the Volga area. This is something that we want to offer not only to the Volga area, but area-wide. Everybody is welcome," Kriese said.

It goes without saying that customers are important, but he wants them to become more than just someone who buys meat products from Back Alley Meats.

"We want to make sure we're making new friends in the business as well; there's already been several repeat customers — they're friends," Kriese said. "That's what I want people to think of when they come in here is, 'Going to my friend's meat shop.' When they leave here, I want them to walk out of the door with a smile (knowing) they got the best service, the best quality products they can get for a very fair and competitive price."

a woman to get the treatment she needs is imperiled if not possible in many states," Biden said in a statement.

Marjorie Dannenfelser, president of SBA Pro-Life America, expressed disappointment with the ruling, but trained her fire on Democrats. "Joe Biden and the Democrats are hell-bent on forcing abortion on demand any time for any reason, including DIY mail-order abortions, on every state in the country," Dannenfelser said.

About two-thirds of U.S. adults oppose banning the use of mifepristone, or medication abortion, nationwide, according to a KFF poll conducted in February. About one-third would support a nationwide ban.

The high court is separately considering another abortion case, about whether a federal law on emergency treatment at hospitals overrides state abortion bans in rare emergency cases in which a pregnant patient's health is at serious risk.

More than 6 million people have used mifepristone since 2000. Mifepristone blocks the hormone

progesterone and primes the uterus to respond to the contraction-causing effect of a second drug, misoprostol. The two-drug regimen has been used to end a pregnancy through 10 weeks gestation.

Health care providers have said that if mifepristone is no longer available or is too hard to obtain, they would switch to using only misoprostol, which is somewhat less effective in ending pregnancies.

Biden's administration and drug manufacturers had warned that siding with abortion opponents in this case could undermine the FDA's drug approval process beyond the abortion context by inviting judges to second-guess the agency's scientific judgments. The Democratic administration and New York-based Danco Laboratories, which makes mifepristone, argued that the drug is among the safest the FDA has ever approved.

The decision "safeguards access to a drug that has decades of safe and effective use," Danco spokeswoman Abigail Long said in a statement.

The plaintiffs in the mifepris-

tone case, anti-abortion doctors and their organizations, argued in court papers that the FDA's decisions in 2016 and 2021 to relax restrictions on getting the drug were unreasonable and "jeopardize women's health across the nation."

Kavanaugh acknowledged what he described as the opponents' "sincere legal, moral, ideological, and policy objections to elective abortion and to FDA's relaxed regulation of mifepristone."

Federal laws already protect doctors from having to perform abortions, or give any other treatment that goes against their beliefs, Kavanaugh wrote. "The plaintiffs have not identified any instances where a doctor was required, notwithstanding conscience objections, to perform an abortion or to provide other abortion-related treatment that violated the doctor's conscience since mifepristone's 2000 approval," he wrote.

In the end, Kavanaugh wrote, the anti-abortion doctors went to the wrong forum and should instead direct their energies to persuading lawmakers and regu-

lators to make changes.

Abortion rights advocates mainly breathed a sigh of relief after the decision, but they echoed Biden about the impact of the decision two years ago.

"In the end, this ruling is not a 'win' for abortion — it just maintains the status quo, which is a dire public health crisis in which 14 states have criminalized abortion," Nancy Northup, president and CEO of the Center for Reproductive Rights, said in a statement.

The mifepristone case began five months after the Supreme Court overturned Roe. Abortion opponents initially won a sweeping ruling nearly a year ago from U.S. District Judge Matthew Kacsmaryk, a Trump nominee in Texas, which would have revoked the drug's approval entirely. The 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals left intact the FDA's initial approval of mifepristone. But it would reverse changes regulators made in 2016 and 2021 that eased some conditions for administering the drug.

The Supreme Court put the appeals court's modified ruling on hold, then agreed to hear the case,

though Justices Samuel Alito, the author of the decision overturning Roe, and Clarence Thomas would have allowed some restrictions to take effect while the case proceeded. But they, too, joined the court's opinion Thursday.

The push to restrict abortion pills likely won't stop with the Supreme Court's ruling, said the lawyer who represented anti-abortion doctors and their organizations in the case.

The decision that the doctors don't have the legal right to sue leaves open the way for lawsuits from others, including three other states that Kacsmaryk had previously allowed to join the case, said Erin Hawley, an attorney for the group Alliance Defending Freedom.

Hawley said she expects Idaho, Kansas and Missouri to continue the lawsuit originally filed in Texas.

Kansas Attorney General Kris Kobach, a Republican, asserted in a statement that the states have "standing that the doctors did not," confirming that he will press ahead with the case in Kacsmaryk's court.

Celebrate pollinator month by inviting a variety of pollinators

June is National Pollinator Month and it's a great time to celebrate all the pollinators that play an important role in producing food, fiber, medicine, and more that we rely on. When you think of pollinators, bees, butterflies, and hummingbirds are likely the first that come to mind. But moths, wasps, beetles, flies, bats, and some other birds also help pollinate our gardens. More than 80% of all flowering plant species, including 180,000 different species and more than 1,200 crops, rely on them for pollination.

Like honeybees and monarch butterflies, many of these pollinators are struggling and their populations dwindling due to pesticides and loss of habitat. Gardeners can make a difference by creating pollinator gardens filled with their favorite plants.

When designing a garden select plants with different shapes, colors, and bloom times. You'll attract a wide array of pollinators and provide them with a constant supply of nectar and pollen. Include bright white, yellow, blue, and ultraviolet-colored flowers to attract the bees. Add some tubular flowers with a spur or landing pad for the butterflies. They are especially fond of purple and red blossoms.

Don't be in a hurry to squash those beetles you find meandering over your plants. Many do not harm the plant but rather move pollen as they travel throughout your garden. These generalists visit a variety of plants, but most often can be found pollinating large strongly scented flowers like Canadian ginger, magnolia, paw paws, and yellow pond lilies. They can be annoying, but flies are also busy pollinating your flowers. They are generalists, like beetles, and tend to pollinate small flowers with shallow, funnel-like, or complex trap-like flowers. You're likely to see them on annuals, bulbs, goldenrod, skunk cabbage, paw paws, and members of the carrot family.

It may be difficult to welcome the often dreaded and feared wasps and hornets to your garden. However, most are solitary, not all sting and some are predators or parasitoids that help manage garden pests.

Besides helping with mosquito control, bats pollinate over 500 species of night-blooming flowers around the world. They prefer those with a musty or rotten odor of mostly tropical and some varieties of desert plants. Most of us enjoy watching hummingbirds visit our gardens and feeders. Hummingbirds are the primary bird pollinators in North America, carrying pollen on their beaks and feathers. They prefer brightly colored scarlet, orange, red, and white tubular flowers. Baltimore orioles are accidental pollinators spreading pollen as they feed on flower nectar while white-winged doves pollinate and spread saguaro cactus seeds.

Be sure to include milkweed, herbs, trees, shrubs, and grasses with foliage that caterpillars and others feed upon. Use native plants including trees, shrubs, flowers, and grasses whenever possible. These plants have evolved with pollinators and provide the greatest benefit. Make sure the native plants you select are suited to the growing conditions and available space. Don't overlook cultivated plants that also attract and support pollinators. Many have flowers or foliage that benefit a variety of pollinators. Watch for bees visiting thyme, borage, and calamint flowers; hummingbirds sipping on salvia, cuphea, and verbena blossoms; and swallowtail caterpillars munching on dill, fennel, and parsley leaves.

Once you create a pollinator-friendly environment, give them time to discover your pollinator paradise. It may take time but once the word gets out you will be enjoying lots of pollinators and the many benefits they provide. Push to promote transgender ideology is backfiring

More Americans are rejecting the tenets of transgenderism.

President Joe Biden has done more to promote transgender ideology than any president, ever. A scroll through the White House archives shows statement after proclamation, speech after speech, in which the president praises what he calls the “extraordinary courage and contributions” of transgender Americans.

Last year, the White House, as part of its observation of Transgender Day of Visibility — an event that included the White House Roundtable on Affirming Transgender Kids — the Biden administration released a list of 42 actions and policy initiatives it has undertaken to support transgender Americans. The list included Justice Department civil rights enforcement actions, “intervening legally when states violate the rights of transgender youth and their families,” signing a “historic executive order to advance equality for LGBTQ+ people,” expanding access to “gender-affirming care,” and much, much more. On that last subject,

the Biden White House has gone all-out even at a time when doctors in Europe have expressed growing concern about the lasting damage caused by the irreversible medical treatments known in some circles as “gender-affirming care.”

So there is no doubt that Biden has put the power of the presidency behind transgender ideology. And yet now there is new evidence that Americans are increasingly rejecting the fundamental tenet of transgenderism: that a man can become a woman and a woman can become a man.

The data is in a new poll by the Pew Research Center. For seven years now, Pew has been asking American voters this question: “Which statement comes

closer to your views, even if neither is exactly right? A) Whether someone is a man or a woman is determined by the sex they were assigned at birth, or B) Someone can be a man or a woman even if that is different from the sex they were assigned at birth.”

Put aside the use of the loaded term “assigned at birth,” which suggests a baby’s sex is an arbitrary assignment rather than a biological reality. When the question was asked in 2017, 54% of those surveyed said that whether someone is a man or woman is determined at birth, while 44% said it can be different. In 2021, the number saying sex is determined at birth ticked upward to 56%. In 2022, it grew to 60%. And this year, 65% of those surveyed said whether someone is a man or woman is determined at birth, while 33% said it can be different.

That is a serious change. Seven years ago, just over half of those surveyed said sex is determined at birth. Now, that number is nearly two-thirds. After all the White House proclamations, all the media talk, all the change in language to “gender neutral” pronouns — after it all, the number of Americans rejecting the foundation of transgenderism has increased.

Pew found huge political differences

in opinion on the subject. Among Republicans, 91% said sex is determined at birth, with just 8% saying it can be different from birth. Among Democrats, just 39% said sex is determined at birth, while 59% said it can be different. But even among Democrats, the number who say sex is determined at birth has grown over the last seven years, while the number who say it can be different has shrunk.

The differences stand apart from some of the conventional divides in recent politics. For example, among people with college degrees, 92% of Trump supporters said sex is determined at birth, while just 30% of college-educated Biden supporters said the same thing. Among voters 18 to 34 years old, 83% of Trump supporters said sex is determined at birth, while 29% of Biden supporters said the same thing.

The contrast is extraordinary. And so is the change. For a time, the number of Americans who said that a person’s sex can be changed, that it can be different from birth, approached a majority. Now, it is receding.

If that trend continues, the ideology which the Biden administration has so energetically promoted might no longer be the political benefit the president thinks it is.

Yankton Press & Dakotan: A Nazi march and an old reminder

On Thursday, June 6, we turned our attentions to Normandy in France as several world leaders honored the 80th anniversary of the D-Day invasion of occupied Europe during World War II, a pivotal moment in that war and in the course of human history. The moment pleaded to us to not forget the cost of confronting fascism and hate. While so few of the soldiers who were part of that invasion now remain, last week’s message seemed to ring out even from the graves of the dead ...

Two days later, South Dakotans were given another reminder of what that fight was all about, and why that resolve can never rest.

On Saturday, members of the neo-Nazi group Blood Tribe staged public demonstrations in both Pierre and Deadwood. The event in Pierre was held on the steps of the state capitol, with about 15 demonstrators, clad in red and black and hiding behind masks, posing next to a large red flag emblazoned with a swastika while, in social media photos, the seat of our state government loomed in the background.

According to the Department of Public Safety, the Highway Patrol dispersed the demonstrators because they did not have a permit for their rally. However, a purported member of Blood Tribe said on social media that the group left of their own accord and were not shooed away by state authorities.

Either way, what was left behind was a disturbing visual, which was one of the points of the effort.

Although the neo-Nazis didn’t have a permit for the protest, they do broadly have the right to free expression as guaranteed by the First Amendment.

In response, we have the right to look upon these people and what they stand for and to see them for what they are.

It also demands that we understand that the fight against fascism (which, by the way, is what “antifa,” or anti-fascism, is) did not end with victory in World War II.

The battle goes on. The fight is never-ending. Hate groups like Blood Tribe and its overt protests make the threat easy to see, impossible to miss.

But it’s the more understated, subversive forms that must be understood and also confronted ... and that’s what makes the battle difficult but all the more essential.

For now, we understand the stakes.

On Saturday night, Gov. Kristi Noem posted on X/Twitter, “Today, Nazis attempted to rally at the SD Capitol without a permit and were escorted away by Highway Patrol officers. Nazis are not welcome here in South Dakota. We stand on the shoulders of generations of Americans who have fought for the freedom of all — here and abroad. We stand for life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. We reject all hatred and Nazis. Full stop.”

The Spink County Democrats responded on social media to the incident by beseeching South Dakotans to “stand against what these people represent,” then posted the names of veterans from that county who died during World War II, closing with the declaration, “(Expletive) Nazis.”

Besides other state officials, national groups also weighed in. The Council on American-Islamic Relations on Monday declared, “We join in the condemnation of this display of hatred and bigotry, which targets every minority community and must be repudiated by all Americans.”

The lessons from the past few days are simple, clear and vital: Remember what was won at a terrible price, and do not delude yourself into thinking that the fight is ever finished.

Austin American-Statesman Trump’s pledge to deport millions of immigrants would devastate Texas businesses

Texas depend on immigrant workers, including those who are here illegally. Donald Trump’s promise of mass deportations might appeal to some voters, but it would have grave consequences.

As Texans rebuild their storm-shattered homes and businesses, many of the workers they call will be immigrants. Some will be undocumented. Under a second Donald Trump presidency, they might not be here to help. Reviving threats from 2016, the former president has pledged to deport the country’s estimated 11 million undocumented immigrants. He has called for deploying the National Guard, local law enforcement and perhaps the military to carry out deportations, and flirted with the idea of building detention camps.

This fantasy will appeal to many voters. Illegal immigration ranks among Americans’ top concerns, with record numbers of unauthorized immigrants apprehended at the southern border in the last two years. Meanwhile, Gov. Greg Abbott has vaulted to the heights of Republican politics, thanks to the costly, optics-intensive Operation Lone Star. But mass deportations would have grave consequences for Texas. Immigrants — authorized and unauthorized, highly educated and low-skilled — are critical to our workforce. In February 2024, the nonprofit Every Texan reported that for every 1,000 workers, Texas immigrants and asylum seekers add \$2.6 million to state and local taxes in their first year of eligibility. Once they get work permits, new immigrants in Texas earned an average of \$20,000 in their first year, rising to \$29,000 by their fifth year.

Undocumented workers also bring a net cost benefit, researcher Jose Ivan Rodriguez-Sanchez found in a 2020 report for the Baker Institute for Public Policy. Fully calculating cost and benefits for immigration, direct and indirect, is a complex task. But, Rodriguez-Sanchez found, in 2018 workers from Texas’ estimated 1.6 million undocumented residents made up 8.2 percent of the state workforce. These immigrants generated costs such as education, medical care and incarceration. But their unemployment rate was 5.7%, and overall, the revenue they brought to Texas exceeded what Texas spent on them for public services, with an estimated net benefit of \$420.9 million in fiscal year 2018. For every dollar spent on public services for undocumented immigrants, undocumented immigrants provided Texas with \$1.21 in fiscal revenue.

These immigrants are deeply enmeshed in Texas culture. Nationally, an estimated 62 percent of unauthorized immigrants have lived in this country for at least 10 years. In 2018, 1.4 million U.S. citizens in Texas were living with at least one relative who was undocumented.

Long-settled populations with deep roots in the United States

“This is a long-settled population with deep roots in the United States,” said Michelle Mittelstadt, communications director for the nonpartisan Migration Policy Institute. “People with U.S.-born children, who have been in their workplaces for many years, who have opened businesses and employ workers including U.S. workers, who have homes, including loans.”

Mass removal of workers would devastate Texas businesses, especially restaurants and building companies. “The construction industry is perhaps the most dependent on undocumented workers,” said author Loren Steffy, an expert on Texas immigrants and the construction industry. Commercial builders, he explained, must ask unions to supply the workers they need. But unions frequently don’t have enough workers to offer. Contractors then may use other workers, typically turning for this to labor brokers — who tend to supply workers who are undocumented.

Yet business owners rarely publicize these dilemmas. The ferocious political rhetoric surrounding immigration is too threatening. One exception: Houston construction subcontractor Stan Marek, with whom Steffy coauthored a book. One of Marek’s common-sense proposals: an ID system giving undocumented workers tamper-proof IDs that permit them to work only for employers who pay payroll taxes and withhold federal income tax from employee paychecks. This would also allow employers to invest in training.

Texas businesses must be able to honestly disclose their labor needs

For real changes in policy, though, Texas business must openly air its needs. This could start with more robust activism from a state-level consortium of Texas business interests that rely on immigrant workers and clients, national business immigration advocate Laura Reiff said. The group should include leaders from agriculture, high tech, health care, restaurants, higher education and construction. This is especially urgent because migration itself has transformed. At the Texas/Mexico border, a migration flow once dominated by male workers from Mexico now includes large shares of families and unaccompanied children, many of them seeking asylum. In 2023, 51 percent arrived from beyond Mexico and Central America. Texas and the nation need a new, hemispheric approach to adapt our society — and our businesses — to these immense changes.

Texas rightly want to update the immigration system. But as the Editorial Board has noted before, turning the border into a military front doesn’t do that.

Nor does Trump’s fantastical deportation plan, which could cost the equivalent of 30 percent of the 2024 Pentagon budget. That’s before the recession that would likely be triggered from removing so many workers from the economy. Instead, businesses deserve lawmakers who respect their labor needs. Communities need leaders who will honor their families and institutions. And Texas needs workers who are decently treated and decently paid and who can keep Texas growing, storm after storm.

Dynamic duos

Twenty-three sets of twins graduate from a single Massachusetts middle school.

NEEDHAM, Mass. (AP) — Twenty-three sets of twins have graduated from a Massachusetts middle school, making up about 10% of the eighth-grade class.

The identical and fraternal twins graduated from Pollard Middle School in Needham, Massachusetts, on Wednesday. Another student, who is also a twin, graduated but her brother attends a different school, said principal Tamatha Bibbo.

It's "quite unusual," said Bibbo. "We typically have anywhere from five to 10 sets at most. Given our numbers, we have approximately 450 to 500 children in each grade so this was extraordinarily high."

The school gave a special shout-out to the 23 sets of twins during the so-called "moving up" ceremony on Wednesday, she said. Twins account for around 3% of live births in the U.S., according to the National Center for Health Statistics.

The Pollard Middle School graduates must all have completed up to 10 hours of service learning in their communities and every year the Needham Exchange Club offers five community service awards. For the first time this year a set of twins — Lukas and Sameer Patel — won an award and a donation to their charity, Bibbo said.

Graduation to be held for 911 basic course

PIERRE — South Dakota Attorney General Marty Jackley said that 17 students will graduate Friday from the state 911 Basic Telecommunicator Certification Course.

DOT seeks fill material

CLEAR LAKE — In 2027, the South Dakota Department of Transportation plans to administer a construction project on S.D. Highway 15 from Clear Lake north to U.S. Highway 212. The project is designed to enhance the safety and function of the roadway through grading, shoulder widening, replacing culverts, adding turn lanes, and improving sight distances.

The proposed improvements to the roadway will require a large quantity of fill material. The fill material, known as borrow, is located beneath the topsoil. Borrow material is removed from the landowner's property by lowering an existing hill/ridge or creating a dugout/hole. The SDDOT cannot alter drainage or wetlands through the borrow process.

The SDDOT is reaching out to area landowners to generate interest as a borrow provider. The SDDOT will consider and evaluate all prospective sites within two miles or less from the construction project.

Prior to construction, the landowner reviews and approves the design for the borrow site. Through a signed borrow agreement with the SDDOT, landowners are compensated for the volume of borrow material removed, the amount of acreage disturbed (crop damage and/or loss of use), and revegetation (if applicable). Upon completion of the borrow material removal, the site is given its final shape and the topsoil is redistributed over the disturbed area. Final acceptance of the borrow site requires landowner approval and signature for release.

No pardon in the works for Hunter Biden

FASANO, Italy (AP) — President Joe Biden said Thursday that he will not use his presidential powers to lessen the eventual sentence that his son Hunter will receive for his federal felony conviction on gun crimes.

Biden, following the conclusion of a news conference held at the Group of Seven summit of the world's wealthiest democracies, responded he would not when asked whether he plans to commute the sentence for his son. Hunter Biden's sentencing date has not been set, and the three counts carry up to 25 years in prison, though that's unlikely as a first-time offender.

Ultimately, it will be up to U.S. District Judge Maryellen Noreika, who was nominated to the bench by former Republican President Donald Trump, to decide how much time, if any, Hunter Biden serves behind bars.

Biden's remarks came one day after the White House declined to rule out a potential commutation for Hunter Biden. Both the president and the White House have said for months that Biden would not pardon his son.

"I'm extremely proud of my son Hunter. He has overcome an addiction. He is one of the brightest most decent men I know," Biden said earlier during the news conference Thursday. "I abide by the jury decision. I will do that and I will not pardon him."

Elon Musk wins back his huge Tesla payday

DETROIT (AP) — Tesla shareholders on Thursday voted to restore CEO Elon Musk's record \$44.9 billion pay package that was thrown out by a Delaware judge earlier this year.

Vote totals were not immediately announced. The favorable vote doesn't mean CEO Musk will get the all-stock compensation anytime soon. The package is likely to remain tied up in the Delaware Chancery Court for months as Tesla appeals the rejection.

The court ruled in January that Musk essentially controlled the Tesla board when it approved the package in 2018, and that it failed to fully inform shareholders who approved it the same year.

Tesla has said it would appeal, but asked shareholders to reapprove the package at Thursday's the company's annual meeting in Austin, Texas.

In a filing with the U.S. Securities and

Exchange Commission on Thursday, Tesla published Musk's own posts late Wednesday on X, the social media platform he owns, with charts that appeared to show that shareholders were in favor of his compensation package, as well a measure to move Tesla's legal home from Delaware to Texas.

The company sought the votes after a Delaware judge threw out the pay package in January. Chancellor Kathaleen St. Jude McCormick determined that Tesla deceived shareholders when the all stock compensation was approved in 2018, so Musk is not entitled to the landmark package, which was worth nearly \$56 billion before a stock slide this year.

Minnesota man who joined Islamic State group is sentenced

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — A Minnesota man who once fought for the Islamic State group in Syria after becoming radicalized expressed remorse and wept in open court Thursday as he was sentenced to 10 years in federal prison.

Abelhamid Al-Madioum, 27, cooperated with federal authorities ahead of Thursday's hearing, which prosecutors factored into their recommendation for a lower sentence than the statutory maximum of 20 years.

U.S. District Judge Ann Montgomery said among the cases she has presided over in her 40 years on the bench, Al-Madioum's was "extraordinary." She cited his confounding path from a loving Minnesota home to one of the world's most notorious terror organizations and his subsequent collaboration with the government he betrayed.

When Al-Madioum rose to speak before being sentenced, he thanked the U.S. government for giving him another chance. He then turned to his address his parents and two young sons, who were rescued from a Syrian orphanage and brought to America with the help of federal authorities.

"I know I put you through so much, and I did with the belief that it was my religious duty," Al-Madioum said while fighting back tears. "That's no excuse. My first duty should have been to you."

Al-Madioum, a naturalized U.S. citizen, was among several Minnesotans suspected of leaving the U.S. to join the Islamic State group, along with thousands of fighters from other countries worldwide. Roughly three dozen people are known to have left Minnesota to join militant groups in Somalia or Syria.

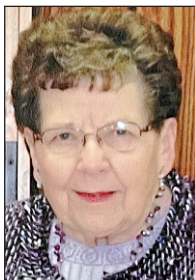

Correa hits two-run homer, Twins top A's 6-2

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — Joe Ryan struck out five in seven strong innings and Carlos Correa had a two-run homer among his three hits as the Minnesota Twins beat the Oakland Athletics 6-2 on Thursday night.

One day after the Twins had a season-high 24 hits against the Rockies, Minnesota banged out 13 hits — 12 singles and Correa's homer in the seventh inning.

Byron Buxton had three hits and drove in two runs, and Royce Lewis and Austin Martin had two hits apiece as the Twins won for the fourth time in five games.

Ryan (5-5) worked seven innings for the fourth time in five starts and lowered his ERA to 3.24. The 28-year-old right-hander gave up three hits and one walk.

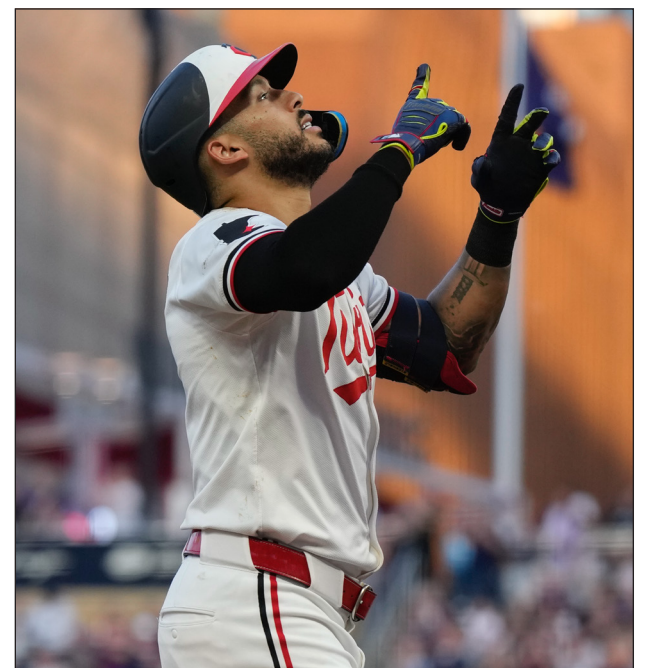
"That's the focus," Ryan said about working deeper into games. "I just go into each game looking for a quality start whatever that means, whatever that looks like, I guess."

Tyler Soderstrom homered for the third time in four games for the A's, who lost their sixth straight. Luis Medina (0-2) gave up four runs in five innings in his third start of the season for Oakland.

Correa, who went 5 for 6 on Wednesday, singled in his first two at-bats. Then, with Lewis on base and two out in the seventh, he launched a hanging breaking ball from reliever Sean Newcomb 394 feet, into the second deck in left field.

When Correa returned to the dugout he donned a purple vest and grabbed an inflatable purple guitar in honor of Minneapolis music icon Prince, whose legacy was being celebrated at Prince Day at the ballpark.

"I'm like, 'This is creative. I love this,'" Correa said of his reaction to seeing the vest before the game. "I was like,

"I want to hit a home run so bad!" It happened in the last at-bat, but it happened. It's a great idea. I loved it."

Correa has 14 hits in his last five games, raising his batting average from .255 to .299.

"He's putting on a show right now. It's impressive," said Lewis, who is 11 for 32 with four home runs since he returned June 3 after missing two months with a strained quad.

Injuries have prevented Buxton, Correa and Lewis from playing together. But, with the trio now healthy, manager Rocco Baldelli hopes the recent offensive surge is a sign of things to come.

"It's a very dynamic trio of guys," Baldelli said. "Having them all feeling great, playing great at the same time — this is what happens. They play like this and all of a sudden we're putting runs on the board, we're making a lot of different things happen."

Soderstrom opened the scoring with a two-run,

431-foot homer to center field in the second inning.

Buxton's two-run single in the bottom of the inning tied it for the Twins.

He'll face Twins RHP Simeon Woods Richardson (2-1, 2.84), who allowed one run in 6 1/3 innings at Pittsburgh on Sunday.

Panthers hold off Oilers in Game 3, now one win away from winning Stanley Cup

EDMONTON, Alberta (AP) — Aleksander Barkov led the way offensively, Sergei Bobrovsky was in peak form in goal once again and the Florida Panthers are on the verge of lifting the Stanley Cup.

Barkov set up a goal and scored another, Bobrovsky made 32 saves to extend his run of dominance and the Panthers held on to beat the Edmonton Oilers 4-3 in Game 3 of the Cup final Thursday night.

They can win the first title in franchise history as soon as Game 4 on Saturday night in Edmonton.

"We know it's going to be the hardest game for sure," Barkov said. "We don't take anything for granted. Every single day is one day at a time. Whether it's one period, one shift, we take it one at a time. That's how we've been all year."

Florida took another step toward hockey's mountaintop by pouncing on a handful of Edmonton turnovers and keeping Connor McDavid from scoring a goal. A late rally got the Oilers within one

but fell short.

Long before that, Barkov forced one of the giveaways by Evan Bouchard seconds before Sam Reinhart's goal, netminder Stuart Skinner coughed up the puck on Vladimir Tarasenko's, and Darnell Nurse gave it away on Sam Bennett's.

"It takes away momentum," Oilers coach Kris Knoblauch said.

Barkov had one of the signature moments by getting past the defense and beating Skinner on a breakaway, quieting for some time the crowd fired up for the first Stanley Cup Final game with fans in Edmonton since 2006.

It will take the Oilers completing a comeback done just four times in NHL playoff history — and once in the final all the way back in 1942 — to end Canada's Cup drought.

The last year a team based in Canada won it was Montreal in 1993, months before the Panthers' inaugural season. Until this series, they had gone 1-8 in the final.

Behind Barkov and

Bobrovsky, Florida has totally flipped that script. The two leading candidates for the Conn Smythe Trophy as playoff MVP were arguably the two best players on the ice in Game 3, including Barkov bouncing back from a high hit from Leon Draisaitl that knocked him out of Game 2 on Monday night.

"Just from the start, our compete and our will and the want to win this one was huge," Bennett said. "Everyone down to our goalie were battling their butts off. It was nice to see the effort. You either have it, or you don't. We have 23 dogs on our team that have that will. You either have it, or you don't."

Another big reason the Panthers got here, winger Matthew Tkachuk, also had a big assist and was responsible for turning up the pressure on Edmonton.

The Oilers wilted under it, losing a game in which they largely the better team but could not overcome ill-timed miscues. Skinner allowed four goals on 23 shots and Warren Foegele, Philip

Broberg and Ryan McLeod scored, while McDavid for the first time all playoffs looked frustrated and out of sorts.

"The finishing, a lot of it just confidence: shooting the puck," Knoblauch said.

Doing that to elite opponents, defending them to the point of second-guessing their ability to score, is a huge part of the Panthers' style

and a big reason they are on the league's biggest stage and putting the cold ones on ice for a potential championship celebration 2,500 miles from home.

By holding on to beat Edmonton on Thursday night, they also showed no ill effects from waiting to fly from South Florida to Alberta, a decision that was questioned when their plane was delayed by storms and got in a few

hours late Wednesday — less than 24 hours before puck drop. Instead of looking jet-lagged, the Panthers were primed to pounce on opportunities to score and delivered when it mattered most.

"We keep staying with the moment," Bobrovsky said. "We don't think too much ahead of ourselves. We're just staying with the moment and enjoy the moment."

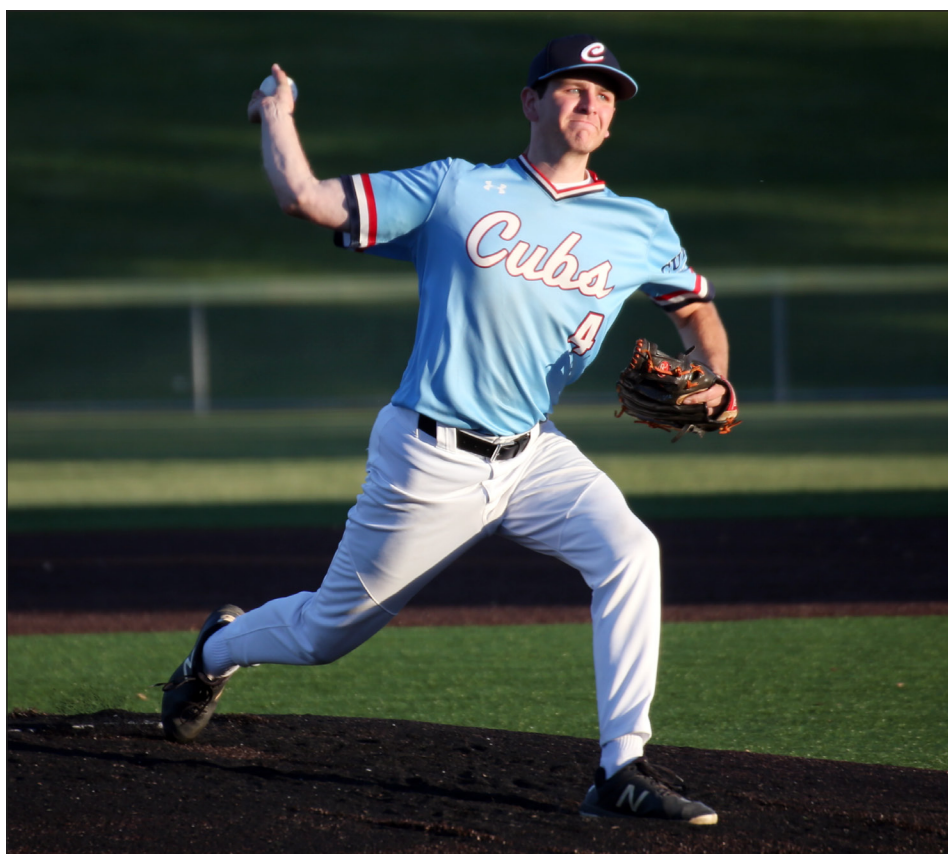

Barnes has spent the last three years at the University Utah on the coaching staff led by Craig Smith. He's served as a director of player personnel and assistant coach for the Utes. Barnes had previously worked with Smith during the 2018-19 season at Utah State where he served as director of basketball operations and player devel-

opment. His campaign in Logan saw the Aggies win the Mountain West regular-season and tournament titles, as well as an NCAA Tournament berth. The NABC recognized Barnes for his efforts and named him to the 2019 Under Armour 30-Under-30 Team.

Barnes began his coaching career at Southwest Minnesota State after a four-year collegiate career capped by two seasons with the Mustangs. He spent six seasons on the SMSU coaching staff. While with the Mustangs, Barnes led them to a South Division Championship in the NSIC back-to-back years while

going 53-15 in those two seasons — including a record-tying 28 victories in 2016-17. In total, Barnes saw six players reach all-conference status while 24 earned academic all-league honors during his time at SMSU.

Barnes received his bachelor's in sports management from Southwest Minnesota State in 2013 before earning his masters in physical education from SMSU. Barnes is married to his wife, Brittani Wiese - who was four-year letter winner at Minnesota Crookston.

Barnes replaces Kyle Marshall who recently accepted a similar position at Furman University.

Jaguars, Lawrence reach 5-year extension

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP) — Trevor Lawrence is getting paid more for his potential than his performance.

Lawrence and the Jacksonville Jaguars agreed Thursday to a five-year, \$275 million contract extension that makes him one of the highest-paid quarterbacks in NFL history, according to a person familiar with negotiations.

Lawrence's deal includes \$142 million fully guaranteed and a \$37.5 million signing bonus, said the person who spoke to The Associated Press on condition of anonymity because neither side had announced the contract publicly.

Lawrence will get an average of \$55 million annually during the deal, tying him with Cincinnati's Joe Burrow for the most in NFL history.

The lucrative bump comes nearly a month after Detroit gave Jared Goff a four-year extension worth \$212 million that made him the second-highest paid quarterback in the league. Goff's average salary is \$53 million.

Lawrence is now the sixth QB making more than \$50 million a year, joining Burrow, Goff, Justin Herbert of the Los Angeles Chargers, Baltimore's Lamar Jackson and Philadelphia's Jalen Hurts. Lawrence is the 14th to top \$40 million annually, and he's the youngest on the list.

The 24-year-old is 21-31 as a starter in three seasons, including 1-1 in the playoffs, and has a whopping 60 turnovers in three seasons.

The Georgia native and former Clemson star has completed nearly 64% of his passes for 11,770 yards, with 58 touchdowns and 39 interceptions. He also has 11 rushing scores and 21 fumbles lost.

The Jaguars point to a 19-game stretch spanning the 2022-23 seasons in which Lawrence was at his best. He threw for 4,713 yards, with 29 TDs and 11 INTs, as Jacksonville went 14-5 during that span.

But he's coming off an injury-filled season that Baalke called "alarming."

The top pick in the 2021 draft missed the first game of his professional career following a sprained right shoulder sustained in Week 16 at Tampa Bay.

Lawrence also missed significant practice time because of other injuries: a sprained left knee in Week 6, a sprained right ankle in Week 13 and a concussion in Week 15.

Lawrence seemingly regressed because of the injuries. He threw for 4,016 yards, with 21 touchdowns and 14 interceptions. He also ran for four scores, lost seven fumbles and was sacked a career-high 35 times.

McIlroy showing major form with bogey-free 65 to share US Open lead with Cantlay

PINEHURST, N.C. (AP) — Rory McIlroy sent his 20-foot birdie putt on its way at the 18th hole Thursday and started walking toward the cup when the ball was still some 6 feet away from falling. It looked like the walk of a four-time major champion in control of his game on a Pinehurst No. 2 course that demanded every bit of that in the U.S. Open.

Turns out that was about the only thing that didn't go according to plan.

"I thought I'd left it short. That's why I walked after it — full disclosure," McIlroy said. "It looked good, though."

He looked as good as ever, posting a bogey-free opening round in a major for the first time since last winning one 10 years ago in the British Open. His 5-under 65 gave him a share

of the lead with nemesis Patrick Cantlay in a first round that had a little bit of everything.

Scottie Scheffler was over par in the opening round of a major for the first time in two years, Collin Morikawa had two double bogeys and still shot 70. Tyrrell Hatton dropped his club on impact at the par-3 17th hole, kicked his club, watched it land on the green and made birdie.

The final touch was McIlroy's final birdie.

"A great way to finish," he said. "The way I played today, the way I hit the ball, the way I managed myself, I felt like that score was pretty deserved."

Cantlay played in the morning beneath a full sun, holing out from a bunker for birdie on his second hole and making a pair of birdie putts in the 20-foot range

in an otherwise tidy round marred by only one bogey.

Pinehurst No. 2 was both playable and punishing, yielding 15 rounds under par, the same number as the last time on this Donald Ross gem in 2014.

Scheffler did not have one of them. The world's No. 1 player, coming off his fifth win of the year at the Memorial, was a picture of frustration — clean-shaven and with a fresh haircut — as he didn't have his usual control off the tee.

He still managed a 71 and was very much in the game.

Tiger Woods couldn't say the same. After a good start, he had five bogeys in a seven-hole stretch around the turn for a 74, his 12th consecutive round in the majors without breaking par.

McIlroy was in control from the start, hitting 6-iron to 7 feet at the 528-yard fourth hole — the toughest par 4 on the course — for birdie, and then chipping in from the front of the green on the next hole.

He has the advantage of towering iron shots that land softly, and they were usually pin-high and away from the domed edges of the Pinehurst greens that cause so much trouble.

McIlroy has won majors the last three times he has started with a bogey-free round — at Hoylake in the 2014 British Open, at Kiawah Island in the 2012 PGA Championship and at Congressional in the 2011 U.S. Open.

"Getting off to a good start is important to try to keep yourself up there, because you have to give

yourself as big of a cushion as possible, knowing what is lurking around the corner," McIlroy said.

Ludvig Aberg, in his U.S. Open debut, hit his tee shot to 6 feet on the scary par-3 ninth hole for birdie and a 66. Every major is something new for the rising star from Sweden, who only turned pro a year ago. He was runner-up in the Masters.

Bryson DeChambeau, the runner-up at Valhalla in the PGA Championship last month, and Matthieu Pavon of France were at 67.

Sergio Garcia had the other bogey-free round — 17 pars and a birdie — in his 25th consecutive time playing the U.S. Open. He also played in the morning and didn't seem particularly alarmed by Cantlay's 65. That matches the low

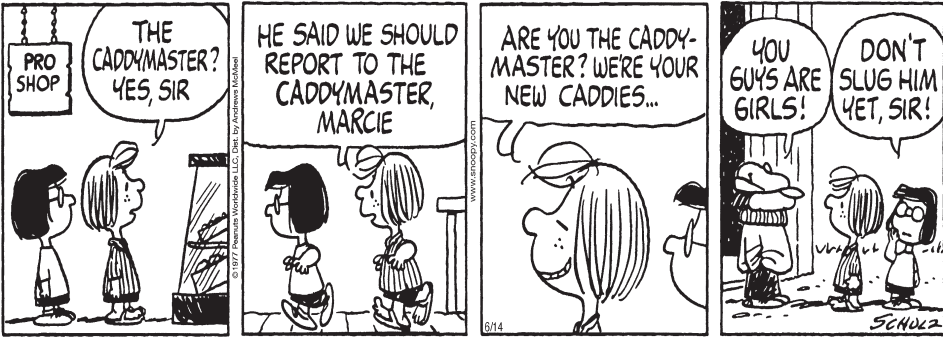
opening round in four U.S. Opens at Pinehurst No. 2.

"There's always going to be someone that hits the ball great, everything goes his way, makes a couple of bombs, and you can shoot it," Garcia said. "You might see someone shooting another 66 or 65 or something like that. I think as the course gets even firmer, even faster, a tiny bit of breeze comes up here and there, it's going to be difficult to shoot those kind of scores."

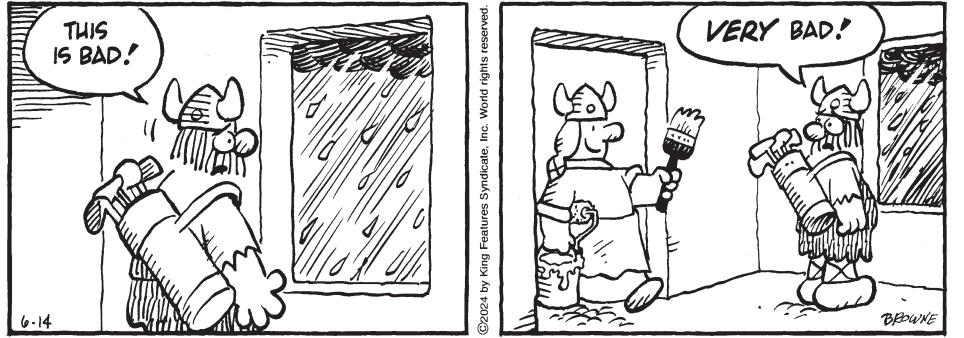
It shouldn't be a surprise to see Cantlay contending given he has no real weakness in his game, except for his performance in the majors. He has only four top 10s in his 26 major starts since returning from a serious back injury in 2017, and only one real chance at winning one.

Bridge

By PHILIP ALDER

Ellsworth Huntington, who taught at Euphrates College in Turkey from 1897 to 1901 and was a professor of geography at Yale University, said, "A journey of 430 miles can be made in any part of the United States, but in Turkey it takes as many days."

The card play of a bridge journey starts with the first trick. And many forget that it is all too easy immediately to take the wrong road. What should South do in this contract of three no-trump after West leads the club two and East plays the three?

South seems to start with nine top tricks: one spade, four hearts, one diamond and three clubs (given the first trick). But the heart suit is blocked and will furnish four tricks only if declarer

has a way into the dummy. Well, what is South's dummy entry?

It must come from the club suit. But if declarer takes the wrong first step, winning trick one as cheaply as possible with his six, he will not reach the finish line except against bad defense. In this scenario, South might as well cash his club ace, just to confirm the 4-1 split, take his heart king, overtake the heart jack with dummy's queen, cash the heart ace and try the diamond finesse. But it loses and the contract fails.

Since South will never get a fourth club trick (unless he pulls off a most unlikely end-play), he should win the first trick with his ace (or king). Then he plays off the heart king and jack, cashes the club king (or ace), and leads

a club toward dummy's jack. He must end with at least nine tricks.

How? Start slowly, taking one step every one to two seconds. Over time, increase the speed and step count. Your optimal goal, according to a new European study, is to climb more than five flights of stairs per day — we suggest 70 steps a minute. Want a dramatic reduction in health risks? Duke University says "There is a significantly lower risk of mortality when climbing more than 55 flights per week."
