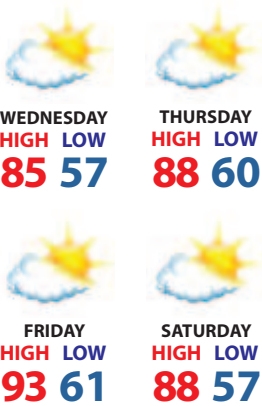

Representative Haroldson getting his
political feet wet in Platte County

WHEATLAND – Jeremy Haroldson is the epitome of the man who carries a Bible and a gun.

He carries the Bible in his heart and a gun at his side. Haroldson who defeated former Representative Dan Kirkbride in 2020 was sworn into office almost six months ago. The pace has quickened, and he finds himself on most days hitting the ground running.

According to his website, haroldsonforhouse.com, “Born and raised in Platte County has given me a unique perspective of our community. After high school, I got a job at Lock Trucking as a diesel mechanic. During that time, I received my degree in Power Plant Technology. I then got a job at Laramie River Station as a laborer. I went through the apprenticeship program and received my Journeyman Mechanics Certification. As a life-long learner, it wasn’t long after my apprenticeship that I started down another learning path. I enrolled in seminary and received my degree in Biblical Theology, all while working at LRS.”

Haroldson is a hard-driving non-apologetic man who is skilled in apologetics. His wife, Lori, was as they say, cut from the same cloth, and

Haroldson calls her a voice of reason and encouragement in their home. He credits his worth-ethic and experience working in Platte County as a strong factor for success for him in political arena representing the hard-working people where they both grew up.

Lori was also born in Wheatland and both her and her husband were home-schooled which is where they originally met each other. Lori said they actually met in a combined chemistry class put together by their parents and as she says, “chemistry happened.” The couple have been married for 15 years.

“After 15 years, there are less things we compete in and more things we complement each other on,” he said. “A lot of my weaknesses are definitely her strengths, and I would say vice versa. That being said, any competitive games still usually end in winners and losers.”

Lori’s parents own Lock Trucking in Wheatland and after high school she went to work for the family business. Her love for music and her talent for singing gave her the perfect background and made her a solid fit for not only the worship leader at Impact but also to be a pastor’s wife.

With such busy lives and being responsible for so many people in a church setting, the question is posed to him many

times, “why politics?”

“I have a 10 and a 13-year-old,” he responds. “Over the course of over a year and a half I’ve realized that if we don’t do something and if conservative values aren’t pushed in this nation, we won’t have them anymore. The way of life we love in Wyoming will be lost.”

Haroldson said that he came to the conclusion that he was not going to complain about that which he was not able to fix. So, his solution was to step in and begin to change things.

He had held conversations with many people who were of his same persuasion that things needed to change, and he set forth to put his hat into the ring. The first step was telling his wife that there would now be more than ministry at Impact.

“I overheard some conversations that he had with a friend, and so I kind of knew kind of what was coming,” she said. “My original thought was if we could do one more thing. But what I’ve learned from being to Jeremy is that you can’t tell him he can’t, because he’s going to do it anyway.”

Transitions have been hard for her, as she mentions. From the financial security of working at the power plant into

Recent
Wyoming data
illustrates
vaccine success

WYOMING – Data gathered from Wyoming residents who have tested positive for COVID-19 in recent months illustrate the success of the safe, free and effective vaccines authorized to fight the virus, according to the Wyoming Department of Health (WDH).

A WDH review of more than 2,400 lab-confirmed and probable cases identified among Wyoming residents age 16 and older between May 1 and June 15 shows just under 95 percent of the individuals do not report being fully vaccinated against COVID-19. During the same period, of the nearly 150 persons infected by COVID-19 who were hospitalized at the time they were interviewed by public health representatives, more than 93 percent did not report being fully vaccinated against COVID-19. To date, there has been one COVID-19 related death of a fully vaccinated Wyoming resident.

Vaccines have been widely available for adults across the state since late March. A person is considered fully vaccinated two weeks after two doses of either the Pfizer or Moderna vaccine or two weeks after one dose of the Janssen (Johnson and Johnson) vaccine.

Dr. Alexia Harrist, state health officer and state epidemiologist with WDH, said the current data for Wyoming appears to be consistent with results across the country. “We are seeing excellent results among those who have been vaccinated. The vast majority of recent, new cases have involved people who were not yet fully vaccinated,” she said.

“It’s clear vaccines are the key to seeing fewer COVID-19 illnesses and there is no question we’d like to see higher vaccine coverage rates in our state,” Harrist said.

Harrist noted Wyoming’s average statewide daily case numbers have remained stable in recent months. “However, Wyoming’s numbers are not dropping as quickly as in states with more complete vaccination coverage. In fact, our rate of new cases adjusted for our population is among the highest in the nation. Hospitalizations have increased in recent weeks and this is something we hate to see happen when we know it could largely be avoided through vaccination,” she said.

The growing presence of the Delta variant among Wyoming COVID-19 cases, particularly in southeastern

On the heels of the Platte County Chamber's Ag Appreciation Banquet, and witnessing a crowd, wowed by the building, it may be prudent at this juncture to quit complaining about a project that is already done and can't be undone and simply take time to say "thank you."

If a few of these paragraphs look familiar, they are. There is emphasis being put on what is happening here in Platte County. With repetitive words.

In 1829, Isaiah Rogers wowed the country with his unique and into the future Tremont Hotel in Boston. It was the first hotel to have indoor plumbing and became the first of many. It didn't really catch on in a lot of homes and people thought it out of their scope to have something that seemed so "foolish" when you could simply walk out

the back door and go 30 feet to the family outhouse.

It is widely known, before electricity, people took baths once a week, usually Saturday nights so everyone would be fresh for Sunday morning church. The family used the same bathwater. By the end of the 1930s, more and more farm families started to use indoor bathrooms and running water for baths and washing dishes and clothes.

It took 101 years. A century came between the modern conveniences of an in-home bath with running water and flush toilets. Privacy. No trudging out to the family "two-holer" through a foot of snow and then sitting in subzero temperatures.

Part of the reason for the lack of change was waiting on electricity. The other part was the majority of

people who had every excuse in the book for "poo-pooing" the stool. The cost would be prohibitive, the taxes would most likely go up, there would be too much maintenance, my father and his father never had this new-fangled extravagance, and if it was good enough for them, then it's good enough for me.

That's the thing about change.

And we have noticed a big and bold change in the 4-H Building that has been remodeled. There were some against it, but there were 72% of the community for it. Last time we checked, Platte County was still was voting in a democracy and the majority rules.

There were rustlings about the building, rustlings about the changes, rustling about the name and rustlings about the price. Probably a good place to say that anywhere else in the country that project would go for double or triple what it cost us here, and

with building supply costs going up, we got a bargain.

And now we have a state-of-the-art convention center. A grand gathering place in Platte County and everyone will have a chance to utilize it. Whether you step out of the 90-degree fair weather to view the fine art or to grab a beverage, you will be taking advantage of something that other counties could only dream of having in their lifetime. It's becoming reality here and now ready for this year's fair.

People have worked hard to bring this to fruition. Some at the expense of their own families with late nights and fielding the criticism that hasn't always been "constructive."

To live in communities where nothing changes and there is no progress is similar to an enclosed pond with no outlet. Stagnation takes place. At some point in a town's history, you can simply look at the buildings and know what period

of time they decided to stop and take a break from all the improvements. Or perhaps there was a council that couldn't be creative enough to move forward. Or perhaps they just got tired.

Platte County began to see the vision that was set before them and their life was creating a legacy for their children. As you watch people jogging our trails, swimming in the pool, biking the paths, you have to thank a former city government who fought against great odds to make it all happen.

The antiquated 4-H Building itself was built under much scrutiny years ago and some thought it was just too much and not needed. Every smiling face of every child that held a ribbon in that old building proved them wrong. Every memory there was evidence of "oh thank God we had that building."

Platte County is a sought-after place to live and to

grow a family. It's one of the most desirable spots to retire, it has everything you'd need for athletics, movies (just temporarily on hold), theater, eclectic shops and so much more.

Although some might like to question some of the things that the "powers that be" move on, rest assured, they are taking care of your children and your grandchildren. If we pay a few dollars more in taxes, figure it as an investment in the future and your children. Oh, how many new memories will happen before this building wears out and each one of our memories is worth every penny.

Just as we close the door to the water closet, and as the weather outside is heating up, we simply have to thank someone who pushed for indoor plumbing in the midst of all the adversity and the cool breezes of that new-fangled waste of money – air conditioning.

Then was our mouth filled with laughter and our tongue with singing."

It's represented for me a change in my life where I have been able to take a deep breath again. I found my smile again. I feel as if my purpose has been restored. Instead of heading out to pasture I found a path to see my passion restored through my writing, my photography and my music.

Now, some journalists go from writing

newspaper articles to writing autobiographies, creating novels and expounding on prose. I did it the opposite way. I wrote my novel, prose and other books before I went back to my roots as a journalist.

The stories I write here may have a buried lead. It may not be 100% journalistically sound. It may be a bit long, sometimes emotional and filled with opinion. I may have studied too much on the merits of long-form journalism that can tell an interesting story without the ramble.

I am a creative writer, and for that I can and will not apologize. I have won both state and national awards with my writing and my photography and have been published in many newspapers and magazines. And it surprised many people the style with which I write can be so embraced and foreign to my mentors at the University of Wisconsin school of journalism that put forth strict journalistic boundaries. It elevates their ire when I color outside the lines.

Good gunslingers shot from the hip. I write from the heart. I don't really know if it is in me to just write the facts without at least the input of a little creativity. Not opinions to sway the public per se, but what I read between the lines of the person I'm interviewing. Sharing with my readers the emotions conveyed beyond the facts from the one who is bearing

their soul to me.

So, instead of saying, "The grass is green," said Mr. Jones. Which to me is a colorless statement, I say, rather, "The grass is green," said Mr. Jones with a tear in his eye because his grass had never before taken root.

Now THAT gives HIS emotion to the story. It speaks of the poignant. It describes the essential.

People here in Platte County know that I will give them an honest day's work. I don't ever just "phone in" a story or throw some letters to a page. In the way I was educated as a creative writer, I want to paint images with my words, and I want the story to come alive. I want the sadness to put tears in your eyes and I want the humor to make you smile right out loud. And I want it to seem as if you were right there in that interview with me.

An interview that doesn't take five questions and 10 minutes. I spend time with people. I want to listen to what they have to say. I want to convey every bit of who they are and bring out the highlights so even they are amazed at what I saw in them.

People invite me back for dinner. Some want to "hang out." This is the greatest compliment I have received here. I always taught my children; you cannot walk out

your front door of opportunity tomorrow morning and just make an appearance in this world. You simply cannot just take up space. You have the chance to make a difference and though you may not be able to change the world, you may be able to change a little portion of the world of those you come in contact with.

Someone wrote about me on a Facebook post, "He is making ordinary people famous." Now, I don't know how famous I make anyone, but I love to make them feel as if they'd hung the moon.

And when I put my pen down for the final time, I wonder what they'll say about me at my passing. I would hope here in Platte County that people would say that his work ethic was tireless, his reach was long and penetrating and his heart loved us above all things. But most of all, I would hope that just one person would say, "he made me feel better about myself and he made a difference in my life."

Because that is what I say about the people of Platte County. You all have truly made me feel better about who I am, about what I accomplish, and you've made a difference in my life. You, Platte County are my defining moment and my finest hour.

It is an honor to stand shoulder to shoulder with you in this battle of life as together we create the legacy of an unforgettable tapestry.

In and Around Wheatland 100 Years Ago

2,000 people attended the big Farm Bureau picnic at Festo Lake coming from every community in the county. 350 autos were parked around the lake and horses were grazing everywhere. Over 800 pounds of barbecued lamb was served as well as numerous other treats from vendors assembled around the shore. The festivities ended with a swell dance under the moonlight. It was a farmers’ picnic, but everybody was

a farmer that day. It was a grand good time.

Goshen County Sheriff Oliver Colyer and Deputy Flora, acting in conjunction with A.S.Roach, staged a major raid on bootleggers and moonshiners in that county. The raid was partially successful, but word had gotten out about warrants being issued and quite a few suspects were unable to be tracked down.

Temporarily deranged, Mrs. H.T. Fish has shocked the community by taking her own life. She had been a sufferer for seven years with attacks of temporary mental aberration and her family had worried previously about her, but she seemed considerably improved. She visited over breakfast with one of her sons, but when another came in about 10:00, he found a note disclosing her plans. He hurried to the cellar but found that she had already accomplished her death by self-imposed strangulation. She was a much-loved woman both by her family and people in this community, and her family has always been

held in the highest regard. She was 58 years old and leaves behind her husband and three sons—Byron, Russell, and Howard.

Capt. W.E.Jackson was killed by Douglas Roberts near Glendo after a dispute over cattle and a fence. The dispute has been ongoing for some time, Also mixed up in the controversy are Jackson’s father-in-law A.J.Covington, Edgar Eaton, a homesteader, and several other neighbors. (The complete story on the front page of the June 29, 1921, issue of the Wheatland Times is an interesting one. You can find the bound newspapers in the basement of the Platte County Library.)

Harry Pepper is seriously ill from appendicitis and blood poisoning. He had been suffering from some light attacks recently, but that did not stop him from taking part in the tug-of-war and other games at the Farm Bureau picnic. It is thought he may have developed blood poisoning during his embalming of Capt. Jackson. He is still in critical condition.

A new moving picture company

is planning to film a western in the country around Wheatland, chosen because of its beautiful mountain-like scenery on all sides. The producers are calling for skilled horse riders—especially young people—to visit with them about a role in the cinema.

The Swan Land and Cattle Company has completed the shearing of 20,000 sheep at Slater and has sold their clip for 18 1/2 cents a pound, which is expected to be the highest price paid this year.

It was no surprise that the latest vote on school bonds carried by a large majority. Schools in District 9 are now funded for a full school year beginning in the fall.

Wheatland has cancelled plans for a 4th of July Celebration and suggests its citizens plan to attend the big celebrations at Chugwater, Glendo, or Guernsey.

Several new United States citizens were sworn in at the County Courthouse. The emigrants were from such scattered places as Russia, Sweden, Italy, Greece, Lebanon, and others.

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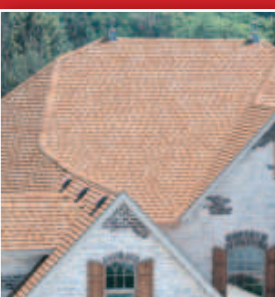
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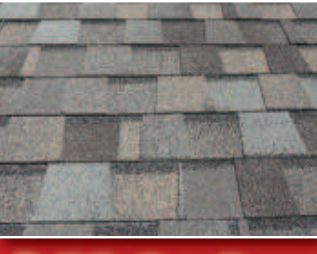

ministry where faith replaces a weekly paycheck was a tester. She says the step into politics has been easier than that first transition.

“I think that the way that God has grown us and how He’s grown me has led me to know that everything was going to be fine,” she said. “We laid a fleece before the Lord and told him that if this was something He wanted us to do, we believe Jeremy will be elected, and if not, then we’ve done our part in being obedient and the rest is up to God.”

A lot is resting on this young Representative’s shoulders, but he has a driving will and a calm spirit and a tenacity to accomplish things that others may have deemed impossible.

“You’re going to get a pastor as a politician,” he said. “I’m not going to change

my morals or my values when I step into Cheyenne. If you want to support me because of who I am, then I will stay who I am. And the thing that you have to understand is I have 150 people I have to answer to every single week as their pastor. And if I do something that is morally in question or is not representing the people, I directly see a portion of my constituents.”

In his new church he has been instrumental in many new bills with his freshman class and has already made an impact in the legislature in Cheyenne. His goal is to bring Wyoming back to the conservative values that the state is used to. Can I get an amen?

Wyoming, is a cause for concern. “The data is showing this variant is more easily transmitted than other strains, meaning it spreads more easily between people and spreads to more people,” Harrist said. “Early information is also showing this variant may be associated with higher likelihood of severe illness than other variants.”

“Our experience demonstrates what we expected to be true: these vaccines can do their job very well including against the Delta variant,” Harrist said. “We remain

confident in recommending that everyone who is eligible to get vaccinated should do so as soon as possible.”

“We know COVID-19 infections are not limited to those who have the highest risk of severe illness. Anyone can get the virus and have a harder time than they might expect and anyone could potentially pass it on to someone who could really struggle,” Harrist said

“By getting a COVID-19 vaccine, you help protect your health and the health of your loved ones,” Harrist said.

Text your ZIP code to 438829 (GETVAX) or 822862 (VACUNA) to find up to three nearby locations that have vaccines available.

Other vaccine reminders include:

No major safety steps were skipped to develop the vaccines.

The Pfizer vaccine is authorized for individuals who are 12 or older;

the Moderna and Janssen vaccines are authorized for individuals who are 18 or older.

If the vaccine received requires two doses for maximum protection, it’s important to get both.

COVID-19 vaccines are free.

Insurance is not required. Some people may be asked to show Medicare or insurance cards so professionals giving shots can get reimbursed.

Afton Rural, Riverton, Lander, Wheatland and Newcastle.

Torrington firefighter Dennis Estes said he was on Torrington's drill team for 25 to 30 years. Estes said each year, firefighters compete in the same five events – Replace Contest, WYE Contest, Double Male/Double Female (Horn) Contest, Chop Contest and Wet Test (Ladder) Contest. Mike Lira of the Torrington Volunteer Fire Department said the Horn Contest and the Chop Contest are crowd favorites.

“What it simulates is training for fire service,” Estes said.

The first event on Thursday was called the replacement. Estes ran one of the backup timers for the event.

“If we're at a fire and run a hose down the street to a house, and

we have a section of a hose that breaks, we've got to replace the hose real fast,” Estes said. That is what the Replacement Contest simulates.

Newcastle won the all-around competition. According to Estes, Wheatland came in sixth, Torrington was seventh and Lingle eighth. Torrington had a second-place finish in the Chop Contest. Estes said he is optimistic about the team going forward.

According to Gene Dietrich of the Newcastle Volunteer Fire Department, each host community has a different setup, equipment and water pressure, so teams get opportunities to practice before competition starts.

Estes said Torrington's plugman, Albert Lira, was injured during a practice run.

“He's probably the oldest plugman in the state and probably the

fastest,” he said.

Dennis said Torrington has won multiple events in years past and still holds one state record. However, the team only recently began competing again.

“This is a brand-new team. We haven't run for five years,” he said. According to Estes, in the past few years, no one had stepped up to put together a team. He said this year was also Lingle's first time competing in a few years.

With each team consisting of volunteers, Estes said, “they give up their weekends to come do this and they give up their time. Most of these teams will practice two or three times a week for a month, month and a half or two months.”

Each run requires five team members, Dietrich said. Some teams have backups.

Estes said Torrington had practiced for a month and a half before the convention, usually three times per week. He said they focus equally on all events, with five total team members.

“A lot of people think it's just a big party event. It's not. It's a big-time competition,” Estes said. “It's very competitive.”

Dietrich, who celebrated his birthday by being at the state convention, has been with the Newcastle Volunteer Fire Department for nearly 60 years.

Dietrich, who also serves as Executive Secretary of the Wyoming State Firemen's Association, said the convention has been one of the most rewarding parts of his experience as a volunteer firefighter. He said his first convention was in Torrington in 1962.

“You develop friendships in every town,” Dietrich said. Estes agreed the camaraderie between departments has been valuable.

“Second Wind” by Patricia Frolander, published by Glendo’s High Plains Press, was the 2021 winner in the Poetry category.

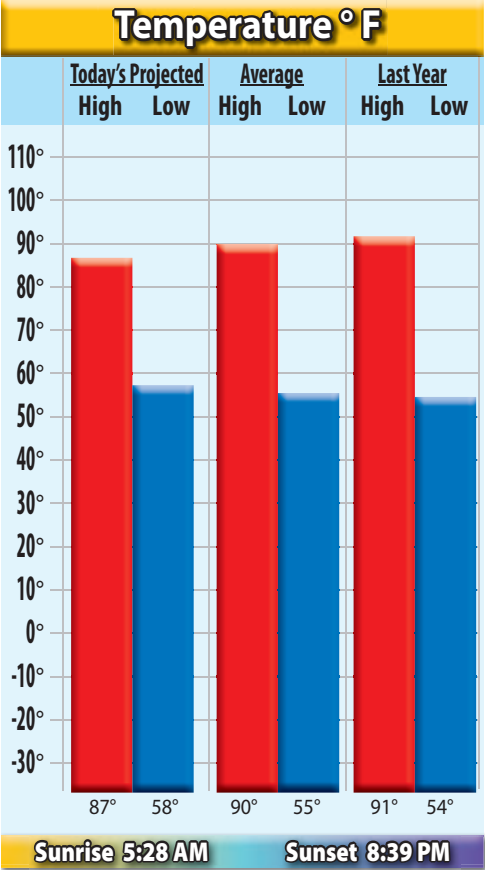
“The book captures Wyoming ranch life in exquisite detail and may change the way the world thinks about women in ranching,” one reviewer wrote.

Chuck Gray planning on a run against Liz Cheney in 2022

WHEATLAND – Chuck Gray is a no-nonsense Natrona County Republican who stands upon a working man’s platform and has given his service in the House of Representatives for District 57 for four years. He makes no bones about his political differences with Liz Cheney who has served as the U.S. Representative for Wyoming’s at-large congressional district since 2017. Many know of her famous father, Dick Cheney, who is the former vice president of the United States who served as the 46th vice president under former President George W. Bush. He was brought to Wheatland by local grassroots activist Shonda Boyd, who is an

advocate for keeping Wyoming dollars in Wyoming. Shonda and her husband, Tyler Boyd, Wheatland residents and ranch owners, have been part of a developing national grassroots movement to see small processing and packing plants come back to life. The goal is to eliminate the middlemen, the excess and the deep pockets of bureaucracy, to get back to the simple idea of meeting supply and demand, matching producers with consumers. In a grassroots effort to chase down a runaway freight train before it derails and causes irreparable damage, a very simple idea sparked the website, United States Meat and Produce Market. Shonda and Tyler Boyd had the insight to see beyond the large processing

closures and know that somewhere down the line, the “big box butchers” will use COVID-19 and the new regime in the White House to exploit the general public and ultimately claim that they have no choice but to charge more for meat and produce products. Boyd brought Gray in on a special night to meet the candidate and to honor the Hillside Bar & Grill June 15. She wanted people to come out and hear a viable candidate option to run against Cheney and she also wanted to celebrate the Wheatland restaurant for vertically integrating beef from local producers, Horblit Natural Beef and Fred’s Produce. The idea was to educate people as to Wyoming’s pure natural beef to be raised and marketed in Wyoming. Gray is running for the Wyoming

Senate in 2022 and came to Wheatland to caution non-Cheney voters that many people running against her could act as a severe split in the voting and would give her the edge. Gray is advocating for a final vote for the top two candidates in a final election. “As soon as she (Cheney) saw the chance on January 6 to vote for impeachment (against then President Trump) and try to quash our movement, she went along with that,” he said. “I’ve proven myself over the last five years in the Wyoming State Legislature. I represent east Casper, was elected in 2016 and entered into the 2017 session.” Gray bills himself as “Liz Cheney’s replacement” and his hashtag to find out more is #draintheswamp. A term that hasn’t been heard

very much since Trump left office, Gray is part of a faction that continues to believe that corruption is the swamp in D.C. and must be drained. Gray runs on a pro-life platform. “The first thing I did as a member of the legislature was to file the ultrasound bill,” Gray said. “This is a pro-life bill that required an ultrasound to be provided any time a woman asked for an abortion. It had been a bill that had been run many times in the state Legislature. We finally passed that bill.” With an air of confidence, and a hint of a pit bull, Gray has successfully promoted and pushed through several bills in the Wyoming Legislature and his tenacity will take him to the task of the next election. Gray is also responsible for

discovering the University of Wyoming was covering abortion in their student health plan. “This was unconscionable,” he said. “We were subsidizing that as state tax payers with a generous block grant that we were providing to the University. I wrote a budget amendment which said that they were not going to receive any of their state funding if they didn’t stop that practice. And of course they are addicted to state funding, so that got it under control and we got that through in 2020.” Another issue that Gray has been active within the legislature is voter integrity and was part of the action that stopped the bill for mail-in voting in Wyoming. Approximately 50 people attended the meet and greet and also attended the 45-minute question and answer period that followed Gray’s presentation.

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Local impact of COVID-19 crisis grants one year later

GLENDO – It has been exactly one year since the Episcopal Church of Glendo received \$1 million to be used by communities across Wyoming to help offset the negative impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic. Saint John the Baptist Episcopal Church of Glendo received \$10,000 to help both individuals in crisis in the community and organizations assisting in meeting their needs. The initial distribution of funds was made in early April 2020 of \$10,000 to each congregation in Wyoming to use in the areas of greatest need with their communities. Gary Hartman, Grants Committee Chair of the Foundation Board noted there were four focus areas recommended by the board for the use of these funds: child care, vulnerable adults, medical bills, transportation and crisis shelter assistance. Saint John the Baptist’s congregation used the initial grant to help individuals and families in need pay their rent, help with utility bills and provide transportation to pick up food or medical care and food. They also donated monies to the food bank in Wheatland to help pay butchering costs of donated animals. The meat was then distributed to people in need through that food bank. We also help stock the small food bank in Glendo. One of our congregation donated hamburger for that food bank, which is kept in a freezer at a near-by business which is Bear Creek Originals LLC. Saint John the Baptist’s congregation delivered the funds in three of the four areas of these COVID-19 grant funds, childcare was not asked for. Sandy Meier, senior warden said, “We at Saint John the Baptist are most grateful for the opportunity to support those in crisis in our community. Former UW thrower headed for the Olympics

EUGENE, Ore. – Former University of Wyoming Track and Field standout Mason Finley is heading to the Tokyo Olympics after winning the Men’s Discus at the 2021 U.S. Olympic Trials on Friday, June 25.

With his best throw of the day at 206 feet, 11 inches, Finley is heading to his second-consecutive Olympic games where he will compete in Tokyo, Japan from July 23 through August 8.

Finley wrapped up his time at the Games of the XXXI Olympiad in Rio de Janerio placing 11th in the men’s discus as he became the first American to compete in the final round of the event since Casey Malone in 2004.

The native of Buena Vista, Colo., won the 2014 Mountain West Conference individual title in the discus back on May 16, 2014, when he recorded a throw of 202- 11 for the second-best mark in MW Championship history.

Finley was named the Outstanding Male Athlete at the 2014 Mountain West Outdoor Track and Field Championships. He went on to place sixth in the discus at the 2014 NCAA Outdoor Track and Field Championships at Hayward Field at the University of Oregon to claim the 11th All-America honor of his college career.

Finley is currently a volunteer assistant for the University of Kansas Jayhawks.

Conservation stamp price to increase

CHEYENNE – The price of the Wyoming conservation stamp will increase on July 1.

The additional revenue from stamp sales will allow the Wyoming Game and Fish Department to invest more money in access opportunities for hunters and anglers. The new price of the annual stamp will be \$21.50 for residents and nonresidents, up from \$12.50.

Improving access for hunting and fishing was one of the top issues identified in the 2018 Game and Fish public outreach engagement process, which eventually led to it being a priority in the department’s 5-year strategic plan.

“The increase in conservation stamp revenue will allow Game and Fish to secure long-term access for sportspeople,” said Rick King, chief of the wildlife division.

The Wyoming Legislature supported the fee increase with the passage of HB0122 to help pay for easements or other agreements to provide public access to difficult-to-access or inaccessible private, federal and state lands for hunting and fishing.

“This is about preserving and increasing our hunting opportunities for the hunting public—both residents and nonresidents,” said Rep. Cyrus Western of House District 51 in Sheridan County and the lead sponsor of the bill.

WHEATLAND – A serendipitous meeting in Cheyenne brought a strong choice in pitching coaches to each her techniques to the Platte County girls.

Jess Yost who played college softball at Bemidji State University in northern Minnesota and was somewhat of a legend in the land of Paul Bunyan and Babe the Blue Ox, was an All-American second team selection at BSU.

According to the BSU softball website, Yost was selected to the Fastpitch News 2017 NCAA Division II All-American list. This Followed a historic season, which included program record for wins (25) and strikeouts (307). Yost earned a spot on the FPN All-American Second-Team Pitchers list. The award marked the first its kind for a Bemidji State Softball Player and never before had a pitcher recorded over 20 victories at the university.

Yost is coaching in a three-week clinic where she comes in and teaches age-appropriate techniques to the 10U group, the 12U group and the 14U and older group each Wednesday.

“The turnout is just amazing,” Yost said. “I am surprised and shocked but it’s awesome. It’s so cool to see so many young pitchers wanting to learn.”

Yost started lessons Wednesday for all girls interested.

“Jess loved her previous interaction with the Wheatland players last year and could not wait to work more with them,” said Fitzwater. “Needless to say, the players were pretty excited as well. We had over 30 girls come out and attend the initial lesson. Girls were broken up into a 10u group, 12u and 14u group, and a group for those attending or coming into High School. Jess believes on teaching a strong foundation of skills so the pitchers develop their technique so that they can eventually throw harder as well as develop more pitches. She too, is excited for our softball future as there is a lot of talent at all levels! Jess will continue lessons Wednesday, June 30, and

July 7 from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m.

Catchers are also invited to attend lessons in order to help catch for the pitchers when needed. When not catching the pitchers. Fitzwater has the catchers work on their techniques by completing drills of their own as well as discussing catching strategies.

Fitzwater said that she is very excited to see so many girls out and playing. She truly appreciates all the time that the coaches and players are dedicating to softball.

“WHS Softball has a great future with all of the awesome talent out there in our community,” Fitzwater said. Yost became a Wyoming resident in 2018, moving to Cheyenne to be closer to her fiancé and his family.

She works for the Laramie County School District where she has four years of coaching experience, and coaches volleyball, basketball and she is hoping also to coach softball. She graduated with a degree in exercise science and had an opportunity to play professionally in Germany, but turned it down as life was making other plans for her out west.

“I love coaching,” she said. “It’s a way for me to still stay involved and teach kids the right way to do things. That way they grow up and they learn to love the sport because they are already doing the right things. At 15, 16, 17 these little ones will know the right way, and that really makes me proud of them, that they started so

young and continued with it.”

In coaching, doing the right things yields a higher degree of success and a lower level of stress due to a lack of consistently performing. The biggest challenge coaching older kids is that they either had no proper teaching or the teaching they received was flawed in some way.

For a Varsity coach to come down and coach in clinic situations poses its own set of challenges. For Yost, it is the attention span of the younger kids – especially in warm summer situations.

“But, their want and their desire to learn is so big at this age,” she said. “They want know and want to throw all the time. You see them right here after we are done, they are still throwing. It’s awesome to see how much they want to get better.”

A mutual friend introduced Jodie Fitzwater, new Wheatland head softball coach to Yost and the rest is pretty much, as they say, history.

“We used to use a different pitching coach,” Fitzwater said. “That lady is on maternity leave and my friend said, ‘hey I stumbled upon Jess and she’s fabulous’ and he said that he’d highly recommend her.”

Fitzwater said that Yost, in addition to the three-week clinic would be available to lessons beyond the clinic dates if the kids wanted extra help.

This was the inaugural year for softball in Wyoming, and Fitzwater couldn’t have been more excited.

“I’m super excited,” she said before last year’s campaign. “We helped softball get going around here again, and then excited for my daughter because she will be a senior this year. She was worried that it wasn’t going to go through until next year, so just the chance to give the girls the opportunity to play is wonderful.”

This year the state was split into two divisions, one east and one west conference.

“It was a challenge and we saw some really have some tough teams,” Fitzwater said. “The girls were excited this first year and what’s great is I’m hoping to see that excitement with the younger girls knowing now that they have high school softball.”

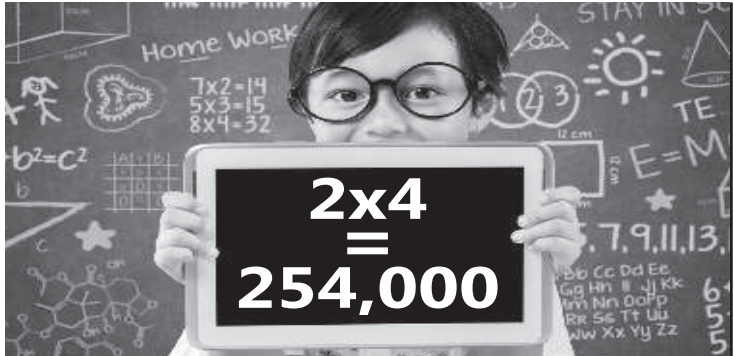
