

Veterans shown appreciation, thanked during 'Welcome Home' ceremony

GUERNSEY – "It was hot. There was no air conditioning and you never quit sweating," Mike Shepherd of Guernsey recalled. He lost a lot of weight and had severe heat rash, with no relief offered except for Calamine lotion by the medics in sick bay. He served in the U.S. Navy for two tours in the Vietnam "war."

A plane with a red-painted tail flying overhead and shooting 122 mm rockets was the welcome received by Doug Johnson of Douglas on his first day in Vietnam. Over the speakers he heard, "Red Option 1 - Take

cover!" In the bunker he saw a young soldier bent over, saying, "I didn't want to come here!" over and over. "It's like, yeah, none of us did," Johnson said of his thoughts at the time.

"I was discharged in '62. They say I was a Vietnam vet, but my association was with the Korean war. When I left and came home, there was no hoopla or GI parades. It was like going to work and coming back the next day," Leonard Anderson of Guernsey said. "The Vietnam boys took it in the hind end. The thanks were few and far between for them."

County and town leadership roles discussed as election approaches

WHEATLAND – In the upcoming 2024 elections, voters across the United States will head to the polls to cast their ballots for federal and state offices; and in many cases, county or city offices.

Becoming an elected official involves so much more than getting 'your' name on a ballot and 'winning'. Of course winning the election is merely the beginning of assuming a public office where one represents the interests of their constituents.

A variety of factors are involved including eligibility; but that eligibility does not necessarily come in the form of a hefty degree or years and years involved in government. Citizenship, age, and residency are some of the criteria necessary for eligibility. For example, in the United States, a person must be at least 25 years old to run for the House of Representatives, and 30 years old to run for a seat in the Senate.

Platte County clerk Malcolm Ervin answered some questions regarding requirements, eligibility, and responsibilities of elected officials, and a list of openings on the 2024 ballot.

"The 2024 primary election ballot will feature a US Senator and Representative, a Wyoming State Senator and Representative and one County Commissioner," Ervin said. "The top two vote recipients from each political party will be forwarded to the general election."

Locally, two Wheatland Councilmembers, two Guernsey Councilmembers and one Chugwater councilmember will also appear on the '24 ballot. "There will also be an opening for Chugwater Mayor," Ervin added. "Three trustees of Platte County School Districts #1 and #2 will be on the ballot as well as two district supervisors for the Resource Conservation District."

A handful of other positions will appear in the general election including four Hospital District directors, two directors of the 1-F Fire Distrct, one director from the Glendo area for the 2-F Fire District, two directors of the Antelope Gap Fire District and one director of the Guernsey Rural Fire District. While this is not a comprehensive list of elected positions opening up, it does give an overview of the number of elected seats that will be under consideration as we approach the election. "Time requirements from an elected individual vary based on the office being sought," Ervin explained. "For Commissioners, it requires two meetings per month and there is always the possibility of special or emergency meetings. Commissioners also field a number of phone calls on dates when they are not meeting," Ervin said. "For other boards, it just depends upon which board the individual is serving on as time commitments vary significantly." Some elected positions are paid and some are voluntary positions, according to Ervin. "Special district directors such as school board or fire district directors, there is no pay. They are essentially volunteers," he said, "for County Commissioners, the pay is \$27,600 per year with health benefits and retirement. Again, the compensation depends upon the office the individual is seeking." Responsibilities for the elected official also vary. Specifically for County Commissioners, they are tasked with overseeing roads and buildings. "The Commissioners are also responsible for approving a budget and administering land use plans," Ervin said.

County fire warden urges temporary fire ban

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WHEATLAND — Spring is officially here; however it comes at the tail end of an unusually dry winter after predictions of abundant snowfall. November and December resulted in less than 12" of cumulative precipitation, according to Wyoming weather sources. This is not good news for Platte County.

County Fire Warden Aaron Clark warned existing fuel conditions and predicted weather in the coming weeks will only result in more heat and less precipitation. "We are asking the commissioners to temporarily impose fire restrictions for the next couple of weeks as we are anticipating a dry spell; there is a lot of fuel sitting around and it's dry," he said.

"There have been two fires along 125 recently; two acres in Glendo and one acre near Chugwater caused by blown tires on the interstate."

Fuel conditions refer to vegetation and other combustible materials in a specified area or region. These conditions play a crucial role in determining fire risk and dry weather exacerbates these conditions.

Linda was born on September 8, 1950, to parents, Lorine McGraudy and Stanley Karas in Richmond, California.



WYDOT replaces delineator posts

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WHEATLAND – As part of a multi-year project to replace all the delineator posts along state highways, a Wheatland-based Wyoming heavy-duty plastic sur-flex posts each year, it will be several more years before all the old metal delineator posts are all replaced.

Wheatland Crew Manager Darren Albright said the replacement project began around three years ago as a cost-effective measure. "They're going to the new ones because if a vehicle swipes it or runs into it, the post will come back up into position. The metal ones just bend and have to be replaced," he said. "Also, once they are in, instead of a full crew, we can send one or two people out and utilize that other person's time for another function."

"They can also appoint numerous board members who will administer various roles of the county such as the library, fair board, senior housing, and planning and zoning," Ervin said.

For those seeking placement on the ballot, the deadlines of entering an election race the time to file is between May 16 and May 31, according to the clerk. "For special district races, the time to file is between August 7 and August 27," Ervin added. "For most positions, one must be at least 18 years of age and be a resident of the jurisdiction for which the office they seek is responsible."

Those running for an office must not be a felon or have had rights restored.

"A candidate must not be adjudicated mentally incompetent – though there is an argument that anyone who seeks public office might be mentally incompetent," Ervin joked.

Aspiring officials also need to build a campaign strategy. Raising funds and connecting with voters is a must. This involves creating a platform, attending debates, and engaging in outreach efforts.

An understanding of issues that affect the community, state, or country is critical is operating a successful campaign. The candidate should have a good grasp of policy matters, economics, and social concerns. Building relationships with political parties, interest groups, and

Additionally, the fire warden commented that because temperatures are still dipping below freezing, fire truck tanks are not currently holding water reserves. This presents additional problems when there is a need to extinguish.

"Fire conditions are also bad at Camp Guernsey," he added. "In the High Plains BLM District, there have been nine fires so far in March. While they have all been human caused, it is still unusual. The below-freezing temperatures keep the rural trucks from storing water in the tanks, and there are no air resources until June. We had to bring in air resources from Colorado, and the turnaround was about two hours," he continued. "I am asking for aggressive fire restrictions until we see a change in the weather and fuel conditions."

Concerns about the Irrigation District burning ditches were discussed. Clark community leaders is also a major factor in building an election platform. Endorsements and other affiliations can greatly impact the chances on winning an election.

In the end, upholding ethical standards is a vital part of conducting oneself in the public domain as an elected official. Transparency, honesty, and accountability are an expectation of those voted into office. Most of their conduct is public, and meetings and decisions are commonly made in a public forum where community members are encouraged to attend.

Candidates' motives for running for office vary. Some candidates may have a deep respect and compassion for their home-town or county and hope to perpetuate good leadership and beneficial policies. Others may have personal and/or business reasons or opinions that they feel could be addressed more 'effectively' if they held an office.

Either way, the role of an elected official is not for the faint of heart. Resilience and perseverance are qualities that must sustain the elected. Candidates, and those elected, face public criticism, financial and policy setbacks, and competition from opposing parties. Ultimately, once elected, those in service must represent their constituents to the best of their ability and work toward the betterment of the city, the state, and the country.

in a few weeks when we see some green coming up; and I don't remember having to put up a restriction in March, but the next few weeks are bringing hotter, drier weather."

Commissioner Ian Jolovich responded saying, "As long as you can work with the people who rely on burning as part of their operations, I think the restrictions are fine."

Clark commented that Laramie County is so bad, that they are on complete "lockdown" and people are forbidden to even smoke a cigarette there. "I'm concerned that this is getting to be our new normal. It's very dry out there. Even with the last snow, those in Chugwater were not in favor of a ban. But two days later, the interstate was on fire."

Platte County Emergency Management director Tony Krotz said, "We talked to the National Weather Service specifically for Platte County and all of Southeast Wyoming is getting back to near-drought conditions."

"Our pastures are crunchy. Camp Guernsey is increasing training. I will come before the commission again in a few weeks and see if we've come out of it," Clark added. "As long as you keep working with the Irrigation District; they are the only ones that probably need to be burning anything right now," commissioner Kayla Mantle added. The commissioners passed Resolution #2024-05: Implementing a Fire Ban as of March 19, 2024.

Department of Transportation (WYDOT) crew has been working their way along US Highway 26 this month.

The territory covered by the Wheatland WYDOT crew includes 500 lane miles. Highways have reflective delineator posts every 300 feet, the interstate has them 200 feet apart on the driving lanes and 400 feet apart on the passing lanes. With that many posts to replace with an allotted 500 new stated restrictions may have to be applied case-by-case. "There may have to be some exemptions in place to reduce risk," Clark said. Someone was burning up near Glendo to get rid of tumbleweeds; things got dicey so we sent an engine out preemptively; and we can do things like that. The Irrigation District did ask if things were really as bad as they looked, and we said, 'Yes'," he added. "We may see some improvement

Waterline construction, fire ban, shooting complex and weed prevention discussed at council meeting

GUERNSEY – Construction on Guernsey's waterline project is now in full swing, as announced by Mayor Ed Delgado at last week's council meeting.

Pavement was roto-milled along Nebraska Ave. on Thursday along the path to be taken by Oftedal Construction crews as they install the waterline re-routing the town's water. The project will direct water from the town's wells to the municipal water tank for disinfection prior to entering the system utilized by the public. While the construction crew can install 100 feet of pipe in an hour, working around existing utilities along the path will take time and care, so it is estimated the line will reach the highway (US 26) in a month. Then a line will be bored under the highway and continue up Nebraska Ave. to the pipe that was bored under

Reichert also reported the chamber is working with Goshen County to build relationships between the counties to jointly host events that could benefit both counties.

As a volunteer member of the Platte County Lodging Tax and Tourism Joint Powers Board, Reichert reported since tourism promotion is rolling forward as planned for this year, the board has been having conferences about next year's tourism season with marketing agency West Edge Collective, LLC of Cheyenne. She also said the board is planning an awareness campaign to let people know how the lodging and tax board benefits the local community with funds gathered from visitors to the area through the lodging tax. "We plan in November to go back to the ballot and we want people to understand who is paying tax and where the money is spent," Reichert said. From its starting point in 2015 when the tax was first instituted, revenue has increased by nearly 40 percent. "[There is] more on the breakdown of what was spent all around on the visitor center and visitor impact... We have good reviews about our campaign. There have been a lot of positive reviews on winter hiking in Platte County and our promotional slogans such

as, 'Swim Platte County – no sharks.'" Councilman Penny Wells commented about the new pictures on the website advertising Platte County (wyplatteco. com). "They are very good. You should do t-shirts," she said.

Reichert told the council they do have collectible stickers and badges with catchy slogans based off the popular Oregon Trail video game. Some of those will be available as t-shirts, including: "I walked the Oregon Trail, and I didn't get dysentery."

"It's fun," Reichert said, adding there is a lot of interest from people around the world wanting to vacation in Wyoming, "Taiwan has opened back up and one of the places they want to go is Wyoming... and when I was in Scotland (recently), I was promoting Platte County."

Fronopfel, Public Works department manager said there are two streetlights on order with a three-to four-month waiting period. The streetlight that is currently not working will be repaired at that time. Fronopfel also said he is being required by the Department of Environmental Quality to gather information on what types of connections public water lines tie into. He said residents should receive a questionnaire asking for information on the materials connecting their home to the public water supply – whether it is copper, pvc, galvanized or lead. "I have to turn into the DEQ a report that says what connections are there from the street to the house. Hopefully, if the residents don't know what they have, they will give me permission to look and everything will go smoothly [with the DEQ]," Fronopfel said.

The council voted 4-0 to raise the fees listed on the equipment and wage chart by \$100 across the board. The equipment and wage chart is the fee schedule for citizens who want to hire the town's equipment and employees to perform specific services.

The council agreed to approve a contract with Tri-City Parks and Recreation to operate the city pool for the summer.

Platte County Chamber Director Shawna Reichert gave a report on Leadership Wyoming tour and education session she attended at the Rock Springs trona mine. The plans for a 6-million-ton soda ash mining project to give America a competitive edge over China has preempted the small towns in Sweetwater county to scramble to find a solution in housing and infrastructure to handle the influx of workers into their communities. "They are having problems with housing, like everyone. There are only 43 houses in the Rock Springs/Green River area," Reichert said, adding, the discussions turned to brainstorming resilience within our communities. "We discussed things like how we could help get our community back after a disaster," she said.

the railroad tracks over the winter, then finally attached into the water tank.

A county-wide fire ban set in place by Platte County Commissioners last week prompted the mayor to announce a fire ban for the municipality of Guernsey. Wyoming state parks have also issued a fire watch and the public is encouraged by each agency to be cautious of the dry conditions in the region during their daily activities.

Town Clerk-Treasurer Hillary Dawson was given a blessing by the council to go forward with plans to change internet providers from Vistabeam to Visionary. Vistabeam is charging the town \$57.95 per router and wanted to increase it to \$87.95 each to include business service in the package. Dawson said, "Visionary will give us business service for less than we would be paying Vistabeam."

Details will be worked out on the cable that Visionary will need to install to accommodate their service, with the council hoping the cable can be put in before the streets are repaired after the waterline construction is concluded.

"I'm not going to sign an agreement until (maintenance director) Mike Fronapfel approves it, and they show up, though," Mayor Delgado said, referring



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Welcome home

These are some of the comments of veterans who showed up to hear Governor Mark Gordon and other state dignitaries during the Wyoming Veterans Welcome Home event in Guernsey on Saturday.

What was it like for some local soldiers when they came back to their homeland after serving in Vietnam?

"People didn't like us very much. They didn't want anything to do with us, they shunned us and were not very friendly. I was in the navy and stationed out of San Francisco. The hippies did not like us. They gave us a hard time," Mike Shepherd said.

"It was bad, really bad," John Rodriguez of Guernsey recalled of his return to Denver, Colorado from the service in December 1975. "I was called 'baby killer,' spit on, kicked, harassed. You couldn't go to the bar, or you'd be in fights."

"They didn't even want us in the Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW) when I came back to Illinois," Bill Bennett of Wheatland said. "I thought I wanted to be close to home (Illinois) when I came back. I found out it's hard to come home because you're not 'you' anymore. And I didn't even have the hard part." Bennett explained he was part of a supply base that provided supplies, did maintenance and operations, etc. during that time. He chose to sign up to serve his country for another 17 years past Vietnam, serving in many locations around the world.

The stories of these veterans are a small sampling of many soldiers who served honorably in the armed forces but were not shown appreciation at a critical time in their lives when they were trying to adjust to life post-war. To change that and finally give veterans the recognition they deserve for their dedication to their country, Wyoming Veterans Welcome Home Day was codified into law by the 61st Wyoming Legislature and is fully supported and celebrated by Governor Mark Gordon. He issued a proclamation during four separate veteran ceremonies across the state including the one in Guernsey on Saturday, in which he signed a proclamation declaring March 30, 2024, as Wyoming Veterans Welcome Home Day, the official day to properly recognize and thank veterans for their service.



Veterans across Wyoming received tokens of thanks from state dignitaries. Governor Gordon gave a coin, while First Lady Jennie Gordon and Wyoming Veterans Commission chairman Ken Persson gave Wyoming pins.

Governor Mark Gordon took to the podium to share his appreciation for veterans. "It's been really absolutely amazing to travel this state. We want to make sure we remember the service that each of you did," Gordon said.

He quoted his cousin, Maj. Gen. George Patton IV, who often said, "If you are to remain a great nation, a few of us will be called – perhaps by the Almighty. You will be chosen to serve our nation. Wars are fought with weapons, but they are won by men and women,"

"Today it is an amazing honor to be chosen," Gordon said. "The men and women who have served in each of the branches seen in the flags behind us have made a difference. Today we remember that legacy to pass on from generation to generation to generation."

"I thank all of you for your service. I also thank the families - they often were at home ... and still remember their loved ones were not able to wear their uniform when they came back. We hope never to have that happen again," Gordon said as he shared experiences from his family.

"We remember our veterans every day, not just on this day. Because of what you have done, you have preserved the greatest experiment of how to build a country with the belief that people can govern themselves - you have saved that."

Following a prayer by Guernsey VFW Post 4471 chaplain Ron Hughes, opening remarks by Tim Sheppard - director of the Wyoming Veterans Commission and emcee for the event, and the governor's speech, a five-minute video was shown of Dan Starks, CEO of the National Museum of Military Vehicles in Dubois. He gave a summary of the unsavory history of our country in its maltreatment of veterans returning from the "peace movement" called the Vietnam war and highlighted the sacrifices and astounding feats accomplished by the mostly 18- to 20-year-old soldiers thrown into war with an enemy of seasoned fighting troops on their home turf. "Even against those odds, it was our Vietnam veterans who still came out on top," Starks said. He added, The Vietnam war claimed a higher number of U.S. troops than

any war in our history when you count 650,000 soldiers affected by agent orange or afflicted with post-traumatic stress, those who were killed, wounded, missing in action or unaccounted for. "More than one-third of all vets deployed became casualties [in some way.]"

"Every veteran came home a winner, [though] they do not give themselves much credit," Starks said. "Welcome home. You did not get recognized like you deserved, but you DO today. Your valor, dedication and service will be remembered forever."

Adjutant General of the Wyoming National Guard, Maj. Gen. Greg Porter shared the importance of Vietnam veterans in his life and the difference they made in his career. "Those are the guys that taught me what I needed to know [as a young soldier...] They taught me to be good, and then luck may follow... The connection remains steadfast to those Vietnam veterans."

He said there have been many veterans he met in the ceremonies held across the state, and he believes Wyoming Welcome Home Day ceremonies are making a big impact in recognizing veterans, their families and veteran caregivers.

He wanted to make sure the families and caregivers of veterans were properly thanked. "They send their loved ones off to war, and sometimes they don't come back the same way. Your sacrifice is important and relevant," Porter said, adding, "I also thank the governor and first lady for their incredible support of veterans. Every conversation I have with them begins and ends with, 'How can I help?' They are tremendous people who support veterans 100 percent."

Porter concluded his comments by addressing soldiers past and present, "Thank you all. Bless you, bless those serving, and bless your families and veterans across Wyoming. 'Ride for the brand."

"Everyone who's worn the uniform deserves recognition," Kenneth Persson, chairman of the Wyoming Veterans Commission, said. "[Military groups] are broken down into units, companies, battalions and brigades...As time passed, they weren't recognized at all, then later only with protests. Those who served

"We want to honor them with a moment of silence. We never want to lose sight of them."

Johnson said," It's nice they finally got around to it." He said he struggled for a while when he saw the hero's welcome given to veterans after Desert Shield and Desert Storm and compared it to his lack of recognition. "I thought, 'they gave me nothing,' and it disgruntled me."

"It feels good to be honored. Nobody gave me a welcome home. Never," Rodriguez said after the ceremony and meeting the speakers. "It felt great, really great."

"This holiday is a big deal to a lot of people in this town," Nick Schwab, a veteran from Wheatland said. "There are a lot of Vietnam veterans if you haven't noticed."

Steven Taylor of Guernsey is a more recent veteran, having served in the late '90s. "It's nice to be recognized for our service. What happened to the Vietnam veterans when they came back shouldn't have ever been. We all did our part to preserve freedom. They served with dignity and honor, and they should have had respect when they came back."

His comment was echoed by Commissioner Kayla Mantle, "I'm very thankful for everybody serving, current and past. I'm thankful for what they do for our country and our community."

Both commissioners, plus Guernsey Mayor Ed Delgado and representatives for U.S. Rep. Harriet Hageman and U.S. Senator John Barasso were elected officials in attendance at the meeting.

"We recognize your unwavering loyalty and patriotism. Thank you... the sacrifice made by you is matched by none. You have helped to preserve life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness. You're in our hearts and prayers, every one of you," Barasso said in a letter read during the ceremony.

Veterans and their families were able to visit personally with the speakers, and veterans were coined by the governor as commander-in-chief of the Wyoming National Guard and given Wyoming pins by First Lady Jennie Gordon and WVC chairman Perssons, as a small token to show appreciation from governing bodies within the state of Wyoming and a host of its grateful citizens.

"I thank you; my kids thank you, this nation thanks you," Gov. Gordon said. "It's an honor to be here. Thank you for your service. God bless the U.S.A., and God bless each one of you and your families."

He also reported spring cleaning operations will begin soon as his team shifts to spring and summer maintenance mode. He, town planner Chuck Porter, and the council discussed plans for managing weeds on town property, and after guidance from the council, work parameters will be set up for spraying weeds. Porter said there will be two specific times weeds will be sprayed around town: mid-spring and in the fall. That spraying will not include alleys.

"Homeowners are responsible for the weeds and trash on their property line through to the center of the alley," Mayor Delgado said. proposal," Michaels said.

He plans to work hard to convince the task force that Guernsey is the best place for the complex. "I have reached out to various shooting sports groups to see what they need. We could have cowboy shooting without horses, shotgunning, skeet and trapping, archery and more. Usually, those folks have to go out of state to practice."

Michaels reported the task force plans to reduce the number of proposals by four or five by the first of June, and in August they will be conducting site visits. "I want to schedule a shooting event for mid-August to show them what

Porter reported some conversations about licensing and permits he has had with people moving to Guernsey from out of state. There is one such party looking into subdividing a lot and building duplexes. "There is a migration to Wyoming from other states. They're coming," Porter said.

Mayor Delgado said he would write a letter in support of a grant being sought by Platte County School District No. 2 to expand technology options at the Guernsey Branch Library, benefiting people of all ages in the greater Guernsey area.

Councilman Joe Michaels reported on the meeting he attended in which a governor-appointed task force is considering proposals for a world-class premier shooting complex in Wyoming. Guernsey is one of nine communities in Wyoming who submitted requests to be considered as the site of a \$10 million dollar complex to not only serve Wyoming and its citizens, but host potential national and international shooting events. The meeting on March 22 in Cheyenne was attended by Michaels and Dawson, in which those nine communities were given more specific parameters to fine-tune their proposals in a bid for the shooting complex that would be a sure economic boost wherever it ultimately is chosen to be built.

Michaels is optimistic Guernsey has a fair chance of winning that bid, since Guernsey already has a dedicated shooting range with a building that could be added onto or modified to meet the requirements. The only downside is not having much by way of accommodations in the town itself for the larger events, but that could be solved easily if the task force allows him to include hotels and motels within a 30-mile or so radius. "Then we could include Torrington and Wheatland accommodations in the revised we can offer. I'm all in," he concluded.

Breaking up with worry



Worrying is a natural response in many situations, and I've wasted many days getting caught up in it. I thought that was a normal way to live. But through the years, God has helped me end my relationship with worry. And He did it with the help of my husband, Dave.

Every time I have come to him with a problem, Dave has had only one thing to say: "Cast your care." But I didn't always want to hear this when I was feeling frustrated and upset-but it's exactly what the Bible tells us to do.

First Peter 5:7 says to cast, "all your cares [all your anxieties, all your worries, and all your concerns, once and for all] on Him, for He cares about you [with deepest affection, and watches over you very carefully]" (AMP).

In the dictionary, the word cast means "to pitch or to throw." I think that description says a lot because if you're going to end your relationship with worry, then you're going to have to get aggressive about it.

For example, we don't have to accept every thought that comes into our head. We can cast out the wrong ones and let the right ones take root. And I find that my whole outlook changes as I say simple prayers: "God, I believe You're working in my life, and I'm expecting something good to happen today."

I'm not saying we should ignore our problems, wishing they'd just go away. We need to see them for what they are, but we can't let them keep us from choosing a hopeful, positive attitude that says, "I believe God is in control!"



I like this saying: "Worry sees the problem. Faith sees the God who can handle the problem."

The question is, do your problems know where they stand in relationship to God in your life?

I'm reminded of the story of Abraham, who at 100 years of age, believed God would give Him a son and make him the father of many nations. He chose to look beyond his circumstances and believe God. I'm absolutely amazed by that!

The Bible says that God can "do superabundantly more than all that we dare ask or think" (Ephesians 3:20). So, no matter what our circumstances look like, we just need to keep our eyes on God.

Typically, when we have a problem, God will do one of two things. He'll either remove the problem or He'll give us the ability to get through it with a positive attitude.

I've found that as I've grown in my relationship with God, I've become more comfortable leaving that choice up to God. Because if He leads me through something I really don't want to go through, then I know for sure He has a purpose in mind.

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As a child I experienced years of sexual and emotional abuse, which was absolutely tormenting. The amazing thing is, everything God has done in my life through that horrible situation-all of the healing and restoration-has prepared me to do what He's called me to do today. I didn't always understand why things were happening the way they did at the time, but I learned how to walk by faith and trust God's goodness even when my circumstances didn't make sense to me.

It's absolutely wonderful when we can feel completely comfortable not knowing the "why" behind what's happening in our lives.

Proverbs 3:5-6 (AMPC) says, "Trust in and rely confidently on the Lord with all your heart and do not rely on your own insight or understanding. In all your ways know and acknowledge and recognize Him, and He will make your paths straight and smooth "

We don't always have to know what God is going to do or when He's going to do it. All we really need to know is that God has a plan and He is in control. We can rest in the truth that at the right time, God will execute His plan.

In fact, there may be something happening in your life right now that you just don't understand, and it's causing you to worry. Instead, you can choose to say, "I don't understand this, and it hurts right now, but I believe God is going to work it out."

If you've already wasted a lot of your time worrying, I encourage you to break up with worry. Instead of giving way to anxious emotions, you can do what God has urged me to do all these years: Cast your care. In time, God's good plan will be revealed.

Romans 8:28 (AMPC) says, "We know [with great confidence] that God [who is deeply concerned about us] causes all things to work together [as a plan] for good for those who love God, to those who are called according to His plan and purpose."

Not everything that happens is good. But it can all work out for if you'll keep loving God and pursuing His will for your life. There's nothing God can't turn around if you'll put your trust in Him!

Sweet chocolate a hallmark of Easter

F ew people would not enjoy finding carefully crafted chocolate confections in an Easter basket. As revered as hidden eggs are on Easter, chocolate and other candies nestled in a bed of green plastic grass often call out like a siren's song.

Many people have their preferences in regard to Easter sweets. Some can't wait to sink their teeth into a milk chocolate bunny. Others savor marshmallow chicks or sweet jelly beans. Still, chocolate often reigns supreme, and people may wonder how chocolate Easter treats came to be.

Eggs and rabbits have long been associated with fertility and new life, long before they became symbols of the Easter holiday. In German folklore, the Osterhase, now known as the Easter Bunny, was a mythical creature that magically laid eggs, which he then carried in a basket and delivered to children as gifts on Easter morning. These first eggs were decorated chicken and duck eggs.

As the custom of giving eggs spread, eggshaped toys started to be manufactured in the 17th and 18th centuries. Chocolate Easter eggs were not created until the 19th century. France and Germany pioneered the manufacturing of these eggs. The first eggs were solid until chocolate artists could master the art of molded, hollow eggs.

One of the first chocolate eggs was made by John Cadbury in 1845. But it wasn't until both the Dutch invention of a press for separating cocoa butter from the cocoa bean and the introduction of pure cocoa by Cadbury Brothers in 1866 that molded chocolate — and molded chocolate eggs — could be made easily. As the process for molded chocolate evolved, just about any shape could be possible.

District, teachers agree to increase in pay

GLENDO — Negotiations went well and an agreement was reached for both the administration and staff at Platte County School District No. 1 schools earlier this month. Speaking at the March 11 school board workshop/meeting at Glendo School, several teachers voiced their opinions to the board they felt their opinions, skills and time were valued by the Administration and School Board.

"[In the past] it has been a brick wall [to negotiate wages]. I am excited about the negotiation agreement because it is the first time staff feel valued and appreciated for our work," Leslie Boaz said.

"I think (superintendent) John Weigel has a good mindset for the district. [We] need to move forward – we need wins. We have to be competitive. If we want to recruit teachers who are good with students and good co-workers. This is a good start," said Danielle Parker, a thirdgrade teacher at West Elementary.

Trustee Diane Haroldson shared there has been mistrust that came into play during past negotiations, and she is pleased with the direction this year's negotiations have gone. "I'm glad you feel valued. You are," Haroldson said.

"There were some great conversations (with district representatives) about how to thank the staff for their time and efforts, and to make sure all staff was heard, not just union members," Dawn McKee said at the workshop preceding the school board Meeting. McKee is a first-grade teacher at Libbey Elementary and president of Platte County Education Association (PCEA). She said the result of several meetings to discuss issues concerning certified teachers and classified staff members resulted in an eight-item Interest-Based Bargaining Agreement (IBB). "It was a pleasure to work on negotiations with superintendent John Weigel, business manager Jamie Wilson, and Principal Josh Sandlian and the IBB team. I feel it was a very great discussion to show support with wages for all staff and the extra duties they take on...The IBB will help the district be competitive with school districts around us, helps us feel appreciated and our voices were heard," McKee said, adding she is excited about the positive effects it could have on our staff and the school district.

The IBB is a document setting

parameters and terms between the local teacher's union and management of PCSD1. It is agreed upon for each school year, and according to school board policy HB, does not perpetuate into additional years unless it is approved annually.

The PCSD1 school board trustees voted unanimously, 5-0, to approve the IBB and base salary increases for all staff, as presented. The IBB provides compensation for teachers taking on more of a workload or extra duty hours. It also and allows IBB representatives to be "involved in reviewing the specifications and options when the health insurance policy renewal is necessary," and "in negotiating raises to the salary schedules when possible, increases in health insurance costs could negatively affect employees take home pay." The negotiation further prevents the district from increasing the percentage of employee retirement contributions and ensures "[a]ll classified staff's wages

will increase to reflect the \$8,080.00 annual increase. The teacher pay scale will increase to a base of \$50,000. These increases in wages are possible because of the change of insurance plan options. The \$8,080.00 increase for all staff eligible for insurance is more than any employee portion of the insurance offerings. Any plan that is chosen by employees that cost below the \$7,947.00 will be additional money in their take home pay. This increase in wage will also make all employees retirement increase," according the the official IBB for 2023-2024.

A copy of the agreement is available at the PCSD1 administration office, or online at platte1.org. The PCEA is the officially recognized negotiating body for the IBB, according to district policy. It was emphasized at the meeting all teachers and staff are welcome to participate with PCEA - even if they are not union members. Though nonmembers don't get a vote, "Whether

you are a member or not, we are a voice for everybody - we do reach out and share. When we come [to the bargaining table], we come with the mindset of all staff, regardless of if they are certified or classified," Leslie Boaz said from her perspective as past president of PCEA. She and other PCEA staff at the meeting said they encourage all district staff to share their ideas and thoughts with PCEA so they can better represent all employees. Boaz said this because there are many valued staff members who haven't approached PCEA for information or to share their concerns, and the consensus is the local union would like that to change. "It's a two-way street," she said.

"In the future we are looking at how we involve everybody. It will be on our radar during negotiations, whether on policy or other issues," PCSD1 chairman Lu Lay said. "We all are on the same team working together. We want to be a solid district together."

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
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

Pneumococcal Who: Adults age 65 and older or between 19 and 64 if you are at high risk for pneumococcal disease.

Hepatitis B (HepB) Who: Adults age 19 to 59

Meningococcal A, C, W, Y (MenACWY) Who: Adults age 19 or older

Meningococcal B (MenB) Who: Adults age 19 or older

Who: Adults age 19 and older

"While these vaccines are beneficial for most adults, for some people with allergies, weakened immune systems or other conditions, they may not be recommended," Dr. Kesara said.

CHEYENNE – Wheatland traveled to Cheyenne on Thursday to play in a conference double-header. The Bulldogs came home with two big conference wins.






