Five wounded in Kline weekend shooting

Authorities are investigatvictims involving mostly juveniles in Kline in the early morning of Saturday, May 28.

According to Barnwell the shooting caused "damage with wounds."

Chief Deputy Darlene Cook said deputies received a call three went to BBMC. All those shortly after midnight of shots wounded received non-life-"When they arrived, sev- Cook.

eral people were fleeing the scene.'

She said deputies found a vehicle with multiple gunshot holes and shell casings.

"We got no information ing a shooting with multiple from the few people who were still on the scene," she said. "All we know is that shots rang out and people began to run."

Later, deputies were alerted County Sheriff Steve Griffith, by Bamberg-Barnwell Medical Center as well as Allendale to multiple vehicles and left County Hospital of several several reporting to hospitals victims with gunshot wounds arriving at their facilities. "Two went to Allendale and fired on Union Circle in Kline, threatening injuries," said

Most of those involved were iuveniles ranging in age from 14 to 18, reported Cook. She also said those involved were from not only Barnwell Countv but also Allendale, Orangeburg, Bamberg and Columbia.

The investigation is continuing and the Barnwell County Sheriff's Office (BCSO) is processing the gun casings found

at the scene, said Cook. Barnwell County Sheriff's Office is asking that anyone with information about the shooting to contact 803-541-1078. You may also contact Midlands Crimestoppers anonymously online or by calling 888-274-6372 to give information.

WSD29 Bomb Threats Prove Not to be Credible

Two bomb threats during Williston School District 29's last week of the academic year proved not to be credible.

On the morning of Monday, May 23 and again on Tuesday May 24, phone calls were made to the school allegeding a bomb was present, resulting in immediate response from local and state law enforcement, emergency services

Ribbon cut on new Barnwell industry

Koch & Company ramping up to build cabinets at rennovated facility

When Jim Koch was a teenager in Baileyville, Kansas, he already knew he loved working with wood. He and his eight siblings grew up on a farm where hard work and dedication were instilled in them by their parents.

While driving a tractor and working the fields, Jim would daydream about woodworking projects. After work and on weekends, he and his brother Dan would take lumber and try to create things. "When we were in high school, we made cedar chests and sold them," said Jim Koch (pronounced Cook) recently. "I just loved the craftmanship."

When he was 20 years old, Jim and Dan with the support of their uncle Fred joined forces to start a company in 1989. "Since 1993, we figured it out and haven't looked back."

Now Koch and his brother Barry are the driving force behind Koch & Company which makes fine cabinets and doors at 11 plants, all in the United States. On Thursday, May 26, he and Tricia, his wife of 36 years, cut a bright blue ribbon on the newest cabinet division in Barnwell located at 11200 Dunbarton Boulevard.

Joining the celebration were representatives from the Southern Palmetto Chamber of Commerce, SouthernCarolina Alliance, Barnwell County Council, Barnwell Mayor and City Council, Can Am Sales Inc., and staff.

The Barnwell plant will produce the Midland line of cabinetry for the Koch Cabinets division of Koch & Co. Their corporate headquarters is in Seneca, Kansas, and manufacturing facilities in various locations throughout Kansas and eastern Tennessee.

The Barnwell plant will offer more access to customers along the eastern U.S. coast, according to company officials.

"Our products are made in America and almost everything in our operation is made in America," said Koch. "I refuse to buy from

The result has been that Koch & Company has not experienced the supply chain issues other companies have faced in recent years. Koch & Company also owns its own trucking division and hauls 90 percent of their own product.

The "new" Barnwell facility is known to locals as "the old Sara Lee sock plant" which has not been utilized in decades. Just like his daydreaming of woodworking, Jim said he and his brother immediately saw potential in the 250,000 square-foot building when they were shown the building by SouthernCarolina Alliance. "It was perfect for our needs," said Koch.

Despite a lot of repairs to be made, Koch said, renovations are moving along. "We're excited," he said.

Koch & Co employs 915 employees throughout its locations and is planning to add 105 jobs in the Barnwell community within the next few years. Hiring has already started locally and initial cabinet production is expected to start next month, said Koch at the ribbon cutting.

Koch stated, "Our cor-

porate headquarters is in rural Kansas so rural South Carolina is a good fit for us."

He also said they were impressed by the cleanliness and hometown feel of the Barnwell com-

Darlene Cook has dedicated her life to protecting the people of Barnwell County. After a nearly 30 year career in law enforcement, Cook was promoted to Chief Deputy of the Barnwell County Sheriff's Office (BSCO) on April 1, 2022.

In this new role, Cook serves as "the right hand to the sheriff." The reins are handed to her when Sheriff Steve Griffith is away from office and as Cook puts it, "it's my turn to step up to the hot seat."

Cook was raised around law enforcement and this is where her affinity for the profession began.

"I wanted to be in law enforcement ever since I was a little girl to be honest with you. My father was in law enforcement for a while. I guess I was just always a bit fascinated with law enforcement even as a child. I just kind of stuck with that dream" said Cook.

Cook has been serving Barnwell County for 24 years and wore many hats such as captain and investigator. This promotion serves as a statement that Cook's dedication to the area is not going unnoticed.

During her time in law enforcement, Cook "worked child abuse cases for 13 years" where she learned to be compassionate but also how to compartmentalize.

This compassion comes naturally to Cook but is fueled by the community. She finds "the people of Barnwell are good people." Cook finds the greatest reward of this community is serving people that she loves and loves her back.

"There are still people, with 25,000 people in the county, that I don't know are very few faces that I don't know," said Cook.

"And if I don't know them, chances are they still know me."

Barnwell is not only the place she grew her career, but it is where she raised her children. However, her own family is not the only one she is thankful for.

"I love my church family. I love my work family. I wouldn't trade this work family for any other," said Cook.

"I get up every morning and love coming to work and I've done that from day one. And so I

while waiting for parents and guardians to sign out their students.

On the evening of Monday, May 23 BCSO posted on Facebook detailing the response of law enforcement officials and WSD29 administrators, faculty

"Williston Elko Faculty and Staff reacted quickly, following properly planned protocol and procedures. The schools were checked by Aiken County Sheriff's Office, SLED, Centerra-SRS and Richmond County Bomb K-9s. EOC personnel, to include Williston Fire Department, Barnwell Fire Coordinator, and Medshore EMS, responded per plan with their resources and set up a command post" said the BCSO Facebook update.

On the morning of the second threat on Tuesday, May 24, WSD29 updated parents and community members on Facebook. "We regret to inform you that the Barnwell County Sheriff's Department is investigating another alleged bomb threat at WEHS."

Scholars and staff were evacuated from the building but later resumed classes once granted access by law enforcement.

"Upon investigating the call made to the school, BCSO, with the assistance of SLED, and ongoing communication with Superintendent Dr. Shaw, it was determined the threat was not credible. Barnwell County Sheriff's Office would like to thank the Williston-Elko Schools for their cooperation and swift actions. We would also like to thank all of the agencies and our partners in the community who worked together to keep the students and school

HALT SALT!

Most Americans eat too much salt. A pinch of salt here and a dash of salt there can quickly add up to unhealthy levels of sodium in the diet. Choosing foods that are lower in salt and sodium is a key to healthy eating.

Salt is sodium chloride. Table salt is 40% sodium and 60% chloride. Food labels list sodium rather than salt content. Foods that are low in sodium are also low in salt. Sodium is an essential mineral that does the following for the body:

- helps maintain the right balance of fluids.
- · helps transmit nerve im-
- influences the contraction and relaxation of muscles, including the heart.
- helps regulate blood pres-

Since humans are not born with a love for salt, taste buds can be retrained by gradually cutting back on salt and sodium. The taste buds will adjust within a few weeks, allowing the natural taste of the food to be enjoyed. Using spice and herb blends instead of salt adds satisfying flavor to almost any recipe. Select more fresh foods, less processed items, and less sodium-dense foods.

Foods naturally contain very little sodium. Most dietary sodium does not come from the saltshaker on the table. Instead, it is added to foods by the manufacturer during processing to preserve or flavor them.

How much sodium is needed?

The Dietary Guidelines for Americans recommends eating only 1 teaspoon of salt per day, which is less than 2,300 milligrams (mg) of sodium. This includes ALL salt and sodium eaten. Currently, Americans consume an average of 4,000 mg per day, almost double the recommended amount.

Consuming a diet of 1,500 mg of sodium has even better blood pressure-lowering benefits. People over fifty years of age, African Americans, and people with chronic diseases such as hypertension, diabetes, and kidney disease should consume less salt. The minimum sodium required is 250-500 mg

Up to 30% of Americans are salt-sensitive and should be especially careful about how much salt is eaten. There is no way to tell if an individual's blood pressure is salt-sensitive.

Pregnant women should not eliminate salt to minimize water retention and swelling. More sodium is needed during pregnancy, although the amount eaten pre-pregnancy should be

Athletes and heavy laborers should replace sodium lost through perspiration by including salt in the next meal. Drinking sports drinks with electrolytes is not necessary. Salt tablets are not recommended since they may lower performance and cause dehydration.

With just over a month left until consolidation, The Barnwell County Consolidated School District (BCCSD) held a school board meeting on the evening of Tuesday, May 24 to discuss the merging of District 29 and District 19 on July 1.

With the countdown to consolidation starting, Blackville-Hilda District 19 Superintendent David Corder recognizes three areas that district administrators and staff are tackling in the final stages of consolidation.

"I think the main thing they're working on is getting the student information system merged," says Corder. "We're on track to get that completed for when school starts in August."

Action Memorandum and Responsiveness Summary issued for the Non-Time Critical Removal Action for the F-Area Material Storage Building (235-F)

The U. S. Department of Energy (DOE) has selected the preferred alternative for the nontime critical removal action for decommissioning of the F-Area Material Storage Building (235-F). A thirty (30)-day public comment period for the Removal Site Evaluation Report/ Engineering Evaluation/Cost Analysis was held from April 5, 2022, through May 4, 2022.

Building 235-F is a windowless, two-story, reinforced-concrete structure located in F Area near the center of Savannah River Site. The building is approximately 222 feet long, 109 feet wide, and 28 feet high. Building 235-F was constructed in the 1950s as part of the original Savannah River Site project and used for a variety of missions, primarily processing, storage, and disbursement of radioactive materials in support of Savannah River Site and the DOE complex. Building 235-F and support facilities are currently in a reduced surveillance and maintenance state and are undergoing deactivation activities and preparations for decommissioning. Two additional structures, an abandoned capped stack (293-F) located on the east side of the building and an underground storage tank connected by a pipe trench on the north side of the building, are included in the scope of the non-time critical removal action.

DOE has selected Alternative A-2, In-situ Decommissioning of First and Second Level Process Areas/Engineered Roof. This alternative involves the grouting of the first and second level process areas, the installation of an engineered roof (sloped concrete reinforced roof slab with integral crystalline waterproofing) designed to last 1,000 years, the grouting/ capping of the underground storage tank, and the permanent sealing of the abandoned capped stack (293-F). This removal action alternative will not preclude any additional remediation and is expected to be consistent with the final remedial action.

The selection of the preferred removal action alternative is documented in the Action Memorandum. DOE has worked with the South Carolina Department of Health and Environmental Control and the U. S. Environmental Protection Agency to ensure that the removal action is consistent with all applicable human health and environmental requirements.
