Store burglary suspect sought

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A burglary occurred at the Healing Springs Country Store in Blackville on Monday, September 5 around 4 a.m. resulting in roughly \$120 of stolen property.

Robert H. Yoder, previous owner of the store, called dispatch Monday morning just past 8 a.m. after receiving a call from a witness who stated they saw the store's front door was kicked in as they drove by.

A Barnwell County Sheriff's Office (BCSO) deputy arrived on Monday morning shortly after receiving Yoder's call and saw "the front door had been forced open and rested on the frame at an angle," stated the incident report.

The report continues to state the door had been detached from the frame and hinges.

The deputy was able to enter the store through an opening between the detached door and the door frame to conduct a protective sweep.

During the protective sweep, he saw candy bars and bags of

chips on the floor.

According to the report, current owner Sophon Tauch arrived on scene shortly after and explained there were security cameras both inside and outside the store.

Tauch then showed the deputy footage of the incident recorded by the cameras on her cellphone.

"The footage showed what appeared to be a Black male subject walking from the side of the store to the front of the store," stated the report.

Memorials honor 9/11 sacrifices

Barnwell County remembered the lives lost 21 years ago during the 9/11 terrorist attacks.

From a flag display in downtown Barnwell to a firefighter parade in Blackville, the community is remembering the sacrifices made by so many people on September 11, 2001.

Blackville Memorial

The Blackville Fire Department Auxiliary and Blackville Fire Department hosted the inaugural 9/11 Memorial event on Saturday, Sept. 10 in the picnic shelter behind Blackville First Baptist Church. The event

honored the victims of the Sept. 11, 2001 terrorist attacks, including the 343 firefighters who perished.

"That was an amazing sacrifice. They sacrificed their lives so others can live," said Blackville Mayor Ronnie Pernell, the guest speaker. "It takes courage in the face of fear to carry out their duties, that's what men and women did on 9/11 and that's what men and women do on a daily basis."

That sacrifice exemplifies why firefighters and other first responders are unselfish individuals, said the mayor.

"Unselfishness requires no thoughts for yourself. That's what it takes to be a servant, to be a fireman. It brings real joy,"

said Pernell.

Mayor Pernell said he's tried to focus his life on service, including as a minister, former police officer and firefighter, military veteran who served as an infantry officer in Desert Storm, and now as mayor.

"I've got a lot of respect for firefighters in that position. We need to do this year after year to make sure we remember the sacrifices people make on a daily basis," said Pernell.

Assistant Blackville Fire Chief Dylan Weaver helped organize the event alongside Renee Chupp from the auxiliary. They organized the event as a fundraiser for the department

County addresses cemetery dispute

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Landfill disputes, the proposed animal control ordinance, museum renovations, and what to do about personalized cemetery plots were discussed at the Barnwell County Services Committee on Thursday, September 1.

Cemetery Ordinance

On July 24, Barnwell County posted on their Facebook page that Barnwell County Council approved an ordinance over two months before on May 10 updating the rules and regulations regarding the Barnwell County Memorial Cemetery on Highway 278.

The updated rules and regulations were implemented to ensure safety and efficiency when county landscaping crews maintain the grounds of the cemetery, according to the post.

Trees, plants, and shrubs will not be allowed to be planted on any plot, and the county reserves the right to remove any in violation of this ordinance.

This excludes plants, trees, or shrubs planted by the county as a part of "an approved landscaping plan," according to the post.

Also, any sort of structure is not allowed to be constructed on a plot otherwise not permitted by the county.

Artificial flowers may be used at headstones or as plot markers only and are not per-

mitted to be used in any other method. Both artificial flowers and cut flowers can be kept in a ceramic, concrete, metal, or durable plastic vase and must be regularly attended. The use of a glass, tin, paper, or cardboard vase is not permitted.

Although allowed, these vases with flowers are only allowed to be on the plot for 60 days until they are removed by county employees.

The end of the post reads, "The county shall have the right to remove any items constructed on a plot or left on a plot in violation of this ordinance."

This post was met with 65 comments from community members, some were expressing anger and discontent.

Barnwell County Councilman and Services Committee Chairman Ben Kinlaw described this as a "very emotional, hot button issue," at the September meeting.

Many concerned citizens asked questions about items they have already placed on a loved one's plot, and some explained they would abide by the ordinances when the plots were better maintained.

Claims were made in the comments on the county's post by citizens expressing the grass in the cemetery has been 'knee-high,' and there has been alleged damage to plots from landscaping crews such as chipped grave markers.

However, the vases, struc-

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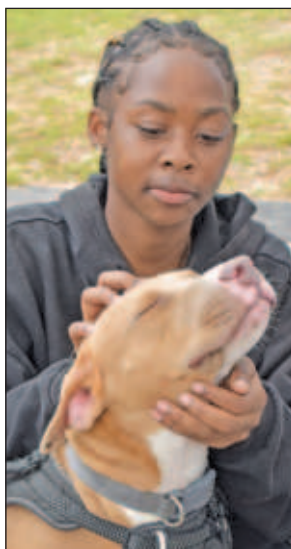

Although BCSO released a statement prior to the event about a potential downpour, the sky remained clear for the community to come together.

Sheriff Steve Griffith and BCSO deputies met members of the community they serve so citizens could get to know the people behind the badge and learn about law enforcement.

This event was hoped to serve as a conduit in Sheriff Griffith's goal of building the trust back between citizens and law enforcement.

"Community is vitally important to this agency, and we will continue doing all that we can to work with and all," said BCSO in a Facebook post.

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well County Consolidated School Board's August 23 meeting in Williston.

"We are ecstatic about our three scholars who scored the maximum scores on the SC READY assessment. This means that our scholars have mastered their respective grade level standards at the highest level of proficiency. We are grateful for the teachers and parents who played significant roles in this accomplishment. This is the perfect example of everyone working together to ensure academic excellence!" said Interim Superintendent Dr. Marcella Shaw.

Facility Improvements

The board accepted the letters of condition from the USDA regarding two community facility grants.

One grant totaling \$49,000 will purchase new marquees for the three schools in Williston. The district must provide a match of

\$30,100.

The other grant in the amount of \$50,000 will fund cafeteria furniture. The district's match is \$20,000.

These grants were started about two years ago by the Williston District 29 School Board prior to the merger with Barnwell District 19. That's why Blackville-Hilda's schools do not benefit from these grants.

The board also heard from architect Bill Palladino about capital projects in Williston. The four main components include: renovating restrooms, improving accessibility, replacing windows at Kelly Edwards Elementary, and renovating the auditorium at the district office in Williston so it can be better utilized for theatre plays, lectures, and other events, said Palladino.

At the board's August 9 meeting in Blackville,

Interim Director of Operations David Corder discussed the district's plan to upgrade the Blackville-Hilda High School football stadium. This includes 350 seats on the visitors side and 570 seats on the home side.

"The plan is to cut a center aisle on the home side of the stadium and add handrails. The visitor's side will be demolished, and new bleachers will be installed," said Corder. "This is being done to bring the stadium up to code."

The total cost of the project is \$232,000, which will be taken out of Blackville's General Obligation Bond. Tyler Construction was the only contractor to bid on the project.

The board approved moving forward with phase one modifications to the stadium.

tures, and plants on plots is what was prohibiting county landscapers from properly maintaining the plots in the first place, according to the county.

Crews were unable to manage weeds and perform general lawn care without risking damaging the personal property on and around the plots.

"The essence of the ordinance is to prevent that type of scenario," said Barnwell County Administrator Tim Bennett, on accidental damage of things like vases and flowers.

The risk to personal property with an abundance of items like these resulted in the ordinance being updated to allow proper maintenance of the cemetery.

Many comments on the county's post express a feeling of ownership over

the plot, however the cemetery itself is owned by the county. When you 'buy' a plot, you are purchasing the right to use that land for a burial, not the gravesite itself. This is generally the case for many cemeteries across the nation.

Administrator Bennett showed the committee pictures of gravesites currently in the cemetery to show the types of things maintenance crews are working around.

Some plots have coping, which is the stone bricks around a gravesite that enclose the plot. Plots with coping commonly have pebbles that fill in the top of the gravesite meaning there is little landscaping that needs to be done.

Plots with coping were a topic of conversation at the meeting because items sitting on top of the pebbles will not interfere with landscaping the cemetery.

Plots with flag poles were also discussed. Administrator Bennett explained, "It would be un-American for us to have that flag pole taken down," and mentioned items like this may have to

be grandfathered in.

The Barnwell County Services Committee, which consisted of Barnwell County Councilman David Kenner and Chairman Kinlaw, decided to seek input from County Council members on this issue before deciding a plan of action.

Also discussed at the meeting regarding the cemetery was the addition of a new loop.

Once each plot is sold, the cemetery becomes a direct cost to the county. An additional loop would provide more plots to be bought.

Creating a loop around the outer roadway was discussed as well as removing some of the pine trees that inhabit the center of the cemetery to create a small additional inner loop.

Administrator Bennett views these trees as an amenity to the cemetery as they provide shade, but plans to continue with establishing a new road by hiring a surveyor to look at the options of both proposed loops.

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At the Services Committee meeting, the proposed Ordinance 2022-01-262 regarding animal control was set to be discussed at a later date with a major redaction.

'Trap, neuter, release,' or TNR, is a method of reducing the population of feral or community cat colonies by trapping the cats, spaying or neutering them, and releasing them back to their colony.

TNR has proved to be effective in not only lessening the population of feral cats as they can no longer reproduce, but also in stabilizing these populations.

The proposed animal control Ordinance 2022-01-262 is planned to replace the current Ordinance 2010-08-262 if approved by council and includes TNR.

If implemented, TNR in Barnwell County would not be the responsibility of the county or Barnwell County Animal Shelter staff, but of the Barnwell County Animal Shelter Foundation members through a grant from non-profit organization Best Friends Animal Society.

Administrator Bennett expressed at the committee meeting that "the devil is in the details for the county council to say yes," to the proposed ordinance.

Administrator Bennett explained the section detailing TNR lacks detail from Foundation members to questions councilmembers may have such as a sufficient volunteer network, veterinarian support, properties willing to host TNR cats, specific protocols, and much more.

Chairman Kinlaw asked about considering looking at other counties that have established TNR as a template and proposed implementing TNR in "controllable chunks."

The proposed Ordinance 2022-01-262 will be discussed at a later date by the Barnwell County Council.

Landfill Dispute
Frank Williams, the solid waste manager at the Barnwell County Landfill, detailed a recent disagree-

ment at the landfill to the committee.

At the landfill, Barnwell County residents can dispose of two tons of garbage, C&D (construction and demolition) material, or whatever else for free. They are charged for the disposal of anything past these two free tons.

Barnwell County residents are charged \$45 per ton for household garbage, \$50 per ton for C&D material including trees and debris, and \$110 per ton for tires, for anything exceeding the two free tons.

Williams explained to the committee a recent event where a citizen came in looking to dispose of tree trunks after a storm. The trunks weighed over the free allotted two tons, and the citizen was told they had to pay to dispose of what was left.

The citizen felt that because they paid taxes, they should not have to pay to dispose of material at the landfill, according to Williams.

Administrator Bennett asked Williams to begin providing quarterly reports to the county.

Museum Renovations
In an August 8 letter to the Services Committee, Barnwell County Museum and Historical Board Chairman Milton Harden expressed concerns about the timeline of museum renovations.

In this letter Harden states, "neither the 2021 project (\$8,000 for portico renovation) and 2022 project (\$10,000 for renovation of the Eastern Sunroom) have been completed."

The museum board has been unable to find a contractor to both start and finish these projects due to reaching effects from the COVID-19 pandemic causing supply chain shortages and lack of labor.

Although the board has had conversations with multiple contractors, architects, and structural engineers not one has taken on either project.

The portico, a porch like structure with a roof that commonly leads to an entrance, at the museum

currently has no roof, and this project was to fix this issue.

A problem that arises with the construction of a portico roof is drainage, as the historic Fuller House where the museum is housed lacks gutters.

This project would be fully funded through the \$8,000 donation made by the C.G. Fuller Foundation, "as well as matching funds from Barnwell County, the City of Barnwell, and private donations," stated Harden in his letter to the committee.

The eastern sunroom has fallen into disrepair over the years and is estimated to be a \$50,000 project fixing issues like broken patio tiles and chipping window paint.

Legislative appropriations were discussed to bring a series of exhibits commemorating the relocated town of Dunbarton prior to the 2022 sunroom project. At this time, the museum board was waiting to begin renovations on the sunroom until this was decided.

In Harden's letter to the committee he informed them that it was now off the table. Instead, the Town of Snelling "offered to fund the renovation of this room to be used to hold exhibits pertaining to small towns in the county such as Snelling, Elko, Kline, and Hilda," said Harden in the letter.

The museum board is now interviewing contractors for bids on the sunroom renovation and plan to use the \$10,000 donation from the C.G. Fuller Foundation alongside the donation from the Town of Snelling toward this project.

Also discussed:

- A building owned by the county and used by the Barnwell County Detention Center has been proposed to be demolished. Inside this building are decade-old arrest reports, according to BCSO Captain Mike Razar. These documents are set to be shredded. According to SC state law, law enforcement agencies are only required to keep these documents for three years and 120 days.
- A draft of an application to schedule events on county-owned property was presented to the Services Committee. It includes information on a permit process, first aid, and portable restrooms and sinks. There is also an application to serve beer and wine at proposed events which includes items like event protocol and insurance requirements.

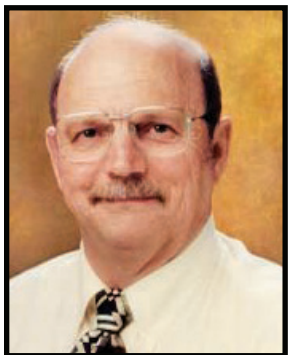

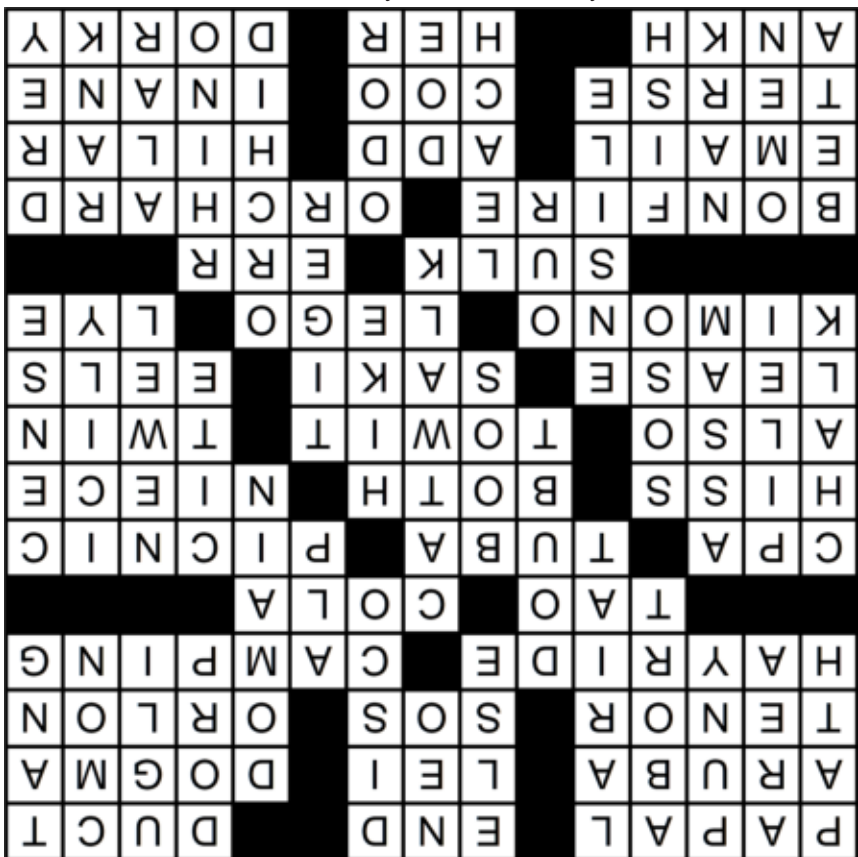

Corder's Book Corner: Shadow and Bone book review

There are circles of writers who advocate reading bad books. Doing so exposes you to what bad writing looks like, thus helping you avoid it. A small cache of writing insight if you will. Well, I'm fortunate that I found such a cache in Leigh Bardugo's Young Adult Fantasy, *Shadow and Bone*.

In this novel, a young girl named Alina learns that she is the Sun Summoner, an individual who wields the power

of light. She is a savior and the key to dispelling the wrath of the Shadow Fold, a great swath of darkness that has rived the land of Ravka in two. With her power, she can save the world.

Well, that's all well and good, but Alina is flatter than a Coca-Cola that's been left sitting on the kitchen counter since Friday night. The typical Mary Sue protagonist that has appeared time and time again in popular movies and books in the past decade, there seems to be this concept among creators that we want the most basic of protagonists. If I was



able to appear in this fictional world, I would give Alina a \$10 bill so that she could buy herself a personality. She lacks drive, she lacks character, she is just a feather being tossed by the wind, going wherev-

er the book's thin-string of a plot takes her.

In the world building of the novel, the author sought to give a Russian atmosphere. The soldiers wear heavy coats and bore rifles, and they sizzle out and leave the reader accepting it as gospel. The Grisha (basically wizards) are the chosen ones that are able to control this magic. Some have the gift, while others don't, kind of like how some people have a fissured tongue. In layman's terms, this was a very bad book. And it worries me that it has become not only a bestseller, but also a show on Netflix. But in this culture of saturated entertainment, I suppose the masses will gobble up anything that at least tries to show the slightest hint of art, despite the fact that it lacks any real substance. The first book in an entire trilogy that I will never finish, *Shadow and Bone* is a disappointment that has seared the fabric of my literary mind.

According to the report, there were \$20 worth of consumable goods stolen and \$100 in office equipment.

The report was mostly redacted when provided to The People-Sentinel by BCSO as this is an active

investigation.

"The recent break-in had left us uneasy. It is unfortunate that we got burglarized because we just opened. Despite what happened we would like to continue to be of service to the local community

as well as tourists," said Tauch in a statement.

The Healing Springs Country Store closed in December 2021 under the ownership of Elsie and Robert Yoder who ran it for many successful years. Tauch reopened the store

Warhorses win brawl over Bruins, 33-20

The Barnwell Warhorses knew they were in for a very physical battle when they visited the fast and powerful Orangeburg-Wilkinson Bruins, Friday, September 9.

Not only was Orangeburg a bigger AAA school, but they were also huge on the field, having several players in the 300 to 350 pound range. The Bruins QB was a great athlete, with great speed. Put all of that together and it could have been a long night for the Horses.

Barnwell was not intimidated, and stuck to what they do best, running the football for more than 400 yards and earning a very tough 33-20 victory.

Barnwell got on the scoreboard first when Tyler Smith scored on a 5-yard run to make the score 6-0 with 2:59 left in the opening quarter. Orangeburg answered the Horses score by completing a 45-yard touchdown pass that was deflected by Barnwell. The Bruins added the extra point to take a 7-6 lead that they would keep until late in the second quarter.

Barnwell quarterback Cam Austin found wide receiver Clay Pender for a 20-yard touchdown completion with less than two minutes to go in the half. Barnwell missed the 2-point attempt, but took a 12-7 lead into the half.

The first half was very physical and both teams knew they were in for another tough second half. Orangeburg took the opening drive the length of the field, scoring on a quarterback keep from 15 yards out. The Bruins added the extra point to take a 14-12 lead.

Barnwell would answer when Seth Ray bolted through the OW defense for a 33-yard touchdown run, giving the Horses an 18-14 lead with 5:21 left in the third quarter. Orangeburg's next drive was stopped when Barnwell's Shea Whitfield intercepted a Bruins pass. Barnwell led 18-14 at the end of three periods.

Seth Ray scored his second touchdown of the night when he exploded for a 27-yard score to cap a 90-yard drive for the Horses. The 2-point attempt was good when Tyler Smith found the end zone making the score 26-14 in favor of Barnwell. Orangeburg scored quickly on a 3-play drive, but the extra point was

blocked by Maurice Odom, but the Bruins were within striking distance, down 26-20.

Barnwell's offense drove down the field, highlighted by another big third down conversion from Seth Ray, who ran for a huge 40-yard gain. Tyler Smith finished the drive when he scored on a 19-yard scamper to the end zone. Lane Evans added the extra point to make the score 33-20 in favor of the Warhorses.

Clay Pender kicked the ball into the end zone for a touchdown. Barnwell's Davin Heyward intercepted an Orangeburg pass, then Warhorse offense ran out the clock for a hard fought 33-20 win to remain unbeaten at 4-0.

"It was another good night rushing. We ran for more than 400 yards," said Barnwell head coach Dwayne Garrick. "Tyler had a great night

and Seth Ray added another dimension to our run game, rushing for 158 yards and two

touchdowns. I am proud of Cameron Austin and the way he runs our offense going from one back to wishbone. The TD pass to Clay was spot on and helped us separate by score at a pivotal time in the game. They were very talented offensively which gave us some problems but all in all we got it done. "This week we face another AAAA opponent. We have a lot to work on to get ready," said Garrick.

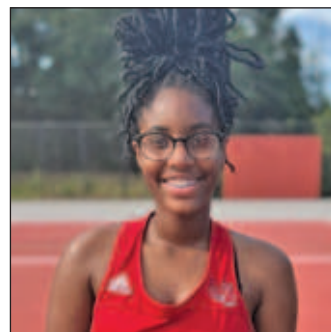

Smithsonian traveling exhibition opens to large crowd in Allendale

Every vote matters. Every voice matters.

That's the message behind "Voices & Votes: Democracy in America", a Smithsonian traveling exhibit that is currently on display in Allendale through Friday, Oct. 21. The exhibit was unveiled Thursday, Sept. 8 in the atrium of the University of South Carolina Salkehatchie's Allendale campus.

"Voting and having a voice is instrumental in our democracy," said history professor Dr. Sarah Miller, who is also USC Salk's interim associate dean for academic and student affairs. "We should take every opportunity we can to cast the ballot whether it's local, state, national, church or whatever; we have an opportunity to make a difference and make our voices heard."

"Voices and Votes" is based on an exhibition currently on display at the Smithsonian's National Museum of American History called American Democracy: A Great Leap of Faith. The exhibition is part of Museum on Main Street, a unique collaboration between the Smithsonian Institution Traveling Exhibition Service (SITES), state humanities councils across the nation, and local host institutions.

"Voices and Votes" explores the action, reaction, vision, and revision

that democracy demands as Americans continue to question how to shape the country. From the revolution and suffrage, to civil rights and casting ballots, everyone in every community is part of this ever-evolving story—the story of democracy in America. Exhibition sections

explore the origins of American democracy, the struggles to obtain and keep the vote, the machinery of democracy, the right to petition and protest beyond the ballot and the rights and responsibilities of citizens," according to a description of the exhibit.

When she was teaching a political science class in Ohio years ago, Miller would ask students if they voted. One student's answer has stuck with her ever since. The student wrote, "People died so I could vote."

"That is the voice that echoes in my head every time I get a chance to cast my ballot. I hope that's a voice we all hear," said Miller.

She said she hopes everyone takes a chance to not only view the exhibit while it's in Allendale but to "appreciate it and understand the importance of voting and using our voice."

The effort to bring the exhibit to Allendale has been two years in the making. Residents Anne Rice and Lottie Lewis, who serve as co-chairs of the Allendale County

Historical Society, led the effort involving many people and organizations, including U.S. Congress, South Carolina Humanities, Dominion Energy, USC-Salkehatchie, Southern Carolina Regional Development Alliance, Allendale Rural arts Team, and the Historical Society.

"This project has truly taken a village pulling together and community members who worked tirelessly over the last year or more. "What a great way to celebrate Allendale and our community. It's a pleasure to host this exhibit," said USC Salkehatchie Dean Dr. April Cone.

The event also served as a meet and greet for Dr. Cone, a Barnwell native who now lives in Allendale County, who became dean on July 1.

"We are super excited to have her leading USC Salk," said Miller.

Rice said she was pleased with the crowd at the opening and hopes many more people check it out over the next six weeks.

In addition to the exhibit, Allendale will host the South Carolina Humanities Festival this Thursday, Sept. 15 through Sunday, Sept. 18. A variety of events will take place.

The festival opens Wednesday, Sept. 14 from 5:30 to 7 p.m. at the Carolina Theatre in Allendale.

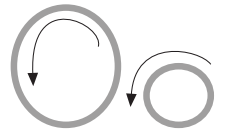

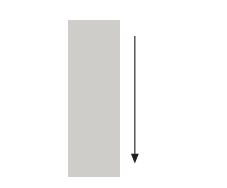

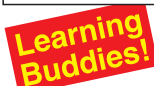

With the two wins last week and the 8-1 overall record, it looks like this



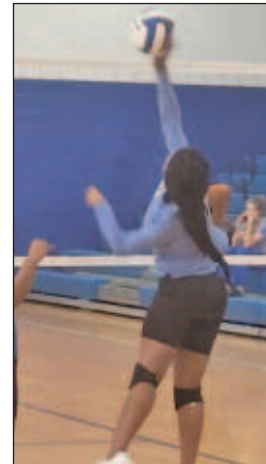
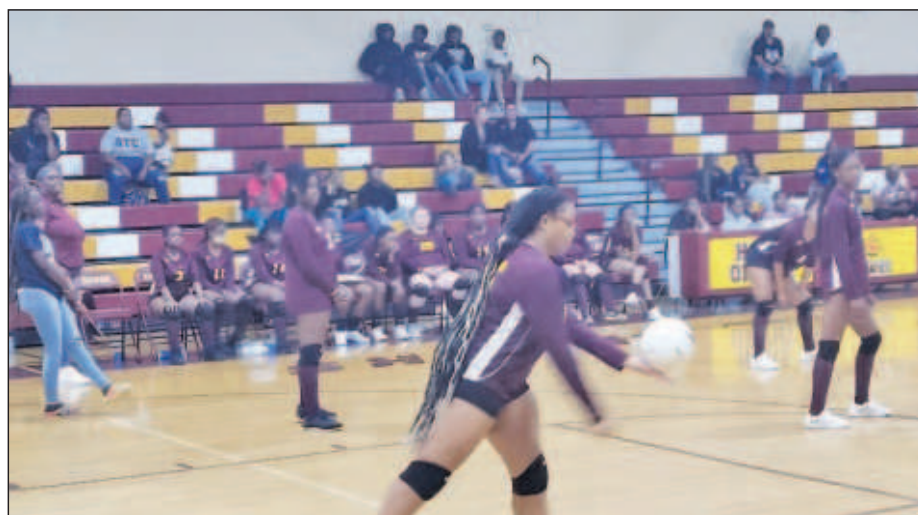

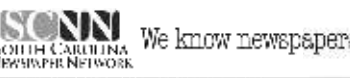

But the metal pie tins hurt when they hit someone. As a safety measure, students started yelling, "Frisbie!" to alert others that they were tossing a tin to a pal.

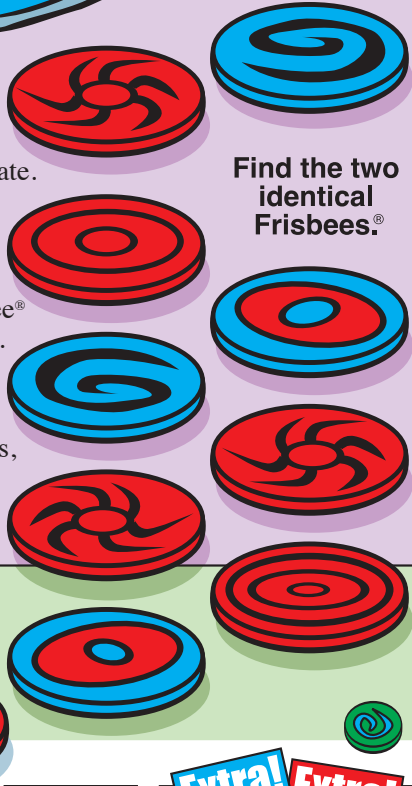

In 1948, Walter Frederick Morrison and Warren Franscioni created a plastic disc that could fly with better accuracy than a tin pie plate.

When Morrison sold the rights to Wham-O in 1957, the company named the disc the Frisbee® (pronounced FRIZ'-bee).

Today, the 65-year-old Frisbee® is owned by Mattel Toy Manufacturers, only one of at least sixty manufacturers of flying discs.



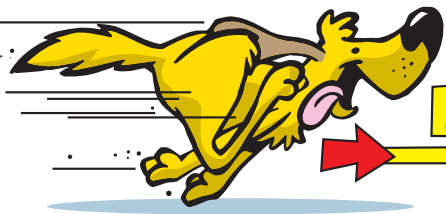

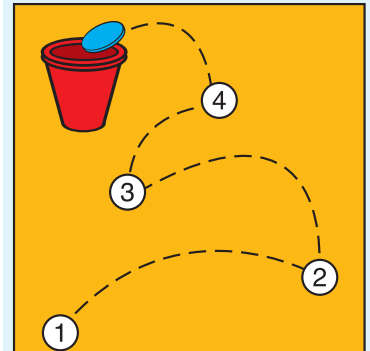

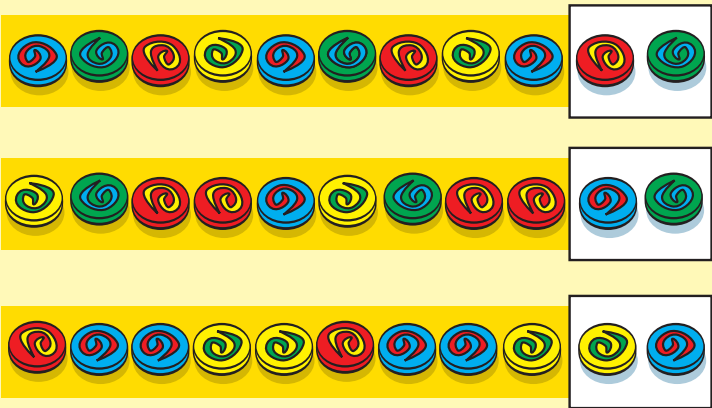

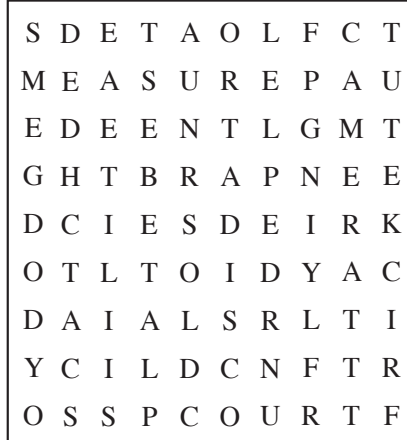
