During this season of Thanksgiving, a Barnwell woman is thankful to be back at work nearly four months after a dog attack.

Rose Hartzog was viciously attacked by a pack of loose dogs on July 18 as she walked from her home on Country Park Manor to her job at Subway in downtown Barnwell. The attack left Hartzog with multiple injuries and led to numerous charges against the owner of the dogs, Angela Ray.

"God brought me the whole way. I thank him every day I wake up. I'm taking things day by day. It's rough for me, but I'm not going to give up. God's got me," said Hartzog.

Returning to work earlier this month after being released by the doctor played a big part in regaining a sense of normalcy.

"We are happy to have her back. She was definitely missed. A lot of customers have come in to see her and welcome her back also," said co-worker and friend Tracy

Operation Christmas Child spreads cheer

Calvary Baptist Church in Barnwell has served as a collection site for Operation Christmas Child since 2018, and this holiday season is no different.

This year, 2,179 shoeboxes were collected from 34 individuals and churches in Barnwell County and surrounding areas to be sent internationally to those in need of holiday cheer.

Operation Christmas Child is a ministry through Samaritan's Purse, a non-denominational evangelical Christian organization providing aid to those in need since 1970. The mission of Operation Christmas Child is to "demonstrate God's love in a tangible way to children in need around the world," according to their website.

Shoeboxes are decorated and packed with holiday gifts for children in war-torn or un-industrialized areas to then be distributed on an international scale. Each shoebox also contains a message of the gospel.

This is a nationwide initiative, and Calvary Baptist Church is only one of the many locations serving as the drop-off locations.

"The project delivers not only the joy of what, for many kids, is their first gift ever, but also gives them a tangible expression of God's love," states the Samaritan's Purse website.

Casey Deichman serves as the drop-off leader at Calvary Baptist Church, where she is currently a member. From November 14 to November 21 of each year since the church has become a collection site,

Deichman organizes the thousands of shoe boxes carefully crafted from the community.

This week in November serves as the National Collections Week for sites globally, thus uniting acts of service across the world.

From the homes of caring individuals to the dedicated team at Calvary Baptist Church, the packages are then brought to a drop off location

Deichman views Operation Christmas Child as "a way to make an eternal difference in somebody's life."

"She was a preemie—in and out of the hospital—and they were with me every step of the way," said Kandish of First Steps when her daughter was born. "I thank God for them."

The Newborn Book Bag is sponsored by Barnwell County First Steps and is funded by a grant from the United Way of Bamberg, Barnwell, and Allendale Counties.

Some of the participating groups were Safe Kids Aiken County, Barnwell School District 45, Family Pantry, Family Solutions, WIC, Healthy Families of America, Save the Children, Low Country Health Care, and Axis I Center of Barnwell.

Also present was Melody Meanor, Community Health Educator with the Department of Health and Environmental Control (DHEC), handing out personal protection gear such as masks and hand sanitizers.

New and expectant parents were welcomed at the Barnwell County First Steps' Community Baby Shower on Saturday, November 5 for a wealth of information, supplies, and support surrounding early childhood initiatives.

Each parent that walked through the door was welcomed by First Steps Program Assistant and Parent Educator, Amie Sanders, who played a major role in bringing the event together.

Bottles, books, and baby supplies were handed out and local families were able to make connections with local resources.

"We have a bunch of different community resources that provided us with some really nice store prizes," said Sanders. "Everything from a stroller, we've got full car seats and booster seats, two pack-and-plays."

These store prize items were raffled off to expectant families.

Aside from tables by First Steps with information about their programs like Parents as Teachers and Home Instruction for Parents of Preschool Youngsters (HIPPPY), many community resources set up a table to chat with local parents.

Kandish Parks and her daughter, Arvaeyah, were only some of the recipients of First Steps Newborn Book Bag; a program aimed at building the libraries of children from a young age.

Arvaeyah was the poster child for the Newborn Book Bag at the event and Kandish

Representing Healthy Families America (HFA) were Coretta Simmons and Joanne Mingo. Both women explained how HFA works to promote child-well being, prevent abuse and neglect, and help parents achieve both parental and personal goals.

"The parents have been coming in and I think with all of the vendors here, with the information that we all provide, it's a great resource for them to have in the community," said Simmons.

Shandalyn Isaac represented Save the Chil-

dren. Each parent that visited her table received the book, "Every Cake Has a Story" by Christina Tosi and a cooking kit with silicone utensils from Rad-dish Kids. These products allow for children to learn cooking and nutrition skills at an early age.

This was the first time in nearly two years the Community Baby Shower was held in person due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

"It's supposed to be every six months and it's part of our outreach services," said Sanders.

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
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
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Outgoing BCCSD board thanked for service

The Barnwell County Consolidated School District board is almost entirely new after the recent election.

BCCSD board chair Ronald Brown and vice chair Ethel Faust are the only two transitional board members who will continue serving after the Nov. 8 election. Board member Edward Rockwell lost his bid for re-election to Catrena Hughes-Parker. Board members Joy Lindell, Rev. Norman O'Neal Jr., Fonda Patrick, and Richard Stanton did not seek a seat on the elected board.

"I commend the board for the journey we took on to unite District 19 and District 29 as one," said Brown at the board's Nov. 15 meeting. "Thanks for your dedication, commitment, and willingness to help out."

At the Nov. 15 meeting, which was the last before the newly-elected members took office, BCCSD Interim Superintendent Dr. Marcella Shaw recognized all seven members for setting an example of how school boards should be.

"The appointed transitional BCCSD Board of Trustees were a phenomenal group to work alongside to ensure that the consolidated school district opened and operated with fidelity and professional integrity. They assumed a yeoman's task in a short period, and adopted numerous policies and procedures; established a 2022-2023 general

fund budget; approved a bond to address technology and facilities needs; worked with the administration to provide retention and recruitment bonuses for all staff, just to cite a few of their accomplishments. In all things, the appointed Board of Trustees kept our scholars as the focus," said Dr. Shaw.

Barnwell County's legislative delegation appointed the seven-member transitional board in late 2021 to oversee the process of consolidat-

ing Barnwell County's two smallest districts, District 19 in Blackville and District 29 in Williston, by July 1. Many had never served on a board before but accepted the call to serve.

"Thanks for your willingness to volunteer," said Brown. "We've got people here from all walks of life but working for one mission for the betterment of all children."

Speaking to Brown in recognition of his leadership as chairman, Faust

said, "Without you being in that leadership role, we don't know where we'd be."

As Dr. Shaw presented each member a plaque from Rep. Lonnie Hosey and Sen. Brad Hutto, the board members reflected on their time.

"I was hesitant when I was asked to serve because I wasn't sure how easy or hard it would be," said Lindell, a retired Williston educator and lifelong Barnwell County resident. "It's been a pleasure."

Stanton and O'Neal are also retired teachers from Williston. They agreed with Lindell that it has been a pleasure to serve.

"My heart is in it," said O'Neal. He looks

forward to working with the new board in some capacity.

The school district has been a great home for Stanton. "It's all been worth it," he said.

"It's definitely bitter-sweet for me," said Patrick, a product of Blackville-Hilda High. She enjoyed working with her former teacher David Corder, who was D19's interim superintendent and now is Interim Director of Operations for BCCSD.

Rockwell said he also leaves with bittersweet emotions because he enjoyed the past year and had hoped to continue serving. He thanked Dr. Shaw for her leadership.

Joining Brown (District 5), Hughes-Parker

(District 6) and Faust (District 7) are Teresa B. Hughes (District 1), Liana Orr (District 3), and Tim Scott (District 4). The District 2 seat was decided by a Nov. 22 runoff between write-in candidates Ken Beatty and Eric Johnson, but results were not available before press time Tuesday.

Faust said she looks forward to continuing the board's work after being re-elected. "I am proud to be behind, beside and before this district."

The new board members were sworn in on Friday, November 18 during a special-called meeting to guide the BCCSD throughout the upcoming year.

"As the interim superintendent, I look forward to working with the newly-elected board of trustees to ensure that the district continues to operate at the highest level of academic, financial, and operational excellence. The new members have hit the ground running and, without hesitation, have all committed to new board member training in the near future. As a team, we anticipate nothing less than excellence for BCCSD," said Dr. Shaw.

Brown was voted to serve as board chair, Faust was voted to serve as vice chair, and Orr was elected to serve as board secretary.

Hughes will serve as the Barnwell County Career Center representative until the position is voted on at the next meeting as Hughes currently serves as the career center board's vice chair.

The District 2 representative will be sworn in at a later date.

The next BCCSD board meeting will be held January 23, 2023 at the Williston-Elko board room.

And as they read it, I will reveal a piece of my soul, and then I will know that the loneliness was worth it.

Lower the Sodium & Turn Up the Flavor for Thanksgiving

Thanksgiving is a holiday dedicated to the act of indulging in a plentiful array of edible traditions. Unfortunately, it usually turns into the act of overindulging. One particular substance that is often eaten in excess during this delectable holiday is sodium. Some media outlets suggest that the average person will consume over 2,000 milligrams of sodium during a single Thanksgiving meal. To put this into perspective, the nation's new dietary guidelines recommend that no one should eat over 2,300 milligrams of sodium per day and half the population should eat even less than just 1,500 milligrams. The smaller limit is for anyone who's in their 50s or older, African-Americans of any age, and anyone suffering from high blood pressure, diabetes, or chronic kidney disease.

However, sodium is a good thing when consumed in moderation. Our body uses this mineral in a variety of ways, from helping transmit nerve impulses and transporting nutrients to balancing fluids. Sodium, mostly in the form of table salt or sodium chloride, also plays a pivotal role in culinary endeavors, such as preserving food, adding flavor, and enhancing color. However, research suggests that excess sodium in our diets is the major culprit behind high blood pressure, which is the leading cause of heart attacks, strokes, and kidney failure.

indulge in sodium to indulge in your Thanksgiving favorites. A few minor changes and adjustments can help you better manage your sodium intake on Turkey Day.

- Since store-bought seasoning blends are often loaded down with sodium, make a poultry seasoning.
- All bread contains sodium but making them from scratch can help cut a few hundred milligrams and skipping over the breadbasket completely can also help skip added sodium.
- Opt for low-sodium or no-salt-added processed foods, such as broths for gravy, soups for casseroles, and vegetables in general.
- Select fresh or frozen vegetables, which have no added sodium except for the frozen ones in a sauce.
- Roasting foods is a great way to add flavor without having to add a lot of salt.
- Use herbs, spices, garlic, onion, and citrus to flavor foods.
- Opt for sweet potatoes instead of mashed potatoes, which often call for heavy doses of salt.
- Don't forget the cranberry sauce. It's naturally low in sodium and pairs nicely alongside turkey and all the trimmings.
- Watch your portions. Overindulging is less about what you eat and more about how much you eat. Like fat and calories, you can cut back on sodium by cutting back on the portion size.

Thanksgiving cooking safety tips More home cooking fires occur on Thanksgiving than any other day

As Thanksgiving approaches, it's a time to celebrate with loved ones and brush up on home fire safety. No holiday celebration would be complete without a feast but be sure to take precautions against kitchen fires when you're cooking and baking.

"Home fires are a real threat to South Carolina over the Thanksgiving holiday," said Rod Tolbert, Chief Executive Officer for the Red Cross of South Carolina. "In particular, cooking fires are the number one cause of home fires and year after year, Thanksgiving is the peak day for these tragedies. We at the Red Cross are urging families to follow cooking safety steps to help prevent your holiday celebrations from going up in smoke."

To help keep you and your loved ones safe this Thanksgiving, the American Red Cross offers these safety tips:

1. **Keep an eye on what you fry.** Never leave cooking food unattended. If you must leave the kitchen, even for a short period of time, turn off the stove.
2. **Move items that can burn away from the stove.** This includes dish towels, bags, boxes, paper and curtains. Also keep children and pets at least three feet away.
3. **Avoid wearing loose clothing or dangling sleeves while cooking.**
4. **When frying food, turn the burner off if you see smoke or if the grease starts to boil.** Carefully remove the pan from the burner.
5. **Keep a pan lid or a cookie sheet nearby.** Use it to cover the pan if it catches on fire. This will put out the fire. Leave the pan covered until it is completely cooled.
6. **Turn pot handles to the back of the stove,** so no one bumps them or pulls them over.
7. **Use a timer to remind your-**

self that the stove or oven is on. Check the kitchen before going to bed or leaving home to ensure all stoves, ovens and small appliances are turned off.

8. **Celebrating with the people you live with is the safest choice.** If you do celebrate with people who don't live with you, gatherings and activities held outdoors are safer than indoor gatherings.

9. **Do not attend or host a holiday gathering if you are sick or have symptoms of COVID-19.**

10. If you are not fully vaccinated and must travel, follow CDC's Domestic Travel or International Travel recommendations for unvaccinated people. Everyone, even people who are fully vaccinated, will still be required to wear a mask on public transportation.

You can also help keep your family safe by testing your smoke alarms monthly and practicing your home fire escape plan until everyone can get out in less than two minutes the amount of time you may have to get out of a burning home before it's too late.

Dear Editor,
As a graduate of Barnwell County Vocational Center, Barnwell High School, and an instructor at the Barnwell County Career Center, I feel I have a unique insight to the value of a unified and consolidated education experience.

For decades, I have long believed that so much potential and effort is wasted through redundancy and lack of uniformity among the school districts. Nowhere is the contrast more vivid than in District 80. Yes, Barnwell County Career Center is indeed the fourth school district in Barnwell County. We serve three separate districts, though two now share at least a common grading platform.

Barnwell County Career Center serves three schools with three different routes, transporting from three locations, arriving at three different times, with three potentially different schedules due to testing, pep rallies, guest speakers, pictures, etc.

A typical class of one hour and twenty minutes is reduced to one hour of instruction based on simple transportation dynamics. That's an impact of an additional class day per week lost on just arrival and departure times.

Imagine school "A" has testing on Monday. This removes one-third of the students from a particular lesson. School "B"? Testing on Thursday. One-third of the class is out. School "C" ... the next Wednesday, but school "A" is having an early release day for a guest speaker that next Thursday which means that one-third of your class will be released 20 minutes early in the middle of whatever lesson you were planning on teaching.

So, before the question is asked, "What does that have to do with a singular school's district?" Perhaps the question is, "Why not make three different career centers instead of one unified school district to serving individual districts more completely?" Therein lies the answer...how does tripling the expense of buildings, transportation, staff, and maintenance serve the community better? Triple the infrastructure and support staff for technology and computer support. Triple the resources required to educate the children, THE FUTURE, of our county.

That's just the logistical operations side of things. Let's look at the grounds and building quality aspects.

The career center is over 50 years old. Introduction of new technology with higher demands on bandwidth and electrical outlets, etc. have to be retrofitted into aging structures that require foundations to be reinforced. Each of the other high schools are currently facing the same challenges. Retrofitting, additions, and repurposing buildings that don't fulfill the needs of the existing, much less upcoming demands of students or teachers are using funds that could otherwise be spent on technology, staff, and recruitment.

four buildings that are up to 50 years old versus a newer, more efficient, better insulated, better constructed building can only be seen as a plus for the community. Additional grants and incorporation of technologies like solar panels to supplement the school's need for energy would almost certainly be utilized, offering even more reason to embrace this opportunity.

The argument of student opportunities:

"Students that play sports or participate in band, etc. won't have that opportunity or will lose their chance to shine for scholarships, etc."

While it's true that team sports have set numbers of players required on the field at one time, there is no limit to bench depth. Every larger consolidated school has access to a larger pool of talent that only strengthens their programs.

Something to consider: Barnwell doesn't have a JV team this year because they don't have enough players to support JV and varsity.

Lastly – tradition. I'll be the first to tell you that I understand the mindset of an ideal like "Once a Warhorse, always a Warhorse." Each high school has a proud tradition with memories and unification of its students and staff.

Rightly so. This "mindset" should never change...

However, each of us need to recognize this irrefutable fact: "The only constant IS change." Those that embrace this change can mold and shape it as they take an active participant role in the consolidation of their schools. To be made to comply means relinquishing that ability to manage the direction of the restructure to a state governed mandate. None of us want that. To remain defiant or reluctant, as numbers at each individual school dwindle, making it not only effective but necessary to consolidate, is going to cost the community a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity at a state-of-the-art education facility that will serve its children for generations to come.

Consider the impact the loss of our hospital had on our community, not only from the services, but to the recruitment of future businesses and families that relocate to the area for potential work. Understand that among the highest considerations for a family to relocate to the area, are how well the school facilities are rated.

We're either growing on the vine or dying. Barnwell County is stronger together. "He who hesitates, is lost."

The argument of cost:
There have been discussions that "\$100 million wouldn't cover half of the cost of a high school that's being proposed."

"OK, where will the other half come from?"

My suggestion has been the "penny tax" option.

"Why should we be burdened with taxes to pay for a NEW school?"

My answer is:
1 – We found it acceptable to pay a penny extra for a courthouse, why not a resource for generations of our future?

2 – We are responsible and already pay taxes for our schools. Step it up and invest in something long overdue, and INEVITABLE.

Failure to do so leaves us at risk of losing \$110 million dollars.

The question then becomes: "Why should the state be able to tell us how to spend our share of monies from a settlement?"

While I cannot disagree that it comes across as "overreach", it doesn't detract from the fact that this is very much needed and should be a priority as an investment in the community's future. Consider that Barnwell County is in the state's minority of non-consolidated school districts, and as such, is one of the lowest on the state's budgetary considerations when school funding is doled out. Plainly stated, larger schools with greater numbers will receive greater funds.

"What about the jobs it will cost?"

There is no less need for skilled educators. It simply unifies their efforts and direction.

The maintenance, infrastructure support, etc. is streamlined to more effectively maintain something new instead of repairing something that is aged.

The newer structure would lend itself to a smarter design from everything to technological demands to security. The majority of buildings in use today are a logistical nightmare to secure and spread our law enforcement's effectiveness thin by keeping them at four facilities instead of one. This also addresses the concerns about school rivalry: "Three schools that are rivals or have separate gang affiliations puts us at risk" – hogwash.

Barnwell Vocational/Career Center has been an example since its inception of how false that statement is. There are no more instances of conflict between schools than there are in individual schools. If anything, it fosters unity, NOT division.

How to shop Black Friday sales

Black Friday, traditionally the single busiest shopping day of the year, arrives a little earlier this year, with many stores already advertising Black Friday prices. Instead of selling an alarm to brave crowds for deeply discounted items, dedicated shoppers are expected to look for deals online, similar to last year -- that is, if they haven't already finished their holiday

shopping. Changes, such as shipping delays, hiring challenges and microchip shortages, are impacting how people will shop. Retail experts are predicting higher than normal crowds in the stores and increased percentages in spending on gifts, decorations, and other holiday-related items.

If you do decide to shop in person on Black Friday, the Better Business Bureau offers these tips to make your shopping experience productive (and maybe even enjoyable):

Make the most of Black Friday deals. Start with a list of items and use sale flyers and promotions to determine which store has the best price. Set a budget and stick with it before heading out.

Read the fine print. Some retailers may offer an additional percentage off the purchase but could exclude certain deals or items such as "door busters." Watch for companies boasting a high percentage off; the item may be "75% off," but the original price could be inflated. Carefully check the price tags, terms, and conditions. Research online using a secure Wi-Fi connection to see if competitors have the item at a better price.

Plan out the excursion. Sometimes it's not necessary to wait to see what deals will be offered on Black Friday. Retailers often will release Black Friday flyers weeks ahead of time, so consumers can plan out their shopping spree. Make a map of the stores to visit and what items are at which store. Some retailers only honor sale ads during a certain time frame, or on certain days, and could limit the amount of deeply discounted items available for purchase.

Sign-up for email alerts. Many stores release their best Black Friday deals and exclusive coupons to people who have subscribed to their emails. Sign up ahead of

the holiday season, and then unsubscribe afterwards if needed.

Do your research. Read product reviews on extremely discounted items. It could be a cheaper model or brand advertised, and not what was expected. Check BBB.org's business profiles of the stores and read what other customers have experienced.

Know the return policy and warranty information. Pass along any information about returns, exchanges, repairs, and warranties to the person who will use the item. Gift receipts are an easy way for recipients to return or exchange a gift if it's not just right, but make sure the item is able to be returned before purchasing.

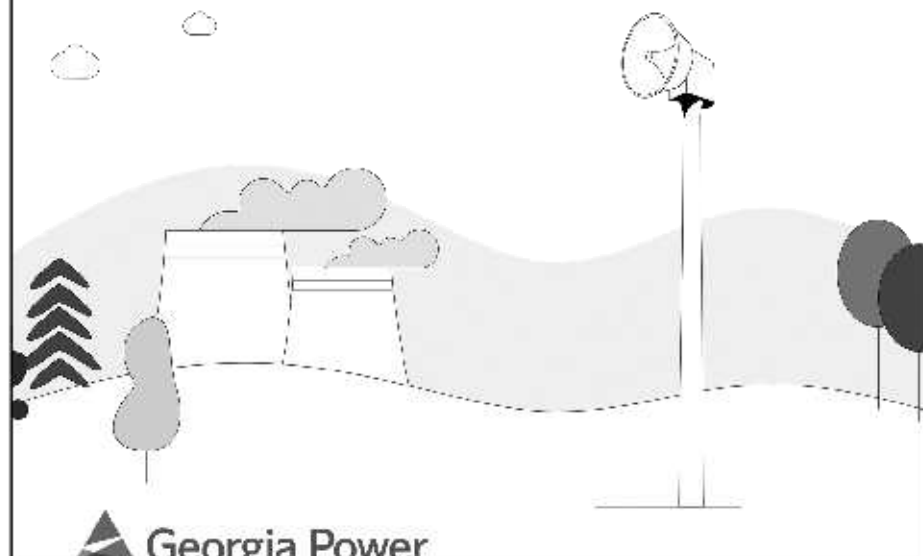
Plant Vogtle siren test Monday, December 5.

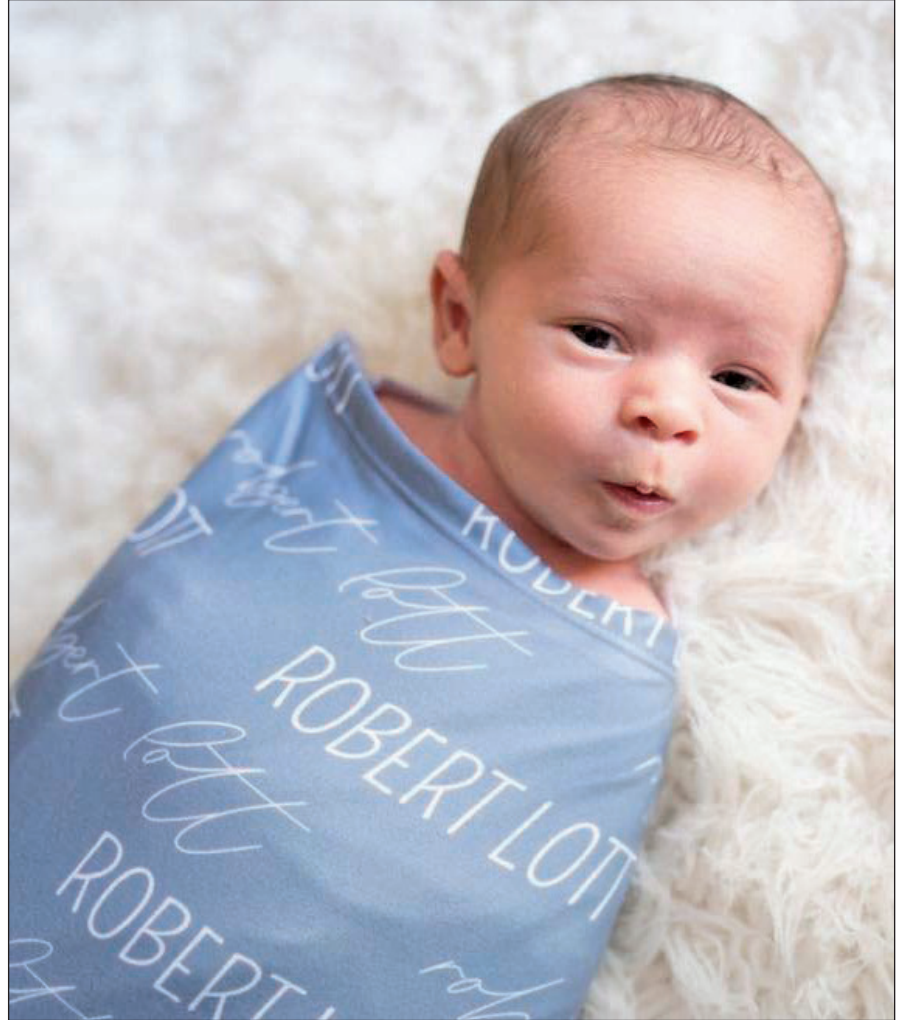

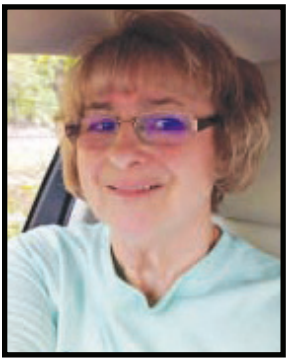

City changes insurance, approves extra \$1.2 million for firehouse upgrades

The City of Barnwell met on Nov. 7 to discuss a state insurance policy for all city employees, detail required updates to police policy, and update the community on future events.

Insurance

The City of Barnwell approved a resolution to participate in the South Carolina Public Employee Benefit Authority (PEBA) insurance plan for all city employees in a four-to-three vote. Once finalized, the city will be locked into this plan for four years.

While each individual plan will differ from employee to employee based on factors such as number of dependents, tobacco use, or frequency of doctor visits, PEBA is understood to ultimately save both the city and its employees money.

"The City will save approximately \$37,300 per year, while its employees will save nearly \$34,000, equaling nearly \$71,300 in savings across the board," said Mayor Marcus Rivera in a statement made on Facebook. "Our employees will also benefit by having a lower deductible. I think this is a huge achievement considering inflation is happening everywhere, and yet our employees will see some of their paychecks grow, while both save money."

In February, Administrator Lynn McEwen sent all city employees a survey asking about their feelings on switching insurance policies. The results varied—some were for it, some were against, and some were indifferent.

The purpose of this survey was to gauge the feelings of employees before presenting the policy to the council to make a final decision on. The survey showed that almost half of city employees were satisfied with their now former insurance plan, and complaints against the previous plan pertained to things such as high deductibles and copays.

Barnwell Police Chief Lamaz Robinson explained to the council at the Nov. meeting that he and his officers were in support of PEBA, and how most of them have held prior positions that offered PEBA where they found it worked for themselves and their family.

BPD Officer David Greene spoke to the council about his wife's struggle with carpal tunnel syndrome, and how a plan like PEBA would make the care she needs accessible and affordable.

Greene feels the current insurance provided by the city "will not pay for things that should be paid for," and wants to see the span of medical coverage expand for city employees.

"The monthly premiums would be lower with the state plan [PEBA], but changes in the benefits and administration should also be considered," stated the October meeting minutes.

Councilman Ron Still explained he has heard mixed reviews from department heads shortly before the Nov. meeting about PEBA, and feels council should not ac-

cept a policy that would majorly disappoint any percentage of city employees.

Councilman Still motioned for PEBA to be tabled until the next council meeting to give Administrator McEwen time to explain the policy in detail to each city employee.

Councilman John Moody suggested employees then take a private vote on whether or not they want to participate in PEBA if the resolution is tabled.

PEBA has been in question for nearly two years, according to Mayor Rivera. If the city council tabled it at this meeting, they would miss the set November deadline to participate and would need to wait until there was another opening which is an indeterminate timeline.

Each city employee will be impacted differently by switching insurance based on personal factors, meaning every employee may not be satisfied with this plan.

The PEBA plan will begin in April 2023.

Policy Updates

Ordinance 2022-4, which repeals and replaces divisions of the Building Code Ordinance of the City of Barnwell, was read by title only. This update to the existing codes is required by the South Carolina Building Code Council, whose primary purpose is to adopt or modify building codes in the state.

Police Department

The Police Department's Operations Manual was amended to include new policies regarding take-home vehicles. The addition states, "Anyone hired on or after November 7, 2022 must reside within 35-miles (as the crow flies) from the city limits of Barnwell" to qualify for a take-home vehicle.

The phrasing 'as the crow flies' is an idiom meaning distance measured in a straight line regardless of road mileage. It was added to identify the 35 mile radius around City Hall where new hires must live.

Currently, there are four BPD officers who live outside this radius.

BPD was provided with a credit card with a \$5,000 limit per month for training and travel. This alleviates officers from paying for their training, travel, and lodging and then being reimbursed by the city, as discussed at the Oct. meeting.

The South Carolina Law Enforcement Training Council is responsible for establishing minimum standards for all SC law enforcement agencies, and recently introduced nine standards that must be adopted and implemented by all agencies by January 1, 2023.

BPD is already in compliance with three of these standards such as policies on the use of force and officer response to resistance, uniform vehicle pursuit standards and the use of lethal options during pursuit, and uniform implementation and use of body worn cameras.

The six standards requiring BPD policies to be edited are regarding an officer's duty to intervene in the actions of other officers, hiring and terminating practices, mandatory and uni-

form post academy field training, the use of 'no knock' warrants, a system to file complaints, and an early warning system.

These policies were adopted as of Oct. 27, and the department is now into the next phase which is initial training on these revised policies and procedures, according to BPD Captain Mark Howard.

Firehouse Upgrades

At their last meeting, the City of Barnwell approved the remaining \$1.2 million of American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funding to be allocated to the initial stages of rebuilding the City of Barnwell Fire Station.

This would be in addition to \$350,000 in funding already secured from the state by Representative Lonnie Hosey.

The fire station is planned to be completely rebuilt to house trucks, and eventually the dorm space and offices. According to Administrator McEwen, the end result is to demolish the current building housing the fire department.

To do this, the City of Barnwell has approved ownership of the .07 mile section of Madison St. (S-6-151) that runs from Academy St. to Washington St. in order to establish a back entrance to the upcoming new fire station.

Ownership allows the city to widen this area without requesting an encroachment from SC Department of Transportation (SCDOT) as well as make decisions on how traffic will flow through this area.

If approved by SCDOT, the street will be removed from the SCDOT system and fall under the care of the city.

Citizen of the Year/Business of the Year

Mayor Rivera and Administrator McEwen energized the city's Citizen of the Year and Business of the Year awards for 2022.

Each award will be given to an individual or business who make a large impact on the community through their commitments to bettering Barnwell.

Nomination forms can be found on the city's website or at City Hall. Nominees must live within the city limits of Barnwell and will be selected by City Council until the program is self-sufficient to be judged by previous winners.

Nominations must be submitted no later than November 30.

Updates

Administrator McEwen gave updates about city happenings in the administrator's report.

The city council is considering a new logo to represent the City of Barnwell and are still discussing if one of the designs made by the South Carolina National Heritage Corridor will replace the current logo.

Administrator McEwen detailed upgrades being made to Lemon Park and Fuller Park, and the city's newly-created website where citizens can pay bills and access fillable forms.

The website also houses information about upcoming Christmas Downtown events such as the parade and tree lighting.

Suspicious Hilda house fire investigated

Barnwell County Sheriff's Office (BCSO) deputies and investigators were also on scene.

Multiple Barnwell County fire departments responded to a "suspicious fire" last week that underwent investigation by the South Carolina Law Enforcement Division (SLED).

Around 6:50 p.m. on Thursday, November 10 the Hilda Fire Department, Blackville Fire Department, and Friendship Fire Department were dispatched to Delk Avenue in Hilda.

"Later on in the call we toned out Barnwell Rural for manpower and tankers," said Barnwell County Fire Coordinator

According to Hilda Fire Chief Thomas Sharpe, when Hilda firefighters arrived on the scene Thursday evening the fire had broken through the roof and gone into the attic rendering the home unlivable with \$134,000 worth of damage.

Hilda firefighters left the call around two o'clock Friday morning, according to Chief Sharpe.

According to BCSO's report naming the incident as a "suspicious fire," responding officers and officials noted "the fire appeared suspicious

in nature," partly based on statements made by someone on scene. Firefighters observed a fire pattern along a wall in-

side a middle room of the home that made a V-pattern, according to the report.

The report states they

were met by a female upon arrival who too suspected the fire was not accidental due to "issues her and the victim were

having in their divorce."

The owners of the home are Jackie Ray and Stephanie Ray of Hilda, according to county officials and Barnwell County property records.

According to the victim's statement, he was in the backyard working on his daughter's car when he left to go eat supper. A neighbor observed the victim in the backyard and later saw smoke coming from the home.

The BCSO incident report states, "No signs of foul play were discovered," and "no signs of accelerants were detected, and the cause of the fire was undetermined."

The fire remains under investigation by SLED.

She's also glad to be reunited with Grubbs and Bethany Lewis, who are not just her co-workers but also good friends.

"I love my girls. They are true friends. When I need to talk, they are always there. I don't think I could make it through the bad times if it wasn't for them," said Hartzog of Grubbs and Lewis.

She is also grateful to Jennie Ann Brown, who was the one who heard Hartzog's screams during the attack and came to her aid. Brown, 74, and Hartzog, 49, have

known each other for years and often see each other when Brown comes to Hartzog's neighborhood to feed stray cats. They had a brief chat just before the attack, but Brown soon heard screams. That's when she grabbed a stick and started fending off the dogs from further harming Hartzog, allowing her to get away and seek medical help.

"She's my lifesaver," said Hartzog of Brown. Brown calls Hartzog every day.

In addition to Grubbs and Lewis, she is thankful her sister Melissa Hartzog, her friend and

son's godmother Kathy Googe, and her family for being there every step of the way and checking on her.

She is also thankful to the community for everything they've done, including meals, calls, visits, donations, and prayers.

"Without this community, I don't know where I'd be," said Hartzog, who asks for continued prayers. "I thank God for being here with my kids."

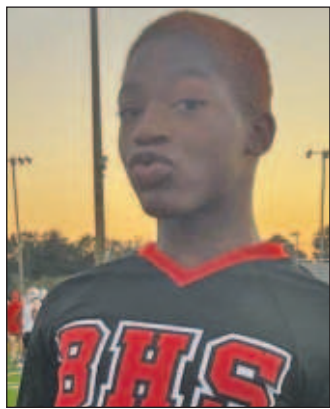
Though physical and emotional scars remain, Hartzog is relying on her faith, family and friends as she regains a sense of normalcy.

Barnwell High competition cheer team competes at state

The Barnwell High School Competitive Cheer Team arrived at BHS early Saturday morning, Nov. 19, after a very late-night cheering for the Warhorses in Kershaw during the third round of the AA State Football tournament the night before. What could possibly bring the cheerleaders back so early on a Saturday morning, you might ask. The answer would be, for a trip to Columbia to compete in South Carolina High School League's State Competitive Cheer Competition.

This was Barnwell's first State Competition of this kind. In the 2018-2019 school year and again in the 2019-2020 school year, the Barnwell Warhorses competed in the State Gameday Cheer Invitational Championships. Barnwell was crowned AA State Champions both years.

This new format was different. According to Barnwell's Cheer Coach Amy Williams, "The Gameday championship is a one-day competition that has three preliminaries: fight song, crowd cheer, and band dance. Based on those performances, seven teams move on to finals. The finals is a three-minute routine that incorporates all three of the preliminaries into one routine. It's more like sideline skills. This new competition requires that you do a two-minute, 15-second routine that includes jumps, primary stunts, secondary stunts, pyramid, dance, running tumbling and standing tumbling. It's a lot harder and you have to attend at least two regional competitions. It's the school's equivalent to all-star cheer."

Williams continued saying, "I knew going into this season that we had a lot of work to do to get state ready. Many of these athletes had no experience with competition style cheerleading and that's a whole different world from sideline. The athletes were given a summer conditioning schedule and had to check in daily when it was completed. This was the only solution to the issue that we didn't have the facilities or equipment for many in-person practices. The athletes didn't disappoint and for the most part, they delivered."

Regular sideline cheering for football or basketball is time consuming, but competitive cheer requires a great

commitment from the participants.

"Once in person training began, we worked countless

hours fixing timing issues, confidence issues, and the overall look of the routine. We decided for state we were going to up our stunt difficulty. Then some unforeseen injuries occurred and athletes were rearranged. With all those hiccups, I was pleased with our state performance. This was our building year, which means we laid the foundation. Next season, my goal is to build the dream team. My favorite message to send to each athlete is that two things can happen at a competition, you either win or you learn. These amazing athletes learned and progressed beautifully," said Coach Williams.

Gamecocks shock #5 Tennessee 63-38

As the last minute ran from the clock at Williams-Brice Stadium Saturday night, Nov. 19, the last 10 to 15 rows of the student section were empty. The students had not left the stadium, but had moved down closer to field, anticipating that final horn. The horn sounded and the impossible had become reality, when the unranked University of South Carolina Gamecocks defeated the highly favored and #5 ranked Tennessee Volunteers 63-38.

When the horn sounded, the entire student section and most of the other fans that were able, descended onto the field in celebration of the huge upset victory. An eyewitness and very reliable source swears that he watched Gamecock head coach Shane Beamer come on down from the stands. Coach Webb remembered for 'adventurous spirit'

Marion E. Webb, otherwise known as The Carolina River Man and lovingly as Paw, passed away on August 30 after 88 years of adventure in Ridge Spring.

Captain, teacher, coach, councilor, principal, superintendent, land surveyor, carpenter, and artist were some of the many titles Webb held throughout his life— although not one ever defined him entirely.

His son Edwin "Eddie" Webb compares his father to "a modern day Mark Twain, Raiders of the Lost Ark, the Voyage of Columbus, Black Beard, Forrest Gump, and all rolled into one."

Webb is remembered facilitating adventures like white-water paddling, camping, canoeing, or anything involving being in the water or the woods.

"Material things were never important to him as long as he had some type of boat," said Eddie. "If he didn't have a boat, an inner tube was fine."

Although he never was a fan of fishing, you could often find Webb on his 'poor man's water mansion,' often referred to as his yacht. This 'yacht' was a pontoon boat with a boarded-up, homemade shelter built alongside his friend, Steve Carter.

"He once jumped off of a shrimp boat and swam to Hilton Head Island before it was developed," said Eddie, who could share countless adventures his father took him and his siblings on.

One memory comes in fragments, but Eddie

recalls hitting rough waters while being pulled on skis by his father who was driving the pontoon boat through the channel connecting Lake Marion and Lake Moultrie.

The boat nose-dived into a huge wave and Eddie remembered why bringing the lifeboat on an adventure with his father was always a good idea.

Webb lived every day with a fervor for life, even after he was left paralyzed from the neck down around age 47 in May 1981.

When returning from white-water rafting on the

Chattanooga River on his 1947 Knucklehead Harley Davidson motorcycle (the same one he took his wife on dates on years earlier), he lost control of the bike and crashed.

Webb spent the remaining 41 years of his life as a quadriplegic, but his sense of adventure never waned.

"He was fearless even following his accident," said Eddie. "We knew he wasn't lacking smarts but we did sometimes question his decisions for some very risky endeavors. We would often look at each other thinking, 'Does he

remember he is paralyzed and in a wheelchair?'"

"I came to the conclusion that though educated and very intelligent, his passion for adventure would always overcome his judgment and reasoning abilities," he said.

"The last few years of his life, he would go explore in the woods with his little tiny wheelchair and get stuck somewhere and we have to go find him," said his grandson and country music star, Cody Webb.

Webb's accident did not change his view of the world or his thirst for adventure, it just shifted the method.

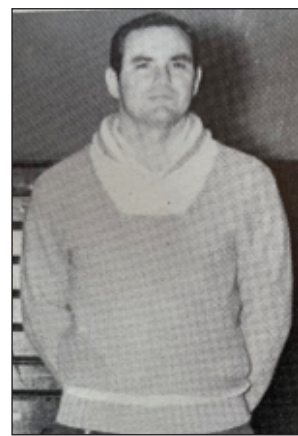
Cody did not know his grandfather before his accident, but still knows the adventurous spirit he had well.

"I know he was always on an adventure, running a river somewhere and having near-death experiences. And even after the accident, they would take a pontoon boat that a friend of his made down the Savannah River to the coast every year," said Cody.

"They did it about 10 years in a row and every single year they would either sink or break down in some kinda way," said Cody. "It was just crazy, and then they'd get rescued every single time. That was just what he lived for."

With adventures like white-water rafting being limited after his accident, Webb would paint them instead. His art commonly depicted rural life and almost always featured water through bold colors of oil paint even with limited movement of his hands and arms.

"He couldn't hold a paintbrush, so he had to wear a special type of

glove and had to hold the paintbrush in his mouth and put it in the air and kind of shove it up in there where it would stick to the canvas and paint that way," said Cody.

Webb's artistry was not just seen on the canvas, but in his relationship with those around him.

Webb was 'Paw' to everyone he encountered and often stood as a father figure in the lives of people who were not his biological children.

Webb possessed the quality to take people for who they were and hear their stories without judgment or expectation, which were traits people flocked to.

Many of the people in Webb's life were given a nickname.

"If you were a part of Paw's circle for any length of time, you would be honored with a new nickname of Paw's choosing," said Eddie.

Cody was nicknamed 'Buffalo,' and his daughter-in-law and primary caretaker after his accident, Mildred, became 'Lil.'

"If you hung around him for more than five minutes, you're gonna have a nickname, he called me Buffalo my whole life," said Cody.

The love of Webb's life, the late Mae Ruth Handberry Webb, was nicknamed 'Duck' after she underwent hip surgery leaving her with a slight waddle. Mae passed away in 2001.

Webb married Mae, a Martin native, in June 1953 and raised three boys—Eddie, Jody, and Mauri, who passed away. Eddie remembers his parents love as steadfast.

Nicknames were just one of the valued components of the relationships Webb built, another part was his ability to lessen their burdens simply by lending an ear.

His grandson, Cody, or 'Buffalo,' remembers his grandfather as "one of those people that you could talk to about anything."

"He took people exactly for who they were," said Cody. "He was one of those people I could always talk to about anything, even when I wasn't comfortable talking to my parents or my close friends. I knew I could always come to... I called him Paw."

Cody remembers singing old country songs with his grandfather on Christmas. A favorite was 'Honky Tonk Toys,' by John Conley.

While Webb encouraged Cody to follow his dream, Cody did not get his musical talent from him.

"He did the thing where he would try to sing, and I mean, he knew he was terrible and he didn't have a musical bone in his body, but he used to try to sing Elvis songs and it was incredibly bad," said Cody jokingly. "But, he always loved it."

"Even during the period of time following his wreck as he was adapting to life as a quadriplegic, people still came to him with their problems and much like his father," said

Eddie. Webb was born in Barnwell to Rev. M.B. Webb and Winnie Fallow Webb on Jan. 8, 1934. His father, Rev. M.B. Webb, is described by surviving family as patient and humble, and was known for healing broken churches throughout South Carolina.

A dear friend of the family, James Fowke, lived with the Webbs throughout high school, even sharing a room with Webb. Fowke has many memories of both Rev. M.B. Webb and his son.

"I lived with the family, which accepted me after my own family had to dissolve because of my father's death," said Fowke, who feels indebted to the Webb family. "I was devoted to him as a friend."

Fowke explains Rev. M.B. Webb was a pastor at First Baptist Church in Barnwell when it was located on Marlboro Ave. before it burnt down around the 1950s, and was subsequently rebuilt where it stands today.

When the Webbs lived in Barnwell, the two-story house was located at the corner of Academy St. and Franklin St. until it was moved down the block, according to Fowke.

After his accident, Fowke would often drive Webb to the Veterans Affairs hospital in Augusta.

"He was only 47 when he got injured. I never, never heard one word negative about his condition, he was always positive," said Fowke. "That was a trait that very few people would have with his condition."

Fowke feels he lost a great friend in Webb, and describes his stamina for living as unbelievable.

"He was so fortunate to have befriended James Fowke, who later became not only the most loyal friend anyone could ever hope for, but eventually moved in and became a family member as well," said Eddie. "James and Daddy remained close throughout his lifetime and there was nothing James would not do for him."

Fowke remembers Webb as a star-athlete who could master any sport in high school. This passion for the game led Webb to a career in coaching at Williston-Elko School District.

Webb coached Susan Rhodus-Derrick in basketball her first year playing guard for the varsity team.

She remembers him as fair, kind, and with the ability to treat everyone the same.

Derrick now lives in Irmo, but has fond memories of her time on the team.

Outside of coaching, Webb served as the superintendent, principal, and a physics teacher at Aiken County Public Schools. His passion for learning new things grew while studying physics at Furman University as well as Duke University.

Although a learned man and an educator, Cody carries his grandfather's favorite phrase with him to this day, "don't let school ruin your education."

"Books are written and movies are made about people with much less interesting lives. Hopefully as time passes, my brother Jody and I, along with family and friends will share some of these incredible stories and adventures for all to read. For now, all of Daddy's family and friends bid a very special farewell to one of the most remarkable men God ever made.

Daddy would often talk in nautical terms so Jody and I say, 'Farewell Captain,'" said Eddie.
