Food drive feeds over 1,000 people

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Five hundred and seventy-five people were given supplies for a Thanksgiving meal at the pop-up food drive held on November 23 at Veterans Memorial Park.

HEALing Partners, The Barnwell County Sheriff's Office, Golden Harvest Food Bank, and the newly-established collaborative pantry, The Well, joined together to host the Thanksgiving Eve event.

Cars lined the entirety of Fuldner Road in Barnwell and spilled out onto Ellenton Street waiting to have their trunk filled with food.

Although 575 people received food, many are feeding families or friends with the food they receive, making the real number of people impacted by this food drive presumably double.

The drive began with 150 servings of food, and was quickly doubled to 300 servings by Golden Harvest Food

Bank upon seeing the traction the event had on social media the day prior, according to HEALing Partners member Jessica Bradshaw.

Cabbage, bags of sweet potatoes and onions, grapes, shrimp, milk, meats, and more were handed out to cars. Golden Harvest provided 300

of each of these items; a jug of milk, a bag of potatoes, and a package of pork each are considered one serving.

Volunteers from participating organizations as well as a handful of others helped sort through and distribute

Delinquent properties to be auctioned Dec. 5th

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Hundreds of delinquent properties will be up for bids next week.

The annual delinquent tax sales for Barnwell and Allendale counties will be held on Monday, Dec. 5 at 10 a.m. The Allendale sale is held at the James Brandt Building (298 Barnwell Hwy., Allendale) while the Barnwell sale is at the Barnwell County Courthouse (141 Main Street, Barnwell). Up for sale will be properties that have unpaid taxes from last year.

"The last thing I want is for people to lose their property. This is a last resort because we send out so many notices," said Barnwell County Tax Collector Alissa Abbott.

Prior to the sale, the tax collector's offices make every effort to collect the delinquent taxes. This includes mailing execution notices, sending a certified letter, posting a levy on the property, and publishing the list in the newspaper for three weeks.

"I go as far as calling people on the phone and knocking on doors," said Allendale County Tax Collector Bridget Woods. "I don't like to see people lose property. They work hard for what they've got."

Owners of the delinquent properties have until 5 p.m. this Friday, Dec. 2 to pay what is owed. After that, the properties will be sold to the highest bidder at next week's sales.

As of Monday evening, Nov. 28, Barnwell County had 308 properties still unpaid, which Abbott said is a lot higher than the last couple of year. Last year, the county had 97 properties up for bids on the day of the auction, said Abbott.

Meanwhile, Allendale County had 162 properties left as of Tuesday morning, Nov. 29. Woods said they typically have at least 200 properties to sale on the day of the auction.

The starting bid is the back taxes plus the current tax bill, said Abbott.

Even if someone loses their property at the auction, they have one more chance to get their property back.

"They have one year to redeem their property, but it costs them a bit more," said Abbott.

They must pay tax bills for both years plus any interest. Interest gradually increases from 3 to 12 percent every three months during the year after the auction, Abbott said.

"Once redemption is done, the bidder is given their bid money back plus any interest to that point," said Abbott.

If the property includes a mobile home, the defaulting taxpayer must pay rent to the purchaser at the time of redemption that's equal to one-twelfth of the taxes for the last completed property tax year, according to state law.

The tax collectors typically lead the sale as the auctioneer, but Abbott said she plans to have a professional auctioneer at the auction to help with the timing. This will help due to having more properties this year and will allow Abbott to complete the paperwork earlier.

"In the last couple of years, we've had fewer properties but it's taking longer because people are bidding more. The process takes forever when people are going back and forth. We've brought more money in than ever," said Abbott of how the 2021 auction brought in \$750,772.18.

On September 28, 2022, Hurricane Ian, a category

4 storm, hit the Western Florida coast leaving thousands without utilities, destroyed homes and caused millions of dollars in damages. The Aiken Stake of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints was one of four stakes, approximately 25 congregations, that sent 500 or more workers the fourth weekend after the storm to Venice, Florida. Closer congregations had sent workers the three weekends before with higher numbers of volunteers. The volunteers slept in tents they brought with them on local church grounds and used their own tools to handle work orders such as the one prearranged for a retired couple, Joseph G. and his wheelchair-bound wife. Luckily,

one set of folks from Gilbert brought a tractor with a grappling hook that was used to pull an upside-down shed over to standing upright and put it back on its foundation. Respirators were required for removing the molded wallboard that was infested with snakes during the flooding. Others cut downed trees and removed damaged household goods. 120 manhours went into this one project. When finished and after receiving a hearty thanks the unshaven sea of yellow Helping Hands volunteers moved on to the next project and cold showers. The World Central Kitchen provided hot meals to the workers.

Trap-neuter-vaccinate-return program approved, finally

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After months of debate, the Trap-Neuter-Vaccinate-Return (TNVR) program was officially adopted in Barnwell County when council members unanimously approved the amendments made to Animal Control Ordinance 2010-08-262.

The conversation began during public comment when co-chair of the TNVR committee, Barbara Christian, detailed recent statistics.

So far, the TNVR committee has located 21 colonies with over 200 cats currently in, or waiting to cycle through the TNVR program.

Once through the program (meaning they are vaccinated, spayed/neutered, and then ear-tipped for identification), cats are relocated to participating farms in need of rodent and insect control, or to remote areas where caregivers can tend to them.

Since July, 140 stray cats have come into the Barnwell County Animal Shelter. Out of those 140 cats, 51 were euthanized and 24 went through the TNR process, according to Christian.

The approved ordinance contains language assuring the second allotment of the \$30,000 grant from Best Friends Animal Society, the non-profit or-

ganization that funded the Barnwell County Animal Shelter Foundation's start of the TNVR program in the county.

The surety of this funding was questioned by all involved when the county officials changed the language unsupported by Best Friends between the second and third reading, which was tabled at a previous meeting. The People-Sentinel covered this exchange in prior editions.

The TNVR program will be financially self-sustaining through already sourced grants and will not look to the county for future funding.

With the passing of this ordinance, nuisance calls regarding stray cats are no longer the responsibility of the Barnwell County Sheriff's Office (BCSO), but that of TNVR volunteers.

Sheriff Vehicles The Barnwell County Sheriff's Office (BCSO) is soon to be outfitted with five new vehicles after council approved a resolution to process a \$208,000 loan.

Four Ford Explorers and one Ford F-150 are set to be purchased.

According to a November 9 memorandum, the county is borrowing \$208,000 from TRUIST Bank to purchase these vehicles with the total invoice being \$277,463.74.

BCSO plans to make a down payment of \$69,463.74 from the ac-

count identified as vehicle replacement. These vehicles will be financed for three years at a 4.77% interest rate with an annual payment of \$76,050.43.

Committees Each county council member is responsible for nominating constituents to represent their district at county committees and boards.

Elizabeth Zorn was nominated by district one Councilman Freddie Houston and subsequently reappointed to the Animal Shelter Board by council.

James Willis Kease was reappointed to the Economic Development Committee to serve at large. Kease was nominated for reappointment by district three Councilman Don Harper.

Stephen Conrad was nominated to the Housing Committee and Vorise Peoples was reappointed to the Generations Unlimited Board representing district six.

Reappointed to the Library Board were Southern Palmetto Regional Chamber of Commerce Director, Terri Smith and Ernestine Gillam both to serve at large.

Barnwell County Council Vice Chairman Jerry Creech provided the Transportation Committee report. The committee is currently getting quotes for drainage as well as rocking and paving county roads.

Vice Chairman Creech

detailed there is \$250 million available from the state in 2023 for the paving and construction of highways. Barnwell County is set to receive \$2 million of it.

Within this allocated funding, counties can only repair certain types

of roadways. This excludes county-owned parking lots, which are seen as a priority to be repaired in Barnwell County.

"We have the parking lot out here that's in awful shape and there's nothing we can do," said

Vice Chairman Creech at the meeting.

Vice Chairman Creech alongside other council members plan to look into this further to see what actions need to be taken to make needed repairs to county-owned parking lots.

They also had to learn to live within the spotlight that brings.

"I love history. I have always enjoyed reading historical fiction and biographies on historical figures. When I came across this play, I truly fell in love with the unique way each woman was portrayed and how the facts of the time were woven into a fictional day/night in their lives," said director Michael Pisacreta.

Renee Owens is portraying Lady Bird Johnson and Betty Ford while Karon Pate is portraying Pat Nixon.

"Each actress is truly stepping into the character of each First Lady. They are doing an amazing job learning pages and pages of lines along with knowing where to stand, when to pick up props and delivering each word with passion and intent," Pisacreta said.

This play marks Pate's Circle Theatre debut and her first-ever role onstage,

though the new Barnwell resident has loved attending plays for years in other places she's lived. After seeing an online ad for open auditions, she decided to audition and got the part.

"I have been meeting every week since and they have all been so kind, supportive and full of expert advice on how to be successful. I have never gone out of my box like this, so this is a first. This play is so different than anything I have attended before; each role story tells and there is no interaction between characters. There is so much to remember," said Pate.

She's enjoyed learning about Pat Nixon, who she calls a "very strong, extraordinary woman" that's she's honored to portray.

Betty Ford being a true party girl and then how her addiction issues were initiated or propelled by her personal doctor," she said. She also learned some of the similarities between all three first ladies, including how they met and married their husbands fairly quickly.

This play humanizes the political scene in a whimsical and moving way, according to the synopsis.

"This is a unique style of play that is historical in nature, and will leave the audience smiling with its personal commentary, its funny moments, some touching and sad, and even some anger over events that transpired," said Owens. "Learn and laugh a little with us. You won't regret it!"

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Beatty wins school board runoff

Ken Beatty of Williston was the winner of the Nov. 22 runoff for the District 2 seat on the Barnwell County Consolidated School District board. Of the 24 votes, Beatty received 15 votes (62.5 percent) while Eric Johnson received 9 (37.5 percent).

"Thank you to everyone that came out and supported me with your vote," said Beatty.

The runoff was needed after no one filed for the seat on the Nov. 8 ballot. Only 18 write-in votes were cast on Nov. 8 with Beatty and Johnson having the most at two votes each. A runoff was needed since both agreed to serve.

"It was a long day for 24 votes," said Naomi DeFrenn of how five precincts at four polling places had to be opened from 7 a.m.

to 7 p.m. on Nov. 22 for the runoff. Nobody voted at the Snelling or Barnwell precincts, but there were votes in Williston and Elko.

"I am looking forward to getting to work helping lead this district to the brightest future possible. It's time to roll up our sleeves and get to work. We have a very challenging road ahead but one that we will take on with our students' interests in the forefront," said Beatty.

Once he's sworn in, he will join the other six board members who took office after the Nov. 8 election.

Making Comfort Foods Healthier

When the weather gets cooler and the leaves start turning beautiful colors, you may look forward to eating warm, rich, and hearty comfort foods. Unfortunately, they can wreck your diet and cause you to pack extra pounds unless you modify your recipes or limit your portions. Research shows that the average weight gain between November and January is at least a pound, which is usually permanent. You can hide an expanding waistline under layers of winter clothing, but the ugly truth will be revealed when you put on those spring fashions.

What is a Comfort Food?
"Comfort food" is any food or beverage that gives a comforting, satisfying feeling after you eat them. It provides temporary relief (e.g. stress relief) or a sense of emotional well-being (e.g. happiness, security, or a reward). According to a Cornell University study, women find comfort in candy, chocolates, and prepared snack foods, such as ice cream or potato chips. Men prefer hearty, home-cooked meals, like pasta, steak, or casseroles.

There are no "bad" foods, although some foods are worse for you than others. Many rich, creamy comfort foods are filled with artery-clogging fat, sugar, sodium (salt), and extra ingredients. You can splurge on an occasional small portion of decadent food, but it's better to completely avoid the temptation.

To prevent craving comfort food that is unhealthy, eat a balanced diet of foods that make you feel full and satisfied longer. This includes protein foods to stabilize blood sugars and high-fiber foods, which send the message "I'm full" to the brain.

The Most Popular Comfort Foods of the Season
Although most spring and summer dishes are light and full of healthy, colorful, leafy vegetables, the most popular fall and winter foods are warm, rich, and hearty dishes. The list includes macaroni and cheese; chili and stews; cream- and cheese-based casseroles; cream-based soups, bisques, and chowders; creamy pot pies with

pastry on the top and bottom; fried side dishes (e.g. French fries, chili cheese fries, and onion rings); mashed potatoes, and a variety of sweet treats (e.g. Halloween candy, chocolate, cookies, and pies topped with whipped cream or ice cream).

Ways to Avoid Winter Weight Gain

In addition to limiting the most fattening foods, follow these tips to avoid winter weight gain:

- Drink plenty of water between meals and at mealtimes.
- Eat tomato-based and broth-based soups and stews that contain lots of vegetables and are low in sodium. Broth-based soup eaten as an appetizer can fill you up so that you eat fewer calories during the meal.
- Eat plenty of lean protein to feel full and satisfied.
- Use only lean meats in soups, casseroles, and other dishes, and limit portion sizes.
- Replace high-fat ingredients with spices and peppers to add pizzazz to your food.
- Use low-fat milk or fat-free half-and-half instead of cream in recipes.
- Replace each whole egg in a recipe with 2 egg whites.
- Simplify your menus and limit food choices so that you aren't tempted to eat everything.
- Stick to your routine during the holiday season. If you splurge on comfort foods at a special meal or party, get your diet right back on track the next day.
- Get at least 30 minutes of physical activity every day to stay fit and keep your metabolism sparking. Exercise is a great non-food way to reduce stress.
- Get plenty of natural sunlight. Winter's shorter days and longer nights may bring on fatigue, depression, and cravings for sweets and starches. Take a walk outside to lift your mood and to give your body a chance to produce vitamin D. This may take as little as 15 minutes of sun exposure on arms and face, without sunscreen, twice a week.
- It is easier to keep your weight stable than to lose weight. You can lose weight, or at least maintain your weight, by eating 100 calories less than your body burns each day. On the other hand, you will gain about 10 pounds in a year by eating 100 extra calories a day.

It led us to the arms of love that we'll never feel around us on this earth again. Dad passed away 4 years before Mom was called to her Eternal Home shortly after I completed the last verse of that rhyme.

I often wonder if I amply relayed how much I appreciated my folks. I hope so. They influenced me more than anyone with their devotion to God and family. I believe that's why it was so important for me to be a stay-at-home-mom, like my mother. Being there for little eyes and hearts to turn to anytime day or night. So, as much as possible while my littles were growing up, I worked from home; painting an occasional sign or mural to help make ends meet while juggling everything else life tossed our way.

Staying busy became the norm between caring for my children, the house, marriage issues, work assignments and helping my elder sister care for my parents' needs. 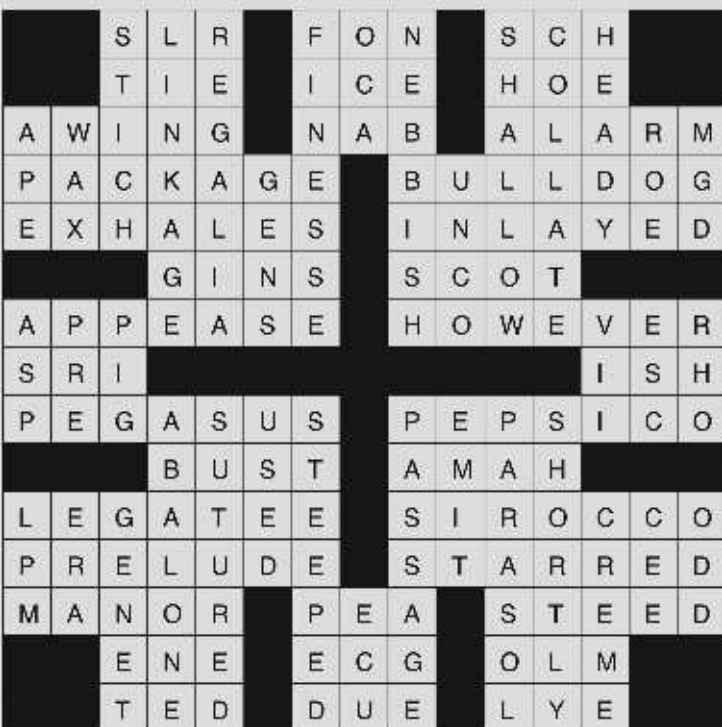

He ensures we slow down with obstacles as such; especially for those of us who are overly willful. And I'm not proud of myself to admit, even after that wake-up-call, I still carried on like a hamster on an activity wheel. When my folks, within a few years of each other were Heavenly reunited, a large part of my days abruptly became, mournful, unfamiliar downtime.

I vividly remember standing on our front porch one chilly night after "Winkin, Blinkin and Nod" were tucked in. Life was irregular with that extra evening time restlessly sitting on my praying hands. No longer was I running next door, helping bathe mom, feed her or sitting at the foot of her bed asking her to share memories, thoughts and dreams I'd treasure for the rest of my days. I stood there, the cool night air around me. I asked God to please direct my steps as that new reality hit me hard. My folks weren't there. And it hurt to accept that our earthly visits were part of the past. Something deep inside me ached to fill the hours I'd devoted to them with some new thing that would honor and keep their spirits nearby somehow.

As I prayed, looking up towards the heavens, my eyes were drawn to a very bright shining star, or possibly a planet. I don't know for sure but, I couldn't take my eyes off of it as if it were a fixation. My attention was completely absorbed when suddenly the cool air became a gentle breeze, then a whirling wind. I wrapped the blanket on my shoulders tighter around me while still fixated on that light. As the wind blew, two small, peculiar shaped clouds moved

into my frame of sight. One appeared to be a jagged formed "J". The other, distinctly a "V". Truth bumps, goosebumps, Holy Spirit hair raising skin or whatever you may call it covered me as I immediately recognized the message God was sharing. My father's given name was Joseph, my mother's, Viola. I have those bumps on my skin again now as I type this. Clearly as the letters joined together with the next windy gust, they created a rough, but obvious, heart shape around that bright light. I believe He was telling me Mom and dad were together and all was as it's supposed to be in Heaven and on Earth.

Just as quickly as the clouds formed, the word "Heartwind" sounded in my thoughts. So much so that I impulsively went inside, inspired to design a business card logo: "Heartwind Creations". I believe; as much as I believe there's a sky above me and ground below, He was telling me to spend those extra hours honoring Him with every piece of art and writing I'd create from then on. A devotion to Him, in their memory, because the one thing they impressed on me more than anything else was to keep my faith first and foremost. And since then, everytime "Old Man Wind" howls, I gaze up and remember the vow I made that night to The One Who controls all things. The wind, the waves, our breaths and numbered earthly days. And I'm thankful I was given these days to share The Good News that we all will be together again, if we graciously trust, He's in control and it's all gonna be okay. Jeremiah 10:13 "He causes the clouds to ascend from the end of the Earth; He makes lightning for the rain, and it brings out the wind from His storehouses." What a beautiful, mighty God He is. Amen.

Mind Matters: Nonsuicidal self-injury



It has happened to me many times over my career. I am asked to see someone in the emergency room and I begin to review the records. I see that the patient has come to

evaluation because they cut themselves, burned themselves, or did something else to injure themselves that fell short of an actual intentional suicide attempt with the expecta-

tion of death. Invariably, the consult request says that the person is suicidal and must be committed for involuntary treatment. But wait, not so fast.

The American Psychiatric Association's Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders, Fifth Edition, Text Revision (DSM-5-TR) has a section toward the back called Conditions for Further Study. These criteria sets have been presented to an evaluating committee and studied, and opinions and input have been requested from various experts in the field, but for some reason they have fallen short of being reliable enough to include in Section 2 of the manual with the rest of the diagnosable disorders. Future research is encouraged for these disorders to be better studied.

One of these conditions is called Nonsuicidal Self-Injury Disorder. In this disorder, the person has on five or more days in the last year done something to injure themselves in a way that might cause bruising, bleeding or pain, but that is not intended to cause their death. Per the DSM-5-TR, and corroborated by my own experience, the person does this in an effort to relieve physical or emotional pain, to resolve an interpersonal difficulty, or to induce a positive feeling state. The person usually is preoc-

cupied with the thought of self-harm, even if they don't act on it, and they know that the behavior is not socially sanctioned, such as tattooing, body piercing or the like. (It is interesting to me in that some of my patients have told me they go to get tattoos to punish themselves or to feel pain intentionally) The behavior or its consequences usually cause clinically significant distress or interference in the person's life, as most all disorders chronicled in the DSM do.

These self-injurious behaviors are usually repeated. Cutting is one of the most common and usually done on the forearm or the inner thighs, places easily concealed under pants or long sleeves. Scratching or burning, hitting one's head, or biting are other forms of self-injury. The behaviors are slightly more common in females than males. They start in the early to mid-teen years and can continue for many years, though they tend to decrease into adulthood. As you may have seen in the news at times, if students or other populations are exposed to self-injurious behaviors, a rash of similar behaviors and copycats may ensue.

Now, back to my emergency room consults. Although staff in the ER may worry that any type of self-injurious behavior means a person is seriously intend-

ing to cause harm that will kill them, and they consult mental health for that reason, this is not always the case. That being said, I also do not believe in the artificial distinction between the "suicidal gesture" and "serious suicide attempt". If a person is feeling enough pain or discomfort or self-doubt or anything else that is serious enough to cause them to harm themselves in any way at all, no matter how trivial or serious, then that fact needs to be taken at face value and evaluated seriously. People who self-harm, sometimes many times, also complete suicide. This means learning more about the mental state of the person, gauging intent, and talking to a third party who knows the person well enough to evaluate recent changes in mood, stress level or circumstances that might have lead to the act of self-harm.

Aiken County still has one of the highest rates of suicide in South Carolina. If you know someone, or you are someone who is struggling with self-harm, suicidal ideation or any other mental health issues, please call 988, your local mental health center, your primary doctor, a family member or friend, or anyone else that you trust and get help. Sometimes a cut is very superficial, but the reasons it occurred run very deep.

a total of five staffed recycling centers, where most centers accept

aluminum cans, large appliances, cardboard, farmer oil, oil/gasoline mixtures, scrap metal, tires, and used motor oil, filters, and bottles.

Also attending Friday's events were Keep Allendale County Beautiful members Barrie Tinsley, Pat Matthews, Anne Rice, Cindy Deer, and SouthernCarolina Alliance's Graci Hiers.

"It was great to have the young people from USC Salkehatchie and the Allendale-Fairfax Junior ROTC join us at the recycling center for the educational presentation and demonstration in celebration of America Recycles Day," says Anne Rice, executive director of Keep Allendale County Beautiful.

Allendale County began working with SouthernCarolina Alliance and Palmetto Pride in March 2022 to receive affiliation with Keep America Beautiful. The group has a targeted completion date set for January 2023 and has successfully formed a board of eleven trained members.

"We are very thankful for our local industries, businesses, and organizations that volunteer, participate, and support the new beautification efforts taking place in Allendale County," says Graci Hiers, SouthernCarolina Alliance's Regional Beautification Marketing Coordinator. 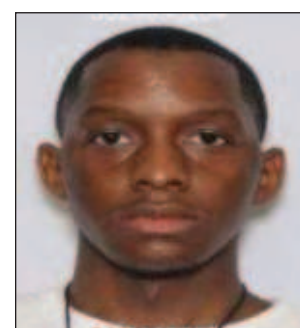


R. Johnson III sworn in as deputy chief

An Allendale man is facing charges after allegedly burglarizing multiple homes.

Kwayna Nakia Parker Jr., 23, of Allendale, was arrested earlier this month on charges of Burglary 1st Violent, Possession of a Weapon During a Violent Crime, Breaking into a Motor Vehicle, and Malicious Injury to Real Property, according to a press release from the Allendale Police Department.

The charges stem from multiple incidents on Nov. 11.

"After a call for service of a male subject with a weapon entering a home unannounced on King Street, officers and deputies with the Allendale Police Department and Allendale County Sheriff's Office were able to apprehend the subject, later identified as Mr. Parker, without inci-

dent," according to the release.

He was taken into custody after being observed by law enforcement on the premises. He matched the description of the subject.

"Shortly after he was

taken into custody, a second call occurred on Cherry Street. A male subject was observed on home video surveillance hours prior entering a residence, damaging property at another, and was positively identified as the same subject. Additionally, this same subject was positively identified by residents on Dix Street after a call for service that a male subject fitting the same description caused damage to a residence," states the release.

This additional information led Allendale police officers to obtain warrants.

Allendale Co. Historical Society to host S.C. 250 meeting

Allendale County Historical Society (ACHS) hosted an introductory meeting of SC 250 to members of the ACHS on November 9 at the James Brandt Building in Allendale.

Bill Davies, vice-chair of the American Revolution Sestercentennial Commission, attended and gave the group and overview of the plans for the celebration of SC 250 for South Carolina. Another informational meeting will be held on Monday, December 5, at 12 noon at the Carolina Theatre for those unable to attend the first meeting.

All interested are invited to attend - Barnwell and Allendale county citizens in particular.

Davies began with explaining that their group was appointed by the State Legislature in 2019 and have funding to pass through to participating counties. Its mission is to celebrate South Carolina's role in the American Revolution by educating, engaging, and inspiring South Carolinians and visitors.

Strategic goals are:
*Discover and celebrate South Carolina's Revolutionary Era, its significant people, places, principles, and events.

*Interpret, preserve, and make accessible Revolutionary scholarship and sites.

*Educate South Carolinians and the world about our state's role in the American Revolution.

*Support and promote research and cultural heritage telling South Carolina's stories from many points of view.

*Support and promote local 250th events, arts, preservation, heritage tourism infrastructure, and corresponding economic development.

The Commission is ready to assist counties in finding and preserving their Revolutionary Era Sites, People, and connect it to the Liberty Trail to increase tourism in the counties. Its lifespan is from 2019 to 2033. Their partners include the S.C. Battleground Preservation Trust, S.C. PRT, and

S.C. Department of Archives and History.

After an explanation of the important role that the Southern States and particularly S.C. played in winning the Revolutionary War, he stated that the Revolution did not end with the Declaration of Independence in 1776. Instead, the Revolutionary time span was 1770-1783. Their Commission is particularly interested in underrepresented such as women, children, persons of color, and Native Americans. He stated that those groups have been documented in playing important roles in the fight for freedom.

The county committee should be made up of diverse individuals interested in the project.

After the formation of the committee, the first step to being accepted as a participating county is for the County Council to approve a resolution creating the county committee. The goal of the committee is look into history and discover what happened in Allendale County during the Revolution. The SC250 Committee is available to provide assistance in all phases of the discovery process, beginning with the writing of the initial \$3,000 grant. Once important sites are located, the goal is to have signage, pull-offs, and to have them put on the Liberty Trail, the interactive travel website with Revolutionary Sites on it.

The Liberty Trail, a

Charitable Institution State Commission, created in 2017, obtained 21 Million dollars with goals to preserve 30 Revolutionary battlefields. To date, it has 81 new or improved Revolutionary Sites. The Ap for the Liberty Trail cost \$400,000 and is a unique ap that you question and it will respond. It is an augmented reality ap, The LibertyTrail.org.

Next steps were discussed and it was decided to hold another informational meeting during the day so that those individuals unable to attend a night meeting would have a chance to learn about SC250.

If, by chance, you never knew Barnwell's Betty Ann Smith Brown, well, you have really missed a wonderful lady who was considered by lots of folks as being their "best friend". She was just that easy to love.

In years gone by, everyone felt welcome to knock at the back door of Larry and Betty Ann's home on Hagood Avenue in Barnwell and just walk on in. The lady of the house would bombard you with one question followed by another while husband Larry sat quietly taking it all in. The length of the visit depended on how many questions Betty Ann asked. When leaving, Larry would make some kinda remark which virtually put the icing on the cake. They were both good company, and we were already

looking forward to our next visit.

Some time following Larry's passing, Betty Ann took up residence at Anchor Rehab in Aiken. She was quick to explain to all visitors that her decision was for the best; that keeping round the clock help at home was out of the question. Since son Forrest lived and worked in Atlanta, Ga. while daughter Emmylou lived in the family home and worked in the surrounding area, Betty Ann would require in home care 24/7. What if a caregiver was unable to show up for work? Who would tend to Betty Ann? So, the decision to relocate to Anchor Rehab was made for the betterment of all concerned.

Besides having explained all of this, it was her responsibility to set a good example for others to follow. Once a teacher, always a teacher. Plus, the fact this certainly proved that at 95 years, our lady was still in charge!

Here, Betty Ann was laying the groundwork for visitors who were in similar situations. Her remarks were proof that if she could pull

When I stood to depart, her hand covered mine with a downward pat saying, "Oh, please don't leave yet. I am not

through talking." I obediently sat back down.

Quite often, B.A. would call at night. She was anxious to confirm or not whether a certain rumor was founded. She knew most of Barnwell and remained interested in the well-being of its townfolks. She was forever interested enough to ask "good" questions...lots of questions. I could tell that she missed living at home; however, she

never mentioned it to me not even once.

Our lady could easily have been one of the most popular patients at Anchor Rehab. Former students continued to drop by for visits plus friends from Barnwell First Baptist Church and others who knew to look for their friend in the courtyard on sunny days. It tickled me seeing her with her pink cap shading the bright rays of sunlight from her eyes. She appeared to be somewhat "sporty" and forever grateful to family and friends for spending time with her.

Betty Ann Brown's life was one of encouraging those who lacked self-worth, guiding those who were uncertain about which steps to take, promoting positive vibes, and always and forever saying, "We do have faith, but remember to always do the right thing. Then, you'll have no regrets."

This teacher lived by example. Now all we have to do is to follow.

In closing, Philippians 1:3 states, "I thank my God whenever I think of you; and every time I pray for you, I pray with joy."

Thousands granted to local art initiatives

A record-breaking \$11.9 million in grants were awarded to arts organizations, arts learning efforts, and artists by The S.C. Arts Commission (SCAC) to ensure continued statewide access to art. \$46,227 of this funding was awarded to Barnwell County artists and art initiatives.

550 grants were distributed throughout 43 counties in the state in four categories – artist development, community arts development, arts learning, and additional programs such as accessibility grants, Folklife and Traditional Arts grants, and South Carolina Cultural Districts.

\$9.15 million of the grant funding came from the SCAC's annual grants, and the other \$2.8 million was provided through the National Endowment for the Arts through the CARES Act.

In Barnwell County, the Barnwell County Arts Council, Blackville Community Development Corporation (CDC) Partners For Progress, Williston-Elko High School, and local artist Julia Dempsey were awarded.

"The Arts Commission is committed to ensuring the people of South Carolina, wherever they might be, have access to the arts in some way. I applaud the efforts of our staff, who distribute these grants and manage programs. Our commissioners and the staff will continue working toward giving access to the arts to everyone in our state," said SCAC Chairwoman Dee Crawford in a statement.

The Barnwell County Arts Council (BCAC) was awarded \$3,375 for operating support. The BCAC's mission is to "educate and stimulate participation in the cultural arts," according to their website.

Blackville CDC Partners For Progress was

awarded \$38,397 in total between two grants for initiatives through the Phoenix Project. One grant was for partnerships and special projects totalling \$28,397, the other was \$10,000 for the development of the Content Creation Laboratory.

The Phoenix Project is under the umbrella of the Blackville CDC, and aims to bring arts to the community through educational initiatives.

"We try to put arts and education in the community, and the Content Creation Lab

would provide services for that," said Evelyn Coker, Executive Director of the Blackville CDC.

The Content Creation Laboratory is located at the Blackville Town Hall and is open to the community. Here, individuals can produce podcasts and work with video as well as host and take arts and education classes.

Currently, the Content Creation Lab is holding music by ear classes for children and adults offered by a local art instructor and musician. Earlier this year, the space was used to showcase an African Art Exhibit as well as dance classes, piano lessons, and craft auctions.

"Funding from the South Carolina Arts Commission has allowed the Phoenix Project to procure equipment and have a secure space in Blackville Town Hall to house the laboratory. All that's missing now, is your VI-SION," states the Phoe-

nix Project website.

Williston-Elko High School (WEHS) was awarded \$2,788 for spring band camp supplies including music, flag poles and silks, a locking rolling percussion cabinet, and a warmup mat for spring band camp, according to Williston-Elko High School Band Director Jessica Pym.

This is not the only art-related grant the Barnwell County Consolidated School District (BCCSD) has received in recent months. A \$15,000 per year, three-year grant partnership was awarded through the SC Arts Commission to hire a part-time Coordinator of Visual and Performing arts for BCCSD.

Grant funding was also awarded through the SC Department of Education. \$10,000 for instruments, music and sound equipment was awarded to WEHS as well as \$10,000 to Blackville-Hilda High School for acoustical panels, instruments, chairs and more.

"Funding provided through the SC Arts Commission and SC Department of Education has allowed our school district to provide stellar arts opportunities for our students! We are so thankful for these grant opportunities and hope to continue using these funds to enrich student education through the arts in Barnwell County Consolidated School District," said Pym.

Local artist Julia

Dempsey was awarded \$1,667 for art project support in creating resin and wood crafts.

Dempsey is a retired nurse practitioner and nursing professor, and has begun creating wood and resin art as an artistic outlet. To master the combination of resin and wood, Dempsey turns to video tutorials.

Dempsey dyes her work with powders rather than a coat of paint to maintain the visible and unique wood grain.

With this funding, she was able to purchase equipment to create hollow forms and supplies to continue pursuing this art form.

She hopes to begin selling bowls, 18-inch river tables, candle stands, and much more at artisan and craft shows in the next 12 months as she grows her inventory.

In Allendale County, Allendale Enterprise was the only entity awarded. The nonprofit received \$10,000 to further their program, Community Hope through Art Engagement & Empowerment.

In fiscal year 2020, SCAC set its previous record by awarding \$5.1 million in grants.

achieve their dreams," said Navarro.

"The Meeting Street Scholarship Fund is truly life changing and helps make college dreams become a reality for so many students," said Barnwell County School District 45 Superintendent Dr. Crissie Stapleton.

There is no limit to the number of students receiving this scholarship, meaning if you meet the criteria and apply, you have a good chance of being a recipient. In previous years, this fund handed out over \$3 million to 276 students in the first two years.

Navarro and his wife Kelly founded the fund in 2019 as a program of the Beemok Family Foundation, a private nonprofit that makes grants to other organizations promoting literacy in under-resourced areas also owned by Navarro.

"With no limit to the number of scholarships granted, every student who completes the simple online application and meets the fund's eligibility criteria will receive the scholarship," states the

press release detailing the organization's expansion into Barnwell County.

Some of these colleges include Anderson University, Clemson University, University of South Carolina Columbia, Winthrop University, Newberry College, and many more.

There are five requirements for students to receive \$10,000 per year toward a four year education. Applicants must live in Barnwell County (or other participating counties) and they must graduate from a public or charter school in 2023.

Applicants must complete the FAFSA and receive a Pell Grant. Pell

Grants are provided by the federal government to qualifying students who need assistance in paying for their education. Applicants must also attend one of the eligible colleges or universities.

Lastly, applicants must earn an SC Legislative Incentive for Future Excellence (LIFE) or Palmetto Fellows Scholarship. To earn an SC LIFE scholarship, a student must meet two of the following criteria: earn at least a 3.0 GPA in high school, score at least a 1100 on the SAT or a 22 on the ACT, and rank in the top 30% of their graduating class.

The Palmetto Fellows

scholarship requires students to earn at least a 3.5 GPA, earn a 1200 on the SAT or a 27 on the ACT, and rank in the top 6% of their class at the end of 10th, 11th, and 12th grade.

If a student has a 4.0 GPA, a 1400 on the math and critical reading portion of the SAT or a 32 on the ACT, their class ranking will be disregarded if it does not meet the above criteria.

be successful in high school, and it further allows them to receive the great benefit of gaining knowledge and expertise in a specialized field of study," said Dr. Stapleton. "It is my hope and desire that this expansion will allow more students the opportunity to make their dreams for the future come true."

Barnwell County falls among the top ten counties in the state with the highest poverty rates, according to 2020 U.S. Census data, which is one of the reasons the scholarship fund expanded here.

This fund aims to bridge the gap in accessibility to higher education by alleviating some of the financial burden students face trying to further their studies.

Application deadlines are scheduled once a month with the first being on December 9. Applicants will be notified of their eligibility within one week of each monthly submission deadline.

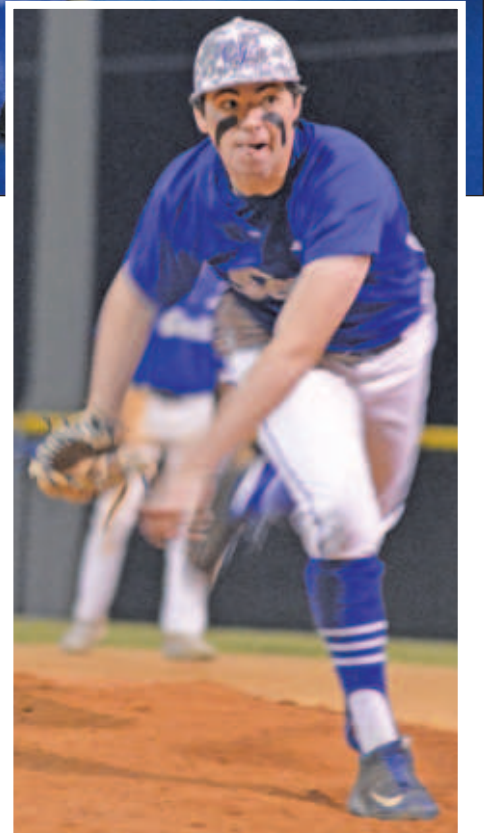

Williston-Elko's Jarrett Wootten is one of the areas top pitchers.

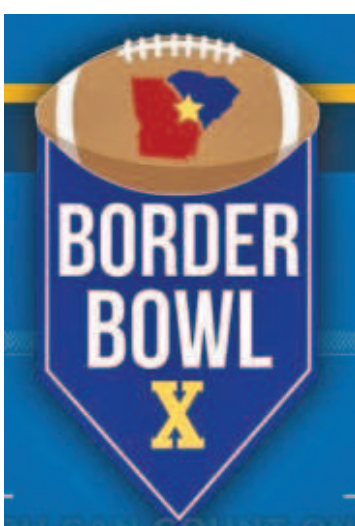
don't see him playing in many different spots throughout the year. He is a versatile player who will do whatever is asked of him to help the Blue Devils.

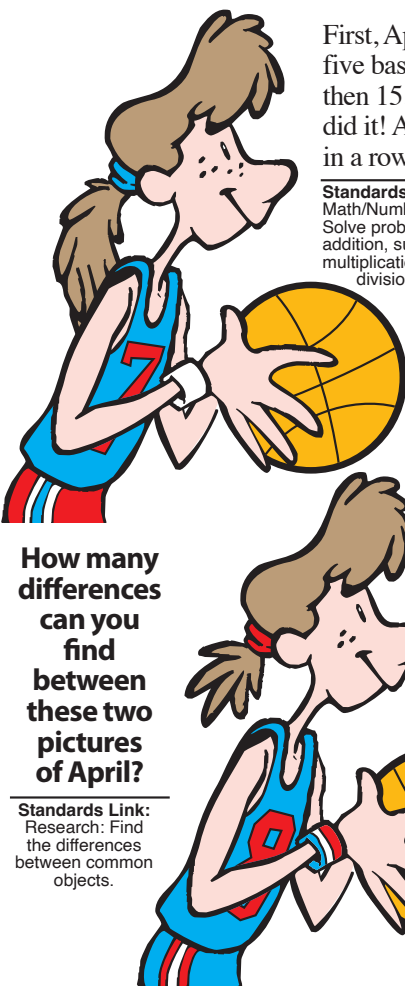

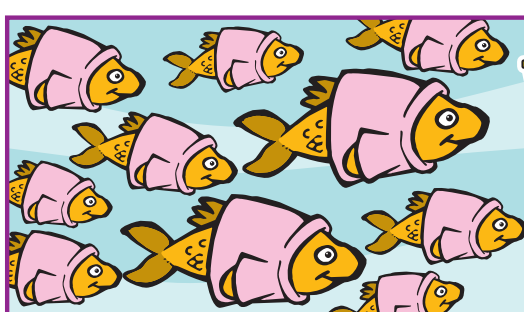
