

Warrants issued after shooting leaves one dead

The Barnwell Police Department (BPD) is actively investigating a Sunday morning shooting on Hiott Street that left one man dead.

196 Hiott Street, Barnwell, was killed in a shooting on the morning of Sunday, December 4, according to Barn-

well County Coroner Denise South Carolina Law Enforce-

The victim was located by law enforcement inside the Laventae Thomas, 24, of Hiott Street residence, but BPD is still investigating where on the premises the shooting itself took place. At the time of publication, the

BPD has issued warrants on a suspect they believe to be involved with the shooting, and are actively investigating the case further. BPD does not have a location on this individual as of the morning of Tuesday, Dec. 6.

An autopsy is scheduled for Tuesday, December 7 in Newberry.

Foster receives 22 years for burglary, armed robbery

Vorise Peeples suggested to prosecutors the man who stabbed her on June 11, 2019 in her Charles Street home spend 22 years in prison-serving one

he had been alive at the time he

assaulted her. Stephon Foster, 25, pled guilty on November 28 to armed robbery and burglary in the first degree and was sentenced the next day at Barnwell County Courthouse to 22 years in a state maximum security

"This is a defendant that the court should be scared of, and this is a person that should be sentenced to the maximum that is allowed under the negotiated cap," said Deputy Second Circuit Solicitor David Miller during the sentencing hearing.

The negotiated cap was set at 22 years due to the suggestion by Peeples, meaning the most presiding Judge Courtney Clyburn-Pope could sentence

Foster to serving was 22 years. Both charges of burglary in the first degree and armed robbery are considered violent offenses, and carry 15 years to life and 10 to 30 years to life, respectively.

Foster will serve a maximum of 85 percent of the 22 years depending on his actions while incarcerated. He has already served 1,266 days while awaiting sentencing- this time will be redacted from his overall sentence.

While being held at the Barnwell County Detention Center and then the Aiken County Detention Center before sentencing, Foster's behavior resulted in three contraband charges in

Intervening 'angels' help Florida man on journey

When Peggy Kirkland spotted Charles Leary struggling to stay upright in the whipping wind as he walked along a Barnwell road, God told her to intervene.

Leary began his journey to Virginia from the Port Charlotte area of Florida after Hurricane Ian swept through the area in late September. He is traveling this distance to be with his sister, who is struggling with brain cancer.

This trek was one he felt compelled to take and is continually proven to be on the right path.

"I just feel that God's got me here, and He's got me on this journey," said Leary. "I'm listening and being obedient. He has confirmed it so many different times, I have no question that I am right where God wants me to be.

Kirkland was yet another confirmation that Leary is where he should be.

"I know God has me, and when He has people like her come into my life it just confirms it more," said Leary.

When Kirkland saw Leary fighting the wind with every step he took on the weekend after Thanksgiving, she called her son, Barnwell County Sher-

GBMS teacher receives \$38,000 of music donations

Teachers have to pay for classroom decorations, prizes, equipment, and other supplies out of their own pockets. Most teachers are happy to buy small treats, prizes, or some decorations for their class, but for major additions, they seek other funding sources.

Donors Choose is a great site where teachers can explain an idea for a project and sometimes a person or organization may decide to fund part or all of that project. Obviously, smaller projects have a much likelier chance of getting funded than huge projects.

of these projects have been in the \$300 to \$700 range. They have been for anything from basic music supplies to more expensive instruments. Many of the projects are funded anonymously, but Mr. P's donors have also included Bill Gates and the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation. His biggest project was for about \$3,000. That all changed this past Pisacreta had three

projects totaling over \$38,000 totally funded last week. Mr. P and Guinyard-Butler Middle School will be receiving 16 pianos, 20 ukuleles, guitars and lots of guitar accessories and storage. These donations will really help provide more GBMS students a better opportunity to explore creating music

with Donors Choose, teachers submit projects for funding. After the project gets totally funded by an organization, an individual, or by many donations, the Donors Choose team facilitates the ordering and making sure the items being funded actually go to where they are meant to go. They also reveal all costs involved, so donors can be assured that what they give goes for what it was intended.

After each project has been funded, Mr. P always writes a note of appreciation to the donors. On a smaller project, he explains why these donations are so important, especially in our area. After getting a project funded to help students get new reeds and cleaning materi- funded.

If you are not familiar als that some families might not be able to afford, he said, "I know it seems like a small thing, but to some of my families, it's one less financial burden to worry about. Your help is very appreciated."

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Williston council recognizes first responders

The Williston Town Council met Nov. 14 to determine dates for upcoming events, set procedures to fill the vacant council seat, and recognize individuals who stand on the frontlines of local emergencies.

Vacant Seat

The special election to fill the vacant council seat will be held on January 31, 2023. This comes after the unexpected death of Councilman William Toney on August 23.

Although state law requires an election to be held on the thirteenth Tuesday after the vacancy occurs, it also allows for municipalities to change this election date if complications

The thirteenth Tuesday after this date would have fallen on November 22. Conversations between the Barnwell County Voter Registration and Elections Office and town officials determined November 22 is too close to the holidays to hold an election.

Ordinance #2022-03 states this is permissible as "the Town has good and valid reason to delay said special election until January 31, 2023: to allow for the emergence of candidates, to save tremendous effort and expense of the Town in conducting a special election and instead having the Barnwell County Voter Registration and Elections Office conduct the election as it routinely does."

Filing will be held January 5 to January 16, 2023. The last day to

Administrator's Re-

The Town of Williston is set to renew their insurance in 2023 for \$83,000, according to Administrator Mike Beasley, who feels this is a good rate for municipalities in light of the recent statewide increase.

It raised this year due to a 13.7 percent state increase in municipality insurance costs. In previous years the cost remained in the \$70 thousands, according to Administrator Beasley.

Some factors that impact the insurance rates for municipalities are general modification and auto liability. This set cost for 2023 can be impacted by claims made before the end of the

Administrator Beasley also explained the Williston Police Department filed for a \$4,000 grant from the Municipal Association of South Carolina which the town matched. He hopes to aid in the fire department applying for upcoming similar grants.







Every seat was filled at the November 21 Blackville Town Council meeting to learn about new jobs, discuss upcoming opportunities, and recognize recreational athletes.

TIVA Hiring

TIVA Building Products is setting up operations in Blackville and is in need of employees.

Two representatives from Önin Staffing attended the meeting to detail how interested job seekers can find employment with TIVA.

With offices across the nation but closely in Columbia and Augusta, Onin Staffing was hired by TIVA to staff their facilities. TIVA is a Canadian-based company and is exploring new ground with operations in South Carolina and therefore needs a staffing service.

Önin Staffing will be responsible for staffing in three phases and for a variety of jobs such as raw materials technicians, quality assurance coordinators, and shipping and receiving associates.

During public comment, Terrance Washington expressed his discontent with this decision and hopes the town will have open communication with local nonprofits in the future.

Data Max Business License Agreement

At the meeting, the

council voted to enter an agreement with DataMax to ultimately increase the town's revenue.

DataMax is a company based in Winston-Salem, N.C. that works with business and local governments to identify revenue streams and capitalize on them.

DataMax refers to the company on their website as the "revenue identifications and recovery specialists."

In a report detailed by Mayor Pernell, \$36 million is leaving Blackville each year between residents and businesses traveling for work, shopping, and pleasure. He and the council hope to fix this promptly.

Mayor Pernell explained all operations entering Blackville, such as a bread delivery truck, must have a business license with the town. Currently many do not, which hinders the economic development of Blackville. This is one project being tackled by DataMax to increase revenue into the town.

Sentenced: Stephon Foster sentenced to 22 years after pleading guilty

December 2020, September 2021, and February 2022.

One incident involving Foster resulted in a jail employee being terminated for their involvement in coordinating conjugal visits between Foster and a female inmate. These visits between the two inmates resulted in the conception of twins, according to Foster in a statement made during the sentencing hearing.

Another incident was detailed by Deputy Solicitor Miller, who explained Foster coordinated a plan on a recorded phone line with someone on the outside for him and fellow inmates to receive unredacted or read mail while at the Aiken County Detention Center.

To do this, he instructed the individual to purchase a legal notice stamp and list the return address as any attorney's office in Aiken County. Privileged mail (from legal represen-

Deputy Solicitor Miller also detailed an incident involving contraband where Foster stored items in his anal cavity.

When first arrested on June 13, 2019, Foster was charged with first degree burglary, kidnapping, armed robbery, attempted murder, grand larceny, assault and battery of a high and aggravated nature, and weapons law violations.

"Ât this time, I thank God that I'm still able to stand and speak," said Peeples at the sentencing hearing when giving her statement.

Peeples detailed her attack in June 2019 as she spoke to both the courtroom and to Foster.

"His red shirt was red with my blood," said Peeples as she explained how she tried to defend herself from the swings of Foster's

"When he tied me to the chair, that's when he really stabbed me on my hips, said Peeples.

During the attack, Foster's bandana slipped

Once discharged from the hospital, Peeples met with Barnwell County Sheriff's Office (BCSO) deputies to identify her assailant on June 15, 2019.

"I pointed to two people, and I looked at one of the deputies and he gave me a nod as to which one, because two looked much alike," said Peeples.

According to Foster's defense attorney, Erin O'Neal Gaddy, Peeples identified the assailant with twists in his hair prior to this photo identification with BCSO.

"Three of the gentlemen have twists, and three don't, that knocked out three individuals right off the bat," said Gaddy of the photo lineup presented to Peeples.

gation, it was 'Mr. Foster did this," said Gaddy.

In the defense's argument, Gaddy also addressed the alleged nod made by the presiding BCSO deputy to Peeples at the photo identification alleging that law enforcement had decided

who the criminal was before it was proven.

This identification was recorded and viewed by both the prosecution and defense prior to sentencing. According to the prosecution, they did not see a BCSO deputy nod when Peeples pointed to Foster's picture. *The People-Sentinel* is in the process of acquiring this footage.
"I have no animosity, he

just needs to get himself together," said Peeples.

Peeples retired from teaching at Denmark-Olar Schools in 1996; however, her impact was long-lasting as former students, now friends, spoke to her character in the courtroom.

S.C. Representative Lonnie Hosey took to the podium in support of Peeples who he has known his whole life.

"The character of this young lady is indescribable," said Rep. Hosey. "A lady who taught a lot of children, and called on me many times to lecture children who were out of place in her classroom."

God bless the young man, let God see through him and promise that this does not occur to anyone else," said Rep. Hosey.



Barnwell School District 45 students, teachers, and administrators had a moment in the spotlight on Oct. 25 when filming a video with Van Robotics, The Smart Robot Tutor company. The video was shot to highlight BSD45's district-wide implementation of STEM initiatives and recognition as a Lighthouse School District.

The Lighthouse School District Recognition was designed by Van Robotics to highlight the achieve-ments of school districts implementing STEM initiatives to ultimately build a stronger community. BSD45 is one of the first.

"We are so honored to be recognized as one of the first Lighthouse School Districts by Van Robotics for our strong STEM efforts across the district. As a district, we approach STEM as a mindset rather than just as a subject or course. Our district firmly believes that STEM Education helps prepare our students for their futures in our dynamic and everchanging world," said Superintendent Dr. Crissie

Stapleton. Óver the past two years, BSD45 has completely integrated ABii Robots into each grade level in the elementary and primary schools. ABii Robots are a product of Van Robotics, a company dedicated to delivering personalized and engaging learning methods for students to build confidence and core skills that will last a lifetime.

"It's much more fun to interact with a robot than paper and pencil," Barnwell Primary School Principal Donna Selvey.

Corder's Creative Corner: The Phantom Train Online

Last week I started teaching my students about narrative writing. This, as you can imagine, is a lot of fun for me since writing stories is what I love to do.
