New hope offered by Mission Center

LIVINGSTON -- Volunteers at the Polk County Mission Center are working to expand the organization’s outreach to the community this year with the upcoming Polk County Center of Hope.

The nonprofit group recently purchased the land adjacent to their current property on 707 S. Washington Ave. in Livingston. An updated 5,000 square foot facility will be the location for the new Center of Hope, which aims to be much more than a local food bank.

“We’re starting new programs that will help break the cycle of poverty for local families,” said Ben Marsh, director of Polk County Mission.

In addition to the existing food bank,

the center will provide assistance to those seeking education, employment and counseling.

Education programs will be available to families, while residents will have the opportunity to find jobs through training and resume help. Counseling services will offer aid for people with addiction or those simply needing spiritual guidance.

The idea for the organization’s new vision began with prayer and the help of local pastors in response to the county’s growing need to address issues of poverty. According to a recent study by the R.W. Johnson Foundation, Polk County was ranked last in Texas for quality of life.

The new land has been cleared and building construction is set to begin in March. The updated facility is expected to be completed in May and will replace the old building still in

operation. The original facility will be demolished after the opening of the Center of Hope.

The Mission Center gives special thanks to the volunteers who have helped with the construction efforts so far. This includes Diana and Gary Hunter for use of their dozer and Hendrix Machinery for use of their track hoe. Trustees and guards from the Polunsky Prison Unit also assisted with the grounds work.

Residents of Polk County who are ready to help with the new programs are encouraged to contact their church for more information on volunteer opportunities. Onalaska declares 3 buildings unsafe

ONALASKA – Three structures were declared dangerous or unsafe, clearing the way for their removal when the Onalaska City County met last week.

During their February meeting, the city council declared the structures as dangerous or unsafe after the owners failed to respond to a show cause order issued by the city. One structure, located in Canyon Park and owned by Richard Collins, was included in the order, but a provision was made to have the city attorney determine what else needed to be done with the owner currently held as an inmate by the Texas Department of Criminal Justice.

The other properties — one in Impala Woods owned by Robert E. Kosha and the other in Ponderosa Ridge owned by Realty Investment Corp. — have been declared dan-

gerous and the city will begin removal and bill the owners for the cost of clean up.

Mayor Roy Newport also displayed photographs of the old flea market on Highway 190 near Bridgeview, showing new owners cleaned the area after the purchase.

In other business, Newport asked council to take no action on the bids for the construction of the park pavilion. He noted several promised bids for the work had not been received and the council agreed to wait until a special meeting later in the month.

Police Chief Ron Gilbert reported the department responded to 497 calls, 120 of which were dispatched by the county. They also made three felony and 13 misdemeanor arrests, issued 165 citations and 38 warnings, drove 4,690 miles and opened 50 new cases. Council accepted the resignation of Officer Forest Tooley.

Fire Chief Jay Stutts was cheering his daughter on with

the Wildcats basketball team and was unable to attend the meeting, so Newport filled in to report 31 medical calls in January and two each landing zones, lift assists and motor vehicle accidents. Four structure fires, one vehicle fire and a grass fire were also handled. A total of 63 man-hours were recorded. Lee Parish reported that permits issued for the month included one new home, four manufactured homes, two additions or modifications and one repair, increasing the city value by \$87,500. Parish issued six warning of violations and placed two red tags on structures. There were two voluntary removals in Canyon Park and one in Kickapoo Forest bringing the total for 2014-15 to five.

During the library report, it was announced that the Polk County Chamber of Commerce would hold an open house there Feb. 24 at 5:30 p.m. The public is welcomed to attend. Light refreshments

will be served and prizes will be awarded. Council declined to appoint Cathy Lott to the library board, questioning if her residence is within the city limits.

Library statistics for January included the addition of 298 new books with a circulation of 802 items to 771 patrons, 268 of whom used the computers. Faxes and copies brought in \$249.50, with \$48 in fines and \$14 new memberships from people who live outside the OISD school area. Donations totaled \$33.20.

Council passed resolution 15-005 authorizing the mayor and or city secretary to file an application for a Texas Parks and Wildlife local park grant. It would be a three-year program and is a 50 percent grant with the balance paid either by city funds, in-kind services, or a combination thereof.

Council approved the 2015 Polk County Basic Emergency Management Plan.

Goodrich annexes pair of businesses

GOODRICH -- The City of Goodrich annexed the Valero gas station and U.S.A. Recycling on Highway 59 North in its monthly gathering on Thursday.

As part of the annexation agreement, both businesses will receive city sewer services. Speedway Goodrich (Valero) will donate \$10,000 and U.S.A. Recycling will add \$5,000 toward the purchase of a new lift station.

“The meeting was great and we made a lot of progress,” Mayor Jeremy Harper said. “I am glad to see that the city is expanding. I am also happy to welcome both Valero and U.S.A. Recycling to the city. It will generate a lot of much-needed tax base for the city that we can use on infrastructure and for community development. I want to let both of them know that I am thankful they will be a part of the city and that the city is able to provide a service they need.”

An item was accepted for a lift station to be placed near the newly annexed Speedway

Goodrich Valero. The city is currently acquiring an easement pending a survey of that area. Harper was given authority from the council to allow installation and construction for the project, as well as finalize the annexation process.

The city has also accepted the voluntary annexation of Mario Rivera on Loop 393. Rivera petitioned the city for annexation earlier in the month.

Council passed a resolution to search outside the city limits for a depository. The city is looking to choose a bank outside the city limits, as it has no option within.

A resolution to submit a 2015-2016 Texas Community Development Block Grant application to the Department of Agriculture was approved. If accepted, the city would use the funds for a city community center.

A callout alarm for lift station No. 1 was approved, as has fencing around the city water tower and lift station No. 3.

An item to purchase hot or cold mix or city street repairs was tabled to bid the cost of all city street repairs.

Livingston council gets ‘best’ 2014 audit report

LIVINGSTON -- February’s meeting of the Livingston City Council Tuesday reviewed the city’s financial audit and accepted a bid for the Walnut Street water tank repainting.

“The city has an unqualified opinion, which is the best you can get and it is what it gets every year,” Harper and Pearson accountant Steve Palmerton said of the audit. “What that basically means is that we found the accounting records to be in good order and did not encounter any difficulties on the audit. The results were not quite as good as they were for 2013, but 2013 was probably a record year for the city, so that’s not saying anything terrible.”

Total cash at the end of 2014 was \$7,605,732. That compares to \$9,186,665 in 2013. Almost all of that decrease relates to the money that was used for the library and water system improvements, according to Palmer-ton.

Certificates of deposit for 2014 were \$1.5 million, unchanged from the balance at the end of 2013.

“In looking at the balance sheet for the city you can see that the city remains in strong financial condition. At the end of the year, net assets combined were \$31,234,404; compared to \$29,833,913 at the end of 2013. The balance

sheet still looks very strong for the city.”

The three incumbents whose term ends in May — Judy Cochran, Elgin Davis and Ray Luna — have all filed for re-election. Those interested in filing for city council may do so until the Feb. 28 deadline. Martha Johnson will serve as the presiding judge for the May 5 election.

Bids opened on Jan. 28 for the Walnut Street water tank repainting project for interior and exterior work. Project Engineer Kirk Bynum said the project’s low bid was from Service Utility Group for \$153,600, which was accepted.

The council accepted bid authorization for the old Murphy Memorial Library building located at 601 West Church Street. The building and property will be appraised and possibly sold. Bids will be collected and the city has the option to accept a bid.

City Manager’s Report Major projects currently underway:

The SRMPA/ Electric department express feeder from the Livingston substation to the Ogletree substation to afford additional reliability in service. of relocating telephone and television cable from the old utility poles to the new poles so the removal of old poles can be done. Substation work remains to be performed on this project. SRMPA has received bids for the substation portion of the project and expects to award a contract on Feb. 26.

The TRA Water Treatment Plant Expansion Project increases the plant to a 5 MGD plant versus the current 3 MGD plant with numerous upgrades to plant. It ensures long-term water supply to Livingston for the future. Council members will tour the facility to see the progress on the project as the weather improves.

CDBG Grant Project in the Livingston Housing Authority on Circle Drive \$275,000 in grant funds. The City received the contract with the Texas Department of Agriculture for signing and is adopting resolutions and policies and procedures required under this federal grant.

The project engineer has recommended that the project be held for bidding in spring 2015 as this is not a good “winter project.”

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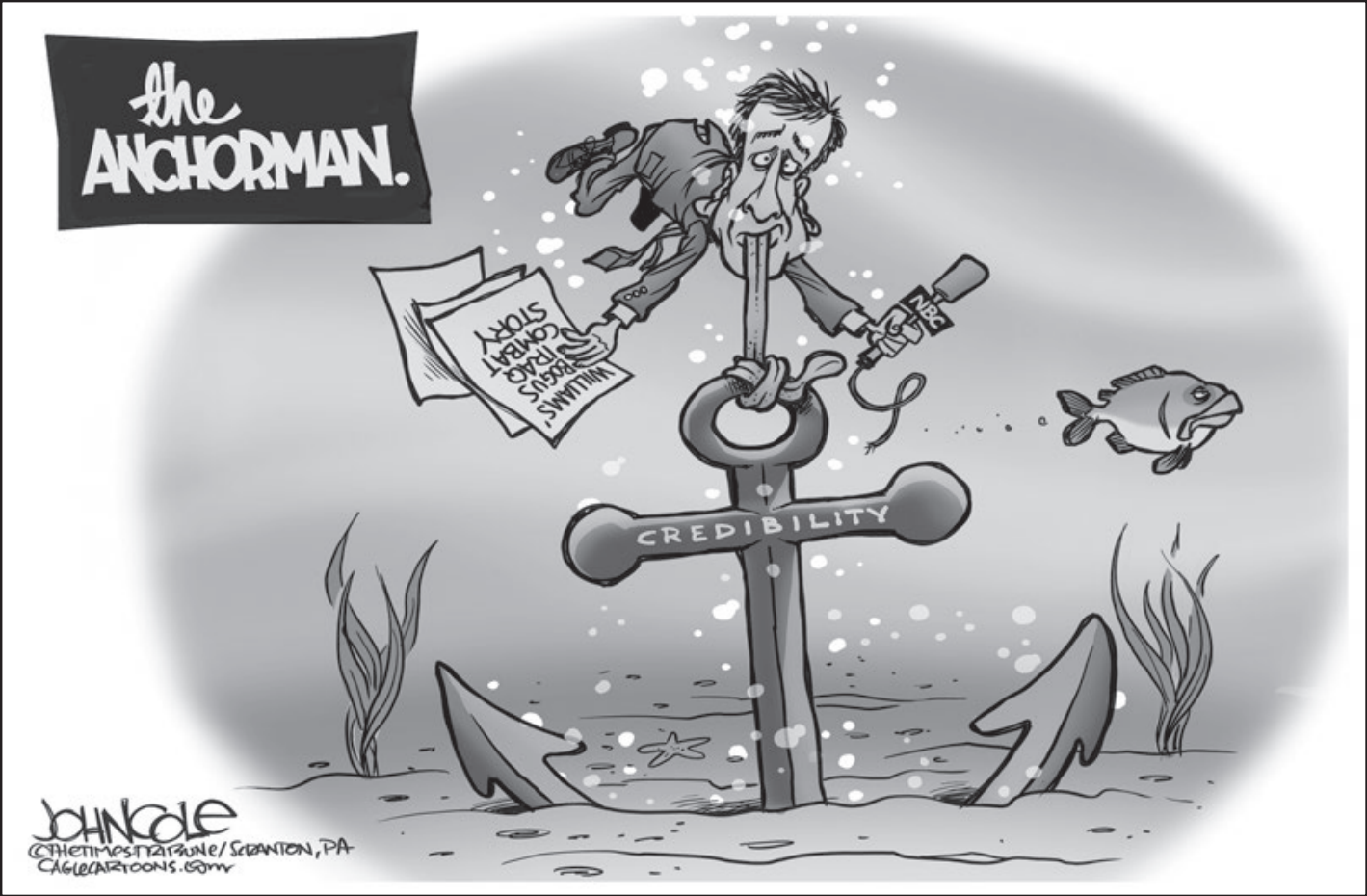
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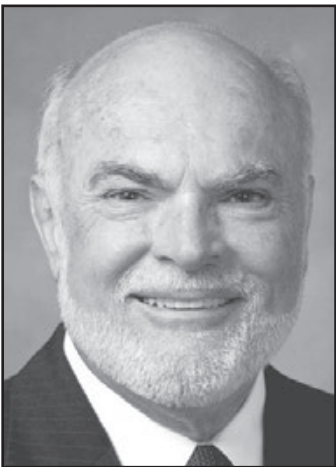
My Five Cents...

Senate receives gun control bills

If you watched the Grammy awards this past weekend, you would have seen 11 recording artists who were born or based in Texas receive 13 Grammy awards. We can all be proud of them for representing our great state.

Here are five things that happened this week at your Texas Capitol:

- 1. State Affairs Hearing**
Much like last session, many bills regarding gun control have been filed in the Senate this session. The Senate State Affairs committee will hold a hearing this week on two of those bills. The first is Senate Bill (SB) 11 by Senator Birdwell which would allow faculty, staff, students and visitors, who have met the requirement for a Concealed Handgun License (CHL), to carry firearms on a university campus without penalty. The second is SB 17 by Senator Estes, which would allow those with a CHL to carry holstered handguns in public. Currently, Texas allows shotguns, rifles and other long guns to be carried in public, but not handguns.
- 2. TANF Drug Testing**
I have co-authored SB 54 by Senator Nelson, which ensures individuals applying for the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) program are drug-free as required of participants who receive government assistance through this

program. This bill would require every adult TANF applicant, and minor parents if they are the head of their household, to submit to a drug use screening when they apply for and renew their applications.

This bill disqualifies applicants at different levels who fail a drug test. However, children would continue to receive benefits through a “protective payee” even if their parent or caretaker is disqualified for TANF benefits. I believe taxpayer dollars should not be spent to support drug habits. This bill will help an important program continue to provide assistance for those who are trying to better their lives.

3. National Guard at Border

This week I participated in a press conference with

Lt. Governor Patrick and other members of the Texas Senate to propose a plan to keep National Guard troops on the state’s border through May of this year. Lt. Governor Patrick stated there has been a significant decline in the number of people apprehended trying to enter the country illegally in the last few months, due to the increased enforcement. In addition, he noted that \$1.87 billion worth of cartel drugs have been seized. More than \$815 million in additional funds is laid out in the Senate budget proposal to continue this surge for a longer period of time.

4. Tuition Set-Aside

In 2003, the Legislature deregulated tuition at institutions of higher education, allowing them to set tuition at a rate necessary to operate their university. At the same time, the Legislature required universities to set aside no less than 20 percent of an undergraduate’s tuition and no less than 15 percent of tuition charged to a student in a graduate or professional degree program. This money is used to provide assistance to students with a financial need. While the set-aside was not meant to be an extra charge to the students, universities have to raise their tuition to cover this set-aside.

I recently filed SB 464, which would eliminate these

tuition set-aside provisions. While I was not in the Legislature at the time this legislation passed, I believe this is a problem which costs students money. Even if a student has taken out loans to pay for their education, they will have to take out much more than is needed for their own education to pay for someone else’s tuition. The set-aside program has created a tax on a student’s tuition, an issue I think needs to be addressed and changed.

5. Gun Tax-Free Weekend

I am a co-author of SB 228, which was filed by Senator Brandon Creighton. This bill, which is modeled after the tax-free weekends held annually for gun owners/sportsmen in Mississippi and Louisiana, would create a sales tax holiday for individual purchases of firearms and/or hunting supplies.

As hunting season begins at the end of August or early September, this bill would place this sales tax holiday on the last full weekend in August. It would provide a sales tax benefit to hunters prior to the hunting season and will give retailers in Texas an economic boost. Contributions hunters make when purchasing equipment or licenses to engage in their sport relieves taxpayers from a significant burden of the financing for state wildlife habitat restoration and conservation efforts.

Stealing valor comes with a price

For the last several days reporting on the shocking exposure of fraudulent claims by NBC News anchor, Brian Williams has been non-stop. The Williams meltdown and that of NBC over a pattern of aggrandizing first person accounts will be historic.

With the end of conscription and an all-volunteer Army in 1973 it is estimated that only about 5% of families have a close relative in today’s military. Can it be that Brian Williams did not fully appreciate the contempt that members of our Armed Forces, particularly those in harm’s way, have towards those who would make false or exaggerated claims of heroism?

As senior political correspondent Bret Hume pointed out, Americans are not hesitant to topple those in the highest positions of our society, but are likely to forgive and want to see such figures rehabilitated and returned to their former status. The decision announced the evening of 10 February that disciplinary action would consist of forfeiture of pay for six months and the possibility of

returning to NBC at a later date seems appropriate in that we want to be able to trust those who provide us news and even more so to our elected officials.

It is appropriate that we put the Williams’ scandal in a broader context. The top Democratic contender for the presidency in 2016 seems to have recovered well from her acknowledged embellishment of the truth in recounting her landing in Bosnia in 1994, supposedly facing a hail of small arms fire.

The Rev. Al Sharpton misled the American public by publicizing the hoax that Tawana Brawley was raped by six white men in 1977-1978. More than ever he is a welcome guest at the White House and is the primary advisor on race relations.

As we know now from leaked tapes from MIT Professor Gruber, the architect of Obama Care, a.k.a. the Affordable Care Act, he advised that only by deception would the American people accept his program.

Americans yearn for such integrity in our leaders. Keep that in mind as the 2016 presidential election approaches. Perhaps you too will trust another well-known Christian surgeon, now retired, who from humble beginnings became chief of pediatric neurosurgery at the prestigious John Hopkins University School of Medicine.

Scenes from February 1990

Heritage Society observed 10th anniversary

On Feb. 19, 1990, the Polk County Heritage Society marked its 10th anniversary. As you might expect from a group devoted to preserving history, the celebration included a look back at their accomplishments.

Outgoing President Helen Malone explained that the group “came into being to assume some of the load of restoring and preserving structures important to the history of Polk County. It was intended to help with fund raising for various projects.”

Malone made the statement just prior to handing the gavel over to her daughter, 1990 Heritage Society President Molly Anderson.

As an arm of the Polk County Historical Commission, the society first met on Feb. 19, 1980. Its first president was Alvin Holley.

Holley said the idea of

the Heritage Society sprang from a conversation he had with Oscar Landry, who was on the Historical Commission. They shopped the idea around town, found a lot of interest and arranged for an organizational meeting.

At that meeting, the initial board of directors was chosen: Holley, Landry, Honey Simons, Nell Wilkerson, Mr. and Mrs. R.L. Rothe, Mrs. Ross Smith, Ruth Bass, James Shotwell, W.A. Hancock, R.B. Hille, Edward W. Jones, Grace Holman, Greg Peak, Inez Watson and James Anderson.

There had always been more desire to preserve his-

tory than there was money.

In its first year, the society’s income totaled \$990 -- \$180 of which was from dues and the rest from donations.

Still, there were some gains made during those first 10 years.

Its first project was to restore the Jonas Davis Log Cabin and establish Heritage Park on land donated by George and Segrest Webster. In 1981, the Wall of History on the courthouse square was started, but stalled following the deaths of Woodville artist Clyde Gray, who was creating the wall, and of Landry.

In February 1981, members of the society joined with a committee that helped save the old Campbell-Foreman building on the courthouse square.

Work on the log cabin restoration continued in 1982 and, also in that year, the society began its Christmas Tour of Homes.

In 1984, the cabin and Campbell-Foreman building were featured on The Eyes of Texas TV program and, for the first time, the cabin was opened for public tours.

That summer, the community responded with enthusiasm to retrieve the old Swartwout Ferry, which had surfaced in the Trinity River due to low water levels. With the help of numerous volunteers, the old ferry was hauled out and was put in County Judge Wayne Baker’s stock pond to prevent its drying out and further deterioration.

Other highlights of the society’s first 10 years including helping Frances and Walt Broemer plan a 50th anniversary celebration for Alabama-Coushatta Chief Fulton Battise.

The first May Day and Juneteenth celebrations at Heritage Park were held in 1987.

In 1988, following partial collapse of the ceiling, the Campbell-Foreman building was stabilized. That was also the year that the old Carter Bros. Locomotive No. 5 was first lighted for the holiday season.

In 1989, a stone chimney was erected the Jonas Davis Log Cabin. In November of that year, the cabin was featured in *Texas Highways* magazine.

All in all, it was a productive first decade for the society.

Also in February of 1990:

al weeks visiting school children, explaining the legacy of Martin Luther King Jr. and others in observance of Black History Month.

Charles Ryans of Livingston shared a black history exhibit in the Livingston City Hall Auditorium that featured items he helped gather over several years. He had developed his interest in local history when he was only about 8 years old.

fight,” King said. “We got it down by nine from 20, and we had a couple of key breaks, a free throw, and a turnover. We could have got it even lower, but the kids didn’t quit — that’s the main thing. We’re young and we’re going to keep working. I don’t use that as an excuse though, I tell them, ‘basketball is basketball and we’re going to

keep playing hard.’ If we beat Spurger Tuesday night, we’ll be tied for third and we’ll have a playoff with them.”
In their first contest, Spurger was victorious 64-47. However, the youthful Goodrich squad held a lead on the road at halftime, 27-22 in January.
“We were capable of winning and I still challenged

them to do better,” King said. “If we can get fired up and beat Spurger, we will be in the mix. It’s been a long way from the night against Premier Academy (first game of the season).”
Leslie Koroma led the game’s scoring with 25, as Darius Cooper had 17, Ezavier Bacon finished with 15, and Delvin Davis added 11.
Goodrich was able to share the wealth, with Fisher getting 15, Javarius Nickelberry contributing 12, Cristian Garzon had 11, and Jordan Landers scored 10.
For Leggett, the play-off card has already been

punched, but Stewart knows there is one last bit of District 29-1A business to take care of.
“We are now getting ready for High Island. We’re not getting ready for the playoffs; we are getting ready for High Island. And wouldn’t that be a surprise — losing to a team that’s 0-13. But, that’s why you have to take everybody serious. You have to learn to be consistent.”
Once the Monday game at 6 p.m. has concluded, the coach believes his team is slated to play Moulton in the first round of playoffs.

two minutes left in overtime.
Four Lady Pirate foul shots later, a 65-64 Goodrich lead with possession and less than a minute remaining would set up a Leggett press. After reaching across the baseline on the inbound pass, James would shoot two technical shots, making one.
Jamariyaa Harrell then put back a rebound off a miss for a 68-64 lead. James made another free throw, pushing the margin to five.
Barlow hit a long-range jumper from the top of the key to separate the teams by two.
James was fouled again and made one of two at the line. But, the junior guard then got a steal at midcourt that allowed a drive to the rim to seal the game.
“I have got to give it to Goodrich tonight,” Leggett Coach Terri Barlow said. “We played a really good game and a better game than we have been. This is the second best game we’ve played since we started district. I am very proud of my team. They battled, they fought, and they didn’t give up.”
Kaycee Mitchell led a 6-0 run to begin the contest, draining two of the three hoops.
James broke the momentum by collecting a free throw and two field goals on the next three trips down the court for a 6-5 deficit.
Each time Leggett could establish a lead, Goodrich had an answer. A 14-11 Leggett first quarter ended an eight-minute period of streaks for both squads.
With 4:20 remaining in the second quarter, the Lady Pirates had extended yet another lead, this time of eight before Hill called a timeout.
“We started off in a zone, because I didn’t like how we played them man-to-man the first two times we played,” Hill said. “I switched to the man in the second quarter and told them, ‘defense and free throws are going to win this.’ I asked if they could play man-to-man and they said they could.”
The lead would extend to 27-18 before James could again interrupt. The first trip down was a made bucket and the next two were assists to Jada Henderson.
“We got a slow start,” Hill said. “Our shots weren’t falling. Barlow, Criswell and Mitchell were all hitting their shots. They slowed down a little bit in the second half

and our shots started to fall. We were a little jittery at the beginning, but once we got our confidence, I feel like we did a very good job.”
But, the Lady Pirates remained in front as the three kept the scoreboard rolling.
A 32-24 halftime score meant Leggett had an advantage, yet the Lady Hornets were within striking distance.
“I told my sophomores and juniors, ‘I hope y’all aren’t nervous, because we have been here before.’” Hill said. “We need to let these freshmen know you have their backs.’ I have been looking for that leadership and I really feel like I got it tonight.”
A Barlow jumper with 5:14 left in the third gave Leggett their largest lead of the game to that point at 41-28.
With 3:47 and an 11-point lead, Barlow collected her fourth foul, taking her out of the game until under a minute in the quarter.
Goodrich was able to chip away at the lead in that time, cutting it to eight, with the frame ending at 46-38.
A three on the wing by Goodrich’s Denedra Taylor at 5:45 cut the lead to five at 50-45.
After the Lady Hornets climbed to within three,

Leggett received a three-point play from Barlow to push the lead back to six.
A steal and James break-away layup brought the game to the slightest of margins at 56-55 with just 40 seconds remaining.
A Leggett free throw put the Lady Pirates up by two.
James hit two free throws with 30 seconds on the clock to tie the game for the first time since the opening tip.
Criswell then got her chance at the line, hitting one of two. A foul on the rebound put Taylor on the line with 23 seconds. She was able to sink the last of two to tie the game at 58 each.
“We relaxed in district and we never should have,” Barlow said. “When we played anybody besides Goodrich, we were laid back, had a lot of turnovers, and just weren’t that good. We need to work on our man defense. I tell them all the time if you play good defense, the offense will come to you. Free throws are another one that we need to focus on.”
James was the game’s high point, pouring in an impressive 53 and Taylor was second on the team with nine.
Barlow led the Lady Pirates with 32, while Criswell had 20.
With the win, Goodrich

will have a first-round bye in the playoffs, while Leggett is expected to travel to College Station for a game versus Prairie Lea.

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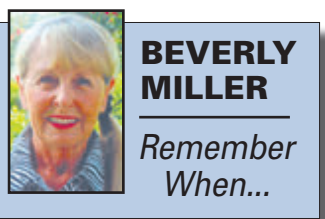

Unique drillers brought fresh water to East Texas

The Rev. Julius C. Cole and George Stokes were a unique team that drilled many water wells in Polk, Liberty, San Jacinto and Montgomery counties and were responsible for bringing water to the homes on the Alabama-Coushatta Indian Reservation. Before Cole and Stokes drilled the water wells for the reservation, the tribal members would have to carry water to their homes as far as a quarter of a mile.

Later, the state of Texas would give each newly married Indian couple a house and water well. They hired Cole, who was a minister, and Stokes to drill the wells for the Indian couples, and

for the ones then living on the reservation. They were paid \$1 per foot and an average well was 28 feet deep.

This was a unique water well drilling team consisting only of Cole, Stokes, and a mule named "Kate." The only equipment they had was an "A" frame, block and tackle, a homemade windlass and two augers, which were operated by a combination of man and mule power — their only source

of energy. This team, using only the materials and power stated above, could produce a water well in a day's time.

Stokes used an ancient method called dowsing — which is known throughout East Texas as "water witching" — to locate their drilling site. Stokes would use a freshly cut "V" shaped peach tree limb from one of his own peach trees and would firmly grasp the limb with both hands and walk around the area with the "V" pointed upward until it started to pull downward. This would be the drilling site.

Howard Jones, Texas Indian agent, stated the team drilled over 80 wells and never drilled a dry hole. This information was first published in a magazine called "NOW" that featured the article about this team and their techniques for "water witching" on Oct. 7, 1955. It was later reported with pictures in the Heritage Edition of the Polk County Enterprise on Oct. 7, 1984.

At the end of the day, they would load their equipment and their faithful mule, Kate, into Cole's red pickup and start for home.

Cole and Stokes were a closely related team. They not only worked together drilling water wells, but also attended church together at the Providence Baptist Church, where Cole was the minister and Stokes was a deacon. Cole's son, Raymond J. Cole, married Stokes' niece, Ruthie G. Nelson.

Descendants of both men are still living in the Livingston area. Raymond Cole, Jerrel Dean Cole Smith and Elaine Cole Roper are the children of Cole and his

wife Eva. They are presently living in Livingston.

Stokes had moved a house to the church for the parsonage. Cole's daughter, Jerrel Dean, came running out to where he was in the process of drilling a well on the property and asked him to take her to town to buy her a pair of ballerina shoes. But, when he refused to let her have her way, Jerrel, grabbed her cat, "Malee," and threw her down the well (about six feet deep at this point)!

Jerrel Dean stood watching her daddy. Stokes, smoking on his pipe, stood patiently to see just how the pastor was going to handle this problem. Cole grabbed

a pine sapling branch and switched Jerrel Dean's legs! He called out to Eva, his wife, to come see what "her daughter" had done. Jerrel Dean's mother took her in the house and switched her legs again. Jerrel Dean said to me, "That was a lesson well learned at six years old."

Bro. Cole worked drilling wells until 1961 until at the "age of 61" he came in one day from work, walked to the foot of the bed and dropped dead. Eva, his wife said, "At least he didn't have to suffer."

Modern water well drilling is now operated by a different method. After Cole's death, Jerrel Dean and her husband needed their well repaired. They called Miller's Pump and Supply in Livingston. The owner, Emanuel Miller, was my dad. My brother Larry Miller, drove up to their home and saw "herds of cats" running everywhere. He was in need of cats. He repaired the well and loaded up some of the cats to take home with

him to clear his barn of rats.

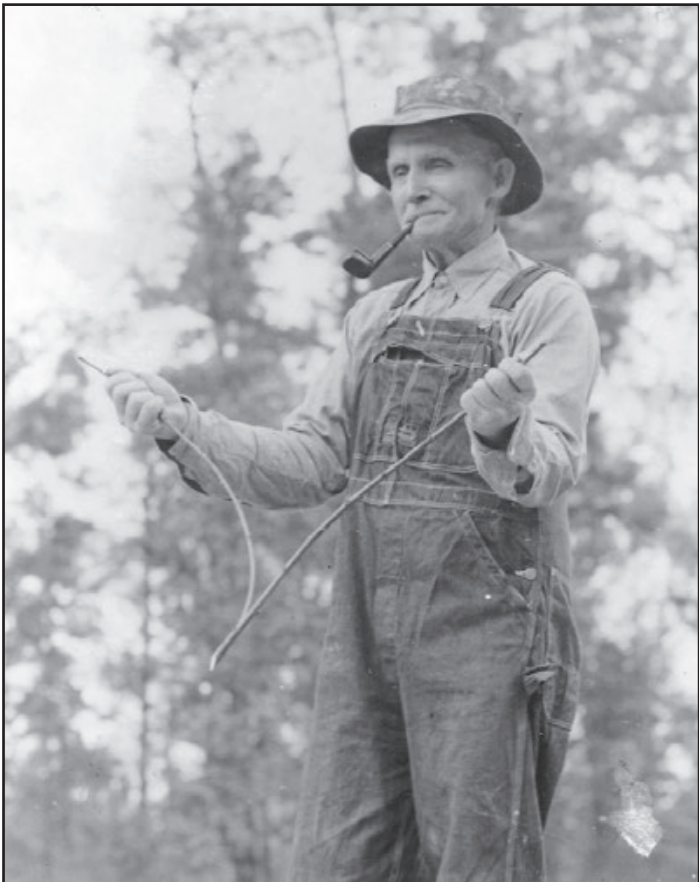
My other brother, Dennis Miller, was a jokster.

One day he pulled up to a drilling site and the owner of the property walked over to ask Dennis, "Just how do you know where to drill this well?"

Dennis always carried a dog with him to work and at this time his "dog of the day" was Moses. Dennis said,

"Well, I just tell Moses to go out and find the right spot!" Dennis trained dogs to do all kinds of unusual tricks. Moses would run around, sniffing at the ground as he made a circle or two, then he suddenly stop and start digging in the dirt. Dennis would say, "Boys set the rig up here." Now, I never saw this,

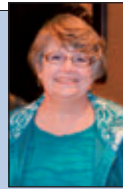

The right scanner provides benefits

About five years ago, I invested in a Fujitsu Scan Snap S1500 document scanner and created a Dropbox account. Keeping up with paper, pictures and media is easy.

The first decision was what kind of scanner to purchase. The scanner included with the printer was too slow and would not perform a duplex scan. I checked into the Neat Scanner. It is tailored for tracking finances and is not designed for pictures. I wanted a scanner that was fast, could scan both sides at once, held a lot of pages and scanned pictures, as well as assisting with finances.

At the time, the Fujitsu Scan Snap S1500 was very highly rated and fit my criteria. The reviews said it was a favorite among attorneys. I purchased it from Amazon and my life has not been the same since. The

physical file cabinet has all but disappeared and paper, as well as pictures and videos, are easily located.

I started with the financial records and progressed to cookbooks, music, appliance manuals, wedding and shower invitations, and even thank you notes from the grandchildren.

A document scanner like the Fujitsu can operate just like the Neat Scanner you see advertised on TV. There is special software available. The easiest way is to design your own set of folders.

When you are setting up the scanner, make sure you go in to the scanner options and check two boxes: the continuous scan and make this a searchable PDF box. It takes a minute or two longer to convert the document to a searchable PDF, but it is well worth it.

Dropbox offers a terabyte — 1,000 gigabytes — of storage space for about a \$100 per year. For me, it is worth it to be able to store everything in one place and

easily access it as needed. The files are stored on your harddrive, as well as in the cloud, so you have two copies of everything. Remember to back up your computer on a regular basis.

I started with the financial records. I created my own filing system, which will make an accountant cringe, but getting the end of the year's tax info to the accountant is a matter of e-mailing the files.

The next project was the kitchen. There were cookbooks everywhere. I kept my favorite cookbooks, as well as the books that had sentimental value. I purchased a paper cutter, tore the backs off the books, trimmed the rough edges and starters scanning. All my cookbooks are at my fingertips at all times. My iPad is now my recipe holder.

On to the music. This one has taken a while. Not only do I have my piano, organ and handbell music, I have my mother's and great grandmother's piano music as well. I no longer have to spend hours searching for music. This searchable PDF allows me to locate it quickly. Download your music into For Score, arrange to suit

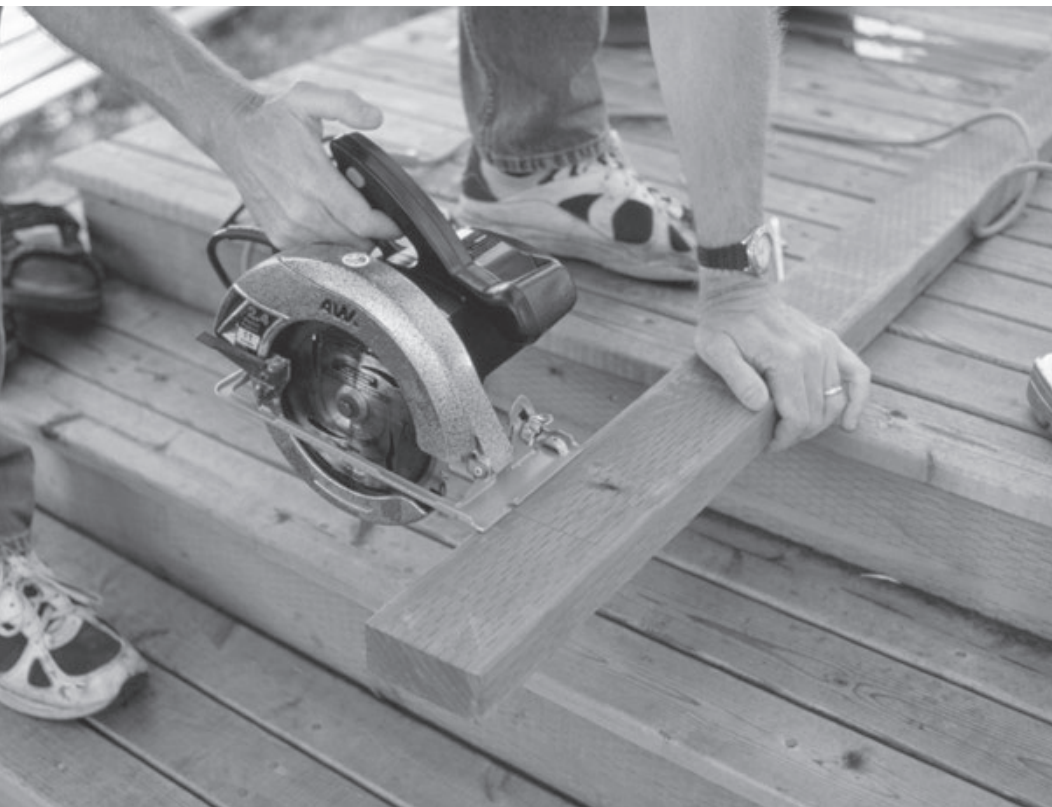

Later Dennis came back and she was still standing in the same spot where she had fallen off, waiting for Dennis to come back and pick her up!

Last week while singing with Holy Grove Baptist Church at the Tall Pines Nursing Home and at the Bradford, I met Jerrel Dean. She then told me that my brother, Larry, had worked on their well. I never dreamed that she was a “well digger’s daughter,” and that we have many things in common.

I’m so glad that Jerrel Dean offered to share this article about “water witching” that was published in *The Polk County Enterprise* dated Sunday Oct. 7, 1984.

White calls for constitutional convention

AUSTIN – Legislation related to calling a convention to amend the U.S. Constitution was the topic of a Feb. 11 press conference called by state representatives James White, Paul Workman, Phil King, and Rick Miller.

Article V of the U.S. Constitution provides that Congress shall call a convention for the purposes

of proposing amendments to the Constitution upon the application of two-thirds of the several states. Support for calling such a convention has been building in Texas and around the United States.

White, who's District 19 includes Polk County, is carrying House Bill 1109 (H.B. 1109) which condenses the process for

application and sets the guidelines for an Article V convention.

White said the "Compact for America" Compact for a Balanced Budget was the "delivery vehicle set up to bring a balanced budget amendment to the U.S. Constitution at an Article V Convention."

The other bills introduced at the Article V Press

Conference include Workman's House Resolutions 78 and 79 which reaffirm the 1977 resolution. The 1977 resolution is a standing application for an Article V Convention proposing a balanced budget amendment to the U.S. Constitution.

Miller's House Resolution 77 is the Convention of States application.

King's House Bill 1110 sets the delegate selection guidelines and legislation on delegate behavior.

The press conference moved along smoothly as members laid out their bills in a formal manner. White along with the other Article V legislation authors were joined by state representatives Dan Flynn,

Dwayne Burns and Mark Keough.

"It is important to remember that the states created the federal government. We are proud to be Americans but we are also proud to be Texans," concluded Rep. White.
