Inmates escape from bus

Two inmates escaped after contract prisoner transport buses were pulled to the side of Highway 190 just east of FM 1276 Friday afternoon.

Initial reports were that two transport buses were on the side of the road, repairing one that had a flat tire, while two inmates escaped, assaulted one of the guards, took a weapon and ran into the woods, according to Polk County Sheriff Byron Lyons.

"They ran from the bus, and while doing so, got a weapon away from an officer and knocked him down and ran into the woods," Lyons said. "We had backup and support of officers from the DPS, district attorney's office,

(Alabama-Coushatta) Indian Reservation Police Department, and several different agencies that responded. TDC dogs were on standby, but a short time after we arrived on the scene, we got the first subject in custody. The second subject, who was in possession of the firearm, was actually caught a half a mile from here, where he'd run off into the woods and ran up on a homeowner. The homeowner found him and held him there until DPS got there and took him into custody. By the grace of God, this incident was able to be brought under control in just a matter of 30 or 40 minutes without any injuries."

Prior to escaping, one of the inmates was able to grab an unsecured firearm from the

As of 5 p.m. Friday, 5,255 ballots had been cast during early voting for the Nov. 8 general election – 3,337 in Livingston, 462 in Corrigan and 1,456 in Onalaska.

Early voting for the Nov. 8 general election began Oct. 24 at three locations and is available from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. through Friday. The three locations are the Polk County Judicial Center located at 101 W. Mill St. in Livingston, the Onalaska Sub-Courthouse located at 14111 U.S. Hwy. 190 West in Onalaska and the Sechrest Webster Community Center located at 100 W. Front St. in Corrigan.

Extended early voting will be available from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Tuesday at the Polk County Judicial Center only.

Ballot concerns arise But are soon fixed

A mapping oversight caused some confusion at the polls this week that could have affected both the Chester ISD school board election and the Corrigan-Camden ISD bond issue election had it not been discovered and rectified.

While Chester ISD is primarily located in Tyler County, a portion of the district extends into Polk County, and as such, residents of that portion of the school district vote in Polk County. Voters in the Chester ISD will elect four school board members in the election.

Just a little to the east, voters in the Corrigan-Camden ISD will go to the polls to vote "for" or "against" two propositions in a bond issue election.

Proposition A is "The issuance of \$21,490,700 of bonds by the Corrigan-Camden Independent

Elvis returning to East Texas

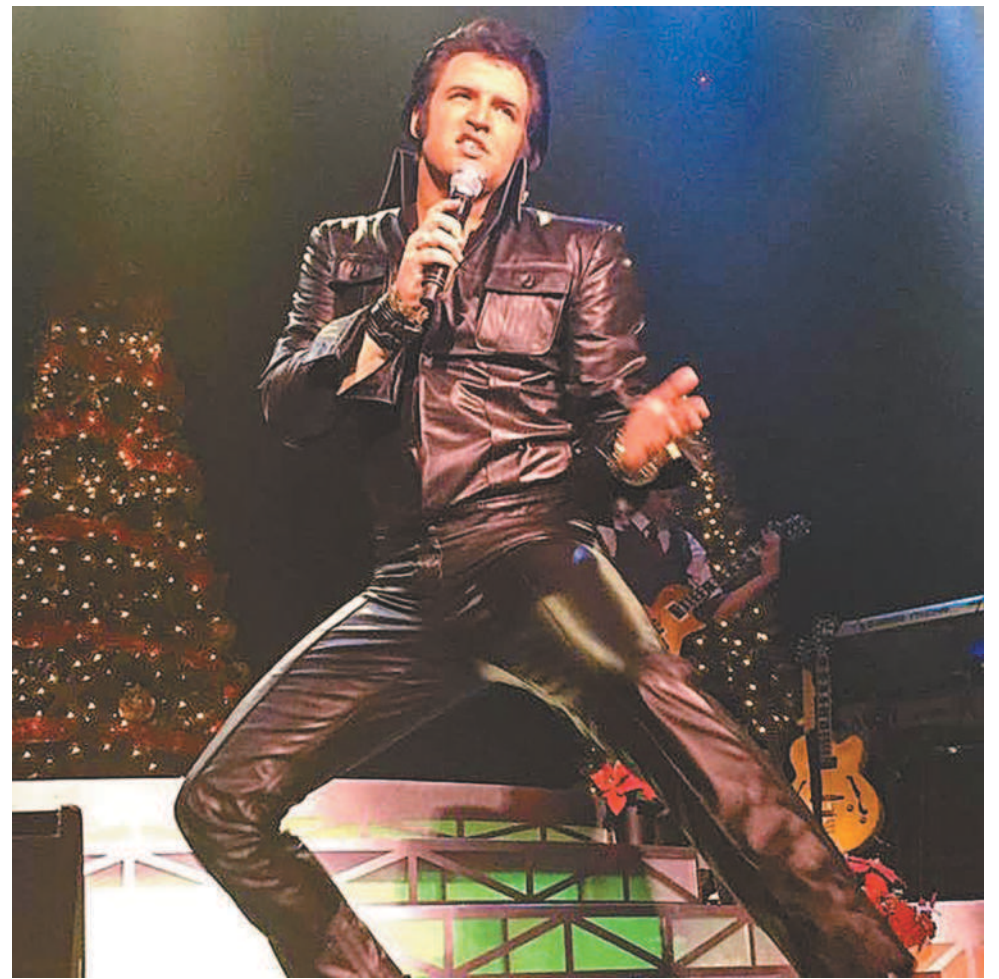
He's got the hair. He's got the dance moves. He's even got the pinky finger positioned just right. His attention to detail has made Travis Powell one of the best Elvis Presley Tribute Artists in the world, and he'll soon be performing two shows nearby. He will be at the Lufkin Pines Theater at 7 p.m. on Nov. 4 and at the Huntsville Old Town Theater at 4 p.m. on Nov. 6.

"Every day I do vocal rehearsals and watch videos of him for an hour. I believe the more you watch him, the more it becomes second nature and you can do the moves from muscle memory. When it's muscle memory, and you're on stage, you can relate to the audience better. All the little things you watched and heard come to you and you're not worried about what moves you are going to do next," Powell said.

Powell placed in the top five at the Ultimate Elvis Tribute Artist Contest in Graceland in 2014. He will perform an array of the King's music, including his early stuff, some '70s songs and beloved "Aloha" tunes. He will be accompanied by an eight-man band, "Edge of Reality," and will change his clothes to coordinate with the songs.

During the performances, Powell wants audience members to be taken back in time for a couple of hours and feel like they really are at one of Elvis' concerts. Although he never met Elvis himself, he continues to meet people who tell him stories about seeing Elvis live.

"It's a bonding experience when people tell me stories about Elvis. I appreciate the people who love Elvis as much as I do. They get it because they loved Elvis then and they still do," he said.



Powell said that one of the reasons Elvis is "still alive" is because his music isn't just appealing to people who were around when he was performing. He said he is hopeful that young people who attend his show will go home and look up Elvis' tunes and get hooked.

"Elvis' music was timeless. I believe Elvis, even though he had his faults, was a good guy who sang from his heart. I believe we, people in general, gravitate toward people that you can tell they believe what they sing. I don't believe he ever sang a song that he couldn't connect to in some way," Powell said.

Being able to relate to Elvis is what Powell said has made him one of the top Elvis tribute artists in the world.

"Me and Elvis are both

Southern guys. We were brought up the same way -- in terms of how much I practice and how much I really pay attention to the details in the little things -- like how he stands or how he holds his finger -- gives people a better illusion that they are watching Elvis," Powell said.

Ever since Powell was 4 years old, he has been enamored with Elvis, but it was just four and a half years ago that he started impersonating him professionally. Since then, he has traveled the country, bringing his blue suede shoes with him. He has won eight prestigious Elvis impersonation contests, including "A Tribute to the King" competition in Milwaukee this year. In 2014, he won the Heart of the King Horizon Award for

best new Elvis tribute artist, which afforded him with the opportunity to perform on the same stage that Elvis performed on in Vegas from 1969 to 1977.

Powell attributes his success to his devotion and daily study of Elvis. He also has his own sideburns and orders his jumpsuits from the company that owns the rights to Elvis' original patterns.

"I try to make the tribute as authentic and as close to Elvis as I can get," Powell said. The all-female group and National Doo Wop Champions, "Shake Rattle & Roll," will open the concert and also perform as backup singers for Powell.

LIFE TRIBUTES

Jo Ann Battise

With the passing of Jo Ann Sylestine Battise, The Alabama-Coushatta Indian Nation of Texas has lost one of its most revered leaders in its history. Jo Ann Battise has left as her legacy to the Tribe an outstanding record of achievement and accomplishment, and an overall record of success and benefit to the Tribe in the many Tribal leadership offices she held during her lifetime. She was born November 10, 1939, in Livingston, TX, to parents Harry R. Sylestine and Doris J. Sylestine. She passed away on October 23, 2022, at home on the Alabama-Coushatta Indian Reservation (ACIR), with her loved ones by her side.

Her achievements began early in her life. During her attendance at Big Sandy School, while she was in the 8th grade, she was invited to play with the Girls' Varsity basketball team, and went on to become the starting forward during all four years of high school. She learned the importance of teamwork at this point in her life. Later, she was recognized by the Alabama-Coushatta Tribal Council and inducted into the ACIR Tribal Hall of Fame. With the recognition of her athletic skills, she graduated from Big Sandy High School with hopes of becoming a high school coach, and enrolled in Sam Houston State University (SHSU). She attended SHSU for one and a half years on a DAR scholarship.

After her marriage, she moved to Dallas with her husband, where she served on various volunteer committees, one of which was the Dallas Civil Rights Commission. One event led to a tremendous uproar in the Mexican -American community and extensive press coverage. As a result, she was interviewed in some detail by the local press, where she not only learned civil rights law, she learned the power of the press and of the importance of public relations.

After her youngest entered public school, she enrolled at North Texas State University (NTSU) in Denton with a determination to finish her degree plan to become a coach and graduated in August 1975 with a Bachelor of Science degree. NTSU is now known as the University of North Texas (UNT). As her first job after graduation, the United Fund hired her as a Sports Center Director in Dallas. She then accepted a position as a Personnel Staffing Clerk with the federal

government (HEW), where she learned all aspects of personnel work, such as recruitment, planning departmental budgets, and evaluating applications and putting together a Best Qualified (BQ) List for supervisors to review and hire. She then entered an Intergovernmental Personnel Agreement (IPA) program, working with the Coushatta Tribe of Louisiana. She was then selected as the Dallas Delegate to the Texas Leadership Program where she learned daily governmental operation of major Texas cities.

When she started working for the Tribe, her intent was to provide and bring about beneficial services for Tribal members. She felt that that is her legacy to the Tribe, her contribution to Tribal history. Her work for the Tribe began with a short-term contract to prepare a budget for BIA. Which then evolved into a Temporary Tribal Administrator position, which then became a permanent position.

Her first accomplishment was the building of the Cultural Center in 1994. She coordinated work with the Finance Officer and the Procurement Office to enable

the new building to replace the decades-old building.

The Gym Caretaker was looking for activities that could be sponsored in the gym. She suggested to him that he could start youth programs in the gym. Why not sponsor a Children's powwow. He did at that time, and the Children's Powwow continues to this day.

After seeing the difficulties faced by Tribal members upon the death of loved ones, emotionally and financially, she presented a Burial Insurance Plan to the Tribal Council in 1997. The plan was approved and became effective in 1998. It covers all enrolled Tribal members. Of all the programs that she has initiated. This program is the one she was most proud of.

After being a Tribal Administrator for 10 years, she became the General Manager for the Muckleshoot Tribe in Seattle. Then she accepted a position as a Claims Examiner with the Social Security Administration in Seattle. After a period of two years in that position, she retired with 12 years of government service.

She returned to the reservation and was selected as the Senior Peacemaker for the Tribal Court. With her guidance, the Peacemaker Court became a Model Court nationwide. She served in this capacity from 2009 to 2014.

In her third year as a Senior Peacemaker, she was invited by the Governor to serve as a member of the Texas Supreme Court Commission for Children, Youth and Families for a term of three years. She served as the Native American Liaison for Native American children in Texas to the Commission. She resigned in 2014.

In 2015 she was elected to the Tribal Council and served as the Tribal Chair for two years. As Chairperson, during the last year of her term, a Realty Department

was created to stabilize housing issues. As another issue, and although per capita distributions from Natural Resources and Longevity pay began when she was a Tribal Administrator, the Tribal pay scale needed a major upgrade. A pay scale upgrade was approved increasing the Tribal employee hourly pay rates.

At this time, due to increasing personal health reasons, she retired without ever coaching a team.

The legacy that Jo Ann Battise has left is that of a fearless, forceful advocate and leader of the Alabama-Coushatta Tribe of Texas. She will be so remembered and honored by the Tribe far into the future for her leadership and protectiveness of the Tribe.

Survivors include her husband of 63 years, Arnold Battise, daughter Freida Ann Battise, and son Russell Battise. She was predeceased by son Gary A. Battise; all of the Reservation. Other survivors include grandson Christopher Swift, of Seattle, Wa.; Marcie Meguinis Swift, Sullivan J. Swift, Olivia J. Swift, and Avery J. Swift, all of Calgary, Alberta, Canada; and numerous nieces and nephews, including Tina Battise and Sheila Alec, both of the reservation.

Debra Battise-Kleinman, CRE, and Rev. Keith Tucker officiated the services at the Multi-Purpose Center of the Reservation on Friday, October 28, 2022, at 11 a.m. Visitation was at the same location on Thursday, October 27, 2022, at 5 p.m.

Pallbearers are Kirk Battise, Dustin Battise, David Battise, Jordan Alec, Colin Poncho, and Carson Janis. Cochran Funeral Home is in charge of the services.

During periods ahead of an election, The Enterprise does not accept letters to the editor urging voters to vote for or against candidates in local elections.

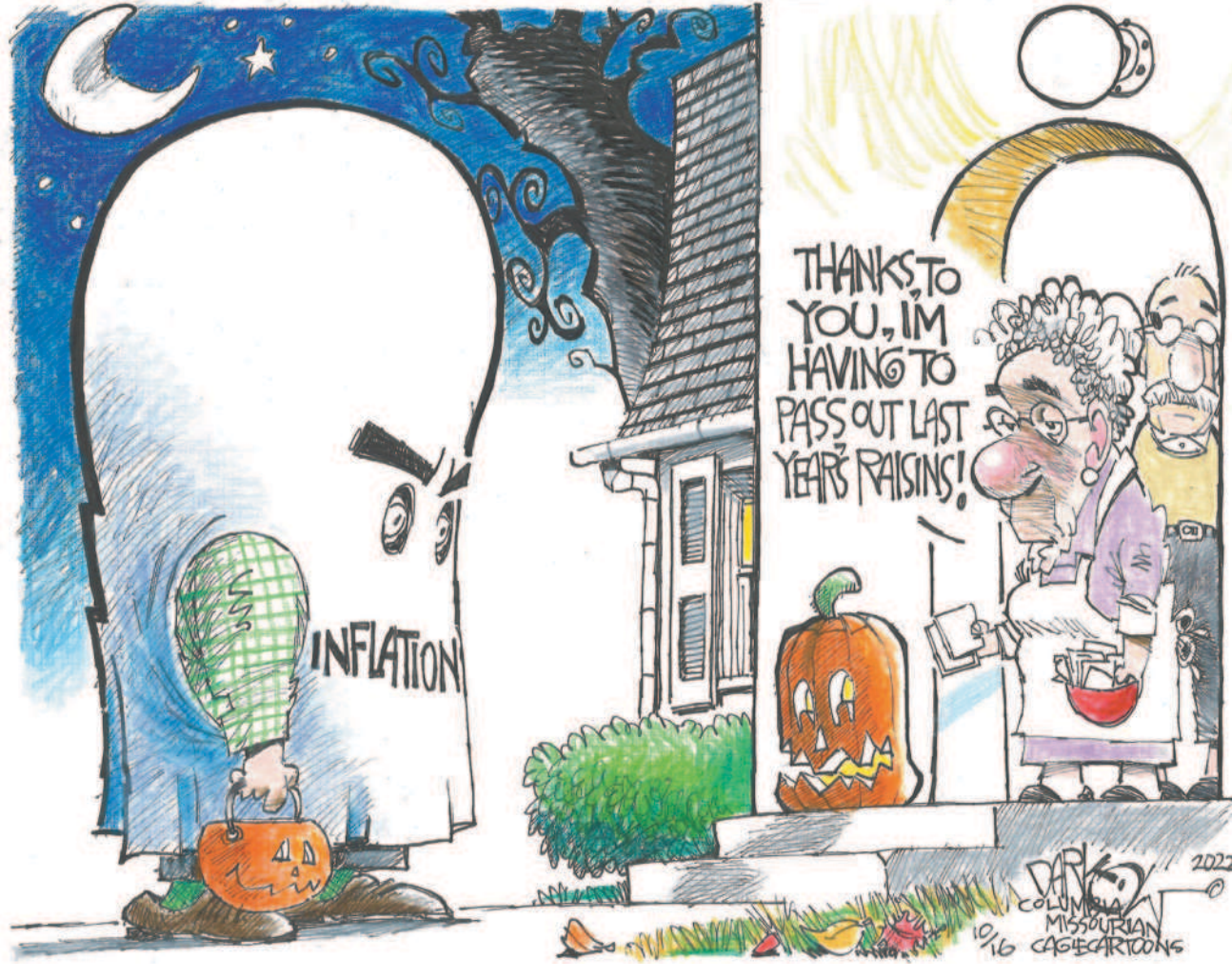

Support for horses sought

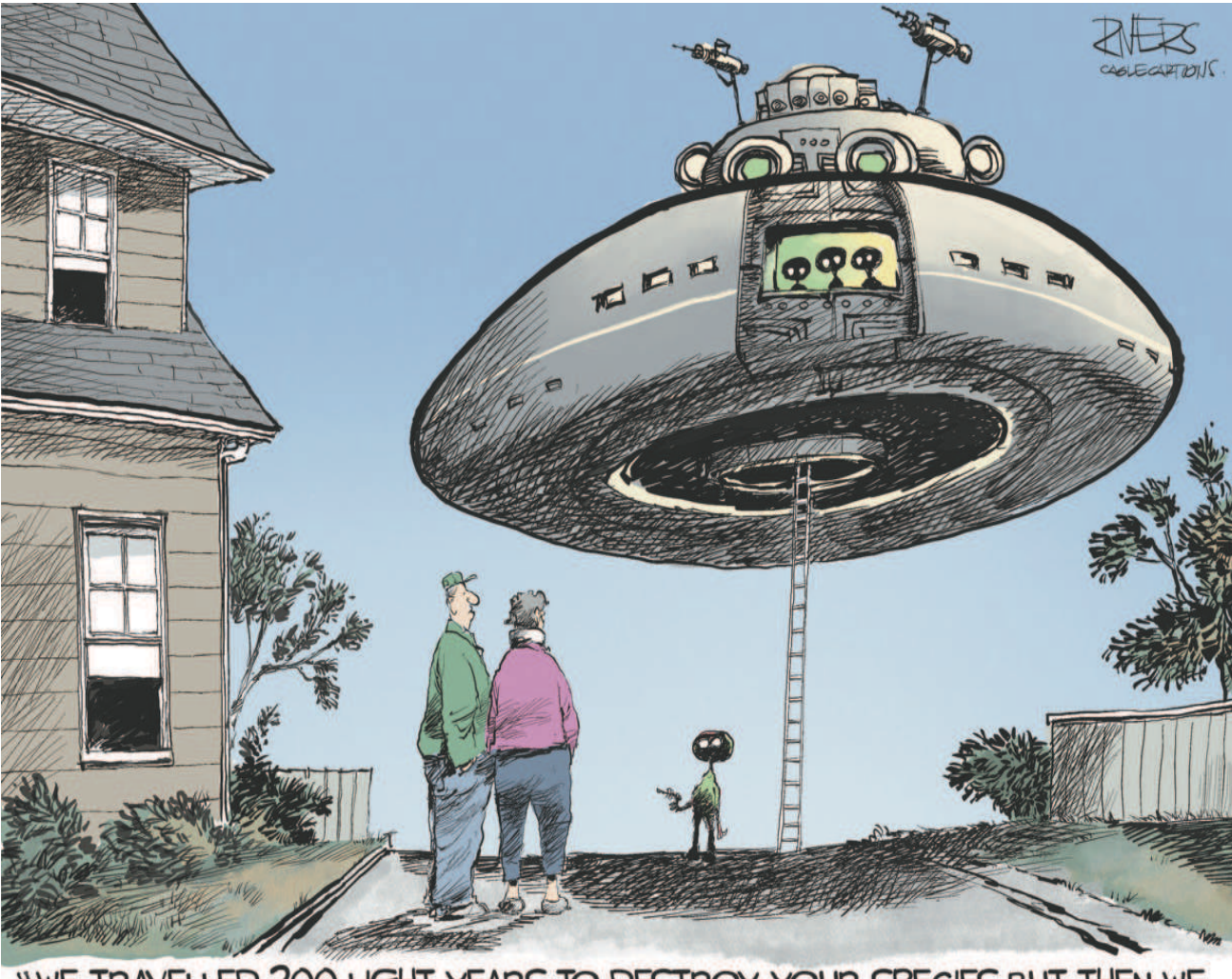
To the Editor:

Texas ag facts presented

For this week's article I want to do something a bit different. Instead of diving into details on a certain topic I want to expand your understanding of agriculture in Texas and its impact. By providing bullet points of Texas ag facts, I hope you gain an appreciation of the diversity of agriculture in Texas and how important agriculture is for Texas' economy.

- Only 1.3% of Texans are producers (directly work in agriculture production).
- In the 1930s one producer fed 4 people, now one producer feeds 166 people in the U.S. and abroad.
- The economic impact of the Texas food and fiber sec-

tor totals about \$100 billion. •86% of land in Texas is in some form of agricultural production. •98.5% of Texas' agricultural operations are still run by individuals or families.

Texas leads the nation in number of farms and ranches, with 248,416 farms and ranches covering 127 million acres.

•Cattle is the top Texas ag commodity (by dollar value) followed by broilers, cotton and milk. These four commodities make up roughly 80% of top Texas commodities.

•95% of Texas is privately owned and 83% of land is classified as rural.

•Of Texas' 171 million acres of land, 141 million acres are devoted to private working ag lands.

•Only 10% of Texans live

in rural areas of the state. •Less than 1% of Texans are landowners.

•Texas ranks 4th in spinach production in the U.S. California, Arizona, New Jersey and Texas grows 98% of the commercial spinach in the U.S.

•Rice is an important crop in the upper and mid coastal regions of Texas. Texas is one of only 7 states that grow rice.

•Texas is one of only three states that grow sugarcane. Florida and Louisiana are the other two states.

•Texas ranks first in the nation in the number of cattle and calves, accounting for 13% of the U.S. total. Texas also ranks first in the number of cattle operations and the value of all cattle and calves.

•Texas is the top producer

of cotton, hay, sheep, goats, mohair and horses. Some of the state's other important crops are vegetables, citrus, corn, wheat, peanuts, pecans, sorghum and soybeans.

•Texas is the fourth leading state in pumpkin production. Pumpkins are grown commercially in the panhandle.

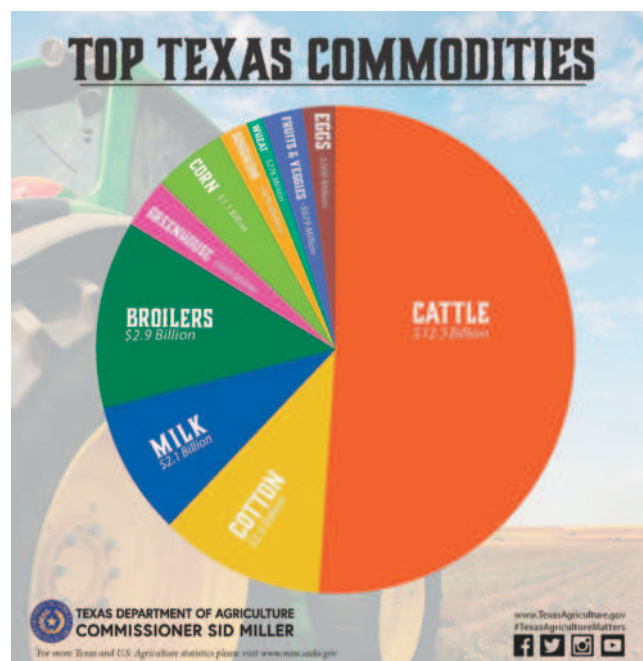
•Texas' wine and grape industry is one of the fastest growing ag industries in the state.

•For 36% of producers in Texas, farming is their primary occupation.

•The average farm in Texas is 411 acres.

•Although cattle farms (beef farms specifically) dominate in numbers in Texas, farms with poultry inventory showed the largest increase since 2012.

•The average age of Texas



farmers and ranchers is 59. •1 of every 7 working Texans (14%) is in an agriculture-related job (support industry, distribution, sales, retail, restaurants, etc.). I hope you enjoyed these quick facts on agriculture in Texas. Farmers and ranch-

ers across this state work hard to provide your family with a healthy nutritious meal. This is important to remember when you sit down to enjoy dinner tonight so always thank our farmers and ranchers for all their hard work.

front of the bus. Officers subsequently located the firearm in the wood line.

Lyons said it has been a while since anything like this has occurred. He said the situations are possible because there are so many fluid, moving parts. The sheriff commended his department for being prepared, well-trained within the county, and working together to respond in a decent amount of time.

Both inmates were transported to the Polk County Jail and charged with felony escape. The incident is still under investigation and additional charges are pending at this time.

Polk County Tax Assessor-Collector Leslie Jones Burks, who also serves as the county’s voter registrar, said she dealt with the appraisal districts in both Polk and Tyler counties and that it took her all of one afternoon and all of one morning, but that she got it fixed.

“I wasn’t going to let it go until I got it fixed,” Jones Burks said.

Chester ISD Superintendent Dr. Paul Drake agreed.

“It was brought to my attention by a concerned citizen that when he went to vote, he was unable to vote for the Chester School Board, but was able to vote on the Corrigan bond issue. I understand he told them this was a mistake and they said they would void it and he would have to do a provisional ballot. I spoke to Leslie Jones Burks. We were told it only affected three people that live on McKnight Lane and they have fixed those.

“I’m not overly concerned because I was told it was corrected and fixed and such a small grouping. If it was a larger grouping, that would be different. The concerned citizen that came to me, I don’t know if it was fixed on the same day or the next day, but I was told it was fixed. I don’t know if he ended up with a regular ballot or a provisional ballot,” Drake said.

McKnight Lane is an offshoot of the Barnum Loop between Corrigan and Chester.

“I know the gentleman it affected,” Jones Burks said. “He owns all three houses on the road. He lives in one and the other two are rentals.

“When I received my information from the mapping department, it had them (the three houses in question) in the Corrigan school district. I knew that was wrong, so I contacted the appraisal district. They were paying school taxes to Chester. The pictometry was wrong in Polk County. His property is the county line,” Jones Burks said.

Pictometry is a patented aerial survey technique for

producing oblique georeferenced imagery showing the fronts and sides of buildings and locations on the ground. Photos are captured by low-flying airplanes, depicting up to 12 perspectives shot from a 40-degree angle, as well as an overhead view of every location flown.

According to Jones Burks, not everyone can go online and look at the pictometry, only those with passwords.

“The layer was incorrect on the pictometry, but was correct on the regular mapping,” Polk County Chief Appraiser Chad Hill said, emphasizing, “Our maps are used for appraisal district business only.”

In Polk County, the tax assessor-collector has always served as the voter registrar and was responsible for disseminating the voter registration cards while the county clerk and her staff have run the elections. However, that will change effective Jan. 1, 2023.

An order transferring voter registration duties from the tax assessor-collector to the county clerk was approved by the Polk County Commissioners Court during its regular meeting June 14.

“We met, Commissioner Purvis (Precinct 3 Commissioner Milt Purvis) and myself, with (County Clerk) Shelana Hock and (Tax Assessor-Collector) Leslie Jones Burks and discussed combining the two instead of having them split and Shelana has very graciously agreed to consolidate those services in her office,” County Judge Sydney Murphy said, emphasizing that the change would not be made prior to the November election.

When asked she is relieved to no longer have the responsibility that comes with being voter registrar for the county, Jones Burks said, “It was hard for me. It was very hard. I’ve worked in that office for 31 years. Bob Willis hired me.”

It is hoped that having all election-related activity handled by one office will eliminate some of the issues that have plagued Jones Burks’ office in recent years.

Several residents from the Midway Loop attended the May 24 meeting of the Polk County Commissioners Court, with two of them addressing the Court during the public forum. Their concerns were that when they voted in the March 1 primary election, they were able to vote in the race for Precinct 4 commissioner. However, when it came time to vote in the May 24 runoff election for Precinct 4 commissioner, they were unable to and were told they were in Precinct 3. Some were allowed to vote provisionally, but others were not given that opportunity.

The confusion was the result of precinct boundary lines being changed in the fall of 2021 following the decennial redistricting that occurs when new population numbers are revealed based on the Census. Redistricting is the process of dividing or organizing an area into new political districts and the purpose of redistricting is to establish and maintain voting districts that are faithful to the principle of one-person, one-vote.

Several members of the Court, as well as the audience, expressed concern regarding people being able to vote in the primary but not in the runoff. One referred to it as “unintentional election-tampering” and others questioned the legality of it.

In January of 2022 it was discovered that a number of newly mailed voter registration cards were incorrect, predominantly affecting citizens in Precincts 1 and 4.

According to 2020 Census figures, Polk County gained 10.4% in its population since the last accounting in 2010, up from 45,413 to 50,123. The Austin firm of Allison Bass & Magee LLP—which serves as general counsel for the Texas County Judges and Commissioners Association of Texas and as litigation counsel for the Texas Association of Counties—was retained by the county to assist in examining the data and developing a redistricting plan for the county.

Texas Law allows a devia-

tion in commissioners’ precincts of up to 10% before boundaries are required to be redrawn and Polk County was over—in total—by 30.66%. Precinct 1 was 18.26% higher than the ideal population and Precinct 3 was 12.4% below the ideal, so a shifting of boundaries had to occur.

“We had eight different maps sent to us from Allison Bass. We got the last one the day before we were out for Christmas. I was just hoping and praying I put everyone in the right one. While everyone else had four days off for Christmas, I was off Christmas Day only because I was at the office dealing with maps. I was hoping and praying it would all work out,” Jones Burks said.

At the time, Jones Burks said if anyone had questions, they could call her office and she could look it up on a spreadsheet and tell them which precinct they were in.

In October of 2016, both the Polk County Enterprise and Livingston ISD each received complaints from voters who said they were unable to cast votes for school board positions. In response to the large number of calls, LISD issued the following statement from Superintendent Dr. Brent Hawkins: “The district has heightened concerns from the reports that we are receiving because it is our goal for the voice of the community to be heard. We have a joint elections agreement with the county, and we stand ready to do anything we can to aid in the resolution.”

A letter dated Oct. 27, 2016 that was addressed to Polk County voters from County Clerk Shelana Hock referred to an error in the school district voter database that was provided to her office that resulted in voters living in the Livingston ISD not being shown as eligible to vote in the LISD School Board election.

“If there is a problem with your ballot you should let an election worker know and we can help, but only if you say something before finalizing your ballot,” Hock said.

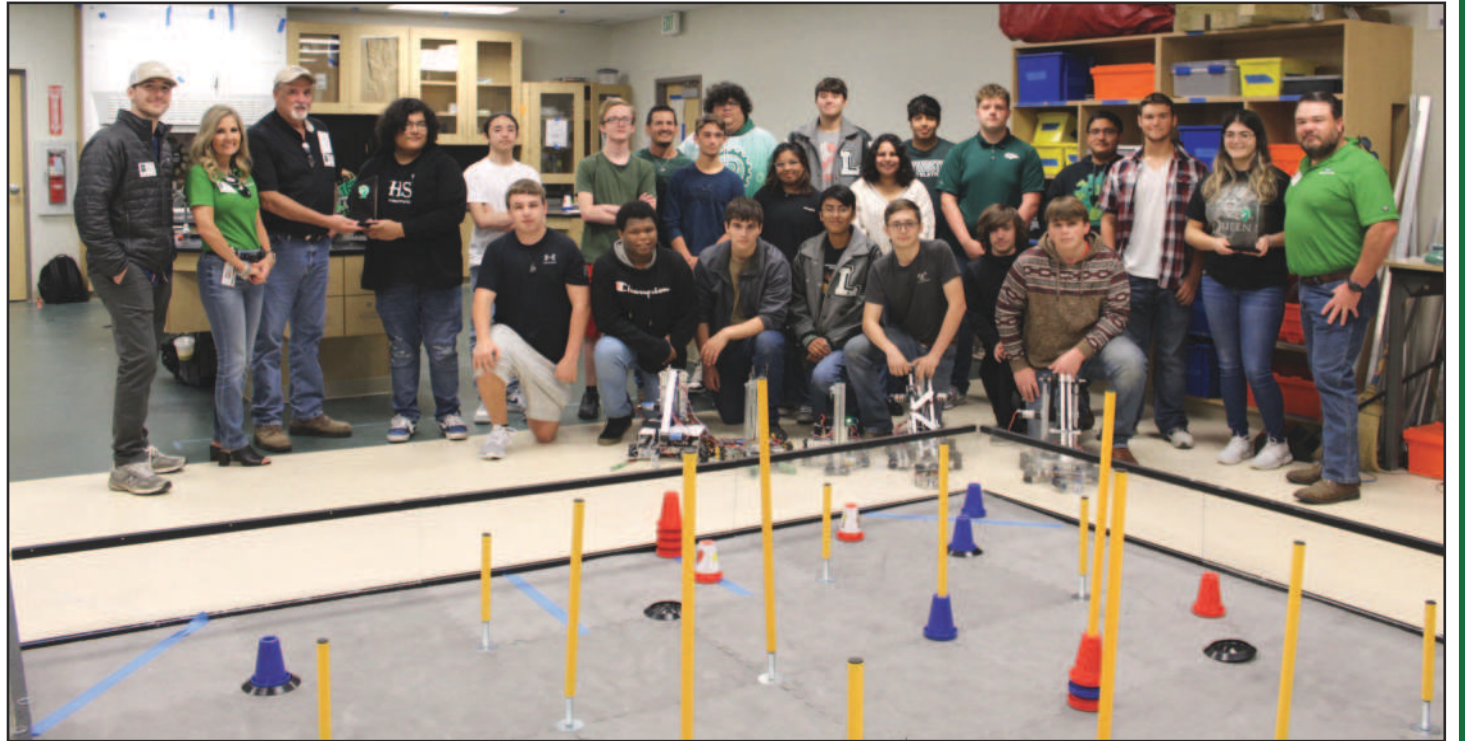

Conquering My Culinary Bucket List One Dish at a Time

DÍA DE LOS MUERTOS

I've always been fascinated by Day of the Dead, or Día de los Muertos. Having originated in Mexico, it is a holiday traditionally celebrated on Nov. 1-2 in which family members and friends who have passed away are remembered and celebrated.

Although it is often associated with the Western Christian All-hallowtide observances of All Hallows' Eve, All Saints' Day and All Souls' Day, according to the National Geographic Society, it has a much less solemn tone and is portrayed more as a holiday of joyful celebration rather than mourning. The multi-day holiday involves family and friends gathering to pay respects and to remember friends and family members who have died. These celebrations can take a humorous tone, as celebrants remember funny events and anecdotes about the departed.

There are numerous traditions connected with the holiday, each with a meaning designed to encourage souls that have passed to return and participate in the celebration. Those observing Day of the Dead create altars in their home, called ofrendas, to honor the deceased with photos, favorite foods and beverages and little trinkets or gifts. Other traditions include using skulls, or calaveras, and marigold flowers.

The celebration is not solely focused on the dead, as it is also common to give gifts to friends such as candy sugar skulls or to share traditional pan de muerto, a traditional



Mexican sweet bread, with family and friends and to write light-hearted and often irreverent verses in the form of mock epitaphs dedicated to living friends and acquaintances, a literary form known as calaveras literarias.

In 2008, the tradition of Day of the Dead was inscribed in the Representative List of the Intangible

Cultural Heritage of Humanity by the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO).

I would never want to be accused

of cultural appropriation, but I do think Day of the Dead is a beautiful, vibrant tradition that is a very loving and happy way to remember our loved ones who are no longer with us. And while we haven't as yet incorporated it into our household, I did recently prepare a meal with a Mexican bent and attempt a fun project with Daughter with Day of the Dead in mind.

I'd run across a recipe for Slow Cooker Chipotle Carnitas that looked and sounded wonderful and I knew it would pair well with an old recipe of mine for Salsa Verde. For most people, this would be the beginnings of a taco night, but as we're still diligently following our keto diets, we left out the tortillas and filled bowls with the flavorful carnitas topped with the salsa verde and some pico de gallo.

A recent trip to Walmart turned up a Day of the Dead cookie kit with 16 baked vanilla skull-shaped cookies, multi-colored "icing writers" and colored sprinkles and beads for decorating the cookies. It looked like it would be easy and fun and Daughter could enjoy some and take the rest to school for her friends. Well, it wasn't easy at all, but we did have fun with it. I couldn't help but chuckle as I threw the box away when I read on the side of it that it was "skill level 1," "perfect for little hands," and "recommended for ages 3 and up." No way! You've got to be kidding me! I can't imagine a three-year-old attempting this project that my teenager and I struggled with amid laughter. Whatever you may celebrate this time of year, enjoy! ■

Slow Cooker Chipotle Carnitas

From mommyshomecooking.com

- 6 garlic cloves, minced
- ¼ cup lime juice (about 2 limes)
- 2 tablespoons vegetable oil
- 2 teaspoons kosher salt
- ½ teaspoon black pepper
- 2 teaspoons dried oregano
- 1 teaspoon onion powder
- 1 teaspoon cumin
- 2-3 individual chipotle peppers from a can of chipotle peppers in adobo sauce
- 2 tablespoons of the adobo sauce from a can of chipotles in adobo
- 3-4 pounds skinless boneless pork shoulder (excess fat trimmed)
- ¼ cup orange juice, about 1 orange
- 1 cup chicken broth
- 2 bay leaves
- Fresh cilantro, chopped for garnish



• Place garlic, lime juice, oil, salt, black pepper, oregano, onion powder, cumin, peppers and adobo sauce in a small food processor. Pulse until well combined, and a paste is formed.

• Rub the pork shoulder with the chipotle paste, rubbing it thoroughly on all sides. If time allows, let the pork marinate for 30 minutes up to overnight.

• Place orange juice, chicken broth, bay leaves and seasoned pork shoulder into a slow cooker. Cook for 8 hours on low or 4 hours on high, until internal temperature reaches 145 degrees on a food thermometer. The pork should be so tender that meat falls apart easily.

• Remove pork from the slow cooker and shred the meat using two forks, removing excess fat. Taste and adjust seasoning if needed.

• Heat oven to broil. Line one baking sheet with foil and spray with cooking oil. Place carnitas onto a baking sheet with a cup or so of the juices and broil until most pork looks golden, crisp, and crusted about 4 minutes. Remove from oven. Garnish carnitas with chopped cilantro, if desired.

My Notes:

I'll definitely make this again but next time I'll skip the step of putting them under the broiler to crisp. We found that this step took away the moisture, making the carnitas too dry.



Salsa Verde

- 1 pound husked tomatillos
- 1 jalapeno
- 2 unpeeled garlic cloves
- ¼ of a white onion
- Two green onions
- ½ cup cilantro
- Juice of one lime



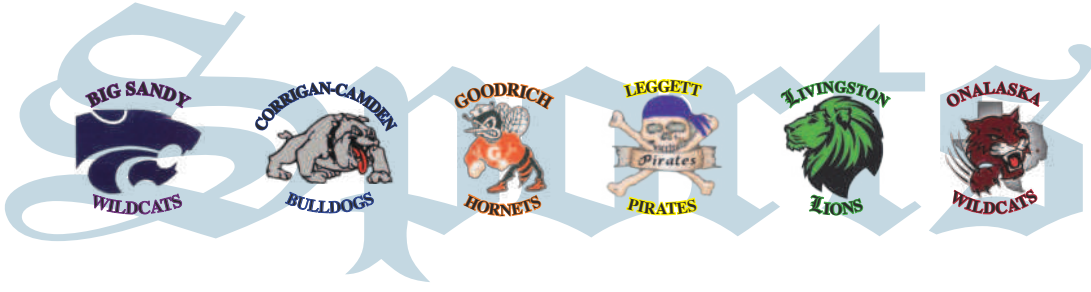
• Peel the husks from the tomatillos and rinse the sticky residue from them.

• Toss the tomatillos, jalapeno, unpeeled garlic cloves and white onion with olive oil and salt.

• Broil until charred, then cool.

• Peel the garlic and puree with the tomatillos, jalapeno, white onion, green onions and cilantro.

• Add lime juice and salt to taste.

Turnovers and a special team mAs the rains continued to fall Friday night in Splendor, the visitors' score continued to rise. Livingston football took a convincing 58-6 win over their rivals behind a smothering defense and power run game.

The contest was never close, as Livingston (2-2, 4-5) scored touchdowns on their first three drives and hit a 32-yard field goal on its fourth for a 24-0 lead. Splendor did get six points on the board when a pass was just out of the reach of defensive back Ta McNeal, going into the half at 24-6.

Livingston's defense was stifling. Splendor (0-4, 1-8) ran the ball 20 times for negative 29 yards. Wildcat quarterback Harrison Facundo threw 26 times, completing just seven passes for 65 yards. For the night, Splendor had 36 yards of total offense. Chevy Peters, Javean Gardner, Zaylon Bogany, Ziekus Garner, McNeal and Ja'Tarius Randolph continuously made plays for the mean green defense.

"It is the best coverage that we have had in a while," Livingston coach Finis Vanover said. "Our front was pretty dang dominant. They like playing the game, they like playing in our defense, and they love playing for those coaches."

McNeal threw two touchdown passes in the first half, one a 26-yard strike to Peters and the other a 34-yard pass to Gardner. There was not a Lion pass thrown in the second half. Zachary Williams ran the first Livingston score in from 28 yards.

The second half was more of the same, as McNeal, Zachary Williams, Damorian Hill, Copeland

Bush and Trent Quinn all scored touchdowns. The Lions produced a touchdown on each drive of the second half until their final possession, where they kneeled out the clock.

Quinn ran for his season high of 101 yards on 15 carries and Zachary Williams toted the ball four times for 57 yards, scoring on half of his attempts. The Lions had 411 total yards of offense, with 327 of

that on the ground.

"They prepared themselves and showed up to play. We challenged them all week to not let anything go wrong and be the best team," Vanover said of his squad. "We needed to expect to be the best team and dominate the line of scrimmage. Our secondary kids started making plays. The offense was wonderful and we did a lot of good things. Every kid on the sidelines played at least

a quarter and a half."

Livingston will now move on to play District 10-4A's top team in Lumberton. Barring a wild final week that has Vidor losing to Splendor and Hargrave defeating Little Cypress-Mauriceville, the Lions are playoff bound.

"There is no pressure and next week we need to just pull out all the stops and be as physical and aggressive as we can," the coach said

of next week with the Raiders

"They are the bad boys on the block right now and they deserve it. Since they were in the eighth grade, they have been bullying everybody in our region. It is important that we give it our best shot, and that is what we intend to do. We are going to practice to win. The big one was tonight, because it is a traditional rivalry between us and Splendor and the fact that this one puts us in."

Four consecutive shutouts

Another commanding performance by the Corrigan-Camden Bulldogs on Thursday has set up a much-anticipated district title match to close the regular season.

The Bulldogs welcomed back their old rival Groveton Indians to Corrigan with a 45-0 shutout Thursday at homecoming. Corrigan's varsity squad came out high-energy for the last home game and are prepared for the regular-season finale against the Centerville Tigers.

"You could see it all week that we had a tremendous amount of focus," said Bulldog head coach Brett Ratliff. "This being a rivalry and the seniors' last home game was special. What was even more special is that we knew this team stood in the way of what we ultimately want to accomplish. That is winning a district title and we get that opportunity against Centerville next week."

The Indian offense failed to consistently move the chains against the recently bulletproof Corrigan defense, which allowed zero points for the fourth-straight game.

"We got that first [shut-out.] They got hungry and wanted another one. Then, can we make it three and four?" Ratliff said. "Now, we go into the last game, one more shutout and we win a district title."

Corrigan's offense came out swinging in the spread-run game and also got comfortable airing it out during

"I thought Groveton's defensive line was a little better than we had seen lately," said Ratliff. Groveton suffered a quick three-and-out on the opening possession. The Bulldogs started from near midfield

and senior back Ja'Varion Williams immediately struck with a huge run gain near the goal line.

Williams then punched in a short touchdown run to help take the early 7-0 lead.

A bad punt by the Indians later set up another short field for Corrigan. Bulldog senior quarterback Christian Guzman got a big run and pass to set himself up for a three-yard touchdown plunge to make it a two-score game.

Later in the first, Williams took a direct snap for a long run to inside the 10-yard line and would finish that drive with a short inside run to the end zone. That drive helped Corrigan establish a comfortable 21-0, still in the first.

The Bulldogs continued to mix it up on the ground early in the second and senior Anthony Harrell would cap off the next drive with a short touchdown run to further extend the lead.

Guzman kept it moving for the Bulldogs with the air attack, getting the ball inside the 5-yard line. This set

Groveton got a short field with a good return on the following kickoff. A pass from Groveton senior quarterback Ean Utz to junior receiver Clifton Davis put

them inside the 10-yard line.

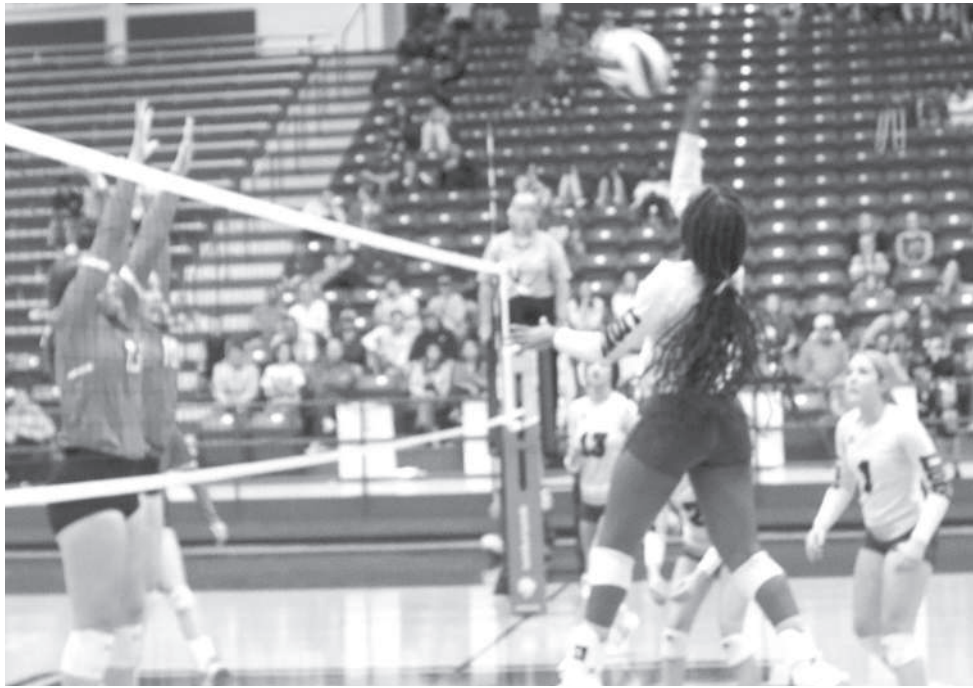
However, the Bulldog defense made a huge fourth-down stop near the goal line to force a turnover late in the game.

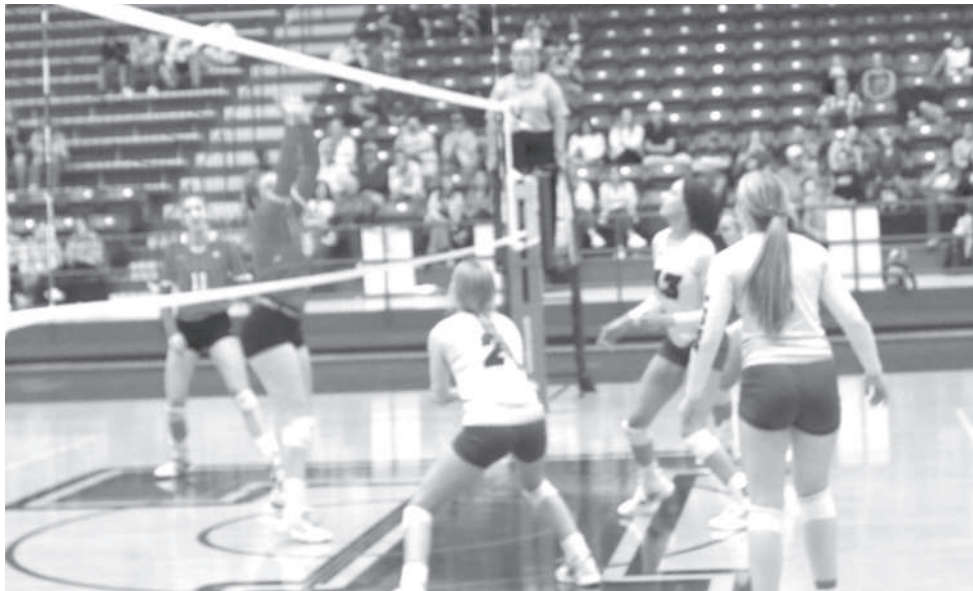

Then it happened at about 12:30 A.M. I

felt something crawling on my hand. I quickly grabbed it and felt it's legs prying to get loose. I figured it was a roach but it's legs seemed longer than a roach as I crushed it. What if it was a scorpion or something that could sting? I quickly flung it on the floor. I grabbed my phone and turned on the flashlight to identify it and kill it. It was gone. I looked all around but couldn't find it. My wife was still asleep. I laid back down there in the dark praying it would not crawl on my wife. That would be funny. Well for a minute maybe. Eventually

she woke up. I explained to her what had happened. I explained we could go back to sleep and hope it would not return. We could go home. We could go to another motel. We could keep the light on and hope it would not come out from its hiding place. We decided to leave the light on. We tried to go back to sleep. Not successfully for several hours. We live in a world filled with spiritual darkness. The devil and his demons live in our world. Satan is referred to as the "god of this world." 2 Corinthians 4:4 In whom the god

of this world hath blinded the minds of them which believe not, lest the light of the glorious gospel of Christ, who is the image of God, should shine unto them. PINEYWOODS FISHING REPORT

B.A. Steinhagen

Water stained; 76 degrees; 0.32 feet below. Fishing patterns continue to be steady. Look for fish to move shallower and feed as the water temperature declines. Bass are fair with topwaters in submerged vegetation and crankbaits along the edge of grass. Crappie are fair using minnows and jigs structures and brush piles. Catfish are good moving shallow biting cut and cheese bait.

Caddo

Water stained; 77 degrees; 0.36 feet above. These cooler days are improving the bite on Caddo as the water temperature fall the bite gets better and bigger. Stay in the river systems and use shad color crankbaits, spinnerbaits, jerk baits and spoons and you should have a great time. Find the baitfish and you will find fish. The leaves will be turning red soon so make plans to come out and see how God paints the scenery around Caddo during the fall. Beautiful days and good bites wait for you once this fall pattern takes a firm grip here in the south. Report provided by Vince Richards, Caddo Lake Fishing & Fellowship.

Conroe

Slightly stained; 73 degrees; 2.38 feet below. With unstable weather this week the eater sized catfish have been great on catfish bubblegum, worms, and liver. Look in 8-30 feet of water near deep on ledges and points. Even catching some trophy class fish mixed in. This strong front should get them going even better. Report by Brad Doyle with Bradley's Guide Service. Smaller black bass

are around the docks adjacent to deeper structure. Some better ones are on small lay downs in 9-14 feet, although very few bites on crankbaits and Carolina rig dark worms. Report by Bryan Brawner, Lake Conroe Charters. Schooling hybrids are getting better with the cooler temperatures. Target flats in 12-21 feet of water, using a one ounce slab from MTPockets tackle white or chartreuse. Still many undersized fish hitting, with white bass mixed in. Please look at the Texas Parks and Wildlife website to check the differences. Crappie are hit and miss, might have to hit several spots. Minnows seems to be working better than jigs on structure in 10-21 feet of water. Always wear your life jacket. Report by Mike Cason, Fishical Therapy Lake Conroe Fishing Guide.

Houston County

Water stained; 70 degrees; 2.50 feet below. Largemouth bass are in 4-12 feet of water on docks, points and brush using square bill crankbaits, shaky heads, Ned rigs and wacky worms. Crappie are in 12-20 feet of water in brush and standing timber using minnows. Report by Colan Gonzales, DFW Fishing Guide Booking.com.

Livingston

Stained; 77 degrees; 1.28 feet low. White bass are fair to slow with the season winding down as the water cools. Catfish can be caught drifting with cut bait on main lake flats and open water. Crappie continues to be slow. Striped bass are slow. Gar are excellent on anything and anywhere in the lake. Largemouth bass are

slow in 2-6 feet of water along the banks. Report by Jeff Friederick, Fishin' Addiction Guide Service.

Nacogdoches

Water lightly stained; 68-75 degrees; 4.05 feet low. Fish are feeding more throughout the day due to cooling water temperatures. Bass are good shallow and on topwater lures during the morning as they chase bait up to grass edges. Crappie are good on minnows. Shallower fish on flats and drains seem to bite more aggressively than deeper fish in large groups. Use caution when running north of the highline. Lake levels continue to drop and more standing timber is soon to be exposed. The lake is the lowest its been in 10 years. Use caution. Report by Blake Oestreich, Brushbuster Guide Service. Toledo Bend

Water stained; 71-74 degrees; 4.77 feet low. The water level is 167.4 with no generators running. Water temperature at the dam is 71-74-degrees with surface temperature around 73-degrees. With some wind and rain this week the back feeder creeks are stained and muddy, and the main lake remains clear. Fishing patterns are similar this week. There are two types of schooling bass in the fall transition. One group will be shallow along the banks chasing and feeding on shad. Look for blue herons and white cranes feeding on baitfish and walking the bank, this will be nature's visual key to the location of bass. The second group of bass will remain deep

but will congregate into bigger schools. For the shallow bite use a topwater bait, such as spoons, buzz baits and pop-r's, and 1/4 ounce or 3/8 ounce spinnerbaits in white, chartreuse, or black. To try something different, go back to the old single spin with a Colorado blade using silver for clear water and gold for muddy water. Squarebill crankbaits out to three feet of water in shad and perch imitation colors. For deeper bass, use a 1/2 to 3/4 ounce jigging spoon in silver with a white or yellow accent tail feather, or deep diving crankbaits in citrus shad and Tennessee shad colors. The jig bite continues to be strong this week with the night temperatures dropping into the 40s and the bass put their feed bags on. Cast your jig to long tapering points that drop off into deep water. The best colors are black and blue, PB&J football jigs 3/4 - 3/4 ounce with a 3-inch matching color craw trailer, and a green pumpkin jig with the chunk style trailer dipped in chartreuse color. Crappie bite is picking up in 10-20 feet of water using small jigs and small minnows depending on the cloud cover. Bluegills are mixed in with the crappie in brush piles and some are now being caught under bathhouses and docks. Catfish are holding in 10-20 feet of water, and migrating up into the feeder creeks. Another bass pattern, if you are using a 5-8 WT fly rod, use a topwater foam white or black wiggle fish and sometimes cast a Dahlberg Diver in yellow/black color with a floating line; strip

slowly and stop, pause, strip again or you can cast a crease fly shad color imitation; strip, strip, pause. The cadence can change daily with the cooler temperatures. Some days fish want the fly fast across the surface like chasing down a shad and other days they want it dead, motionless on the surface. After the colder nights have passed, try a Clouser minnow and sub-surface streamer fly like a Black Woolly Boogier. Now that the lake is at a winter drawdown, it is prime time to go scouting in feeder creeks, ditches, man-made structures, creek bends and undercuts for springtime fishing spots. Always leave the area better than you found it by picking up trash. Good luck and tight lines! Throw small baits matching the baitfish. Crappie are holding tight main lake brush migrating to the creeks and in 12-14 feet of water hanging on brush and timber in 27 feet of water. Catfish 12-22 feet of water off points and creek channels chasing bait cut bait and liver perch. White bass are slowing down moving into the river biting small crankbaits and silver spoons. The deadline to submit a request for a contested case hearing is 30 days after newspaper notice is published. If a request is timely filed, the deadline for requesting a contested case hearing will be extended to 30 days after the mailing of the response to comments.

If a hearing request is timely filed, following the close of all applicable comment and request periods, the Executive Director will forward the application and any requests for contested case hearing to the Commissioners for their consideration at a scheduled Commission meeting. The Commission may only grant a request for a contested case hearing on issues the requestor submitted in their timely comments that were not subsequently withdrawn. **If a hearing is granted, the subject of a hearing will be limited to disputed issues of fact or mixed questions of fact and law relating to relevant and material air quality concerns submitted during the comment period.** Issues such as property values, noise, traffic safety, and zoning are outside of the Commission's jurisdiction to address in this proceeding.




