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LISD sets budget, tax rate

August's regular meeting of the Livingston ISD Board of Trustees included adoption of a budget and tax rate, an administrative report, and an athletic compliance audit Monday in the high school library.

LISD Chief Financial Officer Craig Davis opened the meeting with his thoughts on the proposed 2024-2025 budget.

budget.

"The district is in good shape. This year, we will have to tighten the belt, because federal grant funds are ending," he said. "We expect around \$500,000 less in revenue this year, and we will run approximately \$900,000 in a deficit budget. However, this was to be expected, because of the federal grant-funded salaries that were moved into the budget. The total revenue is \$43,081,000 and the expected expenditures are budgeted at \$43,976,000, a \$900,000 expected deficit. The next two years will be a tight budget, pending legislative changes."

LISD superintendent Dr. Brent Hawkins said the district knew of this deficit well in advance.

"We knew that we would be operating at a deficit three years ago, and that's why the money was assigned to the fund balance to take care of it. If we do not want to run a deficit budget, we could cut services, but we don't want to impact any academic services."

Davis also reviewed the proposed tax rate, saying maintenance and operations to run the district has decreased several consecutive years.

"Last year, it was 0.7575 cents. This year, it will be reduced to 0.7522 cents. The debt service will have to increase by 0.005. Last year, the tax rate was \$0.9186; this year, the proposed tax rate is \$0.9212 per \$100 valuation."

In action items, the budget and tax rate were approved. The tax rate for 2024-25 is a slight increase at 0.9212 from the year prior. Going back to a rate of 1.39 in 2018, the tax rate had dropped each year since. Last year's rate was set at 0.9186, a difference of 0.0026.

Also approved in action items was the guaranteed maximum price for athletic stadium construction at \$16 million. Danny Berry with Berry & Clay Construction Managers, along with Will Clayton of Claycomb Architects, presented information leading to the estimate for the board. The Cochran Complex is currently used for track and field, soccer, as well as some football and extracurricular events. The construction will allow football games to be played on campus.

Hawkins presented the administrative report, saying the state has received another injunction against the TEA accountability system.

"This injunction has held up the accountability ratings for another year," Hawkins said. "The districts in the state have a projected accountability rating on their own. Our accountability rating was 75. We had some definite highs and some definite lows. We are at state average achievement wise. Several years ago, some districts went from an 'F' to an 'A' rating based on progress. A school district north of us that has a Community Eligibility Program turned in their CEP as 99% of socioeconomically disadvantaged students that gave advantages to this district. Both of these examples aren't accurate depictions of performance. In 2020, the TEA commissioner said it would take five years for the reading scores to return to normal from COVID-19, so we have been on that timeline for our plan.

"In 2023, the state changed everything. The accountability system didn't keep things consistent, and this made everything harder. I understand that they're trying to use the accountability system to increase achievement.

History of Onalaska presented to chamber members

Kathy Black Lott, a member of the Polk County Historical Commission, the Greater Onalaska Heritage Society and the Onalaska City Council presented a program on the rich history of the City of Onalaska during a "Lunch with the Chamber," hosted by the Livingston-Polk County Chamber of Commerce Tuesday.

"A lot of people just think of us as a lake town and that's fine but that hasn't always been the case. The Carlisle Company came in in 1900 and bought several thousand acres of land and built the largest sawmill in the state," Lott said. "At one time, there were thousands and thousands of people here working in the sawmill, so they had to build houses for them and there was a three-story hotel and a hospital with an operating room.

"Houses were built in 1904, and the sawmill employees could rent a house for \$5 a month which was about 1.67% of their monthly wages. The houses had electricity, hot running water and their own private outhouse.

"Mr. Carlisle wanted his people to be healthy and he knew that close to the Trinity River there would be mosquitoes. He had screens put on all the windows and doors to get the breeze but keep the mosquitoes out. Mr. Carlisle was very good to his workers," she said.

Lott explained that many of the people were not familiar with the concept of screens and did not think the breeze would go through them. She even shared one story, passed down over the years, of someone who cut two holes in the screen on the door. When asked why, the person said it was so the dog could go out. When asked why the second hole, the person said, 'so he can get back in.'

"We still have 15 of the old houses standing and two churches, one of which was built in 1911 and is still used today – the Methodist church. The sawmill shut down in the 1920s, taking their water, electricity and income, so there was a mass exodus, although a few stayed and toughed it out. The Greater Onalaska Heritage Society bought one of the old houses and the sawmill house is a living museum," Lott said.

Asked why the sawmill left, she said they'd cut all the virgin timber

I believe Commissioner (Mike) Morath is a brilliant guy and has the best intentions at heart for the state of Texas, but there needs to be more voices from educators. I'm giving you a score because of the effort of our faculty, staff, parents, and students deserve that. We were a 'B' district, and scores went up, and our accountability rating went down. This is part of the problem. An equal part of the problem is we changed the content and context of the test, and the cut scores, and the accountability measures. Remember that artificial intelligence is grading part of the test. I feel good about the improvement that we are continuing to make. The CCMR is lagging scores. The scores that are reflected in the current report of the College, Career, and Military Readiness reflect the scores of the class of 2023. When evaluating student data, you want to give them the opportunity to improve, and when it comes to the CCMR accountability, it is always a year behind. While there is a lot of ground to make up, I believe very deeply and very passionately in our staff. We have an exceptional staff who loves kids and tries to make a difference every day in those that we serve. I have a lot of confidence in raising the scores with the processes that we have in place."

Director of Student Services Lana Smith and Director of Personnel Ben Wilroy presented the findings of the athletic department compliance audit. Smith said an overview of Title IX was conducted within the

"In the internal review, we looked

at how it applies to athletics in our district. The scope of the audit was an athletic budget review, athletic director meeting, coaches meeting, tour of athletic facilities, and student athletic data collection."

Smith said there were sevrecommendations eral found as a result including: · Develop a Livingston ISD Athletic Department Regulations Manual. This handbook would provide written regulations for coaches in meeting Title IX requirements. Continue to add athletic equipment as the budget allows, to accommodate the needs of male and female athletes. • Prioritize aligning coaching assignments with campus teaching assignments during the 2025-2026 staffing. Utilize a student survey to determine if campuses are "fully" and "effectively" accommodating the athletic interests and abilities of male and female athletes.

Hawkins also reviewed the Texas Education Agency Lone Star Governance constraints and progress measures. "Progress measures are reflective of the recent curriculum audit and used as a baseline when we are looking at walkthroughs in 2024. We put an increase of 12% on the cognitive level. **Professional Learning Communities** (PLCs) will focus on student data, lesson internalization, and engagement to increase our baseline score from 28% to 68% by August 2028."

Lone Star Governance representative Karen Hinch said many of the campuses already have administrative walkthroughs, but based on the curriculum audit, the district is changing its focus.

"The walkthroughs will be looking at a level of rigor," Hinch said.

"We're tracking the PLCs and walkthroughs, but want quality PLCs based on agendas and logs. The walkthroughs in the rubric will look for specific things in the classroom. They're looking to see if the level of engagement is what it should be, and every bit of that is tied to the curriculum audit that we had. Administrative walkthroughs are necessary for consistency on a campus. There is a rubric that they are always consistently using; they will also be looking for high-level verbs, but it should not be intimidating. The focus of the district is improving academic outcomes.

"The walkthroughs are intended to help us know what is going on in our campus and whether we are meeting the standards we are trying to achieve. According to the curriculum audit, 12% of our kids are on cognitive grade-level instruction. This is the purpose behind the walkthroughs. We want our PLC's agendas to reflect what is happening in the meeting. The Board is the "what," and the admin team is the "how." The board votes on the constraints, and the superintendent sets the progress measures. If we want different academic outcomes, we must expect a change in the classroom."

Approved under the consent agenda was repair of a Cummins GTA50 generator in the amount of \$77,000, workers' compensation insurance renewal with Alamo Insurance Group-Texas Mutual for \$61,109, and budget amendments for required expenditures by the Texas Department of Agriculture to use fund balance on upgrades and repair of cafeterias across the district in the amount of \$579,708.

She said there are Native American hoop dancers and the Lake Livingston State Park Ranger and everyone wears pioneer clothes.

"It just turns back into 1904 and it's such a good educational experience," Lott said.

Mayor James Arnett thanked everyone for attending as he introduced the council members and city employees in attendance. 

ALWAYS SOMETHING TO LEARN IN THE OUTDOORS up plenty early to join catfish guide David Hanson just before sunup.



This past week, I joined a couple of great friends for an afternoon/evening of relaxing and filming whitetail deer and the following morning, enjoyed some great summertime blue catfish catching at Lake Tawakoni with my longtime friend guide David Hanson. Let me tell you all about it.

Ryan Fergus, the operator at Wind Point, arranged for us to stay in one of the comfortable cabins on this beautiful 180 acre park. We settled in about mid afternoon and is often the case, I am the designated supplier of 'vittles'. I had earlier that day prepared some fajitas from the marinated backstraps of a wild hog I had shot a week prior. Some folks have no idea how tasty wild pork can be when the right hog and cooking process is employed. We began our adventure by devouring the pre cooked fajitas as well as the smoked camp 'baked' beans I had brought along.

Our goal was to video and use still cameras to capture some great images of the numerous free ranging whitetail deer that roam the park. Our efforts produced some great still shots as well as footage of bucks and doe belly deep in the lake, munching on lily pads. It was interesting to watch the deer dunk their heads beneath the surface, grab a big lily pad and come up chewing! We also placed some Vineyard Max deer attractant out and shot video of deer actually running in to the grape based 'bait' once they smelled it from downwind.

We timed our outing to coincide with the full moon last week and Jeff got some spectacular images with his drone of this 'Blue Moon' rising in the east and the sun setting in the west. A restful night in the very comfortable cabin at Wind Point Park and we were

As we slowly motored toward the area where David has been catching lots of blue catfish, mostly in the 3 to 8 pound range with a frequent bonus "trophy" fish up to 40 pounds, David explained the fishing pattern he is currently on.

"Summer is traditionally the time to catch quick limits of 'eater' channel catfish averaging 1 to 2 pounds. Bait a spot in water around 15-20 feet, use good punch bait and a fish fry is almost guaranteed this time of year. There was a time when most fishermen waited until cooler weather to target the larger blue catfish. Granted we don't enjoy the almost nonstop bite common with channel catfish but at the end of the trip, we often have three or four times the fillets from the larger blue catfish in the cooler."

By daylight we had arrived at the spot David had been fishing, water less than 10 feet deep with timber, both standing and submerged close by. The Catfish Pro rod and reel combos we were using were strong enough to hold the bigger fish but the rod tip sensitive enough to detect subtle bites. The truth is in this warm water, most blue catfish don't peck at the bait. Oh, maybe the rod tip will jiggle a time of two but the blues we caught slammed the baits. The trick when fishing with circle hooks is to allow the hook to thread into the corner of the fishes mouth as it swims away. The cardinal sin when fishing with a circle hook is to grab the rod and jerk. The drill is once the rod is bent toward the surface, crank the reel handle quickly and once you feel the pressure of the fish, remove the rod from the rod holder and the fight is on. It's difficult not to get excited and when the rod bends, grab it and jerk back. This is a natural reaction, especially by someone like me that has used plastic worms for catching bass for so many years!

David prefers small pieces of cut bait (sunfish) this time of year, even for the bigger blues. "I think of it like this, says David, "Even after dining at an all you can eat buffet, back at home if someone walks by with a bag of potato chips, most folks will grab one, they just can't resist. It's the same with blue catfish in my opinion. This time of year, the lake is full of bait fish (Shad and sunfish). We're

fishing in areas with lots of bait and when the catfish smells that fresh little piece of cut bait it's simply more than it can resist."

The first 'bite' of the morning came on a rod next to me. I cranked the reel fast until I felt a fish and it was all I could do to wrench the rod out of the holder. This was a 'biggun' and the rod bowed heavily toward the water. The big fish make a hard run toward some standing timber off to the right and the reels drag was working to slow his progress, but to little avail! On minute I was fighting a big fish, we even saw his tail break the surface and it looked like a boat paddle, and the next my line went slack. The fish had obviously wrapped the line around a submerged limb or root and broken the thirty pound test line. How much did he weigh? There was no way to tell but we all guessed over 40 pounds which is not at all uncommon, even in the warm weather months.

We fished until about 10:30 when the sun was beginning to warm things up. Most of the fish weighted between two and eight pounds, perfect eaters. Later in the trip I again felt the power of a bigger fish, this one was not nearly as big as the one I lost but he was a strong fighter that we estimated at around fifteen pounds. We got some great footage for our

weekly TV show "A Sportsmans Life" on Carbon TV and YouTube. Back at the dock; Hanson went to work with his fillet knife on a banner catch of summertime blue catfish. Watching Hanson clean fish with a conventional fillet knife is watching a master in action.

To sum it up for all the catfishermen out there, the formula to success is fishing water less than ten feet deep in areas with timber, using pieces of cut bait about the size of a quarter on circle hooks and waiting until that rod bows heavily toward the surface before cranking down on the reel to insure a good hook set. Hanson says this pattern should work well until fall on any lake with a healthy blue catfish population and then, when the cool fronts begin to blow in usually in October, it will be time to target not only the banner catches of good eater blues but 'trophy time' as well when the big one turn on in earnest.

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

"I will say right now, we will be contenders." Next on the schedule is a home date with Dayton Friday, followed by road trips to Huntington and district foe Shepherd.








