

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Student threat leads to police investigation

Earlier this week, a student at Corrigan-Camden ISD privately made a comment to another student at Leggett ISD, which was then reported to authorities.

The Corrigan Police Department deemed the comment from the high school student a threat and investigated the incident.

Corrigan-Camden ISD later released comments addressing the matter and possible steps taken when dealing with threats.

"Safety in schools, hospitals and other public spaces has become the focal point of attention for many in recent years. Unfortunately, young people today have had to become more aware of potential environmental dangers. However, this awareness can help promote prevention.

"This past Monday, a student in another district informed the authorities of a potential shooting threat in Corrigan-Camden ISD. The Corrigan Police Department quickly responded, working with the high school administration to investigate the report."

The release stated that when the district knows a potential threat, a series of steps is followed to ensure a thorough investigation and response.

"We collaborate with law enforcement, conduct a threat assessment, and then develop an appropriate action plan.

"Not only can this behavior result in a placement in the District Alternative Education Program, but students may also receive criminal charges."

Also stated in the release was that the school district works with parents and other agencies to address the students' mental health needs.

"We encourage parents to talk to their children about appropriate conversations with others and the potential consequences of their speech. Be involved with your children, ask questions, talk through challenges they may be experiencing, and support them."

Center provides recycling. educational opportunities

Kari Miller, a founding member of Polk County Recycling & Beautification (PCRB) and its current president, recently presented a program to the Rotary Club of Livingston about the Polk County Recycling Center and the ongoing efforts of PCRB. Assistant to the county judge, Miller also serves as the county liaison for PCRB and has been instrumental in getting the recycling center operational.

"PCRB is a nonprofit 501(c)3 organization that was formed by community members to run the Polk County Recycling Center and the Onalaska Loop Recycling Drop-Off. These facilities were built by Polk County, utilizing surplus waste management revenues, with the goal of responsibly managing waste that can be diverted from the landfill. In 2021, Polk County partnered with PCRB to build Polk County's recycling programs and to operate these recycling facilities. PCRB hired Brian McNinch part-time to manage the operations and coordinate volunteers. The recycling center opened in November 2021, and the Onalaska dropoff opened in October 2022.

"Everyone here has the ability to help in some way. That can be by bringing clean and dry recycling materials that we can accept, participating in litter clean-up efforts, volunteering time or monetary contributions to keep the facilities running, or even just talking to people about the recycling opportunities in our community. Our recycling center accepts corrugated cardboard, single-use plastic bottles and jugs without caps, and aluminum cans and steel cans. Other items we currently take include old athletic shoes, and batteries, and I'll expand on all of that in just a bit.

"At the recycling center, we have equipment that the county purchased with grants. Initially, we purchased a baler and a forklift with a grant from DETCOG, funded by TCEQ. This baler is ideal for baling cardboard, creating bales roughly 1,100 pounds each. Once we have approximately 42,000 pounds of baled material, we are able to load it onto a truck bound for a paper mill, which PCRB has received anywhere from \$1,100 to \$2,500 for, depending on the cardboard prices at the time of sale.

"In our second year of operations, Polk County made application to Keep Texas Recycling for additional equipment for processing recyclable plastic. This grant was funded by Coca-Cola Southwest Beverage Company. While this baler is also ideal for baling cardboard, it works for plastic but is unable to produce plastic bales that weigh as much as cardboard bales. A bale of plastic, which is roughly the same size as a bale of cardboard, holds about 500-650 pounds, and so we are able to ship out a load of plastic when we have accumulated about 19,000 pounds. This isn't a heavy enough load to be shipped direct to a mill, so plastics go on to another facility for further processing first.

"In addition to a second baler dedicated to plastic, we were able to purchase a portable loading dock with our grant funds from Keep Texas Recycling. Plastic has to be loaded into enclosed trailers, making the loading dock necessary.

"Each type of material that we accept that cannot be recycled locally, like the aluminum and steel cans are, has to be shipped out by material. Meaning, we need to be able to store at least a full truckload of each type of material that has to be shipped. We've recently sold a load of cardboard and a load of plastic, so it is much less crowded inside than it was before, and we are getting ready to ship out a second load of

plastic, hopefully next week. The first load of plastic that we sold netted PCRB a little over \$1,900.

"PCRB has made every effort to maximize recycling opportunities in Polk County, and we have learned a lot about what works and what doesn't work, mostly by trial and error. For a time, we had a buyer that could accept all singleuse plastics, and better yet, they said they could accept it in small quantities, meaning they would send a truck when we

TxDOT closing crossovers near Corrigat

Beginning Monday, crews will close the crossovers on US 59 on the north and south ends of the Corrigan Relief Route construction project in Corrigan.

As construction progresses on this project, the closures are necessary to improve safety and allow construction to proceed. Drivers will detour to the nearest crossovers outside the project limits, or within Corrigan city limits to make a turnaround.

"This construction project is progressing well, and work is going smoothly," Rhonda Oaks, public information officer for the Texas Department of Transportation, said. "Closing these crossovers is a necessary part of upgrading US 59 and continuing the median construction. Motorists should expect additional traffic changes to come in the near future as work progresses."

Construction began on the Corrigan Relief Route in late 2023 after Texas Transportation Commissioners approved the \$172.8 million construction for Polk

James Construction Group LLC out of Baton Rouge, La. is serving as contractor for the project that will bring US 59 to interstate standards with construction of new US 59 northbound and southbound lanes with controlled access around the City of Corrigan.

The seven-mile project will include overpasses at the United Pacific Railroad, US 287 and Union Springs Road; entrance and exit ramps at US 59 tie-ins and at the US 287 overpass. The project is being built to interstate standards and will enhance safety, improve emergency evacuations, and support freight transport.

Motorists should obey all traffic controls, reduce speed, and stay alert for moving equipment and workers near the lanes of traffic through this work zone. Traffic fines double when workers are present.

Goodrich receives good financial news

Thursday's regular meeting of the Goodrich ISD School Board was highlighted by reports from finance, as well as upgrades in maintenance and operations.

Goodrich ISD brought in \$63,737 in the most recent quarter. The district also received funds in their settle up with the Texas Education Agency, good for \$570,000. The agency paid Goodrich for their original numbers in the American Disabilities Act but owed the district the difference for their growth and attendance.

"Attendance really matters for our income," Finance Manager Sarah Bacica said. "So we are really excited about that number. We're about \$360,000 from this budgeted year to roll over in the fund balance. If you add that \$360,000 plus the \$570,000, we're at about \$930,000 to roll into fund balance at the end of this year."

Cameras have now been installed on route buses. The new devices will pick up license plates. There have been issues with vehicles running school bus stop signs, and those can now be identified.

Library doors have been installed, and Goodrich Superintendent Daniel Barton said the process has been around six months. The outer fence has been repaired. New access controls for school doors are currently being installed.

The district also received good news on their roof at the old gym-

"I spoke to Dr. (Ray) Luna, who was the original person who donated the solar panels and the new roof that is on there," Barton said. "He was over here the other day, and we had a conversation. I told him that we appreciated it, but that we were going to have to pull them all off and replace it. I told him a price point on it, which was around \$167,000, the only bid that we had at the time. He

called me two days ago and said, "I have a non-profit, and I just want to let you know we are going to pay for

Board members were also shown blueprints of the ag building's reno-

A used John Deere Gator utility vehicle will be purchased for \$3,500 for use by the maintenance crew.

October's regular meeting is scheduled during a conference the superintendent will attend. The new date for the meeting will be Oct. 24.

In action items, the board approved putting a radio in all buses for communication.

When our buses are in route, if

there is an issue, they can radio when there is an emergency," Barton said. "The system will include a repeater, because we can't communicate within our buildings sometimes when we are too far apart. We have an analog system that is not antiquated, but it

Funding for the radios will come from a grant already obtained. It will also give the district a means of communication if cell phones go down.

Each year, Goodrich ISD is granted a waiver for class size. The waiver is a requirement for any class over 22 students in pre-K through fourth grade. Goodrich has three grade levels with classes above 22 students.

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

Need help paying electric bill? Call us

With the conclusion of summer, some low-income households may be struggling with the impact of high summer cooling bills. Funding is available for eligible households in Polk, San Jacinto and surrounding counties. The program targets the elderly, disabled and the working poor. Households in threat of disconnect may also qualify. The Greater East Texas Community Action Program administers the program in East Texas. Face-to-face appointments are not required. Eligibility is based on household income, citizenship and circumstances.

Individuals may apply by mail, online or by calling. The website is www.get-cap.org. Applications are also available at the Polk County Regional Health Building located at 410 E. Church St. in Livingston. When the required information is mailed, emailed or done by alternate methods the individual is contacted by telephone and the case can be completed.

Households who are struggling should not wait until the electricity is disconnected as deposits cannot be paid with this funding. Individuals must find ways to pay the deposits and GETCAP may help with arrears and current bills," Division Director Teresa Land said.

"Polk and the surrounding area residents have embraced our mail-in and online process. It is not necessary to go to an office and physically see a staff person. Residents are encouraged to act soon," Executive Director Karen Swenson said.



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

had 8-12 bales accumulated. And, better yet, everything could be mixed together. So, we started collecting all single-use plastic, numbers 1 - 7 except Styrofoam. We separated the plastic film, because we got so much of it, and it was ideal for baling separately. We also kept our #1 and #2 plastics separate to continue selling that to Keep Texas Recycling to honor our grant agreement. Eventually, we met with someone higher up in the company, and they informed us that they would not send transportation until we had a full truckload. That left us scrambling to figure out how to get rid of this material, since we don't have enough space for it. Fortunately, #3 - #7 plastic is not nearly as common, so we didn't yet have a lot of it. What we did have was taken to another collection facility in Kingwood.

"For a time, we were also accepting bottle caps, which a company in Indiana will turn into benches for a fee. We collected enough to make a trip, and we are working on the logistics of that now. Once we have them, we will open these up to sponsors that want to purchase a bench and place it within the community. This is another program that we are hoping to open back up once we get back from dropping off the first load of caps, but we will need to really emphasize education with this. To be accepted for recycling, the bottle caps must be clean and dry.

"On what we do accept, some of the most common examples are plastic bottles, jugs and jars. Caps and lids should always be removed. For one, we cannot process con-

tainers with them on and leaving them off helps the items fully dry out before we get them. Food and drink residue should be completely removed. I can tell you from experience, if it looks or smells like trash, it is going to be trashed, and our staff should reject these items for various reasons. First, we are hand-sorting these materials, and leftover food and drink waste that has been sitting in the recycling bin gets gross pretty quickly. Milk and creamer are especially bad if not fully rinsed out. Second, we're going to be stuck with these materials for a while until we have enough to sell, and we do not want to invite bad smells, mold, or vermin into the facility. Third, the recyclability of these materials depends on the state that they are in when they get to the next processing facility. It's important to remember that items that are treated like trash will end up in a landfill rather than risking contamination of other recyclable materials.

"When you come out to the recycling center, you will see cages outside for accepting cardboard and aluminum cans. Please ensure if you put items directly into these cages, it's only cardboard or aluminum cans. Cardboard should be broken down, not just crushed, to help us efficiently collect as much cardboard in each cage as possible. We do pride ourselves on making very compact, very stable bales, which makes storage and transportation as efficient and as safe as possible. An unstable stack of bales could lead to serious injury or even death.

"As I mentioned earlier, we do also accept athletic shoes. Got Sneakers is a company that sends us FedEx bags to load up with sneakers, which they then recycle and send us back a little bit of money for them. It's not a lot, but it doesn't cost us anything and it beats throwing them in the trash when they're too far gone for donations. Shoes we get that are still in relatively good condition do get donated to someone in need, so it's a win-win for everyone.

"The recycling center also accepts non-rechargeable batteries, though there is a charge for these, at \$2.50 per pound, which is about what it costs us to recycle them. We can't accept lithium batteries or button batteries, and it's important to make sure they are not corroded before dropping them off. Corroded batteries are dangerous to handle.

"I am so pleased to be able to share that we are going to be hosting an electronics collection event for Texas Recycles Day on Nov. 15 from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the Polk County Recycling Center. We will accept all items with a plug, cord or battery compartment (batteries removed). To help us prepare and coordinate a successful event, we are asking everyone that wants to participate to pre-register for the event on our website, PCRBTexas.org/electronics. This is a great opportunity to get rid of old electronics and other e-waste that are wasting away in drawers and closets. To recover our costs, there will be a charge for all TVs, monitors and printers, but everything else will be accepted at no charge.

"Our drop-off facility in Onalaska is located next to the Onalaska Loop Citizen Collection Station. It is open every first and third Friday from October through May, from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. Due to various limitations, this site does not accept cardboard or batteries, and it also does have to close when there are severe weather conditions.

"We are always eager for new folks that want to volunteer. New volunteers should be able to commit to at least one day per month to stay up to date with training. In addition to recycling, Polk County Recycling & Beautification also gets involved with clean-up events. We clean up a stretch of Hwy. 146 that we adopted, and we are working on coordinating future clean-up events in other parts of the community. We welcome anyone that would like to get involved in that way.

"PCRB has two annual events that we put on. We have folks actively working now on our third annual art contest, where art is produced out of materials that would otherwise be thrown away or recycled. We welcome individuals and groups of all ages to participate, and we have cash prizes for the winners. Those submissions are due on or before Oct. 29 at the recycling center. There are a few rules regarding the size and stability of the art, so that it can be safely transported to Tempe Creek Vineyard & Farms where it will be displayed on Nov. 3. We had a great turnout at that event last year, and hope to do so again this year, so save the date - Nov. 3 from noon to 3 p.m.

"Our big annual event is our Annual Earth Day Fundraiser. We have live music, auctions, raffles, good food, and lots of goodies to buy. It's been a fantastic event that we really look forward to. We'd love to have you out for that on April 13, also at Tempe Creek. And, we welcome anyone looking to sponsor these events or donate to our auction or raffle. We rely on the money we raise at these events to keep our operations going.

"I encourage everyone to visit our website and our Facebook page to stay up to date on all the great recycling opportunities we are offering," Miller said.

SHRIMP IS A NICE ADDITION TO THE BLANK SLATE THAT IS MAC AND CHEESE

"Food is the most primitive form of comfort."

here's nothing like a big dish of mac and cheese to bring one comfort. Over the years we've seen and enjoyed a variety of add-ins to the humble dish - from bacon to lobster to chorizo to the burnt ends of brisket. However, I had never had shrimp mac and cheese and decided that needed to be remedied.

I Googled it and then studied several recipes that appeared, landing on one that appealed to me and received good reviews. And now's as good a time as any to mention this. When making mac and cheese, while it may be tempting to buy the packages of preshredded cheese at the grocery store, please don't. These are packaged with anti-clumping agents that don't melt well and can sometimes result in a grainy taste. Your cheese sauce will be so much better and so much creamier - if you buy the cheese and shred it yourself. I typically use a box grater, but on occasion have been known to use my food processor also.

This is a good basic recipe for mac and cheese and is basically a blank slate in which you may add anything you'd like. As I read the reviews, some people added bacon, some added bacon and chicken, one added scallops and another added

More and more when I cook, I'm learning to reserve some of my pasta water before draining it, regardless of what I'm making. The starch in it can help make your sauce creamier. For example, when I got to the part where I was toasting the spices in butter and then adding the flour, I added some of my pasta water - approximately 1/3 cup - before adding the flour. I found that it made whisking in the flour a little easier.

As you can see, and as I've written here many



times before, a recipe is just the starting point. You know what you and your family like so you may adjust it, tweak it, add ingredients or subtract ingredients until it's the perfect fit for you. I most definitely recommend that you try this. It came together easily and can be dressed up with a variety of sides for a fancy dinner. Or, you can do what we did and just pile it in a bowl on a Wednesday night to enjoy as you begin Season 2 of "The Old Man."■

12 oz. (about 3 cups) shredded gruyere cheese

use a box grater to shred 12 oz. (about 3 cups) shredded white cheddar

2 pounds medium raw shrimp, peeled and

deveined, tails off, patted dry ¾ cup panko breadcrumbs

2 tablespoons grated Parmesan Fresh chopped parsley, optional garnish

Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Measure out the half and half, and set aside. Lightly spray a deep 9x13-inch baking dish, and set aside.

Cook pasta per package directions, to slightly less than al dente. Drain very well; set aside.

In a Dutch oven or large skillet over medium-low heat, add 4 tablespoons of the butter and melt. Add garlic powder, onion powder, cayenne pepper, salt, and pepper to the butter. Stirring constantly, "toast" the spices in the butter for 30 seconds, until fragrant.

Add flour to the pan and whisk to combine. Cook for 2 minutes, stirring fairly constantly. Slowly stream in half and half, whisking constantly, until lump-free. Turn up heat just a bit, between medium and medium-high. Bring mixture to a simmer and simmer until thickened, stirring occasionally, about 5 minutes.

In a large bowl, mix together gruyere cheese and white cheddar cheese. Remove Dutch oven from heat and add half of the mixed cheese. Fold until cheese is melted.

Add shrimp and cooked pasta to the Dutch oven, and fold to combine with the sauce. Transfer mixture to prepared baking dish.

In a small bowl, melt remaining 2 tablespoons of butter. Add breadcrumbs and grated Parmesan, and stir to incorporate evenly.

Add remaining cheese to the top of the dish. Sprinkle breadcrumbs evenly over the top. Bake for 20-25 minutes, or until bubbly and the top is golden brown. If desired, place dish under broiler for a couple minutes to toast the breadcrumbs even more. Remove from oven and let sit for about 10 minutes before serving. Sprinkle parsley over the top, right before serving, if desired.

My Notes:

- · I didn't have cavatappi pasta, so I used rigato-
- · I couldn't find gruyere, so I substituted Swiss
- and mozzarella for it. · I added a tablespoon of Old Bay to the other spices. I used two and a half pounds of medium/large shrimp, about 37.
- · It just so happened that my panko was roasted-garlic-flavored, so that added some additional flavor as well.

Defense sets the tone

The Corrigan-Camden Bulldogs earned a 21-8 victory at home over the Elkhart Elks on Friday.

The Bulldog defense was the driving force and stepped up in key moments during the non-district grudge match from last season's loss at Elkhart.

"We took control and made plays when it mattered," said Bulldog head coach Brett Ratliff. "Defense sets our tone and makes our offense play tougher. We showed that tonight."

Much of the heavy load on the ground was handled by Bulldog sophomore running back Derrick Reagie. Corrigan's hard run game wore down the Elk defense and opened up plays for the rest of the offense.

"Reagie is a special back and has a great future ahead. He has started to figure it out after having just a couple of carries last year," Ratliff said. "We also had great pieces of the puzzle with him tonight. Being able to mix things up like that helps us out. Finding that balance will be the key for us."

Corrigan's offense started with decent field position and moved the sticks into Elkhart territory, but would fall short on a fourth-down run to turn the ball over near the red zone.

The Bulldog defense started strong, forcing a quick three-and-out by Elkhart. This helped set up another short field for Corrigan going into the second quarter.

This first Bulldog scoring drive included big gains from Reagie and a crucial first-down pass reception by junior Mason Murphy.

The drive was capped off by Bulldog junior quarterback William Ratliff on a 29-yard rushing touchdown to put the Bulldogs up by seven.

Elk sophomore running back Dalton Walker would try to get things going for Elkhart with a huge run into Bulldog territory. However, the Elk offense dropped a pass, missing a touchdown opportunity.

Corrigan gave up good field position late in the half on a turnover near midfield, then a Walker run got them near the red zone.

Ratliff would later make a clutch interception on third-and-goal to prevent the potential score from Elkhart before halftime.

The Elk offense started strong in the third quarter, moving the sticks on the ground to drive past midfield. However, a defensive stop by Murphy in the backfield helped force another Elkhart punt.

Murphy caught a first-down pass, then got his facemask pulled to put the Bulldogs further into Elk territory on the following drive

territory on the following drive.

Bulldog senior quarterback Mi-

chael Sullivan followed that up with a 64-yard bomb to junior receiver Paden Walker to the end zone for another touchdown, extending Corrigan's lead.

Elkhart immediately responded with a long pass from senior quarterback Trystyn Tidrow to Walker that quickly set the Elks up inside the red zone.

Elk senior receiver Cody Thomas would run hard up the middle to get Elkhart to the two-yard line, then punched it in for the short touchdown. This made it 14-8 with the successful two-point conversion.

A pass interference call set up the Bulldog offense in a strong position on the next possession. Reagie then exploded up the middle for a 35-yard touchdown run to make it a two-score lead again for

Corrigan late in the fourth.

Elkhart got deep into Bulldog territory with the help of a pass

interference call, but was forced to pass on a fourth-and-long, turning the ball over in the final moments.

Corrigan would work to eat up the clock on the ground and the closing moments to secure the vic-

Ratliff noted the team's improved ball security this week, but still hopes to capitalize more inside and near the red zone. The offense will need to be at full strength with just three weeks until the district schedule.

"I think we definitely limited our offensive mistakes with no fumbles. We still have those other things to fix, especially inside the scoring zone," said Ratliff. "We are going to keep working on cleaning up the rest to get ready for district."

The Bulldogs will travel for their last non-district game this Friday versus the Joaquin Rams. Kickoff is set for 7:30 p.m. at Ram Stadium (Joaquin High School).







Onalaska made Friday a little more exciting than their coach wanted, but came away with a five-set victory over Kennard. The Lady Cats took a 25-20, 25-14, 23-25, 16-25 and 15-13 win.

GOOD. Water slightly stained; 85 degrees; 0.51 feet below pool. Channel catfish are fair in 25 feet of water on baited holes with stink bait. Crappie limits are possible in 25 feet of water on standing timber with black and green jigs. Channel catfish are fair in 25 feet of water on baited holes with stink bait. White bass are fair at night in the lights with a white spinnerbaits. Report by Joey Crews, Lake Bob Sandlin Chubby Chaser Guide Service. Water clarity is 2-4 feet. Largemouth bass and spotted bass are excellent throwing a walking top water bait near the dam, and good numbers can be caught in shallow pockets and along sea walls with a white buzzbait. Report by Blake Doughtie, Lake Country Lunkers.

Caddo GOOD. Water stained; 80 degrees; 0.01 feet below pool. Bass are schooling, so be looking for that and listen for them. When you hear the lily pads popping, slow down targeting the area with a shad or bream color frog or a swim jig and bounce it over those pads. Frog, buzzbait, Pop-R, fluke and spinnerbait will work around the grass lines and pads on the main lake and river. A Texas rig, drop shot or a shaky head should work well when fish are on the bottom in all the cuts along the river. Go with a junebug or watermelon red color worm when you fish the river in September. After the flooding we received this year conditions and water level on the lake are good for this time of year compared to years past. Come visit and fish this majestic lake that God spoke into existence. Report provided by Vince Richards, Caddo Lake Fishing & Fellowship.



Conroe

GOOD. Water stained; 84 degrees; 0.52 feet below pool. Catfish are good all over and we are catching better keepers as the water cools. Fish in 10-30 feet of water with Catfish Bubblegum, liver, worms, and punch bait. Bass are good early and late up shallow, and offshore midday on structure and ledges. Crappie are still poor but some can be caught on structure 12-25 feet of water. Report by Brad Doyle with Bradley's Guide Service. Hybrids have been scattered in 16-24 feet trolling with a deep diver and a pet spoon trailer, or using slabs from Bradley Outdoors to jig for them. Always wear your life jacket and stay hydrated in this heat. Report by Mike Cason, Fishical Therapy. There is a good morning bass bite in the grass with swimbaits, swim jigs, spooks in white colors, or slow your approach down and throw wacky rigged stick baits in black. Look for bait and bird activity. Activity can last all day when there is cloudy or cooler conditions. When it is sunny and warm go to docks in coves and throw a black Texas rigged worm or a wacky stick baits. Report by Hugh Cosculluela, Hugh Fishing Guide.

Fork

GOOD. Water Stained; 81 degrees; 1.59 feet below pool. Bass are good with numbers of fish shallow in 1-2 feet of water around grass hitting spinnerbaits, chatterbaits, and choppos. Shakyheads are good around wood and docks in 5-10 feet. Carolina rigs fair offshore on points and humps 12-18 feet of water. Deep crankbaits, DD-22 and XD 6, are fair over humps and channel swings in 22-25 feet. Report by Marc Mitchell, Lake Fork

Guide Service. Lake Fork crappie

fishing has been up and down this past week. Best bite has been on timber around creek channels in 18-28 feet. Some fish are on brush piles in 14-22 feet, but some days they will bite and some days they lock up. You can find a few fish on bridges but not huge numbers. The white crappie fishing has been the best lately and the black crappie just have not shown up in huge numbers like they will when the water cools off more. We are seeing great quality fish being caught daily. The minnow bite is still very good. You can catch some fish on jigs in both hand ties and soft plastics. The catfish bite is excellent around timber in 20-28 feet. When you find an area holding some fish you just need to tie up to a tree and start fishing. The fish will find you shortly and in huge numbers. You can still use cattle cubes or some sour grain to draw even more fish in or hold fish to your area. Any prepared catfish bait will work to load the boat and load it fast right now. Report by Jacky Wiggins, Jacky Wiggins Guide Service.

Houston County

SLOW. Water stained; 85 degrees; 0.01 feet below pool. Fishing patterns are consistent, but this should change as the weather begins to cool. Sunfish are good. Crappie are slow on minnows and jigs. Bass are slow midday, with the best bite in the morning.

Livingston

GOOD. slightly stained; 82 degrees; 0.45 feet below pool. Catching a lot of white bass shallow in 2-6 feet of water. Later in the mornings fish are hanging off of wind blown points. Ducktracker slabs white and chartreuse has been the go to. Report by Michael Richardson, Lake Livingston Adventures.

Martin Creek

GOOD. Water normal stain; 89 degrees; 1.19 feet below pool. Bass have been good down the edge of hydrilla with swimbaits, weightless senkos and Texas rigged plum colored worms. Bass have been schooling late afternoon near the dam biting 1/4 ounce chrome rattletraps and white buck tailed underspin jigs work good. Crappie are excellent in suspended timber in the 25 feet range. Minnows are best but pintail jigs work too. Reports given by Hambone guide service.

Nacogdoches

GOOD. Water stained; 80 degrees; 1.13 feet below pool. Largemouth bass are excellent for numbers from the bank to 12 feet on a dropshot, straight tailed worm with a light weight, lightly weighted Texas rig, and white and chartreuse spinnerbaits. Crappie are excellent, catching numbers of keepers to fill the freezer on brush piles and standing timber in 12 feet of water. Catfish are fair on cut bait or live minnows. Report by Cal Cameron, Cal's ETX Guide Service.

Naconiche

GOOD. Water slightly stained; 80 degrees; 0.00 feet full pool. The cooler air temperatures have brought the surface temperatures down quite a bit. This has the fish in a weird mood and they cannot decide if they need to stay or transition from their typical summer haunts. Expect the temperatures to rise back to the mid 80s before heading down to set off the fall turnover. Keep an eye on the thermocline because this tells you the exact depth to present your offering. Even over deep water, do not go below this line. Fishing a squarebill crankbait in 5 feet of water has been the most productive approach. If you find bass hugging the bottom in 8-10 feet of water, dragging a Texas rig Mag-worm can be effective. Crappie population is good. Catfish are slow. Report by Eric Wolfe, NacoTack Fishing ServicesReport by Eric Wolfe, NacoTack Fishing Services. Largemouth bass are good from the bank out to 12 feet on dropshots, lightly weighted Carolina rig, and large swimbaits. Quality fish between 2-6 pounds are possible. Crappie are excellent with light white crappie jig on a split shot rig. Big black crappie up to 1.5 pound are phenomenal. Catfish are fair on cut bait, stink bait or live minnows. Report by Cal Cameron, Cal's ETX Guide Service.

Sam Rayburn

FAIR. Water slightly stained; 82 degrees; 0.35 feet below pool. There continues to be a shallow and a deep bass bite with some schooling action. Bass are fair in shallow water over grass with topwaters, or on secondary points Carolina rigs and dropshots. Crappie are fair on 15-27 feet on brush piles with minnows over jigs. As the weather cools crappie will transition up the river on stumps. Blue and channel catfish are fair in 15-25 feet of water on cut bait and minnows. Report by Captain Lynn Atkinson, Reel Um N Guide Service. Lake level is holding steady, but expect the lake to drop to 5-7 feet low to continue to work on the dam in the future. Fish are in all stages of the transition. Target bass with jig head minnows and forward facing sonar. Bass are suspended at the mouth of creeks and on offshores flats chasing bait. When bass are schooling on the bottom cast a Carolina rig, dropshot, and shaky head. There is an abundance of shallow fish and this pattern should continue through the fall. Target the hay grass and flooded bushes early in the morning to catch bass chasing bait using a chatterbait, swimbait or frog. Report by Hank Harrison, Double H Precision Guide

Service. Fishing Guide. **Toledo Bend**

FAIR. Water normal stain; 82 degrees; 3.99 feet below pool. Bass fishing is improving on topwaters and frogs first couple hours at day light. Once the sun rises switch to swim jigs and wacky worms. Deep fish are coming on Carolina rigs and few on spoons. The quality of fish is small right with very few keepers. Crappie are slow. Report by Stephen Johnston, Johnston Fishing.

Tyler

FAIR. Water normal stain; 84 degrees; 0.61 feet below pool. The mild weather has brought more anglers to the lake. Night fishing continues to be the best for catfish and crappie in the lights. Crappie are fair with minnows on brush in 16-25 feet of water, and off the barge. Catfish are fair in 16 feet of water cut bait and nightcrawlers. Bream are slow on red worms off the barge and throughout the lake. Bass are slow in 10-12 feet of water crankbaits, spinnerbaits and frogs. Report by The Boulders at Lake Tyler.

Notice to City of Livingston Water Customers October 1st, 2024

The Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) requires by law that all public water supply systems maintain a disinfectant residual in their drinking water to protect public health. TCEQ recommends that, as part of a proactive maintenance program for water distribution systems, public water supplies that utilize chloramines for disinfection should switch to a free-chlorine disinfection process on a periodic basis. This change of disinfection, coupled with a rigorous flushing program, will maintain the ability of the system to deliver clean, safe water to its customers.

The Trinity River Authority (TRA), as the operator of the system that supplies and treats water for the City of Livingston, the TDCJ Polunsky Unit and IAH Detention Facility has notified City officials that beginning Tuesday, October 1st through Monday, October 28th, a **temporary change** will be made in the disinfectant that is used in treating the City's water supply. TRA will begin feeding free chlorine as the primary disinfectant instead of chloramines. In addition to the change in disinfection procedures, crews from the City of Livingston will be flushing the water distribution system by opening fire hydrants in various parts of the city during the early morning hours to minimize inconvenience to our customers.

As the temporary change in disinfectant and the flushing of the system occur, customers may experience some minor changes in the taste and odor of the water. This is normal and should only last for a short time.

Both the Trinity River Authority and the City of Livingston continually monitor the quality of the public water supply through regular, routine water sample analysis, in accordance with state requirements, to assure the continued safety and quality of our public drinking water. The Trinity River Authority has notified the TCEQ Regional Office in Beaumont and the main office in Austin of its intention to make the changes to the disinfection process.





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
