

## Suspect in Corrigan murder surrenders

CORRIGAN -- Monday afternoon brought the conclusion to an almost three-day manhunt for the suspect in a homicide, which occurred early Saturday morning in Corrigan.

Steve White, 41, of Corrigan, turned himself in with his attorney present at around 3 p.m., at a business in Livingston, according to

Sgt. Harold Rapsilver with the Corrigan Police Department. As the sole suspect in the murder of DeMarcus Jackson, his surrender and subsequent arrest still hasn't stopped the hurt and shock felt throughout the community in the wake of the events of the morning of July 18. Nor does it resolve the questions of many who are trying to make sense of the crime.

When officers with the Corrigan PD arrived on the scene of a reported distur-

bance at 5:23 a.m. at the location of 201 West 2nd Street, eyewitnesses gave an account of what happened between the two subjects. White and Jackson had gotten into an altercation at some point during the morning and White had obtained a knife, which he is alleged to have used to stab the 20-year-old Jackson several times.

Eyewitnesses claim that Jackson met his end while trying to intercede on behalf

of his cousin, TaiAnna Harrell, whom White was allegedly abusing. By the time officers responded to the initial call, Jackson was dead and White had fled the scene.

According to Rapsilver, when White turned himself in to Texas Ranger Ryan Clendennen, he was taken to Polk County Jail on the murder warrant, but Judge Wayne Yankie issued a no bond on White after he was booked into the jail. The Texas Rangers had taken

over the investigation, Rapsilver said.

Multiple agencies were involved in and assisted in the investigation in addition to Corrigan PD and Texas Rangers, including the Polk County Sheriff's Office and the Department of Public Safety. Rapsilver said that from the time the incident was reported until White's surrender on Monday, various leads were pursued by various agencies, but to no avail.

According to eyewitness accounts, including those of Jackson's mother, Kathlina Bean, the crime scene began at the home of Ruth Graham and continued from the carport onto Highway

## Voters being asked to restructure taxes

LIVINGSTON -- Livingston Independent School District's board is asking residents in the district to vote for a restructure of the tax rate. At the June meeting of the board, trustees approved a tax rate that is above the maximum rate allowed without voter approval. Therefore, voters must approve the rate before the district can generate an additional \$775,000 for Maintenance and Operations (M&O) without an increase in tax rates for residents.

"Voters will have the choice to restructure the way that taxes are levied and either bring another \$775,000 to the community or leave that \$775,000 in Austin," Livingston Superintendent Dr. Brent Hawkins said.

Under the plan, voters are being asked to authorize a property tax rate increase to \$1.17 per \$100 in assessed value for M&O and \$0.355 for Interest and Sinking (I&S) for an overall total rate of \$1.525. This represents a 12.46 percent increase in the tax rate from the current overall rate of \$1.395.

Funds generated by the M&O portion of the rate are used for the general operation and maintenance of the

school district while the I&S rate is dedicated to paying off the district's bond debt.

However, the district officials note what they are proposing is a tax rate swap as opposed to an increase. By approving the new rate in a Sept. 5 Tax Ratification Election (TRE), voters will enable the district to shift a portion of the I&S rate over to M&O. The plan calls for the final rate -- after the shift -- to be \$1.17 for M&O and \$0.22 for I&S for an overall rate of \$1.39 per \$100 in assessed value.

This plan would give the district an overall rate that is half a cent lower than the current rate.

"This has been done by over 460 districts in the state and is really nothing new," Hawkins said. "The current state school finance system has forced districts to do these type of things because of the inequities within the finance system. This tax swap will allow more funds to be allocated for salaries. Taxpayers will receive a \$0.05 decrease in the taxes resulting in a savings of \$135 on an average value of a home in the Livingston district when you combine the state's new exemptions and the half-

## Local man named to 'most wanted' list

AUSTIN -- A 46-year-old sex offender with ties to Polk and San Jacinto counties has been named to the Texas 10 Most Wanted Sex Offenders List by the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS).

A cash reward of up to \$3,000 is now being offered for information leading to the capture of Michael Dwayne Cox, a violent sex offender who is wanted for failure to register as a sex offender.

According to the DPS bulletin, Cox has ties to Houston as well as to Onalaska and Livingston in

Polk County and Point Blank in San Jacinto County.

In 1994, Cox was convicted of aggravated sexual assault of a child after an incident in Dallas County involving a 9-year-old girl. He subsequently was sentenced to 10 years in prison. In 2004 he was convicted of possession of a controlled substance in Harris County.

On Sept. 24, 2013, the Polk County Sheriff's Department issued a warrant for his arrest, charging him with failure to register as a sex offender.

Cox is 5 feet 8 inches tall, weighs approximately 170 pounds and is known to wear glasses. Cox may be using the alias Michael Lightfoot. He has a tattoo on his right arm and a scar on his left arm. Cox has previously worked in maintenance jobs.

His last known residence was on Floydene Street in Livingston.

## Mother, daughter seriously injured in accident

LIVINGSTON -- A mother and daughter were seriously injured Friday night in a one-vehicle accident on U.S. 190, just east of Midway Cemetery.

A 2004 Dodge pickup truck driven by Maria Teresa Ahmed, 31, of Colmesneil was eastbound on U.S. 190 when the driver is believed to have fallen asleep, according to Texas Highway Patrol Trooper

Kevin Burman.

The pickup partially left the road to the right and the driver overcorrected to the left, causing the vehicle to veer into a side skid, the investigation showed.

The pickup crossed the westbound lane and skidded onto the shoulder, where it struck a large pine tree.

After impact, the vehicle

spun to the left, ejecting a 10-year-old female passenger in the truck, and rolled over, coming to rest on its side on the highway shoulder, adjacent to a road sign.

The 10-year-old passenger was transported by medical helicopter to Memorial Hermann Hospital in Houston and Ahmed was transported by ambulance to CHI St. Luke

Hospital in Livingston. Both were listed as having sustained incapacitating injuries.

The driver was charged with possession of a substance believed to be synthetic marijuana, not having the child secured by a seat belt and possession of drug paraphernalia in connection with the accident, which occurred at approximately 9:14 p.m.

### Sales tax holiday scheduled Aug. 7-9

AUSTIN — Texas shoppers they can save money on certain items priced under \$100 during the state's annual sales tax holiday, scheduled for Friday, Saturday and Sunday, Aug. 7 – 9, Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar announced.

The law exempts most clothing, footwear, school supplies and backpacks priced under \$100 from sales tax, which could save shoppers about \$8 on every \$100 they spend during the weekend.

"As the father of three young children, I know back-to-school expenses can really put a strain on family budgets this time of year," Hegar said. "This is an opportunity for families to save some money and prepare for the start of the school year."

This year, shoppers will save an estimated \$87 million in state and local sales taxes during the sales tax holiday.

The tax holiday weekend has been an annual event since 1999.

penny savings.” State rules currently require any district seeking to ratify the tax rate or adopt a tax rate above its maximum M&O tax rate must hold a Tax Ratification Election. If the majority of voters turn out in favor of the district’s proposition, the district would be able to utilize the extra funding for everyday maintenance and operations. If voters do not approve the tax ratification, the tax rate will still remain at the current rate with no additional funding being created for district usage.

“If the proposal passes, it will mean an extra \$775,000 for us to use for salary increases and expanding dual credit programs at Livingston High School,” said Hawkins who encouraged voters to go to the polls on Election Day. “It will also mean a decrease in taxes of half a penny.”

One final resolution passed Monday will allow the district to receive additional state funding that was made available by the passage of a bill in the most recent legislative session. The bill was passed to assist districts that were penalized in 2006 when the tax rate was compressed. Districts that were not taxing at the \$1.50 rate in 2006 have not had access to the same level of funding as districts

that were at the \$1.50 rate. The special election will be held from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. on Saturday, Sept. 5, with early voting being held at Livingston Administration Building, 1412 S. Houston Street. Early voting by personal appearance will be conducted each weekday at the Livingston ISD Administration Office at 1412 South Houston in Livingston between the hours of 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. beginning Aug. 19, and ending on Sept. 1.

Applications for ballots by mail shall be mailed to: Livingston ISD, PO Box 1297, Livingston, Texas 77351. Applications for ballots by mail must be received no later than the close of business on Aug. 28.

287 (West 2nd Street) and onto the grounds of the First United Methodist Church, the site where Jackson collapsed and died. “By the time I made it over there, DeMarcus was already laying in the street,” Bean said. “He was already gone.”

“He was happy” Bean said that her son’s final week of life was spent being happy, for life seemed to be taking a change of pace after a rough patch. A newfound dedication to God and employment at the local Whataburger had given him much to be thankful for. “He was very excited about that, just happy; telling everybody,” she said.

“He’d even proposed to his girlfriend...he’d changed his life around and was really starting to do better.” Bean said that her son, who she said was the selfless sort of man who would do anything for anyone in need, had even began to try to help provide positive influence friends and acquaintances who might be headed down a wrong path. “He changed his life around and had wanted them to do

the same,” she said. Bean said, above all, she wants people to remember DeMarcus as a “sweet person” and one who had changed his life around. Although his caring ways ultimately cost him his life, his mother said he would’ve done the same for anyone.

In a community the size of Corrigan, where most people at least knew of DeMarcus Jackson, the shock and sadness is a common topic of discussion around town, but also on social media. Many friends, family and acquaintances have taken to Facebook to pay tribute to the young man, and many postings on his personal page give homage to his willingness to do the right thing, even in the face of brutality.

A candlelight vigil to honor Jackson was held on Wednesday night on the street in Corrigan and T-shirts have been printed and are being sold to raise money toward funeral expenses. Jackson’s funeral is scheduled for 2 p.m. on Saturday at Mayo Chapel Baptist Church.

The proposal consists of drilling new water well, ground storage and reclaim tanks, filtration unit, building, piping, pumps, hydro-pneumatic tank and misc. items. This work will be performed at the existing water well/plant site located in Polk County, Texas.


The Texas Historical Commission issued a "No Effect" determination. In addition, the County Historical Commission issued no significant issues for the project.

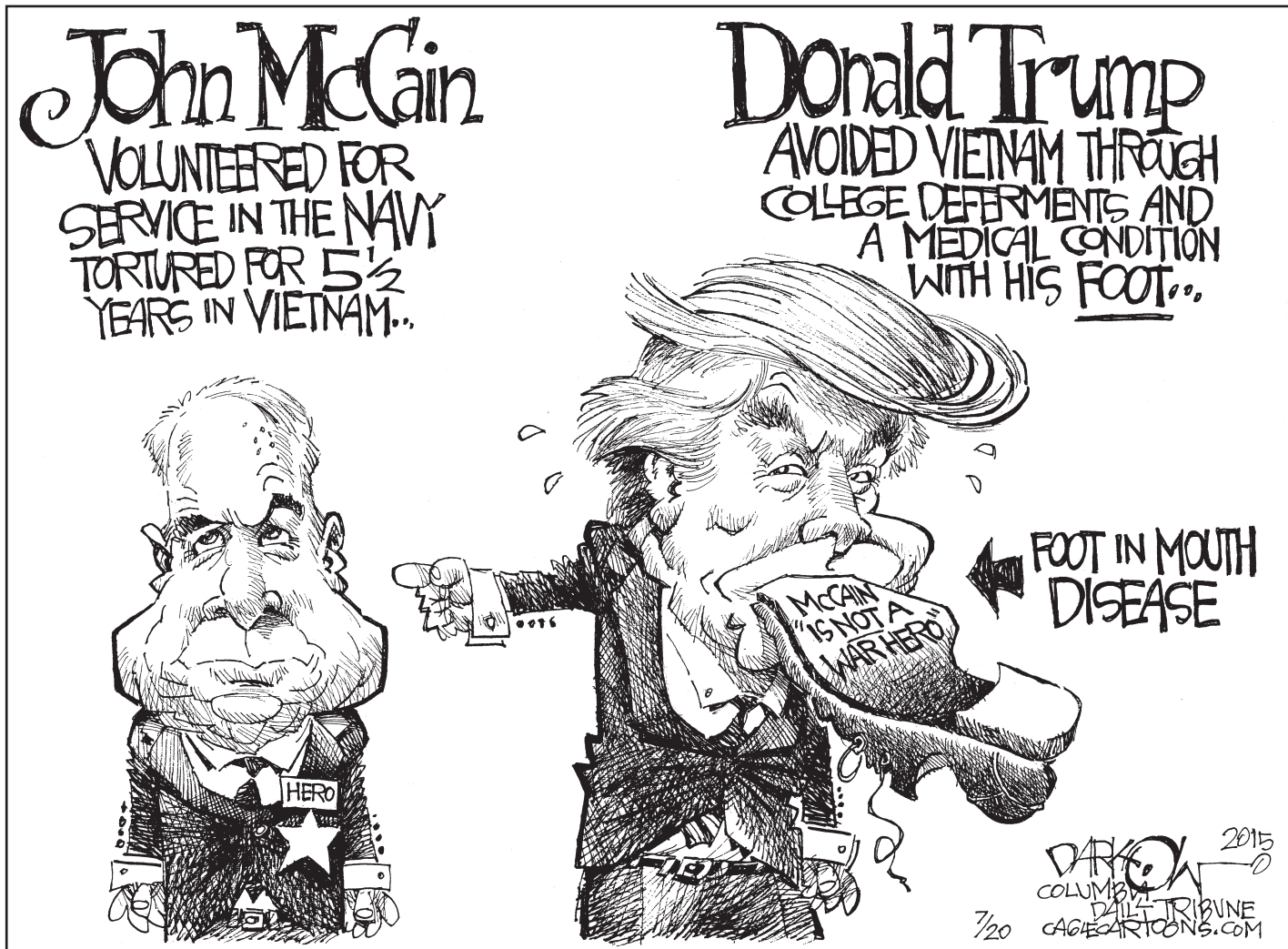

## Governor orders enhanced readiness

AUSTIN — Gov. Greg Abbott on July 18 authorized Adjutant General John Nichols of the Texas National Guard to arm personnel at military facilities across Texas.

Abbott's action comes following the July 16 shooting on two military facilities in Chattanooga, Tenn., that resulted in the deaths of four U.S. Marines and one U.S. Navy sailor. A suspect was killed at the scene. An investigation is in progress.

"It is with a heavy heart that I issue this order," Abbott said. "After the recent shooting in Chattanooga, it has become clear that our military personnel must have the ability to defend themselves against these type of attacks on our own soil."

"Arming the National Guard at these bases will not only serve as a deterrent to anyone wishing to do harm to our service men and women, but will enable them to protect those living and working on the base."

Texas Army National Guard, Texas Air National Guard and Texas State Guard, referred to collectively as the Texas National Guard, are administered by the adjutant general.

**Senator urges recapture**  
State Sen. Carlos Uresti, D-San Antonio, on July 13 posted a statement regarding the recent escape and disappearance of drug kingpin Joaquin "El Chapo" Guzman from a federal prison in Mexico.

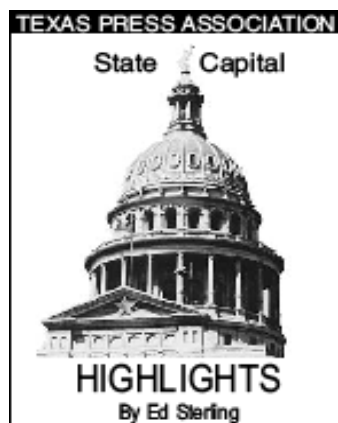
"As a senator who represents over a third of the Texas-Mexico border, I'd like to propose that if Mexico needs help keeping him behind bars once he is found, I know just the place: Texas," Uresti said. "I find it incomprehensible that he was able to escape from a maximum-security prison. I urge Mexico to pursue and hold responsible those who aided in the escape and move swiftly to bring El Chapo back into custody."

**Sales tax holiday is set**  
State Comptroller Glenn Hegar on July 14 released an announcement promoting the annual sales tax holiday scheduled for Friday, Aug. 7, through Sunday, Aug. 9.

Annual sales tax holidays were initiated by the Texas Legislature in 1999. Most clothing, footwear, school supplies and backpacks priced under \$100 are exempted from sales tax, which could save shoppers about \$8 on every \$100 they spend during the weekend, Hegar said. Lists of items that may be purchased tax-free can be found on the comptroller's website at [TexasTaxHoliday.org](http://TexasTaxHoliday.org).

Shoppers will save an estimated \$87 million in state and local sales taxes during this year's sales tax holiday, according to the comptroller's office.

**Navigate Life site debuts**  
The Interagency Task Force for Children with Special Needs, supported by the Texas Health and Hu-



man Services Commission, on July 6 launched [NavigateLifeTexas.org](http://NavigateLifeTexas.org), a website to help families who have children with disabilities and special health care needs.

According to the task force, the site "was built for anyone who needs to find relevant, comprehensive, and accurate information about services in Texas for children with disabilities and special health care needs. A Spanish version of the site is at [AvancemosJuntosTexas.org](http://AvancemosJuntosTexas.org)."

Visitors can enter their ZIP code to search for support groups, services, and events that are specific to their region. Data provided on the site has been vetted by parents, physicians, parent organizations, subject matter experts, and state agencies.

**Court hears arguments**  
Oral arguments in a preliminary injunction appeal in State of Texas, et al. v. USA, et al. were made before the U.S. Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals on July 10.

This is another step in a case brought by Texas and 26 other states who are challenging President Obama's November 2014 executive order allowing an estimated 4 million undocumented residents to remain in the country and offer them a path to citizenship. Texas Solicitor General Scott Keller argued for the states.

On May 26, the Fifth Circuit denied the Obama Administration's request to begin implementing the order after the U.S. District Court for the Southern District of Texas granted a preliminary injunction on Feb. 16, halting the president's executive action on immigration from taking effect.

**Eat local, Ag chief says**  
State Agriculture Commissioner Sid Miller on July 9 encouraged "all Texans to mark their calendars and eat out during the month of July for the eighth annual GO TEXAN Restaurant Round-Up."

Participating restaurants are hosting local events "offering the finest Texas produce, meats, cheeses and beverages. By dining out during Restaurant Round-Up, folks will give back to our economy and support our incredible chefs, farmers and ranchers. Eat out this month and enjoy a large helping of Texas," Miller said.

Diners will also be helping to feed hungry Texans. Participating restaurants will give back to their local communities by contributing to local food banks as part of Restaurant Round-Up.

## Iran deal undermines U.S. security

President Obama's announced "nuclear deal" with the Islamic Republic of Iran must be reversed as it paves the way for a nuclear-armed Iran and threatens the security and safety of the American people.

By legitimizing an Iranian regime that sponsors terrorism throughout the world, routinely chants 'death to America' and is responsible for killing hundreds of American service members, the President's has set the world on a dangerous and treacherous path.

In April, U.S. Energy Secretary Ernest Moniz promised that international inspectors would have 'anywhere, anytime access' of Iran's civil and military nuclear sites under any agreement. Unfortunately, this deal sets forth no such requirement.

The fine print of the deal leaves decisions about access to senior Iranian leaders who have said that inspectors will not be permitted to inspect military sites, even 'in their dreams'. This deal codifies this practice, allowing Iran to continue enriching uranium in secret facilities. The Administration even agreed

to Iranian demands that no American citizen can be a part of any international inspection team that enters the country.

For other facilities that inspectors want to see, Iran essentially gets a 24 day heads up - more than enough time to move their contraband. It would be foolish to suggest that U.S. law enforcement give drug kingpins a 24-day notice before a raid - so how could you justify giving a terrorist 24 days to move their nuclear weapons equipment?

This agreement also fails to secure key requirements that force Iran to dismantle their bomb making technologies, cap their enrichment capacity, and restrict their nuclear research and devel-

opment. Instead, Iran will be one small step away from a nuclear bomb, setting off a nuclear arms race throughout the Middle East, which is already a powder keg of conflict and war.

Furthermore, this deal fails to even secure the release of the four American hostages being held by Iran's government - and has no acknowledgement by Iran of Israel's right to exist.

By providing the Iranian regime with over \$100 billion in relief from international sanctions, this deal creates a massive new revenue source for the Iranians and their continued financing of terrorism across the globe.

The State Department's 2014 Country Report on Terrorism sites Iranian involvement in terrorism in various groups throughout the Middle East, as well as Africa, Asia and Latin America. These funds will no doubt fund a new generation of terrorists within Hamas and Hezbollah who are committed to the destructions of Israel.

Remember, Iran came to the negotiating table as a result of bipartisan Congressional sanctions and international pressure that took a decade to effectively implement. With one swipe of the pen, the President has erased these hard-fought efforts and

removed pressure on Iran, squandering a key opportunity to secure the end of Iran's nuclear weapons plans.

I heard Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu loud and clear when he told a Joint Session of Congress earlier this year that "no deal is better than a bad deal". Regrettably, that is not the path the President chose.

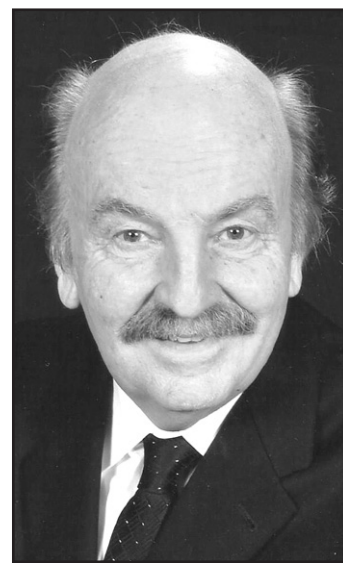

# PCFWSD board meets new engineering rep

ONALASKA – KSA Engineers' new representative, Danny Hays, was introduced to the board of the Polk County Fresh Water Supply District No. 2 during their meeting last week.

Robert "Bob" Thurber of KSA Engineers presented Hays, a Senior Project Engineer with the firm, who will now serve as the district's consultant. Thurber told the board that their former consultant, Jimmy Thompson, had moved on to a position with the Texas Department of Transportation.

In his report, Thurber also told the board that their request for funds for a sewer expansion was ready to submit to Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) and also they will be working on necessary relocation of sewer lines along the proposed expansion of FM 356.

PCFWSD Operations Manager Shannon Goins reported that a weekend power failure at the old plant in Old Town Onalaska revealed that some electrical equipment was not working on the generator back-up system. An inspection by TCEQ, which had already been scheduled for Monday, brought a recommendation the present back-up power equipment to be evaluated. No environmental issues resulted from

the failure and no fines were assessed by TCEQ.

Goins also reported they were still developing a recommendation for a new trailer to haul heavy equipment. The district wants the ability to haul heavier pieces of equipment as the district grows. The current trailer has served for over 10 years and recently a large backhoe bent its frame. The board discussed rebuilding or scrapping the old trailer after approving the purchase of the new one. Goins was asked to get a certified welder to inspect the current trailer.

During the office manager's report, Loveearl Hodge asked for approval of the 2016 Texas County and District Retirement System contributions, which adjusts the amount the districts pays. Since they have funds in the system from employees who departed before being vested in the system, there is no cost to the district at this time. The request was approved.

The board reviewed offers for delinquent tax property in Impala Woods and Twin Harbors and approved all. The second quarter investment report and a review of the current certificates of deposit resulted in no action taken.

The activity reports for June showed 2,229 active users on the system, two new connections, one permit issued and a total of 137 commercial accounts billed.

# Study links sitting to higher cancer risk

Spending more leisure time sitting was associated with a higher risk of total cancer risk in women, and specifically with multiple myeloma, breast, and ovarian cancers, according to a new study.

The higher risk was present even after taking into account the body mass index, physical activity and other factors. The study, appearing in *Cancer Epidemiology, Biomarkers, and Prevention*, found no association between sitting time and cancer risk in men.

While extensive research links physical activity to cancer prevention, few studies have examined the link between sitting time and the risk of specific cancers. Over the past few decades, time spent sitting has increased due to several factors, includ-

ing technological advancements, like computers and video games, and changes in transportation.

For their study, investigators led by Alpa Patel, PhD, compared leisure time sitting to cancer risk among more than 146,000 men and women (69,260 men and 77,462 women) who were cancer-free and enrolled in the American Cancer Society Cancer Prevention Study II Nutrition Cohort. Between 1992 and 2009, 18,555 men and 12,236 women were diagnosed with cancer.

They found longer leisure-time spent sitting was associated with a 10 percent higher risk of cancer in women after adjustment for physical activity, BMI and other factors. The association was not apparent in men.

ONALASKA – Tom Curran, a former member of the Onalaska School Board, was sworn back into office Monday to replace Linda Vincent.

Vincent resigned to avoid possible nepotism issues when her son was hired by the school district.

Board President Ted Wiggins welcomed Curran back to the board and thanked Vincent for her many years of service.

An additional item on the agenda dealt with the pending resignation of board member Louis Landsman, who is moving out of the district. The board members were asked to submit suggestions for a replacement and to think about bringing on a person with interest in the elementary school, such as a younger parent. This means that in May 2016 all positions on the board will be up for re-election, since appointments are only for the remainder of this year and whoever is appointed will have to seek the seat at that time.

Superintendent Lynn Redden reported that the construction is progressing on both campuses. At the elementary the sewer work is 60 percent finished; they are ready for Sam Houston Electric Cooperative to in-

stall the new transformer; 90 percent of the ceiling conduit is completed; and the new classrooms are being sheet rocked and painted. At the junior/senior high the fiber optics are reconnected and active, foundation work is 35 percent complete, acid waste piping in the labs is 85 percent done and the electric under the slabs and storm drainage also is 50 percent done.

Redden announced that Onalaska ISD was recently named as a bronze (third place) recipient by the "America's Best High Schools." He said he thinks only one other school in Polk County that has been so honored is Big Sandy.

A short program was presented from the recent DIGI Camp held for a group of fifth through seventh graders. They were given projects to accomplish which included making a website and adding their own voice clips to the videos on the site. All participants wanted to continue and the program will likely be expanded for next year.

Food Service Manager James Ard explained to the board the criteria used by the federal government regarding food costs and the free lunch programs. He then made a suggestion that they set the cost for meals for 2015-15 at \$2.45 for the elementary school and

\$2.50 for the junior/senior high. This will satisfy those requirements and keep lunch affordable. The board voted to approve those prices.

The board had requested a system of reviewing the financial status of the district on a monthly basis and they were presented with an eight page document covering the income and sources, the expenditures, information regarding bond payments and restricted funds. Wiggins asked all to review these and to offer suggestions for future reports.

The board voted to pass Legislative Update 102 on second reading and deferred electing a new secretary to replace Vincent until all members were present. Two were out and Brandon Smith had to leave for another meeting.

With the upcoming Pre-K on the state short list, Redden asked the board to consider a tuition based one-half day program. They have researched the cost of day care and other alternatives and he proposed a tuition of \$1,500 for the year. Payment methods, if any, will be developed in a few weeks before early registration. The board approved the program and the amount.

There were six properties in the delinquent tax list in Impala Woods and Twin Harbors that the board approved

for sale and one in Impala Woods that did not meet the minimum criteria and was rejected.

Elementary Principal David Murphy reported they have hired Cheryl Brannen to teach kindergarten. She has 10 years' experience. Also hired were Jodie Kreamer for second grade ELAR/Social Studies and Cynthia Gause with 30 years' experience to teach third grade math/science/social science. Joining Gause will be a new teacher, Donielle Skaggs. Fifth grade ELAR/social studies classes will have two experienced teachers, Angela Kennedy (12 years) and Lisa Polk (24 years) returning from Livingston ISD. Sixth grade math's new teacher is Sally Seale with 36 years teaching. Two new teachers are Mistie Wood, sixth grade ELAR, and Madison Dach, fifth grade math.

Junior/Senior High Principal Anthony Roberts reported he has one position left to fill and has brought on these new teachers: Brandi Green, speech/theater arts; Brenda Black, English I & II; Donald Meekins, assistant principal; James Brown, ELA reading in the seventh grade; Kenton Vincent, secondary math; Nicholas Curry, JROTC; and Eric Boettcher, Jo Wheeler and Danny Freeman, all unassigned but several will also coach sports.

### Convention attracts over 12,000 Texas coaches

To pass through the doors of the George R. Brown Convention Center July 19-22 is to enter a coach's shopping mall.

Hundreds of tables and exhibits line the floor, anything imaginable from apparel to equipment, electronics and technology. If it cannot be found under the large roof in Houston, it likely will not be found.

Membership in the association has grown to over 20,000 with over 12,000 in attendance at coaching school annually, making it the largest convention of its kind in the world.

Coaches looking for jobs or looking to fill jobs can do so at the convention, with an area set aside with rows of bulletin boards. After a job description is placed, several applications will surround the posting.

Conferences and lectures also number in the hundreds, with prominent high school and college instructors educating peers in a specific faction of their sport.

The learning can continue at Monday's THSCA Head Coaching Academy, where coaches can seek skills and mentoring it takes to become a head coach in the future. A coach's lounge provides additional networking and an area for staff meetings or discussions.

The media is provided the opportunity to question the 12 Division I college football coaches on the upcoming season in the adjoining Hilton Ball-

room, along with sessions with the UIL governing body.

The festivities conclude Wednesday with a keynote speaker at the Hall of Honor Luncheon to induct

new members.

The Texas High School Coaches Association was formally organized on Nov. 28, 1930, when 28 high school coaches gathered to approve and

adopt the constitution and bylaws for the association. THSCA was formed as the coaches saw a need for an organization whereby they could gather and learn new techniques in coaching. It

was through their efforts that the association was launched and exists today.

In 2005, the association moved its offices from Austin to San Marcos, providing easy access to San Antonio and Austin. The new building opened in January 2006 and has a state-of-the-art Hall of Honor and boardroom, along with a special lobby

to detail its history.

The THSCA website allows member coaches to post jobs, look for jobs, post open dates, view schedules, post game statistics and scores, and communicate with their community on their team page.

Next year's convention and coaching school will take place in San Antonio.



Uniforms, awards, equipment, electronics and technology could be found in the George R. Brown Convention Center July 19-22. From the practical to the peculiar, hundreds of vendors filled the center to sell their wares to the thousands of whistle-wearing instructors in attendance. The annual convention has become the largest of its kind and signals the unofficial beginning to a new athletic school year.

### Healthy Polk County 'Summer Safety'

With the outside temperature nearing the triple digits, it is important to keep several points close to mind.

Dehydration can put a quick damper on your outside activities, including those related to frolicking in the pool or lake. We can be fooled by the fact that our bodies are wet from the pool, lake or sprinkler, when our intake of water or hydrating fluids is ignored.

Don't wait until you are thirsty to replenish your fluid intake. Keep fresh drinking water, popsicles, or fresh fruit available for your children, adult guests or family and remind them to use them from time to time.

Check on elderly frequently, especially those with dementia, who may inadvertently turn the air conditioner off during the night when temperatures are more comfortable. Make sure they also have adequate sources of hydrating fluids and assure that they are receiving an appropriate amount. Remember that some who are elderly or disabled are not capable of telling you they are thirsty.

Severe dehydration is a serious medical emergency which can lead to death. Prevention may be as simple as increasing water intake, but, relatively slowly in order for your body to rehydrate. Limit alcohol and caffeine, which in many cases act as a diuretic, making dehydration worse.

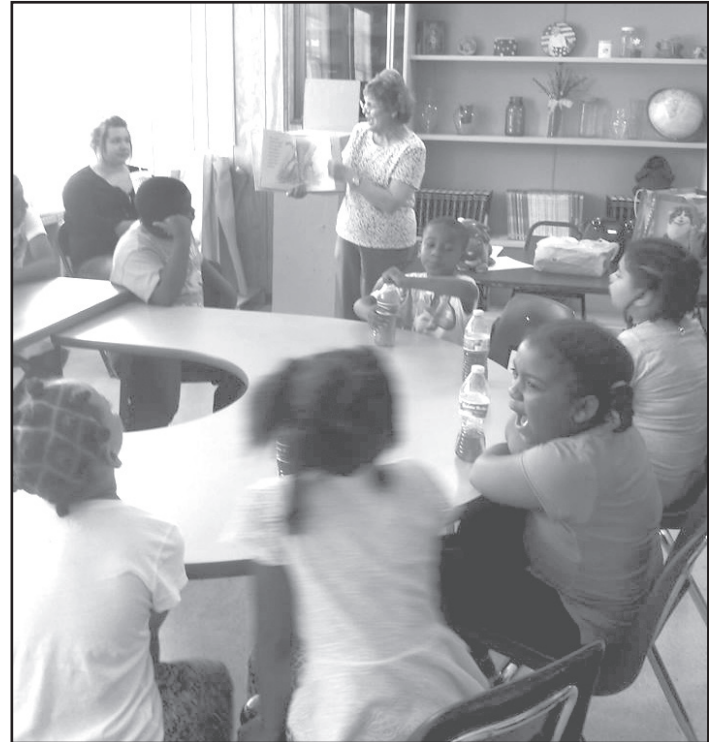

# 'Broken Things' provides thoughtful reading

As a young pastor, I listened faithfully to the broadcast of Radio Bible Class, whose speaker was M.R. DeHaan. This radio preacher was a medical doctor and a theologian. He was born March 23, 1891 in Zeeland, Michigan, to parents who were immigrants from the Netherlands, and graduated from Zeeland High School in 1908. He went to Hope College in Holland, Michigan and graduated from the University of Illinois College of Medicine in Chicago in 1914. He established a country medical practice. He married Priscilla Venhuizen in 1914 and they had four children. DeHaan's medical practice thrived, but it was exhausting. Especially in 1918 when

the flu pandemic pushed him near exhaustion. His book "Broken Things" mentions his own brokenness. He drank more and more alcohol and he almost died from drinking. In October 1921 he was placed in a Grand Rapids, Michigan hospital. He said, "I was born again of the Holy Spirit." He told God, "Spare my life and I will serve you." He sold off his medical practice, home and office equipment. He entered West-

ern Theological Seminary in Holland, Michigan. His first pastorate was the Calvary Dutch Reformed Church. He left the Dutch Reformed Church and founded the Undenominational Church and the congregation grew to 2,000. He resigned because of a dispute with his board members. He had his first heart attack in 1936 and another in 1938. This is part of his experience of brokenness. His radio program took off. He added a daily devotional booklet, *Our Daily Bread*, which had an ever expanding readership. When he died in 1965, his son Richard took over for him and then later his grandson Mart DeHaan took over. We will study the book

"Broken Things" in our next session of Stephen Ministry at the First United Methodist Church. Joyce and I are really getting into this great book. It was written 45 years ago and has sold millions of copies. The family of M.R. DeHaan is bringing it out again and we are glad that they did. It is most helpful in understanding the meaning of suffering. Like little children, we cry over broken toys. As we grow older, we weep over broken promises, broken hopes, shattered dreams and unfulfilled ideals. Life is not easy and is full of suffering. Yet, we have the possibility of something greater coming out of our brokenness. God is with us all the way.

# Heavy spring rains permit restocking effort

ATHENS — Widespread rains in May and June did more than end the drought and raise lakes to levels not seen in years. Many lakes that had been scheduled for stocking contingent on significant spring rains were able to be stocked to take advantage of improved habitat.

Fortunately, TPWD freshwater fish hatcheries had a better-than-expected production year for such popular species as Florida largemouth bass, blue catfish, striped bass and palmetto bass (hybrid striped bass), making more fish available.

TPWD has five inland fish hatcheries. One is currently closed because of water supply problems caused by drought. In 2015 TPWD hatcheries produced and stocked almost 500,000 channel catfish fingerlings; 800,000 blue catfish fingerlings; 4.8 million striped bass and hybrid striped bass fingerlings and 4.7 million fry; 157,000 Guadalupe bass fingerlings; 55,000 smallmouth bass fingerlings; 129,000 bluegill fingerlings and 7.5 million largemouth bass fingerlings. The good news doesn't

stop there. Spring rains brought many reservoirs to levels not seen in several years, so the hatchery fish were stocked into great habitat. When reservoir levels go down for several years, vegetation grows up in the dry lake bottom. When levels rise, the flooded vegetation

gives little fish a place to hide from predators and, as it decays, releases nutrients into the water that jumpstart the food chain. Those water level rises benefit all species of fish, which means that fishing should see significant improvement in the next

several years, and predator species like bass, striped bass and hybrid striped bass will have plenty to eat and grow quickly. Information on where and how many fish were stocked can be found at <http://tpwd.texas.gov/fishboat/fish/management/stocking/>.

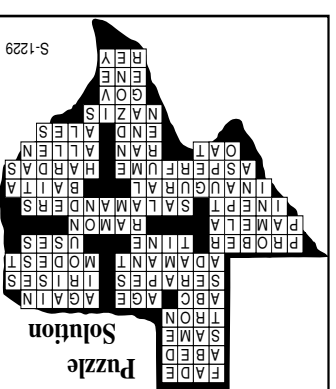

**NOTICE OF RATE CHANGE REQUEST**

On June 12, 2015, Entergy Texas, Inc. ("Entergy Texas") filed its STATEMENT OF INTENT AND APPLICATION FOR AUTHORITY TO CHANGE RATES ("Application"). Entergy Texas filed its Application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas ("Commission") and with those municipal authorities in its service territory that have original jurisdiction over Entergy Texas' electric rates.

**Statement of Intent to Change Rates**

Entergy Texas' Application requests an increase in rates based on operating expenses incurred during the 12-month test year period ending December 31, 2014 and capital additions to rate base for the period April 2013 through December 2014 as well as a post test year adjustment to provide for recovery of the capital investment, operating expenses, and taxes related to Entergy Texas' proposed acquisition of Union Power Station Power Block One. Entergy Texas further requests that the Commission reconcile its existing distribution cost recovery factor ("DCRF") and requests approval of two new rate schedules/riders.

The Application includes the following requests, among other things:

- Entergy Texas proposes an increase in its base rates and rider rates designed to collect a total non-fuel retail revenue requirement for Entergy Texas of approximately \$901.4 million per year, which is an increase of \$75.3 million, or 9.12%, compared to adjusted retail base rate and rider revenues resulting from the Commission's Order in Docket No. 41791, which was Entergy Texas' last base rate case, and Docket No. 43111, which was Entergy Texas' DCRF case. This proposal represents an increase in overall revenues, including fuel, of 5.81%. This increase includes a limited-term Rate Case Expense Rider, described below, to recover approximately \$3.017 million each year for three years.

**Additional Tariff Revisions**

Entergy Texas is proposing to add two new rate schedules or riders as follows:

- A Rate Case Expense Rider ("Rider RCE-4"), which is designed to recover, over a three-year period, certain rate case expenses of Entergy Texas and participating municipalities, consistent with PURA §§ 36.061(b)(2) and 33.023(b). In particular, Entergy Texas seeks to recover expenses reasonably and necessarily incurred in relation to (1) this proceeding (Docket No. 44704) and (2) certain allowed, remaining expenses for the appeals of Entergy Texas base rate case Docket No. 39896, and its associated rate case expense proceeding, Docket No. 40295. Entergy Texas estimates such total costs at approximately \$9.051 million, which would result in recovery of approximately \$3.017 million per year. However, it is further proposed that Rider RCE-4 be set to collect the amount of reasonable and necessary rate case expenses actually incurred, as determined by the Commission. This rider would terminate in approximately three years, after all the approved revenues are collected. This rider would affect all Entergy Texas retail rate classes.
- A new Area Lighting Service tariff schedule specific for Light Emitting Diode ("LED") technology, which Entergy Texas proposes to name Schedule ALS-LED. For this schedule, Entergy Texas proposes to offer seven new LED lighting options for private area lighting. Rates under this schedule will range from \$9.23 to \$20.71 per month, depending on the option selected.

To the extent a proposed new rider or schedule is not approved as requested as a separate rider or schedule, Entergy Texas proposes to recover the costs that it sought to recover through the rider or schedule through its base rates or other rate mechanism designed to recover non-fuel costs. Entergy Texas further requests that the Commission grant good cause exceptions to the extent necessary to support any variance from the Commission's Rules.

In addition, Entergy Texas is proposing to modify terms and charges in a number of its rate schedules. Proposed changes to Schedule Miscellaneous Electric Service Charges will result in a reduction of approximately \$75,906 that is included in the retail revenue requirement stated above. Proposed changes to the schedule for Street and Highway Lighting Service - LED would offer five new LED lighting options with rates ranging from \$10.53 to \$18.61 per month, depending on the option selected. Rider Schedule CGS, regarding Competitive Generation Service, would also be affected by this application. The production costs associated with Entergy Texas' Competitive Generation Service program, and the related credit to customers under Section VI.B of Rider CGS, would increase from \$6.62/kW to \$7.58/kW per month. Entergy Texas also proposes minor modifications to a number of rate schedules, which are detailed in the tariff manual provided in Schedule Q-8.8 of the rate filing package on file with the Commission and each municipality exercising original jurisdiction over Entergy Texas' rates.

**Effect on Customer Classes**

All customers and classes of customers receiving retail electric service from Entergy Texas will be affected by the proposed rate changes contained in the Application. The following table shows the effect of the proposed base rate and tariff changes on existing rate classes:
