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Jail issues to go before voters in 2025

GROVETON — It will cost county taxpayers \$100,000 to begin the process for a jail bond election, which will be held sometime in

At the Aug. 13 Trinity County Commissioners Court meeting, County Judge Danny Martin said during budget discussions the county needs to budget the funds to hire consultants.

Martin said that the plan is to issue \$16 million in construction bonds, and he has found a company that will buy those at 3.5 percent for 20 years. He also said that if that passes, then the county will then put forth another bond

measure for operation costs.

Should the bonds be approved by the voters, the county plans a 60-bed jail to house men and women prisoners, with the hope of renting out empty beds to surrounding counties, Martin said. It would take 2 ½ to 3 years to

Commissioner Neal Smith said he had concerns about placement, as the city of Groveton did not have the water or sewer capacity to add

All the gathered information was to be presented to the county's jail committee for its

In other business, the county:

• discussed additional funds requested by

the county's fire departments for more funding to be included in the budget for the next fiscal year;

- appointed Mark Jones as acting Precinct 3 Constable to replace Carl Casey, who retired for health reasons. Jones was to assume the title in January, having defeated Casey in the March primary;
 - approved personnel actions forms;
- approved budget amendments;
- declared office equipment and vehicles as • hired GLS for engineering services to up-
- date the county's subdivision regulations:
- · tabled approval of a maintenance agreement for the county HVAC systems as costs

were deemed too high;

• tabled bid awards for road materials purchase and delivery to seek additional bids;

- approved the purchase of 22 portable radios for the Sheriff's Office at a cost of \$92,000, to be paid by capital outlay funds and SB 22 grant funds;
- approved just over \$23,000 in disasterrelated expenditures;
- approved adding a cancellation fee to the list of Sheriff's Office and Constable fees for
- approved county road and bridge fees for FY 2025; and
- approved a \$450 fee for removal of trees in the Westwood Shores subdivision.

County shifts gears on recording meetings

GROVETON — The Trinity County Commissioners Court will broadcast all future meetings live after trying to move all recording devices away from the

At its meeting on Aug. 13, the court approved a policy change that moved any recording equipment, such as phones, cameras and recorders, to a distance of 15 feet away from the podium, a change from the

County Attorney Colton Hay said the change was in response to events at recent meetings, which became disruptive to court proceedings. He also said he felt uncomfortable and distracted with cameras being so close to him during meetings.

However, it was pointed out to the commissioners that the acoustics of the commissioners' courtroom were terrible, and the HVAC system causes problems with people hearing any discussions.

While the county approved the change, Hay said that as of Wednesday, commission meetings will be livestreamed, and there will be a new Facebook page and Youtube channel specifically for county information and meeting video.

He also said that eventually, he would like to see that information linked from the county website in order to make meetings accessible so more people can get

o injured in crashes

TRINITY COUNTY — Texas Department of Public Safety Troopers investigated a one-vehicle crash on state Highway 19, south of Lovelady at Tantabogue Creek, that occurred Monday.

The investigation indicates that at approximately 3:57 a.m., a 2019 Peterbilt truck tractor semi-trailer was traveling south. Reports indicate the Peterbilt traveled off the road, rolled over on its side, and caught fire.

The driver of the Peterbilt truck tractor, 72-year-old Robert Oates of Trinity, was transported to Trinity Memorial Hospital for treatment of non-life-threatening injuries.

Trinity Volunteer Fire Department responded to the crash. Fire Chief Keith Johnson said the truck was carrying 9,000 gallons of jet fuel, and the department responded with two engines, two tankers and a rescue

Lovelady Fire Department also responded with an engine, tanker and brush truck, and the Texas Forest Service used a plow to create a containment line around the woods fire, which was allowed to burn itself out so as not to contaminate the creek.

On Saturday, troopers investigated a two-vehicle crash on Farm-to-Market Road 356 south of Trinity.

The preliminary crash investigation indicates that at approximately 6:15 p.m., a 2016 Harley Davidson motorcycle was traveling north, while a 2014 Kia Rio was traveling south. It is reported that the Harley Davidson failed to the yield right-of-way while turning left and turned into the path of the Kia.

The driver of the Harley Davidson, 55-year-old Steven Wolfe of Trinity, was transported HCA Conroe for treatment of non-life-threatening injuries.

The driver of the Kia, 27-year-old Alexander Garcia of Huntsville, and one passenger, 24-year-old Stephanie Mathis of Huntsville, were not injured.

Homeowners, renters still eligible for hurricane aid

AUSTIN — Since May, FEMA has approved two major disaster declarations for Texans impacted by the Spring severe storms, straight-line winds, tornadoes and flooding, and Hurricane Beryl that followed in early July.

As Texans work to recover, nearly 700,000 individuals and families have been approved for disaster assistance following the Spring storms and Hurricane Beryl surpassing \$844 million across both disasters.

While the deadline to apply for federal assistance for the Spring storms has ended, there is still time for Texans who may need assistance following Hurricane

It's been nearly six weeks since the disaster declaration for Beryl, and FEMA has worked with the State to expedite Serious Needs Assistance to help more than 602,000 Texans thus far for a total of more than \$451 million in financial assistance.

FEMA specialists continue working in the 22 counties impacted by the hurricane to help people apply

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



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
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The Wiles of the Devil

Yet, St. Paul urges Christians to stand against "the wiles of the devil" (Ephesians 6:11).

In our modern society, some understand the devil as an ontological reality, in other words a real being who has access to our minds in order to mislead us. Others understand the devil as that inner voice inside of all of us (including Jesus when he walked the earth) that tempts us to do things to serve ourselves even when those actions violate the will of God.

We all have the devil on one shoulder tempting us to evil, and an angel on the other that is our conscience asking us to do what is right. All of us can agree that evil is real, for it can spread like a virus in our world when people allow it to do so.

However, you describe the devil, one of the first steps to mental and physical health is to take responsibility for our own actions. To be healthy as individuals, we must learn to stand against the temptation to participate in that which is not according to the will of God.

To resist temptation and the lure of selfish living, we must "be strong in the Lord and in the strength of His power" (Ephesians 6:10). To whom do you belong —



Heat-related deaths in Texas likely undercounted

As Texans endure the dog days of summer, experts say deaths related to heat in Texas and nationwide are likely undercounted, the Texas Standard reported.

With climate change causing warmer days and nights, last year was the hottest on record in Texas. Though this summer has not been quite as brutal, those working outside are still at considerable risk.

In 2023, 365 people in Texas died directly from heat, and heat was named a contributing factor in another 197 deaths. Accounting for heat's role in a death is challenging, how-

"The health impacts (of heat) are a little bit more subtle," said cardiologist Sameed Khatana, assistant professor of medicine at the University of Pennsylvania. "They can be delayed. And trying to tease apart whether a death or an adverse health effect occurred due to the temperature is quite challenging."

Heat has been called "the most dangerous phenomenon that workers face," according to the Texas Standard story.

Overcrowding, understaffing force jails to move inmates

Jails both large and small are struggling to properly house incarcerated people, and millions in tax dollars are being spent to transport inmates to other jails, sometimes in other states, The Texas Tribune reported.

The number of Texas inmates housed outside the county where they were arrested more than doubled from 2019 to 2024, from 2,078 to 4,358. In June 2024, 41 percent of Texas county jails housed inmates elsewhere, according to the Texas Commission on Jail

"Counties are having to think outside the box," said Ricky Armstrong, assistant director of the Texas Commission on Jail Standards.

"We know there are some counties housing people out of state. It's not something we recommend or encourage, but we see that as a

Among the factors increasing the number of inmates held elsewhere: a law limiting who can be released from jail while awaiting trial; an overburdened mental health system; and a difficulty in finding jailers.

While law enforcement officials advocate for increased jail space to ease the problem, civil rights advocates and defense attorneys say the state should invest more in mental health services and alternatives to jail.

"We are addicted to carceral solutions," Krish Gundu, co-founder of the Texas Jail Project, which advocates for people in Texas county jails, told The Tribune. "If we really cared about not having these people in jails, you'd look at why they are ending up in jail and solve the problem at the root.

Paxton threatens to sue over State Fair gun policy

Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton says he will sue the City of Dallas if it does not change a new gun policy. The city plans to ban licensed gun holders from bringing weapons to the State Fair of Texas unless they are active police officers or qualified retired officers. The Dallas Morning News reported

the fair announced the change after a shooting last year wounded three people.

A letter from the AG's office to the city of Dallas said the new policy violates state law, which says cities and other entities cannot ban handguns on government property unless there is a legal exception, such as for

More than 70 Texas lawmakers issued a letter last week urging the fair to rescind its new policy, saying "gun-free zones are a magnet for crime because they present less of a threat to those who seek to do evil," The News reported.

Meanwhile, the Houston Chronicle reported Paxton will work at a food bank as part of a plea deal he made in March with prosecutors to close the securities fraud case against him. He is required to complete 100 hours of community service and pay about \$300,000 in restitution to the victims.

A cooler and wetter July for most of the

The drought situation in Texas continues to ease, thanks in part to a wetter and cooler July, according to Mark Wentzel, hydrologist with the Texas Water Development Board. At the end of July, 20 percent of the state was in drought, down five percentage points from the end of June. That is the lowest extent of drought since October 2021.

"Precipitation varied considerably, with large areas of Central and East Texas getting twice their normal rainfall, while parts of West Texas and the Panhandle got less than 25 percent of normal," Wentzel wrote.

The return of the La Niña weather system is likely to bring warmer and drier temperatures to the state this winter, according to Wentzel. Much of the drought area that remains in Texas is in the Big Bend area, as well as in the Hill Country west of San Antonio. TWDB adopts the first state flood plan

The state now has its first comprehensive statewide assessment of flood risk after the water development board voted to adopt the 2024 State Flood Plan.

"Adopting the first-ever state flood plan is a monumental achievement for Texas," said TWDB Chairwoman Brooke Paup.

The plan presents about 4,600 plans and projects from 15 regional flood planning entities. Approximately one in every six people in Texas lives or works in known flood haz-

TWDB will produce a new state flood plan every five years.

Fraudulent banking website reported

The Texas Department of Banking is warning consumers to be aware of a fraudulent banking website purporting to offer online and in-person banking services. A fake bank calling itself "All Finance Bank of Texas," claiming to be located in Houston, and a website, allfinanbnktxus, are not known to be associated with a known bank.

"No bank doing business under the name All Finance Bank of Texas has been authorized to provide banking services in Texas, nor is any bank by that name supervised by the Department of Banking, the FDIC, the Federal Reserve, or other U.S. regulatory authorities," TDB said in a news release.

Methamphetamine use in East Texas: An ongoing battle

John, a resident of East Texas, struggled with methamphetamine addiction for several years. His life took a downward spiral as his addiction deepened, leading to severe health problems, strained family relationships, and

John vividly remembers the physical toll and the mental struggles he endured.

Methamphetamine use remains a significant public health challenge in East Texas. This highly addictive stimulant poses a severe risk to individuals and communities alike. A look into the current state of methamphetamine use within our region reveals how crucial to understand its impact, the signs of abuse, and the resources available for those in need.

Despite these challenges, John's turning point came when he was referred to the Alcohol and Drug Awareness Council's treatment program. Initially hesitant, John gradually committed to the comprehensive treatment plan, which included detoxification, individual and group counseling sessions, and ongoing support. The compassionate and professional staff at ADAC played a crucial role in

his recovery, providing the necessary resources and support to help him rebuild his life.

Through the program, John reconnected with his family, repaired broken relationships, and found stable employment. Today, John is a strong advocate for addiction recovery, often sharing his story to inspire others struggling with similar issues. His journey underscores the importance of recognizing the signs of methamphetamine abuse early and seeking help from trusted organizations like ADAC.

The rise of fentanyl-laced methamphetamine has added another layer of danger. As Kim Bartel explains, "Due to the fentanyl, there is an increased risk of not only overdose but of severe side-effects." This makes it even more crucial to be vigilant and proactive in addressing this issue.

Methamphetamine, commonly known as meth, crystal, or ice, has seen a resurgence in East Texas over the past decade. According to the Texas Department of State Health Services, methamphetamine one of the most reported drugs in substance abuse treatment admissions.

In East Texas, this increase is alarming due to the drug's potent addictive properties and the severe physical and psychological effects it has on users.

Bartel, the Region Five Prevention Resource Center Program Manager, notes, "We've seen an increase in fentanyl-laced methamphetamine coming up from Mexico," further complicating the issue. He went on to note that, "fentanyl contamination of other drugs has pushed East Texas to have the highest overdose per capita in Texas."

Methamphetamine use not only affects the individuals who use it but also has far-reaching consequences for families, communities, and the broader society. The drug is linked to a range of issues, including severe health problems, such as chronic dental issues, skin sores, weight loss, and increased risk of infectious diseases.

Mental health issues are also prevalent, with users often experiencing anxiety, paranoia, hallucinations, and violent behavior. Crime rates are notably affected by methamphetamine use, with a rise in both property crimes and violent offenses. Furthermore, the economic costs to the community are substantial, encompassing healthcare expenses, law enforcement efforts, and lost productivity.

Early detection of methamphetamine abuse can significantly improve recovery outcomes. Common physical signs include rapid weight loss, dental issues (often referred to as "meth mouth"), skin sores, and hyperactivity. Behavioral signs to watch for include erratic behavior, paranoia, hallucinations, and social

For those struggling with methamphetamine use, immediate help is available. Community support is robust, with local organizations like the Alcohol & Drug Awareness Council (ADAC) providing resources, support groups, and educational programs to assist individuals and families affected by methamphetamine use.

Methamphetamine use remains a critical issue in East Texas, impacting the health and safety of individuals and communities. By understanding the scope of the problem, recognizing the signs of abuse, and knowing where to find help, we can work together to combat this epidemic. Remember, recovery is possible, and support is available.

for assistance. They have visited more than 95,000 homes and 1,189 public locations. FEMA has operated 33 Disaster Recovery Centers visited by more than 30,000 residents. More than 900 families with 17,000 members have stayed in hotels temporarily at FEMA expense because they could not return to their homes.

The U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) has approved \$162.5 million in low-interest disaster loans to homeowners, renters, private nonprofit organizations, and businesses.





arlier this summer, we marked off the first full week of August on our calendars for a family ✓ vacation. Unlike most of our trips where we have numerous things planned to see and do, this one was different. We didn't plan a thing. We simply wanted to get away, rest, relax and spend quality time with our daughter who is about to head off for college.

Having discussed multiple options, we ultimately

chose to rent a cabin in Broken Bow, Okla. We didn't realize until we got there that the cabin was actually located in Hochatown. Hochatown and Broken Bow are both charming little towns located in McCurtain County in the southeastern corner of Oklahoma, in the foothills of the Ouachita Mountains. The area is a haven for outdoor enthusiasts with its nearby Broken Bow Lake.

Hochatown is the second to hold the name after the first was flooded by the damming of the Mountain Fork River to create Broken Bow Lake. The lake was constructed in 1968 and filled and opened in 1970. Located along the Mountain Fork River, the lake is about eight miles north of the town of Broken Bow.

The land that would become Hochatown was owned by the Choctaw tribe, with 12 families moving into the area in the 1880s. Like Broken Bow, Hochatown grew around the Choctaw Lumber and Coal Company, gaining a post office in 1894 and becoming a bustling little town by 1900.

During the 1920s and 1930s, prime lumber supply dwindled and the lumber company moved to other local areas. Meanwhile, the community became noted for its moonshine production. The town's heyday soon passed, however. The post office shut down in 1963 and the last family left the site in 1966. The cemetery and town church were moved to higher ground while all the other buildings were destroyed and the area is now underwater. Today, the local economy is primarily supported by the influx of tourism around the lake and numerous parks.

Our cabin was comfortable and charming and located near Beavers Bend State Park. We spent several days exploring the park, as well as Broken Bow Lake and the Mountain Fork River. The entire area was absolutely

Construction of the park began in 1935 by enrollees of the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) through FDR's "New Deal" program. Donations from local citizens were instrumental in the purchase of 1,200 acres of land for the park. Beavers Bend State Park is one of seven state parks in Oklahoma that were constructed by CCC enrollees.

Located within Beavers Bend State Park is the Forest Heritage Center, a museum and learning center "designed to explore humanity's continuing relationship with the forest." The center welcomes visitors to the heart of the Ouachita National Forest. The center was educational and fascinating with its various displays showcasing the integral impact of the timber industry throughout the area.

An unexpected surprise for us was the center's temporary exhibit of the famous Smokey Bear paintings in celebration of Smokey's 80th birthday. The historic paintings, created by Artist Rudy Wendelin between 1977 and 1995, depict Smokey's iconic image and message, "Only YOU can prevent wildfires."

In addition to sightseeing and relaxing, we also enjoyed some good food at Buffalo Grill, Hochatown Saloon, Hochatown Swamp Booger Mercantile and one of our favorites, Grateful Head Pizza Oven & Tap Room.

Inspired by the love and fellowship of DeadHeads fans and followers of the band the Grateful Dead - two brothers wanted to share the experience of all the joy and fun of a live Dead show. Their dream was found in the bones of an old abandoned school house in the Ouachita Mountains where they sell "hippie-inspired pizza pies and cold draws of draft beer" and their slogan is "Make pizza not war."

We wouldn't have even known about Grateful Head had it not been for our friend Gary Davis who was there earlier this year with some of his BMX racing friends and enjoyed it and recommended it.

Our week relaxing went by all too quickly, but we noroughly enjoyed ourselves and saw some beautiful country we'd never seen before. In fact, now that we're familiar with the area, Hubby and I are already talking about returning, perhaps later this fall after we get Daughter settled in at college. It's not a bad drive either just a short four and half hours from Livingston.■



The quest for a breakout season begins

TRINITY — With the 2024 Texas High School Football Season rapidly approaching, the Trinity Tigers are preparing to take the field under the Friday Night Lights

On Friday, the Tigers hosted the Top 10-ranked Lovelady Lions in the first of two organized scrimmages prior to the beginning of non-district play.

In what is basically considered a full-speed practice, with each team getting a set amount of offensive and defensive plays followed by one quarter of live football, the Lions and Tigers embraced the opportunity to compete

against a different team.

The Lions took their first set of offensive plays first and attacked quickly completing a 75-yard pass for a quick score. The Lions remained on offense and took 9 plays to march down the field, but on a fourth-down play, the Tiger defense caused a fumble out of bounds. Due to the rules of scrimmage play, the Lions retained possession and scored on the final play of their offensive reps taking a two score lead.

The Tiger offense started sluggish, but a 57-yard run by quarterback Turbo Maxey set the Tigers up at the Lion 20-yard line, after a 3-yard loss on the following play, Maxey found Aden Dubose in the end zone for a 23-yard touchdown pass.

The Lions and Tigers second team offenses were unable to score on their allotted plays and on the final set of 8 plays for each team the Lions were able to combine long pass plays and running plays to add another score to their tally. The Tiger offense was unable to sustain a drive to score on their eight plays.

With the controlled portion of the scrimmage concluded, the teams played one 12-minute timed quarter in game-like conditions, with the exception of special teams play. The Tigers took the ball first and were unable to make a first down so a simulated 30-yard punt gave the Lions the ball at their 42-yard line. A 41-yard run set the Lions up

at the Tiger 18-yard line and 4 plays later were able to punch the ball into the end zone from the 1-yard line.

Neither team was able to effectively move the ball during the remainder of the quarter and the Lions left the scrimmage with a 4-touchdown-to-1 advantage over the Ti-

The Tiger coaching staff commended the team on its effort and showed where improvements have been made and what areas are still in need of work. The Tigers will travel to Centerville Thursday night to scrimmage the Centerville Tigers in the final intersquad practice before hosting Hull-Daisetta on Aug. 30 at Tiger Stadium.

Texas stars shine bright in Texas

The Paris 2024 Summer Olympics wrapped up recently, and the United States once again stole the show. American athletes racked up 40 gold medals and 126 total medals, leaving secondplace China trailing behind by 35 med-

But behind the stars and stripes, one state made a name for itself on the global stage: Texas.

State works to keep your kids learning

Public Education

The House Committee on Public Education has jurisdiction over bills regarding public school systems, state programming of elementary and sec-



ondary education, and proposals to create or change school districts.

The Committee also oversees state agencies such as the Texas Education Agency, the Texas representatives to the Education Commission of the States, the State Board for Educator Certification, and others.

Over the interim, the Committee will monitor the implementation of House Bill 1605, Senate Bill 2124, and House Bill 2209. HB 1605 completely reformed how the Texas Education Agency and public schools acquire educational materials to ensure our schoolchildren have access to highquality, appropriate materials in the

SB 2124 requires middle schools to develop an advanced mathematics program for their students to prepare students to enroll in Algebra I in 8th grade so that a larger number of students can complete advanced math courses in high school.

HB 2209 established the Rural Pathway Excellence Partnership (R-PEP) program, which allows rural school districts to form collaborative partnerships with colleges, universities, or businesses to expand opportunities for students to access college and career pathways.

Additionally, the Committee will evaluate if Texas can increase educational opportunities in Texas to ensure that students and families have increased options to attend a highquality school, regardless of circum-

The Committee also will examine the impact on student outcomes as a result of the increasing number of newly hired Texas teachers who are not certified by the State Board for Educator Certification and will make recommendations to enhance opportunities for uncertified teachers to become certified, as well as strengthen parental rights and notifications.

Finally, the Committee will evaluate opportunities to improve students' early literacy and numeracy outcomes in Pre-Kindergarten through the third grade. It will study best practices for identifying students requiring reading and math intervention and providing evidence-based intervention strategies. The Committee will recommend changes and evaluate investments to increase the number of students achieving reading and math proficiency by the end of third grade.

Find your prey with a newly renamed app

AUSTIN - The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department launched an updated version of the official mobile app used by hunters and anglers across the state for harvest reporting, electronic onsite registration, digital license display, and more.

Formerly named My Texas Hunt Harvest, the mobile app will have an updated look and a new name, Texas Hunt & Fish, but will have all the same great features users are familiar with from the previous version of the

With the Texas Hunt & Fish mobile app hunters and anglers can satisfy mandatory reporting requirements for wild turkey, white-tailed deer and alligator gar harvest, as well as complete electronic on-site registration for most public hunting sites accessed when using the Annual Public Hunt (APH) Permit. Fully digital license holders must use the Texas Hunt & Fish app to execute digital tags for deer, turkey, oversized red drum and spotted seatrout.

One of the newest features, launched during the 2023-24 hunting season, is the app's ability to show

Chronic Wasting Disease zones relative to the hunter's location if they have the location services turned on. A full list of features includes:

· Online and offline functionality - use the app regardless of data service once it has been installed and your account is connected

 Connect and display your ing and fishing license (note that paper license holders must still carry physical tags when pursuing tagged

• Perform mandatory hunt harvest reporting for wild turkey, whitetailed deer, and alligator gar

• Digitally tag harvested game and fish (requires purchase of an appropriate digital hunting and/or fishing

• Track and view your harvest his-

• Perform electronic onsite registration (eOSR) for many public hunt

• Download maps of many public hunt areas for use with or without data service

• View CWD Zone boundaries and, with location service enabled, determine your position in relation to the nearest zone

• Reportar su cosecha en español o en inglés - report your harvest in English or Spanish

Users not wishing to use the app can complete mandatory harvest reporting online.

Users that already have the old version of the app downloaded on their devices will need to update to the new version starting on Aug. 15 to get all the latest features and to ensure proper app functionality.

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

It's time to think deer



We Texans are blessed to live in the best state in the country for hunting deer. I've enjoyed hunting those big body deer up in North Dakota, the Golden Triangle in southwest Illinois and many other places but give me a good old fashioned Texas deer hunt any day.

The choice is ours whether to hunt the woods and fields of east Texas, venture down to the famous Texas Hill Country for a hunt or possibly head way south to the brush country for a chance at one of the heavy horned monarchs the region is known for. Looking for some mule deer venison and antlers for the wall? Head to the beautiful Trans-Pecos region or for some really big mule deer, the Texas Panhandle.

August is the month when we deer hunters begin to get fired up each year. It's about 6 weeks until the opener of bow season and on many Texas ranches that are permitted by Texas Parks and Wildlife, all legal means for taking deer are allowed at the beginning of archery season and on through the end of February. The hunting shows have been in progress across the state with vendors displaying the latest and greatest thing in everything related to deer hunting.

As deer hunters our goal is to ultimately get the deer out of the brush to present an ethical shot as close as possible and through the years, we have employed many ways to accomplish this.

The use of baits and scents has always been legal in Texas and I'm positive it will remain so. There are few Texas ranches that do not use corn feeders during the fall months to concentrate deer, both bucks and doe. Buck hunters know that the does that pattern to the feeders during the summer will still be in the area come the breeding season (rut) and bucks will be on the move checking for receptive doe.

A deer's primary defense mechanism is its nose but deer also use that highly refined sniffer to attract mates as well as locate food. I've long been a believer in using scents to attract deer, both sex based scents as well as food.

About this time last year, I met Mr. Paul Moore who by accident discovered the very best food attractant I've used for deer. His company is called Vineyard Max and is based in Nacogdoches. The name might be a giveaway for you. Grape skins that previously were a throw away, the by product of making wine is the primary ingredient in Vineyard Max Deer Attractant.

Paul knew there must be a good use for those many tons of grape skins that were going to waste. At first he thought they would make a great mulch for flower beds and he used them for that but he soon learned that deer were flocking to his yard in record numbers, munching on the newly distributed grape skins.

After testing the product for a season, Moore discovered deer were naturally attracted to the smell and taste of grape skins. His product is primarily hammermilled grape skins with a little corn chops and rice brand added.

My first time to put Vineyard Max to the test occurred on a hunt out in Sterling County with my good friend Larry Weishuhn. There were still a number of doe permits that needed to be filled in late February . When Larry invited our mutual friend Jeff Rice and I out to hunt, I mentioned to my friends that I wanted to bring of this new grape based attractant to try out. I remember Larry telling me this would be a great testing ground because as far as he knew there wasn't a grape vine, either wild or domestic anywhere near his least situated out in far west

I was hunting with my .50-caliber CVA Optima muzzleloader and hoped to get good video of a few deer being harvested. Larry had informed me that deer were plentiful on his lease and taking the required number of doe

should be no problem. It wasn't but we had to alter our hunting strategy a bit. I planned to set in an elevated blind over a corn feeder and post haste shoot the first fat doe that appeared on the

Soon after Larry dropped me off at a prime spot, I began seeing antlers coming from all points of the compass to the feeder. I had the camera rolling and waited for a doe, and waited and waited. At one point I had four bucks inside the feed pen and a couple younger bucks waiting for their chance to jump the fence and enjoy a late afternoon snack. After a couple hours of seeing plenty of bucks including a couple of impressive wall hangers, I begin to wonder what was causing this phenom-

Weishuhn arrived just after dark to pick me up and he also had seen only bucks. The reason, he explained was not a lack of doe but the fact that the more aggressive buck was dominating the feeding stations, we needed to formulate a plan, and fast. We only had a couple days to hunt.

"Why not bait several areas around the junction of heavily used deer trails with this new Vineyard Max attractant? We can set up downwind in the brush during the afternoon hunt and see if we can pull those doe out of the brush. It won't take long to see if the deer will come to this 'new' grape scent," Weishuhn said as we were driving back to camp.

After another morning hunt of watching numerous bucks but seeing zero doe, we proceeded to bait several spots with the grape based attractant. That afternoon, we each positioned ourselves in the thick juniper brush downwind of the baited areas. I actually shot my doe while walking up to my spot. She and other deer had obviously found the bait pile earlier in the day as most of the attractant was gone. Jeff had several doe and a yearling spike come to his bait pile just before dark and Weishuhn later shot a fine buck.

I'm sure we probably could had

used the spot and stalk method and taken a few doe at longer range on this hunt but for filming we needed to get the deer in closer. After spending over 60 years hunting deer, I learn something new every season. My take away from last year is that deer love the smell and taste of grapes, regardless where one might be hunting. Deer also love corn and every hunter knows the golden kernels are the 'go to' bait in feeders across the state. But I've found a bag of Vineyard Max mixed in with the corn or simply piled on the ground brings in traveling deer that would otherwise pass by. The smell brings in and there's just something about the flavor of grape that deer are attracted to and caused them to keep coming

Caddo

FAIR. Water stained; 80 degrees; 1.65 feet above pool. Another week and another rain event so the lake is muddy and the bite slow. When the water settles and clears a dropshot or Texas rig in the river will land a bass. Work flukes, top water plugs and buzz baits or frog type baits around the pads and grass line. The bite has been slow with all the rain but the good thing is we will have current on the lake all the way through September, so the bite should continue all summer. Lake is still beautiful and majestic to come look at even if the bite is slow. Caddo is a one of a kind lake that God spoke into existence and we get to experience. Report provided by Vince Richards, Caddo Lake Fishing & Fellowship.

Conroe GOOD. Water slightly stained; 86 degrees; 0.11 feet above pool. Catfish are still good. Seems like the spawn is winding down as few fish have eggs in them now and not nearly as bunched up on spots. There are lots more little bitty catfish being caught with some good eaters, and you can expect this to continue until the water cools in the fall. Largemouth bass are still doing good offshore and on docks working monster worms slowly. Report by Brad Doyle with Bradley's Guide Service. Hybrids and white bass are scattered with some in schools in 18-26 feet of water. Fish are being caught with live bait, jigging a spoon, or trolling with a deep diver with a pet spoon as a trailer. Be sure to use a calmer jigging motion to get more hits. Crappie are in or around structure 12-21 feet using minnows, jigs, or hair jigs. The bite has been very light, and shuts off as quickly as you get one in the boat. Always wear your life jacket and stay hydrated in this heat. Report by Mike Cason, Fishical Therapy.

Fork

GOOD. Water Stained; 81 degrees; 0.09 feet above pool. Bass are fairly slow in the mornings, but there is a shaky head bite with yum dingers in both sizes on timber in 5-7 feet on breaklines. Best bite is Carolina rigs offshore in 15-25 feet on humps, road beds, points, all are producing. Big worms like blue fleck, tequila sunrise and plum seem to be best 10-12 inches. Crankbaits are still good over channel catfish bends deep humps and road beds. Shad patterns and chart blue back **PINEYWOODS**

XD 6 - XD 8 are best, Report by Marc Mitchell, Lake Fork Guide Service. Black bass are chasing topwater patterns early in the day and later in the day when it is dark. Check out the brush piles as big bass are using them to feed on crappie. Bream are excellent in the shallows on wooly buggers and small poppers. Report by Guide Alex Guthrie, Fly Fish Fork Guide Service. Lake Fork crappie fishing is in full time summer pattern. Huge numbers of black crappie are loading up at the base of trees, on main lake points and lay downs. There are still good numbers of white crappie on brush piles and in trees. Focus on areas in 14-22 feet for the most fish. The bite has been finicky when fishing for schools of fish. Minnows on very small gold Aberdeen hooks and 6-8 pound test fluorocarbon line has been the go to set up. Small hand tied jigs in natural colors are also working if you swim them over and get those fish to chase and grab. Even if you see a hundred fish in a group just catch the few more aggressive fish and move on if you want to catch numbers. Larger soft plastics should still work on bigger white crappies that are solo on timber. The catfish bite is still red hot. You can load the boat fast in roosting areas that have overnight birds in the trees. We are also seeing big numbers of catfish on main lake points in 14-28 feet around timber. If you find an area with lots of bait the catfish will be close by. Bait an area with cattle cubes or sour grain to group those fish up. Then use your prepared bait of choice to get those fish biting. Report by Jacky Wiggins, Jacky Wiggins Guide Service.

Houston County

SLOW. Water stained; 85 degrees; 0.23 feet above pool. Fishing patterns are consistent. Sunfish are good. Crappie are slow on minnows and jigs. Bass are slow midday, with the best bite in the morning.

Lake O' the Pines

GOOD. Water stained; 90 degrees; 1.63 feet above pool. Channel catfish are good in 15-20 feet

of water in the bridge shade. Channel catfish bite in 3-4 feet of water under trees. Crappie are good in 16-25 feet in standing timber with minnows on a cork. Report by Joey Crews, Lake Bob Sandlin Chubby Chaser Guide ervice. Solid summer pattern is holding steady for the bass. Bass are good with schooling activity starting to pick up. Follow the shad to find the bass. There is still some bass in the bushes along the banks pitching Texas rigged worms and jigs, or wacky rigs. Bass are good on brush piles on points on the south end of the lake in 15-25 feet of water with deep running crankbaits, jigs, wacky worms and Texas rigs. The north end of the lake is producing catches on the grass and bushes. Report by Mike Stroman, R & R Marine.

Livingston

GREAT. Stained; 88 degrees; 1.18 feet below pool. White bass bite is excellent in 10-20 feet of water with white and chartreuse Ducktracker slabs. Report by Michael Richardson, Lake Livingston Adventures.

Martin Creek GOOD. Water normal stain; 101 degrees; 0.13 feet below pool. Martin Creek is at full pool, 101 degrees south of trestle and the clarity is clear. Bass are good along the hydrilla with swimbaits, watermelon red weightless senkos and Ribbit frogs. Crappie are excellent on deep brush and standing timber in 25 feet of water. The fish are suspended at 18-20 feet using minnows for best bite. When you find the crappie you also have found big catfish using live bait on rod and reel with bait near bottom. Report by Hambone Guide Service.

Nacogdoches EXCELLENT. Water stained; 86 degrees; 0.24 feet below pool. Largemouth bass are excellent off the bottom in 18-25 feet of water on deep diving crankbaits, Carolina rigs and dropshots. Crappie are excellent on brush piles with crappie jigs. Catfish are slow on cut bait and live minnows. Report by Cal Cameron, Cal's ETX Guide Service.

Naconiche

FAIR. Water stained; 88 degrees; 0.50 feet above full pool. We have dried out and the heat is on setting the fish to be in full summer mode going forward. Keep an eye on the thermocline because this tells you the exact depth to present your offering. Even over deep water, do bot go below this line. Found quality bass holding tight to submerged timber with a Texas rigged Magworm. The days of Mag-worm fishing are probably here for the next several months. This is a popular tactic, but another approach is a Tokyo-rig. If catch them schooling, chunk an underspin or a spook style topwater at them. Crappie population is good. Catfish are slow. Report by Eric Wolfe, NacoTack Fishing Services. Largemouth bass are excellent on large glide baits and swimbaits. Crappie are good for size but quantity is low, on brush piles with chartreuse crappie jigs. Catfish are slow on cut bait and live minnows. Report by Cal Cameron, Cal's ETX Guide Service.

Pinkston

GOOD. normal stain; 86 degrees. Largemouth bass are excellent medium diving crankbaits and swimbaits. Crappie are fair for numbers of catches with live minnows on standing timber. Catfish are slow on cut bait and live minnows. Report by Cal Cameron, Cal's ETX Guide Ser-

Raven SLOW. Water slightly stained; 88 degrees. Huntsville State Park was hit directly by Hurricane Beryl, and is closed due to storm damage. We apologize to our anglers who were hoping to get on the water this week. Call for up to

GOOD. Water stained; 83 degrees; 4.27 feet above pool. The bite for all species seems to improve when the water is being generated. This stirs the water, breaking up the thermocline. Bass are slow in shallow water with many smaller fish being caught on frogs, and spinnerbaits. Deeper bass bite is fair with Carolina rigs. Crappie are slow in the morning, but improve midday. Catfish are all over the lake in 20 feet of water and in 12 feet of water in the creek channels. White bass are on points in the south end of the lake near the dam. Report by Captain Lynn Atkinson, Reel Um N Guide Service. As the lake continues to drop fish are going to be moving to traditional summer locations pending the thermocline depth. Bass are good early morning on shallow main lake points with medium or deep diving crankbaits, and topwaters. Main lake ledges with Carolina rig shaky head and spoons. Brush piles shallower than the

thermocline with Texas rigs, jigs or Carolina rigs. The thermocline is actively fluctuating and will continue to do so while lake level changes. Navigate with caution watching for floating debris, trees, and stumps. Report by Hank Harrison, Double H Precision Fishing.

Toledo Bend

GOOD. Water slightly stained; 91 degrees; 1.42 feet below pool. The lake is slowly releasing water and conditions are normalizing. Hot weather has slowed the bass bite during the day. There is little to no topwater action in the morning while fish stay close to bottom in 8-14 feet and 16-22 feet of water. Target bass slowly working a Texas or Carolina rig. On a day with light wind, shallow and deep diving crankbaits are working. Now the best bite has been at night, and with the full moon coming it will only improve. The best bite is on big spinnerbaits on main lake points in 10-16 feet of water, but while a Texas rigged worm or 9-10 inch lizard are not catching numbers these baits are landing fish up to 9 pounds. Crappie are still hit-or-miss over the lake, but it seems like the mid lake area from around the bridge north a few miles has been the best. Minnows are best but jigs will land a few bites focusing on brush piles and standing timber. Report by Stephen Johnston, Johnston Fishing.

"As Texas continues to help communities recover and rebuild from Hurricane Beryl, it is critical that SNAP recipients have access to hot foods and ready-to-eat meals," Abbott said. "This extension and the addition of seven new counties will allow impacted Texans to have access to fresh, quality hot foods to feed themselves and their families. I thank the Texas Health and Human Services Commission for working tirelessly with our federal partners to provide healthy foods

"By extending the waiver for hot food and adding additional counties, we're making sure that those still recovering from the storm have what they need," said Molly Regan, HHSC Deputy Executive Commissioner of Access and Eligibility Services. "We're grateful to be able to offer this for Texans in need."

Federal approval allows SNAP recipients to purchase hot foods with their Lone Star Cards at participating retailers through September 15. SNAP recipients initially had until Aug. 14 to make those purchases. Hot foods include rotisserie chicken, grocery store deli items, and other food that is hot at the point of sale.

No action is required by SNAP recipients to receive this additional

Keep your money in your own hands

AUSTIN — The Texas Financial Crimes Intelligence Center and the Texas Department of Licensing and Regulation have released a new public service announcement with helpful tips for avoiding possible credit card skimmers in gas pumps.

The video on TDLR's YouTube channel (https://youtu.be/M1bhD-P722LU) discusses how thieves sometimes attach credit card skimmers on gas pumps to steal payment card information from customers when they purchase fuel.

Most skimmers have been placed deep inside the cabinet and it won't be obvious that something's wrong, but there are still some things consumers can check for before using a credit card at a gas

•Look at the pump and cabinet — does it look damaged, or like it's been tampered with?

•Wiggle the card slot — is it loose?

•Look at the keypad — is it loose or does it look like something has been placed on top of it?

Additional ways consumers can protect themselves:

•Always use a credit card, not a debit card, if they're not going to pay cash — this protects the PIN and prevents access to a bank ac-

•Set card usage or transaction alerts for bank and credit card accounts. Most major banks offer apps that allow real-time monitoring

•Regularly monitor credit card and bank statements for fraudulent charges or suspicious transactions

 \bullet When possible, don't swipe the credit card — use tap to pay or use a trusted payment app on a mobile phone to pay for fuel

Whether a credit card skimmer is found by a consumer, a service technician or a merchant, the merchant is responsible for immediately notifying law enforcement and disabling all dispensers where skimmers have been located until law enforcement or TDLR investigators can remove the device. Merchants also are required by state law to notify TDLR within 24 hours.

Merchants and consumers should report skimmers via the TDLR

website: https://www.tdlr.texas.gov/Skimmers. The FCIC, which coordinates law enforcement investigations into organized financial fraud, was the first statewide unit of its kind in the United States and operates as a partnership between TDLR and the Smith County District Attorney's Office. 
