Scammers use sheriff in money g

COLDSPRING — Scammers have taken to calling San Jacinto County residents demanding money, and using the name of Sheriff Greg Capers to do so.

Capers said that recently, a local resident came to his office and reported that he received a phone call from the office number of the Sheriff — (936) 653-4367) — and the person on the phone said that they were Sheriff Greg Capers" and demanded mon-

The caller also demanded the victim divulge their Social Security number along with other sensitive identifying informa-

Scammers are now able to place phone calls and text messages from other phone numbers, Capers said, but he nor any of his

employees will call demanding money by threat of arrest.

"The court system is the one who collects payment for fines, bonds, etc.," he said. "The Sheriff's Office does not collect those monetary payments."

Capers said that if you get one of these calls, use good judgement and do not divulge any private or sensitive information, especially Social Security numbers, banking information, or debit/credit card informa-

"If you ever feel uncomfortable or are concerned about a phone call, text message, e-mail or letter, please do not hesitate to contact our dispatch at (936) 653-4367 or come to our office directly at 75 W. Cedar Ave. in Coldspring where you can be assisted by an actual representative of the San Jacinto County Sheriff's Office," he said.

Board opts to allow hurricane-related pay

SHEPHERD — The Shepherd ISD Board of Managers approved pay for employees that were unable to work because of Hurricane Beryl.

The resolution was passed during Thursday's meeting.

Superintendent Dr. Jason Hewitt said that typically during hurricane closure, there are hourly employees that can't come to work, so what typically happens is the board passes a resolution to pay the employees.

Those employees include maintenance, custodial, and security staff, as well as some business office employees — all staff that report all year long, he said.

In other business, the board:

- extended Hewitt's contract for another year for a total of 5 years, and gave him a 2 percent raise, which was similar to the rest of the staff; • approved a sanitary control easement that requires the
- district to not place septic systems or solid waste disposals • approved new meal prices approved, up 26 cents due to inflation. Student still have free and reduced lunches; the
- new prices are for adult and outside visitors; • approved contract renewals for teachers, nurses, librar-
- ians, counselors, and administrators; approved the quarterly financial report;

Crash causes HAZMAT spill

SAN JACINTO COUNTY — Texas Department of Public Safety Troopers investigated a crash on U.S. Highway 59, just north of Farm-to-Market Road 3460, that occurred on July 19.

The preliminary crash investigation indicates that at approximately 3:21 a.m., a Freightliner truck tractor semi-trailer was traveling north. It is reported that the driver was traveling at an unsafe speed around a curve and during a period of rainy weather and struck a concrete barrier.

The crash caused fluids from the engine to leak onto the highway and a HAZMAT crew was called for

The driver, 44-year-old Roderick Lee of Pearland, was not injured, but was cited for unsafe speed.

COLDSPRING — FEMA representatives in San Jacinto County have reopened the local service office to assist disaster victims

The San Jacinto Disaster Recovery Center was closed temporarily as a precaution during the landfall of Hurricane Beryl, but reopened last week, and continues to help residents within the county apply for help for both recent disasters.

The DRC in Coldspring, located at the county Innovation Center, is one of a few in the state that is managing dual disaster declarations —the first storm that included straight-line winds, flooding and tornadoes that took place April 26-June 5, and later those impacted by Hurricane Beryl.

FEMA reps remind county residents that requests for assistance must be filled out separately for each event, and that the deadline for the first event is Aug.

Effective Monday, the hours of operation are from



Abbott issues disaster declaration for East Texas flooding

The counties in the Governor's declaration include Baylor, Chambers, Dickens, Ellis, Freestone, Galveston, Grimes, Harris, Haskell, Hill, Hood, Hunt, Kaufman, Knox, Leon, Liberty, Limestone, Madison, McLennan, Montgomery, Navarro, Polk, San Jacinto, Somervell, Tarrant, Trinity, Tyler, Walker, and Wichita counties.

"The State of Texas continues to provide support and assist communities who have been impacted by recent severe weather and flooding," Abbott said. "This disaster declaration will swiftly provide Texans with all readily available resources needed to recover following storms and flood activity."

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The Crucified Christ

Sometimes foreign invaders would nail the Jews to trees or impale them on poles and leave them there for the vultures, hyenas, and other scavengers to eat, denying them a proper burial. It was the most tortuous means of execution possible and was meant as a sign of utter domination by the invader and utter humiliation of the invaded.

The Romans used crucifixion for the same reasons. The Jews

were a rebellious people, motivated in part by their religious belief that God intended them to be free. God had freed them from slavery in Egypt under Moses, and they were always looking for a new Moses, a Messiah, to lead them to freedom again.

There were five major Jewish rebellions from the time of the Roman occupation in 63 B.C. until the Romans made a final solution to the Jewish problem by destroying Jerusalem and

the Temple and dispersing the surviving Jews throughout their Empire in 70 A.D. After a rebellion in 6 A.D., the Romans crucified 2,000 Jewish Zealots in one day.

To make their point most visible, the Romans usually crucified their victims by nailing them to the trees lining the major avenues coming into Jerusalem so that everyone entering the city would see what happens to those who rebel. Probably the most traveled road entering the city was the road Galilean Jews would use.

The Galileans would come south and cross the Jordan River to the east to avoid entering the territory of the hated Samari-

tans, then re-cross the Jordan below the Samaritan territory. They would follow the road up through Jericho, passing Bethany, the Mount of Olives, and Gethsemane. Then they would follow the outer Temple and city walls through the Kidron Valley, entering the city from the south.

Upon the trees lining this road, many crucifixions took place, possibly including the crucifixion of Jesus, although no one knows for sure the location of Golgotha.

Our popular picture of the cross is that of a tall T-shaped structure of milled lumber. But archeological and historical evidence points to the probability that Jesus was crucified on a rooted tree. This hypothesis is bolstered by biblical references to Jesus being crucified on a tree.

For example, in Acts 5:30 it says, "The God of our ancestors raised up Jesus, whom you had killed by hanging him on a tree" (see also, Acts 10:39, Acts 13:29, Galatians 3:13, and I Peter 2:24). If this theory that Jesus was crucified is correct, then when the Bible says that Jesus was unable to carry his own cross, it would be referring not to the entire cross, but just the heavy crossbeam that would be lashed to a tree at the site of the crucifixion.

Jesus was unable to carry his cross not because he was a weakling, but because his back

Expanded passenger rule again on the table

A huge pot of federal rail funding and chronic highway congestion are prompting some Texas officials to again consider expanding passenger rail in Texas, according to The Texas Standard.

Congress set aside \$66 billion three years ago in the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act for rail projects across the country, sparking some interest in increasing passenger rail service between the state's major cities.

"It's like the perfect storm forming, because 20 years ago if we talked about passenger rail in Texas, it would fall on deaf ears," said Peter LeCody of the Texas Rail Advocates.

The state's population is projected to increase from 30 million now to 47 million by 2050, sparking concerns of increased dependence on cars and more road congestion.

A plan to build a high-speed rail between Dallas and Houston with speeds of more than 200 miles per hour is back on the drawing board after Amtrak shelved it due to difficulty acquiring land and leadership issues, The Tribune reported.

The Texas Central route has acquired about 30 percent of the land needed to build the Dallas-Houston line, which is expected to require more than \$30 billion in financing from governmental and private sources. A number of private landowners remain steadfastly opposed to giving up their land for the proposed line.

Uvalde school officer pleads not guilty

A former Uvalde school police officer pleaded not guilty last week to charges of failing to protect children killed and wounded in the 2022 mass shooting at Robb Elementary School in Uvalde.

Adrian Gonzales is one of two officers who have been indicted after the slow response to the shooter by nearly 400 law enforcement personnel, The Dallas Morning News reported.

Gonzales and former Uvalde schools police Chief Pete Arredondo were indicted by a Uvalde grand jury in June. Arredondo pleaded not guilty on July 10.

"Mr. Gonzales' position is he did not violate school district policy or state law," said Nico La-Hood, the former district attorney for Bexar County. LaHood is representing Gonzales.

The May 22, 2022, attack was one of the worst school shootings in U.S. history. Gonzales, one of the first officers to arrive, was indicted on 29 charges of not confronting the shooter, even after hearing gunshots while standing in a school hallway.

Inmate phone fees to be slashed across state

Fees that Texas inmates pay to make phone calls will be cut drastically under new federal regulations to take place next year, The Tribune reported.

The Federal Communications Commission voted last week to cap the price of inmate phone calls and video calls as low as 5 cents per minute. Right now, rates across Texas prisons and jails average 23 cents a minute.

Most of the revenue from these calls — 60 percent — goes to the contractor, with the rest going to

'The FCC's order is a massive victory for incarcerated people, their families, and their allies who have spent decades fighting the exploitative prison telecom industry," the Prison Policy Initiative wrote in a statement.

CenterPoint CEO apologizes for Beryl outages

The head of CenterPoint Energy publicly apologized for failing to quickly respond to massive outages caused by Hurricane Beryl, The News reported.

Jason Wells told the Public Utility Commission last week that he took "personal accountability" for the outages, which affected hundreds of thousands of customers throughout the coastal region.

At least 36 people died because of the hurricane. Many of the deaths were attributed to heat.

"While we cannot erase the frustrations or difficulties so many of our customers endured, I, and my entire leadership team, will not make excuses," Wells added. "We will improve and act with a sense of urgency."

At its peak, about 2.26 million CenterPoint customers were without power. Damage from the storm is estimated at \$4.6 billion. The company is seeking permission to harden its wire system, with the costs to be passed along to its ratepayers.

\$95 million in housing credits announced

The Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs has awarded more than \$95 million in housing tax credits to help finance the development or rehabilitation of more than 60 rental properties across the state. The awards will help developers build or repair more than 4,400 units offering affordable rents to qualified families.

"The Housing Tax Credit Program serves as a crucial factor in making affordable housing available to hard working families, senior citizens, and persons with disabilities," said TDHCA Executive Director Bobby Wilkinson.

Texas still leads nation in job creation

Texas continues to outpace the nation and lead all states for jobs added over the past 12 months, according to the Texas Workforce Commission. The state's civilian workforce reached a new high of 15.311 million in June.

"Our civilian labor force of 15.3 million people in Texas continues to prosper and break records each month," said TWC Commissioner Alberto Treviño III.

Construction jobs grew by 4.4 percent last year, far outpacing the national growth rate and leading the state's job growth.

Texans may be eligible for FEMA sheltering

AUSTIN - FEMA has approved Transitional Sheltering Assistance for Texans displaced by Hurricane Beryl in Brazoria, Chambers, Fort Bend, Galveston, Harris, Jackson, Jasper, Jefferson, Liberty, Matagorda, Montgomery, Nacogdoches, Orange, Polk, San Jacinto, Walker and Wharton

Activation of the program is expected to begin today. Residents in these counties who have applied for disaster assistance may be eligible to stay temporarily in a hotel or motel paid for by FEMA. Applicants do not need to request this assistance. FEMA will notify them of their eligibility through an automated phone call, text message, and/or email, depending upon the method of communication they selected at the time of application for disaster assistance.

Applicants may be eligible if they cannot return to their disaster-damaged home and their housing needs cannot be met by insurance, shelters or rental assistance provided by FEMA or another agency.

Under the TSA program, FEMA pays the cost of room, taxes and non-refundable pet fees directly to participating hotels and motels. Pet fees will only be paid up to the approved limit of assistance for individual rooms. Survivors are responsible for all

other costs, including laundry, restaurant/ room service, parking, telephone, or movie

If notified of TSA eligibility by FEMA, applicants may look for participating hotels on the TSA Locator: Transitional Sheltering Assistance (TSA) (femaemergencyho-

TSA participants may also be eligible for other FEMA financial help, including Displacement Assistance, Rental Assistance, Home Repair Assistance and other aspects of the Individual Assistance program.

repairs on the jail facility. Several contractors have examined the property, which has been damaged in the weather events that occurred in the county, and the results were discussed at the Wednesday meeting


Jail areas received damage from down trees and flooding, including algae and mold, cracking in mortar joints, and water seepage in different areas of the jail, as well as roof damage.





Looking back this week



In the almost 40 years that I've been penning this weekly outdoors column, I've written many times about some of the highlights of my life that began as a very rural kid hunting and fishing in northeast Texas, and later to outdoor adventures like bass fishing in Japan and the wilds of Canada to guiding for elk and bear hunts in the Rocky Mountains.

Now in my mid-70s, I feel truly blessed to still be able to climb into a bow stand in pursuit of whitetail or walk a backwoods creek bank in the early spring in pursuit of spawning white bass. I'm truly blessed with memories of countless outdoor adventures and even more blessed to still be able to make more in my golden years.

I would like to share some of the special times in the outdoors that I've been privileged to enjoy throughout my lengthy career, beginning when I was about 7 years old packing a single shot J.C. Higgings .22 in the woods behind our little farm.

My dad was a hard worker and stayed busy raising 14,000 chickens on our poultry farm when I was a kid growing up, but he found time to occasionally take me on a squirrel hunt and we camped and fished at a little lake in southeast Oklahoma every 9 or 10 weeks when the chickens sold and he was free of duties for a few days.

I remember using my little rifle in the woods behind our house to harvest a fat fox squirrel that later became the centerpiece of a pot of squirrel and dumplings. It was a windy fall day, and the squirrel was high up in the limbs of a big oak. The limb was swaying gently moving the squirrel several inches in a rhythmic motion that I timed and made a perfect but lucky shot.

Another time Daddy and I were running a trotline and had a nice channel catfish a couple of stagings up the line. He reached over to boat the fish, and in my excitement, I leaned too far and tipped the little 12-foot boat over. The water was only 4 feet deep. I remember grabbing a nearby tree trunk and hanging on. I can still picture my Dad's bald head going underwater to flip the boat over.

Looking back, I can recall many such instances that at the time seemed of little consequence but in later life give me much pleasure in recalling.

I recall fishing in a rural lake in Japan with a couple of newspaper outdoor writers from a big newspaper in Tokyo. They didn't speak English and I knew only a few words of Japanese, but we were fishermen and through gestures and facial expressions we were able to communicate nicely. Once I convinced them I knew how to Texas rig a plastic worm, we got along just fine. This was back in

the 80s and I remember watching Japanese fighter jets on training missions over the lake we were fishing. I recall thinking 40 years earlier both our countries were in a death struggle for survival in World War II, and now here I was having a blast with a couple of fine Japanese fellows. I am sure they must have had the same thoughts.

I won't forget my first time to fish a remote lake in northern Saskatchewan. My guide was a Cree Indian fellow then in his early seventies. He was old school and told me about hunting caribou with a short bow his father had made when he was a young teenager. He pulled the boat into a little cove and handed me and my buddy spinning rods.

My first time casting a lure for northern pike, I remember asking my guide for advice as to what type structure to target. His word was "water" and he was not wrong. His advice was sound, I needed to simply get my lure in the water, it didn't matter where I cast, the fish had never seen a hook and catching was easy.

For several years, I traveled to North Dakota in early October to bow hunt deer with a family that outfitted hunts on the thousands of acres of farmland they owned. There were only a few hundred people that lived in the quaint little town. I became great friends with the family and thoroughly enjoyed hunting the big body whitetail deer the region is known for. The Canadian border was only a few miles to the north and occasionally a moose that drifted down from the north would be spotted feeding along the shore of

one of the many pothole lakes.

I remember some memorable dinners served each evening in one of the old homes in town that doubled as lodges. Those ladies knew how to cook, and we often dined on pheasant we shot during mid-day between deer hunts. One of the family members served as an upland bird guide. He had a well-trained Setter and we hunted around the many old farmsteads in the area. I can still picture a big rooster pheasant flushing from hiding around some rusty old farm equipment that had been abandoned during the early part of the past century.

Old, abandoned one-room schoolhouses were situated about the countryside and for some reason, pheasant hunting was always good around the cover near these old building as well as abandoned farm houses, maybe because they provide shelter from the heavy snow in the winter.

I could go on and on recounting things I've seen and experienced in the six-plus decades I can recall in the outdoors. I'm sure if you are a bit long in the tooth you too have countless fond memories of people and places, this is one of the benefits of living an outdoor lifestyle. In retrospect, it's not the big fish I caught or the game animals I have hunted for sport and meat, it's the wonderful people I have had the privilege of spending time with that now matter most to

This coming week, it will be time to make a few more memories; I have a fishing guide buddy that has been catching some big blue catfish during the summer. As most serious catfishermen know, fall and winter months have always been the best for targeting big blues. My buddy says he believes the big fish spawn is over and catfish are no longer guarding nest but rather dispersed on the lake again, chasing baitfish. Duty calls and more on this rather

unique fishing pattern later.

As part of its long-term electric supply resource plan, ETI has determined that it needs additional generating resources in the near future. The docket number and style of the application are PUC Docket No. 56865, Application of Entergy Texas, Inc. to Amend its Certificate of Convenience and Necessity to Construct a Portfolio of Renewable Generation Resources. ETI is not seeking to change its rates in this proceeding.

Segno will be located on 1,168 acres of "greenfield" at a site in south-central Polk County, Texas, approximately 2 miles west of the unincorporated community of Segno and approximately 3.5 miles east of Texas State Highway ("SH") 146. The Segno project site is not within five miles of any municipality, and Sam Houston Electric Cooperative is the only neighboring utility providing utility service within five miles of the project site. Votaw will be located on 614 acres of 'greenfield" at a site in the northwestern portion of Hardin County, Texas, approximately 0.5 miles southeast of the unincorporated community of Votaw. The Votaw project site is not within five miles of any municipality, and Sam Houston Electric Cooperative is the only neighboring utility providing utility service within five miles of the project site. A map showing the locations of the Renewable Portfolio resources may be viewed at ETI's offices at 350 Pine Street, Beaumont, Texas 77701, and is included with notices published in newspapers of general circulation in ETI's service area. A copy of the map may also be obtained by contacting tcr@entergy.com.

The total estimated cost of the Renewable Portfolio is approximately \$656 million, comprised of \$352 million for Segno and \$304 million for Votaw, inclusive of estimated costs of transmission upgrades and interconnection costs, contingency, an allowance for funds used during construction, and expenses related to seeking Commission certification. These costs are based on a February 2027 commercial operation date for Segno and a

May 2028 commercial operation date for Votaw. muscles would have been ripped out by 39 lashes with a cat o' nine tails, which had sharp stones and glass fragments imbedded in each of the nine leather strips. The Romans limited the number of lashes to 39 because it was believed that no one could survive 40.

The Jews themselves generally did not crucify anyone because the Old Testament says in Deuteronomy 21:23, ... anyone hung on a tree is under God's curse." Crucifixion is what others did to Jews, not Jews to Jews. If the Jews wanted to execute someone, they used the more merciful means of stoning someone to death.

The Jewish ruling council, called the Sanhedrin, could have stoned Jesus to death as they did Stephen in Acts 7:54-60. But Jesus was very popular with the crowds as evidenced in John 12:19, "The Pharisees the said to one another, 'You see, you can do nothing. Look, the world has gone after him." The Chief Priest, the members of the Sanhedrin, and the priestly families who had a monopoly in the Temple marketplace where Roman money was exchanged for Jewish money and approved animals were purchased for sacrifice in the Temple did not want Jesus to be the Messiah because their positions of power, prestige, and wealth were granted by the Romans, and any revolt would mean the loss of their positions. If the Sanhedrin had stoned Jesus, he would have become a popular martyr and their likely would have been a riot by the people. If that happened, they would have all lost their positions. So, to save themselves, they presented Jesus to the Roman Proconsul, Pontius Pilate, and charged him with insurrection and treason. To have the Romans crucify Jesus on a tree would mean that Jesus could not possibly be the Messiah because "anyone who hung a on a tree is under God's curse" (Deut.

Since the Messiah had to be blessed and not cursed by God, a person who was crucified could not possibly be the Messiah.

The "Crucified Christ" was the ultimate oxymoron in the mind of the Jews. It just could not be. St. Paul said, "We proclaim Christ crucified, a stumbling block to Jews, and foolishness to Gentiles, but to those who are called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God. For God's foolishness is wiser than human wisdom, and God's weakness is stronger than human strength" (I Corinthians 1:23-25). The Jews could not conceive of a crucified Messiah, and the Gentiles thought it silly that a powerless person could

be the Savior. But God had other ideas.

Jesus preached, "Blessed are the peacemakers," the "meek," and the "poor," which sounded awfully foolish in a world where obtaining and maintaining power meant everything. He died in meekness, humiliation, and poverty. His sacrifice brings the hope of peace in our world. His approach to obtaining that life which is abundant and eternal was verified by the Resurrection.

The one who hung on the tree was not cursed and deserted by God after all. Rather, God was with him in his suffering and humiliation. God was so unified with him that death, the cross, and the grave could not hold him. He rose in victory and triumph. The lifestyle and teachings of Jesus of forgiveness, peace, non-violence, and loving even one's enemies instead of striking out in vengeance were verified by the Almighty.

God is with us even in the most cursed and tortuous of experiences. If you are looking for peace in your soul and meaning and fulfillment in your life, look toward the cross and find the Crucified and Risen Christ.
