VFW organizing Helene relief project

WOODVILLE – With the Veterans of Foreign Wars national organization commander-in-chief giving a call for service last week on the organization's 125th anniversary, the Woodville VFW Post #2033 has answered that call.

The post is organizing a relief project to help all of the victims of the catastrophic Hurricane Helene. According to Post Commander Michael King, the post is working on getting all the posts throughout the district (District 19) as well as the state level organization to adopt and make a united stance to help fellow Americans in their time of great need.

Helene made landfall on Thursday, Sept. 26, as a Category 4 hurricane, which caused widespread and devastating flooding across Florida, North Carolina, South Carolina and Georgia, and according to data analytics from CoreLogic, up to \$47.5 billion in property losses are estimated to have been caused by the storm. At press time, Florida was bracing for another potentially catastrophic storm, Milton, which was projected to make landfall late Wednesday as a Category 4.

King cited the federal government's slow response in providing assistance to Helene victims as part of the need for organizations and individuals to help fellow Americans in need.

Ĥe said that the VFW would like to synchronize the entire county in order to help assist in the efforts, including civic organizations, businesses, local churches and youth groups. Anyone who is interested in helping can email King at cmd@vfw2033.org.

"The VFW national motto is 'continuing to serve' and it is a national service organization with posts located throughout the disaster area," King said.

"Let's come together and show how we as Americans can help each other. How many times have others come to help us out. Now is the time to return the favor."

The Dirty Dozen: What parents need to know

The Dirty Dozen – at one time that name brought to mind a classic, action-packed war film featuring late greats like Lee Marvin, Charles Bronson and John Cassavetes. Now, that name has another connotation, one of which parents and educators need to be aware.

Each year the National Center on Sexual Exploitation (NCSE) releases its Dirty Dozen list, which serves as a compendium of 12 applications and websites that contribute to the online sexual abuse and/or exploitation of minors.

According to NCSE's recent release of the listing, the Dirty Dozen has existed since 2013 and has "galvanized thousands of individuals...to call on corporations, government agencies and organizations to change problematic policies and practices," which make it easier for predators to utilize technologies and platforms to lure their prey.

NČSE claims its efforts have yielded major victories at such tech giants as Google, Netflix, TikTok and Verizon, among others.

Many of these companies have, unknowingly, facilitated and enabled predators. This year, the list is led by Apple.

Not all of the platforms listed seem like they would be popular with children, however, adults use them and, therefore, children might have access to them when the adults leave them logged-on on devices to which children might use.

The Dirty Dozen, aside from its 12 platforms to watch out for, also includes a "Watch List" of potentially harmful sites. This year, the only one named is Snapchat, which, according to NCSE, can change a child's life forever in a snap. "[T]he impact of sextortion, grooming and child sex abuse can last a lifetime. This app is dangerous by its very design."

NCSE invites victims of sexual exploitation to share their stories, as "sometimes it's useful to focus on personal healing first. But for many, sharing their past or current experiences may be a resorative and liberating process." The agency's website, endsexual exploitation.org, has information on how to do this.

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Good neighbors helping good neighbors Woodville VFD awarded grant from State Farm

WOODVILLE – The Woodville Volunteer Fire Department was recently named as one of the 100 volunteer fire departments, nationwide, to receive a \$10,000 grant from State Farm.

The grant, which is made in collaboration with the National Volunteer Fire Council, is to purchase needed equipment, and according to a news release, was announced just in time for Fire Prevention Week, which lasts from Oct. 6 until Saturday, Oct. 12.

"Thanks to this donation from State Farm and the National Volunteer Fire Council, we will be better able to serve nor only our community but our neighboring communities as well ensuring that our volunteers have the proper equipment to execute tasks in a safe and efficient manner," said Woodville VFD Chief Alan Gartner.

According to State Farm, through its Good Neighbor Firefighter Safety program, it has been able to award \$1 million in grants to help volunteer fire departments, across the country, obtain needed equipment to increase responders' safety, effectiveness and ability to serve their communities.

This is the first year that the grant has been awarded.

Woodville VFD intends to purchase four sets of gear and four gas/ CO meters, which can swiftly detect hazardous gases, ensuring that firefighters can promptly assess and mitigate risks in emergency situations.

According to Gartner, Woodville VFD currently has 34 active volunteers, and serves an area of approximately 278 square miles, comprising a population of roughly 8,000+ people. The department responds to about 225 calls a year, which include wildfires, structure fires, vehicle accidents, medical calls and mutual aid calls.

WOODVILLE – The Rose Mobile Mammography Coach is coming to Tyler County on Tuesday, Oct. 29.

Residents will soon have convenient access to life-saving breast cancer screenings. The Rose Mobile Mammography Coach is scheduled to visit in Woodville, hosted by Tyler County AgriLife Extension. The coach will be parked at 201 Veterans Way in Woodville, offering on-site mammograms for women, especially those who face barriers to traditional healthcare.

The Rose is known for providing quality breast cancer screening services, regardless of a patient's financial situation. They accept most major insurance plans, and assistance is available for those without coverage. This visit provides a crucial opportunity for early detection, which can significantly improve outcomes for those affected by breast cancer.

How to Sign Up: Appointments are required and can be made by calling (281) 464-5136 or visiting www.therose.org/mobile and entering code: TYCOAG. To qualify, women must be 35 or older, have a primary care physician, be due for a mammogram, not have any breast health symptoms or problems, currently not pregnant or nursing, and have not been diagnosed with breast cancer within the past two years. A physician's order is needed and the deadline to schedule an appointment is Oct. 22. Uninsured or underinsured women can apply for financial assistance directly through The Rose.

Residents are encouraged to schedule their appointments early, as spots are expected to fill up quickly. Don't miss this chance to prioritize your health.



State Farm, in its news release, referred to volunteer fire departments as "critical" in the role their play in protecting communities and rural areas. "However, they often operate on tight budgets and struggle to find the funding for needed equipment. In collaboration with the NVFC, State Farm aimed to award 50 grants to local fire departments. However, the overwhelming response prompted State Farm to double its commitment to 100 grants, benefiting even more local departments and communities," the news release stated.









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

Donald Trump's apocalyptic vision for America

Have you noticed the incredible decline in American society? According to Donald Trump, it's nearly impossible to miss. Just step outside your front door, and you might encounter the dangerous world he describeswhere, in his words, roving bands of immigrants with AR-15s have taken over, and even your pets aren't safe.

In a recent speech in California, Trump described the state as a "hellscape," blaming Democratic leadership for what he sees as a collapse of public order. For his most fervent supporters, this vision of America resonates deeply, but it's a vision that poses serious risks to the nation.

Though exaggeration is common in politics, Trump's description of America in collapse is a calculated



strategy. It stokes fear, deepens division, and undermines trust in the very institutions on which democracy depends. The consequences are dangerous: it could destabilize the nation by fueling political violence and widening cultural divides.

As the 2024 election approaches, Trump has ramped up this apocalyptic narrative, with constant references to cities overrun by crime and a nation on the verge of collapse. This dystopian framing taps into genuine fears-particularly among those feeling left behind economically or threatened by demographic shifts. For some, Trump's message offers a validation of their anxieties. But this dark portrayal of a failing nation is more than just an outlet for frustration; it's a dangerous tool that fosters paranoia and distrust.

One of the most harmful elements of Trump's rhetoric is its effect on public confidence in democracy. By painting the country as a failed state,

Trump suggests that institutions—courts, law enforcement, and elections—are broken or corrupt. This isn't new; he has long challenged the

legitimacy of U.S. elections, even falsely claiming the 2020 election was stolen.

Democracy thrives on citizens' trust. When that trust erodes, it opens the door to radical, even violent responses. If people believe that the system is rigged or ineffective, they may turn to extra-legal measures, including violence, to "save" the country.

Trump's words have already had real-world consequences, from the rise of political violence during his first campaign to the January 6 insurrection. His persistent calls to "fight" and "take back our country" have inspired some of his supporters to see themselves as soldiers in a battle for America's soul. As Trump continues to depict the nation in apocalyptic terms, this dangerous trend could worsen, emboldening farright militias and extremist groups who view themselves as defending the country from a corrupt government.

There is another aspect to Trump's vision: it sets the stage for authoritarian solutions. If America is as broken as he claims, then only a strongman—someone willing to break the rules—can fix it. This is a classic authoritarian tactic: invent a crisis, then present yourself as the sole solution. Trump's "law and order" promises fit this narrative, where restoring safety might require sacrificing democratic norms.

History shows that authoritarian regimes often rise by exploiting crises, real or imagined. Trump's dystopian rhetoric, combined with his authoritarian inclinations, threatens to erode America's democratic foundations. And by deepening divisions within the country, Trump's apocalyptic vision further pushes the U.S. toward unrest.

When political rhetoric becomes so extreme that it dehumanizes opponents, the possibility of reconciliation fades. Trump's dystopian narrative does not offer solutions; it accelerates polarization, pushing the country closer to civil unrest.

Ultimately, Trump's rhetoric represents more than exaggerated campaign talk. It's a deliberate and dangerous narrative that threatens to erode trust in democracy, incite violence, and pave the way for authoritarianism. In this critical moment, Americans must reject the apocalyptic vision Trump offers. The country is not beyond repair, and the solutions lie in renewing our faith in democracy and rebuilding trust in its institutions.

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
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Lawmen seize nearly two pounds of drugs

COLMESNEIL - The combined efforts of multiple law enforcement agencies resulted in the confiscation of nearly two pounds of suspected methamphetamine not making its way to the streets.

According to Tyler County District Attorney Lucas Babin, an ongoing investigation, which was initiated in May of this year, resulted in the arrest of a Colmesneil man, Demonte Rashaan Siggers, age 24.

Siggers is currently in the custody

of the Tyler County Jail and charged with four felony charges of manufacture/delivery of a controlled substance.

Babin said that the investigation was a joint effort between his office, the Tyler County Sheriff's Office and the Texas Department of Public Safety – CID.

The agencies, along with the U.S. Marshal Service, served Siggers the four felony warrants at his residence last Thursday, Oct. 3, and after placing him into custody, they executed a search warrant of the home, along with associated vehicles.

Officers were able to discover and

ing the case.

"I look forward to reviewing these cases and making sure justice is done in Tyler County," he said.

Learning Everywhere

Schools are not the only place children learn, and they were never meant to be. Long before there were formal schools, parents taught children important skills.

As children dress, talk about the colors of the clothes and identify the parts of the garments. Think about the words to learn about a pair of jeans ... zipper, snaps, belt loops, pockets, legs, waist, color, etc., not to mention directions such as pull up, button, zip, in, etc. During bath time, words such

as faucet, drain, shower, on, off, turn, hot, cold, empty, wash cloth, towel, soap, clean, dirty, wash, scrub, and identifying smells of soap, shampoo, and the sounds of running water are just a few of the words to learn. Young children need to recognize colors and shapes. Any walk along the street, any trip to the grocery store is a learning experience if parents talk to kids about what they are seeing. Just like the jeans, there is much to identify and talk about that children need to know. The importance of such learning during every day at home, while walking or shopping, is impossible to emphasize too much. Parents, who are the first and best teachers, ultimately determine how successful children will be in school and in their adult lives by how they guide children in their earliest learning.

There is just too much kids need to know not to give them the earliest possible start.

• **Cash App** – This popular peer-to-peer payment application is cited because it "appeals to pimps, predators and pedophiles looking for a covert way to conduct criminal activity."

• CDA Section 230 - The Communications Decency Act, section 230, is, according to NCSE, "The Greatest Enabler of Online Sexual Exploitation." The act grants Big Tech blanket immunity for any and all types of abuses they facilitate, according to NCSE, and unless Section 230 is amended, corporations cannot be held accountable.

• Cloudfare – This provides a platform for sex buyers and traffickers, according to NCSE, as well as prostitution forums and deepfake sites.

• **Discord** – This platform is a "hotspot for dangerous interactions and deepfakes," according to NCSE, and is popular with predators looking to create, trade or find sexually abusive content of children and unsuspecting adults.

• LinkedIn – A professional networking platform that doesn't seem like a place

SQUIRREL HUNTING, THEN AND NOW

Some of my most fond childhood memories revolve around squirrel hunting and the great meals my mother prepared after a successful hunt. I remember way back in about 1958 when I was an 8 year old whippersnapper making what was to be the luckiest shot of my life. My Dad and I were hunting in the 'back 40' woods behind our little farm. The wind was blowing hard and in the top of a huge white oak, a big fox squirrel was eating acorns. I timed the sway of the branch perfectly and squeezed the trigger of my little single shot J.C. Higgins .22. A perfect head shot that damaged no meat! I was amazed and my Dad was astonished as well. I remember thinking I was Daniel Boone as I put the makings of a fine meal in my game bag. The morning hunt progressed and I missed a couple of easy shots with the little rifle. Looking back my shot was mostly luck but tell that to a kid that just shot a squirrel high up in a tree from a branch swaying heavily with the wind!

White tailed deer were just getting established from restocking in Red River County where we lived. Squirrel hunting remained a big deal with most of us country folks. Groups of hunters would set up wall tent camps using government surplus tends and camp for several days, hunting and eating squirrel. Each camp would devise contests ranging from number of squirrels harvest tournaments to voting on the best squirrel cook. I was too young to partake of these 'camps' but I did visit them during mid day a couple times and enjoyed some great meals the men made from the fruits of their hunt.

Mr. Guthrey owned a mixed breed hound that did double duty on raccoons at night but served well as a squirrel dog during the day. We would occasionally borrow the mixed breed raw boned hound to hunt behind Mr. Guthrey's cabin and to a budding young hunter; these hunts were highly anticipated events. It was hard to keep

my mind on class work at the old Dimple School when October and cooler weather rolled around. The old hound had a lot of Black and Tan breeding and he could cover ground quickly. He knew the woods well and the spots the squirrels frequented most. The drill was pretty simple; we turned the hound loose and waited until he barked treed, usually in a big old oak den tree. If the squirrel didn't disappear into a hole, one of us would remain stationary and the other circle the tree in efforts to move the bushy tail into position for a shot. I hunted with my single shot .22 and my brother in law used a tight choked 12 gauge. Our plan was for me to take stationary shots but if the squirrel was on the move, the shotgun was a better choice. We encountered mostly grey or 'cat' squirrels along the creeks and the larger fox squirrels when hunting the hardwoods or field edges. My success rate was low on the cat squirrels. They seldom held still long enough for a rifle shot. I later switched to a .410 shotgun loaded with #4 or #6 shot and my success rate became much better. It was challenging to hunt with the .22 but squirrels in the game bag and ultimately in my mother's cast iron skillet was the name of the game back then!

I'm happy to say that squirrel hunting is still popular in east Texas; not as popular is it was back in the fifties and sixties but thankfully older hunters have passed their love of hunting and cooking squirrel along to younger generations. I sometime get a chuckle out of uninformed 'city' folks that liken squirrels to rats. When I tell them that I grew in east Texas in an era when squirrel were considered a delicacy, I raise some eyebrows. When I tell them I still relish a big skillet of smothered squirrel with rice and gravy, I really get some 'looks'! But that's okay, as the old saying goes "they don't know because they don't know"!

are a bit more challenging to clean (butcher) than most other small game but the task is easily learned, there are plenty of good You-Tube videos that detail the process. When teaching newcomers to the squirrel woods the art of cooking squirrel, I compare squirrel with chicken. A big complaint is how tough some squirrels are when fried. I ask my student, "If you were going to butcher a chicken to fry, would you choose a tough old rooster or a younger "Fryer"? Granted, It's possible to par boil or pressure cook mature squirrels and then dust the pieces with flour and fry but I usually reserve the older squirrel for stew or, better yet, dumplings. Young squirrel can simply be seasoned with salt and pepper, dusted with flour and chicken fried.

One of my favorite recipes is smothered squirrel, using my mother's tried and true method. Both young and older squirrels can be used in this slow cooking method. First fry the pieces until crispy and drain most of the oil, making sure to leave the crispy bits in the skillet. Next, add flour salt and pepper and either water or milk and make gravy. Place the squirrel back into the skillet and thin the gravy a bit with water. Cover the skillet or Dutch Kettle and bake at 300 degrees for an hour or so, checking half way through the process to make sure the liquid has not steamed out. I like to stir the squirrel pieces with gravy at this point and add more liquid if necessary. Served with hot biscuits and white rice, this is a meal that will likely become one of your favorite dishes. Squirrel meat is often described as "Sweet". It definitely has a mild flavor. I like to describe it tasting much like free ranging chickens but with even more flavor.

There's plenty of time to get out in the woods and hunt squirrel this fall and winter. Try preparing the above recipe at deer camp and see how many of your family and friends you can enlighten! Once a properly prepared meal of squirrel is enjoyed, the term 'tree rat' will likely not be in their vocabulary any longer!

FAIR. Water stain; 85 degrees; 0.36 feet below pool. Mayflies are hatching, so expect some topwater bass action. Bass are fair on soft plastics in the cuts, or with frogs over grass. Crappie are fair with jigs in flooded timber. Catfish are fair on juglines.

GOOD. Water stained; 80 degrees; 0.02 feet below pool. Bass fishing is tough after the weather has warmed. We need some cool nights to get these fish fired up again. There is still some schooling action on the lake hitting flukes, pop r's, buzz baits and frogs. To find the bait ook for the lily pads and grass lines and listen for the pads popping. Fish in the cuts in the river with rattle traps or shad color crankbaits. Clutching a suitcase in one hand and a satchel full of cash in the other on Oct. 15, 1878, Mifflin Kenedy caught the train for Dodge City where his son Spike was charged with the murder of a popular female entertainer. As the owner of the Laureles Ranch near Corpus Christi, the Pennsylvania Quaker and former sea captain had money to burn and had already spent a chunk of his fortune buying Spike's freedom. But the young hellraiser's past escapades could not compare to the world of trouble he had gotten himself into in the Kansas cowtown. In the looks department, 23-year-old James "Spike" Kenedy took after his mother, the attractive daughter of a former provincial governor of Spanish Texas. Like so many rich kids before and since, the apple of his wealthy daddy's eye felt he was above the law and free to do as he pleased. An incident in Ellsworth, Kan., six years earlier cemented that idea in Spike's head. When an argument over a poker hand resulted in gunshot wounds for the Texas teenager and an adversary, Mifflin greased enough palms to make his legal problems disappear. Hoping to keep the neer-do-well closer to home where he just might settle down, the frustrated father set him up with a cattle ranch in the Panhandle. Instead of taking the opportunity to grow up, Spike left the hard work of



was not the case, as a Wyatt Earp biographer stead of his intended target's, the Texan turned later explained: "Jim Kennedy (sic) elected to kill Kelley in his sleep by shooting through the flimsy wall of the bedroom at the front of the mayor's two-room shack" behind the Great Western Hotel. In the predawn darkness of Oct. 4, 1878, Spike slipped unseen into Dodge, stopped his horse outside Kelley's shack and fired two shots through the wall where he believed his tormentor was sleeping. What he did not know at the time was that Dog Kelley had given his bed to Dora Hand for the night. One of the .44 caliber slugs pierced her side killing the woman instantly. Even though there were no eyewitnesses to the "ride-by" shooting, the unanimous opinion was that Spike Kenedy had committed the despicable crime. Sheriff Bat Masterson and Assistant Marshal Wyatt Earp at first resisted public pressure to pursue the suspect, but at two o'clock that afternoon the future legends grudgingly gave chase with a large posse at their backs. Despite the fugitive's 10-hour head start, they caught up with him the following day. Spike tried to make a run for it, but Masterson used his .50 caliber rifle to knock him out of the saddle with a clean shot through the shoulder. The first words out of Spike's mouth amounted to an admission of guilt. "Did I kill him?"

ing back to Texas to lick his wounds. But that he asked Earp. Told he had taken Dora's life inon Masterson. "You ought to have made a bet-ter shot than you did!" "I did the best I could," was Bat's sarcastic response. Mifflin Kenedy did not know the identity of the murder victim nor the circumstances of the crime until he met in private with Earp and Masterson. His sole concern was whether he had brought enough money. Judging from the outcome, he had. A brief article in the Oct. 29, 1878, edition of a Dodge City newspaper reported the acquittal of James Kenedy. "His trial took place in the sheriff's office, which was too small to admit spectators. We do not know what the evidence was or upon what grounds he was acquitted." Mifflin Kenedy outlived his three sons and one of two daughters. Spike died of natural causes in 1884 while awaiting trial for murder. His death came 12 years after his baby brother was laid to rest and four years before the lone surviving son was gunned down by a jealous husband.

punching cows to the hired hands and made straight for Dodge City.

He arrived in the "Bibulous Babylon of the Frontier" about the same time as Dora Hand, a 34-year-old stage performer from back east who had relocated at the urging of her friend Fannie Garretson. An Old West historian outdid himself with this over-the-top description of Dora: "By all accounts, she was a beautiful creature, with a face and voice which gave men strange nostalgic dreams of better days and finer surroundings."

Spike fell hard for the singer and mistook her flirtatious manner for genuine affection. Dog Kelley, the mayor and part-owner of the Alhambra Saloon where Dora sang five nights a week, took pleasure in bursting the lovesick puppy's bubble. Humiliated by the revelation, Spike retaliated with his fists only to be beaten to a pulp.

When the bruised and battered prodigal son spurred his mount out of town, the mayor and everyone else in Dodge presumed he was go-

Top state lawmakers plan to address soaring homeowners insurance premiums when they return to Austin in January for the next legislative session, according to the Houston Chronicle.

The state's insurance commissioner, Cassie Brown, told a Senate committee that home insurance rates increased last year by more than 21% statewide, twice the average increase in 2022.

More severe and frequent disasters are blamed for the spike in rates. In addition to more severe and more frequent storms, higher home values and higher costs for construction and labor are also factors. The median home price in Texas has risen 40% in the past five years.

"All this new value needs coverage, which results in bigger bills for consumers," Brown said.

Lawmakers reportedly will consider changes to the state's file-and-use system, which allows insurance companies to raise rates and then seek regulatory approval. Brown said the Texas Department of Insurance reviews all rate filings but "rarely" disapproves any of them.

"If we tighten up the criteria that you have to look at in order to approve their rates — I would expect that if it's harder to get a rate increase approval, that would help Texans with their premiums on their insurance," state Sen. Donna Campbell, R-New Braunfels, said.

Alarm sounded over languishing farm bill

Texas farmers, ranchers and lawmakers are voicing concerns that an economic catastrophe is in the works if Congress doesn't approve a new farm bill by the end of the year. The 2018 version — good for five years — has finally expired, The Texas Tribune reported, after being extended until Sept. 30.

In a letter to the House Republican leadership signed by 140 members of Congress, the signers warned that waiting until next year to pass a bill will have a nationwide effect.

The negative impacts of failing to act will not just stop at the farm gate," the letter said, "but will (affect) Main Street businesses, rural communities, and the national economy."

The Farm, Food, and National Security act is considered a "must-pass" piece of federal legislation. The bill supports more than 230,000 farmers and ranchers in Texas, and the state's food and agriculture sectors reportedly contribute more than \$860.8 billion in economic activity while employ-



efits.

"We need our members of Congress and leadership in Congress to recognize there's no room for delay anymore," said Laramie Adams of the Texas Farm Bureau, said. "It's time to actually work together to get something done."

Texas has more than 18 million registered voters

Texas has hit a high-water mark with more than 18 million registered voters. The voter registration rolls are growing at a faster pace than the population's growth, indicating increased interest in signing up to vote. The Chronicle reported the state has added nearly 2.6 million voters since 2018.

Most of the growth has come in Harris County and along the I-35 corridor, areas that tend to vote more Democratic. While Republicans have not lost a statewide race in 30 years, results are getting tighter.

"We are in a competitive state, and we are not going to win just sitting on our laurels," said Dave Carney, a veteran Republican strategist who has been a key political adviser to Gov. Greg Abbott and former Gov. Rick Perry.

Judge ends probe into alleged vote harvesting

A federal judge has stopped the state's ability to investigate alleged cases of vote harvesting, such as the probe into the League of United Latin American Citizens by Attorney General Ken Paxton, The Tribune reported.

The probe was being conducted under a provision of a law passed in 2021 that targeted voter outreach groups suspected of offering vote-harvesting services. Voter outreach groups have complained of overreach by Paxton's office and widespread confusion over the law's implications.

Paxton last week vowed to appeal.

"A ruling — weeks prior to an election — preventing my office from investigating potential election violations is deeply troubling and risks undermining public trust in our political

Voter outreach groups hailed the ruling, saying the restrictions violated the U.S. Constitution by being vague and restricting free speech.

Texas leads nation in road rage shootings

A newsroom dedicated to reporting on gun violence reports Texas is leading the country in road rage shootings, according to data from 2014 through 2023.

The Austin American-Statesman reported on the findings by The Trace, which concluded the number of people shot in road rage incidents surged over 400% during that time period, with 456 shooting incidents reported last year.

Two Texas cities topped the list of road rage shootings during that 10-year period. Houston reported 215 total incidents with 192 shootings and 207 victims shot, while San Antonio reported 107 total incidents with 83 shootings and 94 victims shot.

During that 10-year period in Texas, 146 people were shot and killed in road rage incidents, while 435 were wounded. In addition, 26 suspects were killed and 14 wounded.

Shorter days bring higher risks for pedestrians

The change in seasons brings fewer daylight hours and higher risks for pedestrian safety, according to the Texas Department of Transportation. Last October was the deadliest month for pedestrians, with 80 dying in Texas traffic crashes.

"As the fall and winter months usher in shorter days and less light, pedestrians are at increased risk on our roads," Tx-DOT Executive Director Marc Williams said. "Drivers may struggle to see pedestrians in lower-light conditions and must stay alert to avoid preventable collisions."

Motorists are urged to stop and yield to pedestrians in crosswalks; yield while turning to pedestrians; put phones away; and observe the posted speed limit. Pedestrians are reminded to cross streets only at intersections and crosswalks; make eye contact with drivers before crossing; wear reflective material at night; and also put away all electronic devices.

Statewide sales taxes totaled \$3.8 billion in September

AUSTIN — Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar announced last week that state sales tax revenue totaled nearly \$3.85 billion in September, 1.5 percent more than in September 2023. The majority of September sales tax revenue is based on sales made in August and remitted to the agency in September.

"While overall September sales tax collections grew modestly, receipts were down

"Receipts from restaurants increased from a year ago, though at slightly below the rate of inflation for food away from home for August."

Total sales tax revenue for the three months ending in September 2024 was up 0.7 percent compared with the same period a year ago, which is below the 2.5 percent annual Consumer Price Index increase reported for August and suggests that spending on taxable items is down from a year ago in real terms. Sales tax is the largest source of state funding for the state budget, accounting for 58 percent of all tax collections. Texas collected the following revenue from other major taxes:




