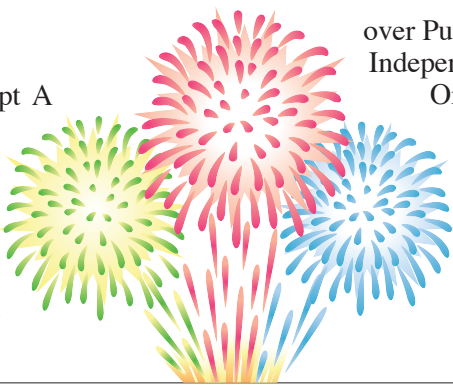

Nothing to dance about

2020 Senior Prom officially cancelled

In comments to Purcell's school board, superintendent Dr. Sheli McAdoo addressed both the COVID-19 pandemic and Black Lives Matter protests that have sparked riots and looting in parts of the country.

"We are at a very powerful place in the nation's history," she said Monday, adding next month she will present a resolution to the board calling for "making school a place for everybody."

The Class of 2020 senior prom was pushed back to July 16 when schools were closed in the spring due to the pandemic. That event is now cancelled.

"We will not be able to put on the prom," she said, citing social distancing guidelines.

McAdoo said she is encouraged by response to return to school surveys the district sent to parents and staff.

She bragged on the district's food service staff which has continued to feed students this

Is takeout food safe during the COVID-19 pandemic?

For several months, Oklahomans have been hunkered down in their homes as a safety precaution during the COVID-19 pandemic.

While this extra time at home has prompted some to spend more time in the kitchen trying new recipes, others have opted for takeout, curbside delivery or home delivery for their meals.

Although the restrictions are being lifted around the state and many restaurants have reopened their doors, the dining-in experience still may not be a great idea for everyone, especially those with underlying health concerns.

However, there isn't any current research to suggest COVID-19 can be transmitted by food or food packaging, and there haven't been any reports of food transmission made to the Centers of Disease Control and Prevention, the Food and Drug Administration or the United States Department of Agriculture.

Takeout and curbside food delivery is still a great option for many Oklahomans, not only for those with a weakened immune system. It also helps support current recommendations for social distancing. If food were to become contaminated with COVID-19, stomach acid, which is very acidic, would inactivate the virus.

Because COVID-19 is a respiratory virus, it isn't well-suited to infect the gastrointestinal system. To help alleviate chances of cross contamination, many restaurants have instituted no-touch options, which further minimizes the risks.

Once the food goes into the oven, it is not touched again by anyone other than the consumer.

However, to further cut down on risk, it's always best to wash your hands at least 20 seconds with warm water and soap, or use hand sanitizer after handling food packaging from your takeout order.

Regulations for Garage Sales

1. A resident may have one garage sale per calendar quarter. A permit must be obtained from City Hall for each sale. A sale may be held for up to three consecutive days. There are no rain checks.
 2. A garage sale permit fee of \$5 must be paid for each garage sale held.
 3. Your garage sale permit must be displayed at the site designated on the permit.
 4. Garage sale signs may not be placed on the city street right-of-way, on any utility pole or street sign, in the center median, or on any private property without the permission of property owner.
 5. All signs must be removed within 48 hours after the sale.
 6. If you have any questions, call the City of Purcell at 527-6561 daytime from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.
- If you have questions for the Oklahoma Tax Commission, call them at (405) 521-3274.
- Violation of any of these regulations may result in revocation of your permit and a fine.

Rolling back reporting

AG's office urged release of COVID-19 data

Attorney General Mike Hunter has some advice for the Oklahoma State Department of Health – releasing data about COVID-19 infections does not violate state or federal law, as long as individuals are not identifiable.

Now after consultation with the attorney general, the OSDH will resume releasing local infection data and deaths.

Demographic data, such as age and race, will only be released in aggregate.

“Releasing the total numbers of each locality, county and state-wide demographic data threads the needle of providing up-to-date information to the public while protecting the privacy of Oklahomans,” Hunter said. “This data is important for citizens to have at their disposal to make informed decisions.”

Hunter credited OSDH Interim Commissioner Lance Frye and Secretary of Health Jerome Loughridge for bring-

ing the issue to the his office's attention for review.

While state law prohibits the department of health from disclosing personal health information, it may nonetheless release epidemiological information for statistical purposes in such a way that no person can be identified, Hunter said.

Officials were concerned that releasing detailed demographic information could inadvertently identify someone who is infected with or died from COVID-19, which would violate state laws on medical record confidentiality.

“I am pleased we found a way to provide this data that upholds the law and protects Oklahomans,” Loughridge said, thanking Hunter for “helping us get to this conclusion.”

Previously, the numbers were being released under the Catastrophic Health Emergency Powers Act, which allowed the governor to temporarily suspend state laws that could hinder the state's ability to respond to a health emergency or increase the health threat to the population. The emergency declaration under that act ex-

pired June 1.

“It is incumbent upon us as state leaders to protect sensitive health information,” Frye said. “I encourage Oklahomans to use the information to make informed decisions in dealing with the COVID-19 pandemic.”

Under estimate City saving on PMH sewer

The Purcell Public Works Authority will spend \$485,908.40 on a sanitary sewer project to serve the new hospital.

The good news is the contract awarded Friday to Krapff Reynolds Construction Company of Oklahoma City is more than \$171,000 below the original construction estimate.

And with funds already set aside for a contingency, the project's cushion stands at around \$230,000.

City engineer Kenny Sullivan told trustees at the meeting that the sanitary sewer project drew four bids, but the lowest bid was withdrawn soon after the bid opening on June 4.

D. Owen Construction LLC's bid was “extremely” low – enough to raise Sullivan's concerns.


Sullivan called the owner, Derry Owen, after the bid opening and expressed his concerns. Owen said he was concerned too and called back within the hour to withdraw the bid, which failed to take into account the need to get across the interstate.

The Purcell City Council also approved an amendment correcting a \$1.18 million omission to expenditures in

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
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Are you kidding, defunding police?

Organizer Samantha Resendiz and her following are to be commended.

She assured Purcell Chief of Police Bobby Elmore if the protest got out of hand she would call the whole thing off.

The Oklahoman reported a similar peaceful protest was held Monday in Ponca City.

All of the protests have come after the death of George Floyd, who died in police custody in Minneapolis.

What the O.J. Simpson murder trial taught me

On Oct. 3, 1995, I stood with fellow journalists in the news room of The Lawton Constitution.

Our eyes were glued to the television and we were stunned at the courtroom scene before us.

It was the last scene in a drama that gripped the world.

For more than eight months, the murder trial of former football great O.J. Simpson had been televised.

Now the jury was coming back and their verdict was about to be announced.

Simpson was charged with the slashing deaths of his ex-wife, Nicole Simpson Brown, and Ron Goldman.

The pair were murdered on June 12, 1994, and Simpson was arrested following a slow-speed pursuit by police.

Charged with two counts of first degree murder, Simpson was tried before Judge Lance Ito.

His trial began on Jan. 29, 1995.

The trial was the entertainment event of the year.

We huddled near the televi-

sion, certain he was guilty. Telling each other we KNEW he did it. Certain he would pay for his crime.

When the jury surprised us all and acquitted Simpson on both counts, we were shocked into silence.

Our group slowly began to break up, reporters and editors shaking their heads in disbelief and returning to their desks.

That's when I noticed the three blacks who worked at the paper. One was a reporter, one a pressman and the third a computer guru from the backshop.

They stood to the side and for the first time I saw them as a separate entity at the paper.

They appeared neither shocked or gleeful at the verdict. Whatever their feelings at that moment, they held them close.

I wish I had asked them if they thought Simpson was guilty or not.

But on that day, there was an invisible line between us bigger than any wall of stone and razor wire.

I've covered my share of murder trials. Most ended in convictions. But I've also seen defendants I was sure were guilty walk free.

It happens. Years after that verdict, NBC conducted a poll, asking 1,186 people if O.J. Simpson was guilty. Seventy-seven percent said yes.

But what is telling is 87 percent of whites said guilty, but just 27 percent of blacks.

I've come to believe it's not color that divides us. It is hate.

Hate on both sides. It's time to show hate the door once and for all.

Communist China's coronavirus cover-up

The United States recently surpassed more than 100,000 precious lives lost to COVID-19. As we sadly know all too well, along with the staggering human cost, this pandemic has disrupted every corner of American society and life as we know it - wrecking thriving economies, shuttering businesses, killing jobs and threatening livelihoods.

While these hard and fast hits seemingly came out of nowhere, the wrath of this invisible enemy could have been quelled and lives protected worldwide had the Communist Chinese Party issued warnings upfront and told the truth about early evidence.

Instead, the regime sat on potentially lifesaving information, allowing spread to occur for weeks before taking any action

to protect even its own citizens.

Though it's unclear who was first infected or when and how transmission of this coronavirus occurred, some of the earliest confirmed cases have in common going to a wet seafood market in Wuhan City, Hubei Province of China. And as early as December 10, we know that a vendor there had pneumonia symptoms due to an unknown cause and was hospitalized several days later.

By the end of the month, many more similar cases were reported in the city of 11 million people, and Chinese doctors caring for patients in the region warned the country's health authorities that the disease was caused by a SARS-like coronavirus and that they believed it could spread easily between people.

Despite early concerns and warnings, Chinese officials

played down the potential risk of the disease, withheld information from the public, failed to take precautions and delayed notifying global health partners.

In fact, doctors who raised alarm were even arrested for sharing information and reprimanded for spreading "rumors" and "lies." Meanwhile, information referencing SARS was then censored online and on social media within the country.

While the World Health Organization (WHO) China Country Office was finally alerted on December 31 about pneumonia cases with unknown causes detected in Wuhan City, Taiwan officials also notified the WHO that same day raising concern that Chinese health workers were

The change was initiated because there were concerns that releasing the information would violate state laws on medical record confidentiality.

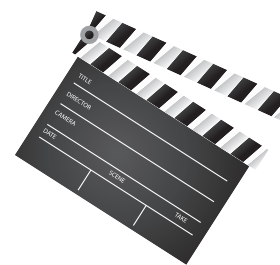
But no names were ever used and Hunter concurred that as long as patients weren't identified the Health Department could release the additional information while being in compliance with the law.

reportedly getting sick.

Taiwan's information, which pointed to suspected spread between people, was not shared with other countries. The very next day, gene sequencing companies and labs, studying and discovering the similarities of the virus to SARS, were then told by an official at the Hubei Provincial Health Commission to stop testing samples and destroy existing ones.

The WHO didn't publish anything about the virus until

January 5, and at that point, it was stated: "Based on the preliminary information from the Chinese investigation team, no evidence of significant human-to-human transmission and no health care worker infections have been reported."

After hearing about the mysterious outbreak, the U.S. Centers for Disease Control immediately volunteered to send a team to help investigate, but China declined the assistance. And for several more days in January, the Chinese

population was kept in the dark.

On January 9, it was finally confirmed to the public that there was a new coronavirus outbreak, but the Wuhan Municipal Health Commission falsely insisted that person-to-person spread was unlikely.

Rather than take precautions at that point, Chinese authorities continued to allow large public gatherings and widespread domestic and international travel, which included millions of people coming in and out of the country—and specifically into Wuhan City—for Lunar New Year celebrations.

One of the gatherings in Wuhan City included more than 40,000 families sharing 14,000 dishes. By January 20, cases of COVID-19 were confirmed in four other nearby countries. Two days later, the WHO China office admitted to earlier evidence of human spread.

Unfortunately, by the time China acknowledged the risks and called for a mass quarantine in the new coronavirus epicenter of Wuhan City, it was already too late to prevent it from spreading globally. And on January 24, the

first U.S. case—a recent American traveler to Wuhan City—was confirmed.

Just five days later, President Trump formed the Coronavirus Task Force. And on January 31, he suspended U.S. entry of visitors from China and mandated quarantines for those allowed to enter who may have been exposed to this coronavirus. While the president was unfairly criticized for this move at the time, imagine how much worse the alternative might have been if he had not "overreacted" early on.

Months later, this COVID-19 pandemic has now sickened nearly 6.5 million people and claimed more than 383,000 lives around the globe. Unfortunately, as talented as our own scientists and researchers are, there's still a great deal of mystery surrounding the origin of the coronavirus that causes the deadly disease.

While early cases have been traced back to the previously mentioned wet seafood market in Wuhan City, it is also worth noting that two nearby labs coincidentally conduct regular research specifically on corona-

viruses and that the U.S. State Department previously raised concerns about safety in those labs after visiting in 2018.

Regardless, China's tight grip on what was known and when makes it much more difficult to plan for and prevent similar pandemics. But what we do know is that the communist Chinese regime willfully chose to hide and destroy critical information, punish and silence those who issued warnings and then blatantly lie about it.

Undoubtedly, there's still a lot being hidden even now. For example, several early coronavirus critics, including a doctor and two citizen journalists in China, have since vanished.

Indeed, it will take years to clean up the mess caused by communist China's outrageous coronavirus cover-up. However, I am encouraged that the Trump Administration is working to hold China accountable and counter the regime's harmful actions and propaganda.

Moreover, Republicans in the U.S. House of Representatives have formed a China task force

to coordinate legislative actions and policies.

There is no doubt that China is a great and rising power. It is the most populous country in the world and has the second largest economy. The Chinese people are talented, hardworking and the heirs to one of the greatest and most enduring cultures in the world.

They, too, suffered greatly from the failure of the Chinese Communist Party to handle the coronavirus crisis competently and transparently.

But if China is to assume its position as a world leader, it must learn to be a responsible global player that assumes its fair share of responsibility and plays by the rules of international behavior expected of a great power.

In the case of the coronavirus crisis, it most definitely did not. As a result, hundreds of thousands of people around the globe needlessly suffered and died. That is a responsibility that the Chinese Communist Party cannot escape and must accept if it is to have any credibility on the global stage.

The 57th Legislature has wrapped up!

Although we finished our business early, we did not officially adjourn sine die until May 29.

"Sine die" is a Latin phrase that means to adjourn an assembly without assigning a day for a further meeting. A legislative body adjourns sine die when it adjourns without appointing a day on which to appear or assemble again.

The state constitution requires the Legislature to meet in session from the first Monday in February to the last Friday in May.

It also requires the Legislature to have set forth a balanced budget for the next fiscal year by 5 p.m. on the last Friday in May.

This year, the Legislature had to make difficult decisions about a dozen policy bills that were vetoed by the governor. Ultimately, we decided that these bills were so important to the future of Oklahoma that we thought it was in the best interest of our constituents to take this action.

One of the bills we overrode was the Governor's veto on House Bill 4018, which creates a system to identify and suggest ways to improve broadband in rural areas of the state. Internet access isn't available in every part of the state, and in many rural areas, quality Internet can be very expensive.

The COVID-19 pandemic highlighted the urgent need for more available access to quality broadband. Although this was a priority this session prior to the pandemic, the sudden influx

of millions of Oklahomans working or studying from home reaffirmed that the Internet is a necessity for both school and work.

I hope that the actions taken in HB4018 will help improve access for rural Oklahomans.

Another bill passed in response to COVID-19 is SB 1888. The bill directs 35 percent of the amount that would otherwise be credited to the County Improvements for Roads and Bridges Fund to be sent directly to the counties, up to \$120 million.

County treasurers are required to deposit the funds into the county's highway fund, to be used for maintenance and operations. This applies only during the FY 2021, in response to revenue loss due to the pandemic.

After working together during interim last year, the House and Senate overwhelmingly approved a cost-of-living adjustment (COLA) for our state retirees, including law enforcement personnel and teachers. Thankfully, the Governor signed the bill, giving our state retirees their first COLA in 12 years!

Some other highlights of session included Senate Bill 1739, which provides that the statutory authorization and requirements related to electronic monitoring in nursing facilities also applies to assisted living centers and continuum of care facilities.

The competition is open to all students who meet the eligibility requirements, regardless of their coding experience.

Winning apps from congressional districts across the country are eligible for display in the U.S. Capitol and featured on the House of Representatives' website at House.gov.

Not that the "The High Note" was explicitly bad necessarily, but because "Premature" ended up being so much better.

Interestingly, the two films do share a couple characteristics. Both movies are romances and both stories are very closely tied into music. Heck, both films feature main characters who are budding music producers.

Beyond that though, the filmmakers decided to take significantly different approaches to their storytelling.

For one, "Premature" is more of a drama, while "The High Note" strives to be a comedy, though whether it succeeds or not is a point of debate.

"Premature" also has a much more focused narrative overall. Not only that, but the characters of "Premature" feel far more grounded in reality and are significantly more relatable overall.

The story of Ayanna and Isaiah is one that will probably seem familiar to many. It's a tale of love and loss, but it's also one about coming of age and dealing with the passion and hardships many people their age face.

And nothing in this film expresses all those feelings better than Zora Howard's performance in this film.

Zora's role as Ayanna is almost traumatizing to watch at times, especially during one particular scene towards the end of the film.

Her character feels very exposed to the audience, and not just because of the surprising amount of nudity or extended scenes of intimacy.

All her expressions, from sheer bliss, to an unbridled agitation, and pure agony felt so real. During these most devastating of moments, I found it impossible not to feel anguish just from the expression on her face.

Of course it's not all sadness. This is a love story after all.

Ayanna and Isaiah's budding romance is very sweet, and I really enjoyed watching it all unfold. Even though in the back of my mind it seemed inevitable that this loving couple would be facing some kind of devastating hardship in the end.

Overall, I liked this movie quite a bit.

It's a simple, but very well made film, elevated by the unwavering authenticity of its characters.

The other movie this week is "Judy and Punch."

In the anarchic town of



Seaside, nowhere near the sea, puppeteers Judy and Punch are trying to resurrect their marionette show.

The show is a hit due to Judy's superior puppeteering, but Punch's driving ambition and penchant for whisky leads to an inevitable tragedy that Judy must avenge.

Over the years I've watched hundreds of movies inspired by just about every medium of entertainment you can imagine. I've seen films based on books, short stories, Broadway plays, comic books, hit songs, and of course movies inspired by movies. I've seen it all.

Or that's what I thought until this past weekend when I happened upon a film based on a popular puppet show.

For those of you who, like myself, were unaware, "Punch and Judy" is a traditional British street show with roots dating back to the 16th century, hosted by a single puppeteer otherwise known as a "professor" or "punchman."

Though these shows have many recurring characters over the years including a baby and crocodile, the two main stars are of course Punch and Judy.

These shows are known for its physical comedy, most of which revolves around the character of Punch, well, punching and hitting the other puppets.

From the little I've seen of these shows, it seems like harmless fun mostly aimed at children and their parents. After

all, who doesn't enjoy a little slapstick now and then?

So with that all said, this movie takes the concept of "Punch and Judy," transforms it into live action, and makes a black "comedy" with an overt message of anti-bigotry which delves into the "hilarious" subject of abusive relationships.

I put "comedy" and "hilarious" in quotes because I'm feeling snarky and I didn't find this film the least bit amusing. Believe me though, it does try to be funny.

Much like the puppet show it's based on, the film tries to use shock humor and violence to make the audience laugh. Which might have worked on me if the beatings and abuse weren't so visceral in this film.

I don't mind physical humor, but I do have a hard time laughing while watching a man beat his wife bloody, almost to the point of death.

Sure, there is a good message here about abuse and society as a whole not believing women who've been the victim of assault and ostracization. But it's so overt with its messaging that it practically becomes a parody of itself.

Seriously, this movie enjoys hitting the audience over the head with its message almost as much as Punch enjoys beating his wife.

The townsfolk of Seaside are all grimy looking, bloodthirsty numbskulls who make the townsfolk of Disney's "Beauty and the Beast" seem thoughtful and reasonable.

Their favorite forms of entertainment, besides puppet shows of course, include stoning

women who are presumed to be witches, and hanging innocent elderly couples based on the flimsy testimony of a single unreliable witness.

None of them have even the slightest bit of self awareness and they all have zero redeeming qualities. They're all just absurd caricatures to be mocked.

Maybe it's just me, but when it comes to villains or antagonists in movies, I like them to be portrayed as at least someone relatable, or at the very least as human. Especially in a film with such a strong social commentary.

Not every bad guy has to be a complex, thought provoking antagonist of course, but sometimes it can help you see flaws buried deep in yourself. Ones that you might not have noticed otherwise without deep introspection.

Here though, there's zero subtlety. They're all just stupid bigots. That's the joke. The entire town is filled with hateful, irredeemable people. I hope you enjoy it because that's the only joke this movie has.

I don't know. I probably would have been more forgiving with this film if it had gone a slightly less realistic route.

Personally I find it hard to laugh at the hardship of others when everything is so graphic. Especially when the subject matter is so serious and relevant to the real life struggles of so many. It just feels weird to make a joke of it all.

Creamy Chicken Bake

4 chicken breasts, large
10 ¾ oz. can condensed cream of mushroom soup
10 ¾ oz. can condensed cream of chicken soup
1 cup sour cream
8 oz. can mushrooms (stems and pieces), drained
1/2 cup water
1/2 tsp onion powder
1 tsp. chives, chopped
1/2 tsp. paprika
1/2 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. pepper

Preheat oven to 350°.

Place the chicken breasts in a lightly greased 9x13 baking pan and sprinkle with salt and pepper.

Mix together the cream of mushroom soup, cream of chicken soup, sour cream, mushrooms, water, onion powder, and chives.

Spoon the mixture over the chicken breasts in baking pan and sprinkle with paprika.

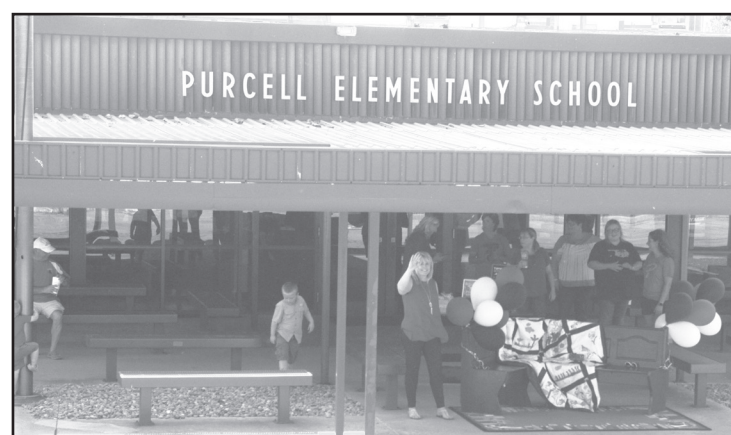
Bake for one hour or until chicken breasts are ready and cream mixture is lightly browned.

HB 1282 prohibits children aged 14 and younger from being placed in a juvenile detention facility, unless certain conditions have been met. Instead, detention of children aged 12 years or younger must be judicially reviewed.

General pesticide safety

Yard and garden work is in full swing at this time, so now would be a good time to discuss safe handling of pesticides. If you are using pesticides in your lawn or garden it is very important that you use them according to the label to protect you and your loved ones.

Pesticides are chemically designed agents used to control, repel or destroy pests. Pesticides are categorized as herbicides, insecticides, fungicides and rodenticides.

All pesticides are toxic to some degree because they are designed to poison the target pest, but pesticides are generally safe when they are handled and applied correctly.

Properly using pesticides can help prevent accidental exposure, contamination and non-target damage. Exercising common sense safety and following label directions aid the safe use of pesticides.

General Guidelines

- Keep all children and pets away from pesticides, application equipment and treated areas. Inform your neighbors when an application will be made and what pesticides will be used.

- Wash thoroughly with soap and water after handling or using pesticides. Wash clothing worn for pesticide applications after each application and separately from other laundry.

Preparation

- Choose the product with the appropriate active ingredient, formulation, target pests and sites where it can be used. If you need help identifying the proper pest we can help with this.

- Read the label on the pesticide container before purchasing, but especially before handling or applying any

pesticide. The label can determine the active ingredient and its toxicity to the surrounding environment, such as nearby water, plants, and animals.

- Before using a pesticide, know what to do in the case of an accidental poisoning. Instructions can be found on the product label.

- Calibrate pesticide application equipment to ensure accurate applications. Over application may cause runoff or seepage, contaminate water supplies or leave harmful residues on the application area.

- Measure carefully and mix only the amount needed for the current job to eliminate the problem of storage or disposal of unused pesticides.

- Mix pesticides in a well-ventilated area, preferably outdoors. Handle and apply pesticides away from wells, ponds, streams, sewer drains, etc. to avoid contamination of water.

Use

- When handling or applying pesticides always wear rubber gloves, long sleeved shirts, closed toe shoes, and long pants.

The label will tell you any other necessary personal protection equipment needed.

- Avoid getting pesticides on you. If a pesticide does come in direct contact with skin, wash the area immediately with soap and water.

- Avoid breathing fumes, dust

and vapor from pesticides.

- Avoid drift and contamination of non-target objects by applying pesticides only when winds are light. Never apply pesticides if the wind is stronger than that allowed on the label. Drift may harm or destroy surrounding plants, insects, animals or humans.

- Clean up spills immediately. For small spills, use an absorbent material such as cat litter or sawdust to soak up liquid spills, sweep it into a garbage bag and dispose of it with the regular trash. For larger spills, immediately create a barrier to prevent spreading of the liquid.

Storage

- If it is necessary to store pesticides, always store them in their original, labeled container. Make sure all containers are tightly closed.

Store pesticides out of children's reach and in a locked area if possible.

Disposal

- Safely dispose of empty pesticide containers by following directions on the container label.

Safe use of pesticides will ensure that they are on the market for our use well into the future, while the mishandling of these pesticides cause them to be pulled from public use.

Remember; not only your safety, but the safety of the environment is at stake this spring when you begin applying pesticides.

Income loss?

More golfers, fewer tournaments

The pandemic brought more golfers to Purcell's Brent Bruehl Memorial Golf Course in April and May.

But even with the increased income from green fees, the course may register a loss.

Mike Gowens, the course's golf pro, said that's due to all the lost tournaments.

There were "at least one every weekend" during April and May, he added.

The boost in golfers and green fees was largely due to the decisions of Oklahoma City and Norman mayors to close their municipal courses.

Those closures came even

though Gov. Kevin Stitt had listed golf courses as essential, meaning they could continue to operate during the shutdown.

With those closures, golfers began searching for open courses.

"There were only a few courses outside the city and Norman," Gowens said.

The pro isn't sure how much revenue was lost due to cancelled tournaments and how much of that loss will be offset by the boost in green fees from those out-of-town golfers.

And perhaps to golfers it's all about the game anyway and income is secondary.

"We did the things we needed to do to stay open," he said.

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Sims:

To understand his reasoning, you need to know his back story.

It began with his maternal grandmother who was raised in Arkansas, one of eight children in the family.

She alone, among her siblings, relocated to California in the 1950s, where she raised Sims' mother who raised Sims, her only child. She was a single mother.

In 2003, the small family's matriarch died. With nothing left for them in California, Sims' mother moved them to Arkansas. He was 17.

"I knew we had roots in Arkansas, but we'd never come back," he recalled. "When we moved from California, I ran from God."

It was seven years of running from God before he was saved and his life took a marked spiritual turn.

He remembers the date and place it happened. Jan. 3, 2010 at the First Assembly of God in Hot Springs.

That marked the beginning of a year of change because 2010 is also when he met the woman he would marry in 2012.

Shana was from Marlow and with a degree in psychology and criminal justice, was working at an Assembly of God children's home at Hot Springs.

Sims describes his decision to enter the ministry as a "surrender, more than anything." "You surrender your life to a calling," he explained.

At the time, he had a very good job with UPS, but in 2014, he and Shana became fulltime youth pastors.

"The Lord just took me on a journey," he explained.

He attended an Assembly of God district school of ministry and was credentialed through the denomination's Arkansas district.

There are three levels of cre-

dentials—certified, licensed and ordained.

"I am ordained," he said.

While he was a youth pastor at Malvern, Ark., Sims said he underwent a "wilderness experience."

He and Shana moved to Oklahoma and he took a job at Halliburton. He also served as executive pastor for a non-denominational congregation at Eternal Life Church in Marlow.

He stayed in that role for 1-1/2 years.

By the fall of 2019, "God was really dealing with us," he said.

In January, he decided "to see where the Lord would take us."

He learned of the opening at Memorial Assembly of God and submitted his resume.

Sims explained that each Assembly of God operates as a sovereign entity under the bylaws of that state's district.

He and one other candidate were invited to preach on different Sundays in January.

A vote by the congregation led to Sims earning the pulpit.

He replaced the Rev. Duane Elmore, who led the congregation for a quarter of a century before resigning in 2019.

The only downside so far has been caused by the global pandemic and government social distancing orders that necessitated churches closing their doors to in-person worship and relying instead on social media and recorded sermons to spread the Word.

"We're a body that comes together," he said. "We're not designed to function that way (social distancing)."

Sims is anxious to resume regular services, visit with his congregation and reach out to other pastors.

He and his wife have two children—Emory, who will be 5 this month, and Caleb, 2.

"We looked for a place where

our children could thrive," he said.

Purcell fit that bill and they "definitely want to get involved in the community."

Next year, Shana will start her own path toward being credentialed by the denomination.

It's a natural next step for a woman "born and bred AG."

How long the family will stay in Purcell is in God's hands.

"We want to raise our family here and have the children graduate here. But it's really up to God."

Sims' mother is still in Hot Springs, but she will be moving to Purcell late this year, settling in the new senior community, Village on Green, now under construction south of Purcell High School and the new junior high school.

Lauren Beason and her graduating Lexington teammates were certainly a trail-blazing bunch during their senior year.

no Lexington girls basketball team had gone before.

Beason (a 6-footer) played under head coach Derek Clark her senior year. The Lady 'Dawgs went 20-6 and went to the Area tournament at Chickasha, where they lost to Hugo, 48-34.

Lexington finished the season ranked No. 15 in Class 3A.

"This year I was just really proud of us as teams both on the basketball court and on the softball field," Beason said.

"Lexington has never had a 20-win season before in basketball and Lexington had never before been as far

as the area tournament. We accomplished both of those things on the court."

Beason played for Lexington head coach Kayla Stewart's fast-pitch softball team and the Lady 'Dawgs made the Class 3A state tournament in 2019 for the first time since 2005.

Lexington went 17-6 and lost to Washington, 5-1, at the tourney. The Lady 'Dawgs finished 2019 ranked No. 5 in Class 3A.

"I think it's important for our group this year to be considered a special group of athletes," Beason said. "It's been really big for our town to see us accomplish what we did. I hope the underclassmen work toward doing what we did and make it even further than us seniors did this year."

Beason graduated No. 4 in her class with a 4.00 GPA and was a National Honor Society member as well as a student council member.

She has a full-ride scholarship for basketball to Southeastern State University in Durant, where she is thinking

of majoring in nursing.

In basketball, she scored 16.1 points per game her senior year and had a career scoring average of 17.4 per contest. She averaged seven rebounds per game, 3.6 steals, two assists, and 3.3 blocks during her entire stint in a Lexington uniform.

"She's a member of our 1,000-point club," said Lexington Head Coach Derek Clark. "She was all conference every season and she made six all-tournament teams. Lauren was just an incredible athlete. She's an even better person."

"She was an outstanding student. Lauren can score with ease and she made it look so simple."

In softball, Beason helped the Lady 'Dawgs look like the New York Yankees of old with lots of big bats.

Beason hit .441 in her slow-pitch career and .369 with 35 runs batted in during her fast-pitch career. During her senior season, Beason hit .439 and was named the district's co-Shortstop of the Year.

She played with a very

strong lineup. Amanda Graddy was the district's Second Baseman of the Year her senior season and hit .307 for her career.

Kaylee Fink went 47-37 with a 3.18 earned run average inside the circle during her career. She had a .276 career batting average in fast-pitch and was the district co-Pitcher of the Year with a 16-5 record and a 2.69 ERA.

Hannah Robbins was the district co-Catcher of the Year her senior season as she made the All-state team with a career .362 batting average along with 88 RBIs.

Emilee Jenks hit a whopping .680 during her career in slow-pitch with 29 home runs and 93 RBIs. She also hit .400 with 10 homers and 73 ribbies during her fast-pitch career as she earned co-district Offensive Player of the Year and third baseman honors.

By the Numbers
Last week 12 veterans received a disability rating of 100 percent for their service-connected disabilities. This group will receive a combined annual \$470,901. They will also be eligible for the state benefits of sales tax exemptions, property tax exemptions, and other benefits that our state provides for disabled veterans.

Thirty veterans were awarded disability ratings from 10-90% percent and will receive a combined annual \$523,673. This group of men and women will be eligible for VA Health Care, and some of them may also be eligible for other state benefits.

Chickasaw Nation Election Secretary Rita Loder announced today the candidates seeking four legislative seats and one judicial seat within the Chickasaw Nation.

The filing period closed June 3. Incumbent Supreme Court Justice Cheri L. Bellefeuille-Gordon, Sulphur, was unchallenged and will retain Seat 3 on the court.

Pontotoc District Seat 4 will be filled by incumbent Karen Goodnight, Goldsby, as she was unchallenged for the seat.

J. Lisa Impson, Ada, will retain Pontotoc District Seat 3, as she was unchallenged.

Pickens District Seat 2 incumbent legislator Connie Barker, Marietta, will face challenger Michael T. Watson, Ardmore.

Incumbent legislator Steven Woods, Davis, will retain Tishomingo District Seat 3 as no challengers filed for the office.

The candidates who did not receive a challenger will be elected by a one vote margin, by the act of filing for office shall be counted as an affirmative vote.

Registered Chickasaw voters will vote by mail ballots, with ballots being mailed to registered Chickasaw voters July 9, 2020.

Ballots must be returned to the Chickasaw Nation Election Commission no later than 10:30 a.m., July 28, 2020. No hand delivered ballots will be accepted.

The Chickasaw Nation Election Commission shall conduct and supervise the ballot counting beginning at 11 a.m., July 28, 2020, at the Chickasaw Community Center in Ada. Results of the elections shall be announced the same day.

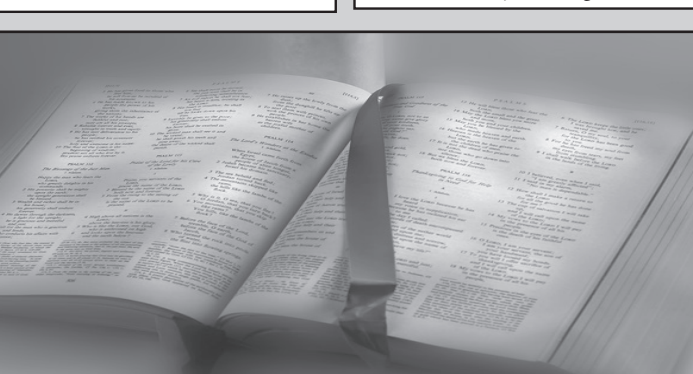

Our Lady of Victory Catholic Church

The God-Mystery of Father, Son and Holy Spirit

We are not publishing a bulletin these days. But my cousin from Iowa sent me a few tidbits from past church bulletins that she had found: “Pot-luck supper Sunday at 5 p.m. - prayer and medication to follow.” And “The pastor would appreciate it if the ladies of the Congregation would lend him their electric girdles for the pancake breakfast next Sunday.” Now there’s a fine way to show off your figure!

This week and next week we are still living in the aftermath of the Great Feast of Pentecost. And so we celebrate the Feast of the Holy Trinity (June 7) and Corpus Christi Sunday (June 14). This first feast is a celebration of what is truly distinctive about the Christian faith, as opposed to Judaism and Islam.

All three faiths believe in

one God, the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob. But Christians believe that this one God has expressed Himself – and continues to express himself – in three distinct persons, who are bound together in their love for one another.

We celebrate against a backdrop of chaos in our country. Emotions are still running high after killing of a black man in police custody in Minneapolis. Ensuing riots and destruction followed in large cities.

We mourn with our brothers and sisters – both over the instances of abuse by our police officers and by the senseless destruction of the property of innocent people.

In the second letter to the Corinthians, St. Paul writes: “Examine yourselves to see whether you are living in the faith.” (2 Cor. 13:5). Is it possible, perhaps, that those who condone violence can point to the vengeful God of the Old Testament?

In Gen 6, God said to Noah: “I have determined to make an end of all flesh, for the earth is filled with violence because of them.” God abhors violence, but he ends all flesh in a violent manner, by drowning.

Later, Joshua conquers the city of Jericho. The city is burned, and apart from Rahab’s family, every person, ox, sheep and donkey is killed (Joshua 6). Joshua attempts to capture the city of Ai but fails (Joshua 7). A second attempt,

advised by God, succeeds. The city is set on fire and all the inhabitants are killed (Joshua 8), all with God’s approval.

Can we justify violence because of God’s violence in the Hebrew Scriptures? And yet Moses hears these words from God – that “God is a merciful and gracious God, slow to anger and rich in kindness and fidelity.” (Ex. 34: 4-9) Perhaps God is slow to anger, but when pushed far enough, justice demands strong action. But why would God destroy a world that he himself has created?

It is only with Jesus that we finally obtain a full picture of God. Here we see a God who is not only merciful and slow to anger, but also would lay down his very life for his friends. If Jesus is God, then we who are angry must examine ourselves very closely.

The Son of God, Jesus, would not release his anger upon the shops of innocent business owners. The Son of God would protest, yes, - in silence and with integrity and with respect – as many have done this past week. But he would not destroy, he would not mutilate or harm. He would not respond to violence with more violence.

Raccoon John Smith's Lesson from a Log

Funny where the best lessons come from—a pandemic, perhaps, or maybe a good old-fashioned sit-down ‘talk’ with mama, or just from the famous school of hard knocks.

The best lessons come from the most unusual sources, and they come when you least expect them. Usually they don't show up politely in a limousine. More likely, they'll crash land in your front yard unannounced. You understand.

But whoever heard of learning a valuable lesson from a log? I hadn't until a few years ago; but when I did, I knew I had to tell it.

Many great preachers emerged during what we know as the “Restoration Period” of the 1800s. Among them was a man named Raccoon John Smith. He labeled himself as “Raccoon” Smith to distinguish him from all the other John Smiths around. He came up with “Raccoon” because, as he would say, he was from such a remote part of Kentucky that raccoons were the only neighbors he had.

One of Raccoon John Smith's greatest assets was his determination, especially his uncanny desire to find the truth of the Bible. That determination ultimately led him on a lengthy journey to find his way back to the church of the New Testament. History holds that his commitment to searching and preaching came at the expense of his health and finances.

As great of a preacher as he became during that era, he almost never got started at all. As a young preacher in the early 1800s, Raccoon John Smith once was delivering his sermon in front of a Kentucky audience when he suddenly went blank. Stage fright gripped him – we can all relate – and he stood there as if in his underwear in front of his audience, unable to get a word out. He just froze.

He turned and saw a back door near the pulpit, and before anyone knew it he was headed for it on the run. He ran as fast as he could to get away from preaching. But a hundred dark feet away from that frightful sermon, something happened that changed his life's journey. He tripped over a log and went sprawling out into the dirt.

After a moment, he got himself up, dusted off his clothes, and turned around and went right back to the pulpit he had just left. He walked back through the door he had hit running a while ago, stepped up to the pulpit, and resumed his sermon. I've often thought that his audience that night sure had a funny story to tell when they got home.

Now, I can't say that the Lord carefully placed that log in just the right spot to trip up the famous preacher, although I'm convinced the Lord had a hand in it. After all, the Lord knew He had Himself a good preacher; and He knew all it would take to shake him up good was a log stretched across his path.

As I think on it, a lot of folks these days could use a log such as that, something to trip them up and get them headed in the right direction. Just look around, you know that's right. If it worked back with Raccoon John Smith in the 1800s, it's bound to work today, too.

Just think of it: Because of one, well-placed old log, the good news of the gospel gushed from the lips of a once-scared but powerful Kentucky preacher for more than half a century. coachbowen1984@gmail.com.

This measure would add a provision to the Oklahoma Constitution requiring the State to expand Medicaid coverage. The expanded coverage would include certain persons over 18 and under 65 who are not already covered and whose annual income, as calculated under federal law, is at or below 133% of the federal poverty line. The federal poverty line changes annually, but for example if this measure were in effect in 2019, the measure generally would have covered a single adult making less than \$17,238 annually and adults in a family of four making less than \$35,508 annually. Under this measure, the State cannot create additional restrictions that make it more difficult to qualify for expanded Medicaid coverage than it is to qualify for the Medicaid program currently in place. The Medicaid program is funded jointly by the federal government and the State. This measure would require the Oklahoma Health Care Authority (OHCA) to try to maximize federal funding for Medicaid expansion in Oklahoma. If the measure is approved, OHCA has 90 days to submit all documents necessary to obtain federal approval for implementing Medicaid expansion by July 1, 2021.

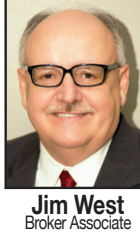
