McClain County voters said an overwhelming no to a new Public Safety Complex Tuesday with nearly 80 percent of the votes cast against the bond issue.

Of the approximately 23,000 registered voters

in McClain County 3,061 voted Tuesday.

Unofficial results from McClain County Election Board Secretary Karen Haley show the final count was 2,412 against the bond issue or 78.80 percent to 649 (21.20 percent) in favor of the safety complex that included a jail, offices for the sheriff's department, emergency management and a 911

call center.

The proposition failed in all 26 boxes in the county.

District No. 2 County Commissioner and chairman of the board Wilson Lyles said, "We will respect the people's wishes.

"They spoke Tuesday. We will continue to keep our thinking caps on and do the best we can for Mc-Clain County.

"We will try to put another game plan together and in the meantime outsource our inmates to other counties,"Lyles said. "That will continue to eat into the sheriff's budget and the county's budget."

On the day of the election McClain County had 130 inmates with a jail that has a licensed capacity of 53. Lyles said 26 of the Mc-

Surprise medical bills blindside many Oklahomans

Eric McDermott's mind began to race when he opened his mail and saw a \$7,300 bill from the Children's Hospital at OU Medicine in the spring of 2016.

The letter demanded immediate payment of what the Yukon resident thought were long-settled expenses tied to his daughter's emergency appendicitis surgery from nearly two years earlier.



McDermott was sure he had the confirmation that the care would be covered as an in-network expense. He had even phoned his insurance company as his daughter was being prepped for surgery.

But the letter shattered that belief. It said Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Oklahoma had reevaluated the claim and determined he now owed nearly 15 times the \$500 he had paid as a deductible.

"I was completely blind-

sided," he said. "How can you possibly plan for that? Nobody just has \$7,000 laying around."

In McDermott's case, the bill was eventually dropped – which he credits to the exposure he got from testifying at a legislative hearing on medical billing in 2016, and to his spending about 80 hours on the phone arguing

Turkey safety tips to help ensure a safe holiday meal

> For many families celebrating the Thanksgiving holiday, the centerpiece on the table is the turkey. Oven roasted, deep fried or whatever the cooking method, making sure the turkey is handled safely from the store to the table is of utmost importance.

> Food safety starts at the grocery store, whether buying a fresh or frozen bird, said Barbara Brown, Oklahoma State University Cooperative Extension food specialist.

> "Food handling errors and inadequate cooking are the most common problems that can lead to foodborne disease," Brown said. "When shopping for a fresh turkey, place it in the bottom of the cart so juices won't drop on other foods you're buying. Once you've checked put the turkey in the refrigerator or freezer."

If the turkey is frozen, be sure to give yourself plenty of time to thoroughly thaw it. Thawing in the refrigerator is the safest from the bird's cavity.

Place the bird in a container on the bottom shelf so juices will not contaminate other foods. Allow about 24 hours for each five pounds of turkey. A 20-pound turkey will take at least four days to thaw.

Another thawing method is

placing the turkey in a sink of cold water. Change the water every half hour to ensure the turkey stays cold. It takes about 30 minutes per pound for this thawing method.

"Whatever you do, don't thaw the turkey on the counter," she said. "A thawing turkey must defrost at a safe temperature to avoid foodborne illness possibilities."

Keep in mind raw poultry can contaminate anything it touches with harmful bacteria. If you defrosted the turkey in a sink of cold water, be sure to clean the sink afterwards to prevent cross contamination.

Brown said if you choose to stuff the turkey, do so just before cooking. Use a food thermometer to ensure the center of the stuffing reaches 165 degrees Fahrenheit.

Bacteria can survive in stuffout, go home immediately and ing that has not reached this critical temperature point and can cause food poisoning. After removing the turkey from the oven, wait about 20 minutes before scooping the stuffing


When roasting a turkey, whether stuffed or not, the turkey needs to reach an internal temperature of 165 degrees Fahrenheit. Check the temperature with a food thermometer in the thickest parts of the breast, thigh and wing joint.

"Be sure to let the turkey rest for about 15 to 20 minutes before carving it. This will help keep the turkey nice and moist, she said.

Once the feast is over, get the food safely stored as soon as possible. Ideally, leftovers should be stored at 40 degrees Fahrenheit within two hours of preparation to prevent food poisoning.

Clostridium perfringens is a bacteria that grows in cooked foods left at room temperature and is the second most common bacterial cause of food poisoning. Symptoms include vomiting and abdominal cramps within six to 24 hours after eating.

"Following these guidelines will help ensure you prepare not only a tasty meal, but a safe one, as well," Brown said.

Section R319 Site Address

R319.1 Address numbers. Buildings shall have approved address numbers, building numbers or approved building identification placed in a position that is plainly legible and visible from the street or road fronting the property.

These numbers shall contrast with their background. Address numbers shall be Arabic numbers or alphabetical letters. Numbers shall be a minimum of four inches (102mm).

Where access is by means of a private road and the building address cannot be viewed from the public way, a monument, pole or other sign or means should be used to identify the structure. This will allow emergency crews to locate the house number.

Honoring the bravest among us

Congressman Tom Cole

Each year on the eleventh of November, we rightly pause to honor and remember the bravery and boldness of the men and women who selflessly answered the call of duty and wore one of the many great military uniforms of the United States of America.

Without question, we owe a constant debt of gratitude to generations of veterans, including many of our own family members, who made sacrifices to ensure the safety of our homeland and who faithfully fought to promote and preserve America's precious freedoms.

On Veterans Day, I am certainly reflecting on the military service rendered by my own relatives. Each day, I am reminded of my namesake and late uncle Tom's tremendous courage and sacrifice.

A prisoner of war during World War II, he was forced to walk the infamous Bataan Death March, and he was held in the Japanese prison camps of Cabanatuan in the Philippines and Hanawa on the main island

of Japan.

names of the brave men that he his impressive skill. met in the prison camps because he never wanted to forget those with whom he served. I was honored to be given his little book after he passed away, and I keep it in my DC office alongside several photos of him, including a picture that was taken of him and his brothers in arms on the day Hanawa was liberated.

I am also always thinking of my father, who I greatly admired while I was growing up in a military family. My dad joined the Army Air Corps on the eve of World War II, and when he left the service, he was the second most senior master sergeant in the Air Force and generally recognized as one of the best to run a crew (or dock) that fixed airplanes.

He was an amazingly talented mechanic and won the prize for "dock of the month" so many times at McGuire Air Force Base that they quit giving it out. When he was placed at Dover Air Force Base for his last command, he was given the worst dock assignment and still managed to win the same award seven out of 12 times He kept a booklet with the there—another testament to

Following his retirement in 1960, our family returned to Oklahoma, where my dad served another 20 years as a civilian defense worker at Tinker Air Force Base.

My uncle and my dad were not the only people in my family who served. My grandfather on my mom's side retired as a naval captain and fought in several engagements in the Pacific.

My brother served in the Air Force during the Vietnam War era. And my favorite cousin retired as an Air Force lieutenant colonel after serving in Iraq.

Of course, in a sense, the families of all these brave men served, too. They supported them when they deployed. Spouses missed anniversaries, children missed birthdays and all were sometimes separated and worried over Thanksgivings and Christmases.

But they never wavered in supporting their family member in uniform. Millions of other families are making those same sacrifices today, so each

Public Virtue

The men who gathered in that blistering humid room in Philadelphia in 1787 to create our governing document did not represent a cross section of the American population. Unlike most Americans, they were wealthy lawyers and planters and most were extremely well-educated.

Though they may not have all attended universities, they were well read in history and political philosophy. We know the major influences of men like Locke and Montesquieu upon our governing documents, but we know little today of James Harrington.

All of the founders were familiar with Harrington. His writing was the inspiration for the original South Carolina government and in many ways also on the Constitution. If we want to try to understand the thinking behind the Constitution, and make better historical arguments, it is helpful to know what inspired the men who wrote it.

Writing during the rule of Oliver Cromwell, Harrington described the fictional utopian nation of Oceana. The Commonwealth of Oceana, like all utopian novels, was meant to shed light on the author's own government and its shortcomings.

Harrington criticized Cromwell, thinly veiled as Olphaus Megaletor in the tract, and served time in the Tower for his criticism. Harrington believed that all political power should be shared by men of property and that property should be distributed amongst the middle class, a concept shared later by Thomas Jefferson.

Harrington believed that these property holders should vote for senators who serve limited terms so all could take turns in governing. Like most political philosophers of the time, Harrington saw these men as those who had a stake in society and so should hold the power. Power should also be held in a bicameral legislature, with a lesser and greater house making the laws.

The key to freedom for Harrington was that the property holding citizens had an obligation to serve in the militia. Under the Cromwell rule, the army had become a tool for tyranny. Not being property holders themselves, Cromwell's soldiers did not have a stake in society and cared little for the rights of the people. They had become professional soldiers, whose only loyalty was to Cromwell.

If the property holding citizens were the militia, he believed, they would not drain the purse. More importantly, they would be the ones who ruled. If they attacked the system, they would only be attacking the system that placed them in power. In other words, a standing army can lead to tyranny, whereas an armed citizenry of stakeholders leads to democracy.

Another author every founder knew was Thomas Gordon who wrote under the name "Cato." The original Cato was a Roman Senator who stood against Caesar and was a popular pen name for anyone representing republicanism.

In his 1722 Cato Letter #65, Gordon wrote, "In attacks upon a

Sure, it was filled with historical inaccuracies, and the characters were often ridiculously annoying, but at the very least they were memorable.


I straight up hate Ben Affleck's character in "Pearl Harbor," but at least I knew his backstory, his personality

Thousands of other Okla-

homans ending up paying such bills, making the issue of surprise medical charges a pronounced one in the state.

The practice, also known as balanced billing, occurs when a patient inadvertently or unknowingly is treated by a provider that is out of their insurance network. This often occurs in emergency situations in which patients have little or no choice in choosing the surgeon, anesthesiologist or other provider.

A recent study by the Peterson Center on Healthcare are simply unwinnable. and the Kaiser Family Foundation found that one in five emergency room visits in Oklahoma resulted in at least one out-of-network charge for patients with employersponsored health plans. That rate was among the 10 highest in the country.

And despite several failed years, Oklahoma is now one five or six figures. of 25 states without laws out-of-network surprise bills.

Oklahoma's medical providthat state law on surprise bill- within 30 days. ing needs to be changed to Medical debt legislative logjam.

"I think we are at point where we have to get this worked out this coming session," said Rep. Marcus McEntire, R-Duncan, who sponsored legislation to reduce surprise billing last session. "And if we can't get something all the parties can agree on, we have to remember we represent the people and we have to do their bidding."

Surprise medical billing is not new in Oklahoma.

Oklahoma Deputy Insurance Commissioner Mike Rhoads said the department's consumer assistance division frequently fields complaints from consumers who discover a surprise bill.

"It is a problem," Rhoads said. "The complaints sometimes come in batches, but they are pretty persistent."

Rhoads said the issue has only gotten worse in the past several years because many insurers are restricting their in-network providers in an attempt to keep their costs down.

The trend mirrors a national one, with data showing that out-of-network billing increased from 32 percent to 43 percent of emergency department visits, and from 26 percent to 42 percent for inpatient visits, from 2010 to 2016, according to a Stanford University study published this summer.

The study also reported that the average cost per patient has

increased, from \$220 to \$628 blocked surprise billing unless for emergency room visits a patient signed an agreement and from \$804 to \$2,040 for in-patient visits.

Patients Stuck in Middle

Mark Engle, an Oklahoma City lawyer who specializes in insurance litigation, said his law firm sees a steady stream of clients who've been affected by surprise medical bills.

His law firm, like many others, can take cases on a contingency basis if there is a strong legal argument that the hospital bill was unwarranted. But under current state law, he said, there are many cases that

"If there is an improper denial, those are good cases we can finance it and we'll do really well on that and so will the patient," he said. "But in different circumstances, you can't really pursue them."

"You can't have a system **Unexpected Billing on Rise** where you have whomever is providing the service doing that work for nothing," said Pam Dunlap, executive director of the Oklahoma Society of Anesthesiologists. "But we also know we can't have exorbitant bills for patients, so it's all about finding a balance."

Struggling to Pass a Law

As federal legislation on surprise billing remains stalled in Congress, states have increasingly looked to pass their own protections.

In each of the last three legislative sessions, Oklahoma lawmakers have introduced bills aimed at curbing the surprise billing. All failed to pass.

That includes a 2017 bill to require hospitals to notify patients if services are out of network and, if so, provide a good faith estimate on costs. The bill passed the state House on a 93-0 vote but failed to get organization that produces a vote in the Senate.

acknowledging they are about to receive uncovered out-ofnetwork care. It also would have set up an independent arbitration process led by a third party chosen by the Oklahoma Insurance Department to settle billing disputes between medical providers and insurers.

The 36-page bill didn't work its way through the legislative process. Instead its language was swapped into a separate bill during the final weeks of the session.

But time ran out, with the proposal never receiving a vote in the House or Senate.

Seeking a Compromise

The Oklahoma Insurance Department, the Oklahoma State Medical Association and the Oklahoma Hospital Association were among the groups that supported the transparency act.

But some insurers balked at details in the plan, particularly how the independent arbitrators would use benchmarking to determine how much insurance companies should pay the providers.

"Naturally, when the Legislature seeks to regulate a reimbursement process or amount, it will generate intense the Oklahoma Association of Health Plans.

Fleet said insurers agree with providers that patients should be protected from surprise billing. But, she said, "unreasonably high payment standards for out-of-network care will raise consumer premiums and erode networks."

Outlook for 2020

Representatives of the insurer and medical groups said there have been sporadic discussions since on finding a compromise.

Although details haven't been disclosed, there appears to be a unified belief that legislation will again be up for debate in 2020.

"There are a lot of players in this deal and it's not going to be easy," McEntire said. "But I think something gets done."

The risk is that the priorities of politically powerful interest groups could overshadow the need to protect patients, said Engle, the Oklahoma City lawyer.

"All your lobbyists are, of course, are going to be for the providers or insurance companies," Engel said. "You don't have patient advocates up there, and we just need someone to take their side."

When a veteran receives a disability rating for a serviceconnected disability, it will range from 10 percent to 100 percent depending on what the disability is and the severity. A veteran who receives a 10 percent rating will receive about \$135 per month, while a veteran who has a 100 percent disability rating will receive close to \$3,000 each month.

For those who would like to review the compensation rates for disabled veterans, they are available on the VA website at www.va.gov.

Last week, 32 veterans were awarded a 100 percent rating for their service-connected disabilities. That group of men and women veterans will receive an annual combined amount of \$1,280,544 per year. Those who reside in Oklahoma will also be eligible to receive the property tax exemption on their primary residence. Our state also exempts the first \$25,000 in sales tax from the veteran's purchases.

The dependents of veterans who are not retired military dependents may be eligible for the Champ VA medical insurance at no cost. Dependents of any veteran rated at a permanent 100 percent may also be eligible to receive education benefits of over \$1000 a month. I have been writing about the possible VA benefits of some of the Blue Water Sailors, Airmen, Marines, Army and Coast Guard members who served within 12 miles of shore along the Vietnam Coastline. The VA is going to start granting some veteran claims along with surviving spouse claims of veterans who were a part of that group. From what I have learned

so far, the veteran or surviving spouse who previously filed for benefits based on Agent Orange exposure will be required to fill a VA form 20-0995 along with a 21-4138 explaining which ship they were on along with any other evidence they have such as a medical diagnosis or death certificate for the surviving preciate your commitment, spouse of deceased veterans.
