## Police incident

No answers to questions about chief

A recent unreported incident at the Purcell Police Department is drawing public interest. City officials and the Purcell Police are not commenting on what occurred at the Purcell Police Department.

The Purcell Register has confirmed through numerous sources that the incident involves the discharging of a weapon inside the police

department. Sources have also told The Register that the incident involves Purcell Police Chief Kevin Williams. City manager Dale Bunn told The Register: "I don't know that we can release if that (discharging a firearm) happened or not."

When pressed for information by The Purcell Register, Bunn said "That's an internal thing at this point. It's an

# Simple majority

County bond doesn't need 60 percent to pass

McClain County's measure to pay for a new jail and public safety center isn't your typical bond issue.

First of all, it needs only a simple majority – 50 percent plus one vote – to pass. In comparison, school bonds fail if they

don't get at least 60 percent of the votes.

Wilson Lyles, county commissioner chairman, said Tuesday the \$23.75 million bond issue is under five mills.

For every \$100,000 of assessed value,

# Known but to God

Tomb of the Unknowns history tied to Veterans Day

The nation will observe Veterans Day on Monday with speeches and laying of wreaths in cemeteries across the country.

Perhaps the most poignant ceremony, though, will take place at

the Tomb of the Unknowns in Arlington National Cemetery outside Washington, D.C.

According to the cemetery's website, the iconic memorial overlooks the nation's capital.

The first unknown – and the genesis of the Veterans Day observance

– was from the "war to end all wars" as World War I was called.

The tomb itself is a white marble sarcophagus on which are carved three Greek figures representing

## Water rate hike?

City favors tying rates to inflation

Discussion of probable water rate hikes during the Purcell Public Works Authority meeting Monday evening left at least two of the trustees with a bad taste in their mouths.

"I have a hard time raising rates," mayor Ted Cox said.

It was a sentiment echoed by Graham Fishburn.

The two balked at alternatives that would set the city's base water usage at 2,000 gallons instead of the present 1,000 gallons.

Currently, customers who use less than 1,000 gallons a month pay \$10. The cost for 2,000 gallons is \$15.50 per month.

The city has proposed raising the 2,000-gallon rate to \$17.31 per month.

That amount would be a modest 10.4 percent increase for customers currently paying \$15.50, but a whopping 71.1

percent hike for those whose current water bill is \$10.

Twenty-five percent of residential customers currently pay \$15.50 and 10 percent pay \$10.

City manager Dale Bunn told the authority that the last water increase was in 2015.

The city's present water rates are the lowest among six area cities - Lexington, Blanchard, Tuttle, Newcastle, Goldsby and Oklahoma City. Only Norman has a lower rate.

Projected annual minimum revenue from water at the existing rates is \$1,849,657.

By tying water rates to inflation, that minimum revenue jumps to \$2,068,304.

A second alternative which rounds the cost of living to the next five cents bumps the projected revenue to \$2,073,314.

A third alternative of scaling charges to high demand would bring in \$2,127,982.

Bunn would also like to see water rates adjusted for inflation every two years.

He pointed out that the water department presently operates on a \$1.8 million budget. But that budget includes nothing for expanding the water system, replacing hydrants or installing new water lines.

During the city council portion of the meeting, Bob Dillon presented the annual financial statement and independent auditor's report for fiscal year 2018-19.

The council awarded a \$206,000 contract to Bohon Industries to make roof and water damage repairs to the Multi-Purpose Building.

They also approved the 2020 council meeting dates and city holidays and voted to declare portions of a city lot surplus property, which was then sold to Jaime and Patricia Resendiz.

## Collection, Hauling and Disposal of Municipal Solid Waste Change in Collection Time

The City of Purcell has an exclusive contract with WCA of Oklahoma to collect, haul and dispose of municipal solid waste within the city's corporate limits.

Collection Time—Pick up is now the last Monday of the month. Items are not to be put out by the curb until that weekend prior.

Bulk Waste—Brush or limbs shall be bundled in no larger than three feet x three feet bundles. No furniture larger than a pickup bed or that exceeds 75 pounds. Appliances must have refrigerant/compressor legally removed and shall not exceed 75 pounds. Yard waste such as leaves and grass clippings must be bagged. All items must be bagged and no loose items will be picked up.

Hazardous Waste—Solid waste identified or listed as a hazardous waste by the administrator of the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) or so classified by any federal or State of Oklahoma statute, rule, order or regulation should not be put out for collection. This includes tire, paint or oil products.

### A flawed impeachment process

The last several weeks have been eventful in terms of one particular topic, and that is House Democrats and Speaker Nancy Pelosi's unprecedented pursuit of impeachment.

Especially on something as consequential as impeaching the President of the United States, it is a disservice to the American people for one political party to dictate the terms of the process, as Democrats have done since day one.

To fully understand the current state of impeachment proceedings, it is important to review the turn of events that have taken place since the midterm elections shifted majority control of the House to Democrats.

When lawmakers on both sides of the aisle were sworn into the current Congress, they were also launched into an era of divided government. As I

have said on numerous occasions, it is in eras of divided government that bipartisanship is most critical.

Unfortunately, instead of finding ways to work together on meaningful legislation for the American people, House Democrats have focused their efforts on nonstarter messaging bills and politically motivated investigations into the Trump Administration.

Until earlier this fall, most of the Democratic-led investigations were conducted by the House Judiciary Committee and focused on Russian interference in the 2016 election. Such investigations by Judiciary Democrats persisted despite the thorough findings of the Mueller Report that confirmed there was no collusion between Russia and President Trump's campaign, nor was there sufficient evidence to justify indictment for obstruction of justice.

Though some embarrassing information may have been revealed, no impeachable offenses could be found. All the while, despite the activity in the Judiciary Committee and insistence by Chairman Nadler, Speaker Pelosi contended that an impeachment inquiry was not actually underway.

It was not until late September – amid reports about a whistleblower complaint on an entirely different matter related to Ukraine and U.S. military aid – that Speaker Pelosi then declared an impeachment inquiry was underway in the House.

Months prior to her announcement, Speaker Pelosi insisted, "I'm not for impeachment without bipartisan support." Needless to say, bipartisan support does not exist for the impeachment proceedings currently taking place in the

## Get ready for open enrollment 2020

Open enrollment for 2020 individual health insurance plans under the Affordable Care Act (ACA) started November 1 and ends December 15. If you want your coverage to start on January 1, you must sign up by December 15.

With a new insurer available for the Oklahoma City area, there are some important things you need to know about the 2020 open enrollment before you apply.

I urge all Oklahomans who plan to enroll for 2020 plans to not automatically renew. Look closely for changes.

In 2020, Bright Health will join the Oklahoma exchange along with Blue Cross Shield of Oklahoma (BCBSOK) and Medica and will offer plans in Oklahoma, Canadian and Cleveland counties.

**If you are currently uninsured:** you can visit [healthcare.gov](http://healthcare.gov) to compare plans and enroll in a plan that meets your health care needs.

**If you already have health insurance:** you will be automatically re-enrolled in your existing plan if it is still available. Even if you are satisfied with your current plan, review your coverage and compare plans to ensure the best option for you.

Keep in mind that cost-sharing subsidies are available only on silver plans and subsidies available on silver plans have

changed. Shop around to look for coverage that truly meets your needs. I encourage you to check with your agent to help you sort out your options.

You can visit <https://www.healthcare.gov/see-plans/> to view plan options, estimate monthly premiums and total annual out-of-pocket costs for each plan, and learn how to buy a plan.

You can also determine if you qualify for Medicaid and the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) at <https://www.healthcare.gov/medicaid-chip/>.

To help make the application process quicker and easier, make sure you have everything you need to apply by reviewing this checklist (PDF). Also, check out these tips about the Health Insurance Marketplace at [healthcare.gov](http://healthcare.gov).

## The importance of being counted

Oklahoma is preparing for the 2020 Census and redistricting - two very important aspects of our representative government.

Having high participation in the Census is so important for our district and state. It provides a complete picture of resident demographics so government, health, business and nonprofit entities can better understand the needs of cities, school districts, counties, legislative districts or the state overall.

State redistricting is necessary to ensure citizens have fair and equal representation.

Since the state Senate has 48 members and the state House has 101, Senate districts are much larger than House districts. Following the 2010 Census, Senate districts included an average of 78,153 residents up from 71,889 after the 2000 Census. House districts have represented approximately 37,142 residents since the 2010 Census up from 34,165 residents after the 2000 Census. Following the results of the 2020 Census, these numbers will increase

House. Moreover, there are serious flaws in the process by which Democrats are pursuing it. Most egregious, the inquiry was not originally authorized by a formal House vote.

Undoubtedly in response to weeks of Republican complaints about the unauthorized inquiry and the resulting closed door and deceptive process led primarily by Intelligence Committee Chairman Adam Schiff, House Democrats last week attempted to do some damage control.

This came through the introduction of an impeachment process resolution written by Democrats, without any Republican input whatsoever. It's worth noting that during the Nixon and Clinton impeachments, both sides treated the process with the seriousness it deserved, negotiating and finding agreement across the aisle to ensure fairness and due process for all involved in the inquiry.

While I am not on the investigating committees of jurisdiction, I was more directly involved in impeachment related matters last week since the process resolution came through the House Rules Committee, where I serve as the Ranking Republican.

As you may know, this committee focuses on procedural matters, most often setting the terms for consideration of major legislation before it goes to the House floor for debate and a vote.

But last week, the committee marked up the Democrats'

impeachment process resolution. During the markup, Rules Republicans offered several constructive amendments – 17 in total – to ensure a fair, open and transparent process as was done during the impeachment process for both President Nixon in 1974 and President Clinton in 1998.

All were blocked from inclusion, further affirming that Democrats are pursuing a one-sided process to ensure a pre-ordained result. However, such a process is severely flawed and surely cannot yield a legitimate outcome. Moreover, it makes political polarization and divisions in the country even worse.

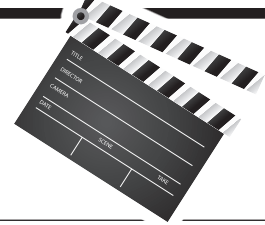
Rather than drag the country through the drama of impeachment 12 months before an election, lawmakers should legislate. Even in divided government, there is plenty of room for agreement on many pressing issues that the American people care about – like trade, drug pricing, immigration reform, border security, providing for our troops and funding the government.

Unfortunately, the more consumed the country becomes over impeachment, the less likely lawmakers are to tackle productive things.

**MOVIES WITH DAVE**

Well it's November now, which means the beginning of awards season for films.

It also means, every studio is trying to cram their movies in theaters before the year is out. Which is why I ended up watching five movies last weekend, and I'll probably see at least five next weekend.

Oh well. I never did care for sleep anyway.

This week we've got yet another film in the long running "Terminator" franchise. An animated movie starring an arctic fox voiced by Jeremy Renner. The latest film from acclaimed Korean director Bong Joon-ho. A film starring, written, and directed by Edward Norton about a mobster detective with Tourettes. And finally a historical drama featuring one of America's most heroic figures, Harriet Tubman.

Let's get to the reviews.

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First up is "Terminator: Dark Fate." More than two decades have passed since Sarah Connor (Linda Hamilton) prevented Judgment Day, changed the future, and re-wrote the fate of the human race. Dani Ramos (Natalia Reyes) is living a simple life in Mexico City when a highly advanced and deadly new Terminator (Gabriel Luna) travels back through time to hunt and kill her.

Dani's survival depends on her joining forces with Grace (Mackenzie Davis), an enhanced super-soldier from the future, and a battle-hardened Sarah Connor (Linda Hamilton). As the Terminator ruthlessly destroys everything and everyone in its path on the hunt for Dani, the three are led to a T-800 (Arnold Schwarzenegger) from Sarah's past that may be their last best hope.

Six.

That's how many movies are in the "Terminator" franchise now.

You know how many of them have had the same basic story? You know, a machine being sent to the past to eliminate a foe while they're most vulnerable, and a savior being sent from the future to protect them.

Well this film makes five.

Oh sure, they've all had their twists.

Heck, back in the 90s, before the formula became so stale, "Terminator 2: Judgment Day" did a fantastic job taking the concept from the first movie and not only turning it on its head by sending a reprogrammed Terminator to protect the future savior of humanity, but it also went a step further by allowing Sarah Connor to change the future itself. Preventing Skynet and judgment day from ever happening.

Sarah spat in the face of destiny itself and made her own future.

Of course this all becomes undone in the next movie. Destiny is suddenly unavoidable in "Terminator 3: Rise of the Machines." Forget about "no fate but what we make." Instead it's more like "fate is inevitable and there's no point in even trying."

"Terminator Salvation" is the one movie that doesn't fit the typical "Terminator" time travel mold. Instead it follows an adult John Connor battling machines in the far off future world of 2018. And while I applaud it for at least doing something different for once, I found the movie itself pretty unremarkable.

Then of course there's "Terminator Genisys," which is by far the biggest retreat of them all, not to mention the lowest

point in the franchise.

So I guess that brings us to "Terminator: Dark Fate."

Right off the bat, the movie does the smartest thing it could have possibly done, and pretends "Terminator" 3-5 didn't exist. Something many of us wish we could do ourselves.

Still, it's the same basic story we've all seen before.

This time the evil Terminator is basically two machines slammed together. It has the traditional Terminator skeleton, along with a skin made of a liquid metal like the T-1000 in "Terminator 2." It's similar in design to the T-X "Terminator 3," but this guy can actually separate itself into two functional robots.

Our savior from the future isn't a T-800 for the first time in awhile, so that's something different I guess.

Grace is actually human, though significantly enhanced with a few cybernetic alterations. And with those augmentations come some pretty debilitating limitations.

If she spends too much time fighting, she suddenly becomes weak to the point of fainting. And every so often she has to inject a cocktail of prescriptions just to stay upright.

Not exactly the person you want defending you against a relentless and unstoppable killing machine. Personally I'd take Arnold over her anyway.

Then of course there's Dani, our Terminator's target. She's okay I guess. Though personality wise she's definitely no Sarah Connor.

The story is one you already know if you've watched the first "Terminator." Even the supposed "twists" can be seen coming a mile away.

The only changes are the setting. This time all the action takes place in Mexico and Texas.

Plus there's the addition of some old faces.

And I'll admit, it is nice to see Linda Hamilton and Arnold Schwarzenegger on the big screen together again. It's interesting to see what's become of them over the years. Especially Arnold's T-800, even though this is a different model than we saw in "Terminator 2."

As for the action itself, it's fine. Good even. It's competently shot, fairly well choreographed, and largely entertaining.

Look, I'm not gonna say "Terminator: Dark Fate" holds a candle to the first two "Terminator" movies. But as far as the series goes, it's one of the better ones.

If you're looking for a fun action movie with a large dose of nostalgia, this certainly fits the bill. At the very least it didn't attempt to brutally murder the franchise like Genisys did.

"Terminator: Dark Fate" is rated R.

Next is "Arctic Dogs."

Swiftly the Arctic Fox (Jeremy Renner) works in the mailroom of the Arctic Blast Delivery Service, but has much bigger dreams. He yearns to become a Top Dog, the Arctic's star husky couriers.

To prove he can do it, he commandeers a sled and delivers a mysterious package to a secret location. There he stumbles upon a hidden fortress overseen by the nefarious Otto Von Walrus (John Cleese) and a sinister plot to destroy Swiftly's arctic home.

It's these kind of movies that make me regret being a critic.

This is yet another trash film released to theaters by Entertainment Studios, which is all

they seem to do lately.

Their biggest claim to fame is "47 Meters Down," low budget shark based horror movie released in 2017. In fact that seems to be the only movie in their repertoire that hasn't been a complete box office failure. And for the most part, it's for a very good reason.

At Entertainment Studios they have a talent for finding garbage no one wants or cares about. And "Arctic Dogs" fits that bill perfectly.

You can tell just from watching the trailers how cheap this movie looks.

This is by far the worst looking animated movie I've seen all year.

The animal characters here look completely lifeless. It's like watching someone puppet their creepy collection of taxidermied pets. Nothing about their movement feels natural.

Why star furry animals in your animated movie when can't make fur look realistic? This is something Pixar was doing back in 2001 with "Monsters, Inc." Sure, at the time it was revolutionary, but that was 18 years ago. It's like this movie didn't even try.

Their environment looks just as low effort. It's like the film is a black hole for creativity. Everything about it, from the landscapes, to design of the town just looks generic and uninspired.

And why in the world did they set this movie in the middle of the arctic when they clearly didn't have the ability to animate snow properly? At best the white dust they have floating around here looks more like clouds if they're lucky.

And don't worry, the bad doesn't stop with just the animation.

Though this film features a collection of fairly high profile actors like Jeremy Renner, Alec Baldwin, Heidi Klum, James Franco, and John Cleese, they all sound just as stilted and lifeless as their animated counterparts look.

Add on top of that a horribly generic, yet surprisingly unfocused story, annoying dialogue, terrible comedic timing, and you've got yourself an atrocious film firing on every terrible cylinder.

The worst part of all though? It's just boring.

I swear even though the movie is only 91 minutes long, it felt like I sat there in that theater for three hours straight.

And it seemed the few kids in my showing felt about the same as I did. Most of them weren't paying attention to the screen towards the end. Quite a few were out of their chairs and looked completely restless.

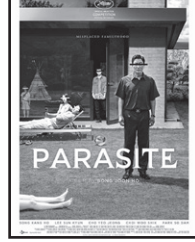
And who can blame them? Their parents took them to see "Arctic Dogs" for crying out loud. I wouldn't even take a kid to see garbage as a punishment.

Don't be like those parents. Don't take your kids to see this movie.

If you see the Entertainment Studios logo, just run away. This is a studio that has made a name for themselves by releasing bad movies, and until they make an effort to change that image, every new movie they produce is best avoided.

"Arctic Dogs" is rated PG.

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Third is "Parasite."

Meet the Park Family (Yeojong Jo, Sun-kyun Lee, Ji-so Jung, Hyun-jun Jung), the picture of aspirational wealth. And the Kim Family (Kang-ho Song, So-dam Park, Woo-sik Choi, Hye-jin Jang), rich in street smarts but not much else. Be it chance or fate, these two houses are brought

together and the Kims sense a golden opportunity.

But as a symbiotic relationship forms between the two families, the Kims' newfound comforts become jeopardized, and a savage, underhanded battle for dominance breaks out, threatening to destroy the fragile ecosystem between the Kims and the Parks.

I don't have the opportunity to watch many foreign language films. In fact, I had to go out of my way this week to even watch this one.

But considering the waves this movie has been making in the film critic community, I knew I had to make an exception.

"Parasite" isn't just being touted as a good movie, heck it's not even just being called the best film of the year. I'm hearing people say "Parasite" is one of the best movies of the decade.

If word of mouth like that doesn't get someone like me off their butts to go all the way up to the AMC Theater in Quail Springs Mall to watch a film, I don't know what will.

And so I did just that. And yeah, they were right. This is indeed one of the best movies I've seen all year.

There is not a single throw-away moment in this film. Every scene, every captivating shot, every seemingly insignificant line of dialogue ends up meaning something more in the grand scheme of things.

The characters here are all absolutely fascinating in their own ways.

Despite essentially being a family of scammers, the Kim's are impossible not to love. I love their family dynamic, and the dialogue between the four of them makes for some surprisingly hilarious moments throughout the film.

Make no mistake though, "Parasite" is no comedy. Or at least it's only one part of the time. Other times it a thriller, and it even adds horror to the mix as the movie drifts closer to its climatic conclusion.

Through it all is a deeply intertwined message about class and the divide between the poor and wealthy.

It's almost subtle enough to miss at first. But once you start noticing certain details, it's impossible to ignore the movie's brilliant, yet heartbreaking message about social inequality, expertly woven together by the film's writer and director Bong Joon-ho.

And unlike another movie the wealth divide released earlier this year, you can tell the film's underlying meaning had some thought put into it and wasn't just carelessly thrown in the script in an attempt to appear more intellectual. I'm looking at you "Joker."

The only reason I wouldn't recommend this movie to absolutely everyone remotely interested in a dark comedy, horror, thriller is because the film is entirely in Korean.

In fact, I'm certain I would have enjoyed it much more myself if I could have just heard the dialogue instead of reading every single line. It can be a chore, especially if you're not used to it.

And it's a shame that reading subtitles will keep so many from watching this incredible film. Because a story like this one is well worth the trouble.

If you love cinema, this is one movie that can't be missed. Heck, if you can get past the foreign language aspect at all, I'd say this movie is a must watch.

Don't be surprised when the 92nd Academy Awards roll around and you see "Parasite" buried in nominations. If this

Census population totals also guide legislative redistricting at the federal level determining how many seats each state has in the federal House of Representatives.

It assists federal, tribal, state and local governments in planning and implementing programs, services and emergency response. Data helps forecast future transportation needs as well as determine areas eligible for housing assistance and rehabilitation loans.

All the funding and projects awarded in our Senate District are typically based on Census numbers. Approximately \$675 billion in federal funding is distributed to communities nationwide annually based on Census numbers.

Businesses also use Census data when looking to relocate or open new facilities. They look at local economies, education levels, ages, etc. to determine the best location for branches or stores. They have to make sure that local communities have the type of workers they need or are desired places for workers to relocate. National companies put a lot of thought into relocating and opening new offices and depend heavily on Census information.

According to the U.S. Census Bureau, around 25 percent of Oklahoma households didn't participate in the 2010 Census accounting for a significant undercount. It's estimated that an undercount of just two percent could cost the state as much as \$1.8 billion over ten years in lost economic development and federal funding.

This is a big deal, and one I hope our citizens don't take for granted. The results impact all of us. Every citizen not counted in the census costs Oklahoma approximately \$1,800 per year in lost federal funding for ten years, and that doesn't include lost state, lo-

cal or nonprofit funding.

I want to encourage everyone to please be looking for information in your mail about the Census. Talk with your neighbors, friends and family members, especially those who are disabled or elderly who may need assistance reading and filling out their surveys. You'll begin seeing advertisements after the new year and then you'll receive your survey in March or early April.

This year will be easier than ever to participate as we can fill out the Census survey online, by phone and or by mail. If you don't have access to internet, everyone will still get a pamphlet in the mail and you can call in your answers or mail the survey back. You can also visit your local library or other Census partners in your community to submit your survey online. There are three easy ways to participate.

Currently, Census Complete Count Committees are being formed at the national, state and local levels. Communities and neighborhoods are also setting up their own committees to help ensure their residents are counted.

The U.S. Census Bureau is also looking to hire temporary employees to help with the Census in various ways throughout the state in the coming months.

Fourth is "Motherless Brooklyn." Lionel Essrog (Edward Norton) is a small time gangster who doesn't let Tourette's syndrome stand in the way of his job. Gifted with a few clues and an obsessive mind, Lionel sets out to solve the murder of Frank Minna (Bruce Willis), his mentor and only friend.

Scouring the jazz clubs and slums of Brooklyn and Harlem, Lionel soon uncovers a web of secrets while contending with thugs, corruption and the most dangerous man in the city.

You know, it's not every day they come out with a mobster-noir movie, starting a man with Tourettes. Guess it was my lucky day.

I didn't know much about this film going into it, but about halfway through it struck me that this movie must have been written by Edward Norton.

After all, who but Norton would write a character like this, a man's whose sole purpose in the film it to be constantly told how quirky yet brilliant he is.

Sure enough, not only was Norton the film's screenwriter, but he directed it too. Zero surprises there.

I'm not gonna say Edward Norton isn't a great actor. He is. But he also has a reputation of being an incredibly difficult man to work with when it comes to making movies.

He has a very bad habit of rewriting his roles, whether the filmmakers like it or not.

And in the case of "American History X" he even made the production re-edit the movie. And though the film is generally well reviewed, it resulted in a final product the movie's director didn't even want his name on.

Luckily for Norton, he didn't have to worry about any of that for this movie.

He could make it as long and as self flattering as he wanted. And boy did he.

This film clocks in at nearly two and a half hours, and the time doesn't exactly fly by.

That said, it did end up being an experience I enjoyed, at least for the most part.

At its heart, the film is an old fashioned noir detective movie. Constant moody narration and all.

Though Norton's character starts off as a gangster flunky, he morphs into an incredibly competent private eye about 30 minutes in. And not long after that, he steals a reporter's press pass and instantly becomes the most approachable journalist in New York.

All this, despite his random vocal tics and odd mannerisms. To the surprise of no one, Norton's character is the most interesting thing in this movie. He definitely made sure of that.

But even though I think Norton is a talented actor, and even a competent filmmaker, I think he bit off a bit more than he could chew here.

The movie isn't bad. There's just too much going on. Too many things that don't serve the story. Things that probably shouldn't have even made the screenplay in the first place.

It was a struggle towards the end to keep characters and their backstories straight. Some of which feel completely pointless looking back on the whole thing.

Luckily for me, despite its flaws, I really like stories about brilliant people who manipulate everyone around them through their sheer wit and charisma. And Norton's character here fits that bill pretty well.

It definitely could have been a good 30 minutes shorter, but at the end of the day I still liked it pretty well.

I think if you enjoy noir detective movies, and you don't mind the odd addition of a private eye with Tourettes, you'll probably have a good time too. Just make sure to use the bathroom beforehand.

Finally, last this week is "Harriet." Based on the inspirational life of an iconic American freedom fighter, this film tells the extraordinary tale of Harriet Tubman (Cynthia Erivo), her escape from slavery and transformation into one of America's greatest heroes.

This is a movie I really wish I could have loved.

Like the synopsis says, Harriet Tubman is an American hero. Someone whose life story should be memorialized in book, song, and film.

And while this movie does an okay job telling her tale, at the end of the day I just couldn't help but feel like the whole thing was a wasted opportunity.

To her credit, Cynthia Erivo made for a really good Harriet. In fact, I don't think I'd fault any of the performances in this movie. They're all more than competent across the board.

My biggest problem was, while everyone seemed to love commending Harriet on her often incredible actions, the filmmakers here did a pretty bad job showcasing her heroics.

Beginning with her own escape, when Harriet makes it to Pennsylvania for the first time, I wanted to feel moved, I wanted to break down watching what could have been an incredibly emotional moment.

But I didn't. And it's because the movie did a poor job showing the struggle and hardship that led up to this life changing moment.

When Harriet first arrives in Philadelphia and is greeted by abolitionist William Still (Leslie Odom Jr.), he tells her that completing the journey she made alone was nothing short of a miracle. But in the movie the whole trek took less than 10 minutes.

It's great that we're told how amazing Harriet's actions were, but I wanted to see them, I wanted to feel them for myself. And most of the time, this film just wasn't up for the task.

And not to nitpick too much, but I was really unimpressed with how this movie was filmed. It just looked boring and uninspired. It was far from unwatchable, but again, it was less than it could have been.

The movie as a whole still makes for an incredible story to be sure.

This film would definitely be worth watching as an introduction to Harriet Tubman if you knew nothing about her. Even if the filmmakers did take a few liberties with the historical record for dramatization, at the very least it keeps with the spirit of her tale.

I really wish I could have loved this movie, but instead I just liked it okay. If you have any interest in Harriet Tubman, or pre-civil war America, this film is probably worth a watch. Just don't go in with expectations as high as mine.

## Keep your spice rack on track for fall flavors

Have the cooler temperatures and turning leaves got you thinking of flavors like pumpkin spice or apple cinnamon?

For many, fall means comfort foods and incorporating spicy autumn flavors into homemade chili and stews, warming ciders and holiday baking.

The enjoyment of using species to create fragrant and flavorful foods for our family tables abounds.

Spices and herbs not only add wonderful flavors, but they can also add the healthy benefit of allowing cooks to use less added fats, sugar and salt when creating meals. The fresher the spice, the more great flavor.

So, when was the last time you looked at your spices? Do they still have a bright color, or a strong fragrance? Are they expired?

The USDA defines spices and other foods that can be stored at room temperature as a "Shelf Stable" product that will truly never expire, however, over time the flavor and potency of

the spices will diminish. Flavoring extracts can evaporate over time.

Here are some guidelines to help you determine when it's time to toss your spices and herbs.

- As a general rule, keep herbs or ground spices for one year and whole spices for two years.

- Buy a smaller container until you determine how fast you'll use a particular spice or herb.

- If a spice or herb smells strong and flavorful, it's probably still potent.

- Check an herb or ground spice by rubbing a small amount in your hand. If the aroma is fresh, rich and immediate, it can still flavor foods.

- Check a whole spice---such as a clove or cinnamon stick---by breaking, crushing or scraping it before smelling it.

- Avoid smelling pepper or chili power as they can irritate your nose.

- Initial quality will influence shelf life.

- Label your date of purchase

on the container with a permanent marker.

Use the following guidelines for storing your spices and herbs to maintain maximum quality.

- To prevent flavor and color loss, avoid moisture, light, heat and air.

- Store in tightly covered containers.

- Store in a dark place away from sunlight, such as inside a cupboard or drawer.

- Avoid storage above the dishwasher, microwave, stove or refrigerator, or near a sink or heating vent.

- If storing in an open spice rack, store in a site away from heat, light and moisture.

- Avoid sprinkling dried spices and herbs directly from container into a steaming pot to prevent moisture from entering the container.

- Use a dry spoon to measure spices and herbs from container.

- Refrigerate paprika, chili powder and red pepper for best color retention, especially in summer of hotter climates.

## November is National Family Caregiver Month

It is that time of year again---the leaves are changing colors, the weather is cooling off and Thanksgiving is on the horizon. This season is all about being thankful, so it is only fitting that November is National Family Caregivers Month.

This month is focused on recognizing, honoring and thanking those who provide care for someone who is aging, disabled or chronically ill.

A family caregiver is anyone who helps take care of a family member or friend without any professional training. Nationally, it is estimated more than 43.5 million Americans provide care for a loved one.

Closer to home, more than half-a-million Oklahomans are providing 488 million hours of care each year. Alarmingly, at least 42 percent do not know who to contact if there is a problem.

Caregiving is not easy, but no one needs to go it alone. Asking for help can be hard, especially when you feel you're the only

one who is there to provide help. Caregiving comes with obligation and guilt.

Obligation in the sense that, 'it's what families do for each other.' Guilt is that your loved one does not get a break from their condition, so you don't deserve a break either.

One of the biggest concerns with caregiving is burnout. The caregiver becomes emotionally burdened or may be overwhelmed by their responsibilities. This can negatively impact the caregiver's health--and can result in greater risk for cardiovascular diseases, depression and social isolation.

Burnout puts the caregiver and person receiving care (PRC) at risk for injury, possibly resulting in the PRC being prematurely placed in a long-term facility. As a caregiver, it is your job to advocate for your loved one, but it is also important that you advocate for yourself. So, what can be done?

The best way to access resources is to have a family meeting. Sit down with the PRC and discuss the tasks

with which they want to help. Caregivers have a tendency to want to help the PRC as much as possible, but everyone wants their independence.

Once you have an idea about what needs to be done, gather everyone and have a conversation. Have a list prepared and let people volunteer for what they would like to do.

Another tip is to keep a running list of tasks you need done such as laundry, yard work or possibly dinner one night because you will get home later than expected. This list will help you stay organized as family members finish tasks and want more to do.

Family caregivers are invaluable to our society. They fill a gap in the medical system. National Family Caregiver Month is a great way to shine light on everything caregivers do for their loved ones.

Remember caregivers often throughout the year. Thank a family caregiver and show your appreciation as often as you can and step in to assist when possible.

## Reducing losses when feeding hay to beef cattle

Feeding hay to cattle is expensive. Recent analyses show that hay costs between \$0.02 and \$0.07 per pound of dry matter; usually more than double the cost for the same amount of nutrients from pasture. Hay is expensive because:

- It requires a large investment in equipment;
- It requires labor to make and feed;
- More than 50 percent of it can be wasted by either poor storage methods or improper feeding practices, or both.

### Feeding methods

No matter how hay is packaged, if you waste it, you lose money. Below are some general rules that can help minimize waste during feeding.

- Feed hay in small amounts or in a feeder to minimize waste. When fed a limited amount of hay at a time, cattle have less opportunity to trample and soil the hay. Feeding hay in a rack or a "hay ring" also limits the opportunity that animals have to trample or soil hay and will reduce waste substantially if you intend to provide more than a day's worth of hay at one time.

- Feed hay in well-drained areas. If you intend to feed hay in a single location all winter, then providing a footing such as crushed gravel or even

concrete can help minimize problems with mud. Perhaps more cost effective is to move hay-feeding areas around the farm to minimize the damage to any one area of the pasture.

- Feed hay stored outside before hay stored inside. Hay stored outside usually has more spoilage during storage and lower palatability than hay stored inside.

Cattle will waste a greater percentage of poor-quality hay than they will of good-quality hay. Animals fed high-quality hay early in the season will often refuse poor-quality hay when it is offered later.

### Big packages

Large bale systems are designed to minimize labor, not waste. It is important to remember that outside storage of large bales will increase hay losses due to weather-related spoilage. Spoiled, rotted, or moldy hay is often refused by all but the hungriest of cattle and will result in more waste during feeding.

### Large round bales

The simplest system for feeding large round bales is to set the bale in the pasture or feeding area where the stock will have free access to hay. This system does not require the purchase of any extra equipment for feeding, but it is prone to high feeding losses.

Losses are greatest when

a several-day supply of hay is fed at one time. Feeding a one-day supply of hay each day minimizes waste but increases labor costs.

When feeding large round bales without a ring or rack, a good way to estimate how many bales to have available each day is to figure one cow per foot of outside diameter of the bale. Even then, feeding losses can be excessive.

A better system for feeding large round bales is to set the bale in the pasture or feeding area but limit access to the hay with a rack or hay ring. This system requires an initial investment in hay racks or rings, but feeding losses are low, even if a seven-day supply of hay is left at one time.

Feeding hay in racks or rings is crucial for producers who do not or cannot feed hay to their cattle on a daily basis.

When hay rings are used, you need to consider the space available around the feeder. Most hay rings have enough space for approximately 10 cows at a time.

The more aggressive cows will eat first and consume the more desirable hay. Cows that are more timid will be forced to eat the lower-quality material or go hungry. To make the most efficient use of hay rings, you may need to purchase several rings and feed more bales at

one time.

As an example, a 30-cow herd would consume one 900-pound round bale per day. To feed a 30-cow herd, we could use one hay ring that is filled daily.

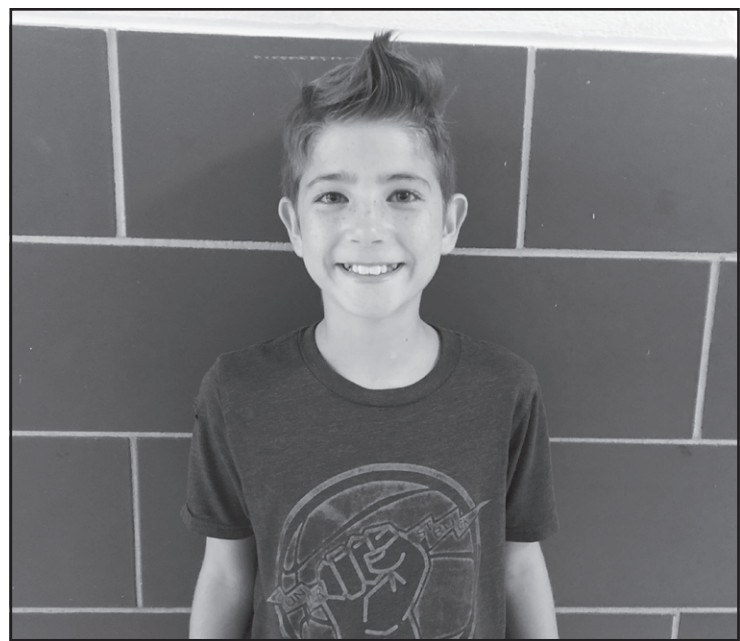
But a better alternative would be to use three hay rings that are filled every three days. This gives every cow in the herd an opportunity to get the hay she needs, in addition to cutting labor costs. Similar calculations can be used with other types of hay feeders.

### Small packages

Feeding small hay bales is labor intensive but reduces waste if fed properly. Small hay bales can be fed intact, in bunks or racks or spread throughout the field. Since you usually have greater control over the amount of hay available to the cattle, these bales often have low trampling and soiling losses.

No matter what size hay package or feeding style you use, some hay will be lost or wasted. Proper feeding management minimizes these losses. Since hay is some of the most expensive feed used on beef operations, it makes sense to try to keep waste as low as possible through good management practices.

## Neighbor:

“At the end of the day if you help someone, to me that is rewarding,” she said.

“It’s been a blessing, a great opportunity for me. We provide so many different services here ... and we’re able to help people so much more quickly.”

That help takes many forms — finding shelter for those without, food on the table, lights on when they get home, day care assistance.

“We deal with all kinds of situations, but helping meet that person’s needs is what it’s all about,” Ronie said. “We truly work as a team here. It’s an amazing outcome when everybody does their part. There are a lot of good people in this community who participate in

programs like Operation Christmas and Delta.

“It’s rewarding to know those good people are there.”

The McClain County DHS is part of a region that also includes Garvin and Murray counties.

With 25 to 30 workers in just the Purcell office, the need is great.

On average, the office receives 800 to 900 walk-ins and averages 3,000 phone calls every month.

Food stamps and medical fall under family support. And then there’s child welfare unit, foster care and adoptions, to name a few.

“This is a really small building, but it’s loaded with services and good people,” Ronie said.

She tells everyone they are welcome to apply for any service.

Following an initial application, there’s an interview process after which a worker determines if the individual is eligible for assistance.

With online application and telephone interviews, the process is streamlined to save the applicant gas money and time.

Ronie’s husband, James, is an accountant at the University of Oklahoma.

The couple’s adult daughter, Lindsey Pickle, teaches first grade at Newcastle.

“I do love my job here,” Ronie said. “I have such good folks I work with, I’m able to leave it at the office when I go home.”

## Violations:

The county is making available for inspection the latest jail inspection report.

Commissioners said even a cursory glance at the report clearly demonstrates that the county jail is far from being in compliance with the jail standards and statutes set out in the report from Inspector Barry Edwards.

The commissioners said if the four areas of violations cannot be corrected within the required time period, the Health Department may refer the violations to Attorney General Mike Hunter with a recommendation that the matter be sent to District Court for an order closing the jail.

Should that happen, all prisoners will be sent to a county with bed space and the citizens will have to pay all costs of incarceration and transportation at the foreign county’s daily rate.

“This would be money that won’t help our people at all,” Hewett said. “We need to make sure that we do the best we can for our citizens right here at home.”

This is not the first notice of non-compliance. Over the past four plus years, the Health Department’s Division of Protective Health has provided the county with numerous violation reports and opportunities to improve all of the conditions and reduce the critical and dangerous overcrowding in the jail.

As Mr. Edwards’s report of September 16 notice of non-compliance demonstrates, the Health Department has set out in detail exactly what the county’s insufficiencies are and has made very clear recommendations on corrective action.

Jail Administrator Lt. Bill Scott responded within the appropriate time period and agrees that the county can make significant progress to correct the hygiene and physical plant violations.

“What we cannot do though,” says Scott, “is correct all of the critical and serious health and safety hazards created by our overcrowding.”

The costs associated with reducing the population alone

are staggering. Jail records indicate that for nearly two years, the jail’s daily census has been over 100 inmates. The jail is only certified for 53 inmates. Lately, the daily population has been close to or over 120. Over the next year, the county will have to pay well over \$1,000,000 in additional costs just to house inmates at between \$45-48 per day while the McClain County daily cost as certified by District Judge Leah Edwards is just under \$29 per day.

“Just think, if we reduce our daily population from 100 to 53, at an average daily cost of \$46.50, we spend over \$2,000 per day just buying bed space in other counties,” Hewett said. “And our citizens don’t really get any benefit from spending that much money.” On top of the actual amount paid to other counties, Hewett has had to hire an additional transport deputy and had to purchase an additional transport vehicle at a cost of over \$20,000. Simple arithmetic indicates the daily rate along with fuel and wear and tear on the vehicles, amounts to a staggering annual total that could continue for years.

At a recent meeting of jail administrators from throughout the state, Lt. Scott represented McClain County and verified that Inspector Edwards singled out McClain County’s non-compliance saying that if the county cannot actually correct the violations in a reasonable time, it is likely that the Health Department will institute closure proceedings in District Court.

“The health and safety of our employees is critical,” Lt. Scott said. “We cannot continue to operate in these dangerous and unhealthy conditions and I completely understand why the Health Department has finally told us that this may very well be our last chance.”

In 2015, the voters resoundingly rejected a ballot measure asking to approve debt for construction of a new courthouse and jail.

“In 2015, we believed that with the cost of money at a

historic low, we’d be taking advantage of the economic climate that would enable us to upgrade all of our facilities and thereby provide enhanced services to our citizens. We would have a modern, efficient physical plant for at least 30 years,” County Commissioner Chairman Wilson Lyles said. The post-election reconnaissance clearly indicated that while they disagreed that a complete new courthouse was a good idea, the citizens clearly understood the need then for a larger, safer and more modern jail.

“Time after time,” Lyles said, “we heard that the ballot measure would have passed if we only built a jail.” The county is asking the citizens for that new, modern facility with technology and infrastructure that will operate more efficiently and effectively,” Hewett said. “It will create a safe and healthy environment for our friends and neighbors who work in our jail.”

The plans call for a Public Safety Center with a jail, sheriff offices, Emergency Management and 911 departments at a cost of \$23.75 million.

Hewett said the modern facility will operate efficiently and will enable all of the county’s public safety functions to work together in close proximity for the first time in history. Everyone involved in county public safety endeavors looks forward to being able to work together to improve services to the citizens, the sheriff said. The entire non-compliance report can be reviewed at the McClain County Clerk’s office at the courthouse.

Hewett said a yes vote Tuesday will enable the county to put \$23,750,000.00 to use to improve public safety services for all the county’s citizens and will guarantee a jail that will be able to stay in compliance with all of the mandated standards for at least 30 years.

Lyles said that ultimately the election may result in spending nearly the same amount of the requested bond over time in attorneys’ fees and court costs.

## Unknowns:

Peace, Victory and Valor.

There are also six carved wreaths for the war’s six major campaigns.

And there are these words: “Here rests in honored glory an American soldier known but to God”

According to the website, the journey of the World War I Unknown to Arlington began in France in September 1921.

Four American bodies were exhumed from unmarked battlefield graves. Army Sgt. Edward F. Younger (a World War I veteran who was wounded in combat and received the Distinguished Service Medal) selected the Unknown Soldier from among four identical caskets at Chalons-sur-Marne, France.

The remaining three caskets were re-buried in the Meuse-Argonne American Cemetery.

With much pomp, the chosen casket was shipped to Washington, D.C. aboard the USS Olympia, a Navy cruiser.

The body arrived in Washington on November 9, 1921 and 90,000 paid their respects as it lay in state at the Capitol Rotunda for two days.

On Armistice Day (November 11), pallbearers from the Army, Navy and Marine Corps transported the casket to a caisson for its procession to Arlington National Cemetery.

More than 5,000 were waiting at the cemetery’s Memorial Amphitheater.

The ceremony included the National Anthem played by the Marine Corps band and an invocation by the Army Chief of Chaplains.

After two minutes of silence, President Warren G. Harding spoke and then placed the Medal of Honor and Distinguished Service Cross on the casket. More medals were added by foreign dignitaries.

A cannon battery fired three salvos and the casket was lowered into the waiting crypt.

A bugler played the haunting Taps and the battery fired a 21-gun salute.

The first Unknown Soldier was home.

A 24-hour military guard was added at the tomb in 1937.

The Unknowns of World War II and Korea weren’t interred until 1958.

Because Americans fought on three continents during World War II, the Army exhumed a total of 18 bodies from North Africa, Europe, the Philippines and Hawaii.

Two World War II unknowns were chosen — one each from the European and Pacific theaters.

They were placed in identical caskets aboard the USS Canberra, a guided-missile cruiser off the Virginia capes.

Navy Hospitalman 1st Class William R. Charette, then the Navy’s only active-duty Medal

of Honor recipient, selected the Unknown Soldier of World War II.

The second body was given a solemn burial at sea.

During the Korean War, North Korean forces killed and captured a number of American soldiers during their initial offensive in June 1950.

When the Chinese entered the war that fall, they overran a number of temporary cemeteries.

Army officials chose one unknown casket among four exhumed from the National Memorial Cemetery of the Pacific in Hawaii.

Caskets holding the remains of the Unknowns from the two wars reached Washington, D.C., on May 28, 1958. They lay in state at the Capitol Rotunda until May 30 when they were placed on caissons and transported to Arlington.

President Dwight Eisenhower awarded each the Medal of Honor.

The fourth — and final — Unknown was from the Vietnam War.

In 1978, President Jimmy Carter dedicated a plaque at Memorial Amphitheater which commemorated those missing in action from the Vietnam War.

Due to scientific advances in identifying remains, there were few unknown burials in Vietnam.

Still, President Ronald Reagan and many Americans wanted to honor Vietnam veterans by interring an unknown

information although he stated, “I’m not working on anything on Chief Williams.”

Bunn said there is an investigation underway. Sources told **The Register** Lt. James Bolling is spearheading the investigation. He declined comment to the newspaper.

Bunn did not confirm if any action had been taken against Williams or anyone else in connection with the incident.

Wayne clinched the No. 2 spot in Class A's District 7 Friday night with a 57-24 win over the Konawa Tigers.

They again relied on their powerful offensive line, as well as the legs of Ethan Mullins, to dominate the game.

"Our offensive line is playing as well as a unit as any that I can remember," said Wayne Head Coach Brandon Sharp. "Ethan is playing extremely well too."

Wayne amassed 503 rushing yards on 48 attempts.

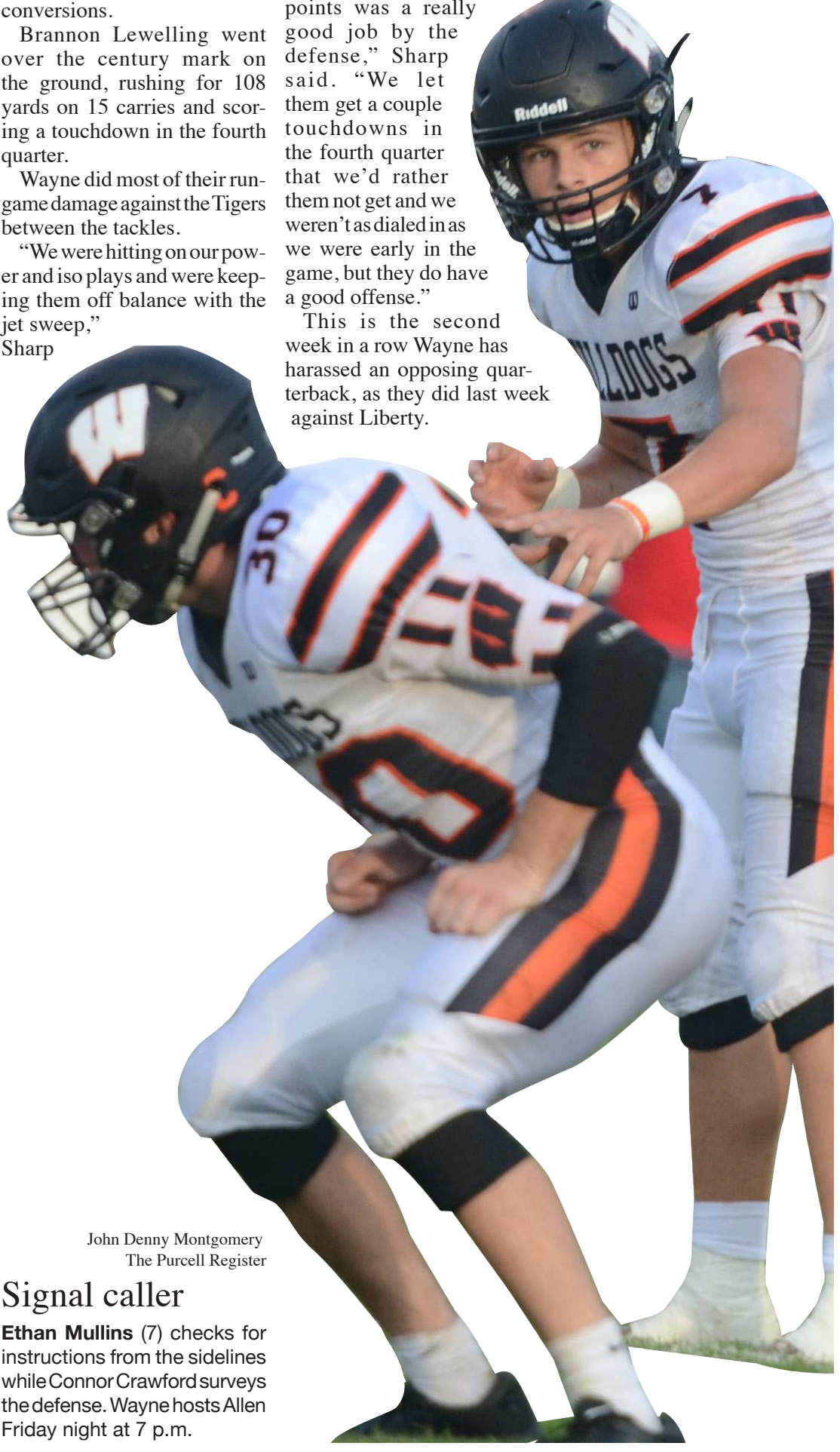

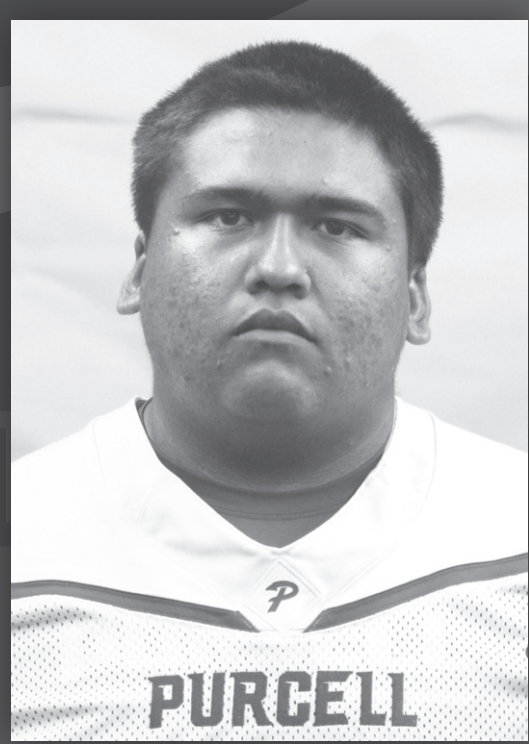

# District title on line Friday

Washington playing for outright championship

When Washington travels to Lexington Friday night a District Championship will be on the line.

A Warrior victory and they are the outright champs and will be set to host two playoff games. A Lexington victory would create a three-way tie for the league title along with Millwood.

"And they get downhill in a hurry," Beller noted. "They've been the most physical team on the field this year. They run to the football extremely well and don't give up the big plays. That jumps off the screen at you. They force teams to have

to drive the football."

Beller said the key for the Warriors is ball security.

"We must take care of the football and establish our ground game," Beller said. "On defense we have to limit big plays and that includes big plays in the passing game and the run game. That is vital."

The Warriors were in scoring mode when they shellacked CCS last Friday, 57-0.

It didn't take Washington long to get on the busy scoreboard.

Senior quarterback Devin Orr scored on Washington's very first play on offense on an 85 yard run.

That was the first of three touchdowns Orr would play a part in on the night.

He tossed touchdown passes of 36 yards to Kobe Scott and 14 yards to Rhett Vaughn.

Orr finished the night with 93 yards rushing on four attempts and was 4-6 passing for 81 yards.

"We haven't been able to pass much because of the scores lately but Devin has been making the right reads and making some really good throws," Beller said.

"I'm really proud of the way Devin ran the ball. That adds to the strength of our offense when he pulls it. It makes our offense much more diversified because everyone keys on Lance."

Spaulding, who rushed 11 times for 84 yards, scored three times including a 46 yard punt return. Emitt Wilks also took a punt return to the house, a 38 yard return.

The encounter with Zaccheus – a guide for us all

When I was in high school, I went to spend some time with my older brother Tom. He was the priest in a small parish in Temple, Texas. I wanted to stay with him for a few days and learn about the life of a priest.

The first night, he picked up the phone and called someone. He said "My younger brother is here on a visit. Can we come over for dinner at your house tonight?" I knew then that I would like to be a priest!

Jesus invited himself to dinner at the home of Zaccheus (Luke 19:1-10). He wanted to know this man personally. He wanted to love him personally.

There are two primary ways that we learn from the Bible, the Word of God. One is the literal sense, by listening to and praying with the actual words in Scripture.

The second is the spiritual sense. This is the sense in which, through prayer, the words point to something that is hidden, that is beyond the words only. This is when the Word of God points to truths that are not felt by the body's senses, but can only be grasped

by the heart.

The story of Jesus and Zaccheus has a spiritual meaning. Zaccheus has a desire to meet Jesus, to see him face to face. But he is short, so he climbs a tree. He has to get above the crowd in order to see Jesus. Then he crawls out on a limb to get a better look. When he does this, then Jesus sees him. Jesus sees that he is sincere. And Jesus invites himself over for dinner.

In a spiritual sense, this encounter is like our own life of faith. We first have to acknowledge our own desire to see Jesus, to know him, and to love him. That is the first step. But the crowd gets in our way. We can get caught up in the crowd.

We are caught up in the crowd when we become cynical, when we are a bully to others. We are caught up in the crowd when we follow the latest trend or fashion, when we just go along with it because "everyone else is doing it". But Jesus is not in the crowd. The encounter with Jesus will make us stand apart

from the crowd.

We also might have to go out on a limb to see Jesus. We might have to take a leap of faith. As the Bible says, faith is believing in things that are hoped for. It is evidence in things not seen. (Heb 11:1) When we commit ourselves to something that is above and beyond the crowd, then we are taking a leap of faith.

We commit to our family, our marriage, our vocation, our faith – these are things that are beyond the crowd. But it is risky, because we often feel alone. We feel like we are out on a limb. But such is a necessary step in our life of faith.

Finally, Jesus turns his gaze towards us and invites himself into our home. We know then an intimacy with Jesus. He comes into our home where he sees all the clutter in our lives. He sees the good and the bad, the holy and the sinful. But this is where he wants to be.

He wants to be here because he sees our desire and he knows

mind, and that tugging at her heart leads her to investigate this "Jesus" thing further, ultimately forcing Lee to as well.

While Leslie is truly looking for something to anchor her life to, Lee is looking to debunk this silly notion of a Jesus who was raised from the dead.

Strobel's story, really, more of a "journey," truly is compelling, even until the end when, after he has spent months looking to prove the fallacy of this resurrection notion, Lee asks his editor if he can write an article on his findings. Of course, his editor knows the nature of

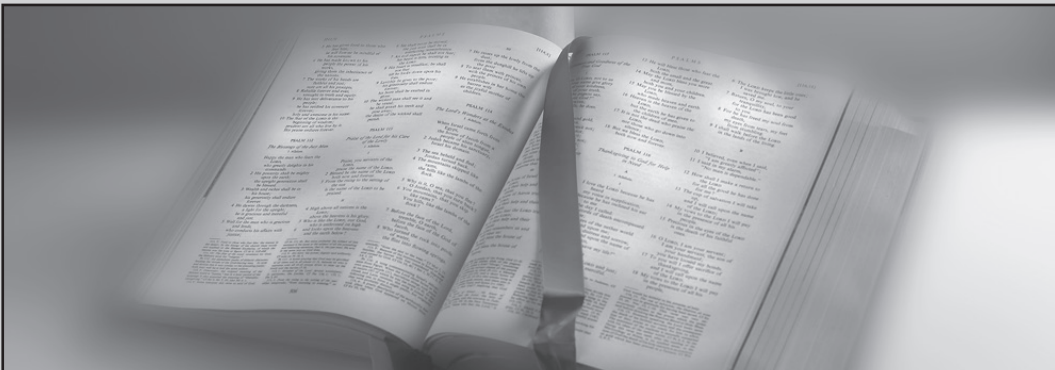
Our ladies sewing group has recently completed their Operation Christmas project making pillow cases for area teens.

This Sunday, November 10, from 3 p.m. to 5 p.m., we would like to invite you to be with us for a guest speaker on the origins of the Bible. To add a little mystery, I'll ask you to look elsewhere in this week's paper for the "rest of the story."

In the past 15 or so years, there has been a movement for businesses and other entities to describe what they do in a mission statement. For example, at one point the Kodak company wrote their mission as "Preserving memories."

This didn't say anything about cameras, film, or other picture paraphernalia since that would limit how memories could be preserved in the future. The person I learned about this from said that if the mission couldn't be stated in fewer than seven words, the writer doesn't understand what their mission really is.

We can each develop our

own mission statement. A few years ago I started thinking about what I feel my mission is. I started out with words that I use to describe myself: a learner; a teacher; an encourager; someone who shows love to others; kind; good hearted; a communicator; a musician; and so on. Using few words, how can I tell you what I feel my purpose for being alive is?

Instead of "mission statement", we can also use the term "ministry." In Paul's writings we often hear him speak of ministry. He sees his purpose as leading others to Christ This was also the purpose for the disciples, but their realization of their ministry was awakened only after Jesus's death and resurrection.

We all have a ministry or mission. Some are called to help people make repairs around their homes. Others may knit or crochet items for others to stay warm with. We may see feeding others as a ministry.

Those are a few tangible examples, but we may also minister spiritually by praying for others, giving everyone a smile, touching someone on the hand, showing kindness to all. Our ministry may be tell-

ing people that God loves them and that we do too. It may be showing everyone, no matter their race, ethnicity, or religion, that you care for them.

God already has a ministry for us, although we may need to work to find out what it is. It may change to fit the circumstances we find ourselves in, but my thought is that God wants us to show what God is like through our actions.

Jesus never turned anyone away or turned his back to them. As his followers, we should be the same way: loving and accepting of all people.

The bottom line is that we all need to prepare ourselves for ministry wherever God places us and to respond to the situation at hand. So...what is your mission? Next time, we'll look at the structure of a prayer.

the thesis and declines.

That night at home, as Lee laments that lost opportunity, Leslie says non-assumingly: "Well, then, write a book."

Since that casual "write a book" suggestion, Lee Strobel has written twenty "apologetic" books, including the one that bears the name of his movie, The Case for Christ, and also his powerful A Case for Faith. We find a hint of greatness in this journey.

The topic of faith probably has never been timelier than it is right now as men are searching for something real to anchor their lives onto.

But for most of us, we do not need to investigate the resurrection of Jesus, as does Mr. Strobel, by interviewing medical doctors or psychologists. We

simply go where we can find the greatest evidence for faith. Once we arrive there and spend time in that place, we accept its truth without hesitation. A far greater writer and "journalist" even than Mr. Strobel says, "Faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen."

We do not have to travel the country at all to find these great truths. We take the little book we call the Bible – particularly those first four amazing books of the New Testament – and we read the gripping account of a risen Savior, accepting the truth of those accounts through faith.

No, we do not accept them blindly but, rather, because there is overwhelming evidence that those accounts are true. Four men – evangelists – tell the

story of a risen Savior in beautiful harmonizing detail, and we find the evidence is not only compelling but also convicting.

The world, I think, largely has missed the true meaning of this thing we call faith: Faith, you see, does not mean that we cannot know. It simply means that we cannot see.

Faith, you see, is not the guessing, the assumption, the theory, the possibility of things not seen. Faith is the "evidence of things not seen." Faith is evidence!

So, today, we – along with all the Strobels of the world – take our place firmly and confidently in that one arena in this world that makes logical and spiritual sense. We call that arena "faith." coachbowen1984@gmail.com

# ‘The Chickasaw Nation is strong because the people are strong’

During his annual State of the Nation address, Chickasaw Nation Governor Bill Anoatubby said that advances in economic development, cultural preservation and community services have enhanced the lives of the Chickasaw people.

“The Chickasaw Nation is strong, because the Chickasaw people are strong,” said Gov. Anoatubby. “Chickasaw people are achieving new levels of personal success that allows them to have a positive impact on the lives of others. We believe it is vital to lift up our fellow Chickasaws and our neighbors.”

Gov. Anoatubby delivered the address October 5, to a standing-room-only crowd in Fletcher auditorium on the Murray State College campus. In 2019, Chickasaw Nation businesses achieved record revenues and profits. This fiscal year, net profits from core business operations have increased by 15 percent, while net assets grew by 11 percent.

“Our commitment to financial stability, accountability and responsible stewardship makes our nation strong,” said Governor Anoatubby. “As our businesses have prospered, we have also been able to invest in new opportunities and diversify our portfolio.”

Chickasaw Nation Industries, (CNI) a federally-chartered corporation established in 1996 for \$50,000 now has revenues of more than \$350 million annually.

“CNI is on track to reach another record for revenue this fiscal year, and even conservative estimates indicate that since 2015, CNI has grown 75 percent,” said Gov. Anoatubby. “Part of that growth is Filtra-Systems and their SCOUT mobile filtration system, which has the potential to revolutionize the oil and gas industry, and its voyager community water treatment system which will solve challenges of rural communities throughout the United States.”

This cost efficient, environmentally friendly system is expanding into new markets and reduces the demand on streams and aquifers. The CNI manufacturing plant in Marietta has operated at record levels to keep up with the demand for its products.

The Chickasaw Nation purchased the facility in 2004, when previous owner Siemens

announced it would close the 100,000 square foot metal fabricating plant. Keeping the facility open saved dozens of local jobs, and employment has increased since.

“We work to ensure business diversification and economic development includes a focus on local communities,” said Gov. Anoatubby. “We have worked hard to be good neighbors. We continue to partner with communities to provide vital resources and infrastructure that benefit all Oklahomans.

“In the modern world, perhaps the most important infrastructure resource is fast, reliable internet. Trace Fiber Networks is bridging the technology gap affecting small towns and rural communities within Chickasaw Country by building a reliable fiber-optic network.”

To date, Chickasaw Nation owned Trace Fiber Networks has installed nearly 180 miles of buried fiber-optic cable. Once completed, the nearly 500-mile fiber-optic network will connect over 40 communities and schools. This network will provide unsurpassed speed and connectivity to offices, schools, hospitals, clinics, libraries and homes, as well as more than 100 Chickasaw Nation-owned businesses.

“Our commitment to build community and partnerships with our neighbors makes our nation strong,” said Gov. Anoatubby. “We have worked hard to be good neighbors. Our roads program continues to partner with local governments to improve local streets, highways, county roads and bridges.”

This year alone, the Chickasaw Nation committed more than \$6 million to joint projects to resurface or construct 22 miles of roadway.

Since it was re-established 15 years ago, the Chickasaw Lighthouse Police Department has worked closely with local, state and federal agencies. To date, the Lighthouse Police has 48 cross deputation agreements with city, county, state and federal law enforcement agencies, allowing them to work together to protect and serve our communities.

Recently, the Chickasaw Nation WIC program launched a mobile unit to travel to remote rural sites, making WIC services accessible to residents in

those areas.

Growth in business revenues benefits education services in several areas, including increases in the amount of scholarships and text book grants.

“This past year, we invested more than \$25 million in scholarships, grants and other forms of financial support to more than 5,400 Chickasaw students.”

The tribe increased the amount of scholarships for tuition, the number of credit hours funded per semester and the amount of the text book grant. This fall, a higher education grant was introduced to help with tuition and enrollment fees.

This past year, the Chickasaw Honor Club awarded incentives to more than 2,700 Chickasaw students and distributed nearly 6,700 awards to encourage excellent academic performance.

Training has begun on the Chickasaw Heritage Series Curriculum, which brings Chickasaw history into the classroom.

“The curriculum was developed cooperatively with state educators to meet state academic standards and to share the story of who we are with the next generation of Oklahomans,” said Gov. Anoatubby. “This will be the first time that many Oklahoma students will learn about the influential role the Chickasaw Nation played in U.S. and world history.”

Health care has long been a high priority for the Chickasaw Nation, which operates a hospital, four clinics, eight pharmacies, a diabetes care center, emergency medical services, four nutrition centers, eight WIC offices and five wellness centers.

This year alone, the tribe served more than 970,000 patient encounters, delivered more than 785 babies, filled more than 1.9 million prescriptions, served more than 88,000 meals to children, saw more than 154,000 visits to its wellness centers, served more than 5,300 Chickasaws with eyeglass assistance and served more than 7,000 citizens with financial assistance to help with medical and dental costs.

Through a partnership with Oklahoma State University, the Chickasaw Nation Family Medicine Residency Program Clinic opened on the third floor of the medical center this year.

“The Family Residency

Program has both economic and social benefits for our community,” said Gov. Anoatubby. “Graduates of medical residency programs tend to settle and establish a practice or become an active provider where they have trained.

Revitalizing Chickasaw culture and language is also a high priority. Therefore, the Chickasaw Nation takes a comprehensive approach, which includes the Chickasaw Press, fitness applications, online language lessons, stomp dance and traditional games.

Dozens of young Chickasaws are learning stomp dances through the Chickasaw Young Dancers program. This year, a Chickasaw Nation women’s stickball team was formed and

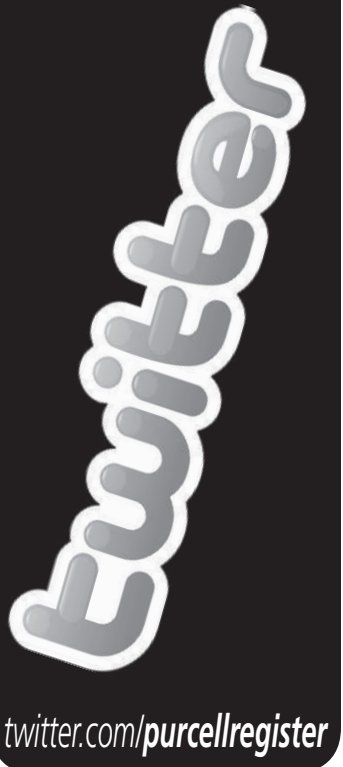
has about 50 members.

Rosetta Stone Chickasaw level 3 was released this year. This new installment of 40 immersive lessons builds on the previous two levels, and bringing language learners one step closer to fluency.

Since opening in 2010, the Chickasaw Cultural Center has shared Chickasaw culture with more than 820,000 visitors from around the world. The center has also won 13 awards this past fiscal year, including two conservation awards for our monarch butterfly repopulation initiative.

“Our nation is strong because we know who we are and continue to keep our culture, language and traditions alive,” said Gov. Anoatubby.

# Plan ahead for amaryllis blooms all winter long

Let amaryllis fill your home with flowers for the holidays and keep the blossoms coming all winter long.

When you plant several different types of amaryllis bulbs, from both the southern and northern hemisphere, you can be sure to get a long-lasting, colorful show that will brighten your mood and surroundings throughout the winter months.

Plan a winter filled with amaryllis blossoms by referring to Longfield Gardens' article, longfield-gardens.com/article/When-Will-Your-Amaryllis-Bloom, for insight on when different amaryllis varieties will bloom.

Start your indoor flower display with an early bloomer such as Evergreen, which is always quick to break out of dormancy. Its flowers have narrow, lime/chartreuse petals on 20-inch plants. Enjoy the

impressive display as each bulb produces two stems with four to six blooms.

Minerva's extra-large, cherry-red flowers have a white star in the middle and an apple green throat. They are eye-catching from afar and spectacular up close. Apple Blossom is a long-time favorite with snow-white petals brushed with pink and a lime green throat. Or grow a double amaryllis such as Double King with layers of burgundy-red petals and up to a dozen flowers.

Enjoy some of the more unusual amaryllis colors and flower styles by planting varieties such as Naranja, with its tropical red-orange blossoms or Sweet Nymph, a romantic double amaryllis with stunning, coral-pink petals.

Add elegance to your indoor garden with Picotee. Its 8" flowers are white with a thin red line around each petal.

As winter turns to early spring, celebrate with an explosion of indoor blooms from Red Pearl, Spartacus and other proven performers.

The velvety, burgundy-red flowers of Red Pearl have a deep maroon throat that sets off the glittering gold stamens. Spartacus turns heads with its crimson petals and bold white stripes.

Display your amaryllis on a mantle, kitchen counter or entryway table where you can watch the amazing show as the first sprout appears, followed by buds and the spectacular trumpet-shaped blooms.

Amaryllis are also beautiful, long-lasting cut flowers.

For best selection, order your bulbs early and store them in a cool, dry, dark place until you are ready to plant. Once you pot up the bulbs and place them in a warm, bright location, flower buds should appear in about six to 10 weeks.

Protect yourself from the winter blahs by investing in amaryllis. You can count on their big flowers and bright colors to lift your spirits and ease your way to spring.

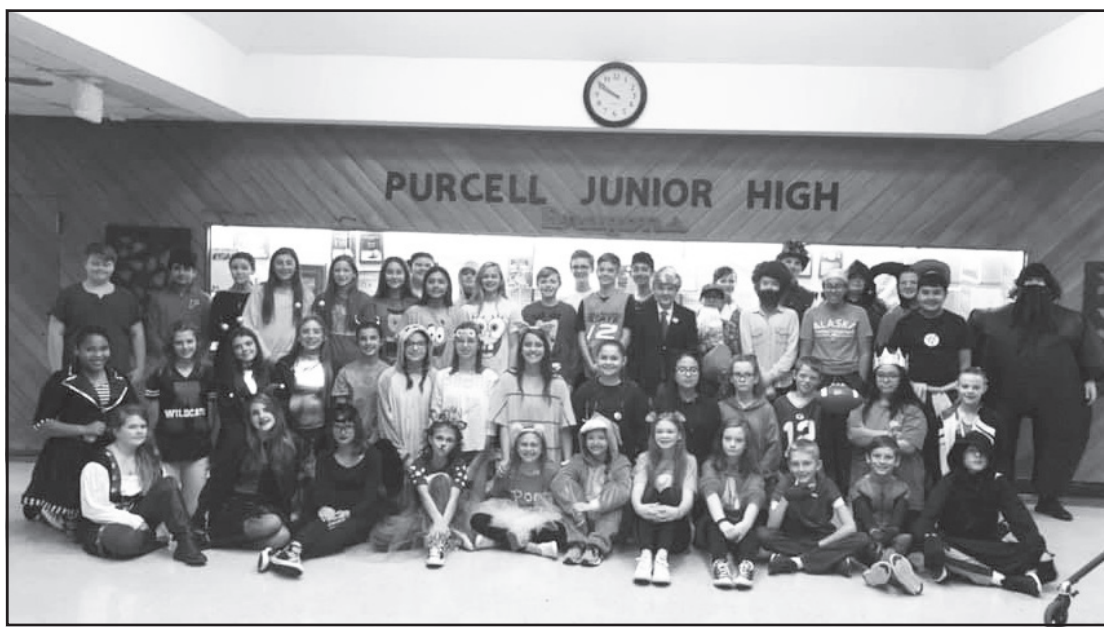
