First of all, it needs only a simple majority - 50 percent plus one vote - to pass. In comparison, school bonds fail if they
don't get at least 60 percent of the votes. Wilson Lyles, county commissioner chairman, said Tuesday the $\$ 23.75$ million bond issue is under five mills. For every $\$ 100,000$ of assessed value,

The nation will observe Veterans Day on Monday with speeches and laying of wreaths in cemeteries across the country
Perhaps the most poignant cer emony, though, will take place at
the Tomb of the Unknowns in Arlington National Cemetery outside Washington, D.C.
According to the cemetery's web site, the iconic memorial overlooks the nation's capital.

The first unknown - and the gen esis of the Veterans Day observance

- was from the "war to end all wars as World War I was called.

"Shehas become an invaluable member of the team and a true public servant.
Ronie recently received a certificate for her 15 years service at DHS.
She has her own unique way to describe her tenure, saying she started in an era of filing cabinets and paper records, worked through the years of rolling file storage and now all is accessible on the computer.
"With a few keystrokes, we can help people statewide," she said.
She attended Dibble schools and landed her first job while still in high school It was working for a company called High Test, which manufactured starter drives.

After high school, she worked for ABLE, a nonprofit in Norman offering support to adults with developmental disabilities
Ronie handled clerical and payroll duties.
The day came when "it was time for a change.'
Ronie looked at job openings with the state and took a job working with DHS' Developmental Disabilities Services office in Grady County.
She stayed there six or seven months before transferring to the McClain County office as an administrative technician.
The job description may focus on clerical responsibility, but Ronie says that is superseded by helping people. To that end, she greets all who walk through the door, assesses their situation and then either directs them to a kiosk where they can apply for services ordirects themto resources within and outside the DHS.

## News from Capitol hill

## A flawed impeachment process

Congressman Tom Cole

The last several weeks have been eventful in terms of one particular topic and that particular topic, and that is House Democrats and Speaker Nancy Pelosi's unprecedent pursuit of impeachment Especially on something as consequential as impeaching the President of the United States, it is a disservice to the American people for one political party to dictate the terms of the process, as Democrats have done since day one.

To fully understand the current state of impeachment proceedings, it is important o review the turn of events that have taken place since the midterm elections shifted majority control of the House to Democrats.
When lawmakers on both sides of the aisle were sworn into the current Congress, they were also launched into an era of divided government. As
have said on numerous occasions, it is in eras of divided government that bipartisanship most critical.
Unfortunately, instead of finding ways to work together on meaningful legislation for the American people, House Democrats have focused their efforts on nonstarter messaging bills and politically motivated investigations into the Trump Administration.
Until earlier this fall, most of the Democratic-led investigations were conducted by he House Judiciary Committee and focused on Russian interference in the 2016 election. Such investigations by Judiciary Democrats persisted despite the thorough findings of the Mueller Report that confirmed there was no collusion between Russia and President Trump's campaign, nor was justify indictment for obstruc justify indictment for obstruc on of justice.

Though some embarrassing information may have been revealed, no impeachable offenses could be found. All the while, despite the activity in
the Judiciary Committee and the Judiciary Committee and insistence by Chairman Nadler, an impeachment inquiry was not actually underway
It was not until late September - amid reports about a whistleblower complainton an entirely different matter related to Ukraine and U.S. military aid - that Speaker Pelosi then declared an impeachment inquiry was underway in the House.
Months prior to her an nouncement, Speaker Pelos insisted, "I'm not for impeach ment without bipartisan sup port." Needless to say, bipartisan support does not exist for the impeachment proceedings currently taking place in the

Use the following guidelines Here are some guidelines to for storing your spices and im you determine when it's herbs to maintain maximum tome to toss your spices and herbs.

- As a general rule, keep: herbs or ground spices for one year and whole spices for two years.
- Buy a smaller container until you determine how fast you'll use a particular spice or herb.
- If a spice or herb smells strong and flavorful, it's probably still potent.

Reducing losses when feeding hay to beef cattle

Feeding hay to cattle is expensive. Recent analyses show that hay costs between $\$ 0.02$ and $\$ 0.07$ per pound of dry mat ter, usually more than double the cost for the same amount of nutrients from pasture. Hay

- It requires a large invest ment in equipment;
- It requires labor to make and feed;
- More than 50 percent of it can be wasted by either poor storage methods or imprope feeding practices, or both.
Feeding methods
No matter how hay is packaged, if you waste it, you lose ules that can help minimize waste during feeding.
- Feed hay in small amounts or in a feeder to minimize waste. When fed a limited amount of hay at a time, cattle have less the hay. Feeding hay in a rack the hay. Feeding hay in a rack or a hay ring also limits the opportunity that animals have to trample or soil hay and will youce waste substantially is you intend to provide more than a day
one time.
- Fee
- Feed hay in well-drained areas. If you intend to feed win in a single location all winter, then providing a footing
concrete can help minimize problems with mud. Perhaps more cost effective is to move hay-feeding areas around the farm to minimize the damage - Feed hay stored outsid before hay stored inside. Hay stored outside usually has more spoilage during storage and lower palatability than hay stored inside.
Cattle will waste a greate percentage of poor-quality hay than they will of good-quality hay. Animals fed high-quality hay early in the season will often refuse poor-quality hay when it is offered later.
Big packages
Large bale systems are denot waste. It is important to remember that outside storage of large bales will increase hay losses due to weather-related spoilage. Spoiled, rotted, or moldy hay is often refused by all but the hungriest of cattle and will result in more waste during feeding.
Large round bales
The simplest system for feeding large round bales is to set the bale in the pasture or feeding free access to hay. This syste does not require the purch of any extra equipment for feeding, but it is prone to high feeding losses
Losses are greatest when
several-day supply of hay is fed at one time. Feeding one-day supply of hay each day minimizes waste but increases
When feeding large roun bales without a ring or rack, a good way to estimate how many bales to have available each day is to figure one cow per foot of outside diameter of the bale. Even then, feeding losses can be excessive A better system for feeding large round bales is to set the bale in the pasture or feeding area but limit access to the hay with a rack or hay ring. This system requires an initial investment in hay racks or rings, but feeding losses are low, eve if a seven-day supply of hay is left at one time.
Feeding hay in racks or rings s crucial for producers who do not or cannot feed hay to their cattle on a daily basis.
When hay rings are used, you need to consider the space available around the feeder. Most hay rings have enough space for approximately 10

Small packages
Feeding small hay bales is labor intensive but reduces waste if fed properly. Small hay bales racks ed intact, in bunks or field. Since you usually have greater control over the amoun of hay available to the cattle hese bales often have low trampling and soiling losses. No matter what size hay package or feeding style you use, some hay will be lost management minimizee the losses. Since hay is sose the most expensive feed of on beef opensive feed used sense to operations, it makes low as possible keep waste as managemsible through good management practices.

The body arrived in Washngton on November 9, 192 and 90,000 paid their respects as it lay in state at the Capitol Rotunda for two days.

The first night, he picked up the phone and called someone. He said "My younger brother is here on a visit. Can we come over for dinner at your house onight?" I knew then that I would like to be a priest.
Jesus invited himself to dinner at the home of Zaccheu (Luke 19:1-10). He wanted to know this man personally. He wanted to love him personally. There are two primary ways he Word of God. One is the literal sense, by listening to and praying with the actual words in Scripture.

In a spiritual sense, this encounter is like our own life of faith. We first have to acknowledge our own desire to see Jesus, to know him, and to love him. That is the first step. But the crowd gets in our way. We can get caught up in he crowd.
We are caught up in the crowd when we become cynical, when we are a bully o others. We are caught up in the crowd when we follow he latest trend or fashion en we just go along with we just go along with g it". But Jesus is not in

We also might have to go out on a limb to see Jesus. We might have to take a leap of faith. As the Bible says, faith is believing in things that are hoped for. It is evidence in things not seen. (Heb 11:1) When we commit ourselves to something that is above and beyond the crowd, then we are taking a leap of faith.
We commit to our family, our marriage, our vocation, our faith - these are things that are beyond the crowd. But it is risky, because we often feel alone. We feel like we are out on a limb. But such is a necessary step in our life of faith. Finally, Jesus turns his gaze towards us and invites himself into our home. We know then an intimacy with Jesus. He comes into our home where he sees all the clutter in our lives. He sees the good and the bad, the holy and the sinful. But his is where he wants to be. He wants to be here because he sees our desire and he knows
