phetamine was packaged in gallon size bags.

Ismael Avila, 37, and Felipe Zamora-Guardiola, 34, are charged in McClain County District Court with aggravated trafficking in illegal drugs.

They are being held on \$200,000 bond each. Preliminary hearing conferences for both defendants will be at 9 a.m. March 7.

According to court documents, they were southbound on Interstate 35 in a Volvo

belonging to Zamora-Guardiola when a task force officer stopped them for speeding near mile marker 88.

A dog handler with the task force worked his dog around the vehicle. When the dog



indicated the presence of narcotics, the first officer obtained the men's permission to search the Volvo.

to the affidavit, a hidden compartment was found under the carpet from beneath the front passenger seat to the back seat.

The compartment was locked with an electronic trunk latch. With no code available to unlock the latch, an officer cut wires and forced the latch open.

McCurdy left the council August 8, with a sudden resignation after the city council on a 3-2 vote





R319. 1 Address Numbers. Buildings shall have approved address numbers, building numbers or approved building identification placed in a position that is plainly legible and visible from the street or road fronting property.

These numbers shall contrast with their background. Address numbers shall be Arabic numbers or alphabetical letters.

Numbers shall be a minimum of 4 inches (102 mm) high with a minimum stroke width of $\frac{1}{2}$ inch (12.7 mm).

Where access is by means of a private road and the building address cannot be viewed from the public way, a monument, pole or other sign or means shall be used to identify the structure.



Taking politics out of politics

The Oklahoma Academy has a pretty good idea. And since Tuesday is an election day, it's a good time to take note.

Participants in the most recent Oklahoma Academy Town Hall, Oklahomans who represent all corners of the state and all walks of life, tackled the voting process and attempted to identify what would make it better. The group consisted of 260 men and 201 women; 216 Republicans, 204 Democrats and 40 independents and Libertarians. Ninety-five percent of them voted in the 2016 presidential election. That group held 24 listening sessions and were asked to list the top three barriers and solutions regarding the election process, voter access, and voter engagement.

If it's possible to summarize civics education in public what the group concluded, it schools, a central location for might be that Oklahoma should take some of the politics out of politics.

To simplify the election process the Academy recommended open primaries, a nonpartisan group to review the wording of state questions, and automatic voter registrations with a driver's license or state ID, as well as the ability to register online.

Voter access could be improved, the group said, with more early voting sites, online voting or mail-in voting without notarization, and free public transportation on election days.

Thirdly, the Academy said voter engagement would be improved by requiring K-12

unbiased information, and open primaries.

Note that open primaries – more specifically, the Academy is calling for a nonpartisan blanket primary – came up as a solution in two categories, voter engagement and a simplified election process. Under that system, candidates from all parties would appear on a single ballot with the top two vote-getters moving on to the general election. That system tends to reduce partisanship among voters, reduce the number of elections voters are asked to participate in, and open the

Rep. William Fourkiller found a great use for that extra hour too. Beginning drivers, those safety-conscious teenagers bearing learner's permits, are only allowed to drive between 5 a.m. and 10 p.m. Since no teenagers are up at 5 a.m. and it will still be daylight at 10 p.m. during the summer, those newly minted drivers won't have the challenges presented by driving in the dark. All the more reason, then, to let those teenagers get started even younger. Fourkiller's bill, HB 2616, would lower the age to enroll in driving school to 14 and the age for a learner's permit to 14-and-a-half. why didn't the director (James Foley) bother to get better takes her lines?





The addition of approved levels of ionophores such as monensin (Rumensin®) or lasalocid (Bovatec®) to the ration will improve the average daily gain and enhance onset of puberty. Replacement heifers need to be fed separately from the rest of the herd. Because of their size and age, as well as higher nutritional demands, they simply cannot compete with the rest of the cowherd, nor can they be expected to efficiently utilize poorer quality forages and still breed as yearlings. If there are wide ranges between the smaller and larger heifers, they should be divided into two feeding groups to reach their desired weight by breeding time. The heifers should be bred for 45-60 days, starting three to four weeks before breeding the cows. All heifers should be pregnancy checked about 60 days after the breeding season. Any heifer not bred should be culled. This is the easiest breeding season she will face in her lifetime. High percentages of the open heifers after the first breeding season are sub-fertile and will be slow to rebreed much of their productive lives. Age, weight, breed, and adverse environmental stresses such as temperature and parasitism affect when heifers first begin cycling. Of these factors, weight is the one that most producers can readily influence.







"His word is in my heart like a fire," he says, no doubt through gritted teeth, "a fire shut up in my bones, and I was weary with holding it in; indeed, I cannot!" (Jeremiah 20:9).

That's what I admire about Jeremiah! He has a burning desire to spread the Master's word. And even though he tries to shut it out, he cannot. It is in his bones; and when it's down that deep, it won't come out!

Be sure to keep that fire burning this week, good friends! Perhaps, the Lord willing, we can help you in that task again next week...here on the "front porch." God bless!





Last week we had information on the Oklahoma Quarter Horse Association's annual convention and Hall of Fame inductions. Purcell-Wayne horseman Luke Castle was profiled for his Hall of Fame induction. Following is the biography for one of Purcell's equine royalty, Miss Olene, owned and raced by A.B. Green.

Miss Olene 1957 Black Mare (Leo X **Barbara L By Patriotic**) 2018 Oklahoma Quarter Horse Hall of Fame Inductee

a producer of American Quarter Horse racing royalty.

Bred and raced by A.B. and Kathalyn Green, owners of the Green Pastures Stud Farm in Purcell, Miss Olene was by Leo, and her dam was the Patriotic (TB) mare Barbara L. Both are members of the American Quarter Horse Hall of Fame and the Oklahoma Quarter Horse Hall of Fame. A.B. Green named the mare for his wife's best friend, Olene Cobb.

Miss Olene was a winner on the Quarter Horse tracks, where she earned \$31,022 while compiling a record of 11-3-3 in 33 starts. However, the mare is remembered most for the biggest race she didn't win, the first running of the All summer, Miss Olene finished on Labor Day, 1959.

went to post as the favorite in the 11th race at Ruidoso Downs on Labor Day 1959.

With Richard Lujan in the irons for trainer Jerry Fisher, Miss Olene took the early lead out of the gate, while Tonta Lass broke so hard she lost her rider. But Miss Olene could not maintain the pace and faded to finish third in what would become Quarter Horse Racing's signature event.

Coast Quarter Horse Racing Association Futurity in California that followed, Miss Olene won the Bardella Handicap at Los Alamitos.

Owned for a time by Vernon Miss Olene was a product and Pool and Henry Hurd, both of track-record-setting champion Oklahoma, the mare later went Jess Louisiana Blue, who has

third in the Ruidoso Futurity and to New Mexico, where Sarah Henderson and Harriett Peckham made her a mainstay at the Buena Suerte Ranch at Roswell. It was her ability, as a broodmare that made Miss Olene a Hall of Famer. Miss Olene produced Little Blue Sheep's full sisters Miss Angel Eyes, who won the Kansas Futurity and was third in Hall of Famer Rocket Wrangler's Rainbow Futurity, and went on to produce one stakes winner and three other winners from five starters; and Takeme Freely, who won the Debutante Handicap and was third in Game Plan's Bay Meadows Futurity, and produced three starters, all winners. Miss Olene was also the dam of the Rillito Derby winner Master's Angel by Master Hand (TB), who produced six winners from seven starters.

Miss Olene also produced the stakes-placed Bar Tonto mare Prissy Olene and Little Bar Olene, a Three Bars (TB) filly who was second in the 1965 Rainbow Futurity and earned points at halter to become an AQHA Champion. And one of her unraced foals went on to produce a black-type performer, Teenie Weenie, becoming the dam of the stakes-winning Cashcan (\$114,012).

Miss Olene was inducted into the American Quarter Horse Hall of Fame in 2013. Tonight Miss Olene continues her royal ways by being inducted into the Oklahoma Quarter Horse Hall

Dale K. Graham Veterans Foundation Veteran of the Week is Ray Tolle Jr. of Oklahoma City who served during the Korean Kid's Choir and Bible War in the United States Navy. We appreciate Mr. Tolle for his

VA benefits when the veteran is deceased. Nothing is going to happen unless the spouse files a VA Form 21-534EZ requesting either DIC or Pension benefits. The DIC may be payable if the veteran was rated 100 percent disabled for 10 years or their cause of death was a service-connected disability or one that was presumptive to military service. The service-connected disability must be listed on the death certificate as the primary or contributing cause of death.

One of the suggestions we have for surviving spouses where the veteran's serviceconnected disability was not listed on the death certificate is to have the death certificate amended to list those conditions. Most times the attending physician does not know about the veteran's serviceconnected disabilities and will list only a main cause of death.

Spousal Pension benefits are based on when the veteran served and the income and assets of a surviving spouse. To understand what may be available, I always urge surviving spouses to come in and visit with our volunteers.

As the Accredited VAAgent, I receive copies of the award letters sent to those we are helping with their VA claims and questions. Last week there were seven veterans who received a rating of 100 percent. These folks will receive \$271,868 on an annual basis. There were 19 folks who were rated at 10-90 percent. These folks will receive \$272,066 on an annual basis.

I'm very proud of everyone who has dedicated their time to help us make a difference in the lives of all veterans and their spouses. Two of those volunteers are our drivers who spent 74 hours transporting 21 folks 1,150 miles. We appreciate Clayton and Louie!

Another volunteer shared a Winston Churchill quote with me. It certainly echoes we at our Foundation feel. Churchill said, "We make a living by what we get, but we make a life by what we give."
