

Fieldhouse bids due today

Jason Midkiff: Construction should start in early June

The Purcell Public Schools is on target to begin fieldhouse construction at the high school early next month.

Superintendent Jason Midkiff told the school board that will kick off nearly two years of projects that will include a new junior high school.

The first bid opening will be today (Thursday) at 2 p.m.

"I know there will always be challenges that will come up, but I am looking forward to seeing these projects finished and benefitting our students and teachers."

The board was in an ap-

pointing mood Monday evening.

Kim Croslin will represent the Purcell school board in negotiations with Purcell Association of Classroom Teachers for the 2018-19 school year.

Croslin, the board's president, was appointed during Monday's monthly meeting of the board.

In turn, she will name an administrator and up to four other individuals to assist her.

The board also appointed Midkiff to sign all paperwork

Chris Reynolds to take over for retiring A.J. Brewer

A veteran educator and administrator will start work July 1 as Washington Public Schools superintendent.

Chris Reynolds will replace longtime superintendent A.J. Brewer who is resigning June 30 at the end of his contract.

Reynolds' selection as incoming superintendent was unanimous at a special meeting May 7 of Washington's

Board of Education.

"What we heard in surveys of educators and the community was that our district needed a superintendent who could build on the traditions of excellence at Washington and continue to move our school forward with a focus on best classroom teaching practices and technologies," said board president Greg Tontz.

Reynolds is presently the executive director of secondary instruction with Midwest City-Del City Public Schools.

"I am thrilled and honored to have been chosen as the new superintendent for Washington Public Schools and look forward to working collaboratively with the school board, staff, parents and community," Reynolds said.

Failure to quash

Glasgow firearms case to continue

A former Purcell police officer's attempt to have a firearms charge against him thrown out on grounds of insufficient evidence failed May 9 in McClain County District Court.

Sales tax revenue way up in 2 towns

The people payeth and the state giveth some back.

That's the way sales tax works. And for two McClain County towns, the giveth back part was especially good this month.

Byars received a sales tax disbursement of \$15,383.02 - more than 514 percent above sales tax monies received from the state a year ago.

Typically, monthly sales tax disbursements to the town are

in the low four figures.

Town clerk Sandy Gaches believes the increase can be attributed to a local business, Cail Construction.

"He ordered a lot of material," she said. "I bet that is why."

Gaches is trying to get the Oklahoma Tax Commission to provide a report that lists sales tax revenue collected from each business in town.

Until then, she's hoping Cail Construction, which builds metal buildings, stays in business and

business continues to be good.

Byars sales tax is 4 percent.

A smaller sales tax boon this month was in Wayne, which has a 3.5 percent sales tax.

The tax commission disbursed \$36,761.45 in May. That was slightly more than 272 percent better than the \$13,506.07 received a year ago.

Jamie Cody became town clerk in December. She hasn't received an explanation for the increase, but said there is a new wrecker business in town.

Swimming Pools
Permits are required prior to installation of swimming pools. There is a \$19.50 fee for above-ground and \$29.50 fee for in-ground. No permit is required for children's blow-up pools. An outdoor swimming pool, including an in-ground, above-ground or on-ground pool, hot tub or spa, shall be surrounded by a barrier (fence) at which shall be at least 48 inches high. According to the Center for Disease Control and Prevention, in 2009 children one to four years old have the highest drowning rates. Among children one to four years old who died from an unintentional injury, more than 30 percent died from drowning. Among children one to four years old, most drownings occurred in home swimming pools. One factor that influences drowning risk is lack of barriers, such as fencing, which prevent children from gaining access to the pool area without a caregiver's awareness. A four-sided isolation fence, separating the pool area from the house and yard, reduces a child's risk of drowning by 83 percent, compared to a three-sided property-line fencing. The Oklahoma Tax Commission has returned \$157,087,540 in sales taxes to cities and towns this month. That is an increase of \$10,923,814 from a year ago.


Municipalities also shared in a use tax disbursement totaling \$16,126,899.



Collision claims 1

Lex motorcyclist killed Sunday

A Lexington man riding a motorcycle near Tuttle died at the scene after colliding head-on with a semi Sunday morning.

Killed was Forrest A. Smith, 23. He sustained massive internal injuries, according to Oklahoma Highway Patrol Trooper Zachary Wright.

Smith's body was taken to the State Medical Examiner's office in Oklahoma City.

Wright reported Smith was riding a 1983 Kawasaki motorcycle southbound on State Highway 4 southeast of Tuttle.

For an unknown reason, the

motorcycle crossed the center line and into the path of a northbound 2014 Freightliner driven by William C. Campbell Jr., 56, of Dallas, Texas.

Campbell wasn't injured. The crash occurred around 10:11 a.m.

Smith wasn't wearing a helmet, the trooper reported.

Time to seize an opportunity

The U.S. Supreme Court's ruling that a ban on sports betting is unconstitutional opens a lot of doors for the states that choose to walk through them.

New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Mississippi and West Virginia have already passed bills that could allow them to begin taking bets almost immediately. According to Eilers & Krejcik Gaming LLC, which tracks state gambling legislation, legalized sports betting outside of Nevada would be worth more than \$6 billion. They estimated that if all 50 states got on board, legal sports betting could be worth \$7.1 billion to \$15.8 billion.

That company envisions 14 states legalizing sports wagering within two years and 18 more states – Oklahoma among them – legalizing it within five years.

Oklahoma had an opportunity to clear that path this year with

Senate Bill 1195, which gave an OK to ball and dice games, or, more practically speaking, roulette and craps. Those popular table games will help tribal casinos significantly as they, like blackjack and poker, attract a different clientele than slot machines. Sports wagering brings in yet another group of gamblers, and while that means more prosperity for the tribes that successfully operate casinos, it also means more money for the state budget.

This is a case of the law catching up with practice. Online sportsbooks have been around since the advent of the internet, taking in wagers primarily on college and professional sports, but also on international soccer contests, cricket, politics and the Oscars. Those operations are based outside the U.S., but plenty of gamblers are willing to risk running afoul of the law in order to wager from their iPhones

and laptops.

Consider the already legal parimutuel wagering at Oklahoma's racetracks and off-track betting parlors and it's hard to argue that the state here has a moral objection to gambling on sports.

If Gov. Mary Fallin has to call the Legislature back into special session to consider rules for implementation of State Question 788, the medical marijuana issue, passes in June, lawmakers should seize the opportunity to allow sports wagering in Oklahoma. There is no moral high ground to take, and Oklahomans gambling on sports is inevitable. Pretending it's not going to happen is like believing March Madness brackets are just for bragging rights or that no bar in the state has a guy sitting on the next-to-last barstool who can get you odds on the Super Bowl.

Oklahoma should seize the opportunity quickly.

Hand-picked group to begin wielding powers over state agencies

A small group of unelected citizens, all appointed by Republican state leaders, will soon be exercising significant powers to decide how the state's top agencies spend their funding and which services they should provide.

Legislators and Gov. Mary Fallin added \$2 million to the state budget this year to pay for state agency audits to be conducted by a private firm and overseen by a commission of Oklahoma business leaders.

Conservative lawmakers say this private-sector approach will uncover waste, fraud and unnecessary spending that goes beyond agencies' legislative or constitutional directives.

But the new funding has drawn critics from both Republicans and Democrats, who say the audits are expensive and are likely to reveal little beyond agencies' need for more money to carry out their core missions.

A larger concern, they argue, is that the state is potentially politicizing the audits and giving a group of businessmen undue influence over how the state spends taxpayer dollars.

A Focus on Cost-Cutting

The task of overseeing the audits falls to the newly formed,

nine-member Agency Performance and Accountability Commission. The general concept of the group was spelled out in a bill approved by the Legislature and signed by Gov. Mary Fallin last year. Appointed by Fallin and GOP House and Senate leaders,



the commission is in the process of hiring a firm that will conduct the first round of performance audits.

Instead of just forwarding cost-saving recommendations to the audited agencies – the case with traditional audits – the law creating the commission says the agencies "shall implement the recommendations" unless otherwise directed by the Legislature.

That gives the group more powers than those of other private-led commissions that the Legislature created in the past. For example, the Incen-

tive Evaluation Commission, charged with making recommendations on many business tax breaks, only had an advisory role and could not instruct agencies on what to cut or keep.

Rep. David Perryman, D-Chickasha, said he believes this is an attempt by lawmakers to circumvent the Legislature and agency directors who control spending decisions, with the goal of cutting budgets and shrinking government.

"Theoretically, under Oklahoma law, when an agency head is hired, they're supposed to have expertise in wherever they are serving," Perryman said. "So we are basically taking away their ability to function in their own areas of expertise and, instead, having this group come in and dictate that something needs to be done a certain way."

Perryman said because just three Republicans – Fallin, Senate Pro Tempore Mike Schulz, R-Altus, and House Speaker Charles McCall, R-Atoka – had any say in selecting the members, he questions how objective and non-partisan the commission will be. The commission could "conceal" findings that might not coincide with the views of those

Edmond needs its e back

Imponderable: That which cannot be conclusively determined or explained, says the newsroom dictionary.

Chief among them is Kelley Avenue, which inexplicably loses its second e as soon as it crosses from Oklahoma City into Edmond at 33rd Street. This has troubled me for years. Where did the second e go? Is the street named after a different Kelly and they just happen to connect? That seems unlikely; it's more likely a sign maker goofed way back when and it was cheaper to keep the signs than to start over. There was an Edmond police chief named Kelly back in the day, but there's no record of the city honoring him with a street sign.

Perhaps the answer lies in the southern Kelley. There's enough documentation to work that one out. In 1900 George Kelley was in the streetcar business. On Aug. 4, 1900, the Guthrie Daily Leader reported, "The town council has granted a street car franchise to the Oklahoma City Land and Electric Railroad Company. The officers of the company are J.M. Lindsay, Gainsville, Texas, president; S.E. Laird, vice president; G.B. Stone, secretary; J.H. Everest, general attorney, and George C. Kelley, general manager. The company guarantees to have cars running in six months on six miles of track."

One hundred eighteen years later we're laying four miles of track and guaranteeing to have cars running in seven months, but it's a "modern" streetcar. No word on whether the Laird, Stone, and Everest mentioned were any relation to Michael, Renzi or Christy.

In 1916, the Oklahoma City Times reported that Kelley had returned to Alabama, but was in town and paying Mayor Overholser a visit. "George C. Kelley, capitalist of Birmingham, Ala., after several days of investigation, declared today that Oklahoma City is in a better commercial condition than any city in the United States," the Sept. 20 paper said. The story went on to say that Kelley developed the Oak Park addition on the east side and that Kelley Avenue was named for him.

That explains Oklahoma City's part of the bargain, but in that era, what is now Kelly Avenue in Edmond was called Western. An ad on the back page of the July 25, 1907 Edmond Sun that shows the street now called Kelly as Western touted the benefits of buying into the recently platted city. "More people have made Money, and more people have become wealthy by buying city lots, when first placed on the market, than any other way," the advertiser claimed. "Vacant lots have been the stepping stone to wealth for tens of thousands of people in Oklahoma and big fortunes are yet to be accumulated in the same manner." It might surprise no one to learn that the appeal of Edmond 111 years ago was education: "... thousands of people will seek homes here because of the excellent school, the healthful and delightful location," the ad said.

But as the two cities grew to abut, Edmond's Western Avenue was moved west so it aligned with its southern neighbor, leaving the street previously known as Western – the one that aligned with Kelley – nameless. Renaming it Kelley would have made some sense, but calling it Kelly, without the second e, was either a thumb of the nose at Oklahoma City or somebody's spelling error. The only other explanation is that there was a Kelly Edmond official wanted to honor so the extension of Kelley became Kelly.

That leaves one to ponder while driving along Kelley/Kelly; where did that other e go?

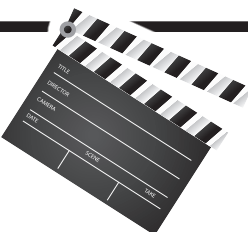
If you happen to have it, perhaps you'll consider giving it back.

There was a bit more excitement at the Moore Warren Theater than normal this weekend. This time the action wasn't just on the silver screen.

About 10 minutes before my Saturday screening of "Breaking In" was set to start, the projector suddenly shut down, emergency lights started flashing, and an automated voice came over the speakers informing everyone of a fire in the building and politely asked us to exit the theater.

As we all lazily left the auditorium we were greeted by a hallway filled with smoke, but thankfully there were no visible flames.

And though there was a fair amount of smoke around us, I soon learned this emergency wasn't the cause for too much concern.

Apparently the popcorn popper on the IMAX side of the theater had caught fire, sweating off the building's fire vlam.

As far as I could tell, no one was injured. Just a lot of smoke and everyone got the chance to stretch their legs in the main lobby for 10 minutes or so.

Soon we were given the all-clear by a Warren manager we all shuffled back to our respective theatres.

Luckily for those of us seeing "Breaking In," zero smoke had gotten in our auditorium, and we were able to watch our movie with only a scant 15 minute delay from its original showtime.

All in all as far as fires go, this one wasn't terribly inconvenient.

But enough about my excitement away from the screen, how were the movies themselves? Let's get to the reviews, shall we?



First up is "Life of the Party." When her husband suddenly dumps her, longtime housewife Deanna (Melissa McCarthy) decides to go back to college and complete her degree.

Going for the full college experience, Deanna joins her daughter Maddie's (Molly Gordon) university.

Much like my review for "I Feel Pretty," let me start out by saying I don't dislike Melissa McCarthy.

The opposite in fact. I think she's a great comedic actress.

I'm pretty sure I even heard some audible gasps during a couple of the film's not so shocking plot twists.

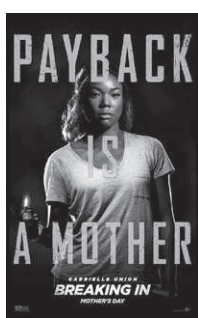
I guess if the trailer looks funny to you and you enjoy most of McCarthy's other work, you might have a good time here.

leaders, giving political cover to cut budgets or reduce services, he said.

State Auditor and Inspector Gary Jones, a Republican who is running for governor, said he's also concerned.

A request for proposal, which set out the scope of work for companies that wanted to bid, is proof that the audits won't be independent or meet the standards his office must meet, he said.

Instead of honestly evaluating whether an agency is performing correctly, needs more money or can cut costs, the document specifically requires the firm to identify cost-cutting moves.

Among other things, the request says the firm "will be expected to explore savings" by identifying areas where the level of service exceeds what is necessary, or by consolidating agencies and privatizing services.

Jones said it's improper for such a request to require the auditor to assume that costs need to be cut.

"You can't have pre-determined outcomes," he said.

Jones said his office was invited to bid on the audits or recommend who should do the audits. But he declined because he didn't believe the request for proposal would allow him to perform a truly independent audit.

"We didn't want any of our fingerprints on this," he said.

He said concerns over politicizing the process would have been moot had Fallin not vetoed a bill in 2013 to create the Joint Legislative Committee on Accountability.

Jones said his office would likely be able to perform the audit more cheaply than a private firm could. The state auditor's office does not make a profit, and would be better qualified than a company that may not even be located in Oklahoma, he said.

Republican leaders have defended the commission and expressed confidence in its members, who are volunteers.

At the commission's first meeting in December, McCall,

the Speaker, called the effort a "fresh look" and said taking a "very private-sector approach" can be more productive than a traditional government audit.

"The vision for this commission is not to just look at financial matters — those are currently reviewed," he said. "But this will look at the processes agencies use, the programs they are involved in and their structure and other various things."

Senate leader Schulz added, "There never can be too much oversight" when it comes to deciding how taxpayers' dollars are spent.

In a recent email to Oklahoma Watch, Schulz said, "It's not surprising that Capitol insiders would reject the infusion of common sense and business acumen (the commission) will undoubtedly bring. Legislators, agency directors and taxpayers should expect (the commission) to provide actionable ideas and best practices that will ensure more efficient delivery of government services and expenditure of taxpayer dollars."

Bob Sullivan, who heads the Tulsa-based oil and gas firm Sullivan and Company, is among those on the commission. He also said commission members will bring a fresh perspective. The language requiring agencies to follow the recommendations is necessary because it gives "teeth" to their work.

"It makes me feel better that we are going to be spending time on something that has some chance of being implemented here," he said.

Outlook for Audits

The company that wins the bid to do the audits will face tight deadlines. A preliminary report is due September 28, and a final one is due December 31.

Only a small number of agencies will get a look this year. The commission is to audit the 20 largest state agencies on a rotating basis, but the \$2 million in funding for fiscal year 2019 will only go so far.

The request for proposal, issued well before the 2019 budget was approved, says agencies that could be audited in the first year are the Oklahoma Tax Commission, Office of Management and Enterprise Services, the Department of Corrections, the Department of Public Safety, the District Attorneys Council and the Office of Juvenile Affairs.

The commission planned to meet May 9 to discuss its next steps and review proposals from five bidders. It also was expected to discuss when the Department of Education would be audited and how to pay for it.

But the meeting was called off when the group was told that its notice didn't comply with the state Open Meeting Act. Another meeting will be scheduled.

The commission is required to publish its final report and a follow-up online. The reports track whether agencies are following audit recommendations.

Reunion Sausage Casserole

12 oz. package egg noodles uncooked
1 pound ground beef
1 pound ground pork sausage
1 cup onion chopped
2 cups cheddar cheese shredded, divided
1 medium green pepper stemmed, seeded, and diced
14.5 oz. can corn drained
8 oz. can tomato sauce

1 (6 ounce) can tomato paste
1/3 cup pimento-stuffed green olives
1 clove garlic minced
1/2 tsp. salt

Preheat oven to 350°. Coat a 9 x13 baking dish with non-stick spray.

Bring 4 quarts water and 1 teaspoon salt to a boil in a large stock pot. Add egg noodles and cook according to package instructions, about 6 to 8 minutes. Drain well and set aside.

Meanwhile, in a large saucepan or Dutch oven over medium-high heat, cook beef, sausage, and onion until the meat is browned, about 5 to 7 minutes, breaking up any clumps with a wooden spoon. Drain well and return to the pot.

Stir in 1 cup cheese, bell pepper, corn, tomato sauce, tomato paste, olives, garlic, salt, and noodles. Pour into prepared baking dish and sprinkle with remaining 1 cup cheese.

Cover with foil and bake for 35 minutes. Remove foil, return to the oven, and bake an additional 10 minutes, or until cheese is light golden brown and bubbly. Let stand 5 minutes before serving.

Dale K. Graham Veteran's Foundation

Dale K. Graham Veteran's Foundation Veteran of the Week is Ralph Roll who served in the Korean War while serving in the United States Air Force. Mr. Roll lives in Clinton and we were proud to recognize him for his service to our country.

One of my favorite things that I get to do is to present a cap to our first time visitors who served in WWII and the Korean War. I have been told on many occasions that we are the first ones to ever recognize them for their service in either of those wars. The men and women who served have some stories to tell other veterans. Many of them have never filed a claim for VA benefits. One thing I tell all veterans is that it will be much easier to help their spouse receive VA benefits if they are receiving benefits themselves.

We recognized Oklahoma Electric Cooperative Operation Round-up for its recent gift. Our cost to provide services to veterans is averaging more than

\$30,000 each month. Our costs include transportation to VA appointments, medical testing, rent, utilities, food items along with countless other unforeseen expenses all of us have from time to time.

For those of you who do not participate in the OEC Round-Up billing program, please contact its office for more information. A few extra pennies go a long way toward helping many organizations in our area.

It looks like the warm weather is bringing veterans and surviving spouses from all over Oklahoma and surrounding states. Our local hotels and restaurants are certainly seeing an increase in the number of people coming to Norman for help with their VA claims and questions.

Maybe they could start offering some type of incentives such as discounted rooms and 10 percent off coupons for meals. As we continue to see an increased number of visitors, there will be many opportunities for our local businesses to see an increase too.

In 2017, we provided our services to more than 10,000 veterans and surviving spouses. We are on track to serve more than 14,000 this year. I don't know of any other place that can top what we do for the men and women who served in the American Military.

We are now accepting volunteer applications from caring individuals. We recently added another van to our fleet and need another driver to transport veterans to their VA appointments and our location. A safe driving record and a will to help others could be your key to join our other three full-time drivers. We also have other positions available. For more information, please visit with our Executive Director Lora Malone Tuesday or Thursday morning.

Last week I received the following rating decisions from the Department of Veterans Affairs. Six veterans received a 100 percent rating for their service-connected disabilities. These men and women will receive an annual combined amount of \$221,6617 per year. They will also be eligible for

other Oklahoma State benefits. Their spouses and dependents may be eligible for Champ VA medical insurance if they are not retired military.

We had 17 veterans who received a disability rating decision from 10-90 percent for their service-connected disabilities. This group of deserving veterans will receive \$265,392 per year. We received two \$30,795 decisions for DIC, Pension or Aid and Attendance for the surviving spouses of veterans. These surviving spouses will receive \$30,795 per year.

One of the benefits that I have not written about recently is the education benefit that is available for the spouse and dependents of veterans who receive a 100 percent permanent rating. This rating could be \$1,200 per month for spouse or dependents to continue their education.

There were veterans from

Texas, Arizona, Indiana, Kentucky, Arkansas and Kansas who visited us last week. Just proves that our volunteers can help people receive the VA benefits for which they are eligible while others have failed. I believe that most veterans could receive benefits if they provided evidence of a disability. That could be as simple as a claim for hearing loss and tinnitus that was caused by gunfire or exposure to other types of acoustic trauma in the military.

Another disability we are seeing a lot of veterans suffering from are depressive disorders caused by a service-connected disability. An example, a veteran who is service-connected for hearing loss and tinnitus then becomes depressed because they can't understand what people are saying or what is on television or radio. For many years, I have not been

able to understand children and some females when they are talking. The Department of Veterans Affairs has Disability Benefits Questionnaires for several types of mental conditions with Depressive Disorder and PTSD being the most common.

We have seen an increased number of veterans who are service connected for TBI (traumatic brain injury) caused by roadside bombs or IED (improvised explosive devices). Many of those who were knocked unconscious will have a cognitive disorder where they have difficulty concentrating and may have chronic headaches. We encourage the veterans we assist in seeking medical and mental treatment for all their disabilities.

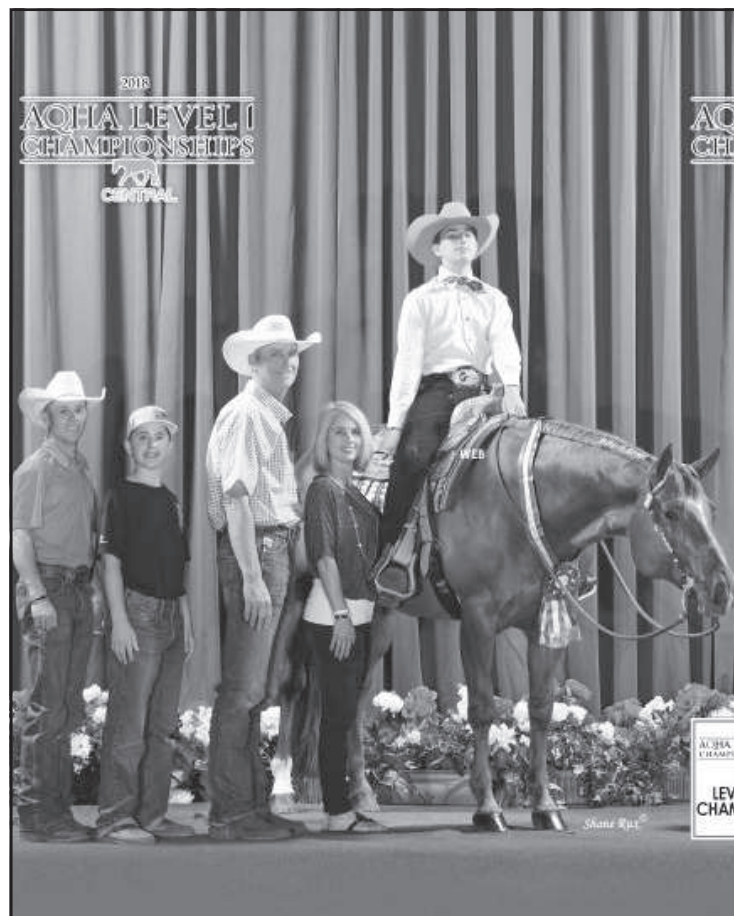

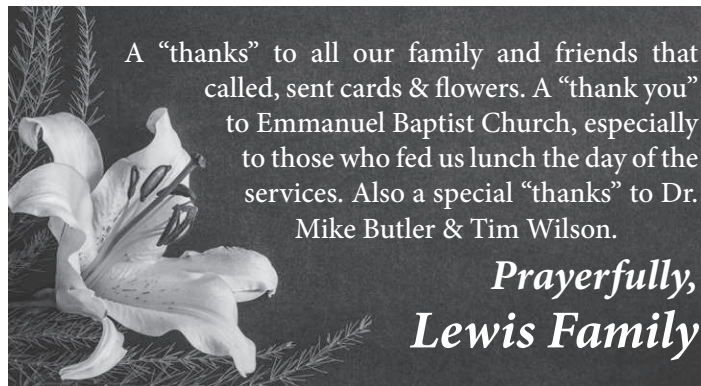

What to look for when kenneling your pets

When planning a summer vacation, many people take trips that include their furry, four-legged family members. However, there will be times when vacations may not be very pet friendly.

Long car trips or airplane rides can be stressful to your pet, said Dr. Elisabeth Giedt, director of Continuing Education, Extension and Community Engagement at the Center for Veterinary Health Sciences at Oklahoma State University.

"Even if your vacation destination includes staying with friends or family, they may not be able to accommodate your pet," Giedt said. "If this is the case, you'll need to find a reputable kennel where your pet can stay while you're gone. Kenneling your pet will allow your cat or dog to receive more attention and supervision than they would at home alone if you're using a house sitter. In addition, a well-run kennel is staffed by trained personnel who

will be able to spot any health problems should they arise."

Much like parents do with their infants when searching for a daycare, do your research for reputable kennels in your area. Get recommendations from your veterinarian, friends and family. It is a good idea to check out the facility in person before your planned trip to make sure you are comfortable with the staff and the accommodations.

Giedt suggests asking if you can bring your pet's own food, bedding and toys. Also, inquire about what veterinary services are available in the event of an emergency. Check for cleanliness of the kennel and the outdoor area where the pets will co-mingle. Make sure the facility is well ventilated.

"Double check the dates you'll need the kennel's services and inquire about drop off and pick up hours. For those leaving on a trip early in the morning, you may need to drop off your pet the day before. If you return late in the day from your vacation, you may not be able to pick

up your pet until the next day."

Something else for pet owners to keep in mind is possibly scheduling your pet for a short stay at the facility before boarding the animal for an extended period of time. This will help ensure any issues can be worked out before your longer trip.

Most kennels will require pet owners to have their pets up to date on vaccinations and may ask for documentation. Your veterinarian can provide this information. Plan to bring any medications your pet may be taking, along with detailed instructions on how it is to be administered. Be sure to bring an extra day or two of medications in the event your trip is delayed. In addition, make sure your pet has proper tag identification. You may want to consider having your pet microchipped.

"Going on vacation is a fun and relaxing way for families to spend time together. Knowing your pet is being well taken care of will help ensure you can enjoy your vacation to the fullest," Giedt said.

Equine Herpes

The State of Oklahoma is home to countless horse owners and many large national equine events. Due to the potentially serious consequences, news of an Equine Herpes Myeloencephalopathy incident has generated questions, particularly in the barrel racing industry.

Authorities have been notified that a horse from Texas has tested positive for Equine Herpes Virus (EHV-1 "A" strain or wild type strain).

"This horse competed recently at the Better Barrel Races World Finals in Oklahoma City April 26 to 29th and also a barrel racing event in Taylor, Texas on May 5," Herrin said. Please report any suspicious illness to your veterinarian or Dr. Michael Herrin, (405) 522-6142, michael.herrin@ag.ok.gov.

Then on May 4, the girl told her mother that Olguin fondled

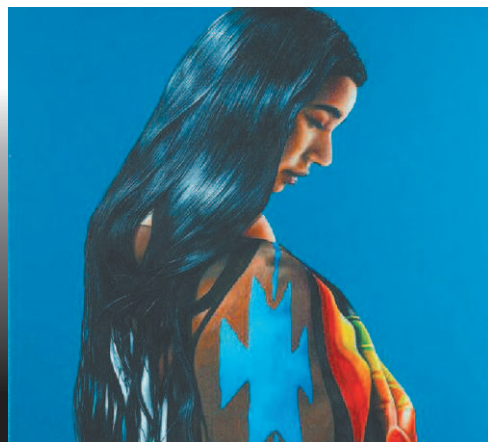
her genitals and breasts while babysitting her on April 14.

be poured next week.

The concrete pour will serve as a test run. Pohlmeir said because of temperature concerns as the area moves into summer, all the bridge pours will be made at night.

When the bridge work began in late October it was announced construction on the first two lanes would take about a year.

But with a \$2 million bonus payment in the offing for completing the bridge ahead of schedule, crews have shaved several weeks off the initial time line.

“We are targeting sometime in July ... if it stays dry a while,” the manager said.

However, the Oklahoma Department of Transportation anticipates that it will be early fall before the new span will open to traffic.

“The resident engineer believes it will be late August or early September,” said ODOT spokeswoman Lisa Shearer-Salim.

Whether July or September, once those lanes open to traffic work will switch to the existing bridge. That span must be demolished before construction can begin on the north two lanes.


Completion of phase two is expected in late June 2019.

The new bridge will be 3,700 feet in length. Some 3,785 feet of refurbished ornamental handrail will be salvaged from the existing bridge and used in the new.

Webber LLC holds the \$36 million contract to replace the aging James C. Nance Memorial Bridge between Purcell and Lexington.

The firm is based in The Woodlands, Texas.

They will be tried in the June 7, 2017, shooting death of David Allen.

According to an affidavit, Allen called the McClain County Sheriff's Department on June 6 and reported he'd

allowed his roommate, Lowe, to borrow his Toyota Tundra pickup the day before and she hadn't returned the vehicle.

The following day, Allen again called the sheriff's department to report Lowe had returned the vehicle.

Then on June 12, the sheriff received a call from Steven Moxley who reported he'd found Allen, a friend, dead outside his home at 21217 Lilac Road.

Charges against Finkbeiner are two counts each of first-degree murder and conspiracy, kidnapping and pattern of criminal offenses.

The victim, Shaliyah Toombs, was discovered in a vehicle along Interstate-35 near Goldsby on May 2.

Toombs, who was seven

months pregnant, was reported missing April 29 from an apartment in southwest Oklahoma City.

According to an affidavit, Vasquez was driving Finkbeiner's pickup and ran out of gas on the interstate.

He walked to the Love's on State Highway 9. There he contacted a Chickasaw Lighthorse Police officer and told him he ran out of gas and there was a murder victim in the pickup.

Each blamed the other for Allen's death.

Lowe told the agents that she was Allen's caregiver and they lived together, but she was in love with Thacker. She said she wanted to steal Allen's pickup so she and Thacker could drive to California to see her family.

According to the affidavit, Thacker went to the mobile home on June 8 and told Lowe to take the dogs outside.

Lowe said she was outside when she heard a gunshot. When she went back inside, the house was empty and there was blood on the floor.

During that time, he and Lowe had a sexual relationship, but he said he hadn't seen her since.

Lowe reportedly told Thacker's stepfather on June 12 that Allen was missing. However, Thacker later told him Allen had been shot by Lowe.

Glasgow:

He was suspended with pay at that time.

In a motion to quash filed Aug. 16, 2017, Richard K. Glasgow's attorney wrote prosecutors had not produced anyone who saw Glasgow shoot and that no bullets were recovered from the scene.

In addition, the motion argued that no one administered a field sobriety, breath or blood alcohol content test to Glasgow witnesses.

However, District Judge Leah Edwards found the defense's claims unproven, leaving her no choice but to

overrule the motion.

Glasgow was charged July 30, 2017, with violating a protective order and four months later prosecutors charged him with two counts of child abuse by injury.

When the felony child abuse charges were filed, the city put Glasgow on unpaid administrative leave. He resigned on Dec. 16, 2017—just 18 days before facing more felonies.

On Jan. 3, 2018, Glasgow was charged with two counts of embezzling public property and a count of violating state statutes on a computer.

She hit .305 and led the team with 18 stolen bases while starting 43 of the 47 games.

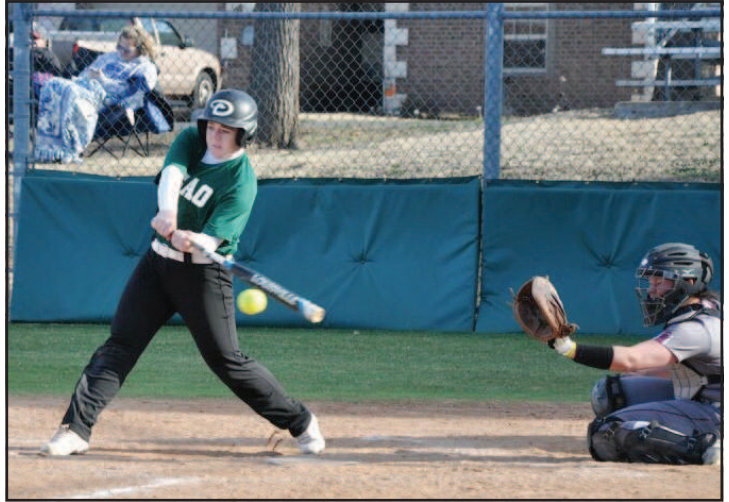

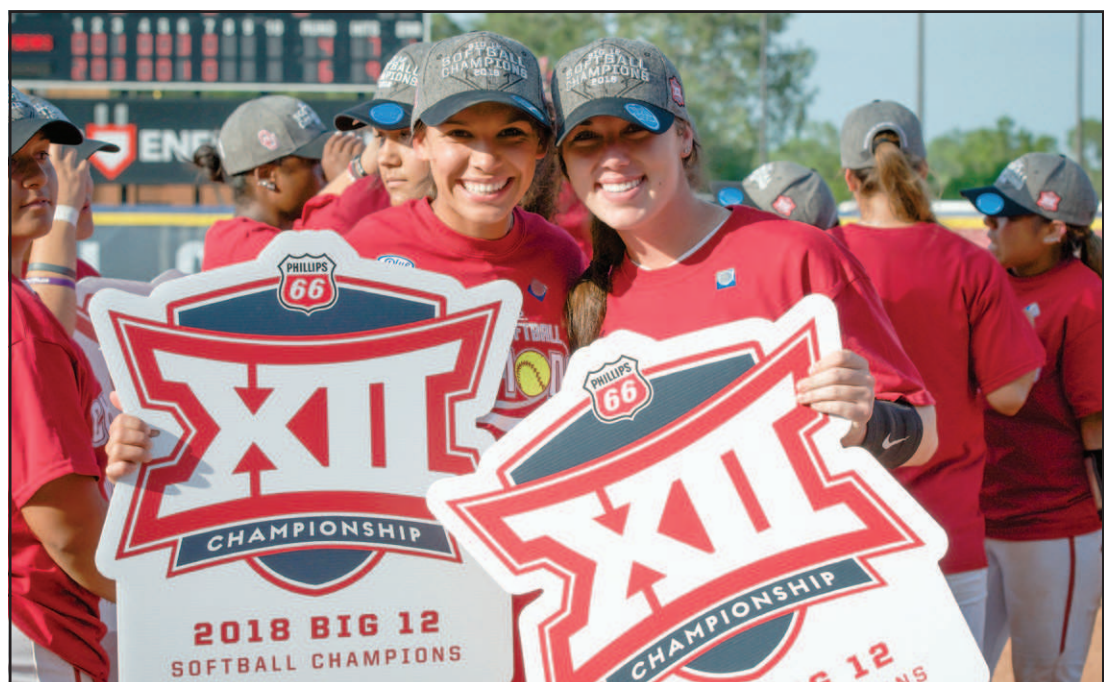

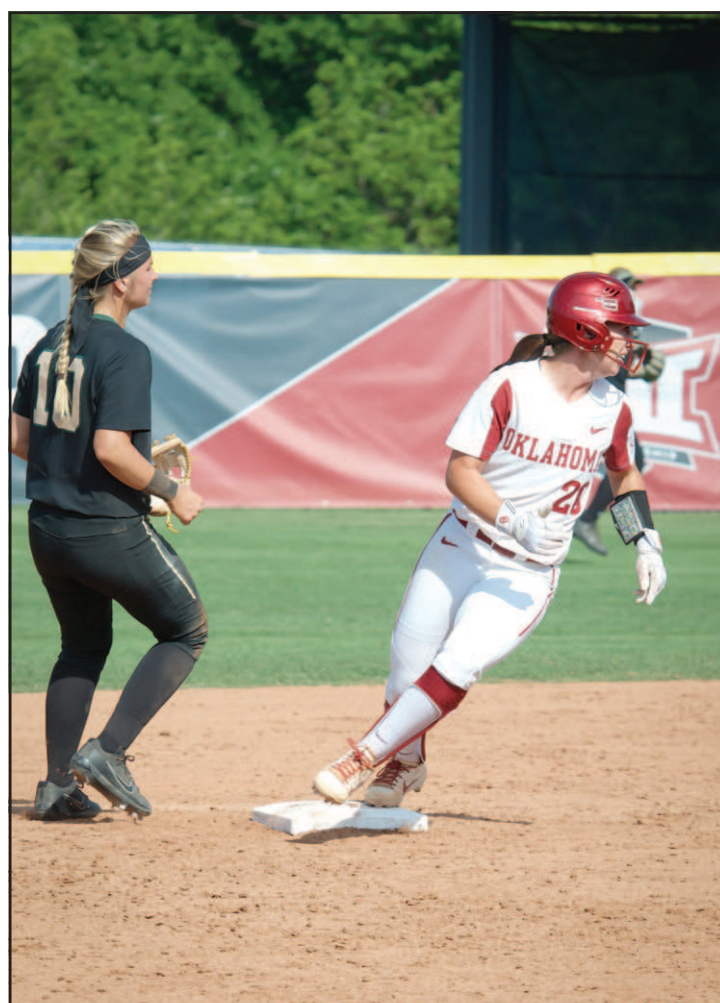

Our Lady of Victory Catholic Church

In last Sunday's liturgy, we heard an ending and a beginning. We heard the ending of Mark's Gospel and the beginning of the book of Acts of the Apostles. In effect, we were hearing the end of Jesus' ministry on earth and the beginning of the time of the Holy Spirit.

It is a time of passing on, of handing over of a gift – the gift of faith in Jesus to the disciples who will now live out that gift in their own particular ways. Let us think first of how that gift of faith is given to us. And then let us think of what we are to do with it.

First of all, faith is given implicitly in a culture of faith. Cinco de Mayo is a celebration of Mexican culture, with its music, dancing and traditional foods. But the culture also carries with it an explicit faith – a faith in the presence of God in the saints, in the Virgin Mary of Guadalupe, in the strength of family bonds, and in a culture of prayer and celebration. Wherever the Mexican culture lives and thrives, it includes the spirit of the Catholic faith.

The indigenous peoples - the American Indians – also have a culture of faith. They feel the sacred in all aspects of the created world. There is no word for “religion” in their language, because the sacred is not separate from the rest of life. The land is not owned by anyone. The land and its resources are a gift that is shared by all in common.

To the American Indian, life is cyclical, like the seasons of the year. This is why they live in a circular tepee, with a single pole up the center which is not connected to the others, but without which the tepee could not stand. This unbound pole represents the Great Spirit, the mystery upon which all else depends.

And so, when a child grows up in a culture such as the Mexican culture, or the Native American Indian culture, the child inherits a faith that is simply part of the air that she breathes. It is natural, and needs no explanation.

But secondly a child also inherits an explicit faith from her mother, or grandmother. She hears the prayers that her mother prays. She sees the actions of faith that her mother makes. The faith of her mother or grandmother is the solid assurance that God is part of all her thoughts and actions. So a child receives a faith – both implicitly from her culture and explicitly from her mother or grandmother.

What then does she do with it? Now she has to make it her own. This now is the work of the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit is the force which helps us make the faith our own which we have inherited. The Spirit is the one who helps create a new faith – the faith of Rosemary or Fr. Jim or Bobby or Susie. It is faith that is specific to our personality and gifts. And it includes both our service and our prayer. The holiest actions of our day are those that are done most in tune with the Spirit, whether these are actions of service or of prayer.

Whatever we do in our service – these tasks can be made holy. Things that we do on our job, for our children or grandchildren, any act of service to the world can be made holy. Both prayer and service are done under the guidance of the Holy Spirit. In the middle of the day, we can simply say “Holy Spirit, I lift up these tasks to you. Make them holy and pleasing in your sight.”

St. Paul says this: “I urge you to live in a manner worthy of the calling (faith) you have received, with all humility and gentleness, with patience, bearing with one another through love, striving to preserve the unity of the Spirit through the bond of peace.” (Eph. 4:1-3) Let us consider the gift that we have been given – perhaps from our mother - the gift of our faith. Let us not take this gift lightly, but cherish it and nurture it and make it our own.

We are grateful for all the catechists who taught our children this past year!
