## Wrongful termination

Suit claims Open Meeting Law violation JeanneGrimes The Purcell Register

An allegation that Dibble Public Schools Superintendent Chad Clanton went around the state's Open Meeting Law to fire the football coach in 2018 is behind a lawsuit filed May 6 in McClain County District Court, Jacob Offolter claims in his lawsuit that Clanton wanted his son to start for the Demons. According to the petition, Dibble's school board hired Offolter as a high school teacher and head football teacher and head football year on March 26, 2018.
Four months later, Offolter Four months later, Offolter attended a coaches clinic in Tulsa. He was arrested and tery/domestic in the presence
of a minor child.
According to an affidavit in that case, Muscogee (Creek) Nation Lighthorse Tribal Police were called to investigate a domestic at the Riverspirit Resort shortly before midnight on July 25.

## Tips to keep mosquitoes out of your landscape

We are still a few weeks out from the official start of sum from the official start of sum mer, but with warmer weathe pending time outside is a prior ity for many. It is fun to invite friends and family over for a cookout. Unfortunately, there will likely be some unwanted pesky guests...mosquitoes.
Much of the state has received quite a bit of rain lately, and while the moisture is welcome, it can lead to a greater population of mosquitoes. Mosquitoes breed in open water sources, so the best way to eliminate these pests is to get rid of their breeding grounds, said David Hillock, Oklahoma State University Cooperative Extension consumer horticulturist.
"Look around your landscape at anything that collects water. Flowerpots, rain gutters, watering cans, old tires or birdbaths are prime breeding ground for mosquitoes," Hillock said. Through some landscape design, we unintentionally create an atmosphere pleasing to mosquitoes. Fortunately, just dumping out the water is an
easy fix."
For those who may employ the use of rain barrel or other containers to collect rain water or irrigation purposes, cover mosquitoes. Be sure to keep out creens clear of debris
Hillock said something as imple as a puddle of water in the lawn can be a breeding ground for these annoying "Fill
"Fill in those low places where water puddles form in an effort to cut down on the mosquito population. Clean out your rain gutters so water doesn't build up inside and create another breeding ground," he said.

Also, check all of the outdoor water spigots around your home to ensure they aren't leaking and causing puddles of water. Flush the water from your bird bath at least twice a week. Not only will this cut down on mosquitoes, the birds will like it, too.'
Children's toys and wading pools are other places mosquitoes like to hang out and things over following each rain
to dump out collected water. If
to dump out collected water. If way that water will not collect For those who have collect For those who have a swim ming pool, fish pond or othe body of water in the landscape make sure it is properly main ained. In addition, keep gras cut short around your home so adult mosquitoes will no hide there
When working in you garden, be sure to wear in outdoor gear clothing and long-sleeved shirts will help provide protection for your arms. This also will help with minimizing sun exposure.
"Obviously, there's no way o completely rid your yard of mosquitoes and keeping ourself protected can be challenging. Insect repellents are another way to provide protection, as well as using citronella oil products such as candles and tiki torches in your outdoor space," Hillock said. With summer just around he corner, families want to spend more and more time outdoors. Don't let the mosquitoes get the best of you," Hillock concluded.

It's like they told the punch line of ajoke without including the setup.
